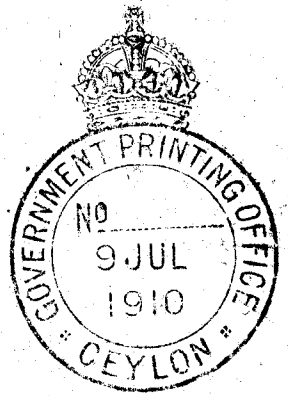
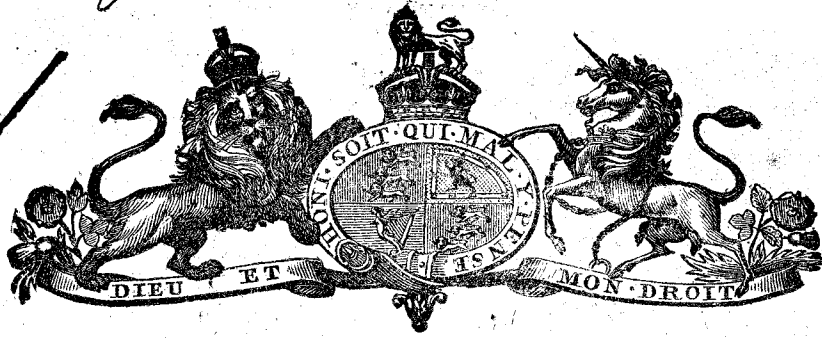

And whereas the said by-laws were not objected to by the said Legislative Council within forty days after their having been so laid before the said Council :

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, in exercise of the power in Us vested by sub-section (2) of section 124 of the first-named Ordinance, do hereby proclaim the said by-laws.

GOD SAVE THE KING.

BY-LAWS REFERRED TO.

1. The annual tax prescribed by section 128 of "The Municipal Councils' Ordinance, 1887," shall be paid before February 1 in each year in respect of all carts and hackeries kept or used within the Municipality and in respect of the animals employed in drawing them, whether these vehicles and animals have or have not been licensed under "The Vehicles Ordinance, 1901."

2. On payment of the annual tax the proper officer of the Municipal Council will issue a metal plate marked with the letter "C," and with figures denoting the year for which the license is issued, and the corresponding number in the register of vehicles kept by the Municipal Council. The proper officer of the Municipal Council before issuing a plate for a cart or hackery may, if he thinks fit, require the owner to paint in a conspicuous place on the cart or hackery the year and the registered number of the vehicle.

3. The owner or person in charge of any cart or hackery in respect of which a license has issued shall keep, in addition to any plate which he is required to exhibit by "The Vehicles Ordinance, 1901," the plate issued under these by-laws affixed in a conspicuous place on the body of the cart or hackery.

4. Where the plate prescribed by these by-laws is not duly affixed in accordance with these by-laws to any cart or hackery kept or used within the Municipality, the owner and the person in charge of such vehicle shall each be liable to a penalty not exceeding Rs. 10.

5. Any Municipal Inspector or Police Officer may detain any cart or hackery kept or used within the Municipality, to which the prescribed plate is not duly affixed in accordance with these by-laws, and in such case shall forthwith bring the owner or person in charge of the vehicle before the Municipal or Police Magistrate.

G O D S A V E T H E K I N G.

BY-LAW REFERRED TO.

(Substituted for By-law No. 6 of Chapter XIV.)

In taking samples of milk the Medical Officer of Health or Assistant Medical Officer of Health, Veterinary Surgeon, or Municipal Inspector shall take three samples, and shall at once seal them in presence of the registered dairyman or other person from whom they are taken, and shall deliver one to such registered dairyman or other person, send the second to a qualified Analyst, and the third to the Municipal Office. A certificate signed by such qualified Analyst, if it states that the sample is adulterated, shall be evidence that the milk from which the sample was taken was adulterated. Should any evidence to the contrary be offered, a similar certificate from the Government Analyst shall be conclusive on the question of adulteration.

(3, Chapter XIII.)

It shall not be lawful for any stall-holder to take into or keep in any stall any box, table, chair, or other article whatsoever not provided by the Council, or to fix up any pole or shelf in any stall without the permission of the Chairman.

South : Elahena, Malakandura, and culvert No. 284.

West : 17th milestone on the side of Kandy-Hindagala-Deltota Public Works Department road.

The limits of Mailapitiya are :—

The high road leading from Kandy to Haragama from culvert No. 126 near the Public Works Department building to the 12th milestone with an extent of 100 yards on either side of the road.

Regulations framed under Section 9 of the Rabies Ordinance, No. 7 of 1893.

(a) Every owner of a dog within the limits of the Local Board of Ratnapura shall cause such dog to be muzzled or led by a chain when in any public road or place within such limits. The muzzle shall be so constructed as to render it impossible for the dog, while wearing the same, to bite any person or animal, but not so as to prevent the dog from breathing freely or lapping water.

(b) A dog shall not be considered effectually controlled unless muzzled as above, or led by some competent person by means of a collar and chain, both of which shall be securely fastened to the dog's neck.

(c) Any dog found in any public road or place unprovided with a muzzle, or not under control by means of a collar and chain, may be seized by any police officer or any person duly appointed for the purpose by the Local Board and removed to the nearest dog shelter or slaughter-house, there to be dealt with in the following manner:—

(1) If the dog is affected with or suspected of rabies, it shall be forthwith slaughtered.

(2) If the dog is not affected with or suspected of rabies, it shall be detained in the dog shelter or slaughter-house. Provided that where the owner or person having charge of a dog so detained is known, the Local Board or some person duly authorized by the Board shall forthwith cause notice to be given to such owner or person of the fact of the dog having been so seized and detained, and the dog shall, without prejudice to the recovery of any penalty for the breach of these regulations, be given up to such owner or persons on payment of the reasonable expenses of detention.

(3) If the dog so seized and detained shall not have been claimed by such owner or person within three days after the seizure, or, where such owner or person is known, within two days after the aforesaid notice has been given, the Local Board shall cause the dog to be slaughtered or otherwise disposed of in such manner as the Local Board deems expedient.

(d) The owner or person in charge for the time being of any dog which shall have been seized and detained under these regulations shall be liable to pay to the local Board the following charge:—

For detention for each day 50 cents, and such charge shall be recoverable if the dog is not affected with or suspected of rabies by the sale thereof, unless the said charge shall have been paid before sale by the owner or person in charge of the dog; otherwise the charge shall be recoverable in the manner provided by section 1 of Ordinance No. 6 of 1873, in respect to the order in which the property of public defaulters may be seized and sold.

(e) These regulations shall be in force for a period of three months from July 4, 1910.

SIR,—WITH reference to Lord Elgin's circular despatch of January 25, 1907, I have the honour to transmit to you, for publication or for such action as may be considered desirable, a copy of revised regulations for the Matriculation Examination of the University of London, and to call attention to the regulations with regard to the optional languages which may be taken by candidates for that examination.

The External Registrar states that the following languages have been accepted by the Matriculation Board :—

Starred under old Regulations.—Spanish, Portuguese, Italian, Modern Dutch, Arabic, Sanskrit, Hebrew, Chinese ;

By the Matriculation Board, January 25, 1909.—Burmese, Gaelic (Irish, Scottish, or Welsh), Hindustani, Persian, Russian, Tamil,* Urdu—

and that the special fee referred to in the regulations is £1 in the case of either Spanish or Hebrew, and £2 in the case of any other of the languages named. This special fee must be paid by candidates taking such languages at the same time as the ordinary fee for the examination, and should be forwarded with the application for the examination.

The regulation comes into force so far as the Colonies are concerned in January next.

REGULATIONS FOR MATRICULATION.

IMPORTANT NOTICES.

The attention of all students who matriculate is directed to the following extract from Statute No. 120 :—

"No student shall be admitted to the Final Examination for a degree until the expiration of at least three years after Matriculation, unless the Senate in special cases otherwise determine."

MATRICULATION.

Candidates for any degree in this University, unless admitted under Statute 113,* or under the second clause of Statute 116,† must have passed the Matriculation Examination either in its ordinary form or in the form of the School Examination (Matriculation or Higher Standard for the School-leaving Certificate) at least three years previously to the Final Examination for a First Degree.‡

Students admitted under Statute 113, or under Statute 116, upon a qualification other than the Matriculation Examination, must pay a registration fee of £2 to the appropriate Registrar.

The Matriculation Examination and all other examinations of the University are open to men and women alike.

There shall be three examinations for Matriculation in each year, one commencing on September 15 if that day be a Monday, or if not, on the Monday next preceding the 15th; one on the second Monday in January; and the third on the second Monday in June (or July, as may be hereafter determined).§

† See Appendices to these Regulations, No. II.

‡ The Medical and Surgical Degrees of this University are registrable qualifications, and it is not necessary for students to register as Medical Students in order to qualify for the examinations for these degrees. Compliance with the University Regulations is sufficient. For the diplomas of certain other licensing bodies, however, registration as a Medical Student by the General Medical Council is a necessary preliminary, and under the present regulations of the Council, those desiring to use the Matriculation Examination of this University as a qualification for registration must show that they have passed in Latin and in Greek or a modern foreign language.

§ The examinations in January and June (or July), but not that in September, may be held not only at the University, but also under special arrangements in other parts of the United Kingdom or in the Colonies. Neither Botany nor Drawing can be taken in the Colonies.

Every candidate entering for the Matriculation Examination must pay a fee of £2. If a candidate withdraws his name before the last day of entry to the examination the fee shall be returned to him. If he fails to present himself at the examination, he shall be allowed to enter again within eight months for the Matriculation Examination on payment of a fee of £1. If he retires after the commencement of the examination, or fails to pass it, the full fee of £2 shall be payable upon every re-entry.*

Candidates who have matriculated in the University by examination, whether it be by the Matriculation Examination or by the School Examination (Matriculation Standard), will not be admitted to any subsequent Matriculation Examination as a whole; but they can enter any subsequent Matriculation Examination with a view to passing in one or more additional subjects on payment of a fee of £1 for a single subject and of £2 for two or more subjects.

Matriculated students of the University who have been registered under Statute 116 and members of the University who have proceeded to any Intermediate Examination in any Faculty or to the Preliminary Scientific Examination will not be admitted to any subsequent Matriculation Examination in whole or in part. Nevertheless, candidates who have so proceeded after passing the Matriculation Examination may, for the special purpose (which must be declared) of satisfying the requirements of a Public Authority, and on the conditions stated above, enter for one or more subjects of the Matriculation Examination. The names of such candidates will not appear on the pass list, nor will they receive certificates; but the University will on their behalf, notify their success to the Public Authority concerned.

The examination shall be conducted by means of printed papers; but the Examiners shall not be precluded from putting, for the purpose of ascertaining the competence of the candidates to pass, *viva voce* questions to any candidate in the subjects in which they are appointed to examine.

Candidates shall not be approved by the Examiners unless they have shown at one and the same examination a competent knowledge in each of the following five subjects, according to the details specified under the several heads:—

- (1) English. One paper of three hours.
- (2) Elementary Mathematics. Two papers of three hours each.
- (3) Latin, or Elementary Mechanics, or Elementary Physics—Heat, Light, and Sound—or Elementary Chemistry, or Elementary Botany. One paper of three hours in each subject.
- (4) and (5) Two of the following subjects, neither of which has already been taken under section (3). One paper of three hours in each subject. If Latin be not taken, one of the other subjects selected must be another language either ancient or modern:—

Latin.
Greek.
French.
German.
Ancient History.
Modern History.
Physical and General Geography.
History and Geography. †
Logic.
Geometrical and Mechanical Drawing. ‡
Mathematics (more advanced).
Elementary Mechanics.
Elementary Chemistry.
Elementary Physics—Heat, Light, and Sound.
Elementary Physics—Electricity and Magnetism.
Elementary Biology—Botany. §
Elementary Biology—Zoology. ||
Elementary Geology. ¶

A candidate desirous of offering any language or languages other than those named above should submit his proposal for the consideration of the Matriculation Board. The normal notice of such proposal is six months before the beginning of the Matriculation Examination for which he enters. Candidates giving less than six months' notice are advised that it may not be possible to make arrangements for papers to be set at the next Matriculation Examination, even though the language be approved.

Proposals to take a particular language, other than those mentioned above, must be accompanied by a special fee, additional to the regular Matriculation fee. This fee will be returned should the proposed language not be accepted by the Matriculation Board, but in no other case. The amount of this additional fee varies with the language selected, and can be ascertained on application to the External Registrar.

The following are the particulars of the foregoing subjects of examination:—

I.—ENGLISH. **

The paper will include—

- (a) A subject for an essay to be chosen by each candidate from several subjects set. Those proposed may include some having reference to Geography and History, and some involving an acquaintance with English Authors, as well as more abstract subjects, the main object being to test power of expression, thought, and arrangement, general reading, and knowledge. (All candidates will be expected to attempt the essay, to which special importance is attached.)
- (b) Questions testing knowledge and command of English. These may include questions on precis writing, paraphrase, and analysis of sentences.
- (c) Questions testing general reading and knowledge of English books.

* Candidates who entered for the Matriculation Examination in or before January, 1902, will for the present be admitted to subsequent Matriculations upon payment at every such entry of a fee of £1, provided that they comply with the above Regulations. Colonial Candidates who withdraw their names after having entered for, or who fail to present themselves at, an examination will be required to pay the full fee of £2 upon every re-entry.

† Candidates who take the combined paper in History and Geography will not be allowed to take, whether in the general examination or for supplementary certificate, either the Modern History paper or the paper in Physical and General Geography; but candidates who have taken either of those subjects separately will be allowed to take the combined paper for a supplementary certificate.

‡ This subject cannot be taken in the Colonies.

§ In this examination special stress is laid on competence in Drawing. This subject cannot be taken in the Colonies.

|| Candidates for examination in these subjects must give notice and pay their fee at least two months before the commencement of the examination.

II.—ELEMENTARY MATHEMATICS.

Arithmetic.—The principles and processes of Arithmetic applied to whole numbers and vulgar and decimal fractions. The Metric System. Approximation to a specified degree of accuracy. Contracted methods of multiplication and division of decimals. Ratio and proportion; percentage. Averages. Practical applications of Arithmetic.

Algebra.—Symbolical expression of general results in Arithmetic.

Algebraic laws and their applications. Factors of simple binomial or quadratic expressions. Equations of the first or second degree, and problems leading thereto. Square root. Graphs of simple rational integral algebraic functions. Arithmetic and harmonic progression. Geometric progression.

Geometry.—The subjects of Euclid I.—IV., with simple deductions; including easy loci and the areas of triangles and parallelograms, of which the bases and altitudes are given commensurable lengths. (Euclid's proofs will not be insisted upon.)

III.—OPTIONAL LANGUAGES.

Latin.—The paper shall contain passages to be translated into English from Latin books not previously prescribed, together with questions on Grammar and simple and easy sentences of English to be translated into Latin.*

Candidates who take Latin may also take an additional paper on Latin prose, if they give notice on their entry forms. This paper will not be a part of the Matriculation Examination, and marks gained on it will not be credited to the candidate. Two hours will be allowed for this paper, which will be of about the same difficulty as the corresponding paper in Responsions at Oxford.†

Greek.—The paper shall contain passages to be translated into English from Greek books not previously prescribed, together with questions on Grammar and simple and easy sentences of English to be translated into Greek.‡

French.—The paper shall contain (1) passages for translation from French, (2) a piece of easy translation into French, or, as an alternative, an essay of a simple character to be written in French, (3) questions on Grammar limited to Accidence and Elementary Syntax.

German.—The paper shall contain (1) passages for translation from German, (2) a piece of easy translation into German, or, as an alternative, an essay of a simple character to be written in German, (3) questions on Grammar limited to Accidence and Elementary Syntax.

Other Languages.—The paper in any other language approved for the Matriculation Examination shall be drawn up as nearly as may be practicable in conformity with the following syllabus:—

The paper shall contain (1) an easy passage or easy passages for translation from the language in question, (2) an easy piece for translation into the language in question, or, as an alternative, an essay of a simple character to be written in the language in question, (3) questions in Grammar limited to Accidence and Elementary Syntax.

IV.—HISTORY.

Ancient.—The general course of Greek and Roman History, from an outline of the earlier monarchies. The questions will be framed to test the general conceptions of history and historical development rather than technical detail.

Modern.—The general course of English history from 1485 to the death of Queen Victoria, with some reference to the contemporary history of Europe and Colonial developments.

The questions will be framed to test the general conception of history and historical development rather than technical detail.

V.—PHYSICAL AND GENERAL GEOGRAPHY.

The following regions in decreasing detail:—(a) England and Wales, (b) Scotland and Ireland; (c) Europe, the Mediterranean, the North Atlantic, North America, and Greenland, (d) the remaining Continents. Recapitulation from the point of view of the British Empire.

Attention should be directed to the following aspects of the several regions:—The broad contrasts and chief features of the land relief. The chief features of the coastal outline as related to those of the relief. The disposition of the water partings and of the chief river basins. The winds and sea currents, distribution of rainfall, the climatic contrasts, and the resulting agricultural contrasts. The districts of exceptionally dense or rare population considered in relation to their position, natural resources, and industrial activities. The arrangement of the political divisions upon the land relief and with reference to the drainage system. The analysis of the positions of the great towns.

Candidates will be expected to understand the main physical causes of the phenomena they describe, such as variations of atmospheric temperature and pressure, their seasonal and regional distribution; the causes of precipitation, winds—their cause and prevalence in different regions, the interpretation of weather charts, and the meaning of the network and other conventional symbols employed in maps. VI.—HISTORY AND GEOGRAPHY.

Candidates who take the combined paper in History and Geography will not be allowed to take either the Modern History paper or the paper in Physical and General Geography.

History.—The general course of English History from 1688 to the death of Queen Victoria, with some reference to the contemporary history of Europe and Colonial developments.

The questions will be framed to test the general conceptions of history and historical development rather than technical detail.

Geography.—The British Isles and (in outline) the rest of the world.

Attention should be directed to the following aspects of the several regions:—The broad contrasts and chief features of the land-relief. The chief features of the coastal outline as related to those of the relief. The disposition of the water partings and of the chief river basins. The winds and sea currents; distribution of rainfall, the climatic contrasts, and the resulting agricultural contrasts. The districts of exceptionally dense or rare population considered in relation to their position, natural resources, and industrial activities. The arrangement of the political divisions upon the land relief and with reference to the drainage system. The analysis of the positions of the great towns.

VII.—LOGIC.

Except in the case of Elementary Mathematics, candidates will only be allowed to take one paper in each subject. Two papers will be set in many other subjects in order to compress the examination into as short a period as possible, but no candidate will be allowed to take more than one of these papers. No option is allowed as to the order in which they are taken, and if the candidate does not present himself for examination in a given subject at the right time, he will on no account whatever be allowed to take a paper which may be set later on the same subject. It is, therefore, of the greatest importance that candidates should attend to the following rule:—

Candidates, having selected their subjects in accordance with the regulations, will be examined in these subjects in the numerical order in which they occur in the above list, and must take each subject on the first possible occasion accordingly.

Thus, a candidate who offers, in addition to English and Mathematics (Elementary), Botany, Mechanics, and French, must take Botany (No. 5) on the afternoon of the third day, Mechanics (No. 7) on the morning of the fourth day, and French (No. 9) on the afternoon of the fourth day. Again, a candidate who offers Latin, German (10), and Greek (11), must take German in the morning and Greek in the afternoon of the fourth day.

Candidates who take any of the subjects for which two months' notice is required will be informed when the examination in these subjects will take place.

A pass certificate, signed by the Principal and setting forth the subjects of examination taken by the candidate, shall be delivered to each successful candidate after the report of the Examiners shall have been approved by the Senate.‡

CERTIFICATES IN ENGLISH.

Any person will be admitted to take the English paper and *viva voce* test at the Matriculation Examination on payment of a fee of £2 for each entry, and subject to the General Regulations affecting that examination.

A certificate will be issued to each successful candidate stating that he has submitted himself to an oral and written test in English and has shown an adequate knowledge of the subject.

Any person who has obtained the foregoing certificate will be admitted to take the English papers at the Intermediate Examination in Arts (Pass) for External Students and a *viva voce* test on payment of a fee of £3, and subject to the General Regulations affecting that examination.

A certificate will be issued to each successful candidate stating that he has shown an adequate knowledge of the English Language, and of the period of English literature and of the texts prescribed for that examination.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended July 2, 1910.

Births.—The total births registered were 74 (2 Europeans, 6 Burghers, 41 Sinhalese, 6 Tamils, 14 Moors, 1 Malay, and 4 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on January 1, 1910, viz., 185,704) was 20·8, as against 21·1 in the preceding week, 26·9 in the corresponding week of last year, and 25·1 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 112 (2 Europeans, 9 Burghers, 54 Sinhalese, 26 Tamils, 16 Moors, 1 Malay, and 4 Others), including 2 deaths of town residents who died in the Enteric Hospital at Kanatta. The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 31·4, as against 29·5 in the previous week, 38·8 in the corresponding week of last year, and 33·7 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 112 total deaths, 30 were of infants under one year of age, as against 15 in the preceding week, 37 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 27 the average for last year.

Still Births.—The number of still births registered during the week was 6.

Selected Causes of Death.—Fifteen deaths were registered from *Phthisis* (against 11 in the previous week and 15 the weekly average for last year), of which 5 were in Maradana hospitals, 3 in Kotahena, 2 each in New Bazaar, Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), and Slave Island, and 1 in St. Paul's.

2. Twelve deaths were registered from *Pneumonia* (against 16 in the previous week and 15 the weekly average for last year), of which 3 were in Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), 2 each in Pettah, Kotahena, New Bazaar, and Maradana hospitals, and 1 in Kollupitiya. Six deaths were registered from *Bronchitis*.

3. Eleven deaths were registered from *Enteritis*, 9 from *Dysentery*, 8 *Infantile Convulsions*, 5 *Tetanus* (all infants) 4 *Worms* (2 infants), 4 *Diarrhoea* (3 infants), 3 *Debility* (2 infants), 3 *Valve Disease of Heart*, and 22 from *Other Causes*.

4. Ten deaths were registered from *Enteric Fever* (against 8 in the previous week and 6 the weekly average for last year), of which 3 were in Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), 2 in San Sebastian, and 1 each in St. Paul's, Kotahena, New Bazaar, Maradana hospitals, and Kollupitiya. There were 25 cases reported during the week, against 31 in the previous week.

5. Four cases of *Measles* were reported, as in the previous week; and 5 of *Chickenpox*, against 9 in the previous week. One case of *Smallpox* was reported during the week of a vagrant cooly.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 81·2°, against 80·4° in the preceding week and 82·1° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29·908 in., against 29·856 in. in the preceding week and 29·914 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 0·12 in., against 2·41 in. in the preceding week and 0·43 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.
