The examination in the Criminal Procedure Code prescribed under the Minute of March 26, 1900, for officers in the Fourth Class of the Civil Service, will also be held on July 18, 1911, as well as at the Kandy Kachcheri.

It is also hereby notified that candidates will be given the option of using Codes in the examination in the Criminal Procedure Code and the Penal Code; they must, however, state when sending in their names what their decision is, as the character of the papers set for those who use Codes and those who do not will be different.

The examination for officers in the Police Department, and the *vidæ voce* examination in the native languages for officers in the Public Works Department, the Irrigation Department, the Forest Department, and the Railway Department, will be held at the same time and place.

Candidates are required to send in their names not later than June 30, 1911.

Gentlemen in the Civil Service should state in their applications whether they are presenting themselves for the first or second examination, and whether they intend taking up Sinhalese or Tamil, and whether they wish to have the option of using Codes.

The hours of examination will be from 10.30 A.M. to 1.30 P.M. and from 2 P.M. to 5 P.M., exclusive of the *vidæ voce* examinations, which will be specially arranged for.

SIR,—I HAVE the honour to inform you that His Majesty the King has decided that the Royal Standard, which is the personal flag of the Sovereign, is not in future to be flown, except when and where His Majesty is personally present.

2. Accordingly, Colonial Regulation No. 148, which requires the Royal Standard to be flown at Government House on the King's Birthday and on the days of His Majesty's Accession and Coronation, has been cancelled, and Colonial Regulation No. 149 will in future run as follows:—

“The Union Flag, without any badge, shall be flown at Government House daily from sunrise to sunset.”

"THE SMALL TOWNS SANITARY ORDINANCES, 1892 to 1909."

IT is hereby notified that the Sanitary Board of Nuwara Eliya, in the Central Province, has, in exercise of the powers vested in it by sub-section (2) of section 9 E of the above-mentioned Ordinance, and with the approval of His Excellency the Governor in Executive Council, made the regulations set forth in the schedule hereto, and the same shall come into operation from the date hereof.

REGULATIONS.

Eating-houses and Tea or Coffee Boutiques.

1. All utensils, furniture, and other requisites used in or belonging to any eating-house or tea or coffee boutique shall always be kept clean.
2. The walls of all eating-houses and tea or coffee boutiques shall be plastered and limewashed, and the rooms well ventilated and lighted.
3. All refuse and dirt in and about the premises of an eating-house or tea or coffee boutique shall be removed twice daily.
4. No person suffering from any loathsome, contagious, or infectious disease, or who has recently been in attendance on any such person, or who is unwashed or otherwise unclean, shall be employed in any eating-house or tea or coffee boutique.
5. The sugar used in such places shall be kept in glass-stoppered, wide-mouthed bottles.
6. All cakes, sweetmeats, &c., exposed for sale shall be kept in properly constructed glass cases free from flies. No food stuff shall be exposed to the contamination of flies. The glass cases used shall be kept scrupulously clean.
7. No waste tea or coffee or milk and no remnants of food or cooking waste shall be thrown on the ground, but the same shall be collected in a proper receptacle and removed daily.
8. These by-laws shall be framed and hung up in a prominent place in every such eating-house and tea or coffee boutique.

Bakeries.

1. Every bakery shall be well ventilated and well lighted, and the walls thereof shall be plastered and whitewashed at least four times a year, the floor cemented and sufficient drainage provided. There shall be a ceiling provided to the room in which dough is kneaded.
2. No bakery shall be within 30 feet of any cesspit, latrine, or sewer, nor in a position where bad odours wafted therefrom shall reach it.
3. No room used as a bakery shall be used as a dwelling place or for any other purpose whatsoever.
4. All utensils, furniture, and other requisites used in or belonging to a bakery shall be kept clean.
5. The flour, water, and other materials used in the manufacture of bread shall be good and wholesome. The flour shall be kept on a raised shelf or platform at least 3 feet above the ground.
6. All refuse and dirt in and about the premises of a bakery shall be removed at least once a day, and the drains well flushed.
7. No person suffering from any loathsome, contagious, or infectious disease, or who has recently been in attendance on any such person, or who is unwashed or otherwise unclean, shall be employed in a bakery. The person or persons engaged in kneading the dough or flour shall wear white aprons covering the chest and body.
8. Every bakery and the management and conduct of the business shall be at all times open and subject to inspection and examination by the Assistant Government Agent, or by any person acting under his authority.
9. Every bakery shall be licensed under the hand of the Assistant Government Agent, the licenses to remain in force till December 31 of the year in which the license is granted. The Assistant Government Agent shall have power to revoke any such license for a breach of any of these by-laws. All existing bakeries must take out a similar license within one month of the publication of these by-laws.
10. These by-laws shall be framed and hung up in a prominent place in every bakery.

Butchers' Stalls.

1. Every butcher's stall shall be well ventilated and well lighted, the walls thereof shall be plastered and whitewashed at least four times a year, and the floor cemented and sufficient drainage provided.
2. Every room in which meat is kept shall be kept scrupulously clean.
3. Every table used in a butcher's stall shall be zinc covered. Such tables and the chopping block and all implements shall be kept scrupulously clean. They shall be washed with water and scrubbed with a hard clean brush immediately after use. All hooks for hanging meat shall be polished and free from rust.
4. Refuse and unsaleable material, offal, &c., if not immediately removed, shall be kept in a zinc-lined box with perforated zinc cover, the perforation to be of such size as to prevent flies entering.
5. All refuse and dirt in and about the premises of a butcher's stall shall be removed at least once a day, and the drains well flushed.
6. No person suffering from any loathsome, contagious, or infectious disease, or who has recently been in attendance on any such person, or who is unwashed or otherwise unclean, shall be employed in a butcher's stall.
7. Every butcher shall provide himself with a movable receptacle of metal for waste material.

8. Every butcher's stall and the management and conduct of the business shall be at all times open and subject to inspection and examination by the Assistant Government Agent, or by any person acting under his authority.

9. Every butcher's stall shall be licensed under the hand of the Assistant Government Agent, the license to remain in force till December 31 of the year in which the license is granted. The Assistant Government Agent shall have power to revoke any such license for a breach of any of these by-laws. All existing butchers' stalls must take out a similar license within one month of the publication of these by-laws.

10. These by-laws shall be framed and hung up in a prominent place in every butcher's stall.

Fish Stalls.

1. Every permanent fish stall shall be well ventilated and lighted, and the walls thereof shall be plastered and whitewashed at least four times a year. The floor shall be of smooth cement having a proper fall leading to a masonry drain built in cement and cement rendered, which shall empty itself into a bucket. The drains and buckets shall be washed with disinfectant at least twice a day, and the bucket shall not be allowed to overflow. The stall shall always be kept clean and free from stains of blood and dirt.

2. Instead of the drain referred to in the last preceding rule, a fishmonger may use a large zinc sheet so bent as to have a fall towards its centre, and so arranged that the washing from this sheet of zinc shall fall into the bucket.

3. Every table used in a fish stall shall be zinc covered. Such table and the chopping block shall be kept scrupulously clean. They shall be washed with water and scrubbed with a hard clean brush immediately after use. All hooks for hanging fish shall be polished and free from rust.

4. Fish baskets shall be washed daily and kept exposed to sun and air on a shelf and not be kept inside the fish shop.

5. Every fish stall holder shall provide himself with a movable receptacle of metal for waste material.

6. All refuse and dirt in and about the premises of a fish stall shall be removed at least once a day, and the drains well flushed.

7. No person suffering from any loathsome, contagious, or infectious disease, or who has recently been in attendance on any such person, or who is unwashed or otherwise unclean, shall be employed in a fish stall.

8. Every fish stall and the management and conduct of the business shall be at all times open and subject to the inspection and examination by the Assistant Government Agent, or by any person acting under his authority.

9. Every fish stall shall be licensed under the hand of the Assistant Government Agent, the license to remain in force till December 31 of the year in which the license is granted. The Assistant Government Agent shall have power to revoke any such license for a breach of any of these by-laws. All existing fish stalls must take out a similar license within one month of the publication of these by-laws.

10. These by-laws shall be framed and hung up in a prominent place in every fish stall.

Keeping of Animals.

No horse, ass, mule, cattle, sheep, goat, or pig shall be housed in a dwelling-house, or in the verandah of dwelling-house, or in any shed or maduwa, which is part of, or attached to, a dwelling-house.

General.

The Assistant Government Agent or any officer acting under his authority may at all times order—

- (a) That all or any part of any house, dwelling, church, place of assembly, or other building be forthwith internally or externally limewashed or provided with sufficient ventilation or disinfected or otherwise clean.
- (b) That privies shall be constructed where it is desirable that they should exist.
- (c) That cesspits or offensive drains shall be filled up by the owners of the land on which they are situated and that others be opened.
- (d) That compounds shall be cleansed and rubbish in them shall be burned.
- (e) That fences for private premises shall be kept down to a maximum height of 6 feet, and that all overhanging branches and foliage shall be removed, and every owner and occupier of such premises so ordered shall forthwith comply with such directions.
- (f) That hollow places in compounds or close to dwelling-houses shall be filled up or drained so that water may not stagnate in them.

THE RABIES ORDINANCE, No. 7 OF 1893.

REGULATIONS REFERRED TO.

1. Every owner of a dog shall cause such dog to be muzzled or led by a chain when in any public road or place. The muzzle shall be so constructed as to render it impossible for the dog, while wearing the same, to bite any person or animal, but not so as to prevent the dog from breathing freely or lapping water.

2. A dog shall not be considered effectually controlled unless muzzled as above, or led by some competent person, by means of a chain or collar, the latter to be securely fastened to the dog's neck.

3. Any dog not effectually controlled found in any public road or place may be (a) destroyed by any person specially authorized thereto by the local authority, or (b) seized by any police officer or any person duly appointed for the purpose by the local authority. If seized a dog shall be removed to such place as may be appointed, there to be dealt with in the following manner:—

(i.) If the dog is affected with, or suspected of, rabies, it shall forthwith be slaughtered.

(ii.) If the dog is not affected with, or suspected of, rabies, it shall be detained in any place appointed. Provided that where the dog is registered, and the owner or person having charge of a dog so detained is known, the local authority, or some person duly authorized by him, shall forthwith cause notice to be given to such owner or person of the fact of the dog having been so seized and detained, and the dog shall, without prejudice to the recovery of any penalty for the breach of these regulations, be given up to such owner or person on payment of the reasonable expenses of detention.

(iii.) If the dog so seized and detained shall not have been claimed by such owner or person within six hours after the seizure, the local authority shall cause the dog to be slaughtered, or otherwise disposed of in such manner as the local authority may deem expedient.

(iv.) No dog which is not wearing the special badge or token issued by the proper authority under the Dog Registration Ordinance, No. 25 of 1901, shall be deemed to be registered for the purposes of these rules.

4. The owner of any dog which shall have been seized and detained under these regulations shall be liable to pay to the local authority the following charge:—For detention for each day or part of a day, Re. 1; and such charge shall be recoverable, if the dog is not affected with, or suspected of, rabies, by the sale thereof, unless the said charge shall have been paid before sale by the owner or person in charge of the dog, otherwise the charge shall be recoverable in the manner provided by section 1 of Ordinance No. 6 of 1873 in respect to the order in which the property of public defaulters may be seized and sold.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended June 3, 1911.

Births.—The total births registered were 92 (0 Europeans, 12 Burghers, 51 Sinhalese, 9 Tamils, 13 Moors, 6 Malays, and 1 Other). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the population as enumerated at the Census on March 10, 1911, viz., 211,287) was 22.7, as against 21.2 in the preceding week, 29.8 in the corresponding week of last year, and 25.6 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 128 (1 European, 9 Burghers, 56 Sinhalese, 31 Tamils, 24 Moors, 4 Malays, and 3 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 31.6, as against 30.8 in the previous week, 34.0 in the corresponding week of last year, and 31.2 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 128 total deaths, 33 were of infants under one year of age, as against 29 in the preceding week, 36 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 27 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 5.

Selected Causes of Death.—As many as 20 deaths were registered from *Pneumonia*, in addition to 6 from *Bronchitis* (against 15 from *Pneumonia* in the previous week and 12 the weekly average for last year). Of the deaths from *Pneumonia*, 5 each were in Kotahena, New Bazaar, and Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), 2 each in St. Paul's and Maradana hospitals, and in 1 Pettah.

2. Eight deaths were registered from *Phthisis* (against 13 in the previous week and the weekly average for last year), of which 3 were in Maradana hospitals, 2 each in St. Paul's and Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), and 1 in Kotahena.

3. Seven deaths were registered from *Enteric Fever*, as in the previous week (against 5 the weekly average for last year), of which 3 were in New Bazaar, and 1 each in Pettah, St. Paul's, Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), and Kollupitiya South. There were 18 cases reported during the week, against 14 in the previous week.

4. Twelve deaths were registered from *Enteritis* (including 3 infants), 11 *Debility* (5 infants), 8 *Infantile Convulsions*, 6 *Diarrhoea* (5 infants), 4 *Dysentery*, 3 *Tetanus* (2 infants), 3 *Septicæmia*, 3 *Inflammation of the Brain*, 3 *Disease of the Valves of the Heart*, 2 *Erysipelas*, 2 *Old Age*, and 23 from *Other Causes*.

5. One death was registered from *Measles*, a Sinhalese in the Infectious Diseases Hospital, Kanatta. There were 9 cases of *Measles* reported during the week, against 10 in the previous week; and 13 of *Chickenpox*, against 21 in the previous week.

6. Six deaths were registered from *Cholera*, of which 3 occurred in the Infectious Diseases Hospital and 1 each in Kotahena, Kollupitiya South, and the General Hospital. These were cases due to infection from the Ragama Cooly Camp.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 82.6°, as in the preceding week, against 84.5° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.866 in., against 29.861 in. in the preceding week and 29.878 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 1.68 in., against 3.49 in. in the preceding week and 0.32 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.
