**VITAL STATISTICS OF TOWNS IN CEYLON IN THE
MONTH OF OCTOBER, 1910.**

REPORT OF THE REGISTRAR-GENERAL.

THIS report deals with the Vital Statistics of the 31 principal towns in the Island proclaimed under sections 31 to 36 of the Ordinance No. 1 of 1895.

Births.

2. The births registered in the 31 towns during the month numbered 1,200 (639 males and 561 females), and were equal to an annual rate of 28·47 per 1,000, against 28·96 during the preceding month, 27·21 in the corresponding month of last year, and 29·77 the monthly average for the thirty-six months, July, 1907, to June, 1910. Of the towns (excluding Vavuniya and Lunugala, which have a population under 1,000), the highest birth-rate was in Tangalla (56·36, average 34·75), and the lowest (as in the previous month) in Hatton and Dikoya (8·87, average 15·31).

3. In the city of Colombo* the births numbered 454 (234 males and 220 females), and were equal to an annual rate† of 27·94 per 1,000, against 25·49 in the preceding month, 23·50 in the corresponding month of last year, and 25·09 the monthly average. Of the wards (omitting Fort and Galle Face and the Pettah, which contain a population mainly adult and floating), the highest birth-rate was in New Bazaar (30·59, average 23·01), and the lowest in Kollupitiya (15·48, average 16·73).

Deaths.

4. The deaths registered in the 31 towns during the month numbered 1,405 (749 males and 656 females), and were equal to an annual rate of 26·67 per 1,000, against 26·86 during the preceding month, 27·89 in the corresponding month of last year, and 30·64 the monthly average. The health of the towns was slightly better than usual, and about the same as in the previous month. Excluding Vavuniya and Lunugala, the highest death-rate was in Anuradhapura (67·31, average 53·39), followed by Ratnapura (46·83, average 37·43), and the lowest in Nuwara Eliya (6·81, average 14·28), followed by Matara (12·52, average 24·64).

5. In the city of Colombo* the deaths registered numbered 443 (242 males and 201 females), and were equal to an annual rate† of 25·34 per 1,000, against 28·08 during the preceding month, 26·94 in the corresponding month of last year, and 32·67 the monthly average. The city was healthier than usual and than in the previous month. Omitting the Fort and Galle Face Ward and the Pettah Ward, the lowest death-rate was in St. Paul's (15·20, average 23·85), and the highest in Maradana, exclusive of hospitals (24·76, average 27·79), while Kollupitiya, which is usually the healthiest ward, has fallen to the second place this month from the third in the two previous months. Judged by the infantile mortality, which is a better test, St. Paul's Ward was the least healthy (see paragraph 7 below).

Infantile Mortality.

6. The infantile mortality of the 31 towns was equal to a rate of 247 per 1,000 births registered, against 228 in the preceding month, 237 in the corresponding month of last year, and 252 the monthly average. In the towns having an estimated population of 5,000 or more, the infantile mortality ranged from 375 in Jaffna (average 255) to 59 in Puttalam (average 281).

7. The infantile mortality in the city of Colombo was 249 per 1,000 births registered, against 247 in the previous month, 253 in the corresponding month of last year, and 319 the monthly average, and ranged from 356 in St. Paul's (average 402) to 241 in New Bazaar (average 398).

Causes of Death.

8. *Infants.*—Out of the 1,405 deaths from all causes at all ages in the 31 towns, 296 were among infants under one year. Of these, the chief causes were 95 *Convulsions* (including 34 in Colombo, 8 in Kandy); 51 *Debility* (18 in Colombo, 6 in Jaffna); 25 *Tetanus* (10 in Colombo, 7 in Jaffna); 22 *Diarrhoea* (7 in Colombo, 6 in Jaffna); 21 *Premature Birth* (7 in Colombo, 5 in Jaffna); 19 *Pneumonia* (10 in Colombo); 13 *Bronchitis* (5 in Colombo).

* Consequent on the extension of the limits of the Colombo Municipality in February, 1910, by adding about 49 acres to Kotahena Ward, 531 to Maradana Ward, and 6013 to Kollupitiya Ward, it became necessary to alter the limits of these registration divisions to make them co-terminous with the Municipal divisions, and this was done with effect from October 1, 1910, by Proclamation of September 13, 1910. The population of the town was increased but slightly, as the added parts are not populous. An additional Registrar has from October 1 been appointed to Kollupitiya Ward, owing to the large area of the ward as enlarged, the ward being divided into two registration divisions, north and south.

† The city-rate is worked out independently of the ward-rates and on a different basis of population, and takes into account hospital events, &c., not assignable to wards.

9. In the city of Colombo, out of the 443 deaths from all causes at all ages, 113 were among infants under one year. Of these, the chief causes were 34 *Convulsions* (11 in St. Paul's, 8 in Maradana, exclusive of hospitals) : 18 *Debility* (7 in New Bazaar, 5 in Kotahena) ; 10 *Tetanus* (7 in Kotahena) ; 10 *Pneumonia* (4 in Kotahena) ; 7 *Premature Birth* (5 in Maradana hospitals) ; 7 *Diarrhœa* (2 each in Maradana, exclusive of hospitals, and Slave Island) ; 5 *Bronchitis* (3 in Maradana, exclusive of hospitals).

10. **General Mortality (One Year and over).**—Out of the 1,109 deaths of persons one year and over in age in the 31 towns, there were 158 from *Diarrhœa* (29 in Kandy, 18 in Ratnapura, 13 each in Nawalapitiya and Matale, 13 in Colombo) ; 118 from *Phtisis* (59 in Colombo, 14 in Galle, 10 in Kandy, 8 in Jaffna, 6 in Moratuwa) ; 108 from *Pneumonia* (40 in Colombo, 6 each in Moratuwa, Kandy, Galle, Batticaloa, and Badulla) ; 65 from *Dysentery* (24 in Colombo, 8 in Kandy, 6 in Ratnapura) ; 65 from *Dochmus Duodenalis* (18 in Matale, 9 in Kandy, 8 in Gampola) ; 39 from *Malarial Cachexia* (8 in Batticaloa, 5 in Ratnapura) ; 35 from *Remittent Fever* (7 in Jaffna, 5 in Colombo) ; 24 from *Enteric Fever* (16 in Colombo) ; 23 from *Puerperal Fever* (7 in Colombo).

11. The highest mortality in the town of Colombo was from *Phtisis* (18 per cent. of all deaths one year and over), followed by *Pneumonia* (12 per cent.), *Dysentery* (7 per cent.), *Enteric Fever* (5 per cent.). Out of the 122 deaths from *Phtisis* in all towns at all ages, 63 occurred in Colombo. This and *Pneumonia* were responsible for 113 deaths at all ages in the city, or 26 per cent. of the deaths from all causes in it.

12. Taking all the towns together, *Diarrhœa* and *Dysentery* contributed the highest mortality (18 per cent.), followed by *Bronchitis* and *Pneumonia* (11 per cent.), *Phtisis* (9 per cent.), and *Infantile Convulsions* (7 per cent.).

Meteorology.

13. *Rainfall.*—The rainfall was exceptionally heavy in the month, and was as high as 22.18 in Chilaw, 21.20 in Kalutara, and 21.03 in Ratnapura. In Colombo it was 16.83. The south-east and eastern coast from Tangalla to Mullaittivu received the least rainfall, with a minimum of 2.51 in Mullaittivu and 2.96 in Hambantota, but Trincomalee was an exception with a rainfall of 10.96, or more than double that in Batticaloa.

14. *Temperature.*—The mean temperature varied from 59.3 in Nuwara-Eliya to 82.7 in Trincomalee, and was 76.8 in Colombo, 75.0 in Kandy, and 73.9 in Badulla.
