**VITAL STATISTICS OF TOWNS IN CEYLON IN THE  
MONTH OF APRIL, 1910!**

**REPORT OF THE REGISTRAR-GENERAL.**

THIS report deals with the Vital Statistics of the 31 principal towns in the Island proclaimed under sections 31 to 36 of the Ordinance No. 1 of 1895.

**Births.**

2. The births registered in the 31 towns during the month numbered 1,078 (540 males and 538 females), and were equal to an annual rate of 26·64 per 1,000, against 29·03 during the preceding month, 26·95 in the corresponding month of last year, and 29·94 the monthly average for the thirty months, July, 1907, to December, 1909. Of the towns (excluding Vavuniya and Lunugala, which have a population under 1,000), the highest birth-rate was in Mullaittivu (67·97, average 32·00), and the lowest in Hatton and Dikoya (3·05, average 15·86).

3. In the city of Colombo the births numbered 291 (149 males and 142 females), and were equal to an annual rate of 18·88 per 1,000, against 25·61 in the preceding month, 21·90 in the corresponding month of last year, and 25·12 the monthly average. Of the wards (omitting Fort and Galle Face and the Pettah, which contain a population mainly adult and floating), the highest birth-rate was in Maradana, exclusive of hospitals (20·53, average 22·50), and the lowest in Kollupitiya (8·00, average 16·19).

**Deaths.**

4. The deaths registered in the 31 towns during the month numbered 1,120 (612 males and 508 females), and were equal to an annual rate of 22·11 per 1,000, against 24·05 during the preceding month, 29·28 in the corresponding month of last year, and 31·58 the monthly average. The health of the towns was thus better than usual, and than in the previous month. Excluding Vavuniya and Lunugala, the highest death-rate was in Mullaittivu (65·11, average 48·83), followed by Puttalam (47·46, average 42·86), and the lowest in Panadure (11·74, average 30·77).

5. In the city of Colombo the deaths registered numbered 321 (178 males and 143 females), and were equal to an annual rate of 19·06 per 1,000, against 23·06 during the preceding month, 30·63 in the corresponding month of last year, and 34·03 the monthly average. The city was thus healthier than usual, and than in the previous month. Omitting the Fort and Galle Face Ward and the Pettah Ward, the lowest death-rate was in Kollupitiya (11·49, average 20·20), and the highest in Slave Island (17·02, average 28·01).

**Infantile Mortality.**

6. The infantile mortality of the 31 towns was equal to a rate of 283 per 1,000 births registered, against 215 in the previous month, 253 in the corresponding month of last year, and 319 the monthly average. In the towns having an estimated population of 5,000 or more, the infantile mortality ranged from 500 in Kurunegala (average 491) to 59 in Moratuwa (average 195).

7. The infantile mortality in the city of Colombo was 251 per 1,000 births registered, against 260 in the previous month, 344 in the corresponding month of last year, and 407 the monthly average, and ranged from 450 in Slave Island (average 368) to 91 in San Sebastian (average 329).

**Causes of Death.**

8. *Infants*.—Out of the 1,120 deaths from all causes at all ages in the 31 towns, 205 were among infants under one year. Of these, the chief causes were 84 *Convulsions* (including 25 in Colombo, 19 in Galle); 32 *Debility* (8 in Colombo, 7 in Jaffna); 14 *Premature Birth* (4 in Colombo, 4 in Jaffna); 14 *Tetanus* (9 in Colombo); 11 *Bronchitis* (6 in Colombo); 9 *Pneumonia* (3 in Colombo).

9. Out of the 321 deaths from all causes at all ages in the city of Colombo, 73 were among infants under one year. Of these, the chief causes were 25 *Convulsions* (11 in Maradana, exclusive of hospitals); 9 *Tetanus* (3 each in St. Paul's, Kotahena, and New Bazaar); 8 *Debility* (3 in Slave Island); 6 *Bronchitis* (3 in St. Paul's).

10. *General Mortality (One Year and over)*.—Out of the 915 deaths of persons one year and over in age in the 31 towns, there were 125 from *Diarrhoea* (19 in Ratnapura, 16 in Matale, 12 in Kandy); 120 from *Pneumonia* (25 in Colombo; 82 from *Phthisis* (37 in Colombo); 53 from *Dysentery* (8 in Colombo, 8 in Trincomalee); 50 from *Old Age* (18 in Colombo); 41 from *Dochmimus Duodenalis* (10 in Matale); 36 from *Debility*; 33 from *Enteritis* (20 in Galle); 25 from *Worms* (13 in Galle); 22 from *Malarial Cachexia* (6 in Matara).

11. The highest mortality in the town of Colombo was from *Phthisis* (15 per cent. of all deaths one year and over), followed by *Pneumonia* (10 per cent.), *Enteric Fever* (5 per cent.). Out of the 82 deaths from *Phthisis* in all towns, 37 occurred in Colombo. This and *Pneumonia* were responsible for 65 deaths at all ages in the city, or 20 per cent. of the deaths from all causes in it.

12. Taking all the towns together, *Diarrhoea* and *Dysentery* contributed the highest mortality (16 per cent.), followed by *Bronchitis* and *Pneumonia* (14 per cent.), *Infantile Convulsions* (9 per cent.), *Phthisis* (7 per cent.).
