SIR,—I DESIRE to place on record, on behalf of myself and the other Judges, our deep regret at the death of Mr. HORATIO WILLIAM NELSON, the Registrar of this Court, and our appreciation of the very great loss which the Colony has sustained.

He was appointed Third Deputy Registrar in 1903, and Registrar on January 1, 1907. His appointment was an unqualified success. He kept every officer and every department of his office in excellent order and discipline; was prompt and punctual in all his work; absolutely trustworthy; fearless and strict in dealing with any laxity or misconduct; honoured and respected by all the best of the advocates and proctors; and trusted and beloved by the Judges.

He was modest, self-sacrificing, and generous; and always guided by a strong resolve to do his duty.

KNOW Ye that We, the Governor of Ceylon, in exercise of the power vested in Us by section 54 of the Ordinance No. 17 of 1869, intituled "An Ordinance for the General Regulation of Customs in the Island of Ceylon," do hereby proclaim and declare that ships or boats under fifteen tons burthen may import goods into Ceylon from parts beyond the seas at the several ports in the Mannar District, Northern Province, specified in the schedule hereto.

WHEREAS certain by-laws have been made for the Southern Province, under the provision of section 5 of the Vehicles Ordinance, No. 9 of 1901, and published by a Proclamation dated March 1, 1906:

And whereas it is expedient to determine the operation of by-law No. 31 of the said by-laws within the Municipal limits of the town of Galle and to substitute therefor a fresh by-law for the town of Galle within the said limits:

SCHEDULE.

31. (a) Every person driving a motor vehicle shall have ready and available for immediate use a suitable horn capable of giving audible and sufficient warning of his approach and position, and shall sound the same whenever expedient to prevent danger to any of the public.

“THE CEYLON MEDICAL COLLEGE ORDINANCE, 1905.”

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR in Executive Council has been pleased to approve of the following alterations in the Rules and Regulations with regard to examinations made by the Council of the Ceylon Medical College, and published in the supplement to the *Government Gazette* dated March 1, 1907, that is to say:—

- (a) No person will be allowed to be registered as a Medical Student, unless he shall have previously passed the Medical Preliminary Examination of the Ceylon Medical College.
- (b) The note with reference to the Preliminary Examination appended to the said rules and regulations stating that the examinations therein specified are accepted in place of the Preliminary Examination is rescinded as from this date.
- (c) The number of First-Year Medical Students is limited to 70. Vacancies in this number will be filled by candidates selected in the order of merit of passing the Medical Preliminary Examination.

“THE SMALL TOWNS SANITARY ORDINANCES, 1892 TO 1909.”

HIS Excellency the Governor, in exercise of the power vested in him by section 35 (1) of the above-named Ordinances, and with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to order that the Sanitary Board towns of (1) Dehiowita and (2) Yatiyantota, in the District of Kegalla, Province of Sabaragamuwa, shall, from and after the date hereof, be school divisions for the purposes of “The Rural Schools Ordinance, 1907,” and that the said “The Rural Schools Ordinance, 1907,” shall be in force in the said towns from and after the said date.

NOTICE is hereby given that an examination for candidates wishing to enter the Third Class of the Clerical Branch of the Public Service will take place on Wednesday, January 4, 1911, and following days.

2. Applications for admission to the examination by persons not now in the Public Service must be addressed to the Director of Public Instruction, must bear a duly cancelled stamp of Rs. 10, and must be in the form (Schedule A) attached to this notice. Forms are to be obtained at any Post Office on application, or within four days' notice. A certificate of the registration of the candidate's birth showing him to be on January 4, 1911, between the ages of 18 and 21, and a certificate of good character signed by a responsible person,* to the satisfaction of the Director of Public Instruction, must be attached to the form of application. If a certificate of birth for a previous examination was sent in, reference may be made to it by mentioning name and date of examination. Affidavits will in no circumstances be accepted. In the case of candidates who submit certificates of registration in the register of past birth, the certificates will only be accepted after consideration of the evidence by which the dates of birth were established. If the name appearing in the birth register differs, either by alteration or addition, from the name by which the candidate is known, the parent or guardian should, before obtaining a certificate, apply to the Registrar-General or his Assistant for such alteration in the manner set forth in section 7 of Ordinance No. 23 of 1900.

3. Clerks in Government service, from whatever funds they may be paid, who have completed three years' satisfactory service, and are not members of the Customs, Postal, Survey, or Railway Departments, and those clerks employed by Provincial and District Road Committees whose appointments date prior to July 1, 1875, are eligible for examination irrespective of age and without fee. Their applications (in the same form, Schedule A) for admission to the examination should be forwarded to the Director of Public Instruction through the Heads of their Departments.

4. Applications are to reach the Director of Public Instruction not later than 2 P.M. on Monday, November 28, 1910; any applications received after that hour, by whatever cause delayed, will be absolutely rejected.

5. The Director of Public Instruction will return to the candidate his application, approved or disapproved as the case may be, after taking, if necessary, the orders of Government thereon. The approved application shall constitute the candidate's ticket of admission to the examination. Candidates presenting themselves for examination must produce to the officer appointed to supervise the examination their forms of application approved by the Director of Public Instruction. A candidate not producing such form, whatever may be the reason for his not so doing, will be refused admittance to the examination.

6. The examination will be held at Colombo only, in the place and under the supervision of the officer specified in Schedule B. Heads of Departments are required to grant to officers of their Departments, whose applications to present themselves for examination have been returned to them approved by the Director of Public Instruction, leave to present themselves at the examination.

7. The examination will be competitive. The number of places assigned for competition will be thirty.

8. The successful candidates will be required to pass a medical examination as to their physical fitness for service in any part of the Island.

9. The subjects for examination are those set out in Schedule C to this notice. The examination shall be held in two parts. The first part a qualifying examination in Handwriting, Spelling, and Arithmetic, and Book-keeping. Any candidate failing to obtain two-thirds of the marks allotted for Handwriting, half those allowed for Spelling and Arithmetic respectively, and one-third of those allowed for Bookkeeping shall be excluded from the remainder of the examination. Special attention will be paid to Handwriting, and candidates whose writing is untidy or illegible or contains defects in the formation of letters will be rigorously excluded. The kind of writing preferred will be that generally shown as the "Civil Service" hand. The second part of the examination shall be in the remaining subjects in Schedule C. Should a candidate obtain less than one-third of the aggregate marks for the three subjects—Composition, General Paper, Précis Writing—or less than one-fourth marks in any other subject, or if he be a Sinhalese or Tamil, less than one-half of the marks in his native language, such marks shall not be counted in his favour. In all the written papers marks will be deducted for bad writing and mistakes in spelling.

10. Clerks of the description given in section 3 above, who have served Government continuously for over six years, will be allowed to compete amongst themselves, and will be eligible, if they obtain a minimum of 66 per cent. in Writing and 33 per cent. in the other compulsory subjects, for seven of the appointments offered for competition. Three of the appointments will be reserved as prizes for deserving clerks of the same description, who have served Government continuously for ten years and upwards, to be selected irrespective of examination. No service under the age of sixteen years will be reckoned for this purpose.

*Additions and Amendments to Chapter VI. of the
Kandy Municipal Council By-laws.*

By substituting the following by-law for by-law 64 as published :—

No article other than that specified in license shall be sold.

64. No person shall keep or sell in a public market any article or thing not specified in his license or ticket.

Occupation of stall or space beyond line prohibited.

By adding the following by-laws after by-law 72 :—

72 A. The occupant of any stall or space in a market shall not cause or allow any goods or articles to be deposited or exposed for sale in or upon such stall or space so that such goods or articles or any part thereof shall project beyond the line of such stall or space.

Thoroughfares not to be obstructed.

72 B. No stall holder, owner or occupier, or lessee of any market shall in any way obstruct or allow to be obstructed any of the lanes, walks, gangways, passages, or other thoroughfares within such market by exposing for sale or accumulating or allowing to be exposed for sale or accumulated in any such lane, walk, gangway, passage, or thoroughfare any package or any other materials whatever.

By substituting the following by-law for by-law 73 as published :—

Receptacles.

73. Every person holding a license or ticket for any stall or space in a public market shall keep on or near such stall or space a receptacle, to be approved by the Chairman, in which such person shall deposit all rubbish and refuse matter.

By substituting the following by-law for by-law 82 (e) as published :—

Behaving in disorderly manner.

82 (e) To behave in a disorderly manner, or beg or commit any nuisance in any public market or the premises appertaining thereto.

By substituting the following by-law for by-law 82 (h) as published :—

No person suffering from infectious diseases to occupy market, stall, or space.

82 (h) Being a person affected with any loathsome or contagious or infectious disease to occupy any stall, seat, or space in any public or private market, or expose or carry about for sale in such market, or in any street within the Municipality any article whatsoever. And no person shall employ in any capacity in any public or private market any person affected with any such disease, nor shall any person so affected enter any market. Any such person may be expelled from the market premises.

By adding the following by-laws after by-law 88 :—

Fire and lights.

88 A. Every tenant, occupier, or servant of a tenant or occupier of any building or stall in the market shall extinguish or cause to be extinguished every fire or light in such building or stall before leaving it, and no fire or light shall be permitted which is dangerous to the safety of the building or stall.

Expulsion of disorderly persons.

88 B. The market-keeper or any other officer authorized by the Chairman may expel from the market premises any person who is found drunk or begging or loitering, or who misconducts himself, or is a lunatic ; and if such person is a tenant or a tenant's servant may (subject to the approval of the Chairman) prevent him from further carrying on any trade or business in the market, or occupying any shop or stall therein.

A vendor guilty of assault may be expelled from the market and prevented from further carrying on any trade or business, or occupying any shop or stall in the market.

CEYLON GOVERNMENT ENGINEERING SCHOLARSHIPS.

AN examination will be held by the Ceylon Government in March, 1911, for the award of scholarships to be held in the Engineer Class at the Madras Engineering College.

If candidates of sufficient merit present themselves there will be awarded three scholarships, which will under certain conditions lead to appointment in the Ceylon Public Works Department. Two of these scholars will be trained as Civil Engineers and the third as a Mechanical Engineer.

A fourth scholarship will be awarded if there is a fourth candidate of sufficient merit desiring to be trained as a Civil Engineer for private practice.

The scholarships will entitle the holders to the following allowances for the three years of their course in the Engineer Class :—A subsistence allowance of Rs. 50 per mensem and an outfit and travelling allowance at the rate of Rs. 300 per annum, paid half-yearly. Fees and deposits required for the Engineer Class will be paid by Government. Those who pass the College final examination at the end of the three years' course will receive the same

subsistence allowance for an additional year, during which they will be employed on works in India. They will also during this additional year receive the same travelling allowances as are drawn by Indian students under the same circumstances. All allowances will be contingent on the good conduct and satisfactory progress of the student.

2. The three scholars selected with a view to service in the Public Works Department will, if they obtain the B.E. degree and receive a certificate of good conduct and satisfactory progress during the year spent on works, be offered appointments in the Third Grade of District Engineers, and will be eligible, provided their qualifications are sufficient, for appointments to the higher grades upon vacancies occurring. Each of these scholars will be required before appointment to execute a bond of Rs. 1,000 pledging himself to enter Government service in the Public Works Department.

3. The examination will be confined to candidates whose age will be under 22 on June 30, 1911, and who are nominated by His Excellency the Governor. Before receiving such nomination candidates must have passed one of the following examinations:—

- (a) Intermediate B.Sc. Examination of the University of London.
 - (b) The Intermediate Examination in Arts of the University of London, with a pass in one of the Mathematical or Science subjects.
 - (c) The B.A. Examination of the University of Madras with Mathematics or Physical Science (II.—A).
4. The physical fitness of all the candidates will be tested before they are admitted to the examination.
5. The subjects of examination will be as follows:—

Compulsory.

- (1) Arithmetic.
- (2) Drawing, Freehand and Geometrical.
- (3) English Language and Composition.
- (4) Pure Mathematics.

Optional.

Not more than two of the following:—

- (5) Applied Mathematics.
- (6) Chemistry, Theoretical and Practical.
- (7) Physics, Theoretical and Practical.

The range of work in the Mathematical and Science subjects will be the same as that prescribed in the Intermediate Examination in Arts of the University of London.

6. Applications for His Excellency the Governor's nomination must be submitted to the Director of Public Works not later than November 30, 1910. Each candidate must send in with his application two certificates of character, one of which must be from the Principal of the last school which he attended.

7. Candidates nominated by His Excellency the Governor will be required to pay a medical fee of Rs. 10-50 and an examination fee of Rs. 25.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended August 6, 1910.

Births.—The total births registered were 83 (1 European, 8 Burghers, 52 Sinhalese, 6 Tamils, 13 Moors, 2 Malays, and 1 Other). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on July 1, 1910, viz., 187,554) was 23·1, as against 24·7 in the preceding week, 27·8 in the corresponding week of last year, and 25·1 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 116 (2 Europeans, 6 Burghers, 65 Sinhalese, 26 Tamils, 13 Moors, 1 Malay, and 3 Others), including the death of a town resident who died in the Enteric Hospital at Kanatta. The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 32·2, as against 35·3 in the previous week, 31·2 in the corresponding week of last year, and 33·7 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 116 total deaths, 18 were of infants under one year of age, as against 30 in the preceding week, 26 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 27 the average for last year.

Still Births.—The number of still births registered during the week was 2.

Selected Causes of Death.—Fourteen deaths were registered from *Pneumonia* (against 15 in the previous week and the weekly average for last year), of which 4 were in Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), 2 each in St. Paul's, Kotahena, New Bazaar, and Slave Island, and 1 each in Fort and Galle Face Ward and Maradana hospitals. Three deaths were registered from *Bronchitis*.

2. Eleven deaths were registered from *Phthisis* (against 16 in the previous week and 15 the weekly average for last year), of which 3 were in Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), 2 each in Kotahena and Kollupitiya, and 1 each in Pettah, St. Paul's, New Bazaar, and Maradana hospitals.

3. Eleven deaths were registered from *Dysentery* (including 1 infant), 9 from *Enteritis* (1 infant), 7 *Diarrhoea*, 7 *Old Age*, 5 *Debility* (3 infants), 5 *Tetanus* (3 infants), 5 *Infantile Convulsions*, 3 *Worms*, 3 *Bright's Disease*, and 22 from *Other Causes*.

4. Eleven deaths were registered from *Enteric Fever* (against 3 in the previous week and 6 the weekly average for last year), of which 4 were in Kotahena, 2 in Maradana hospitals, and 1 each in Fort and Galle Face Wards, St. Paul's, New Bazaar, Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), and Kollupitiya. There were 29 cases reported during the week, against 22 in the previous week.

5. Three cases of *Measles* were reported, against 1 in the previous week; and 4 of *Chickenpox*, against 3 in the previous week.
