IIS Excellency the Governor has been pleased, with the approval of the Secretary of State for the Colonies, to order that gentlemen employed in banks and mercantile firms may be allowed to present themselves for examination in the vernacular languages—Sinhalese and Tamil—at the Government Civil Service Examinations on the following conditions:—

- (i.) Candidates should make their applications to the President of the Board of Civil Service Examiners, who will arrange for their examination.
- (ii.) The application, if from an Assistant in a bank or firm, should be supported by a certificate from the Manager of the bank or from the Head of the firm signifying his desire that the candidate should be allowed to appear at the examination. The Board may refuse any application which in its opinion should not be granted.
- (iii.) In submitting his application each candidate must forward to the President of the Board of Examiners a fee of Rs. 16. The fee will be refunded if the application is rejected.
- 2. The Government Civil Service Examinations, which take place in the Legislative Council Chamber, are held quarterly, generally in the third week of January, April, July, and October, and candidates must send in their names not later than the last day of December, March, June, or September, as the case may be. The exact dates of the examinations will be notified from time to time in the Government Gazette.

T is hereby notified that His Excellency the Governor, in exercise of the powers vested in him by section 7 of the Explosives Ordinance, No. 8 of 1902, and with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to amend in manner following the regulations relating to the storage of explosives dated June 13, 1902, and published in the Ceylon Government Gazette No. 5,858, dated June 20, 1902, viz.:—

(a) By the substitution of the following for Divisions "A," "B," "C," and "D" in regulation No. 1:-

Division "A."—A store licensed to contain not more than 300 lb. of gunpowder; or in lieu of each pound of gunpowder less than 300 lb., 1 pound of dynamite, half a pound of any other explosive except fulminate; or 2 pounds of manufactured fireworks of Division II.; Class VII.; and in addition there may be 1,500 lb. of explosive of Class VI. Division I.

Division "B."—A store licensed to contain not more than 1,000 lb. of gunpowder; or in lieu of each pound of gunpowder less than 1,000 lb., I pound of dynamite, half a pound of any other explosive except fulminate; or 2 lb. of manufactured fireworks of Division II., Class VII.; and in addition there may be 5,000 lb. of explosive of Class VI., Division I.

Division "C."—A store licensed to contain not more than 2,000 lb. of gunpowder; or in lieu of each pound of gunpowder less than 2,000 lb., 1 pound of dynamite, half a pound of any other explosive except fulminate; or 2 lb. of manufactured fireworks of Division II., Class VII.; and in addition there may be 10,000 lb. of explosive of Class VI., Division I.

Division "D."—A store licensed to contain not more than 4,000 lb. of gunpowder; or in lieu of each pound of gunpowder less than 4,000 lb., 1 lb. of dynamite, half a pound of any other explosive except fulminate; or 2 lb. of manufactured fireworks of Division II., Class VII.; and in addition there may be 20,000 lb. of explosive of Class VI., Division I.

(b) By substituting the following figures for those now appearing in the "Table of Reference" attached to the said regulations opposite the word "Dynamite" in Class III., Division I. under headings "Division A," "Division B," "Division C," and "Division D," respectively, to wit, 300, 1,000, 2,000, and 4,000.

Regulations framed under Section 9 of the Rabies Ordinance, No. 7 of 1893.

- (a) Every owner of a dog shall, after publication has been made by the local authority that an outbreak of rabies is apprehended at any place within his jurisdiction, cause such dog to be muzzled or led by a chain when in any public road or place within such limits and for such period as shall be notified in such publication. The muzzle shall be so constructed as to render it impossible for the dog, while wearing the same, to bite any person or animal, but not so as to prevent the dog from breathing freely or lapping water.
- (b) A dog shall not be considered effectually controlled unless muzzled as above, or led by some competent person by means of a collar and chain, both of which shall be securely fastened to the dog's neck.
- (c) Any dog found in any public road or place unprovided with a muzzle, or not under control by means of a collar and chain, may be seized by any police officer or any person duly appointed for the purpose by the local authority and removed to the nearest dog shelter or slaughter-house, there to be dealt with in the following manner:

(i.) If the dog is affected with, or suspected of, rabies, it shall be forthwith slaughtered.

(ii.) If the dog is not affected with, or suspected of, rabies, it shall be detained in the dog shelter or slaughter-house or other secure place. Provided that where the owner or person having charge of a dog so detained is known, the local authority or some person duly authorized by him shall forthwith cause notice to be given to such owner or person of the fact of the dog having been so seized and detained, and the dog shall, without prejudice to the recovery of any penalty for the breach of these regulations, be given up to such owner or person on payment of the reasonable expenses of detention.

(iii.) If the dog so seized and detained shall not have been claimed by such owner or person within three days after the seizure, or where such owner or person is known within two days after the aforesaid notice has been given, the local authority shall cause the dog to be slaughtered or otherwise disposed of in such manner as the local authority deems

(d) The owner of any dog which shall have been seized and detained under these regulations shall be liable to pay to the local authority the following charge:-

For detention for each day 50 cents, and such charge shall be recoverable, if the dog is not affected with, or suspected of, rabies, by the sale thereof, unless the said charge shall have been paid before sale by the owner or person in charge of the dog, otherwise the charge shall be recoverable in the manner provided by section 1 of Ordinance No. 6 of 1873 in respect to the order in which the property of public defaulters may be seized and sold.

"THE SMALL TOWNS SANITARY ORDINANCES, 1892 TO 1909."

REQULATIONS.

Eating-houses and Tea or Coffee Boutiques.

- 1. All utensils, furniture, and other requisites used in or belonging to any eating-house or tea or coffee boutique shall always be kept clean.
- 2. The walls of all eating-houses and tea or coffee boutiques shall be plastered and limewashed, and the rooms well ventilated and lighted.
- 3. All refuse and dirt in and about the premises of an eating-house or tea or coffee boutique shall be removed twice daily.
- 4. No person suffering from any loathsome, contagious, or infectious disease, or who has recently been in attendance on any such person, or who is unwashed or otherwise unclean, shall be employed in any eating-house or tea or coffee boutique.
- 5. The sugar used in such places shall be kept in glass-stoppered, wide-mouthed bottles.
- 6. All cakes, sweetmeats, &c., exposed for sale shall be kept in properly constructed glass cases free from flies. No food stuff shall be exposed to the contamination of flies. The glass cases used shall be kept scrupulously clean.
- 7. No waste tea or coffee or milk and no remnants of food or cooking waste shall be thrown on the ground, but the same shall be collected in a proper receptacle and removed daily.
- 8. These by-laws shall be framed and hung up in a prominent place in every such eating-house and tea or coffee boutique.

Bakeries.

- *f. Every bakery shall be well ventilated and well lighted, and the walls thereof shall be plastered and whitewashed at least four times a year, the floor cemented and sufficient drainage provided. There shall be a ceiling provided to the room in which dough is kneaded.
- 2. No bakery shall be within 30 feet of any cesspit, latrine, or sewer, nor in a position where bad odours wafted therefrom shall reach it.
- 3. No room used as a bakery shall be used as a dwelling-place or for any other purpose whatsoever.
- 4. All utensils, furniture, and other requisites used in or belonging to a bakery shall be kept clean.
- 5. The flour, water, and other materials used in the manufacture of bread shall be good and wholesome. The flour shall be kept on a raised shelf or platform at least 3 feet above the ground.
- 6. All refuse and dirt in and about the premises of a bakery shall be removed at least once a day, and the drains well flushed.
- 7. No person suffering from any loathsome, contagious, or infectious disease or who has recently been in attendance on any such person, or who is unwashed or otherwise unclean, shall be employed in a bakery. The person or persons engaged in kneading the dough or flour shall wear white aprons covering the chest and body.
- 8. Every bakery and the management and conduct of the business shall be at all times open and subject to inspection and examination by the Assistant Government Agent, or by any person acting under his authority.
- 9. Every bakery shall be licensed under the hand of the Assistant Government Agent, the licenses to remain in force till December 31 of the year in which the license is granted. The Assistant Government Agent shall have power to revoke any such license for a breach of any of these by-laws. All existing bakeries must take out a similar license within one month of the publication of these by-laws.
- 10. These by-laws shall be framed and hung up in a prominent place in every bakery.

Butchers' Stalls.

- 1. Every butcher's stall shall-be well ventilated and well lighted, the walls thereof shall be plastered and whitewashed at least four times a year, and the floor cemented and sufficient drainage pravided.
 - 2. Every room in which meat is sept shall be kept scrupulously clean.
- 3. Every table used in a butcher's stall shall be zinc covered. Such tables and the chopping block and all implements shall be kept scrupulously clean. They shall be washed with water and scrubbed with a hard clean brush immediately after use. All hooks for hanging meat shall be polished and free from rust.

- 4. Refuse and unsaleable material, offal, &c., if not immediately removed, shall be kept in a zinc-lined box with perforated zinc cover, the perforation to be of such size as to prevent flies entering.
- 5. All refuse and dirt in and about the premises of a butcher's stall shall be removed at least once a day, and the drains well flushed.
- 6. No person suffering from any loathsome, contagious, or infectious disease, or who has recently been in attendance on any such person, or who is unwashed or otherwise unclean, shall be employed in a butcher's stall.
- 7. Every butcher shall provide himself with a movable receptacle of metal for waste material.
- 8. Every butcher's stall and the management and conduct of the business shall be at all times open and subject to inspection and examination by the Assistant-Government Agent, or by any person acting under his authority.
- 9. Every butcher's stall shall be licensed under the hand of the Assistant Government Agent, the license to remain in force till December 31 of the year in which the license is granted. The Assistant Government Agent shall have power to revoke any such license for a breach of any of these by-laws. All existing butchers' stalls must take out a similar license within one month of the publication of these by-laws.
- 10. These by-laws shall be framed and hung up in a prominent place in every butcher's stall.

Fish Stalls.

- 1. Every permanent fish stall shall be well ventilated and lighted, and the walls thereof shall be plastered and whitewashed at least four times a year. The floor shall be of smooth cement having a proper fall leading to a masonry drain built in cement and cement rendered, which shall empty itself into a bucket. The drains and buckets shall be washed with disinfectant at least twice a day, and the bucket shall not be allowed to overflow. The stall shall always be kept clean and free from stains of blood and dirt.
- 2. Instead of the drain referred to in the last preceding rule, a fishmonger may use a large zinc sheet so bent as to have a fall towards its centre, and so arranged that the washing from this sheet of zinc shall fall into the bucket.
- 3. Every table used in a fish stall shall be zinc covered. Such table and the chopping block shall be kept scrupulously clean. They shall be washed with water and scrubbed with a hard clean brush immediately after use. All hooks for hanging fish shall be polished and free from rust.
- 4. Fish baskets shall be washed daily and kept exposed to sun and air on a shelf and not be kept inside the fish shop.
- 5. Every fish stall holder shall provide himself with a movable receptacle of metal for waste material.
- 6. All refuse and dirt in and about the premises of a fish stall shall be removed at least once a day, and the drains well flushed.
- 7. No person suffering from any loathsome, contagious, or infectious disease, or who has recently been in attendance on any such person, or who is unwashed or otherwise unclean, shall be employed in a fish stall.
- 8. Every fish stall and the management and conduct of the business shall be at all times open and subject to the inspection and examination by the Assistant Government Agent, or by any person acting under his authority.
- 9. Every fish stall shall be licensed under the hand of the Assistant Government Agent, the license to remain in force till December 31 of the year in which the license is granted. The Assistant Government Agent shall have power to revoke any such license for a breach of any of these by-laws. All existing fish stalls must take out a similar license within one month of the publication of these by-laws.
- 10. These by-laws shall be framed and hung up in a prominent place in every fish stall.

Keeping of Animals.

§ No horse, ass, mule, cattle, sheep, goat, or pig shall be housed in a dwelling-house, or in the verandah of dwelling-house, or in any shed or maduwa, which is part of, or attached to, a dwelling-house.

General.

The Assistant Government Agent or any officer acting under his authority may at all times order—

- (a) That all or any part of any house, dwelling, church, place of assembly, or other building be forthwith internally or externally limewashed or provided with sufficient ventilation or disinfected or otherwise clean.
- (b) That privies shall be constructed where it is desirable that they should exist.
- (c) That cospits or offensive drains shall be filled up by the owners of the land on which they are situated and that others be opened.
- (d) That compounds shall be cleansed and rubbish in them shall be burned.
 (e) That fences for private premises shall be kept down to a maximum height of 6 feet, and that all overhanging branches and foliage shall be removed, and every owner and occupier of such premises, so ordered, shall forthwith comply with such directions.
- (f) That hollow places in compounds or close to dwelling-houses shall be filled up or drained so that water may not stagnate in them.

It is hereby notified that His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has, by virtue of the powers by section 5, sub-section (1) (c), of "The Stamp Ordinance, 1909," on him conferred, authorized the following Joint Stock Company, incorporated under "The Joint Stock Companies' Ordinances, 1861 to 1907," to compound for the payment of stamp duty on share certificates specified in Schedule B to the said Stamp Ordinance on the conditions set out in section 5 aforesaid, sub-sections (1) (c) (i.), (ii.), and (iv.).

Clerks in Government service, from whatever funds they may be paid, who have completed three years' satisfactory service, and are not members of the Customs, Postal, Survey, or Railway Departments, and those clerks employed by Provincial and District Road Committees whose appointments date prior to July 1, 1875, are eligible for examination irrespective of age and without fee. Their applications (in the same form, Schedule A) for admission to the examination should be forwarded to the Director of Public Instruction through the Heads of their Departments.
- 4. Applications are to reach the Director of Public Instruction not later than 2 r.m. on Monday, November 28, 1910; any applications received after that hour, by whatever cause delayed, will be absolutely rejected.
- 5. The Director of Public Instruction will return to the candidate his application, approved or disapproved as the case may be, after taking, if necessary, the orders of Government thereon. The approved application shall constitute the candidate's ticket of admission to the examination. Candidates presenting themselves for examination must produce to the officer appointed to supervise the examination their forms of application approved by the Director of Public Instruction. A candidate not producing such form, whatever may be the reason for his not so doing, will be refused admittance to the examination.
- 6. The examination will be held at Colombo only, in the place and under the supervision of the officer specified in Schedule B. Heads of Departments are required to grant to officers of their Departments, whose applications to present themselves for examination have been returned to them approved by the Director of Public Instruction, leave to present themselves at the examination.
 - 7. The examination will be competitive. The number of places assigned for competition will be thirty.
- 8. The successful candidates will be required to pass a medical examination as to their physical fitness for service in any part of the Island.
- 9. The subjects for examination are those set out in Schedule C to this notice. The examination shall be held in two parts. The first part a qualifying examination in Handwriting, Spelling, and Arithmetic, and Book-keeping. Any candidate failing to obtain two-thirds of the marks allotted for Handwriting, half those allowed for Spelling and Arithmetic respectively, and one-third of those allowed for Bookkeeping shall be excluded from the remainder of the examination. Special attention will be paid to Handwriting, and candidates whose writing is untidy or illegible or contains defects in the formation of letters will be rigorously excluded. The kind of writing preferred will be that generally shown as the "Civil Service" hand. The second part of the examination shall be in the remaining subjects in Schedule C. Should a candidate obtain less than one-third of the aggregate marks for the three subjects—Composition, General Paper, Précis Writing—or less than one-fourth marks in any other subject, or if he be a Sinhalese or Tamil, less than one-half of the marks in his native language, such marks shall not be counted in his favour. In all the written papers marks will be deducted for bad writing and mistakes in spelling
- 10. Clerks of the description given in section 3 above, who have served Government continuously for over six years, will be allowed to compete amongst themselves, and will be eligible, if they obtain a minimum of 66 per cent. in Writing and 33 per cent. in the other compulsory subjects, for seven of the appointments offered for competition. Three of the appointments will be reserved as prizes for deserving clerks of the same description, who have served Government continuously for ten years and upwards, to be selected irrespective of examination. No service under the age of sixteen years will be reckoned for this purpose.

Extract from Regulations of Inns of Court.

- 6. In addition to making the above declaration, the applicant shall produce certificates of good character, to the satisfaction of the Benchers of the Inn of Court to which he seeks admission, from such persons and to such effect as specified in rules 7 and 8. Provided always that the Benchers of the Inn of Court to which the applicant seeks admission may in special circumstances accept such other exidence of good character as they may deem sufficient.
- 7. (1) If the applicant or his family permanently resides in the United Kingdom, such certificates shall be separate certificates from two responsible persons resident in the United Kingdom who have known him personally for one year or upwards and have had opportunities of judging of his character.
- (2) If neither the applicant nor his family permanently resides in the United Kingdom, one of such certificates shall be from a responsible person who has known him personally for one year or upwards and has had opportunities of judging of his character, and such applicant shall also produce—
- (a) If he has received, or is still receiving, his general education in the United Kingdom, a certificate from the head of his school or college, or from his tutor.
 - (b) In all other cases-
 - If he is a native of India, a certificate from the Collector or Deputy Commissioner of the district in which his family resides, or if his family resides in a native State, from the political officer attached to the native State or an officer of higher rank representing the Indian Government in the State.

If he is not a native of India, a certificate from a Judge, Magistrate, or other person holding a similar official position in the place or district in which the applicant resides.

- 8. Every such certificate shall state the name, address, and profession, occupation, or position of the person giving it, and what opportunities he has had of judging of the character of the applicant, and that the person giving it believes the applicant to be a person of respectability and fit to be admitted as a student of an Inn of Court, and shall be in the following form or to the like effect:—

VITAL STATISTICS

Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended November 5, 1910.

Births.—The total births registered were 121 (4 Europeans, 11 Burghers, 65 Sinhalese, 10 Tamils, 23 Moors, 6, Malays, and 2 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on July 1, 1910, viz. 187,554) was 33.6, as against 33.1 in the preceding week, 27.2 in the corresponding week of last year, and 25.1 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 133 (2 Europeans, 11 Burghers, 65 Sinhalese, 24 Tamils, 24 Moors, 5 Malays; and 2 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 37.0, as against 30.9 in the previous week, 27.8 in the corresponding week of last year, and 33.7 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 133 total deaths, 34 were of infants under one year of age, as against 32 in the preceding week, 20 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 27 the average for last year.

Still Births.—The number of still births registered during the week was 10.

Selected Causes of Death.—Seventeen deaths were registered from Pneumonia (against 9 in the previous week and 15 the weekly average for last year), of which 7 were in Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), 3 in Maradana hospitals, 2 in Pettah, and 1 each in Fort and Galle Face Ward, St. Sebastian, Slave Island, Kollupitiya North, and Kollupitiya South. Three deaths were registered from Bronchitis.

- 2. Eleven deaths were registered from *Phthisis* (against 20 in the previous week and 15 the weekly average for last year), of which 4 were in Kotahena, 2 each in New Bazaar, Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), and Slave Island, and 1 in St. Paul's.
- 3. Ten deaths were registered from Infantile Convulsions, 9 from Debility (2 infants), 8 Dysentery (2 infants), 7 Diarrhæa (3 infants), 7 Enteritis (1 infant), 5 Tetanus (4 infants), 4 Worms, 4 Starvation (all infants), 3 Rickets (1 infant), 3 Puerperal Fever, and 37 from Other Causes.
- 4. Five deaths were registered from *Enteric Fever* (against 4 in the previous week and 6 the weekly average for last year), 3 in Kollupitiya South and 1 each in Kotahena and New Bazear. There were 12 cases reported during the week, against 18 in the previous week.
- 5. One case of Smallpox was reported, against 5 in the previous week; also 3 of Measles, against 4 in the previous week; and 6 of Chickenpox, against 2 in the previous week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 77.2°, against 79.2° in the preceding week and 80.4° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.930 in., against 29.929 in. in the preceding week and 29.971 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was as high as 14.44 in., against 1.47 in. in the preceding week and 0.41 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.
