PART I.

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VITAL STATISTICS OF TOWNS IN CEYLON IN THE MONTH OF JUNE, 1911.

REPORT OF THE REGISTRAR-GENERAL.

THIS report deals with the Vital Statistics of the 31 principal towns in the Island proclaimed under sections 31 to 36 of the Ordinance No. 1 of 1895.

Births.

2. The births registered in the 31 towns during the month numbered 1,092 (548 males and 544 females), and were equal to an annual rate of 26·20 per 1,000, against 28·31 during the preceding month, 26·64 in the corresponding month of last year, and 29·60 the monthly average for the forty-two months, July, 1907, to December, 1910. Of the towns (excluding Vavuniya, which has a population under 1,000), the highest birth-rate was in Mannar (58·32, average 40·84), and the lowest in Panadure (2·72, average 33·63).

3. In the city of Colombo* the births numbered 358 (193 males and 165 females), and were equal to an annual rate† of 22·04 per 1,000, against 24·07 in the preceding month, 23·74 in the corresponding month of last year, and 25·23 the monthly average. Of the wards (omitting Fort and Galle Face and the Pettah, which contain a population mainly floating), the highest birth-rate was in Kotahena (22·41, average 22·63), and the lowest was, as in the three previous months, in St. Paul's (10·57, average 17·43).

Deaths.

4. The deaths registered in the 31 towns during the month numbered 1,528 (852 males and 676 females), and were equal to an annual rate of 30·47 per 1,000, against 26·82 during the preceding month, 25·48 in the corresponding month of last year, and 30·28 the monthly average. Of the towns (excluding Vavuniya), the highest death-rate was in Ratnapura (124·53, average 37·45), and the lowest in Nuwara Eliya (9·92, average 13·71), followed by Panadure (11·58, average 27·74).

5. In the city of Colombo* the deaths registered numbered 603 (365 males and 238 females), and were equal to an annual rate† of 35·08 per 1,000, against 29·31 during the preceding month, 27·22 in the corresponding month of last year, and 32·35 the monthly average. Omitting Fort and Galle Face Ward and the Pettah Ward, the lowest death-rate was in Slave Island (21·25, average 26·14), and the highest in Maradana, exclusive of hospitals (30·02, average 27·69).

Infantile Mortality.

6. The infantile mortality of the 31 towns was equal to a rate of 283 per 1,000 births registered, against 246 in the preceding month, 258 in the corresponding month of last year, and 254 the monthly average. In the towns having an estimated population of 5,000 or more, the infantile mortality ranged from 667 in Anuradhapura (average 410), 394 in Batticaloa (average 335), 379 in Kandy (average 230), to 89 in Kalutara (average 162), 83 in Trincomalee (average 274), and 30 in Weligama (average 99).

7. The infantile mortality in the city of Colombo was 391 per 1,000 births registered, against 287 in the previous month, 352 in the corresponding month of last year, and 317 the monthly average, and ranged from 538 in Maradana, exclusive of hospitals (average 355) to 324 in Kotahena (average 331)..

Causes of Death.

8. *Infants.*—Out of the 1,528 deaths from all causes at all ages in the 31 towns, 315 were among infants under one year. Of these, the chief causes were 95 *Convulsions* (including 38 in Colombo, 12 in Batticaloa, 6 in Moratuwa); 47 *Debility* (18 in Colombo, 7 in Kandy); 34 *Pneumonia* (20 in Colombo, 7 in Moratuwa); 28 *Premature Birth* (6 each in Colombo and Kandy, 5 in Jaffna); 20 *Tetanus* (8 in Galle, 7 in Colombo, 5 in Jaffna); 21 *Diarrhoea* (12 in Colombo); 14 *Bronchitis* (8 in Colombo, 4 in Jaffna); 14 *Enteritis* (11 in Colombo). There were two deaths from *Smallpox* in "Hatton and Dikoya" of a Tamil and Moor respectively.

* Consequent on the extension of the limits of the Colombo Municipality in February, 1910, by adding about 49 acres to Kotahena Ward, 531 to Maradana Ward, and 1,013 to Kollupitiya Ward, it became necessary to alter the limits of these registration divisions to make them co-terminous with the Municipal divisions, and this was done with effect from October 1, 1910, by Proclamation of September 13, 1910. The population of the town was increased but slightly, as the added parts are not populous. An additional Registrar has from October 1 been appointed to Kollupitiya Ward, owing to the large area of the ward as enlarged, the ward being divided into two registration divisions, north and south.

† The city-rate is worked out independently of the ward-rates and on a different basis of population, and takes into account hospital events, &c., not assignable to wards.

9. In the city of Colombo, out of the 603 deaths from all causes at all ages, 140 were among infants under one year. Of these, the chief causes were 38 *Convulsions* (9 in Slave Island, 8 in Maradana, exclusive of hospitals, 7 each in New Bazaar and San Sebastian); 20 *Pneumonia* (5 each in Kotahena and Maradana, exclusive of hospitals); 18 *Debility* (4 each in Slave Island and Kollupitiya); 12 *Diarrhoea* (6 in Maradana, exclusive of hospitals); 8 *Bronchitis* (2 each in Kotahena, New Bazaar, and Maradana, exclusive of hospitals); 7 *Tetanus* (2 each in St. Paul's and Kotahena).

10. General Mortality (One Year and over).—Out of the 1,213 deaths of persons one year and over in age in the 31 towns, there were 151 from *Diarrhoea* (40 in Ratnapura, 15 in Matale, 13 in Colombo, 11 in Kegalla); 129 from *Pneumonia* (53 in Colombo, 11 in Galle, 7 in Moratuwa); 108 from *Phthisis* (64 in Colombo, 11 in Galle); 78 from *Dysentery* (26 in Colombo, 10 in Kandy); 68 from *Enteritis* (58 in Colombo); 55 from *Anchylostomiasis* or *Dochmias Duodenalis* (16 in Matale, 8 in Colombo, 6 in Kandy, 5 each in Gampola, " Hatton and Dikoya," Galle, and Kegalla); 47 from *Malaria* (10 in Ratnapura, 7 in Jaffna, 6 in Gampola); 46 from *Enteric Fever* (37 in Colombo); 32 from *Malarial Cachexia* (7 in Batticaloa, 4 each in Colombo, Matale, and Trincomalee); 29 from *Convulsions* (11 in Colombo, 7 in Kandy); 22 from *Bright's Disease* and *Nephritis* (9 in Colombo, 4 in Galle); 21 from *Pyrexia* or *Fever* (14 in Kandy, 4 in Matale); 18 from *Bronchitis* (9 in Colombo). There were 10 deaths from *Smallpox* (5 in " Hatton and Dikoya," 4 in Kandy, and 1 in Matale); 8 from *Cholera* (all in Colombo), a continuation of the epidemic which broke out in Ragama Cooly Camp and extended to this city last month.

11. The highest mortality in the city of Colombo was from *Phthisis* (14 per cent. of all deaths one year and over), followed by *Enteritis* (13 per cent.), *Pneumonia* (11 per cent.), *Enteric Fever* (8 per cent.). Out of the 109 deaths from *Phthisis* in all towns at all ages, 65 occurred in Colombo. *Phthisis* and *Pneumonia* were together responsible for 138 deaths at all ages in the city, or 23 per cent. of the deaths from all causes.

12. Taking all the towns together, *Diarrhoea* and *Dysentery* contributed the highest mortality (17 per cent.), followed by *Bronchitis* and *Pneumonia* (13 per cent.), *Infantile Convulsions* (8 per cent.), *Phthisis* (7 per cent.)

Meteorology.

13. *Rainfall*.—Ratnapura records the highest rainfall (28.06 inches), followed by " Hatton and Dikoya " (26.11 inches). The next highest, 18.03 inches and 17.43 inches, were in Gampola and Matale respectively. In Jaffna, Mannar, and Mullaittivu the rainfall was less than one inch.

14. *Temperature*.—The mean temperature varied from 59.6° in Nuwara Eliya to 86.4° in Batticaloa, 85.1° in Mannar, 84.8° in Trincomalee, and was 77.9° in Colombo, 75.6° in Kandy.
