By His Excellency Sir Henry Edward McCallum, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

HENRY McCallum.

HEREAS by section 28 of "The Courts Ordinance, 1889," it is amongst other things enacted that Criminal Sessions of the Supreme Court shall be holden by one of the Judges thereof, or by a Commissioner of Assize duly appointed under the provisions of the said Ordinance, for each of the Circuits into which the Island is divided, for the hearing, trying, and determining all prosecutions which shall be commenced against any person for in respect of any crime or offence, or alleged crime or offence

For the Southern Circuit, twice at least in each year at Galle and such other places in such Circuit, as the Governor, after previous consultation with the Judges, shall appoint; such Sessions commencing at Galle in the month of April and in the month of September in every year:

And whereas it appears to Us expedient to order that a Criminal Sessions of the Supreme Court shall be holden on the day hereinafter mentioned, at Matara, a place included within the said Southern Circuit:

Now therefore know Ye that We, the Governor, for sufficient reasons to Us appearing, and after previous consultation with the Judges of the Supreme Court, do order and appoint that a Criminal Sessions of the Supreme Court shall be holden at Matara, in the said Southern Circuit, on or about Thursday, September 29, 1910.

SCHEDULE.

WESTERN PROVINCE.

Division No. 1 consisting of the Fort and Galle Face Ward.—North by the harbour; east by a water-course, Lotus road, and the lake; south by a road leading from Slave Island Railway Station to the sea crossing Kollupitiya road; and west by the sea.

Division No. 2B consisting of the Southern part of Kollupitiya Ward.—North by the Bambalapitiya Railway Station road, the portion of the Kollupitiya road lying between the Station road and Lawrie's road, Lawrie's road, the portion of Serpentine road lying between Lawrie's road and Buller's road, Buller's road up to its junction with Base Line road, a portion of Base Line road lying between the aforesaid junction, and the road forming the southern boundary of the General Cemetery, Kanatta, and a continuation of that road in a straight line up to Dematagoda-ela; east by Dematagoda-ela, centre of the Kelani Valley Railway line; south by the centre of Kirillapone canal; and west by the sea.

Division No. 3 consisting of the Maradana Ward.—North by the St. Sebastian canal and Urugodawatta road; east by the eastern boundary of North and South Base Line from Urugodawatta road to the Dematagoda-ela and by the Dematagoda-ela; south by the Kotte road, Ward place, and Union place; west by Darley road for a distance of 135 yards and the lake.

Division No. 4 consisting of the Pettah Ward, St. Sebastian Ward, New Bazaar Ward, and St. Paul's Ward; Pettah Ward.—North by the harbour; east by St. John's road and 5th Cross street; south by the lake; and west by the Lotus road and the water-course.

St. Sebastian Ward.—North by Dam street and New Moor street; east by Kuruwe street, Hulftsdorp street, and Maradana road; south by St. Sebastian canal and lake; west by 5th Cross street.

New Bazaar Ward.—North by Barber street, Layard's Broadway, and Urugodawatta road; south by St. Sebastian canal; and west by 1st Division, Maradana road, Hulftsdorp street, and Kuruwe street.

St. Paul's Ward.—North by the Jampettal street; east by Green street, Barber street, and Kuruwe street; south by New Moor street and Dam street; and west by St. John's read and the harbour.

Division No. 5 consisting of Kotahena Ward.—North by the Kelani-ganga; east by the Kelani-ganga; by and including the St. Sebastian canal, the Weragoda-ela, and a line going south in prolongation of the eastern boundary of the Base Line road reservation; south by the Urugodawatta road, Layard's Broadway, Barber street, Green street, and Jampettah street; and west by the harbour and the sea.

By-LAW REFERRED TO.

REGULATIONS FRAMED UNDER ORDINANCE No. 30 OF 1909.

Section 2, Sub-section 2 (a).

- 1. The ordinary meetings of the Board shall be held at least once a month on such days and at such time and place as the Board shall from time to time by resolution determine. Any special meeting shall be convened at the discretion of the Chairman or on the written requisition of two members of the Board. Provided that it shall be lawful for the Board to adjourn any meeting to any other day or hour.
- 2. The Chairman at any meeting shall preserve order and decide on all disputed points of order, and his decision on such matters shall be final.
- 3. As soon after the hour appointed for any meeting (whether ordinary or special) as a quorum shall assemble the member entitled to preside shall take the chair, and the Board shall proceed to business. Should a quorum not be present at the expiration of half an hour from the time appointed for the meeting, the meeting shall stand adjourned, if an ordinary meeting, to the day appointed for the next ordinary meeting, or, if a special meeting, sine die.
- 4. Any member desiring to ask a question or to make a motion, unless in the course of discussion or in case of emergency by special leave of the Board, shall give notice of such question or motion either at some previous meeting of the Board or by notice in writing at least four days before the day on which he intends to ask such question or make such motion, and when any such notice is given, a copy of the question or motion shall be delivered by such member to the clerk of the Board.
- 5. All questions asked and motions made shall be in the order of the notices thereof, unless the Board shall unanimously decide otherwise.
- 6. Any member presenting a petition or other communication will be held responsible for its contents being throughout respectful, and no document shall be laid before the Board unless the name and address of the drawer be legibly recorded on it.
- 7. When a petition or communication is presented by a member, the purport thereof shall be concisely stated by him, and on the motion of any member duly seconded the question shall be put whether or not the document shall be read.
- 8. The business of the ordinary meetings shall be conducted in the following order:—
 - (a) The minutes of the previous meeting shall be read and confirmed after being, if necessary, corrected.
 - (b) Memorials, petitions, or other communications addressed to the Board shall be laid before the meeting and orders made thereon.
 - (c) The other business shall be considered in the order set down in the order book hereinafter mentioned.
- 9. The clerk shall keep an order book in which shall be entered and numbered in succession the subjects to be brought under discussion at each meeting, and he shall serve on each member or leave at his residence two days at least before each meeting a notice containing the order of the day copied from the order book. The proceedings of the Board in respect of each item shall be minuted in this book during each sitting.
- 10. The clerk shall also keep a minute book in which the proceedings of the Board shall be entered, and the minutes of every meeting of the Board as entered in the book shall, after they have been confirmed at any subsequent meeting, be signed by the Chairman of the meeting at which they are so confirmed.
- 11. The clerk shall lay on the table at each meeting all complaints addressed to the Board and all reports made by officers of the Board and notes of any action taken by the Chairman since the last previous meeting of the Board.
- 12. Notice of every special meeting shall be served on each member or left at his residence two days at least before the day of such meeting.

Sub-section (2) (d).

- 13. Every bakery shall be well ventilated and well lighted, and the walls thereof plastered with lime mortar and whitewashed, the floor cemented, and drainage sufficiently provided.
- 14. Every eating house and tea and coffee boutique shall be well ventilated and well lighted, and the walls and floor thereof shall always be kept clean and in good repair.
- 15. No bakery, eating house, or tea and coffee boutique shall be within 30 feet of any cesspit or latrine, or in a position where bad odours wafted therefrom shall reach it.

- 16. No place used as a bakery shall be used as a dwelling place or for any other purpose whatsoever.
- 17. All utensits, furniture, and other requisites used in or belonging to a bakery, eating-house, or tea and coffee boutique shall be kept clean.
- 18. The flour, rice, water, and other materials used in the manufacture of bread, rice, or other eatables shall be good and wholesome, and it shall be lawful for any member of the Board or for any person thereto authorized in writing by the Chairman from time to time to demand and obtain samples thereof.
- 19. All refuse and dirt in and about the premises of a bakery, eating-house, or tea and coffee boutique shall be removed without delay, and the drains kept well flushed.
- 20. It shall be lawful for any member of the Board or other person authorized in writing by the Chairman at any time to enter and inspect any bakery, eating-house, or tea and coffee boutique, provided there is some one in charge of the premises at the time.

Sub-section (2) (e).

- 21. It shall not be lawful for any person to slaughter for sale any cattle, sheep, goat, or other animal except at the place or places set apart for that purpose by the Board.
- 22. It shall be the duty of the person or persons slaughtering any animal at the place or places set apart for that purpose to remove therefrom all refuse and blood and generally clean the place after slaughtering.

Sub-section (2) (f).

23. No person shall keep or deposit or cause to be kept or deposited for sale or storage any guano, bone dust, hides, or any manure or substance whatsoever from which noxious or offensive smells arise, or erect or use any lime or brick kiln or tannery in any place or depôt within the limits of any town, unless such place or depôt be licensed therefor by the Chairman, which license shall be subject to such conditions as the Board may from time to time by resolution in that behalf appoint, and shall be in force from the date of issue until December 31 then next ensuing.

Sub-section (2) (g).

- 24. It shall not be lawful for any person to introduce into or expose for sale within the limits of any town any meat, fish, poultry, game, flesh, vegetable, fruit, or other article of food which is unfit for human consumption.
- 25. No person affected with or suffering from any cutaneous, contagious, or infectious disease shall sell or expose for sale any provisions whatsoever.
- 26. It shall be lawful for the Chairman or any person authorized by him to seize any meat, fish, poultry, game, flesh, vegetable, fruit, or other article of food introduced into or exposed for sale within the limits of any town which he considers to be unfit for human consumption, and upon such seizure to convey the same or cause the same to be conveyed to the Health Officer, or in his absence, or if there be no such officer, to the Magistrate; and if it appear to such Health Officer or Magistrate that such meat, fish, poultry, game, flesh, vegetable, fruit, or other article of food is unfit for human consumption, he shall order the same to be destroyed, or to be so disposed of as to prevent it being exposed for sale or used for food.

Sub-section (2) (j).

- 27. It shall be the duty of every owner or occupier of any land within the limits of any town which is fenced according to the custom of the place to keep such fence always in good repair, and no fence shall be raised to any height above 7 feet.
- 28. Whenever any tree or branch or fruit of a tree within the limits of any town shall be deemed after inspection by the Chairman to be likely to fall upon any house or building and injure the occupiers thereof, or whenever the same shall over-hang any street, it shall be lawful for the Chairman to cause notice in writing to be given to the owner or occupier of the land upon which such tree stands to cut down or remove the said tree or branch or fruit; and if such owner or occupier shall not cut down or remove the same within twenty-four hours after such notice has been served on him, the Chairman or any officer authorized by him in writing with necessary workmen may enter upon such land and cause the work to be done, and the expense thereby incurred shall be paid by such owner or occupier, and in default of payment may be recovered by the same process by which rates payable under the Ordinance may be recovered.
- 29. Every owner or occupier of any house, garden, building, or land within the town shall, if so required by the Board, keep such house, garden, building, or land surrounded with a wall or good fence of not less than 4 feet in height from the level of the ground.

Sub-section (2) (k).

- 30. It shall be lawful for the Board by resolution from time to time to set apart for public bathing such places as it may deem proper and to determine the hours during which they may be used.
- 31. A list of the places so set apart for public bathing shall be proclaimed within the limits of the town in which such places are situated by beat of tom-tom, and copies of the list in the English, Sinhalese, and Tamil languages shall be affixed at the office of the Board, and at any other place decided upon by the Chairman.

- 32. No person shall resort for the purposes of bathing to any public place other than those set apart for that purpose; and no person shall bathe at the place set apart except during the hours determined by the Board.
- 33. No person shall wash or caused to be washed horses, cattle, clothes, mats, or any other articles at any public place set apart for public bathing.
- 34. No person suffering from any cutaneous, infectious, or contagious disease shall bathe or wash clothes or any other articles in any public place.

Sub-section (2) (0).

- 35. It shall not be lawful for any person to erect a house or hut for the purpose of a dwelling place, or permit the same to be occupied as a dwelling place, within the limits of any town, except under the following conditions:—
 - (a) Every such house or hut or any room therein to be used for human habitation shall not be less than 120 superficial feet in area, and not less than 10 feet in height, and shall have the eaves at least 6 feet from the ground.
 - (b) Every room to be used for human habitation shall have at least one door not less than 6 feet by 3 feet, and at least one window not less than 3 feet by 2 feet.
 - (c) When any house or hut has a frontage upon any thoroughfare, the level of the floor of such house or hut shall be at least 1 foot above the level of such thoroughfare, and the house or hut shall be situated at least 4 feet from such thoroughfare.
 - (d) It shall be lawful for the Board to cause any house or hut erected contrary to the provisions of this regulation to be taken down at the expense of the owner, if within one month after written notice to him to alter or take down the same he shall fail or neglect to do so; and the expenses incurred thereby may be recovered by the same process as is provided for the recovery of rates under this Ordinance.

Sub-section (2) (t).

- 36. All owners, tenants, or occupiers of lands within the limits of any town shall keep the same clean and free from all weeds or rank and noisome vegetation, as well as from all refuse and rubbish.
- 37. No person shall keep, for the purpose of letting or renting out the same, any cattle shed or halting place for cattle within the limits of any town without a permit from the Board. Such permit may impose such conditions as the Board shall consider necessary for the preservation of public health; and the persons keeping such cattle shed or halting place for cattle shall be bound to observe such conditions. Any permit issued under this rule shall be free of charge.
- 38. Any person who is desirous that ashes, sweepings, refuse, or other rubbish from his premises shall be removed by the scavengers of the Board shall deposit the same in proper covered tubs, boxes, or other like receptacles as the Board may prescribe at the edge of the road outside his premises at such hours daily as the Board shall from time to time appoint by notice duly published, and shall remove the said tubs, boxes, or other like receptacles within half an hour after the emptying of such tubs, boxes, or other like receptacles by the scavenger. No person shall place any ashes, sweepings, refuse, or other rubbish on any street except in such manner as aforesaid or on any public place other than public dust bins where such are provided.
- 39. It shall be lawful for the Chairman at any time to require the owner or occupier of any house, building, enclosure, or premises within the limits of any town, by notice in writing, to remove or bury or cause to be removed or buried the contents of any privy, pit, or earth closet, in or belonging to such house, building, enclosure, or premises, to or at such place or places and within such time as shall be set forth in such notice. Should such owner or occupier fail to comply with the requirements of such notice within three days from the time when such notice shall have been served on him, the Chairman may cause the necessary work to be done, and for that purpose shall have power to enter into and upon such house, outhouse, building, enclosure, or premises, with such labourers, implements, and things as may be required; and the expenses incurred shall be recoverable in the same manner as is provided for the recovery of rates under this Ordinance.
- 40. The occupier of any house or premises within or upon which any eattle, horse, sheep, goat, or pig may die shall within four hours after its death, or if death occurs at night, within four hours after daylight, either remove the carcase at his own expense to such place as may be appointed by the Board for that purpose, or report such death to an officer of the Board; and in such latter case shall pay to the Board the expenses of removing or burying the carcase at such rate as the Board shall determine.
- 41. It shall not be lawful for any person to ease himself on any thoroughfare, street, road, or path, or any place whatsoever within the limits of any town other than a public latrine or a building or enclosed space which has been set apart for such purpose.

Interpretation Clause.

In the regulations the word "town" means a town or village in the District of Mannar proclaimed under the Small Towns Sanitary Ordinance, No. 18 of 1892.

By-LAWS REFERRED TO.

By-laws re Eating-houses and Tea or Coffee Boutiques or Markets.

- 1. All utensils, furniture, and other requisites used in or belonging to any eating-house or tea or coffee boutique or market shall always be kept clean.
- 2. The walls of all eating-houses and tea or coffee boutiques or markets shall be plastered and limewashed, and the rooms well ventilated and lighted.
- 3. All refuse and dirt in and about the premises of an eating-house or tea or coffee boutique or market shall be removed twice daily.
- 4. No person suffering from any loathsome, contagious, or infectious disease, or who has recently been in attendance on any such person, or who is unwashed or otherwise unclean, shall be employed in any eating-house or tea or coffee boutique or market.
- 5. The sugar used in such places shall be kept in glass-stoppered wide-mouthed bottles.
- 6. All cakes, sweetmeats, &c., exposed for sale shall be kept in properly constructed glass cases free from flies. No food stuff shall be exposed to the contamination of flies. The glass cases used shall be kept scrupulously clean.
- 7. No waste tea, coffee, or milk, and remnants of food and cooking waste shall be thrown on the ground, but shall be collected in a proper receptacle and removed daily.
- 8. A copy of these by-laws shall be hung up in a prominent place in every such eating-house and tea or coffee boutique or market.

IN terms of section 20 (1) (a) of "The Opium Ordinance, 1910," it is hereby notified that September 30, 1910, has been fixed as the date on which all persons licensed to sell opium, whether by wholesale or by retail, must make declarations of the amount of opium in their possession, custody, or control. If a certificate of birth for a previous examination was sent in, reference may be made to it by mentioning name and date of examination. Affidavits will in no circumstances be accepted. In the case of candidates who submit certificates of registration in the register of past birth, the certificates will only be accepted after consideration of the evidence by which the dates of birth were established. If the name appearing in the birth register differs, either by alteration or addition, from the name by which the candidate is known, the parent or guardian should, before obtaining a certificate, apply to the Registrar-General or his Assistant for such alteration in the manner set forth in section 7 of Ordinance No. 23 of 1900.
- 3. Clerks in Government service, from whatever funds they may be paid, who have completed three years' satisfactory service, and are not members of the Customs, Postal, Survey, or Railway Departments, and those clerks employed by Provincial and District Road Committees whose appointments date prior to July 1, 1875, are eligible for examination irrespective of age and without fee. Their applications (in the same form, Schedule A) for admission to the examination should be forwarded to the Director of Public Instruction through the Heads of their Departments.
- 4. Applications are to reach the Director of Public Instruction not later than 2 p.m. on Monday, November 28, 1910; any applications received after that hour, by whatever cause delayed, will be absolutely rejected.
- 5. The Director of Public Instruction will return to the candidate his application, approved or disapproved as the case may be, after taking, if necessary, the orders of Government thereon. The approved application shall constitute the candidate's ticket of admission to the examination. Heads of Departments are required to grant to officers of their Departments, whose applications to present themselves for examination have been returned to them approved by the Director of Public Instruction, leave to present themselves at the examination.
 - 7. The examination will be competitive. The number of places assigned for competition will be thirty.
- 8. The successful candidates will be required to pass a medical examination as to their physical fitness for service in any part of the Island.
- 9. The subjects for examination are those set out in Schedule C to this notice. The examination shall be held in two parts. The first part a qualifying examination in Handwriting, Spelling, and Arithmetic, and Bookkeeping. Any candidate failing to obtain two-thirds of the marks allotted for Handwriting, half those allowed for Spelling and Arithmetic respectively, and one-third of those allowed for Bookkeeping shall be excluded from the remainder of the examination. Special attention will be paid to Handwriting, and candidates whose writing is untidy or illegible or contains defects in the formation of letters will be rigorously excluded. The kind of writing preferred will be that generally shown as the "Civil Service" hand. The second part of the examination shall be in the remaining subjects in Schedule C. Should a candidate obtain less than one-third of the aggregate marks for the three subjects—Composition, General Paper, Précis Writing—or less than one-fourth marks in any other subject, or if he be a Sinhalese or Tamil, less than one-half of the marks in his native language, such marks shall not be counted in his favour. In all the written papers marks will be deducted for bad writing and mistakes in spelling.
- 10. Clerks of the description given in section 3 above, who have served Government continuously for over six years, will be allowed to compete amongst themselves, and will be eligible, if they obtain a minimum of 66 per cent. in Writing and 33 per cent. in the other compulsory subjects, for seven of the appointments offered for competition. Three of the appointments will be reserved as prizes for deserving clerks of the same description, who have served Government continuously for ten years and upwards, to be selected irrespective of examination. No service under the age of sixteen years will be reckoned for this purpose.

VITAL STATISTICS.

-Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended September 10, 1910.

Births.—The total births registered were 101 (2 Europeans, 13 Burghers, 63 Sinhalese, 13 Tamils, 10 Moors, 0 Malays, and 0 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on July 1, 1910, viz., 187,554) was 281, as against 23.1 in the preceding week, 19.6 in the corresponding week of last year, and 25.1 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 119 (2 Europeans, 9 Burghers, 64 Sinhalese, 25 Tamils, 14 Moors, 1 Malay, and 4 Others), including two deaths of town residents who died in the Infectious Diseases Hospital at Kanatta. The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 33.1, as against 35.6 in the previous week, 32.9 in the corresponding week of last year, and 33.7 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.-Of the 119 total deaths, 19 were of infants under one year of age, as against 28 in the preceding week, 29 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 27 the average for last year.

Still Births.—The number of still births registered during the week was 9.

Selected Causes of Death. - Seventeen deaths were registered from Phthisis (against 12 in the previous week and 15 the weekly average for last year), of which 5 each were in Kotahena and New Bazaar, 2 each in Maradana hospitals and Slave Island, and I each in San Sebastian, St. Paul's, and Maradana (exclusive of hospitals).

- Fourteen deaths were registered from Pneumonia (against 13 in the previous week and 15 the weekly average for last year), of which 3 were in Slave Island, 2 each in Pettah, Kotahena, and Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), and I each in San Sebastian, St. Paul's, New Bazaar, Maradana hospitals, and Kollupitiya. Five deaths were registered from Bronchitis.
- 3. Ten deaths were registered from Enteritis (including 3 infants), 9 Old Age, 5 Diarrhoxa, 5 Dysentery, 4 Worms (2 infants), 4 Tetanus (2 infants), 3 Infantile Convulsions, 3 Debility (2 infants), 3 Cirrhosis of Liver, and 30 from Other Causes.
- Five deaths were registered from Enteric Fever (against 9 in the previous week and 6 the weekly average for last year), of which 2 were in Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), and 1 each in Fort and Galle Face Ward, Slave Island, and Kollupitiya. There were 28 cases reported during the week, as in the previous week.
- Two deaths from Smallpox occurred in the Infectious Diseases Hospital, both of Sinhalese removed from Kotahena. There were 4 cases reported during the week, against 7 in the previous week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 80.5°, against 80.6° in the preceding week and 80.3° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.917 in., against 29.906 in. in the preceding week and 29.931 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 0.35 in., against 0.33 in. in the preceding week, and 0.51 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.
