**VITAL STATISTICS OF TOWNS IN CEYLON IN THE  
MONTH OF DECEMBER, 1910.**

**REPORT OF THE REGISTRAR-GENERAL.**

THIS report deals with the Vital Statistics of the 31 principal towns in the Island proclaimed under sections 31 to 36 of the Ordinance No. 1 of 1895.

**Births.**

2. The births registered in the 31 towns during the month numbered 1,257 (604 males and 653 females), and were equal to an annual rate of 29·68 per 1,000, against 32·35 during the preceding month, 30·10 in the corresponding month of last year, and 29·77 the monthly average for the thirty-six months, July, 1907, to June, 1910. Of the towns (excluding Vavuniya and Lunugala, which have a population under 1,000), the highest birth-rate was in Tangalle (65·03, average 34·75), and the lowest in Hatton and Dikoya (8·87, average 15·31).

3. In the city of Colombo\* the births numbered 459 (214 males and 245 females), and were equal to an annual rate of 27·88 per 1,000, against 31·51 in the preceding month, 26·89 in the corresponding month of last year, and 25·09 the monthly average. Of the wards (omitting Fort and Galle Face and the Pettah, which contain a population mainly floating), the highest birth-rate was in Slave Island (34·08, average 24·37), and the lowest in San Sebastian (19·47, average 21·73).

**Deaths.**

4. The deaths registered in the 31 towns during the month numbered 1,554 (818 males and 736 females), and were equal to an annual rate of 29·64 per 1,000, against 28·59 during the preceding month, 29·75 in the corresponding month of last year, and 30·64 the monthly average. Excluding Vavuniya and Lunugala, the highest death-rate was in Matale (65·04, average 40·34), and the lowest in Nuwara Eliya (11·92, average 14·28).

5. In the city of Colombo\* the deaths registered numbered 559 (298 males and 261 females), and were equal to an annual rate† of 32·85 per 1,000, against 32·27 during the preceding month, 33·28 in the corresponding month of last year, and 32·67 the monthly average. The health of the city was almost normal. Omitting the Fort and Galle Face Ward and the Pettah Ward, the lowest death-rate was in Kollupitiya (18·14, average 19·21), and the highest in New Bazaar (33·42, average 29·16). Judged by the infantile mortality, which is a better test, St. Paul's Ward was the least healthy (see paragraph 7 *infra*).

**Infantile Mortality.**

6. The infantile mortality of the 31 towns was equal to a rate of 278 per 1,000 births registered, against 247 in the preceding month, 287 in the corresponding month of last year, and 252 the monthly average. In the towns having an estimated population of 5,000 or more, the infantile mortality ranged from 536 in Jaffna (average 255), 474 in Matale (average 238), to 166 in Matara (average 169) and 68 in Kalutara (average 173). The deaths of infants in Jaffna numbered 44, or nearly half the deaths at all ages (106), and included 16 from *Debility* and *Premature Birth* and 12 from *Bronchitis*.

7. The infantile mortality in the city of Colombo was 316 per 1,000 births registered, against 277 in the previous month, 374 in the corresponding month of last year, and 319 the monthly average, and ranged from 619 in St. Paul's (average 402) to 216 in Kollupitiya (average 278).

**Causes of Death.**

8. *Infants.*—Out of the 1,554 deaths from all causes at all ages in the 31 towns, 350 were among infants under one year. Of these, the chief causes were 94 *Convulsions* (including 41 in Colombo, 9 in Moratuwa, 6 in Batticaloa, 5 in Kandy); 66 *Debility* (28 in Colombo, 12 in Jaffna, 6 in Matale); 41 *Premature Birth* (8 in Colombo, 6 in Galle, 5 in Moratuwa, 4 each in Jaffna and Trincomalee); 34 *Tetanus* (17 in Colombo, 13 in Galle, 4 in Jaffna); 24 *Bronchitis* (12 in Jaffna, 9 in Colombo); 19 *Pneumonia* (8 in Colombo, 4 in Galle); 14 *Diarrhoea* (8 in Colombo).

\* Consequent on the extension of the limits of the Colombo Municipality in February, 1910, by adding about 49 acres to Kotahena Ward, 531 to Maradana Ward, and 1,013 to Kollupitiya Ward, it became necessary to alter the limits of these registration divisions to make them co-terminous with the Municipal divisions, and this was done with effect from October 1, 1910, by Proclamation of September 13, 1910. The population of the town was increased but slightly, as the added parts are not populous. An additional Registrar has from October 1 been appointed to Kollupitiya Ward, owing to the large area of the ward as enlarged, the ward being divided into two registration divisions, north and south.

† The city-rate is worked out independently of the ward-rates and on a different basis of population, and takes into account hospital events, &c., not assignable to wards.

9. In the city of Colombo, out of the 559 deaths from all causes at all ages, 145 were among infants under one year. Of these, the chief causes were 41 *Convulsions* (18 in Maradana exclusive of hospitals, 8 in St. Paul's, 7 in Kotahena); 28 *Debility* (8 in St. Paul's, 4 each in New Bazaar and Maradana hospitals, and 3 each in Kotahena, Maradana exclusive of hospitals, and Slave Island); 17 *Tetanus* (5 each in St. Paul's and New-Bazaar, 4 in Kotahena); 9 *Bronchitis* (2 each in St. Paul's, New Bazaar, and Maradana exclusive of hospitals); 8 *Premature Birth* (5 in Kotahena); 8 *Diarrhoea* (3 in St. Paul's, 2 each in New Bazaar and Maradana exclusive of hospitals); 8 *Pneumonia* (2 each in Slave Island and Kollupitiya).

10. General Mortality (One Year and over).—Out of the 1,204 deaths of persons one year and over in age in the 31 towns, there were 164 from *Diarrhoea* (59 in Ratnapura, 16 in Kandy, 15 in Colombo, 14 in Matale); 129 from *Pneumonia* (41 in Colombo, 14 in Moratuwa, 11 in Kurunegala, 8 in Jaffna, 7 in Galle); 105 from *Phthisis* (63 in Colombo, 12 in Galle, 6 in Kandy); 90 from *Dysentery* (24 in Colombo, 11 in Ratnapura, 8 in Badulla, 6 in Trincomalee, 5 each in Kandy and Jaffna); 57 from *Dochmias Duodenalis* or *Anchylostomias* (14 in Matale, 11 in Kandy, 9 in Colombo, 4 each in Panadure, Gampola, and Kegalla); 37 from *Enteric Fever* (22 in Colombo, 7 in Moratuwa, 3 in Kandy); 36 from *Malarial Cachexia* (7 each in Moratuwa and Badulla, 4 in Ratnapura, 3 each in Jaffna and Batticaloa); 23 from *Recurrent Fever* (4 in Negombo, 3 each in Colombo and Tangalla); 22 from *Puerperal Fever* (10 in Colombo); 21 from *Bright's Disease* and *Nephritis* (7 in Colombo).

11. The highest mortality in the city of Colombo was from *Phthisis* (15 per cent. of all deaths one year and over), followed by *Pneumonia* (9 per cent.), *Dysentery* (6 per cent.), *Enteric Fever* (5 per cent.), and *Diarrhoea* (4 per cent.). Out of the 106 deaths from *Phthisis* in all towns at all ages, 64 occurred in Colombo. This and *Pneumonia* were responsible for 111 deaths at all ages in the city, or nearly 20 per cent. of the deaths from all causes in it.

12. Taking all the towns together, *Diarrhoea* and *Dysentery* contributed the highest mortality (17 per cent.), followed by *Bronchitis* and *Pneumonia* (12 per cent.), *Infantile Convulsions* (nearly 7 per cent.), and *Phthisis* (6 per cent.).

#### Meteorology.

13. *Rainfall*.—The rainfall during the month was heaviest in Batticaloa (21.30 inches), and ranged from 17.87 inches (the next highest) to 10.68 inches in Badulla, Trincomalee, Nuwara Eliya, Kandy, Matale, and Gampola. Colombo and Galle recorded 3.37 and 3.34 inches respectively. The least rainfall was recorded in Mannar (3.06 inches).

14. *Temperature*.—The mean temperature varied from 58.5° in Nuwara Eliya to 79.0° in Ratnapura, and was 75.8° in Colombo, 73.6° in Kandy, and 70.0° in Badulla.
