WHEREAS by "The Municipal Councils Ordinance, 1910," the Governor is empowered; with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, by Proclamation in the Government Gazette, to define for the purposes of the said Ordinance the limits of the town of Colombo, and to divide the said town into districts, and such limits or divisions from time to time by Proclamation to alter or vary:

And whereas by a Proclamation bearing date March 7, 1910, and made under the provisions of section 5 of the above-recited Ordinance, the limits of the town of Colombo and the districts into which the said town was divided were respectively defined for the purposes of the said Ordinance, and it is expedient to alter such limits and districts:

Now know Ye that We, the Officer Administering the Government of Ceylon, in exercise of the powers vested in Us by the said section of the said Ordinance, and with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby alter in manner hereinafter appearing the limits of the town of Colombo for the purposes of the said Ordinance and the districts into which the same is divided. And We do declare and ordain that from and after January 1, 1912, the limits of the said town and the districts into which the same is divided shall be as the same are set out in the schedule hereto.

SCHEDULE.

Limits of the Town of Colombo.

Bounded on the north by sea and the Kelani-ganga; east by the Kelani-ganga, by and including the St. Sebastian canal, the Weragoda-ela, a line going south in prolongation of the eastern boundary of the Base Line road reservation to the centre of the Dematagoda-ela, from thence along the centre of the Dematagoda-ela passing under the bridges on the Kandy railway, Kolonnawa and Kotte roads, to the centre of the Kelani Valley railway, and thence along the centre of the said railway to the centre of the Kirillapane canal; on the south by the centre of the Kirillapane canal as far as the Dehiwala canal, and thence along the centre of the Dehiwala canal to the sea; and on the west by the sea and harbour.

Limits of Districts or Wards.

- 1. Fort and Galle Face.—Bounded on the north by the harbour; on the east by a water-course, Lotus road, and the lake; on the south by a road leading from Slave Island railway station to the sea crossing Kollupitiya road; on the west by the sea.
- 2. Pettah Ward.—On the north by the harbour; on the east by St. John's road and 5th Cross street; on the south by lake; and on the west by Lotus road and the water-course.
- 3. St. Sebastian Ward.—On the north by Dam street and New Moor street; on the east by Kuruwe street, Hulftsdorp street, and Maradana road; on the south by St. Sebastian canal and lake; and on the west by 5th Cross street.
- 4. St Paul's Ward.—On the north by Jampettah street; on the east by Green street, Barber street, and Kuruwe street; on the south by New Moor street and Dam street; and on the west by St. John's road and the harbour.
- 5. Kotahena Ward.—On the north by the Kelani-ganga; on the east by the Kelani-ganga, by and including the St. Sebastian canal, the Weragoda-ela, and a line going south in prolongation of the eastern boundary of the Base Line road reservation: on the south by the Urugodawatta 10ad, Layard's Broadway, Barber street, Green street, Jampettah street; and on the west by the harbour and the sea.
- 6. New Bazaar Ward.—On the north by Barber street, Layard's Broadway, and Urugodawatta road; on the south by St. Sebastian canal; and on the west by 1st Division, Maradana road, Hulftsdorp street, and Kuruwe street.
- 7. Maradana Ward.—On the north by St. Sebastian canal and Urugodawatta road; on the east by Dematagoda-ela; on the south by a straight line drawn from Dematagoda-ela to the southern boundary of the Borella Convict Hospital along Ward place, Kynsey road, Norris Canal road, Regent street, Union place up to the lake (near the new park); on the west by the lake.
- 8. Slave Island Ward.—On the north by Parson's road bridge and the lake; on the east by Darley road and Union place; on the south by Turret road; and on the west by Hunupitiya cross road, the lake, the railway bridge, and Bridge street bridge. This division includes within it the lake.
- 9. Kollupitiya Ward.—On the north by a road leading from the sea to the Slave Island railway station, the lake, Alston place, Humupitiya Cross road, Turret road, Regent street, Norris Canal road, Kynsey road, Ward place, Cotta road up to the Dematagoda-ela; on the east by a portion of Dematagoda-ela; on the south by Castle street, Ruller's road along Serpentine road to Laurie's road along Wellawatta road up to the road leading to Bambalapitiya railway station, along this road as far as sea; and on the west by the sea.
- 10. Wellawatta Ward.—On the north by the approach road to the Bambalapitiva railway station along Wellawatta road up to Laurie's road along Serpentine road, up to Buller's road, Buller's road, and Castle street; on the east by Dematagoda-ela up to Kelani Valley railway along the centre of the said railway up to the Kirillapane canal; on the south by the centre of the Kirillapane canal as far as Dehiwala canal, and thence along the centre of the Dehiwala canal to the sea; and on the west by the sea.

Note.—Where a road is a common boundary between wards, then it means the centre of the road.

It shall not be lawful for any person at any time to preserve or dig up any part of the carcases of any cattle which have died in an area which is or has been infected with cattle disease, provided that the Government Agent or Assistant Government Agent may issue permits in writing to preserve the hides, horns, hoofs, or bones of healthy cattle which have been slaughtered for meat for human consumption. Every such permit shall contain the conditions under which such hides, horns, hoofs, or bones may be preserved. In cases where a permit is not granted it shall be the duty of the person in possession of such hides, horns, hoofs, bones, &c., to burn them forthwith; in default the Government Agent may cause them to be destroyed, and recover the cost of destruction from the owner.

1 (e). It shall not be lawful during the existence of rinderpest in any part of the Island, or for a period of five years after it has ceased to exist, to remove by land or sea any part of the carcases of cattle or wild animals, whether taken from an infected area or not, without a permit in writing from the Government Agent of the Province or Assistant Government Agent of the District.

CEYLON CHAMBER OF COMMERCE.

Examinations for Commercial Certificates.

ITH the object of fixing a standard for Commercial Education in Ceylon, the Chamber of Commerce will, in conjunction W with the Department of Public Instruction, hold annual examinations, on the results of which certificates will be awarded to the successful candidates. A register of successful candidates will be kept by the Chamber of Commerce, and the Chamber will in erest itself in assisting them to obtain suitable employments.

Candidates for these examinations must conform to the following regulations:—(a) They must be not under fourteen and not over twenty-one years of age on the last day of the month immediately preceding that fixed for the examination; (b) they must for eight months preceding the date of examination have been attending the Commercial Class of a school, which has previously satisfied the Director of Public Instruction as providing suitable instruction in commercial subjects.

The next examination will be held in July, 1912, and the subjects will be as follows:-

Compulsory Subjects.

- (1) Handwriting, Orthography, and Dictation.
- (2) Reading.(3) English Composition.
- (4) Arithmetic.
- Ordinary Commercial Terms.
 - (6) Précis and Indexing.

Ontional Subjects. (7) Shorthand and Typewriting.

- (8) Office Routine and Bookkeeping.
- (9) Commercial Geography and Shipping
- (10) Advanced Arithmetic.

In order to obtain a certificate, candidates must satisfy the examiners in all the compulsory subjects and in one of the three groups (7), (8), and (9). All the subjects in which a candidate passes will be noted on his certificate.

4: The approximate range of the various subjects and the standards of knowledge required in each are as follows:

Manduriting, Orthography, and Dictation.—In handwriting the chief requirements are legibility of writing, and uniformity of size and slope. The ideal business handwriting is such as that set out in Blackie's Commercial Course of Copy Books. Writing should not be angular or floresque.

The handwriting of the candidates will be tested in general by their writing in the various papers, and in particular by special tests, such as addressing envelopes, copying a draft letter, or writing from dictation. The spelling of the candidates will be judged from their general work and from a special test involving words of ordinary difficulty. In dictation the chief requirements are accuracy and correct punctuation.

Reading.—The essentials in reading are clear and distinct enunciation of each word, observation of necessary pauses according to punctuation, and faculty of making clear the meaning of each sentence. Questions will be put on the meaning

of the passage read.

English Composition.—Candidates will be tested in the following ways:—(a) Writing a letter on a given business subject, the headings of which will be supplied; (b) re-writing in proper form and in correct phraseology a badly drafted

letter; (c) correcting faulty or incorrect sentences. In this paper special attention will be paid to English Grammar.

Arithmetic.—Tots, simple and compound, long and cross. Weights and Measures. Vulgar Fractions and Decima Vulgar Fractions and Decimals. Proportion, simple and compound. Practice, simple and compound. Interest, simple and compound. Percentages.

nge. Special attention should be paid to methods of working and setting out of work.

Commercial Terms and Abbreviations.—A good knowledge of the terms and abbreviations ordinarily used in business. Lists of such terms and abbreviations may be found in almost any Manual of Commercial Correspondence, such as Ritman's or Routledge's.

Précis and Indexing.—Candidates will be required to make both a précis and an index of a series of business letters,

all relating to the same subject.

The object of a précis is to present in a consecutive narrative all the principal points of the correspondence, leaving out all unimportant details, and making the narrative as concise as possible, without sacrificing completeness and lucidity. The object of an index is to present in separate sections, chronologically arranged, a brief resumé of each letter. giving number, date, name of writer, and substance of each letter in separate columns, so as to enable the particulars of any of the letters to be obtained without turning up the original document.

Writing in shorthand from dictation at the Shorthand.—Pitman's system as set out in the Manual and Reporter. Writing in shorthand from dictation at the rate of eighty words per minute. Transcribing accurately from shorthand into longhand at the rate of ten words per

Marks will be awarded for good shorthand outlines.

Typewriting .- Typing from manuscript copy, and setting out in proper form draft letters, tabular statements, or other commercial documents. Special attention must be paid to accuracy, correct spelling, proper punctuation, and

paragraphing. Any candidate desiring to use his own machine may do so.

Office Routine .- Good knowledge of the methods in which business transactions should be entered up and treated. VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended September 23, 1911.

Births.—The total births registered were 92 (3 Europeans, 8 Burghers, 55 Sinhalese, 13 Tamils, 10 Moors, 3 Malays, and 0 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on July 1,1911, viz., 213,825, was 22·4, as against 24·4 in the preceding week, 27·1 in the corresponding week of last year, and 25·6 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 128 (0 Europeans, 3 Burghers, 58 Sinhalese, 36 Tamils, 28 Moors, 2 Malays, and 1 Other). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 31·2, as against 32·9 in the previous week, 25·2 in the corresponding week of last year, and 31·2 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 128 total deaths, 24 were of infants under one year of age, as against 21 in the preceding week, 20 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 27 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 6.

Selected Causes of Death.—Seventeen deaths were registered from Phthisis (against 8 in the previous week and 13 the weekly average for last year), of which 5 were in Maradana hospitals, 3 each in St. Paul's and Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), 2 each in Kotahena and New Bazaar, and 1 each in San Sebastian and Kollupitiya North.

- 2. Thirteen deaths were registered from *Pneumonia* (against 22 in the previous week and 12 the weekly average for last year), of which 4 were in Kotahena, 3 in Maradana (exclusive of hospitals). 2 in New Bazaar, and 1 each in Pettah, San Sebastian, St. Paul's, and Slave Island. Seven deaths were registered from *Bronchitis*.
- 3. Ten deaths were registered from Enteric Fever (against 13 in the previous week and 5 the weekly average for last year), of which 4 were in St. Paul's, 2 in New Bazaar, and 1 each in Kotahena, Maradana hospitals, Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), and Kollupitiya South. There were 30 cases reported during the week, against 31 in the previous week.
- 4. Twolve deaths were registered from Enteritis, 6 Infantile Convulsions, 6 Tetanus (5 infants), 6 Dysentery, 5 Senility, 4 Nephritis (2 infants), 3 Peritonitis, 3 Anchylostomiasis, 3 Debility (2 infants), 2 Malaria, (1 infant), 2 Worms (both infants), 2 Abdominal Tuberculosis, 2 Cerebral Hæmorrhage, 2 Softening of the Brain, 2 Puerperal Septicæmia, and 21 from Other Causes.
- 5. Five cases of Measles were reported during the week, as in the previous week; and 8 of Chickenpox, against 4 in the previous week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 82·1°, as in the preceding week, against 81·1° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29·812 in., against 29·877 in. in the preceding week and 29·939 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 0·77 in., against 0·53 in. in the preceding week and 1·35 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.
