By His Excellency Sir HUGH CLIFFORD, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Officer Administering the Government of the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

HUGH CLIFFORD.

KNOW Ye that We, the Officer Administering the Government of Ceylon, in exercise of the power vested in Us by section 25 of "The Road Ordinance, 1861, Amendment Ordinance, 1884," and with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby, as from and after January 1, 1912; alter the rate of Re. 1.25 hitherto paid in respect of the District of Mullaitivu, Northern Province, for the commutation of labour under the said Ordinance, and do hereby with the advice aforesaid fix the money payment for the commutation of labour payable by every male inhabitant between the ages of 18 and 55 at the sum of Re. 1.50.

Given at Nuwara Eliya, in the said Island of Ceylon, this Third day of October, in the year of our Lord, One thousand Nine hundred and Eleven.

WHEREAS by a Proclamation bearing date January 29, 1909, issued under the provisions of "The Rural Schools Ordinance, 1907," certain by-laws made by the District School Committee of Matara were duly confirmed by the Governor of Ceylon, with the advice of the Executive Council, and proclaimed in the *Government Gazette* of February 5, 1909; and whereas the said District School Committee, Matara, has amended the schedule of schools referred to in by-law No. 1 of the said by-laws by substituting therefor the schedule hereto:

Now know Ye that We, the Officer Administering the Government of Ceylon, in exercise of the powers vested in Us by sub-section (2) of section 20 of the said Ordinance, and with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby confirm the said amendment, with effect from the date hereof. And We do in all other respects confirm the said Proclamation.

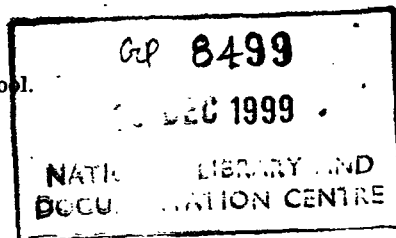

P R O C L A M A T I O N.

By His Excellency Sir HUGH CLIFFORD, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Officer Administering the Government of the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

HUGH CLIFFORD.

WHEREAS by the 85th section of the Ordinance No. 17. of 1869, intituled "An Ordinance for the General Regulation of Customs in the Island of Ceylon," it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor may by Proclamation appoint any place to be a haven, creek, port, or warehousing port in this Colony, and declare the limits thereof :

And whereas it is expedient to appoint the town of Kalkudah, in the Eastern Province, to be a port for the purposes of the said Ordinance from October 15, 1911, to March 15, 1912 :

Now therefore know Ye that We, the Officer Administering the Government, do by this Our Proclamation appoint the town of Kalkudah, in the Eastern Province aforesaid, to be a port for the purposes of the said Ordinance, and declare the limits set out in the schedule hereto, to be for the purposes of the said Ordinance the limits of the said port of Kalkudah.

Given at Colombo, in the said Island of Ceylon, this Thirtieth day of September, in the year of our Lord One thousand Nine hundred and Eleven.

BY-LAWS.

Eating Houses and Tea or Coffee Boutiques.

1. All utensils, furniture, and other requisites used in or belonging to any eating-house or tea or coffee boutique shall always be kept clean.
2. The walls of all eating-houses and tea or coffee boutiques shall be plastered and limewashed, and the rooms well ventilated and lighted.
3. All refuse and dirt in and about the premises of an eating-house or tea or coffee boutique shall be removed twice daily.
4. No person suffering from any loathsome, contagious, or infectious disease, or who has recently been in attendance on any such person, or who is unwashed or otherwise unclean, shall be employed in any eating-house or tea or coffee boutique.
5. The sugar used in such places shall be kept in glass-stoppered wide-mouthed bottles.
6. All cakes, sweetmeats, &c., exposed for sale shall be kept in properly constructed glass cases free from flies. No food stuff shall be exposed to the contamination of flies. The glass cases used shall be kept scrupulously clean.
7. No waste tea or coffee or milk and no remnants of food or cooking waste shall be thrown on the ground, but the same shall be collected in a proper receptacle and removed daily.
8. These by-laws shall be framed and hung up in a prominent place in every such eating-house and tea or coffee boutique.

THE following by-laws made by the Local Board of Anutadhapura, under the provisions of sub-sections (5) and (21) of section 56 of the Local Boards Ordinance, No. 13 of 1898, having been submitted to and confirmed by the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, are hereby published for general information.

BY-LAWS REFERRED TO.

1. The Chairman when specially empowered thereto by resolution of the Board may, by notice in writing, require the owner or occupier of any house or building or land having a cesspool or cesspit on his premises to clean and clear such cesspool or cesspit and substitute a dry-earth closet therefor. If this is not done within ten days of receipt of such notice, the Chairman shall have the power to get the work done. The owner, if he prefers, may instead of cleaning put not less than ten bushels of slaked lime into the pool or pit, and shall satisfy the Chairman that he has done so.
2. Permission may be granted in writing by the Chairman to any householder to have night soil from his own premises buried or otherwise disposed of on his own premises.
3. Any householder who shall permit any night soil to be buried or otherwise disposed of on his premises, without permission in writing from the Chairman, shall be guilty of an offence.
4. Every person (unless specially exempted in writing thereto by the Chairman under by-law 2) on whose premises the dry-earth system is in operation is hereby required to cause the daily removal of night soil to a depôt appointed by the Board for the disposal of night soil.
5. Any householder not having received written permission under by-law 2 may employ any person (except the Board's coolies) for the purpose of the removal and disposal of night soil. Provided that in the case of such private arrangements being entered into, the name of such person so employed shall be registered at the office of the Board, and the place to which the night soil shall be removed and the method and time of removal and the disposal thereof shall be submitted to the Board for approval. Provided further, that such removal shall be done between the hours of 8 P.M. and 5 A.M.
6. Every person causing the removal of night soil by means of the Board's coolies shall pay to the Board in advance such sum as shall be determined by the Chairman not exceeding Re. 1 per mensem for each household in which such night soil is deposited on his premises for removal by the Board.
7. The charge for cleaning a pit by the Board shall be Rs. 5 per pool or pit.
8. Any person who shall open a new cesspool or cesspit without permission in writing from the Chairman shall be guilty of an offence.

IT is hereby notified that His Excellency the Officer Administering the Government, in exercise of the powers in him vested by section 4 of "The Colombo Graving Dock and Patent Slip Ordinance, 1908," and with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to make the following rule, to be added to Part I. of the Colombo Graving Dock rules dated March 13, 1909, and the same is published for general information.

RULE REFERRED TO.

40 A. The licensee who has cleaned the vessel's bottom shall, immediately the bottom has been scraped, remove from the dock all refuse resulting from such operation, and convey it to such place as may be pointed out by the Dock Master. A breach of the rule shall be an offence, punishable on conviction with a fine not exceeding Rs. 50.

REGULATIONS FRAMED UNDER ORDINANCE NO. 30 OF 1909.

Section 2, Sub-section (2) (a).

1. The ordinary meetings of the Board shall be held at least once a month on such days and at such time and place as the Board shall from time to time by resolution determine. Any special meeting shall be convened at the discretion of the Chairman or on the written requisition of two members of the Board. Provided that it shall be lawful for the Board to adjourn any meeting to any other day or hour.
2. The Chairman at any meeting shall preserve order and decide on all disputed points of order, and his decision on such matters shall be final.
3. As soon after the hour appointed for any meeting (whether ordinary or special) as a quorum shall assemble the member entitled to preside shall take the chair, and the Board shall proceed to business. Should a quorum not be present at the expiration of half an hour from the time appointed for the meeting, the meeting shall stand adjourned, if an ordinary meeting, to the day appointed for the next ordinary meeting, or, if a special meeting, *sine die*.
4. Any member desiring to ask a question or to make a motion, unless in the course of discussion or in case of emergency by special leave of the Board, shall give notice of such question or motion either at some previous meeting of the Board or by notice in writing at least four days before the day on which he intends to ask such question or make such motion, and when any such notice is given, a copy of the question or motion shall be delivered by such member to the clerk of the Board.
5. All questions asked and motions made shall be in the order of the notices thereof, unless the Board shall unanimously decide otherwise.
6. Any member presenting a petition or other communication will be held responsible for its contents being throughout respectful, and no document shall be laid before the Board unless the name and address of the drawer be legibly recorded on it.
7. When a petition or communication is presented by a member, the purport thereof shall be concisely stated by him, and on the motion of any member duly seconded the question shall be put whether or not the document shall be read.
8. The business of the ordinary meetings shall be conducted in the following order:—
 - (a) The minutes of the previous meeting shall be read and confirmed after being, if necessary, corrected.
 - (b) Memorials, petitions, or other communications addressed to the Board shall be laid before the meeting and orders made thereon.
 - (c) The other business shall be considered in the order set down in the order book hereinafter mentioned.
9. The clerk shall keep an order book in which shall be entered and numbered in succession the subjects to be brought under discussion at each meeting, and he shall serve on each member or leave at his residence two days at least before each meeting a notice containing the order of the day copied from the order book. The proceedings of the Board in respect of each item shall be minuted in this book during each sitting.
10. The clerk shall also keep a minute book in which the proceedings of the Board shall be entered, and the minutes of every meeting of the Board as entered in the book shall, after they have been confirmed at any subsequent meeting, be signed by the Chairman of the meeting at which they are so confirmed.

11. The clerk shall lay on the table at each meeting all complaints addressed to the Board, and all reports made by officers of the Board, and notes of any action taken by the Chairman since the last previous meeting of the Board.

12. Notice of every special meeting shall be served on each member or left at his residence two days at least before the day of such meeting.

Sub-section (2) (d).

13. Every bakery shall be well ventilated and well lighted, and the walls thereof plastered with lime mortar and whitewashed, the floor cemented, and drainage sufficiently provided.

14. Every eating-house and tea and coffee boutique shall be well ventilated and well lighted, and the walls and floor thereof shall always be kept clean and in good repair.

15. No bakery, eating-house, or tea and coffee boutique shall be within 30 feet of any cesspit or latrine, or in a position where bad odours wafted therefrom shall reach it.

16. No place used as a bakery shall be used as a dwelling place or for any other purpose whatsoever.

17. All utensils, furniture, and other requisites used in or belonging to a bakery, eating-house, or tea and coffee boutique shall be kept clean.

18. The flour, rice, water, and other materials used in the manufacture of bread, rice, or other eatables shall be good and wholesome, and it shall be lawful for any member of the Board or for any person thereto authorized in writing by the Chairman from time to time to demand and obtain samples thereof.

19. All refuse and dirt in and about the premises of a bakery, eating-house, or tea and coffee boutique shall be removed without delay, and the drains kept well flushed.

20. It shall be lawful for any member of the Board or other person authorized in writing by the Chairman at any time to enter and inspect any bakery, eating-house, or tea and coffee boutique, provided there is some one in charge of the premises at the time.

Sub-section (2) (e).

21. It shall not be lawful for any person to slaughter for sale any cattle, sheep, goat, or other animal except at the place or places set apart for that purpose by the Board.

22. It shall be the duty of the person or persons slaughtering any animal at the place or places set apart for that purpose to remove therefrom all refuse and blood and generally clean the place after slaughtering.

Sub-section (2) (f).

23. No person shall keep or deposit or cause to be kept or deposited for sale or storage any guano, bone dust, hides, or any manure or substance whatsoever from which noxious or offensive smells arise, or erect or use any lime or brick kiln or tannery in any place or depôt within the limits of any town, unless such place or depôt be licensed therefor by the Chairman, which license shall be subject to such conditions as the Board may from time to time by resolution in that behalf appoint, and shall be in force from the date of issue until December 31 then next ensuing.

Sub-section (2) (g).

24. It shall not be lawful for any person to introduce into or expose for sale within the limits of any town any meat, fish, poultry, game, flesh, vegetable, fruit, or other article of food which is unfit for human consumption.

25. No person affected with or suffering from any cutaneous, contagious, or infectious disease shall sell or expose for sale any provisions whatsoever.

26. It shall be lawful for the Chairman or any person authorized by him to seize any meat, fish, poultry, game, flesh, vegetable, fruit, or other article of food introduced into or exposed for sale within the limits of any town which he considers to be unfit for human consumption, and upon such seizure to convey the same or cause the same to be conveyed to the Health Officer, or in his absence, or if there be no such officer, to the Magistrate; and if it appear to such Health Officer or Magistrate that such meat, fish, poultry, game, flesh, vegetable, fruit, or other article of food is unfit for human consumption, he shall order the same to be destroyed, or to be so disposed of as to prevent it being exposed for sale or used for food.

Sub-section (2) (h).

27. It shall be the duty of every owner or occupier of any land within the limits of any town which is fenced according to the custom of the place to keep such fence always in good repair, and no fence shall be raised to any height above 7 feet.

28. Whenever any tree or branch or fruit of a tree within the limits of any town shall be deemed after inspection by the Chairman to be likely to fall upon any house or building and injure the occupiers thereof, or whenever the same shall overhang any street, it shall be lawful for the Chairman to cause notice in writing to be given to the owner or occupier of the land upon which such tree stands to cut down or remove the said tree or branch or fruit; and if such owner or occupier shall not cut down or remove the same within twenty-four hours after such notice has been served on him, the Chairman or any officer authorized by him in writing with necessary workmen may enter upon such land and cause the work to be done, and the expense thereby incurred shall be paid by such owner or occupier, and in default of payment may be recovered by the same process by which rates payable under the Ordinance may be recovered.

29. Every owner or occupier of any house, garden, building, or land within the town shall, if so required by the Board, keep such house, garden, building, or land surrounded with a wall or good fence of not less than 4 feet in height from the level of the ground.

Sub-section (2) (k).

30. It shall be lawful for the Board by resolution from time to time to set apart for public bathing such places as it may deem proper, and to determine the hours during which they may be used.

31. A list of the places so set apart for public bathing shall be proclaimed within the limits of the town in which such places are situated by beat of tom-tom, and copies of the list in the English, Sinhalese, and Tamil languages shall be affixed at the office of the Board, and at any other place decided upon by the Chairman.

32. No person shall resort for the purposes of bathing to any public place other than those set apart for that purpose; and no person shall bathe at the place set apart except during the hours determined by the Board.

33. No person shall wash or cause to be washed horses, cattle, clothes, mats, or any other articles at any public place set apart for public bathing.

34. No person suffering from any cutaneous, infectious, or contagious disease shall bathe or wash clothes or any other articles in any public place.

Sub-section (2) (o).

35. It shall not be lawful for any person to erect a house or hut for the purpose of a dwelling place, or permit the same to be occupied as a dwelling place, within the limits of any town, except under the following conditions:—

- (a) Every such house or hut or any room therein to be used for human habitation shall not be less than 120 superficial feet in area, and not less than 10 feet in height, and shall have the eaves at least 6 feet from the ground.
- (b) Every room to be used for human habitation shall have at least one door not less than 6 feet by 3 feet, and at least one window not less than 3 feet by 2 feet.
- (c) When any house or hut has a frontage upon any thoroughfare, the level of the floor of such house or hut shall be at least 1 foot above the level of such thoroughfare, and the house or hut shall be situated at least 4 feet from such thoroughfare.
- (d) It shall be lawful for the Board to cause any house or hut erected contrary to the provisions of this regulation to be taken down at the expense of the owner, if within one month after written notice to him to alter or take down the same he shall fail or neglect to do so; and the expenses incurred thereby may be recovered by the same process as is provided for the recovery of rates under this Ordinance.

Sub-section (2) (t).

36. All owners, tenants, or occupiers of lands within the limits of any town shall keep the same clean and free from all weeds or rank and noisome vegetation, as well as from all refuse and rubbish.

37. No person shall keep, for the purpose of letting or renting out the same, any cattle shed or halting place for cattle within the limits of any town without a permit from the Board. Such permit may impose such conditions as the Board shall consider necessary for the preservation of public health; and the persons keeping such cattle shed or halting place for cattle shall be bound to observe such conditions. Any permit issued under this rule shall be free of charge.

38. Any person who is desirous that ashes, sweepings, refuse, or other rubbish from his premises shall be removed by the scavengers of the Board shall deposit the same in proper covered tubs, boxes, or other like receptacles as the Board may prescribe at the edge of the road outside his premises at such hours daily as the Board shall from time to time appoint by notice duly published, and shall remove the said tubs, boxes, or other like receptacles within half an hour after the emptying of such tubs, boxes, or other like receptacles by the scavenger. No person shall place any ashes, sweepings, refuse, or other rubbish on any street except in such manner as aforesaid, or on any public place other than public dust bins where such are provided.

39. It shall be lawful for the Chairman at any time to require the owner or occupier of any house, building, enclosure, or premises within the limits of any town, by notice in writing, to remove or bury or cause to be removed or buried the contents of any privy, pit, or earth closet, in or belonging to such house, building, enclosure, or premises, to or at such place or places and within such time as shall be set forth in such notice. Should such owner or occupier fail to comply with the requirements of such notice within three days from the time when such notice shall have been served on him, the Chairman may cause the necessary work to be done, and for that purpose shall have power to enter into and upon such house, outhouse, building, enclosure, or premises, with such labourers, implements, and things as may be required; and the expenses incurred shall be recoverable in the same manner as is provided for the recovery of rates under this Ordinance.

40. The occupier of any house or premises within or upon which any cattle, horse, sheep, goat, or pig may die shall within four hours after its death, or if death occurs at night, within four hours after daylight, either remove the carcass, at his own expense to such place as may be appointed by the Board for that purpose, or report such death to an officer of the Board; and in such latter case shall pay to the Board the expenses of removing or burying the carcass at such rate as the Board shall determine.

41. It shall not be lawful for any person to ease himself on any thoroughfare, street, road, or path, or any place whatsoever within the limits of any town other than a public latrine or a building or enclosed space which has been set apart for such purpose.

42. It shall not be lawful for any person to put copra or any other produce on any road or public thoroughfare to be dried or for any other purpose.

Interpretation Clause.

In the regulations the word "town" means a town or village in the District of Puttalam proclaimed under the Small Towns Sanitary Ordinance, No. 18 of 1892.

Belgium, Extradition Order in Council, 1911.

At the Court at Buckingham Palace, the 8th day of August, 1911.

PRESENT:

WHEREAS by the Extradition Acts, 1870 to 1906, it was amongst other things enacted that, where an arrangement has been made with any foreign State with respect to the surrender to such State of any fugitive criminals, His Majesty may, by Order in Council, direct that the said Acts shall apply in the case of such foreign State; and that His Majesty may, by the same or any subsequent Order, limit the operation of the Order, and restrict the same to fugitive criminals who are in or suspected of being in the part of His Majesty's dominions specified in the Order, and render the operation thereof subject to such conditions, exceptions, and qualifications as may be deemed expedient:

And whereas a Treaty was concluded on October 29, 1901, between His late Majesty King Edward VII. and His late Majesty the King of the Belgians, for the Extradition of Criminals, which Treaty was amended by a supplementary Convention concluded on March 5, 1907:

And whereas a further Convention was concluded on March 3, 1911, between His Majesty and His Majesty the King of the Belgians, amending Article 6 of the aforesaid Treaty, which Convention is in the terms following:—

His Majesty the King of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, Emperor of India, and His Majesty the King of the Belgians, being desirous of amending the provisions of Article 6 of the Treaty between Belgium and Great Britain of October 29, 1901, for the mutual extradition of fugitive criminals, have named as their respective Plenipotentiaries, for this purpose, that is to say:

His Majesty the King of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, the Right Honourable Sir Edward Grey, a Baronet of the United Kingdom, a Member of Parliament, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs;

And His Majesty the King of the Belgians, Count de Lalaing, His Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary at the Court of His Britannic Majesty;

Who, having reciprocally communicated their full powers, found to be in good and due form, have agreed as follows:—

Article 1.—The following Article is substituted for Article 6 of the Extradition Treaty of October 29, 1901:—

When a person shall have been extradited by one of the High Contracting Parties, that person, until he has returned to the country from which he had been extradited, or until he has had opportunity of returning to it, shall not be detained or brought to justice in the State to which he has been handed over for any crime or on any other charge whatever prior to the extradition, except those in respect of which the extradition has been accorded.

Neither shall that person, until he has had an opportunity of returning to the country from which he has been extradited, be handed over to a third State.

Article 2.—The present Convention shall be ratified, and the ratifications shall be exchanged at London, as soon as possible.

It shall come into force ten days after its publication in the manner prescribed by law in the respective countries, and shall have the same force and duration as the Treaty to which it relates.

In witness whereof the respective Plenipotentiaries have signed the present Convention, and have affixed thereto their seals.

Done, in duplicate, at London, March 3, 1911.

And whereas the ratifications of the above Convention were exchanged at London on May 10, 1911:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, and in virtue of the authority committed to him by the said recited Acts, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after August 25, 1911, the said Acts shall apply in the case of Belgium under and in accordance with the said Treaty of October 29, 1901, and the supplementary Conventions of March 5, 1907, and March 3, 1911.

Provided always that the operation of the said Acts shall be and remain suspended within the Dominion of Canada so long as an Act of the Parliament of Canada, being Part I. of Chapter 155 of "The Revised Statutes of Canada, 1906," and entitled "An Act respecting the Extradition of Fugitive Criminals," shall continue in force there, and no longer.

WHEREAS by the Extradition Acts, 1870 to 1906, it was amongst other things enacted that, where an arrangement has been made with any foreign State with respect to the surrender to such State of any fugitive criminals, His Majesty may, by Order in Council, direct that the said Acts shall apply in the case of such foreign State; and that His Majesty may, by the same or any subsequent Order, limit the operation of the Order, and restrict the same to fugitive criminals who are in or suspected of being in the part of His Majesty's dominions specified in the Order, and render the operation thereof subject to such conditions, exceptions, and qualifications as may be deemed expedient:

And whereas a Treaty was concluded on the Twelfth day of September, One thousand Nine hundred and Eight, between His Majesty King Edward VII. and the President of the Republic of Paraguay, for the extradition of criminals, which Treaty is in the terms following:—

His Majesty the King of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, Emperor of India, and His Excellency the President of the Republic of Paraguay, having determined, by common consent, to conclude a Treaty for the extradition of criminals, have accordingly named as their Plenipotentiaries:

His Majesty the King of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, Emperor of India, Cecil Gosling, Esquire, His Chargé d'Affaires in the Republic of Paraguay;

And His Excellency the President of the Republic of Paraguay, His Excellency Doctor Eusebio Ayala, Minister for Foreign Affairs of the Republic of Paraguay;

Who, after having exhibited to each other their respective full powers and found them in good and due form, have agreed upon the following Articles:—

Article 1.—The High Contracting Parties engage to deliver up to each other, under certain circumstances and conditions stated in the present Treaty, those persons who, being accused or convicted of any of the crimes or offences enumerated in Article 2, committed in the territory of the one Party, shall be found within the territory of the other Party.

Article 2.—Extradition shall be reciprocally granted for the following crimes or offences:—

1. Murder, or attempt or conspiracy to murder.
2. Manslaughter.
3. Administering drugs or using instruments with intent to procure the miscarriage of women.
4. Rape.
5. Carnal knowledge, or any attempt to have unlawful carnal knowledge of a girl under the age of 16 years, so far as such acts are punishable by the law of the State upon which the demand is made.
6. Indecent assault.
7. Kidnapping and false imprisonment, child stealing.
8. Abandoning, exposing, or detaining children.
9. Abduction.
10. Bigamy.
11. Maliciously wounding or inflicting grievous bodily harm.
12. Assault occasioning actual bodily harm.
13. Threats, by letter or otherwise, with intent to extort money or other things of value.
14. Arson.
15. Burglary or house-breaking, robbery with violence, larceny, or embezzlement.
16. Fraud by a bailee, banker, agent, factor, trustee, director, member, or public officer of any company.

- 17. Obtaining money, valuable security, or goods by false pretences; receiving any money, valuable security, or other property, knowing the same to have been stolen or unlawfully obtained.
- 18. (a) Counterfeiting or altering money, or bringing into circulation counterfeited or altered money.
- (b) Knowingly making, without lawful authority, any instrument, tool, or engine, adapted and intended for the counterfeiting of the coin of the realm.
- 19. Forgery, or uttering what is forged.
- 20. Crimes against bankruptcy law.
- 21. Any malicious act done with intent to endanger the safety of any persons travelling or being upon a railway.
- 22. Malicious injury to property if such offence be indictable.
- 23. Piracy and other crimes or offences committed at sea against persons or things which, according to the laws of the High Contracting Parties, are extradition offences.
- 24. Dealing in slaves in such manner as to constitute a criminal offence against the laws of both States.

With regard to the effect of this last paragraph, as the Paraguayan Penal Code does not consider slave dealing, it is declared by the present Treaty that that act is considered as piracy, and subject to the penalties of that offence.

Extradition shall also be granted for participation in any of the aforesaid crimes, provided such participation be punishable by the laws of both Contracting Parties.

Extradition may also be granted at the discretion of the State applied to in respect of any other crime for which, according to the law of both the Contracting Parties for the time being in force, the grant can be made.

Article 3.—Neither party is obliged to surrender its own subjects or citizens to the other party.

Article 4.—Extradition shall not take place if the person claimed on the part of His Britannic Majesty's Government, or of the Government of Paraguay, has already been tried and discharged or punished, or is awaiting trial in the territory of the United Kingdom or in the Republic of Paraguay respectively for the crime for which his extradition is demanded.

If the person claimed on the part of His Britannic Majesty's Government, or of the Government of Paraguay, should be awaiting trial or undergoing sentence for any other crime in the territory of the United Kingdom or the Republic of Paraguay respectively, his extradition shall be deferred until after he has been discharged, whether by acquittal or on expiration of sentence, or otherwise.

Article 5.—Extradition shall not be granted if exemption from prosecution or punishment has been acquired by lapse of time, according to the laws of the State applying or applied to.

Neither shall it be granted if, according to the law of either country, the maximum punishment for the offence charged is imprisonment for less than one year.

Article 6.—A fugitive criminal shall not be surrendered if the offence in respect of which his surrender is demanded is one of a political character, or if he proves that the requisition for his surrender has, in fact, been made with a view to try or punish him for an offence of a political character.

Article 7.—A person surrendered shall in no case be kept in prison or be brought to trial in the State to which the surrender has been made for any other crime, or on account of any other matters, than those for which the extradition shall have taken place, until he has been restored, or has had an opportunity of returning, to the State by which he has been surrendered. This stipulation does not apply to crimes committed after the extradition.

Article 8.—The requisition for extradition shall be made through the Diplomatic Agents of the High Contracting Parties respectively.

The requisition for the extradition of an accused person must be accompanied by a warrant of arrest issued by the competent authority of the State requiring the extradition, and by such evidence as, according to the laws of the place where the accused is found, would justify his arrest if the crime had been committed there.

If the requisition relates to a person already convicted, it must be accompanied by a copy of the judgment passed on the convicted person by the competent Court of the State that makes the requisition for extradition.

A sentence passed *in contumaciam* is not to be deemed a conviction, but a person so sentenced may be dealt with as an accused person.

Article 9.—If the requisition for extradition be in accordance with the foregoing stipulations, the competent authorities of the State applied to shall proceed to the arrest of the fugitive.

Article 10.—A criminal fugitive may be apprehended under a warrant issued by any competent authority in either country, on such information or complaint, and such evidence, or after such proceedings, as would, in the opinion of the authority issuing the warrant, justify the issue of a warrant if the crime had been committed or the person convicted in that part of the dominions of the two Contracting Parties in which the said authority exercises jurisdiction; but the arrested fugitive shall be sent as speedily as possible before the competent Magistrate of the country where he is arrested.

He shall, in accordance with this Article, be discharged, as well in the Republic of Paraguay as in the United Kingdom, if within the term of sixty days a requisition for extradition shall not have been made by the Diplomatic Agent of his country in accordance with the stipulations of this Treaty. The same rule shall apply to the cases of persons accused or convicted of any of the crimes or offences specified in this Treaty, and committed on the high seas on board any vessel of either country which may come into a port of the other.

Article 11.—The extradition shall take place only if the evidence be found sufficient according to the laws of the State applied to, either to justify the committal of the prisoner for trial, in case the crime had been committed in the territory of the same State, or if extradition is claimed in respect of an offence of which the fugitive has been already convicted, to prove that the prisoner is the person convicted, and that the crime of which he has been convicted is one in respect of which extradition could, at the time of such conviction, have been granted by the State applied to.

Article 12.—The extradition of fugitives under the provisions of this Treaty shall be carried out in His Britannic Majesty's dominions and in the Republic of Paraguay respectively, in conformity with the laws regulating extradition for the time being in force in the surrendering State.

Article 13.—In the examination which they have to make in accordance with the foregoing stipulations, the authorities of the State applied to shall admit as valid evidence the sworn depositions or the affirmations of witnesses taken in the other State, or copies thereof, and likewise the warrants and sentences issued therein, and certificates of, or judicial documents stating, the fact of a conviction, provided the same are authenticated as follows:—

1. A warrant must purport to be signed by a Judge, Magistrate, or officer of the other State.
2. Depositions or affirmations, or the copies thereof, must purport to be certified, under the hand of a Judge, Magistrate, or officer of the other State, to be the original depositions or affirmations, or to be true copies thereof, as the case may require.
3. A certificate of, or judicial document stating, the fact of a conviction must purport to be certified by a Judge, Magistrate, or officer of the other State.
4. In every case such warrant, deposition, affirmation, copy, certificate, or judicial document must be authenticated, either by the oath of some witness, or by being sealed with the official seal of the Minister of Justice, or some other Minister of the other State; but any other mode of authentication for the time being permitted by the law of the country where the examination is taken may be substituted for the foregoing.

Article 14.—If the individual claimed by one of the High Contracting Parties in pursuance of the present Treaty should be also claimed by one or several other Powers on account of other crimes or offences committed upon their respective territories, his extradition shall be granted to the State whose demand is earliest in date.

Article 15.—If sufficient evidence for the extradition be not produced within ninety days from the date of the apprehension of the fugitive, or within such further time as the State applied to, or the proper tribunal thereof, shall direct, the fugitive shall be set at liberty.

Article 16.—All articles seized which were in the possession of the person to be surrendered at the time of his apprehension shall, if the competent authority of the State applied to for the extradition has ordered the delivery of such articles, be given up when the extradition takes place; and the said delivery shall extend not merely to the stolen articles, but to everything that may serve as a proof of the crime.

Article 17.—All expenses connected with extradition shall be borne by the demanding State.

Article 18.—The stipulations of the present Treaty shall be applicable to the Colonies and Possessions of His Britannic Majesty, so far as their local laws permit; for which purpose His Majesty's Government shall be at liberty to make special arrangements with them for the surrender of criminals to Paraguay in accordance with the terms of the Treaty.

The requisition for the extradition of a criminal, who has taken refuge in one of the British Colonies or Possessions, shall be addressed to the Governor or chief authority of the same by the senior local Paraguayan Consular officer, or failing him, by the Ministry for Foreign Affairs.

The Governor, or authority referred to, will deal with the demand in accordance with the provisions of the present Treaty, and to the extent permitted by the local laws; but he will be at liberty either to surrender the criminal or to refer the case to the British Government.

As regards demands for the surrender of criminals fugitives from British Colonies and Possessions, they will be governed by the rules laid down in the present Treaty.

Article 19.—If in any criminal matter pending in any court or tribunal of one of the two countries it is thought desirable to take the evidence of any witness in the other, such evidence may be taken by the judicial authorities in accordance with the laws in force on this subject in the country where the witness may be.

Article 20.—The present Treaty shall come into force ten days after its publication, in conformity with the forms prescribed by the laws of the High Contracting Parties. It may be terminated by either of the High Contracting Parties by a notice not exceeding one year and not less than six months.

It shall be ratified, and the ratifications shall be exchanged at Asuncion as soon as possible.

In witness whereof the respective Plenipotentiaries have signed the same, and affixed thereto their respective seals. Done in duplicate at Asuncion, the Twelfth day of September, One thousand Nine hundred and Eight.

And whereas the ratifications of the said Treaty were exchanged at Asuncion on the Thirtieth day of January, One thousand Nine hundred and Eleven:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, and in virtue of the authority committed to Him by the said recited Acts, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the Seventeenth day of July, One thousand Nine hundred and Eleven, the said Acts shall apply in the case of Paraguay, and of the said Treaty with the President of the Republic of Paraguay:

Provided always that the operation of the said Acts shall be and remain suspended within the Dominion of Canada so long as an Act of the Parliament of Canada, being Part I. of Chapter 155 of the Revised Statutes of Canada, 1906, and entitled "An Act respecting the Extradition of Fugitive Criminals," shall continue in force there, and no longer.

CEYLON CHAMBER OF COMMERCE.

Examinations for Commercial Certificates.

WITH the object of fixing a standard for Commercial Education in Ceylon, the Chamber of Commerce will, in conjunction with the Department of Public Instruction, hold annual examinations, on the results of which certificates will be awarded to the successful candidates. A register of successful candidates will be kept by the Chamber of Commerce, and the Chamber will interest itself in assisting them to obtain suitable employments.

2. Candidates for these examinations must conform to the following regulations:—(a) They must be not under fourteen and not over twenty-one years of age on the last day of the month immediately preceding that fixed for the examination; (b) they must for eight months preceding the date of examination have been attending the Commercial Class of a school, which has previously satisfied the Director of Public Instruction as providing suitable instruction in commercial subjects.

3. The next examination will be held in July, 1912, and the subjects will be as follows:—

Compulsory Subjects.

- (1) Handwriting, Orthography, and Dictation.
- (2) Reading.
- (3) English Composition.
- (4) Arithmetic.
- (5) Ordinary Commercial Terms.
- (6) Précis and Indexing.

Optional Subjects.

- (7) Shorthand and Typewriting.
- (8) Office Routine and Bookkeeping.
- (9) Commercial Geography and Shipping.
- (10) Advanced Arithmetic.

In order to obtain a certificate, candidates must satisfy the examiners in all the compulsory subjects and in one of the three groups (7), (8), and (9). All the subjects in which a candidate passes will be noted on his certificate.

4. The approximate range of the various subjects and the standards of knowledge required in each are as follows:—

Handwriting, Orthography, and Dictation.—In handwriting the chief requirements are legibility of writing, and uniformity of size and slope. The ideal business handwriting is such as that set out in Blackie's Commercial Course of Copy Books. Writing should not be angular or floresque.

The handwriting of the candidates will be tested in general by their writing in the various papers, and in particular by special tests, such as addressing envelopes, copying a draft letter, or writing from dictation. The spelling of the candidates will be judged from their general work and from a special test involving words of ordinary difficulty. In dictation the chief requirements are accuracy and correct punctuation.

Reading.—The essentials in reading are clear and distinct enunciation of each word, observation of necessary pauses according to punctuation, and faculty of making clear the meaning of each sentence. Questions will be put on the meaning of the passage read.

English Composition.—Candidates will be tested in the following ways:—(a) Writing a letter on a given business subject, the headings of which will be supplied; (b) re-writing in proper form and in correct phraseology a badly drafted letter; (c) correcting faulty or incorrect sentences. In this paper special attention will be paid to English Grammar.

Arithmetic.—Tots, simple and compound, long and cross. Weights and Measures. Vulgar Fractions and Decimals. Proportion, simple and compound. Practice, simple and compound. Interest, simple and compound. Percentages. Exchange. * Special attention should be paid to methods of working and setting out of work.

Commercial Terms and Abbreviations.—A good knowledge of the terms and abbreviations ordinarily used in business. Lists of such terms and abbreviations may be found in almost any Manual of Commercial Correspondence, such as Pitman's or Routledge's.

Précis and Indexing.—Candidates will be required to make both a précis and an index of a series of business letters, all relating to the same subject.

The object of a *précis* is to present in a consecutive narrative all the principal points of the correspondence, leaving out all unimportant details, and making the narrative as concise as possible, without sacrificing completeness and lucidity.

The object of an *index* is to present in separate sections, chronologically arranged, a brief *resumé* of each letter, giving number, date, name of writer, and substance of each letter in separate columns, so as to enable the particulars of any of the letters to be obtained without turning up the original document.

Shorthand.—Pitman's system as set out in the Manual and Reporter. Writing in shorthand from dictation at the rate of eighty words per minute. Transcribing accurately from shorthand into longhand at the rate of ten words per minute. Marks will be awarded for good shorthand outlines.

Typewriting.—Typing from manuscript copy, and setting out in proper form draft letters, tabular statements, or other commercial documents. Special attention must be paid to accuracy, correct spelling, proper punctuation, and paragraphing. Any candidate desiring to use his own machine may do so.

Office Routine.—Good knowledge of the methods in which business transactions should be entered up and treated. Use of ordinary office forms, such as invoices, order forms, despatch notes, forward notes, debit notes, credit notes, statements of account, account sales, accounts current, and similar forms. Use of documents, such as receipt forms, vouchers, cheques, paying in slips, bankers' drafts, bills of exchange, foreign bills, money orders, postal orders, I. O. Us. Treatment of correspondence, inward and outward. Letter register. Indexing, docketing, filing (various systems). Range of knowledge similar to that set out in Hooper and Graham's Business Manual or Blackie's Office Routine.

Bookkeeping.—Sound knowledge of the practice of modern bookkeeping by double entry. The system to be employed is that commonly known as the English system, in which the following subdivisions of books are employed:—Cash book, invoice book, day book, bought ledger, sales ledger, private ledger, bills receivable and bills payable books. Treatment by above system of discounts, interest, loans, mortgages, rents, dividends, bad debts, depreciation, plant fixtures, machinery, property, wages, salaries, consignment and commission accounts, joint accounts, partnership accounts, fixed and floating assets, trading and profit and loss accounts, profit appropriation accounts, and balance sheets.

Commercial Geography.—General knowledge of Asia and Australia, paying special attention to their products, trade, and commerce. Special knowledge of India and Ceylon in regard to their products, commerce, lines of communication, and trade routes with other countries. Special attention must be paid to the produce areas and particular trade centres, also to the rivers and railways of Ceylon and India.

Shipping.—A good knowledge of the more important steamship lines trading with Ceylon. Knowledge of procedure adopted in shipping various kinds of articles, such as live stock, goods, explosives, &c., import and export. Knowledge of Customs procedure and use of documents, such as advice note, mate's receipt, insurance slip, bill of lading, Customs specification, certificate of origin, delivery order, Customs entry forms, landing order, warehousing form, bill of sight, weight note, manifests, and similar forms. Range of knowledge such as that set out in Hooper and Graham's Manual of Import and Export Trade.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended September 30, 1911.

Births.—The total births registered were 84 (1 European, 3 Burghers, 47 Sinhalese, 11 Tamils, 18 Moors, 2 Malays, and 2 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on July 1, 1911, viz. 213,825) was 20·5, as against 22·4 in the preceding week, 22·6 in the corresponding week of last year, and 25·6 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 135 (3 Europeans, 11 Burghers, 65 Sinhalese, 21 Tamils, 28 Moors, 6 Malays, and 1 Other). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 32·9, as against 31·2 in the previous week, 27·6 in the corresponding week of last year, and 31·2 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 135 total deaths, 22 were of infants under one year of age, as against 24 in the preceding week, 27 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and the average for last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 6.

Selected Causes of Death.—Eighteen deaths were registered from *Phthisis* (against 17 in the previous week and 13 the weekly average for last year), of which 4 were in Kotahena, 3 each in St. Paul's, Maradana hospitals, and Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), 2 in Kollupitiya North, and 1 each in San Sebastian, New Bazaar, and Kollupitiya South.

2. Fifteen deaths were registered from *Pneumonia* (against 13 in the previous week and 12 the weekly average for last year), of which 4 were in Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), 2 each in San Sebastian, St. Paul's, New Bazaar, and Maradana hospitals, and 1 each in Fort and Galle Face Ward, Pettah, and Kotahena. Four deaths were registered from *Bronchitis*.

3. Twelve deaths were registered from *Enteric Fever* (against 10 in the previous week and 5 the weekly average for last year), of which 4 were in St. Paul's, 3 in Maradana hospitals, and 1 each in San Sebastian, Kotahena, New Bazaar, Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), and Kollupitiya South. There were 37 cases reported during the week, against 30 in the previous week.

4. Fourteen deaths were registered from *Debility* (including 6 infants), 9 *Enteritis* (2 infants), 8 *Senility*, 7 *Infantile Convulsions*, 5 *Tetanus* (4 infants), 5 *Bright's Disease*, 3 *Paralysis*, and 33 from *Other Causes*.

5. One death was registered from *Cholera*, of a Dutch Naval Officer, who died in the Colombo Harbour on board ss. Koningen-der-Nederlander en route from Batavia to Europe.

6. One death was registered from *Smallpox*, which occurred in the Infectious Diseases Hospital, Kanatta, of a Sinhalese removed from Maradana (exclusive of hospitals). Nine cases of *Measles* were reported during the week, against 5 in the previous week; and 8 of *Chickenpox* as in the previous week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 82·4°, against 82·1° in the preceding week and 80·7° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29·821 in., against 29·812 in. in the preceding week and 29·910 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 0·09 in., against 0·77 in. in the preceding week and 0·18 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.
