HENRY McCALLUM.

WHEREAS by section 28 of "The Courts Ordinance, 1889," it is amongst other things enacted that Criminal Sessions of the Supreme Court shall be holden by one of the Judges thereof, or by a Commissioner of Assize duly appointed under the provisions of the said Ordinance, for each of the Circuits into which the Island is divided, for the hearing, trying, and determining all prosecutions which shall be commenced against any person for or in respect of any crime or offence or alleged crime or offence—

For the Southern Circuit twice at least in each year at Galle and such other places in such Circuit as the Governor, after previous consultation with the Judges, shall appoint, such Sessions commencing at Galle in the month of April and in the month of September in every year:

And whereas it appears to Us expedient to order that a Criminal Sessions shall be holden, on the day hereinafter mentioned, at Tangalla, a place included within the said Southern Circuit :

Now therefore know Ye that We, the Governor, for sufficient reasons to Us appearing, and after previous consultation with the Judges of the Supreme Court, do order and appoint that a Criminal Sessions of the Supreme Court shall be holden at Tangalla, in the said Southern Circuit, on or about Monday, June 5, 1911.

3 A. The stalls of the Nuwara Eliya markets shall not be opened each day before 6 A.M.

Revised Regulations for the Administration of a Grant in Aid in providing Equipment in Science Teaching.

UNDER certain conditions the Public Instruction Department will assist managers with a grant towards the provision of appliances necessary for science teaching.

2. (a) Science teaching includes (1) class lessons, with experiments performed by the teacher, and (2) laboratory work, when the experiments are performed by the pupils themselves.

(b) A class lesson should be of one hour's duration, and a practical class of not less than 1½ hours.

(c) A practical class must not contain more than 25 pupils, unless there are two qualified teachers present, when it may be increased to 40.

(d) Pupils should not, as a rule, be allowed to do laboratory work till they have received a fair grounding in elementary algebra.

3. The grant will only be allowed in a school in which there is a laboratory which has been approved by the Department, and in which one or more classes are doing regular laboratory work, in addition to the class lessons. For the present the subjects for which aid may be given will be—

For boys' schools experimental science, chemistry, and physics.

For girls' schools experimental science.

4. A competent teacher with special qualifications must be employed and must be in charge of the appliances. The following will be accepted as a qualification:—

(a) For chemistry and physics, the Intermediate Examination in Arts or Science of the University of London, provided that the subjects concerned were passed.

(b) An equivalent qualification of the same standard as the above may be accepted, provided that it furnishes proof of a knowledge of the practical part of the subject.

(c) A teacher qualified in chemistry or physics will be considered as qualified in elementary experimental science.

(d) A certificate showing that the student has attended a course of lectures and practical work at the Technical College and has passed satisfactorily an examination at the end of it.

5. The grant made under these regulations must be used solely for the provision of appliances for teaching the above subjects, and must be supplemented by the managers by an amount not less than that granted by the Department. The grant to one school will not ordinarily exceed Rs. 300 in any year. This amount may be increased to Rs. 500, if the reports show that—

- (a) A specially well-qualified staff is employed.
- (b) The number of pupils receiving elementary laboratory instruction is considerable.
- (c) The work is being carried on in a very efficient manner.

It should be distinctly understood that the object of the grant is to assist the teaching of elementary science to a considerable number of pupils as a regular school subject, and not to provide expensive apparatus for teaching advanced science to a few exceptional pupils.

6. Managers applying for a grant must state—

- (a) The name of the science master or masters and their qualifications.
- (b) The total number of pupils in the school and the number to whom science is taught.
- (c) The time table of the science classes with the number of pupils in each class.
- (d) The sum for which application is made.
- (e) A list of the articles which it is proposed to purchase with the aid of the grant.
- (f) The amount by which the grant will be supplemented by the manager.
- (g) Any application after the first must be accompanied by the receipted bills or invoices or other documents showing the actual expenditure of the previous grant, and of the amount by which the manager has supplemented it.

7. The appliances must be open to inspection by the Department at all times, and managers must provide the necessary rooms, furniture, &c., for the proper use and preservation of the same.

8. It must be understood that the grant will only be awarded to schools in which the Department is satisfied that efficient work is going on. Managers must not rely on the continuity of the grant unless the work done is shown by inspection to be satisfactory.

CEYLON GOVERNMENT RAILWAY.

Despatch of Explosives by Railway under the Terms and Conditions laid down in Paragraph 46 of the Rules and Rates for the Conveyance of Goods Traffic, published in the "Ceylon Government Gazette" of October 11, 1907.

It is hereby notified that on and after Monday, May 1, 1911, explosives will be accepted only on the following days at the Colombo Goods Shed for despatch:—

Class.

A ..	Gunpowder and blasting powder ..	Only on Mondays
B ..	Nitrate mixtures ..	Only on Wednesdays
C ..	Blasting gelatine, cordite, dynamite, gelnite, guncotton, potentite, tonite, and other nitro compounds and chlorate mixtures ..	Only on Wednesdays
D ..	Ammunition of all kinds, including safety cartridges, crackers, detonators, fireworks, fog signals, fuses, matches, and percussion caps ..	Only on Tuesdays
E ..	Inflammable liquids and vapours of all kinds, such as benzene, benzole, benzoline, ether, fusel oil, kerosine, methylated spirit, motor car spirit, naphtha, paraffin, petrol, petroleum, turpentine (rubber solutions composed of rubber and naphtha), spirits of turpentine, and spirits of wine ..	On Tuesdays and Thursdays
F ..	Dangerous, corrosive, and poisonous chemicals, such as carbide of calcium, carbolic acid, corrosive acids (hydrochloric, muriatic, nitric, and sulphuric), fluoric acid, gas (compressed), oil of vitriol ..	On Tuesdays and Thursdays

In the case of explosives and dangerous goods for stations beyond Anuradhapura—

Articles in Class A will be accepted only on the first Monday of each month.

Articles in Classes B and C only on the first Wednesday of each month.

Articles in Class D only on the first Tuesday of each month.

Articles in Classes E and F only on the first and third Tuesdays of each month.

Articles in A, B, C, and D may be conveyed in gunpowder vans only.

Articles in A may not be conveyed in the same powder van with explosives of any other class or with goods of any other description.

Articles in B and C may be conveyed in the same powder van but in separate compartments, and on no account may goods of any other description be loaded with them.

Articles in Class D may not be conveyed in the same powder van with explosives of any other class or with goods of any other description.

Articles in Classes E and F may be conveyed in ordinary lime wagons, but must never be loaded in the same wagon with any other goods, carbide of calcium excepted (*vide* special regulations).

In the case of naphtha, benzene, benzole, and benzoline, they must be conveyed in the receptacles laid down for petrol.

When forwarding explosives for transport by rail, the name of the article and the class to which it belongs under the above classification must be distinctly stated on the special "Dangerous Articles Consignment Note" accompanying the goods.

Consignees must be present to meet the train conveying the explosives, and senders should advise them in time to permit of their doing so.

Explosives cannot be unloaded *en route*, except for the purpose of direct delivery to consignees, and any consignee failing to be present to take delivery will be charged Rs. 4 for over-carriage and extra services entailed thereupon.

In addition to the above arrangements, every endeavour will be made to meet special and urgent requirements when consignors give 48 hours' notice, and are prepared to pay for special accommodation as laid down in rule 46, clauses (a) and (b), of the Goods Regulations.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended April 29, 1911.

Births.—The total births registered were 94 (5 Europeans, 8 Burghers, 50 Sinhalese, 12 Tamils, 10 Moors, 7 Malays, and 2 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on January 1, 1911, viz., 189,423) was 25·9, as against 29·4 in the preceding week, 16·6 in the corresponding week of last year, and 25·6 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 107 (5 Europeans, 5 Burghers, 43 Sinhalese, 32 Tamils, 13 Moors, 4 Malays, and 5 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 29·4, as against 30·6 in the previous week, 19·6 in the corresponding week of last year, and 31·2 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 107 total deaths, 24 were of infants under one year of age, as against 25 in the preceding week, 15 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 27 the average for last year.

Still Births.—The number of still births registered during the week was 8.

Selected Causes of Death.—Twenty deaths were registered from *Pneumonia* as in the previous week (against 12 the weekly average for last year), of which 6 were in Kotahena, 4 in Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), 2 each in Pettah, St. Paul's, Slave Island, and Kollupitiya North, and 1 each in New Bazaar and Maradana hospitals. Three deaths were registered from *Bronchitis*.

2. Eleven deaths were registered from *Phthisis* (against 18 in the previous week and 13 the weekly average for last year), of which 3 were in Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), 2 in St. Paul's, and 1 each in San Sebastian, Kotahena, New Bazaar, Maradana hospitals, Slave Island, and Kollupitiya North.

3. Ten deaths were registered from *Infantile Convulsions*, 6 from *Debility* (4 infants), 5 from *Enteritis*, 5 from *Worms* (2 infants), 4 from *Diarrhœa* (1 infant), 3 from *Septicœmia*, 3 from *Nephritis*, 2 each from *Puerperal Fever*, *Diabetes Mellitus*, *Asthma*, and *Bright's Disease*, and 23 from *Other Causes*.

4. Six deaths were registered from *Enteric Fever* (against 10 in the previous week and 5 the weekly average for last year), of which 3 were in Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), and 1 each in San Sebastian, St. Paul's, and Kotahena. There were 9 cases reported during the week, against 20 in the previous week.

5. Eleven cases of *Measles* were reported, against 4 in the previous week; and 38 of *Chickenpox*, against 37 in the previous week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 84·0°, against 84·3° in the preceding week and 82·3° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29·969 in., against 29·978 in. in the preceding week and 29·937 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 0·04 in., against 0·08 in. in the preceding week and 0·15 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.
