HENRY MCCALLUM.

WHEREAS certain by-laws contained in Chapters XI. and XIII. of the by-laws proclaimed on December 18, 1906, have been amended by the Municipal Council of Kandy, under the provisions of section 122 of the Municipal Councils' Ordinance, No. 7 of 1887, as amended by the Ordinance No. 8 of 1901, by substituting therefor or adding thereto the by-laws set out in the schedule hereto, and the said amended by-laws having under section 124 (1) of the first-named Ordinance been confirmed by the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, were published in two successive issues of the Government Gazette, namely, on February 18 and 25, 1910, in the English, Sinhalese, and Tamil languages, and laid before the Legislative Council :

And whereas the said amended by-laws were not objected to by the said Legislative Council within forty days after their being so laid before the said Council :

Now therefore know Ye that We, the said Governor, in exercise of the power in Us vested by sub-section (2) of section 124 of the first-named Ordinance, do hereby proclaim the said amended by-laws as set forth in the schedule hereto, and declare that the same shall come into force as from and after the date hereof.

# SCHEDULE.

## CHAPTER XI.

By-law No. 129.—By substituting the following by-law for the by-law as published :—

129. The owner or tenant of every stable, cattle stall, cattle halting place, or gala shall have the same covered with a tiled roof and paved with brick, stone, concrete, cement, or asphalt, and provided with suitable paved or cemented drains for conveying the urine and washings into a covered receptacle constructed in such manner as the Chairman shall direct, the contents of which shall be daily removed at the expense of such owner or tenant and disposed of so that no nuisance is caused thereby. Every such stable, cattle stall, halting place, or gala shall be daily washed, and always kept clean, and whitewashed at least once in three months.

By adding the following by-law after by-law No. 129 :---

129 A. The owner or occupier of any of the following places, viz., any livery or hack stable, horse lines, veterinary infirmary, cart stand, gala, cattle shed, or yard in which ten or more sheep or goats or five or more cattle are kept, shall once at least every day remove or cause to be removed all dung, manure, filth, urine, or other offensive or noxious matter produced in or upon the said premises, and shall cause the same to be deposited in such places as the Chairman shall from time to time direct. 'All such dung, manure, filth, urine, or other offensive or noxious matter produced in or upon such premises will be removed by the Municipal Council on application to the Chairman at such rates as may from time to time be fixed by him.

#### CHAPTER XIII.

By-law No. 207.—By substituting the following by-law for by-law as published :----

207. Householders to deposit rubbish in proper receptacles.—Any person who is desirous that ashes, sweepings, refuse, or other rubbish (other than refuse from premises where any trade is carried on) from his premises shall be removed by the scavengers of the Council, shall deposit the same in covered tubs, boxes, or other like receptacles of such shape and size as shall be approved in writting by the Chairman, on the curb stones or edge of footpaths outside his premises at such hours daily as the Chairman shall from time to time appoint by notice duly given; and shall remove the said tubs, boxes, or other like receptacles within half an hour after the emptying of such tubs, boxes, or other like receptacles by the scavengers. No person shall place any ashes, sweepings, refuse, or other rubbish on any street, except in covered tubs, boxes, or other receptacles as aforesaid, or except at such hours as aforesaid.

#### By adding the following by-law after by-law No. 207 :---

207 A. Removal of trade refuse.—Refuse from premises where any trade is carried on will be removed by the Municipal Council on application to the Chairman at such rates as may from time to time be fixed by him.

By adding the following by-laws after by-law No. 209 :---

209 A. Persons not to pluck plants or flowers in any public or recreation ground.— No person using any public or recreation ground belonging to or in charge of the Municipal Council shall commit any nuisance therein, or pluck plants or flowers without the leave of the Chairman, or do any injury to the trees and shrubs in the ground.

209 B. Picketing animals, &c., forbidden.—No person shall picket animals or collect carts or form an encampment upon any public ground within the Municipality or on any ground or place belonging to or in charge of the Municipal Council without the written permission of the Chairman.

By adding the following by-law after by-law No. 213 :---

213 A. Owner or occupier to repair, cut, or trim fences to a certain height.—The Chairman may require the owner of any land or premises to surround such land or premises with boundary walls or good fences wherever they do not already exist, and where such walls or fences do exist the Chairman may require the owner, lessee, or occupier of such land or premises to put them into a state of proper repair, or to cut and trim the fences, or lower the boundary walls, so that they may not exceed such height from the base of the adjoining roadway as the Chairman may from time to time determine, or to cut and trim all trees which by overhanging any street are likely in the Chairman's opinion to obstruct or cause damage thereto. Written notice of any requirement under this by-law shall be served on the owner, lessee, or occupier, as the case may be, or posted to his address, and the owner, lessee, or occupier shall comply with the terms of the notice within such time as is mentioned therein, or such extension of it as the Chairman may allow.

By adding the following by-law after by-law No. 220 :-

220 A. Hanging mats, dec.—No person shall hang up or otherwise expose any mats, cloths, or other materials or substances on or at the side of any street.

By adding the following by-laws after by-law No. 221 A :---

221 B. Public seats not to be misused or used by injected persons.—No person shall lie down on or put either of his feet on any seat provided by the Municipal Council in any public place or recreation ground.

221 c. No person suffering from any loathsome, infectious, or contagious disease shall sit on or make use of any seat provided by the Municipal Council in any public place or recreation ground.

221 D. Dirt, rubbish, &c., not to be thrown into the lake.—No person shall throw, eause, or suffer to be thrown any dirt, rubbish, filth, or other noisome or offensive matter or thing into the Kandy lake, or into any stream or waterway leading into the lake.

221 E. Sand, &c., not to be removed from the lake.—No person shall remove sand from the Kandy lake without the written permission of the Chairman, or do any act that is likely to cause damage to the bund of the lake.

#### SCHEDULE.

## CHAPTER XX.

#### Bakeries and Eating Houses.

297. (1) *License*.—No place shall be used as a bakery without an annual license from the Chairman.

(2) Water connections.—The person applying for an annual license shall before so doing cause or procure to be laid into the premises a water connection from the water main, and shall cause such connection and all fittings thereof to be kept in proper order and efficient action so as to provide for use on the premises a sufficient supply of water for the purpose of thoroughly washing and cleansing such premises.

298. (1) Walls to be plastered, floor cemented, and drainage provided.—Every bakery shall be well ventilated and well lighted, and the walls thereof impervious, plastered with lime mortar and whitewashed, the floor cemented, and drainage sufficiently provided. A ceiling shall be provided over the table on which the flour is kneaded.

(2) No bakery to be within thirty feet of a cesspit or latrine.—No part of a bakery shall be within thirty feet of any cesspit or latrine, nor in a position where bad odours wafted therefrom shall reach it.

299. No bakery to be used for other purposes.—No place used as a bakery shall be used for any other purpose whatsoever, or shall have internal communication with any part of a dwelling-house.

300. Utensils to be kept clean.—All utensils and other furniture shall be kept clean.

301. Materials used to be wholesome.—The flour, water, and other materials used in the manufacture of bread shall be good and wholesome. There shall be a separate storeroom for flour, and no flour shall be left lying on the floor in any part of the bakery.

302. (1) Removal of refuse and flushing of drains.—All refuse and dirt in and about the premises shall be swept off, and the drains well flushed, and the premises at all times maintained in a clean and tidy condition.

(2) Persons suffering from contagious disease not to be employed.—No person suffering from a contagious or loathsome disease, or who has recently been in attendance on such person, or who is unwashed or otherwise unclean, shall be employed in a bakery.

(3) Kneaders to wear aprons.—All kneaders of flour shall wear large clean aprons.

(4) Precautions to protect bread, &c., from flies and dust.—All reasonable precautions shall be taken to protect cakes, bread, and flour from flies and dust.

(5) Definition of bakery.—A bakery includes any building or part of a building used for any process connected with the baking of bread for sale.

(6) Transport of bread.—No person shall transport bread from any one place to any other place, except in a closed vehicle or a closed basket, tin, or other suitable receptacle. Every such vehicle, basket, tin, or other receptacle shall at all times be kept thoroughly clean and wholesome, and no person shall commit any act which may tend to render any bread which is being transported dirty or unwholesome.

303. (1) Eating-houses.—No person shall, after the passing of these by-laws, keep or manage an eating-house without giving information of that fact to the Chairman within seven days of his commencing to keep or manage such eating-house, and in the case of eating-houses already existing at the time these by-laws come into operation within thirty days of the coming into operation of these by-laws. Any person who shall appear, act, or behave as the person in charge of an eating-house shall be deemed and taken to be the keeper or manager thereof.

(2) The provisions of by-laws 298, 300, 302 (1), and 302 (2) shall apply to eatinghouses. An eating-house includes any house or place where cooked rice is kept for sale, other than a house for which a license has been obtained under "The Licensing Ordinance, 1891."

304. Bakery to be subject to examination.—Every bakery and the management and the conduct of the business shall be always open and subject to examination by the Chairman of the Municipal Council, the Health Officer, and all persons acting under the authority of the said Chairman.

## HENRY MCCALLUM.

W HEREAS the port of Galle was brought within the operation of the Master Attendant's Ordinance, No. 6 of 1865, by a Proclamation dated January 6, 1866 :

And whereas by section 6 of the said Ordinance it is enacted that the Governor may from time to time, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, frame and establish such port rules not inconsistent with the said Ordinance as he may think necessary for any of the purposes in the several sub-sections of the said section specified :

And whereas the Governor, in Executive Council, has from time to time framed and established certain port rules in respect of the said port for the purposes of the said Ordinance, and among other rules the rules proclaimed on November 23, 1906:

And whereas it is expedient that a new rule should be added :

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, in exercise of the powers vested in Us, and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, do hereby frame and establish port rule No. 32 in the manner set out hereto for the said port of Galle, and We do further promulgate the said rule to take effect as from and after July 15, 1910.

#### RULE REFERRED TO.

32. No ballast, ashes, or rubbish shall be thrown overboard from any vessel or boat within the port under a depth of twelve fathoms water.

The commander of any vessel within the harbour from which any cargo shall have been dropped overboard and sunk shall report the same immediately to the Master Attendant, who will take steps to recover it, the cost of which shall be borne by the vessel from which the article dropped overboard.

The tindal or person in charge of any boat receiving or discharging cargo alongside of any vessel shall also report to the Master Attendant all cases of cargo dropping overboard from the vessel's slings in the act of being lowered into or hoisted out of his boat as soon as possible after the occurrence.

1. Applications for apprenticeship in the Public Works Department must be made to the Director of Public Works.

2. All applications must be accompanied by copies of certificates and a statement giving age of applicant, nationality, where educated, and particulars of any special qualifications.

3. Candidates must be of sound constitution, possessed of good sight, and be otherwise physically qualified for service, and they will be called upon to undergo a medical examination to test these points.

4. The period of apprenticeship will be five years.

5. All candidates before being accepted will be required to undergo a probationary term of six months, which, in the event of the candidate subsequently being admitted as an apprentice, will be counted towards the period of his apprenticeship.

6. A candidate before being admitted as an apprentice will be required to enter into an agreement to diligently serve as an apprentice for five years, obey all lawful orders of the Director of Public Works or any officer of the Public Works Department under whom he may be ordered by the Director of Public Works to serve, to keep all lawful secrets, and not to correspond directly or indirectly in the public press.

7. Candidates admitted as apprentices will have no claim to any remuneration during the first two years of their apprenticeship, but will, subject to their attention to duty, diligence, and capabilities being considered satisfactory by the Director of Public Works, receive pay during the third year at a rate not exceeding 50 cents per diem, during the fourth year at a rate not exceeding Re. 1 per diem, and during the fifth year at a rate not exceeding Re. 1 50 per diem.

8. Candidates, upon the completion of their apprenticeship, will have no claim upon Government for further employment or remuneration, but will, in the event of vacancies occurring, be eligible for appointments as Head Overseers in the Public Works Department.

SIR,—WITH reference to Lord Elgin's circular despatch of June 6, 1907, I have the honour to inform you that His Majesty's Government have again had under consideration the question of the grant of passports in this country to persons naturalized in the British Colonies.

2. Hitherto it has been the practice of the Foreign Office to issue passports to such persons upon production of a letter from this Department certifying to their identity and nationality.

3. The Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, however, has drawn attention to the fact that the certificate given in this Department does not contain any statement as to the respectability of the applicant or assurance that he is a fit and proper person to be entrusted with a passport signed by the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs requiring His Majesty's representatives abroad to afford him every assistance and protection of which he may stand in need.

4.<sup>7</sup> A statement to this effect is required in the case of all British subjects born or naturalized in the United Kingdom who may apply to the Foreign Office for passports, and careful inquiries are made in all cases in which there is any doubt about the suitability of the applicant. The same rule is now being extended in similar circumstances to all persons who may be resident in one of the self-governing Dominions, and no reason exists for exempting from the operations of the rule persons who, being by birth or naturalization British subjects, are usually resident in Crown Colonies or Protectorates.

5. In the case, however, of persons resident in a Colony, it is not always possible to obtain in this country evidence of the kind required, and I have, therefore, to request that you will take the necessary steps for causing it to be notified publicly in the Territories under your Government that any British subject residing therein who may expect to require a passport to be issued to him when he comes to this country must furnish himself with evidence of such a character as will enable the Colonial Office to recommend him to the Foreign Office as a fit and proper person to be entrusted with a passport.

6. I would add that in the case of a naturalized British subject this requirement will be in addition to the evidence of identity and nationality contained in the applicant's naturalization papers.

ON Friday night, the Sixth of May instant, at a quarter to twelve o'clock, our late Most Gracious Sovereign King Edward the Seventh expired at Buckingham Palace in the sixty-ninth year of his age, and the tenth of his, reign. This event has caused one universal feeling of regret and sorrow to His late Majesty's faithful and attached subjects, to whom he was endeared by the deep interest in their welfare which he invariably manifested, as well as by the eminent and impressive virtues which illustrated and adorned his character.

Upon the intimation of this distressing event, the Lords of the Privy Council assembled this day at St. James's Palace and gave orders for proclaiming His present Majesty, who made a most Gracious Declaration to them, and \* caused all the Lords and others of the late King's Privy Council, who were then present, to be sworn of His Majesty's Privy Council.

WHEREAS it has pleased Almighty God to call to His Mercy our late Sovereign Lord King Edward the Seventh of blessed and glorious memory, by whose decease the Imperial Crown of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland is solely and rightfully come to the High and Mighty Prince George Frederick Ernest Albert : We, therefore, the Lords Spiritual and Temporal of this Realm, being here assisted with these of His late Majesty's Privy Council, with numbers of other principal gentlemen of quality, with the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Citizens of London, do now hereby, with one voice and consent of tongue and heart, publish and proclaim that the High and Mighty Prince George Frederick Ernest Albert is now, by the death of our late Sovereign of happy memory, become our only lawful and rightful Liege Lord George the Fifth by the Grace of God, King of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India; to whom we do acknowledge all faith and constant obedience, with all hearty and humble affection; beseeching God, by whom kings and queens do reign, to bless the Royal Prince George the Fifth with long and happy years to reign over Us.

"To endeavour to follow in his footsteps, and at the same time to uphold the constitutional government of, these realms, will be the earnest object of my life. I am deeply sensible of the very heavy responsibilities which have fallen upon me. I know that I can rely upon Parliament and upon the people of these islands and of my dominions beyond the seas for their help in the discharge of these arduous duties, and for their prayers that God will grant me strength and guidance. I am encouraged by the knowledge that I have in my dear wife one who will be a constant helpmate in every endeavour for our people's good."

# VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended June 4, 1910.

Births.—The total births registered were 106 (1 European, 10 Burghers, 51 Sinhalese, 17 Tamils, 18 Moors, 7 Malaysand 2 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on January 1, 1910, viz., 185,704) was 29 8, as against 21 6 in the preceding week, 26 1 in the corresponding week of last year, and 25 1 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 121 (2 Europeans, 5 Burghers, 58 Sinhalese, 25 Tamils, 24 Moors, 3 Malays, and 4 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 34.0, as against 80.9 in the previous week, 35.5 in the corresponding week of last year, and 33.7 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.-Of the 121 total deaths, 36 were of infants under one year of age, as against 25 in the preceding week, 30 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 27 the average for last year.

Still Births.-The number of still births registered during the week was 6.

Selected Causes of Death.—Seventeen deaths were registered from Phthisis (against 11 in the previous week and 15 the weekly average for last year), of which 5 were in Kotahena, 4 each in New Bazaar and Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), 3 in St. Paul's, and 1 in San Sebastian.

2. Eleven deaths were registered from *Pneumonia* (against 17 in the previous week and 15 the weekly average for last year), of which 3 were in Kollupitiya, 2 each in St. Paul's and New Bazaar, and 1 each in Pettah, San Sebastian, Maradana hospitals, and Maradana (exclusive of hospitals). Four deaths were registered from *Bronchitis*.

3. Thirteen deaths were registered from Infantile Convulsions, 11 from Diarrheea (including 3 infants), 9 from Tetanus (8 infants), 8 Worms (1 infant), 6 Dysentery, 5 Debility (4 infants), 4 Old Age, 3 Enteritis (1 infant), 3 Peritonities. and 22 from Other Causes.

4. Five deaths were registered from *Enteric Fever*, as in the previous two weeks (against 6 the weekly average for last year), 1 each in Pettah, Kotahena, New Bazaar, Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), and Slave Island. There were 15 cases reported during the week, as in the previous week.

5. Five cases of *Measles* were reported, against 1 in the previous week; and 22 of *Chick npox*, against 18 in the previous week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was  $84.5^{\circ}$ , against  $84.2^{\circ}$  in the preceding week and  $82.4^{\circ}$  in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.878 in., against 29.917 in. in the preceding week and 29.834 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 0.32 in., against 0.08 in. in the preceding week and 1.13 in in the corresponding week of the previous year.
