THE following by-laws made by the Government Agent, Western Province, in pursuance of the powers vested in him by section 38 of the Cemeteries and Burials Ordinance, No. 9 of 1899, which have been submitted to and confirmed by the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, are hereby published for general information.

By-laws under Section 38 of Ordinance No. 9 of 1899.

- 1. The proper authority may give notice requiring that all burial grounds in any defined area or group of areas shall be registered in his office on or before a certain date.
- 2. The trustees, managers, or proprietors of any burial ground, or the person having sole or principal charge, shall within three months after the publication of this notice nominate a person, hereafter referred to as the "responsible officer," who shall be responsible to the proper authority for the proper regulation of the burial and cremation of corpses in such burial ground, and for ensuring that graves shall be of proper depth, in default the proper authority shall nominate a person.
- 3. In the case of such burial grounds as are in charge of the proper authority, the Police Vidane, exercising authority over the area in which the burial ground is situated, shall, in the absence of a special written nomination of some other person, be the "responsible officer," who shall be responsible to the proper authority for the proper regulation of the burial and cremation of corpses, and for ensuring that graves shall be of proper depth.
- 4. It shall be the duty of the "responsible officer" to furnish such information as the proper authority may from time to time require in order to prepare a register of burial grounds within such area or areas. The information shall, inter alia, contain the following particulars:—
 - (a) Name of the district, korale, pattuwa, peruwa, division, or badda, village.

(b) Name of the burial ground.

- (c) A plan of the land by a surveyor, or in its absence a sketch giving the measurements in yards along the various boundaries.
- d) The names and residences of the trustees, managers, or proprietors.

(e) The name and office of the responsible officer.

(f) To what community or communities the burial ground is open.

5. The "responsible officer" shall forthwith report any burial grounds opened under section 34 or closed under section 35 of the Ordinance.6. It shall be the duty of the "responsible officer" to see that all burial grounds

6. It shall be the duty of the "responsible officer" to see that all burial grounds in his charge are kept clear of all weeds and undergrowth, and that no rubbish is deposited thereon.

7. In the case of the burial grounds mentioned in by-law 2 above, should the "responsible officer" fail to keep the burial grounds in his charge clear of all weeds and undergrowth and all other rubbish, the proper authority may proceed in the manner indicated in section 37 of "The Cemetries and Burials Ordinance, 1899." In the case of burial grounds in charge of the proper authority, the responsible officer shall not incur any expenditure without previous sanction thereto having been obtained from such authority.

8. All graves shall be dug in order, so as not to waste space, and shall be not less than 6 feet deep.

9. Burial grounds shall be inspected once in every three months by the Vidane Arachchi of the peruwa in which they are situated, who shall report to the proper authority as to—

(a) Their cleanliness.

(b) Their freedom from weeds or jungle growth.

(c) The nature of the boundaries.

(d) Any encroachment.

(For this purpose a list of the burial grounds within the peruwa shall be kept by each Vidane Arachchi.)

THE following rule made by the Governor in Executive Council, with the approval of the Secretary of State for the Colonies, in substitution for amended rule 18 of the rules and regulations concerning land sales, referred to in the Notification dated November 15, 1909, published in the Government Gazette of the 19th idem, is published for general information.

2. The new rule will take effect from January 4, 1911.

RULE REFERRED TO.

18. Lands shall be sold by public auction at an upset price which shall not be less than Rs. 15 an acre, except where the Governor is satisfied that from the presence of rock, swamp, or other cause the average value of the land is less than Rs. 15 an acre. A sum of Re. 1.50 shall be paid in respect of each boundary mark which may have been or may be erected to define the boundaries of the land. Provided, however, that where the land purchased abuts on Crown land, only one-half of the cost of each boundary mark erected to define the boundaries between the land purchased and the Crown land will be charged, the other half cost to be recovered from the purchaser of the Crown land when such Crown land is sold.

IT is hereby notified that the Sanitary Board of the Colombo District has, in terms of section 7 of Ordinance No. 18 of 1892, as amended by Ordinances Nos. 26 of 1908 and 30 of 1909, and with the sanction of the Governor and Executive Council, made and assessed a rate of 3 per centum per annum for the year 1911 on the annual value of all houses and buildings and all lands and tenements whatsoever within the town of Gampaha, in the Colombo District, Western Province, save such as are by the said section of the said Ordinance No. 18 of 1892 exempted from the payment of such rate.

RULE REFERRED TO.

20 A. In exceptional cases the Provincial Committee may, subject to the approval of His Excellency the Governor, allow a gratuity to the widow or orphans of an officer or servant after his death, whether it takes place hereafter or has occurred already, provided that he has not received from the Committee any gratuity in lieu of pension during his lifetime.

IT is hereby notified that His Excellency the Governor in Executive Council, in exercise of the power vested in him by sub-section (1) of section 62 of "The Municipal Councils' Ordinance, 1910," has been pleased to prescribe the following rules for the grant of pensions and gratuities to officers and servants of the Galle Municipality.

MUNICIPAL PENSION MINUTE.

Rules relating to Grant of Pension to Officers of the Galle Municipality.

- 1. Municipal officers and servants have no absolute right to any pension or allowance under these rules, and the Municipal Council retain the power to dismiss a Municipal officer or servant without compensation.
- No pension or allowance can be granted to any Municipal officer or servant without the authority of the Governor.
- 2. Subject to the exceptions and provisions hereinafter contained, every Municipal officer or servant holding a permanent office in the service of the Council,

separately provided in the estimates, which has been declared to be pensionable by resolution of Council and drawing a salary of Rs. 250 per annum and upwards, either in respect of one or of several offices held permanently and conjointly, may be awarded a pension as under:—

- (i.) Any person who shall have served for ten or less than eleven years may receive an annuity equal to 15-60ths of the salary as defined hereinafter of the permanent office or offices held by him at the time of retirement.
- (ii.) Any person who shall have served for eleven and less than twelve years may receive an annuity equal to 16-60ths of such salary.
- (iii.) In like manner, an addition may be granted of 1-60th for each additional year of service until the completion of thirty-five years' service, when the maximum pension, equal to 40-60ths of the salary, may be granted.
- (iv.) Any person retiring on account of illness or age before completing ten years' service may receive a gratuity calculated at the rate of one month's salary of the permanent office or offices held by such person at the time of retirement for each year of service. If the service includes a fractional part of a year over six months, half a month's salary shall be allowed in addition.
- 3. The service of a Municipal officer or servant to be reckoned for pension will be calculated from the date on which he commences to draw salary from the Council in respect of his first permanent appointment. Provided that in the case of an officer or servant required to pass any examination prescribed by the regulations in force at the time of his first appointment, he shall pass the examination within the period prescribed. If he fails so to pass, the period by which the date of his passing the examination is overdue will be deducted from his term of service when his claims to pension are considered. In the case of an officer or servant holding a pensionable appointment under agreement, upon such officer or servant being confirmed in the permanent appointment, the period of such service under agreement shall count for pension.
- 4. Acting service in an office carrying claim to pension will, when continuous with permanent employment, be allowed to reckon as service for pension, provided no other officer was earning pension for the same period in respect of the same office. And a Municipal officer or servant who has been transferred from a non-pensionable to a pensionable office will be entitled to reckon his service in the former if it has been continuous with his subsequent service in the latter capacity. The service of a Municipal officer or servant under sixteen years of age does not count for pension, but may count for a long service allowance granted under section 21 of this Minute.
- 5. (1) In the case of abolition of office the pensions or gratuities grantable to a Municipal officer or servant whose office has been declared to be pensionable will be at the rate of 1-60th of his salary for each year of his actual service, plus the following addition of years for abolition:—
 - (i.) Where the actual service of an officer or servant amounts to twenty years and upwards, a period of ten years may be added to his actual service in computing his retiring allowance.
 - (ii.) Where the actual service amounts to less than twenty years and not less than fifteen years, a period of seven years may be added.
 - iii.) Where the actual service amounts to less than fifteen years and not less than ten years, a period of five years may be added.
 - (iv.) Where the period of service amounts to less than ten years and not less than five years, a gratuity shall be awarded calculated at the rate of one month's salary for each year's service, with the addition of three months' salary.
 - (v.) Where the period of service amounts to less than five years, a gratuity shall be awarded calculated at the rate of one month's salary for each year's service, plus half a month's salary for the fraction of a year over six months, with the addition of one month's salary.
- (2) Provided always that the officer or servant who is thus retired on pension shall be liable to be recalled to the Municipal service for re-employment on a salary which, together with his pension, shall not be less than that enjoyed at the time of abolition, and that in no case shall the number of years to be added to the actual service exceed that which, if added to the age of the retiring officer, would bring that age up to sixty years.

Mode of Calculation of Pension, &c.

6. The pension or gratuity awarded to a Municipal officer or servant shall be computed upon the salary drawn by him at the time of his retirement in respect of the permanent office or offices then held by him, provided that he shall have held such office or offices, or an office or offices to which the same fixed salary or incremental scale of salary is attached, for at least three years; otherwise the pension shall be calculated upon the average of the salaries attached to the permanent offices held by such person during the three years next preceding the commencement of such pension.

Provided always that in the case of an officer or servant seconded from Government service for service under the Municipal Council, the pension of such officer or servant shall be provided by the Government, and shall be calculated on the final salary attached to the permanent post held by him under Government at the time of his retirement, subject to the general pension regulations of the Government. The Municipal Council shall pay to Government as a contribution towards the pension of every such officer or servant 4 per cent., and in the case of officers or servants seconded for service on or after May 26, 1903, 8 per cent. on the salary of

the permanent post from time to time held by such officer or servant under Government. Such contribution shall begin from the date of such officer or servant being seconded for service under the Municipal Council, and shall be paid monthly, and

shall cease on his reverting to Government service.

Provided further that in the case of such an officer or servant retiring while still in the service of the Municipal Council, his pension shall be calculated on the final salary of the permanent post held by him under the Municipal Council at the time of his retirement, subject in other respects to the general regulations governing Municipal pensions. Should the pension of such officer or servant so calculated exceed the pension he would have obtained had it been calculated on the final salary of the permanent post held by him under Government at the time of his retirement, the Municipal Council shall, in addition to the contribution above-mentioned to be paid by the Council to the Government, pay to such officer or servant the difference between the two pensions.

- 7. For the purpose of the last preceding section, salary includes personal allowance equivalent to salary voted as such to the officer or servant by name, but no other emohument whatever.
- 8. A Municipal officer or servant is entitled to reckon as service for pension the whole period of absence on vacation leave and half the period of absence on leave with half salary. Absence without salary will not count as service for pension, provided, however, that a period not exceeding one year during which an officer or servant is absent on leave without salary, such leave being granted on grounds of public policy, may be counted as service on full pay.

Private Practice.

9. As a general rule, it is indispensable as a qualification for pension that the whole time of the retiring officer or servant during his employment shall have been given to the Municipal service, except in any case in which the Municipal Council has expressly sanctioned a departure from this rule.

. Deductions and Additions.

10. The rates of pension above set forth will only be granted in cases of faithful and meritorious service. Where the testimony as to good conduct is in any way defective, a deduction will be made from the pension; and where the misconduct of a Municipal officer or servant has been of a serious nature, he shall forfeit all claim to pension.

Note.—Heads of Departments are enjoined to take care, when furnishing the particulars required in reference to persons recommended for pensions or retiring allowances, to avoid giving unqualified certificates in any case where the service of an officer has been in any respect faulty.

11. Where service of peculiar and extraordinary merit has been rendered by a Municipal officer or servant distinctly outside the duties in respect of which his salary is paid a special rate of pension may be recommended for sanction, but in ordinary cases the maximum pension or retiring allowance grantable to an officer or servant under these rules shall not exceed two-thirds of the highest salary drawn by such officer or servant at any time in the course of his service.

Age at which Pensions are Granted.

12. A pension will not be granted to a Municipal officer or servant who shall be under fifty-five years of age unless upon a certificate from the Head of his Department and from a Medical Board nominated by the Chairman and approved by the Standing Committee, or, if the Municipal officer or servant is absent on leave from such medical adviser or advisers as the Standing Committee may approve, that he is permanently unfit to discharge the duties of his office owing to infirmity either of mind or body, and unless he shall have therefore discharged such duties to the satisfaction of the Council. When a Municipal officer or servant claiming pension is himself the Head of a Department, a pension will be granted only upon medical certificate as prescribed above, and if he shall have discharged the duties of his office to the satisfaction of the Council.

When an officer or servant is responsible or mainly responsible for the illness which leads to his retirement, some reduction may be made in the pension or gratuity awarded.

Retirement for Inefficiency.

13. Where a Municipal officer or servant who is below the limit of age (55 years) entitling him to retire on pension is removed from the Municipal service on the ground of his inability to discharge efficiently the duties of his office, and the Council thinks that the special circumstances of his case justify the grant to him of a retiring allowance, he may, with the approval of the Governor, be given such retiring allowance as the Council thinks just and proper, but in no case exceeding the amount for which his length of service would qualify him under these rules without any addition under section 5.

Re-employment of Pensioner.

14. Should a Municipal officer or servant to whom a pension has been awarded take salaried employment in any public or quasi-public Department either in this Colony or in any other part of His Majesty's dominions, his pension shall cease to be paid whilst he is so employed, if the official income of his new office is equal to the salary of the appointment from which he retired. But if such official income is less than the salary of his last former office, then so much of his pension shall be paid as shall make up his income to the amount of the salary last drawn by him previously to his retirement.

On final retirement the original pension shall be payable irrespective of such additional pension as shall have been earned in respect of such re-employment, but subject, nevertheless, to a redistribution of the additional five years commonly known as "climate allowance." In no case shall more than five years' climate allowance be granted to any one person.

Compulsory Retirement.

15. Every Municipal officer or servant may be required to retire from the Municipal service on or after attaining the age of fifty-five years, upon being given twelve months' notice to that effect, subject to the approval of the Governor. Retirement shall be compulsory for every Municipal officer or servant on attaining the age of sixty years. Provided that in the case of subordinate officers and members of the Clerical Service and outdoor staff, the Council may extend such officers or servants employment for a further period, in no case exceeding ten years, and in special cases among other classes of Municipal officers or servants the Council may extend such officers or servants employment for a further period (in no case exceeding five years) on being satisfied that his retirement at sixty would be detrimental to the interests of the Municipal service.

Retirement on Pension of Officers and Servants at Age of Sixty or over.

16. (ie) Every Municipal officer or servant claiming a pension is required to submit six months before he attains the age of sixty years the usual paper of particulars for pension, with a view to the question of his retirement being considered.

(ii.) Heads of Departments must forward to the Chairman soon after January 1 of each year a return of all officers and servants, of whatever grade, serving in their Departments, who are sixty or more than sixty years of age, or who will attain the

age of sixty during the current year.

(iii.) In each case it must be stated whether or not there are any grounds for departing from the general rules that officers and servants should be retired at sixty, and whether the retention of the officer or servant in Municipal employment would be detrimental to the interests of the Municipal service. The grounds should be stated in the column of remarks.

Forfeiture of Pension on Conviction for certain Offences.

17. If any person in the receipt of a pension or long service allowance shall be convicted of any offence for which he shall be sentenced to death or to any term of rigorous imprisonment or analogous punishment exceeding twelve months, the payment of such pension or allowance shall be forthwith discontinued, unless the Council, with the approval of the Governor, otherwise direct.

Service must be continuous.

18. The service in respect of which pensions or gratuities will be granted must be unbroken, except in cases where the service has been interrupted by abolition of office or other temporary suspension of employment not arising from misconduct or voluntary resignation. Service prior to a break of service may, however, be allowed to count for pension together with service subsequent to such break, if the whole intervening period has, with the Council's permission, been spent in employment under the Crown or under some other Municipality or other local public body.

Seconded Officers and Servants.

- 19. An officer or servant seconded from a pensionable appointment in the Municipal service to temporary employment under Municipal control, or to an office to which pension rights are not attached, may be allowed to count the period of his temporary employment for pension purposes, provided always—
 - (1) That he retires under circumstances which would otherwise entitle him to pension.
 - (2) That if he should be superannuated from seconded service, or within three years' full service after leaving such seconded service, his retiring allowance shall be based on the pensionable emoluments of the last pensionable appointment or appointments held by him prior to retirement.
 - (3) That the fact of his being seconded with claim to pension shall have been notified at the time.
 - (4) That the seconding for such other temporary employment shall have been authorized by the Council.
- 20. Officers or servants who have been paid from votes for services exclusive of establishments shall, when transferred to appointments on the establishment, be allowed to count for pension half of such service as may have been continuous with their subsequent service on the establishment. Provided that the allowance of such service shall be limited to a maximum of five years to count for pension.

Long Service Allowances for Officers and Servants drawing less than Rs. 250 per Annum.

21. Municipal officers or servants drawing a salary of less than Rs. 250 per annum retiring on account of illness after serving continuously for a period of twenty-five years and upwards may, if the Council be satisfied from the report of a Medical Board nominated by the Chairman and approved by the Standing Committee that they are physically unfit to discharge the duties of their offices owing to infirmity either of mind or body and that such infirmity is likely to be permanent, be awarded such long service allowance, not exceeding Rs. 5 per mensem,

as the Council may think just and proper. Those in the receipt of daily pay with continuous service of twenty-five years and upwards retiring under similar circumstances may be awarded gratuities calculated at the rate of one-third of a month's salary for each year's service.

No Medical Board is required if the officer or servant is proved to be over sixty

years of age.

Enhanced Pensions, &c., in Cases of Injuries received in Discharge of Duties.

22. (i.) When an officer or servant employed in the Municipal service, whether serving in a pensionable or in a non-pensionable office, is injured (a) in the actual discharge of his duty, (b) without his own default, and (c) by some injury specially attributable to the nature of his duty, it shall be competent for the Council to grant to him in respect of such injury an annual allowance not exceeding the undermentioned portion of his salary and emoluments at the date of the injury, viz.:—

When his capacity to contribute to his support is-

Slightly impaired	••		560ths

Totally destroyed			20~60ths

- (ii.) Provided that no award shall, together with retired allowance for which he would be qualified by length of service, exceed 50-60ths of his salary and emoluments at the date of the injury, and that the award shall be so much less than the amount grantable under the scale given above as the Council shall think reasonable, in case—
 - (a) The usual amount exceeds by not less than Rs. 1,000 a year the rate of retired allowance to which the length of the injured person's service would entitle him; or
 - (b) The injured person has continued to serve for not less than one year after the injury in respect of which he retires; or
 - (c) The injured person is fifty years of age or upwards at the date of injury; or (d) The injury is not the sole cause of retirement, i.e., the retirement is caused
 - (d) The injury is not the sole cause of retirement, i.e., the retirement is caused partly by age or infirmity.
- (iii.) In the case of a pensionable officer or servant the above award shall be in addition to the pension or gratuity for which the injured person would be qualified by length of service, and in the case of an injured officer or servant who is entitled to a gratuity only, he may, if he wish it, be awarded in lieu of such gratuity an annual allowance of so many 60ths as the years he has actually served; together with the number of 60ths that may be awarded as above on account of his injuries.

Pensions, &c., to Widows and Children of Officers and Servants killed while on Duty.

23. (i.) When an officer or servant is killed while in the discharge of his duty, the Chairman may at his discretion propose to the Council an award to the widow and children, which ordinarily may be on the following scale:—

Pension to widow not to exceed 10-60ths of the husband's salary and emolu-

ments, or Rs. 100 a year, whichever is greater; and
Gratuity to children not exceeding Rs. 10, multiplied by the total number of
their years, starting from the ages at the time of their father's or mother's
death, as the case may be, and ending with fifteen years, the total
gratuity not to be less than Rs. 100 or more than Rs. 500.

In the case of orphan children the award may be twice the usual rate.

- (ii.) If the service of the deceased at the date of the injury was less than five years, the award may be-
 - To the widow a gratuity not exceeding one-half of the salary and emoluments of the deceased; and to each child a gratuity not exceeding 1–12th of of the salary and emoluments of the deceased; but the total gratuity to widow and children shall not exceed one year's salary and emoluments of the deceased:
- (iii.) If the deceased does not leave a widow and if his mother or other near relative was wholly dependent upon him for their support, the award which might have been made to a widow may be made to the mother or other such dependent relative.

Gratuity to Widow and Children of an Officer or Servant dying while in Service.

24. In the event of an officer or servant dying while in the service of the Municipal Council, it shall be competent to the Municipal Council to grant to the widow of such officer or servant a gratuity not exceeding three months' pay of the office, and it shall be competent to the Council to grant in addition one month's pay for each minor child.

Extended Service of Officers and Servants engaged under Special Agreements.

25. (i.) Whenever an officer or servant who has been serving the Municipal Council on a special agreement for a fixed term of service remains in the service of the Municipal Council after the expiration of that term without any fresh agreement, or without express renewal for a definite term of his previous agreement, as a member of a permanent Department under the Municipal Council, holding an office declared pensionable by notification, such officer or servant thereby ceases to be entitled to the stipulations made in his favour in the original agreement.

(ii.) The period of service under such agreement when continuous with subsequent permanent service, which has been declared to be pensionable, may, however, be

reckoned for pension, subject only to the limitation provided in section 20 as regards service paid from votes for services exclusive of establishments.

26. The following are the rates of exchange for payment of pensions in England: --

s. d.

(1) For officers and servants on sterling salary .. 1 4 to the rupee.

(2) For officers and servants on rupee salary :-

(a) If appointed not later than February 19, 1897 i 101

(b) If appointed after February 19, 1897, but not later than December 31, 1904

(c) If appointed on or after January 1, 1905 ... 1 4

Medical Boards and Pension or Gratuity Papers.

27. When the Head of a Department considers that any of his officers or servants should be retired on the ground of ill-health, he must apply to the Chairman for the appointment of a Medical Board.

All Medical Boards shall consist of three Medical Officers.

If the officer or servant reported on is condemned by the Board, the particulars necessary for the computation of his pension and a statement of the pension to which he is entitled, together with the report of the Board, must be submitted to the Council.

28. The same course with regard to superannuation papers must be followed where an officer or servant retires on account of age.

Payment of Pensions of Deceased Pensioners

29. (i.) The payment of pensions of deceased pensioners to the widow or next of kin up to the end of the month in which the pensioner died is allowable where the pension does not exceed Rs. 2,200 per annum.

(ii.) In all other cases pension is payable only up to date of death.

(iii.) The Auditor is authorized to pass such payments on the signature of the next of kin on a certificate being appended to the abstract by the Head of the Department that they are to the best of his knowledge and belief the parties entitled to the payment.

Miscellaneous.

- 30. (i.) When an officer or servant has been reduced for misconduct and subsequently reinstated, if the reinstatement took place three years before his retirement, his pension will be calculated on his actual salary without deduction, if the reinstatement took place within three years of the retirement, the pension will be calculated on the average salary for the three years.
- (ii.) If an officer or servant reduced for misconduct has not been reinstated, his pension will be calculated on his actual final salary, even though the reduction was made within three years of retirement, but no further reduction will be made, save in very exceptional circumstances in which the misconduct has been very serious, or the punishment inflicted inadequate.
 - 31. No pension granted under these rules shall be assignable or transferable.
- 32. If any person to whom a pension has been granted under these rules becomes a bankrupt, the pension shall forthwith cease; but it shall be lawful, if such pensioner is resident in the Colony, for the Council, with the approval of the Governor, from time to time during the remainder of such pensioner's life, or during such shorter period or periods either continuous or discontinuous as such Council shall think fit, to pay all or any part of the moneys to which such pensioner would have been entitled by way of pension had he not become a bankrupt, or to apply the same for the maintenance and personal support or benefit of all or any, exclusive of the other or others of the following persons, namely, such pensioner and any wife, child, or children of his in such proportions and manner as the Council from time to time thinks proper.
- 33. Should any case arise which has not been provided for in this Minute, the principles laid down in the Government Pension Minute will be applied.
- 34. All previous Minutes and Notifications regarding Municipal pensions are hereby cancelled.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended December 24, 1910,

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 83 (2 Europeans, 7 Burghers, 48 Sinhalese, 12 Tamils, 12 Moors, 2 Malays, and 0 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on July 1, 1910, viz., 187,554) was 23·1, as against 30·3 in the preceding week, 20·1 in the corresponding week of last year, and 25·1 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 121 (0 Europeans, 7 Burghers, 57 Sinhalese, 31 Tamils, 20 Moors, 2 Malays, and 4 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 33.6, as against 35.3 in the previous week, 35.7 in the corresponding week of last year, and 33.7 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 121 total deaths, 27 were of infants under one year of age, as against 34 in the preceding week, 38 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 27 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 7.

Selected Causes of Death.—Fifteen deaths were registered from Phth sis (as in the two previous weeks and the weekly average for last year), of which 4 were in Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), 3 in New Bazaar, 2 each in St. Paul's, Kotahena, and Maradana hospitals, and I each in San Sebastian and Slave Island.

- Thirteen deaths were registered from Pneumonia (against 11 in the previous week and 15 the weekly average for last year), of which 3 were in San Sebastian, 2 each in New Bazaar, Maradana hospitals, and Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), and 1 each in Fort, St. Paul's, Slave Island, and Kollupitiya North. Three deaths were registered from Bronchitis.
- 3. Nine deaths were registered from Enteritis (including 2 infants), 9 Infantile Convulsions, 8 Old Age, 8 Debility (5 infants), 7 Dysentery, 7 Tetanus (5 infants), 5 Diarrhæa, 5 Worms, and 29 from Other Causes.
- Three deaths were registered from Enteric Fever (against 8 in the previous week and 6 the weekly average for last year), 2 in St. Paul's and the other in Kollupitiya South. There were 19 cases reported during the week, against 24 in the previous week.
- No deaths were registered from Smallpox. Three cases of illness were reported during the week, against 2 in the previous week; and 5 of Chickenpox, against 12 in the previous week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 78.3°, against 78.5° in the preceding week, and 79.4° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 30.000 in., against 30.004 in. in the preceding week, and 30.003 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was nil against 0.12 in. in the preceding week and 0.35 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.
