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### VITAL STATISTICS OF TOWNS IN CEYLON IN THE MONTH OF MARCH, 1911.

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# REPORT OF THE REGISTRAR-GENERAL.

This report deals with the Vital Statistics of the 37 principal towns in the Island proclaimed under sections 31 to 36 of the Ordinance No. 1 of 1895.

#### Births. 15.9

The births registered in the 31 towns during the month numbered 1,461 (757 males and 704 females), and 2. were equal to an annual rate of 33.93 per 1,000, against 35.29 during the preceding month, 29.03 in the corresponding. month of last year, and 29 60 the monthly average for the forty-two months, July, 1907, to December, 1910. In the town of Lunugala there were no births registered. Of the other towns (excluding Vavuniya, which has a population under 1,000), the highest birth-rate was in Mullaittivu (57.00, average 34.40), and the lowest in Batticaloa (15.51, average 31.81).

In the city of Colombo\* the births numbered 481 (236 males and 245 females), and were equal to an annual  $25 \cdot 23$  the monthly average. Of the wards (omitting Fort and Galle Face and the Pettah, which contain a population mainly floating), the highest birth-rate was in Kotahena (30.48, average 22.63), and the lowest in St. Paul's (15.34, average 17.43).

## Deaths.

4. The deaths registered in the 31 towns during the month numbered 1.412 (802 males and 610 females), and were equal to an annual rate of 26.84 per 1,000, against 30.83 during the preceding month, 24.05 in the corresponding month of last year, and 30.28 the monthly average. In the towns of Lunugala and Kegalla there were no deaths of residents, the 16 and 12 deaths which occurred respectively in those towns being of non-residents. Of the other towns (excluding Vavuniya), the highest death-rate was in Mullaittivu (115.89, average 49.02), and the lowest in Panadure (11.20, average 27.74). Nuwara Eliya recorded the next lowest (12.80, average 13.71).

5. In the city of Colombo\* the deaths registered numbered 515 (308 males and 207 females), and were equal to an annual rate† of 29.31 per 1,000, against 33.62 during the preceding month, 23.06 in the corresponding month of last year, and 32.35 the monthly average. Omitting Fort and Galle Face Ward and the Pettah Ward, the lowest death-rate was in Kollupitiya (18.07, average 19.64), and the highest in New Bazaar (28.35 average 28.64).

## Infantile Mortality.

6. The infantile mortality of the 31 towns was equal to a rate of 188 per 1,000 births registered, against 232 in the preceding month, 215 in the corresponding month of last year, and 254 the monthly average. In the towns having an estimated population of 5,000 or more, the infantile mortality ranged from 357 in Batticaloa (average 335), 269 in Jaffna (average 270), 231 in Anuradhapura (average 410), to 99 in Moratuwa (average 156), 69 in Weligama (average 99), and 37 in Matale (average 251).

The infantile mortality in the city of Colombo was 227 per 1,000 births registered, against 247 in the previous month, 260 in the corresponding month of last year, and 317 the monthly average, and ranged from 478 in New Bazaar (average 388) to 115 in Kollupitiya (average 275).

# Causes of Death.

8. Infants.—Out of the 1,412 deaths from all causes at all ages in the 31 towns, 275 were among infants under ear. Of these, the chief causes were 80 Convulsions (including 32 in Colombo, 7 in Kandy, 5 each in Jaffna, one year. Matara, and Batticaloa, 4 in Moratuwa); 49 Debility (16 in Colombo, 8 in Kandy, 7 in Jaffna); 35 Premature Birth (5 each in Colombo, Moratuwa, and Jaffna, 4 in Galle); 26 Tetanus (10 in Colombo, 8 in Galle, and 5 in Jaffna); 22 Pneumonia (14 in Colombo, 4 in Galle); 19 Bronchitis (11 in Colombo, 4 in Jaffna); 12 Diarrheea (5 in Colombo) 3 in Matara).

\* Consequent on the extension of the limits of the Colombo Municipality in February, 1910, by adding about 49 acres to Kotahena Ward, 531 to Maradana Ward, and 1,013 to Kollupitiya Ward, it became necessary to alter the limits of these registra-tion divisions to make them co-terminous with the Municipal divisions, and this was done with effect from October 1, 1910, by Proclamation of September 13, 1910. The population of the town was increased but slightly, as the added parts are not populous. An additional Registrar has from October 1 been appointed to Kollupitiya Ward, owing to the large area of the ward as enlarged, the ward heing divided into two registration divisions, north and south. † The city-rate is worked out independently of the ward-rates and on a different basis of population, and takes into account hereital avents for not assignable to wards.

account hospital events, &c., not assignable to wards.

9. In the city of Colombo, out of the 515 deaths from all causes at all ages, 109 were among infants under one year. Of these, the chief causes were 32 *Convulsions* (11 in Maradana exclusive of hospitals, 8 in New Bazaar, 4 in St. Paul's, 3 in Kotahena); 16 *Debility* (6 in Kotahena, 3 each in New Bazaar and Slave Island); 14 *Pneumonia* (7 in Maradana exclusive of hospitals, 3 in New Bazaar, 2 in Kotahena); 11 *Bronchitis* (5 in St. Paul's, 2 each in San Sebastian and New Bazaar); 10 *Tetanus* (5 in Kotahena, 3 in New Bazaar); 5 *Diarrhea* (3 in Kotahena).

10. General Mortality (One Year and over).—Out of the 1,137 deaths of persons one year and over in age in the 31 towns, there were 169 from *Pneumonia* (71 in Colombo, 9 each in Moratuwa and Kurunegala, 7 in Jaffna, 6 each in Negombo, Kandy, and Matale, 5 each in Kalutara, Mannar, and Galle); 131 from *Diarrhea* (24 in Ratnapura, 16 in Colombo, 12 in Nawalapitiya, 11 in Galle, 9 in Kandy, 8 in "Hatton and Dikoya," 6 in Matale, 5 in Matara); 93 from *Phithisis* (56 in Colombo; 10 in Galle, 7 in Moratuwa, 5 in Kandy); 68 from *Dysentery* (14 in Ratnapura, 10 in Badulla, 7 in Colombo); 50 from *Enteritis* (33 in Colombo, 11 in Badulla); 46 from *Enteric Fever* (34 in Colombo, 8 in Moratuwa); 45 from *Dochmius Duodenalis* or *Anchylostomiasis* (7 each in "Hatton and Dikoya" and Matale, 6 in Colombo, 5 in Kurunegala); 41 from *Remittent Fever* (7 in Colombo, 6 in Trincomalee, 5 in Jaffna); 36 from *Malarial Cachexia* (9 in Ratnapura); 24 from *Bronchitis* (16 in Colombo); 22 from *Bright's Disease* and *Nephritis* (7 in Colombo, 3 each in Galle and Badulla).

11. The highest mortality in the city of Colombo was from *Pneumonia* (17 per cent. of all deaths one year and over), followed by *Phthisis* (14 per cent.), *Enteric Fever* (8 per cent.), *Enteritis* (8 per cent.). Out of the 93 deaths from *Phthisis* in all towns at all ages, 56 occurred in Colombo. *Phthisis* and *Pneumonia* were together responsible for 141 deaths at all ages in the city, or nearly 27 per cent. of the deaths from all causes.

12. Taking all the towns together, Bronchitis and Pneumonia contributed the highest mortality (17 per cent.), followed by Diarrhæa and Dysentery (15 per cent.), Infantile Convulsions (8 per cent.), and Phthisis (7 per cent.).

## Meteorology.

13. Rainfall.—Ratnapura records the highest rainfall (9 58 inches), followed by Galle (7 48 inches), the next highest, 6 77 inches and 6 50 inches, were in Kalutara and Kandy respectively. Colombo records 2 39 inches. In Tangalla, Hambantota, Tricomalee, Matale, Mannar, and Batticaloa the rainfall was less than one inch, while in Mullaittivu there was no rainfall at all.

14. Temperature.—The mean temperature varied from  $60.0^{\circ}$  in Nuwara Eliya, to  $83.7^{\circ}$  in Kurunegala,  $83.4^{\circ}$  in Jaffna, and  $84.9^{\circ}$  in Mannar, and was  $80.6^{\circ}$  in Colombo,  $78.2^{\circ}$  in Kandy, and  $73.1^{\circ}$  in Badulla.
