Walawe Cultivation Rules.

- . Cultivation of the lands under the irrigation works named above shall be confined to the maha and yala harvests.
- 2. Cultivation for yala shall take place between March 12 and May 1, and cultivation for maha between September 9 and November 9.
- 3. Between September 9 and October 9 paddy may be sown, which requires water for not more than 105 days from the sowing; paddy sown at any other time must be of a kind which does not require water for more than 90 days from the sowing.
- 4. Cattle may be kept within the lands of the proprietors until the sowing for each harvest is terminated. Within a day thereafter all cattle must either be removed to a distance of at least 2 miles from cultivated lands or must be tethered.
- 5. The cultivators shall put up fences and watch huts for the protection of their fields according to the directions of the vel-vidanes in proportion to the extent of land cultivated by them. Such fences and huts shall be kept in order by the cultivators of each tract of fields until the whole of the crops of that tract are reaped and secured. If any field in a tract is not cultivated, it shall be the duty of the proprietor of that field to do his share of the fencing. If any cultivator fails to erect or maintain his share of the fences or watch huts, the vel-vidane shall cause the work to be done, and recover the cost from the defaulter.
- 6. The managers of fields shall within 15 days after sowing furnish the irrigation headmen with a list of persons whom they have employed as goiyas, showing the extent which each goiya cultivated.
- 7. No substitute for a goiya shall be allowed, unless such substitute is approved of by the field manager and the irrigation headman is informed.
- 8. The managers of fields shall settle with the goiyas in the fields immediately after the harvest is reaped.
- 9. The irrigation headmen shall be paid one kuruni for each acre's extent sown as remuneration for their services, and shall grant receipts for the paddy received on that account.
- 10. Requisitions for the issue or for the stopping of water shall be made in writing by the vel-vidane to the Superintendent on application from the cultivator or proprietor to the vel-vidane. Kirinde-oya (Tissamaharama) Scheme Cultivation Rules.

- 1. Cultivation of the lands under the irrigation works named above shall be confined to the maha and yala harvests.
- 2. Cultivation for yala shall take place between March 15 and May 15, and cultivation for maha between October 1 and November 30. No paddy shall be sown for yala, except such kinds as can be reaped within 60 days of sowing. The Assistant Government Agent may grant an extension of cultivation for either maha or yala not exceeding 15 days.
- 3. All fields, except those exempted by the Assistant Government Agent, shall be ploughed or worked with the mamoty, and no buffaloes shall be used as "mudding buffaloes," except for smoothing the fields after being ploughed or worked with the mamoty.
- 4. Cattle may be kept within the lands of the proprietors until the sowing for each harvest is terminated. Within a day thereafter all cattle must either be removed to a distance of at least 2 miles from cultivated lands or must be tethered or pounded.
- 5. The cultivators shall put up watch huts in their fields necessary for the protection of fields according to orders of the vel-vidanes, and such huts shall be kept in order by the cultivators on whose fields such huts are until the whole of the crop of that tract of fields be reaped and secured.
- 6. The managers of fields shall within 15 days after sowing furnish the irrigation headmen with a list of persons whom they have employed as goiyas, showing the extent which each goiya cultivated.
- 7. No substitute for a goiya shall be allowed unless such substitute is approved of by the field manager, and the irrigation headman is informed.
- 8. The managers of fields shall settle with the goiyas in the fields immediately after the harvest is reaped.
- 9. The irrigation headmen shall be paid three kurunies for each amunam's extent sown as remuneration for their services, and shall grant receipts for the paddy received on that account.
- 10. Requisitions for the issue or for the stopping of water shall be made in writing by the vel-vidane to the Superintendent on application from the cultivator or proprietor to the vel-vidane. The requisition shall state the tract of field, and the extent for which application is made. The vel-vidane shall keep a copy of all such requisitions consecutively numbered for each cultivation.
- 11. If at any time before the maha and yala cultivation notice be given to the Assistant Government Agent by the officer in charge of the works that water is insufficient for the cultivation of all the fields insigated by the scheme, the Assistant Government Agent shall decide what area and what fields shall be cultivated for the maha or yala cultivation, and it shall be an offence for any person to cultivate any fields other than these decided upon by the Assistant Government Agent.

In the event of any proprietor failing to clear his share of the channels, the officer in charge of the works shall give notice that such repair or maintenance is required to the Government Agent or to the Assistant Government Agent, who shall cause the work to be done, and recover the cost thereof from the defaulter.
- 6. No dam may be constructed on any channel except on instructions from the officer in charge of the works.
- 7. The irrigation headmen as referred to in section 56 (1) of the Irrigation Ordinance shall be elected as provided in section 8 of the same, and it shall be their duty to properly distribute the water supplied from the Government channels or other sources by the irrigation officer in charge of the works to the various fields or tracts of fields in their charge, and they shall be under the control of the Government Agent or Assistant Government Agent, and their dismissal shall rest with him.
- 8. If in the case of storage works it should appear to the Director of Irrigation or his officer in charge of the work or scheme that the supply of water is or is likely to be insufficient for the cultivation of more than one crop, or for even one crop over the whole irrigable area, and that it is considered necessary to issue notices to that effect, and that the area to be cultivated must therefore be curtailed, the Assistant Government Agent shall decide on what actual area (so curtailed) or fields shall be cultivated and report accordingly to the officer in charge of the works, and water will only be issued to, and sufficient for, the cultivation of this area.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended December 17, 1910.

Births.—The total births registered were 109 (3 Europeans, 10 Burghers, 52 Sinhalese, 19 Tamils, 19 Moors, 2 Malays, and 4 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on July 1, 1910, viz., 187,554) was 30.3, as against 28.4 in the preceding week, 24.7 in the corresponding week of last year, and 25.1 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 127 (0 Europeans, 5 Burghers, 62 Sinhalese, 26 Tamils, 25 Moors, 6 Malays, and 3 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 35.3, as in the previous week, against 33.2 in the corresponding week of last year, and 33.7 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 127 total deaths, 34 were of infants under one year of age, as in the preceding week, against 24 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 27 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 10.

Selected Causes of Death.—Fifteen deaths were registered from Phthisis (as in the previous week and the weekly average for last year), of which 3 each were in San Sebastian, New Bazaar, and Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), 2 in Kotahena, and 1 each in Pettah, Maradana hospitals, Slave Island, and Kollupitiya North.

- 2. Eleven deaths were registered from *Pneumonia* (against 15 in the previous week and the weekly average for last year), of which 2 each were in Kotahena, New Bazaar, Maradana hospitals, and Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), and I each in Fort and Galle Face Ward, Pettah, and Slave Island. Three deaths were registered from *Bronchitis*.
- 3. Seventeen deaths were registered from Debility (including 5 infants), 9 Infantile Convulsions, 9 Old Age, 1 Infants), 6 Starvation (all infants), 5 Dysentery, 4 Tetanus (all infants), 4 Diarrhea (2 infants) 3 Worms, 3 Diralysis, and 22 from Other Causes.
- 4. Eight deaths were registered from Enteric Fever (against 6 in the previous week and the weekly average for last year), 2 each in Kotahena, Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), and Kollupitiya South, and 1 each in St. Paul's and Kollupitiya North. There were 24 cases reported during the week, against 18 in the previous week.
- 5. One death in the Infectious Diseases Hospital was registered as due to Smallpox, of a Sinhalese from Kotaliena. There were 2 cases reported during the week, against 6 in the previous week; and 12 of Chickenpox, as in the previous week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 78.5°, against 78.1° in the preceding week and 78.9° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 30.004 in., against 29.926 in. in the preceding week and 29.988 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 0.12 in., against 3.93 in. in the preceding week and 0.05 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.
