By-LAWS REFERRED TO. CHAPTER XIX. A.

Common Lodging Houses.

Register.---A register of all common lodging houses shall be ke 296 A. Chairman of the Municipal Council in the Form P in the Appendix hereto.

Registration of houses.-Before a house can be registered as a common 296 в. lodging house, an application must be made to the Chairman in the Form Q in the Appendix hereto setting forth the situation of the house, the number of the rooms to be set apart for lodgers, and the cubic capacity of each room so set apart, and for this purpose the schedule or form will be furnished by the Chairman.

296 c. Registration of houses.—Any house to be registered as a common lodging house must be substantially built and in a good state of repair, the floors must be paved with tiles or cement concrete or with lime concrete rendered with one inch of Portland cement, and all the rooms which are to be used asseleeping rooms must be on all sides above the level of the ground immediately surrounding the houses. The house drains must be in good order, and constructed in accordance with the by-laws regulating house drainage, there must be adequate kitchen, ablution, privy urinal, and ash-bin accommodation to the satisfaction of the Chairman ; and, unless when the supply of water is constant, there must be proper cisterns for the storage of water.

Licensing of keepers .- Before any person can be licensed as a keeper of 296 D. a common lodging house, an application must be made to the Chairman, and such application must be accompanied by a certificate of character from three or more householders-to be approved of by the Chairman-who shall give security for the

carrying out of the regulations by the licensed keeper. 296 E. Licensing of keepers.—When the Chairman is satisfied with the character of an applicant for a license to keep a common lodging house, he may issue a license to such applicant accordingly. The license shall state the number of persons which each room in the common lodging house is registered to accommodate, and should more than that number be found in any room at any time, the keeper of the common lodging house shall be guilty of an offence. Provided that in reckoning the said number two children under twelve years of age shall be counted as one person.

296 F. Reduction of the number of lodgers.—The keeper of a common lodging house shall reduce the number of lodgers in any room of his common lodging house upon receiving notice in writing from the Chairman stating the cause for making such reduction, and the period for which it shall continue in force. 296 G. Affixing sign boards, &c.—The keeper of a common lodging house shall

affix and keep in a conspicuous position on the outside of his common lodging house a board having painted on it in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil in legible white letters and characters not less than two inches long, on a black ground, the words "Licensed Lodging House." He shall also affix and keep in a conspicuous place at the entrance to each room a board having painted on it in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil the number of persons the room is registered to accommodate.

Separation of sexes .- The keeper of a common lodging house shall not 296 н. permit males and females above ten years of age respectively to occupy the same sleeping apartment, except in the cases of husband and wife, and parents and children, and he shall not allow any person to occupy his house for immoral purposes. 296 I. Good order. The keeper of a common lodging house shall not knowingly. permit persons of bad character to lodge in his house, and he shall maintain and

enforce good order and decorum therein ; and he shall also keep a register of the name, occupation, and native place of each lodger.

296 J. Ventilation.—The keeper of the common lodging house shall cause the windows of each of the sleeping rooms to be kept open to their full width for at least four hours each day, unless prevented by inclement weather. 296 K. Cleansing and limewashing.—The keeper of a common lodging house shall

296 k. Cleansing and limewashing.—The keeper of a common lodging house shall cause the internal walls and ceilings of every part of his house to be thoroughly cleansed and limewashed during the third, sixth, ninth, and twelfth months of the year.

296 L. Cleanliness, &c.—The keeper of a common lodging house shall at all times keep his premises in a clean and wholesome condition, and the fittings of the sleeping rooms shall be maintained by him in a thorough state of repair. He shall cause every room, passage, and stair to be thoroughly swept at least once a day. 296 M. Cleanliness. &c.—The keeper of a common lodging house shall are in

²⁹⁶ M. *Cleanliness*, &c.—The keeper of a common lodging house shall cause all filth and house refuse or other offensive matter to be removed from his premises daily.

296 N. Infectious, contagious, and communicable diseases.—If any person in a common lodging house becomes ill from any infectious, contagious, or communicable disease, the keeper of such common lodging house shall forthwith give notice thereof to the Municipal Inspector in whose ward the lodging house is situated, or to the nearest Police Station, or to the Chairman; and the keeper of such common lodging house shall clow the bedding, clothing, and other articles used by the infected person to be destroyed or disinfected, and the house to be fumigated, disinfected, and limewashed at the public expense in such manner as the Chairman may direct.

The keeper of such lodging house shall not receive any lodger until the premises shall have been inspected and certified by the Medical Officer of Health or his Assistant as free from infection.

296 o. *Privy accommodation.*—Privy accommodation in the premises shall be under the dry-earth system, and if the Chairman deems necessary, a day cooly will be specially attached thereto. There shall be one standard bucket at least for every 12 lodgers. Provided that should the system of water carriage be introduced, the privy accommodation shall be such as the Chairman shall direct, and in all cases the privy accommodation shall be provided by the keeper of the common lodging house.

296 p. Water service.—The premises shall be provided with water service from the reservoir at the expense of the keeper of the common lodging house.

* 296 q. Inspection.—The premises shall be subject to inspection at all hours during day or night by Municipal Officers or by Police Officers not below the rank of Inspector.

296 R. Definitions.—A common lodging house is (a) any house or part thereof where persons not being members of the same family—to the number of ten and upwards—are housed.

(b) Any permanent structure in which employers of labour house their employés other than domestic servants or shopmen.

The keeper of a common lodging house is any person licensed to keep a common lodging house.

SCHEDULE.

1. Adulterated milk.—It shall not be lawful for any person to sell, hawk about, or expose for sale any cow's milk or buffalo's milk which has been adulterated with water or any foreign substance whatever.

2. Sale and inspection of milk, &c.—No person shall sell or offer for sale any milk from which the cream has been removed, unless he previously informs the person to whom he sells er offers it that the cream has been removed.

3. The Medical Officer of Health or Assistant Medical Officer of Health or Veterinary Surgeon or any Municipal Inspector may at any time demand and take for the purpose of analysis samples of any milk which is in possession of a registered dairyman or any person who is found selling, hawking, or exposing milk for sale, and any registered dairyman or other person who refuses to permit samples to be taken shall be guilty of an offence.

4. In taking samples of milk the Medical Officer of Health or Assistant Medical Officer of Health or Veterinary Surgeon or Municipal Inspector shall take three samples and shall at once seal them in presence of the registered dairyman or other person from whom they are taken, and shall deliver one to such registered dairyman or other person, send the second to a qualified analyst, and the third to the Government Analyst. A certificate signed by such qualified analyst, if it states that the sample is adulterated, shall be evidence that the milk from which the sample was taken was adulterated. Should any evidence to the contrary be offered, a similar certificate from the Government Analyst shall be conclusive on the question of adulteration.

5. Printed and numbered cards, in such form as the Chairman shall from time to time direct, and signed by the Secretary, shall be issued annually to every registered dairyman on his application. No person shall sell, hawk, or expose milk for sale, unless he has in his possession a card issued for the current year to a registered dairyman, and unless such dairyman's name is still on the register at the time of the sale, hawking, or exposing of the milk for sale. Should such person fail to produce on demand by any Municipal or Police Officer such a card for inspection, he shall be guilty of an offence, and such officer may at once arrest him, and shall convey him forthwith after arrest to the nearest Police Station, and the officer in charge of such Police Station shall deal with him as if he had been arrested by a police officer without a warrant under the provisions of the Criminal Procedure Code.

6. Should any samples of milk taken under the provision of the preceding by-laws prove to be adulterated, the person in whose possession they were found shall be guilty of an offence, or if such person produce at the time the samples were taken a card such as is described in the preceding by-law, and the name of the registered dairyman to whom such card was issued is still on the register, then such registered . I dairyman shall be guilty of an offence.

2. A certificate of the registration of the candidate's birth showing him to be on January 4, 1911, between the ages of 18 and 21, and a certificate of good character signed by a responsible person,* to the satisfaction of the Director of Public Instruction, must be attached to the form of application. If a certificate of birth for a previous examination was sent in, reference may be made to it by mentioning name and date of examination. Affidavits will in no circumstances be accepted. In the case of candidates who submit certificates of registration in the register of past birth, the certificates will only be accepted after consideration of the evidence by which the dates of birth were established. If the name appearing in the birth register differs, either by alteration or addition, from the name by which the candidate is known, the parent or guardian should, before obtaining a certificate, apply to the Registrar-General or his Assistant for such alteration in the manner set forth in section 7 of Ordinance No. 23 of 1900.

3. Clerks in Government service, from whatever funds they may be paid, who have completed three years' satisfactory service, and are not members of the Customs, Postal, Survey, or Railway Departments, and those clerks employed by Provincial and District Road Committees whose appointments date prior to July 1, 1875, are eligible for examination irrespective of age and without fee. Their applications (in the same form, Schedule A) for admission to the examination should be forwarded to the Director of Public Instruction through the Heads of their Departments.

4. Applications are to reach the Director of Public Instruction not later than 2 P.M. on Monday, November 28, 1910; any applications received after that hour, by whatever cause delayed, will be absolutely rejected.

5. The Director of Public Instruction will return to the candidate his application, approved or disapproved as the case may be, after taking, if necessary, the orders of Government thereon. The approved application shall constitute the candidate's ticket of admission to the examination. Candidates presenting themselves for examination must produce to the officer appointed to supervise the examination their forms of application approved by the Director of Public Instruction. A candidate not producing such form, whatever may be the reason for his not so doing, will be refused admittance to the examination.

6. The examination will be held at Colombo only, in the place and under the supervision of the officer specified in Schedule B. Heads of Departments are required to grant to officers of their Departments, whose applications to present themselves for examination have been returned to them approved by the Director of Public Instruction, leave to present themselves at the examination.

7. The examination will be competitive. The number of places assigned for competition will be thirty.

8. The successful candidates will be required to pass a medical examination as to their physical fitness for service in any part of the Island.

9. The subjects for examination are those set out in Schedule C to this notice. The examination shall be held in two parts. The first part a qualifying examination in Handwriting, Spelling, and Arithmetic, and Bookkeeping. Any candidate failing to obtain two-thirds of the marks allotted for Handwriting, half those allowed for Spelling and Arithmetic respectively, and one-third of those allowed for Bookkeeping shall be excluded from the remainder of the examination. Special attention will be paid to Handwriting, and candidates whose writing is untidy or illegible or contains defects in the formation of letters will be rigorously excluded. The kind of writing preferred will be that generally shown as the "Civil Service" hand. The second part of the examination shall be in the remaining subjects in Schedule C. Should a candidate obtain less than one-third of the aggregate marks for the three subjects—Composition, General Paper, Précis Writing—or less than one-fourth marks in any other subject, or if he be a Sinhalese or Tamil, less than one-half of the marks in his native language, such marks shall not be counted in his favour. In all the written papers marks will be deducted for bad writing and mistakes in spelling.

10. Clerks of the description given in section 3 above, who have served Government continuously for over six years, will be allowed to compete amongst themselves, and will be eligible, if they obtain a minimum of 66 per cent. in Writing and 33 per cent. in the other compulsory subjects, for seven of the appointments offered for competition. Three of the appointments will be reserved as prizes for deserving clerks of the same description, who have served Government continuously for ten years and upwards, to be selected irrespective of examination. By-laws made under Sections 7 and 8 of * The Towns Mappols Ordinance, 1906," for the Area described in the Schedule hereto by the Sanitary Board of the Hambantota Disprint

1. In these by-laws the terms "boy," "girl," and "child" mean a boy or a girl or a child residing in the area described in the Schedule A hereto.

The term "parent" includes a guardian and any person who has the actual custody of the child.

The term "Code" means the Code for Aided Schools for the time being sanctioned by His Excellency the Governor in Executive Council.

The term "attendance" means an attendance for the period defined by the Code as constituting a full attendance recorded in an attendance register in the manner prescribed by the Code.

The term "local authority" means the Sanitary Board of the Hambantota District.

The term "school " means a school specified in the Schedule B flereto.

The terms "adequate and suitable provision for the education of a child," and "reasonable excuse" shall bear the meaning defined in section S(1)(b) of "The Town Schools Ordinance, 1906."

The term "Inspector of Schools" means an Inspector of Schools appointed by His Excellency the Governor.

2. The parent of every boy of not less than 6 for more than 12 years of age, and the parent of every girl of not less than 6 nor more than 12 years of age, or in the case of Muhammadan and Tamil girls, the parent of, every girl of not less than 6 nor more than 10 years of age, shall cause such boy or girl to attend one of the schools specified in Schedule B, unless he has made other adequate and suitable provision for the education of such boy or girl, or unless there is a reasonable excuse for non-attendance.

3. The time during which every boy or girl shall attend school shall be the whole time for which the schools shall be open for the instruction of children of similar age.

4. Provided always that nothing in these by law (a) shall prevent the presence of children being excused during the hours when religious instruction is given, as provided by section 9 (2) (d) of "The Town Schools Ordinance, 1906"; (b) shall require any child to attend school on any day exclusively set apart for religious observance by the religious body to which its parent belongs.

5. And provided always that when a chill between 10 and 12 years of age being beneficially employed to the satisfaction of the Assistant Government Agent. Hambantota, has received a certificate from the Inspector of Schools that it has passed in reading, writing, and arithmetic, the Fourth Standard prescribed by the Code for the time being, it shall not be required to attend school.

6. Every parent who shall not observe, or shall neglect or violate, these by laws or any of them, shall upon conviction be liable to a penalty not exceeding Rs. 20 for each offence, and an additional fine not exceeding Rs. 10 per day in the case of a continuing offence.

Nore.-The following are the portions of the Town Scholls Ordinance referred to in sections 1 and 4.of these by laws

Section 8 (1) (b)—A parent shall be deemed to have made adequate and suitable provision for the education of his child if he proves that his child is in regular attendance at a school registered by the Director of Public Instruction for the receipt of a grant in aid, or at a school with regard to which an application for a grant in aid is under consideration, or at a school certified by the Director of Public Instruction to provide adequate and suitable instruction, or if he proves that he has made such other provision for his child's education as the Director of Public Instruction shall certify to be adequate and suitable, or if he produces a certificate from the Director of Public Instruction recommending that the child shall be exempted from compulsory attendance. Provided that he proves that he be adequate and suitable of the produces a certificate for not causing his child to attend slich school if he proves to of the Magistrate that he has reasonable excuse for not causing such child to attend. A parent shall be deemed to have a reasonable excuse for not causing his child to attend school if he proves that the child he prevented from attending by sickness or other unavoidable cause.

Section 9 (2)—No school in which religious instruction is given shall be named in any by-law made under this clause (a) of the last preceding section as a school in which efficient provision is made for vernacular education, unless the local authority is satisfied—100

(q) That religious instruction is given only during the times specified in the school time table.

(b) That religious instruction is not given to pupils of other denominations than that to which the school belongs if the parents object ;

(c) That pupils who do not attend religious instruction are employed in other studies during the hours allotted to religious instruction; **\$**. 7

(d) That such pupils, if their parents object to their being present in the room where religious instruction is given, are either allowed to study in some other part of the school premises during the hours when such instruction is given, or their presence in the school during such hours is excused ; and

(e) That a copy of sub-section (2) of this section in the English, Sinhalese, and Tamil languages is conspicuted up in the school

The above by-laws were made by the Sanitary Board of the Hambantota District at a meeting held on Thursday, August 25, 1910. . iz

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VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended October 8, 1910.

Births.—The total births registered were 83 (0 Europeans, 12 Burghers, 44 Sinhalese, 10 Tamils, 13 Moors, 3 Malays, and 1 Other). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on July 1, 1910, viz., 187,554) was 23.1, as against 23.9 in the preceding week, 21.0 in the corresponding week of last year, and 25.1 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 83 (2 Europeans, 2 Burghers, 33 Sinhalese, 18 Tamils, 20 Moors, 4 Malays, and 4 Others), including the death of a town resident who died in the Infectious Diseases Hospital at Kanatta. The deathrate per 1,000 per annum was 23 1, as against 29 2 in the previous week, 25 0 in the corresponding week of last year, and 33 7 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 83 total deaths, 22 were of infants under one year of age, as against 27 in the preceding week, 12 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 27 the average for last year.

Still Births.-The number of still births registered during the week was 7.

Selected Causes of Death.—Ten deaths were registered from Pneumonia (against 11 in the previous week and 15 the weekly average for last year), of which 4 were in New Bazaar, 2 each in Maradana Hospitals and Slave Island, and 1 each in Kotahena and Maradana (exclusive of hospitals). Three deaths were registered from Bronchitis.

2. Seven deaths were registered from *Phthisis* (against 20 in the previous week and 15 the weekly average for last year), of which 2 were in San Sebastian, and 1 each in Kotahena, New Bazaar, Maradana hospitals, Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), and Kollupitiya North

3. Eight deaths were registered from Infantile Convulsions, 5 from Debility (3 infants), 4 Diarrhæa (1 infant), 4 Dysentery, 4 Old Age, 3 Worms, 3 Tetanus (2 infants), and 28 from Other Causes.

4. Three deaths were registered from *Enteric Fever* (against 1 in the previous week and 6 the weekly average for last year), 1 each in Kotahena, Maradana hospitals, and Maradana (exclusive of hospitals). There were 14 cases reported during the week.

5. One death from *Smallpox* occurred in the Infectious Diseases Hospital, of a Sinhalese vagrant in Kollupitiya South. One case was reported during the week; also 3 of *Measles* and 4 of *Chickenpox*.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 80.8° , against 80.7° in the preceding week and 82.7° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.955 in., against 29.910 in. in the preceding week and 29.933 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 0.37 in., against 0.18 in. in the preceding week and 0.19 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.
