# SCHEDULE. Rules of Court.

In exercise of the power vested in Us by "The Courts Ordinances, 1889 and 1901," and of every other power enabling Us, We hereby make the following rules relating to the execution of Letters of Request for Service of Foreign Process:—

1. Where in any civil or commercial matter pending before a court or tribunal of a foreign country a Letter of Request from such court or tribunal for service on any person in Ceylon of any process or citation in such matter is transmitted to the Supreme Court by the Secretary of State for the Colonies through the Colonial Secretary or otherwise, with an intimation that it is desirable that effect should be given to the same, the following procedure shall be adopted:—

(1) The Letter of Request for service shall be accompanied by a translation thereof in the English language, and by two copies of the process or citation to be served, and two copies thereof in the English language.

(2) Service of the process or citation shall, unless the Supreme Court otherwise directs, be effected by the Fiscal of the Province or district in which the party desired to be served usually resides or has his or her place of business.

(3) Such service shall be effected by delivering to and leaving with the person to be served one copy of the process to be served, and one copy of the translation thereof, in accordance with the provisions of "The Civil Procedure Code of 1889" regulating the service of process so far as the same shall be applicable.

(4) After service has been effected, the Fiscal, or other person by whom service has been effected, shall return to the Registrar of the Supreme Court one copy of the process, together with the evidence of service by affidavit of the person effecting the service verified by notarial certificate, and particulars of charges for the cost of effecting such

(5) The particulars of charges for the cost of effecting service shall be submitted to the Registrar of the Supreme Court, who shall certify thereon the correctness of the charges, or such other amount as shall be properly payable for the cost of effecting service. A copy of such charges certified as aforesaid shall be forwarded to the Colonial Secretary, together with the documents specified in the clause next following.

(6) The Registrar of the Supreme Court shall forward to the Colonial Secretary the Letter of Request for service received from the foreign country, together with the evidence of service, with a certificate appended thereto duly sealed with the seal of the Supreme Court. Such certificate shall be in the form in the schedule to these rules.

2. The Supreme Court or any Judge thereof may make all such orders for substituted service or otherwise as may be necessary to give effect to these rules. Such orders may be made either in court or chambers.

- 3. In these rules the word "Ceylon" means the Island of Ceylon and its Dependencies.
- 4. These rules may be cited as the "Rules of 1911 for Service of Foreign -Process."

OTICE is hereby given that an examination for candidates wishing to enter the Third Class of the Clerical

Branch of the Public Service will take place on Wednesday, January 3, 1912, and following days.

2. Applications for admission to the examination by persons not now in the Public Service must be addressed to the Director of Public Instruction, must bear a duly cancelled stamp of Rs. 10, and must be in the form (Schedule) A) attached to this notice. Forms are to be obtained at any Post Office on application, or within four days' notice. A certificate of the registration of the candidate's birth showing him to be of January 3, 1912, between the ages of 18 and 21, and a certificate of good character signed by a responsible person,\* to the satisfaction of the Director of Public Instruction, must be attached to the form of application. If a certificate of birth for a previous examination was sent in, reference may be made to it by mentioning name and date of examination. Affidavits will in no circumstances be accepted. In the case of candidates who submit certificates of registration in the register of past birth, the certificates will only be accepted after consideration of the evidence by which the dates of birth were established. If the name appearing in the birth register differs, either by alteration or addition, from the name by which the candidate is known, the parent or guardian should, before obtaining a certificate, apply to the Registrar-General or his Assistant for such alteration in the manner set forth in section 7 of Ordinance No. 23 of 1900.

Clerks in Government service, from whatever funds they may be paid, who have completed three years' satisfactory service, and are not members of the Customs, Postal, Survey, or Railway Departments, and those clerks employed by Provincial and District Road Committees whose appointments date prior to July 1, 1875, are eligible for examination irrespective of age and without fee. Their applications (in the same form, Schedule A) for admission to the examination should be forwarded to the Director of Public Instruction through the Heads of

their Departments.

4. Applications are to reach the Director of Public Instruction not later than 2 P.M. on Monday, November

27, 1911; any applications received after that hour, by whatever cause delayed, will be absolutely rejected.

The Director of Public Instruction will return to the candidate his application, approved or disapproved as the case may be, after taking, if necessary, the orders of Government thereon. The approved application shall constitute the candidate's ticket of admission to the examination. Candidates presenting themselves for examination must produce to the officer appointed to supervise the examination their forms of application approved by the Director of Public Instruction. A candidate not producing such form, whatever may be the reason for his not so doing, will be refused admittance to the examination.

The examination will be held at Colombo only, in the place and under the supervision of the officer specified in Schedule B. Heads of Departments are required to grant to officers of their Departments, whose applications to present themselves for examination have been returned to them approved by the Director of Public

Instruction, leave to present themselves at the examination.

The examination will be competitive. The number of places assigned for competition will be forty.

The successful candidates will be required to pass a medical examination as to their physical fitness for

service in any part of the Island.

The subjects for examination are those set out in Schedule C to this notice. The examination shall be held in two parts. The first part a qualifying examination in Handwriting, Spelling, Arithmetic, and Bookkeeping. Any candidate failing to obtain two-thirds of the marks allotted for Handwriting, half those allowed for Spelling and Arithmetic respectively, and one-third of those allowed for Bookkeeping shall be excluded from the remainder of the examination. Special attention will be paid to Handwriting, and candidates whose writing is untidy or illegible or contains defects in the formation of letters will be rigorously excluded. The kind of writing preferred will be that generally shown as the "Civil Service" hand. The second part of the examination shall be in the remaining subjects in Schedule C. Should a candidate obtain less than one-third of the aggregate marks for the three subjects—Composition, General Paper, Précis Writing—or less than one-fourth marks in any other subject, or if he be a Sinhalese or Tamil, less than one-half of the marks in his native language, such marks shall not be counted in his favour. In all the written papers marks will be deducted for bad writing and mistakes in spelling.

10. Clerks of the description given in section 3 above, who have served Government continuously for over six years, will be allowed to compete amongst themselves, and will be eligible, if they obtain a minimum of 66 per cent. in Writing and 33 per cent. in the other compulsory subjects, for nine of the appointments offered for competition. Four of the appointments will be reserved as prizes for deserving clerks of the same description, who have served Government continuously for ten years and upwards, to be selected irrespective of examination. No service

under the age of sixteen years will be reckoned for this purpose.

#### BY-LAWS REFERRED TO. CHAPTER I. SECTION 9 E (2) (a).

Time and Place of Meetings and Order to be observed thereat.

The ordinary meetings of the board shall be held at least once every two months and at such time and place as the board shall, from time to time, by resolution determine, provided that it shall be lawful for the board to adjourn any meeting to any other day or hour.

2. For all purposes connected with the board at its meetings the precedence and

seniority of the members shall be as follows:-

The ex-officio chairman.

- (b) The members nominated by the Governor in the order in which they have . been gazetted.
- The chairman shall preserve order and decide on all disputed points of order · 3. As soon after the hour appointed for any meeting (whether ordinary or special) as a quorum shall assemble, the member entitled to preside shall take the chair, and the board shall proceed to business. Should a quorum not be present at the expiration of half an hour from the time appointed for the meeting, the meeting

shall stand adjourned, if an ordinary meeting, to the day appointed for the next ordinary meeting, or if a special meeting sine die.

5. Any member desiring to ask a question or to make a motion, unless in the course of discussion or in case of emergency by special leave of the board, shall give notice of such question or motion either at some previous meeting of the board or by notice in writing at least four days before the day on which he intends to ask such question or make such motion.

6. Every member in giving such notice shall deliver to the chairman a copy

of such question or motion.

All questions asked and motions made at a meeting shall be made in the order of the notices thereof, unless the board shall unanimously decide otherwise.

A motion negatived at a meeting shall not be again made until after the expiration of at least three months, and no motion in an; way contrary to one passed by the board at a meeting shall be entertained until after the expiration of

the same period. 9. Any member presenting a petition or other communication will be held responsible for its contents being throughout respectful, and no document shall be laid before the board unless the name and address of the drawer be legibly recorded

on it.

When a petition or other communication is presented, the purport thereof shall be concisely stated, and on the motion of any member, duly seconded, the question shall be put whether or not the document shall be read.

The business of the ordinary meetings of the board shall be conducted in the 11.

following order:-

(a) The minutes of the former meeting shall be read and confirmed after being, if necessary, corrected.

(b) Memorials, petitions, or other communications addressed to the boars' shall be laid before the meeting and orders made thereon.

(c) The other business shall be considered in the order set down in the order book hereinafter mentioned.

An order book shall be kept, in which shall be entered and numbered in succession the subjects to be brought under discussion at each meeting. Another book to be called the minute book shall be kept, in which shall be minuted during

each sitting in the order in which they occur the proceedings of the board.

13. The inspector shall also keep and submit to the board at every meeting a complaint book, and he shall provide that this book shall be accessible to the public at his office between the hours of 11 A.M. and 4 P.M. on every week day, excepting Saturday and holidays, and excepting also on such days as the board may sit. Every inhabitant of the town shall have access to this book on his furnishing the inspector with his name and address.

#### CHAPTER II. SECTION 9 E (2) (b).

#### Execution of Works, Streets, Roads, and Bridges.

1. All votes of money for public works shall be made on estimates previously

prepared and approved by the board.

2. It shall be lawful for any person or persons thereunto authorized in writing by the chairman, between the hours of 7 A.M. and 5 P.M., with all necessary and proper servants, labourers, workmen, carriages, and animals, and other means, to enter upon any land adjacent or near to any existing or intended street within the limits of the board, and there severally to do and perform all acts, matters, and things necessary for the purpose of tracing, measuring, making, working, opening, altering, turning, repairing, clearing, improving, or fencing any such street, or for building, excavating, repairing, clearing, or improving any bridge, fence, drain,

dam, or ditch thereupon, or in any way connected therewith, or for performing any act, matter, or thing under the provisions of this Ordinance.

3. In the tracing, measuring, making, working, opening, altering, turning, repairing, clearing, or improving any existing or intended street, or building, excavating, repairing, or improving any bridge, fence, drain, dam, or ditch thereupon, or in any way connected therewith, it shall and may be lawful for the person or persons authorized as aforesaid to throw upon any lands adjacent or near thereto such earth, rubbish, or materials as it shall or may be necessary to remove from the place of any such work; provided that such earth, rubbish, and materials shall be removed within a reasonable time.

4. It shall be lawful for any person thereunto authorized in writing by the chairman to make any temporary road through the grounds near to any existing or intended thoroughfare during the execution of any work in any way connected therewith; provided such road shall not run over any ground whereon any building

stands, nor over an enclosed garden or yard.

5. It shall be lawful for any person thereunto specially authorized in writing by the chairman to cut and remove and place upon any ground near thereto all trees, bushes, or shrubs, and all leaves or branches or roots of trees that shall grow in or overhang any thoroughfare, or cause any obstruction or harm thereto, and for that purpose to enter upon any land or premises with such persons, animals, and instruments as may be necessary for the removing of such trees, bushes, shrubs, leaves, branches, or roots.

8. It shall be lawful for any person thereunto authorized in writing by the chairman to put up or make fences, hedges, ditches, drains, or banks by the side of

any thoroughfare whenever to him it shall appear necessary.

7. Any person thereunto specially authorized in writing by the chairman shall have power to make and cleanse all drains or water-courses, and also to make such bridges as he shall deem necessary, for the preservation, imprevement, repair, or construction of any road or canal in and through any lands or grounds lying near to such road or canal or intended road or canal.

- 8. Any officer of the Board thereunto specially authorized in writing by the chairman shall have power to lay any matter or thing whatsoever upon any road, and to allow the same to remain there during the time such road is under repair, and for such time before the repairs are commenced and after the irepairs are completed as may be necessary for facilitating the making of such repairs or for preventing damage to such recently repaired road; but he shall take due and reasonable precaution for preventing danger or injury to persons passing along such road.
- 9. It shall be lawful for any such person or persons authorized as aforesaid; with the servants, workmen, and labourers employed by or under him, between the hours of 7 a.m. and 5 P.M., and with all necessary and proper carriages, animals, and other means, to search for, dig, cut, take, and carry away any water, timber, brushwood, stone, gravel, clay, or any other material whatsoever for the purpose of tracing, measuring, making, working, opening, altering, turning, repairing, clearing, improving, or fencing, or in any way assisting in the tracing, measuring, making, working, opening, altering, turning, repairing, clearing, improving, or fencing any existing or intended street, or of building, excavating, repairing, clearing, or improving any bridge, fence, drain, dam, or ditch thereupon, or repairing any lines or any buildings whatsoever required on or near any such thoroughfare for the use of any officer of the board employed on any work connected with such street, or any workmen, carriages, persons, or things employed in his service, in and from any land adjacent or near to any such street, and to carry away the same through the ground of any person, without being deemed a trespasser; provided that no such materials shall be dug for, cut, or taken away upon or from any yard, avenue, to a house or lawn, or any enclosed garden, plantation, field, or wood without the consent of the owner thereof, unless sufficient materials cannot conveniently be obtained from the neighbouring waste lands, or common or abandoned grounds, in which case the person or persons authorized as aforesaid may take any of such materials where these can be conveningntly procured; provided also that reasonable compensation for all materials so taken, and for the damages done by the getting and carrying away the same, shall be made to the owner thereof; and provided further, that such person or persons shall rail or fence off any quarries or pits from which any such materials shall be taken, so that the same shall not be dangerous to any person or animal.

10. Any officer of the board authorized in writing by the Chairman shall have power to make, scour, cleanse, and keep open all ditches, gutters, and drains or water-courses, and also to make and lay such trunks, tunnels, plats, or bridges as he shall deem necessary for the protection, preservation, improvement, repair, or construction of any street or road in and through any lands or grounds adjoining or

lying near to such street or road or intended street or road.

11. It shall be lawful for the chairman, should he deem it necessary, to require, by notice in writing, the owner of any yard or ground adjoining a dwelling-house, or the owner of any alley, to have such yard, ground, or alley paved in such manner as the chairman shall direct, and to lay sufficient drains or pipes to the nearest town sewer or drain for the purpose of draining such yard, ground, or alley. Such drains or pipes shall be of such material, of such size, of such level, and with such fall, and shall be carried to such point of junction with the said sewer or drain as the chairman shall appoint; provided that the board shall supply to such owner on application, at cost price, the materials necessary for the drains or pipes which he is required to lay. If such owner shall fail to comply with the requirements of such notice within the time appointed, the chairman and any officers or workmen authorized by him may enter upon the premises and cause the required work to be done, and the cost thereof shall be paid by the owner.

#### CHAPTER III. SECTION 9 E (2) (d).

#### Establishment and Regulation of Public Markets,

i. Whenever it shall be determined to establish a public market, the board shall give not less than ten days' notice of the time when the same will be opened, and such notice shall be published by beat of tom-tom.

2. After any such public market shall have been established and opened, no person shall, without a license granted by the board, publicly expose for sale any meet, poultry, fresh fish, fresh fruit, or vegetables in any place within the limits of the board other than the public market; and it shall be lawful for the inspector of the board to seize any such meet, poultry, fresh fish, fresh fruit, and vegetables exposed or hawked about for sale contrary to the provisions of this by-law, and to remove the same to the office of the board to be disposed of as may be ordered by the chairman or police magistrate or the president of a village tribunal.

3. All licenses referred to in the last preceding by-law shall be in the form in Schedule A annexed, and shall be in force for the period mentioned therein and no longer, which period shall not be more than twelve months or less than one month. Such licenses shall be paid for in advance at a rate not exceeding 50 cents for each month. Provided that it shall be lawful for the board at any time to cancel

any such license or licenses.

4. A table of the rents, tolls, and fees leviable at each market shall be printed in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil, and placed in a conspicuous place at each market, and it shall be unlawful for any person to demand or receive higher sums than those authorized by such notice.

5. The several rents, tolls, and fees payable in respect of a public market shall be paid in advance from time to time on demand to the board, or their lessee, or other

persons authorized by the board or their lessees to receive the same.

6. If any person liable to the payment of any rent, toll, or fee authorized as aforesaid does not pay the same when demanded, the board or any person authorized by the board to collect the same may levy the same by seizure and sale of all or any of the articles in the market belonging to or in the possession or custody of the person liable to pay such toll, rent, or fee.

7. No person shall hold, use, or occupy any stall in the public market without a license, which license shall be in the form in Schedule B annexed; nor shall be contravene any of the conditions of such license, and no person shall keep or expose for sale in any stall any article the keeping or sale of which therein shall have been

prohibited by the board by notice posted in the market.

8. No person shall sell or expose for sale in any fish market or stall any provi-

sions or things other than fresh fish.

9. No person shall sell or expose for sale in any vegetable or fruit market or stall any mest or fish, whether fresh or salted, or any cooked food, or any articles other than fresh fruit and vegetables.

10. No occupant of a stall shall enclose in any way any portion of a market or erect any awning or screen or fixture of any kind, nor shall he leave any goods in any market between the hours of 9 p.m. and 6 A.M., without having first obtained the sanction of the chairman.

11. Every occupant of a stall or seat in any market shall keep such stall or seat

clean and free from filth or rubbish.

No person affected with or suffering from any cutaneous, contagious, or infectious disease shall occupy any stall, seat, or place in any public market, or expose for sale thereat any provisions whatsoever.

12. No person using or occupying any public market shall—

 (a) Behave in a disorderly manner or commit any nuisance in or about such market.

(b) Carry on any cooking in any such market.

- (c) Remain in or loiter about such market after the place is closed for business at 9 r.m. without being able to give a satisfactory account of himself.
- (d) Damage or in anywise deface any portion of the buildings, stalls, lamps, or any property of the board in or about such market, or defile or pollute in any way the water provided for use in such market.
- 13. It shall be lawful for the inspector of the board, upon the seizure by him as unwholesome or unfit for human food of any meat, poultry, fish, game, flesh, vegetable, fruit, or other article of food introduced into or exposed for sale within the limits of the sanitary board, to convey the same to the medical officer of the station, or, in his absence, or if there be no such officer, to the magistrate, or in cases where there is no police court, to the president of a village tribunal; and if it appear to such medical officer, magistrate, or president that such meat, poultry, fish, vegetable, fruit, or other provisions are unfit for human food, he shall order the same to be destroyed or to be disposed of as to prevent it being exposed for sale or used for such food.

14. All public markets shall be open daily from 6 A.M. to 9 P.M., and it shall be the duty of the board to make provisions for the proper lighting of the market.

- 15. It shall be the duty of the market-keeper or of the lessee of the market to maintain order within the limits of the market, and every person who shall obstruct or resist any person appointed by the board to superintend any public market, or to collect the rents, tolls, or fees, or to enforce order or cleanliness therein whilst in the execution of his duty shall be guilty of an offence.
- 16. Whenever it shall appear to the board that the use or consumption by the public of any particular kinds of fish is injurious, or that during the prevalence of any pepidemic the use or consumption of any particular kind of fruit or vegetable is hurtful, it shall be lawful for the board, on the recommendation of the medical officer by beat of tom-tom or other sufficient notice, to prohibit for such time as to the

board shall appear necessary the sale of any such fish, fruit, or vegetable in any market or other place within the limits of the board, and after such notice to cause the same, whether exposed for sale or not, to be seized and destroyed in such manner as the board or chairman may direct.

17. No licensed butcher shall sell or keep for sale any meat or any portion of a slaughtered animal except in a public market and in the stall rented by him.

18. No cart or vehicle shall remain within any market premises for a longer

period than is necessary for loading or unloading.

19. Every person holding a license for a stall in a public market shall keep on or near such stall a receptacle to be approved by the chairman, in which such person shall deposit all rubbish and refuse matter.

No person shall throw any rubbish, refuse, bones, skins of animals, or other such thing in or upon any public market or its premises except into a receptacle

provided for such purpose.

21. Except as hereinafter provided no carease of any animal (or any portion thereof) not slaughtered at the public slaughter-house provided by the board shall be brought into a public or private market, or to any place specially licensed as provided in by-law 2 of this chapter, or sold or exposed for sale in any public or private market or in such specially licensed place. The provisions of this by-law shall not apply to frozen meat, game, or fish imported into the Island.

22. If any person having a license to hold or occupy a stall in any public market shall wilfully neglect or refuse to serve the public, without being able to assign a satisfactory reason during two consecutive days, it shall be lawful for the chairman

to suspend or revoke any such license.

#### Bakeries.

23. Every bakery shall be well ventilated and well lighted, and the walls thereof plastered with lime mortar and whitewashed, the floor cemented, and drainage sufficiently provided.

24. No bakery shall be within 30 feet of any cesspit, latrine, or open sewer, nor

in a position where bad odours wafted therefrom shall reach it

25. No place used as a bakery shall be used as a dwelling-place or for any other purpose whatsoever.

26. All utensils, furniture, and other requisites used in or belonging to a bakery

shall be kept clean.

27. The flour, water, and other materials used in the manufacture of bread shall be good and wholesome, and it shall be lawful for any person thereto authorized in writing by the chairman from time to time to demand and obtain samples thereof.

All refuse and dirt in and about the premises of a bakery shall be removed

without delay, and the drains kept well flushed.

29. No person suffering from any cutaneous, contagious, or infectious disease, or who has recently been in attendance on any such person, or who is otherwise unclean, shall be employed in a bakery.

It shall be lawful for the sanitary board, inspector, or other person authorized in writing by the chairman at any time to enter and inspect any bakery, provided there is some one on the premises.

## Eating-houses, Tea and Coffee Boutiques, and Dairies.

31. All eating-houses, tea and coffee boutiques, and dairies shall be kept clean and sanitary to the satisfaction of the chairman.

#### Washing Places.

32. It shall be lawful for the board by resolution from time to time to set apart for washing of horses, cattle, and clothes such places as it may deem proper, and the hours during which they may be used.

A list of the places so set apart shall be published in the Government Gazette in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil, and proclaimed within the limits of the board by beat of tom-tom, and copies of the list in the said three languages shall be kept affixed at the office.

34. No person shall wash horses, cattle, clothes, or mats at any public place within the town except at such places so set apart by the board for the purpose.

35. No person suffering from any cutaneous, infectious, or contagious disease shall wash clothes or any other article in any place set apart as hereinbefore provided for the purpose.

#### CHAPTER IV. SECTION 9 E (2) (h).

#### Protection of Fish and Fishing.

1. No person shall erect kraals for the purpose of taking fish in any lake, stream, or river except under a license from the chairman. Such license may be granted for a year or any shorter period at the discretion of the chariman, and shall be subject to the under-mentioned fees and to such conditions as the board may from time to time determine:--

Provided that it shall be lawful for the chairman at any time to cancel such license.

#### CHAPTER V. SECTION 9 E (2) (i).

#### Care of Waste or Public Lands.

1. No person shall remove any sand, earth, stone, or growing plants or trees from, or in any way alter or deface the surface of, any waste or public land without the authority of the chairman.

2. No horse, cattle, sheep, goats, or swine shall be tethered or grazed upon any public ground vested in the board without a license from the chairman. Such license may be granted for a year or any shorter period at the discretion of the chairman, and shall be subject to such fee as the board shall from time to time

appoint.

3. Any person thereto authorized in writing by the chairman may seize any horse, sheep, goat, or other animal which he may find tethered or grazing without such license as aforesaid on any public ground within the town. No animal so seized shall be released except upon payment of a fee of Re. I and the charges leviable for occupation of the pound if it has been so impounded.

4. Any animal seized and not claimed within ten days may be sold by public

auction.

5. The board may farm or let out the public grazing grounds or any part thereof for any period not exceeding twelve months on such conditions as to the board may seem fit.

#### CHAPTER VI. SECTION 9 E (2) (j).

#### For the putting up and preservation of Boundaries.. .

Every owner or occupier of any house, garden, building, or land within the town shall keep such house, garden, building, or land surrounded with a wall or good fence of not less than 4 feet in height from the level of the ground.

2. No live fence shall in future be erected within 3 feet from any public masonry

drain.

#### CHAPTER VII. SECTION 9 E (2) (k).

#### Public Bathing Places.

1. It shall be lawful for the sanitary board by resolution from time to time to set apart for public bathing such places as it may deem proper and to fix the hours during which they may be used.

No person shall resort to any other public place in the town for the purpose of bathing; and no person shall bathe at the places set apart except during the hours

determined by the board.

A list of places so set apart for public bathing shall be published in the Government Gazette in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil, and proclaimed within the limits of the board by beat of tom-tom.

4. Every well the water of which is used by the public upon payment for bathing purposes shall have a protecting wall of the height of not less than 3 feet, and be cemented outside the said wall for a depth of 2 feet below the surface of the ground.

5. The ground immediately surrounding every such well shall be sloped so as to

allow the water to run down into a built drain leading to a proper outlet.

6. It shall not be lawful to wash clothes, mats, or any other thing at or near any such well.

7. The tubs used for bathing at such well as aforesaid shall be painted at least once every year and daily cleansed.

8. No person suffering from any outaneous, infectious, or contagious disease shall bathe in any place set apart as hereinbefore provided for bathing, and no person shall allow any animal belonging to him or under his control to enter or remain in or upon or drink at any such place.

#### CHAPTER VIII. SECTION 9 E (2) (m) and (n).

#### Charges for Occupation of Pounds, &c.

1. All cattle, sheep, and goats straying on the public roads or paths within the town shall when seized be placed in the pound established by the board for the purpose, and the following charges shall be paid before removal of any animal so impounded :-

For seizure, Re. 1 per head.

For occupation, 25 cents per head for a day or part of a day. For food if supplied, 15 cents per head for a day or part of a day.

2. Any animal seized and not claimed within ten days may be sold by public auction, and the charges and costs recovered from the proceeds.

#### Doas.

3. All stray dogs shall be seized, and, if diseased, or suspected of disease, destroyed; otherwise they shall be impounded in a pound provided by the board, and a sum of 40 cents for the first day of detention and 15 cents for each succeeding day to meet the expenses incurred by the sanitary board shall be levied from the owner of the dog if he claims it and desires to remove it. Impounded dogs if not claimed within three days shall be destroyed,

#### CHAPTER IX. SECTION 9 E (2) (0).

It shall not be lawful for any person or persons to erect, re-erect, repair, add to, or enlarge any building, whether permanent or temporary, renew, or repair, or alter, or add to the frontage of any such building in any way, or to build any drain or bridge, platform, or structure over a drain, or any privy or cesspool without fourteen days' previous notice in writing to the chairman.

2. It shall not be lawful for any person to erect a house or hut for the purposes

of a dwelling place, or permit the same to be occupied as a dwelling-place within the limits of the board, except after fourteen days' previous notice in writing to the

chairman and under the following conditions:

The walls shall in no case be built of cadjan, but of mud and wattle or other suitable material, to allow of being properly plastered and whitewashed.

Every such house or hut or any room therein to be used for human habitation shall not be less than 120 superficial feet in area, and not less than 10 feet in height, and eaves at least 6 feet from the ground.

Every room to be used for human habitation shall have at least one door not less than 6 feet by 3 feet, and at least one window not less than 3 feet

by 2 feet.

The floor shall always be higher than 1 foot from the ground, provided the chairman shall be at liberty to require a higher standard according to situation. Between any two ranges or blocks of huts there shall be a clear space of at least 15 feet.

It shall be lawful for the chairman to cause any house or hut erected contrary to the provisions of this by-law to be taken down at the expense of the owner, if within one month after written notice to him to alter or take down the same he shall fail or neglect to do so.

## Chapter X. Section 9 E (2) (t). General Purposes of Conservancy.

All owners, tenants, or occupiers of lands within the limits of the sanitary board shall keep the same clean and free from all weeds or rank and noisome vegetation, as well as from all refuse and rubbish.

2. No person shall keep for the purpose of letting out or renting out the same any cattle shed or halting place for cattle within the limits of the town without a permit from the board. Such permit may impose such conditions as the chairman shall consider necessary for the preservation of public health; and the person keeping such cattle shed or halting place for cattle shall be bound to observe such conditions.

Any permit issued under this by-law shall be free of charge.

3. The owner or tenant of every livery stable, cattle stall, cattle halting place, or gala shall have the same covered with a tiled or iron roof and paved with brick stone, concrete cement, or asphalt, and provided with suitable paved or cemented drain for conveying the urine and washing into a covered receptacle, constructed in such manner as the chairman shall direct, the contents of which shall be daily removed at the expense of such owner or tenant and disposed of so that no nuisance is caused Every such stable, cattle stall, halting place, or gala shall be daily washed All dung and always kept clean, and whitewashed at least once in three months. and dry refuse shall be deposited daily by the owner or tenant of such stable, cattle stall, halting place, or gala in a proper receptacle outside, to be thence removed by the officers of the board.

Every owner or occupier of any place within the limits of the sanitary board used for a tannery, brick factory, lime kiln, and every owner or occupier of a cart stand, cattle yard, bakery, coach-building yard, or manfactory shall remove or cause to be removed from such premises twice in every twenty-four hours (between 6 A.M. and 8 A.M. and again between 4 P.M. and 6 r.M.) all filth, dirt, and rubbish, and deposit it in such places as the chairman may approve

5. Every cart stand, cattle yard, and sheep pen shall be paved and drained to the

satisfaction of the chairman.

6. All householders or other persons who are desirous that the dust, ashes, sweepings, rubbish, and other refuse from their premises should be removed by the scavengers of the board, shall deposit the same in proper boxes or other receptacles on the edge of the road outside their respective dwellings or shops daily between the hours of 6 A.M. and 8 A.M.; and it shall not be lawful for any person to place or caused to be placed such dust, ashes, sweepings, rubbish, or refuse in any street, unless the same shall be contained in boxes or other receptacles as aforesaid, nor after the hours specified; and every such person shall remove such boxes or other like receptacles within the space of half an hour after the same shall have been emptied

by the scavengers.

7. It shall be lawful for the chairman at any time to require the owner or occupier of any house, building, enclosure, or premises within the limits of the sanitary board, by notice in writing, to remove or cause to be removed the contents of any privy, pit, or water-closet in or belonging to such house, building, enclosure, or premises to such place or places and within such time as shall be set forth in the said notice. Should such owner or occupier fail to comply with the requirements of such notice within seven days from the time when such notice shall have been served on him, the chairman may cause the necessary work to be done, and for that purpose shall have power to enter into and upon any such house, out-house, building, enclosure, or premises, with such labourers, implements, and things as may be required; and the expenses incurred shall be recoverable as a debt due by the owner to the board.

- 8. Any person who shall bury or cause to be buried or deposit or cause to be deposited the contents of any latrine, privy, pit, or water-closet within any house, building, or premises, or in or on any land within 100 feet of any dwelling-house, well, stream, or water-course shall be guilty of an offence. Upon receiving notice he shall at once remove the same to such place and within such time as the chairman shall direct. In default of compliance with such notice within the time appointed, the chairman and any efficers or workmen authorized by him may enter upon such house, building, or premises and cause the necessary work to be done, and the expenses incurred thereby shall be paid by the person in default, and shall be ascertained and determined and recoverable as a debt due by the owner to the board.
- 9. The occupier of any house or premises within or upon which any cattle, horse, sheep, goat, or pig may die, shall within four hours after its death, or if death occurs at night, within four hours after daylight, either remove the carease at his own expenses to such place as may be appointed by the chairman for that purpose, or report its death to the inspector of the board, and in such latter case shall pay to the board the expense of removing or burying the carease at such rate as the chairman shall determine

All latrines shall be conducted on the dry-earth system, and each householder or landlord who owns or makes use of such a latrine shall pay to the board a sum of Paul nor month for each bucket to most the cost of conserverey.

Re. I per month for each bucket to meet the cost of conservancy.

10. Whenever any tree, or branch, or fruit of a tree within the limits of the sanitary board shall be deemed after inspection by the chairman to be likely to fall upon any house or building and injure the occupiers thereof, or whenever the same shall overhang any street, it shall be lawful for the chairman to cause notice in writing to be given to the owner or to the occupier of the ground upon which such tree stands to cut down or remove the said tree or branch or fruit; and if such owner or occupier shall not cut down or remove the same within twenty-four hours after such notice, the chairman and any officers or workmen authorized by him in writing may enter upon such ground and cause the work to be done, and the expenses thereby incurred shall be paid by such owner or occupier, and shall be ascertained and determined and recoverable as a debt due by the owner to the board.

#### REGULATION REFERRED TO.

1. (a) Every person importing horses, asses, or mules into the Island from oversea ports shall whenever possible give at least twenty-four hours' notice of the arrival of such animals to the principal officer of Customs, and shall produce a certificate of inspection by a qualified veterinary surgeon describing such animals and certifying that they were free from disease immediately before shipment.

(b) Upon receipt of the said notice the principal officer of Customs shall cause such animals to be inspected by a duly authorized veterinary inspector.

(c) The veterinary inspector shall report the result of his inspection in writing to the principal officer of Customs, and if the certificate referred to in (a) above has been produced, may at the same time in his discretion, by a writing under his hand, authorize the discharge of the said animals from the ship.

authorize the discharge of the said animals from the ship.

(d) The principal officer of Customs may after perusal of the inspector's report authorize the removal from the Customs premises of any such animals.

(e) Any person discharging or causing the discharge of such animals from the ship without the authority of the inspector as provided in (c), or removing or causing the removal of such animals from the Customs premises without the permission of the principal officer of Customs as provided in (d), shall be guilty of an offence.

#### CEYLON CHAMBER OF COMMERCE.

#### Examinations for Commercial Certificates.

TITH the object of fixing a standard for Commercial Education in Ceylon, the Chamber of Commerce will, in conjunction with the Department of Public Instruction, hold annual examinations, on the results of which certificates will be awarded to the successful candidates. A register of successful candidates will be kept by the Chamber of Commerce, and the Chamber will interest itself in assisting them to obtain suitable employments.

2. Candidates for these examinations must conform to the following regulations:—(a) They must be not under fourteen and not over twenty-one years of age on the last day of the month immediately preceding that fixed for the examination; (b) they must for eight months preceding the date of examination have been attending the Commercial Class of a school, which has previously satisfied the Director of Public Instruction as providing suitable instruction in commercial subjects.
3. The next examination will be held in July, 1912, and the subjects will be as follows:

Compulsory Subjects.

(1) Handwriting, Orthography, and Dictation.

(2) Reading. (3) English Composition.

(4) Arithmetic.

(5) Ordinary Commercial Terms.

(6) Précis and Indexing.

Optional Subjects.

(7) Shorthand and Typewriting.

(8) Office Routine and Bookkeeping.

(9) Commercial Geography and Shipping.

(10) Advanced Arithmetic.

In order to obtain a certificate, candidates must satisfy the examiners in all the compulsory subjects and in one of the three groups (7), (8), and (9). All the subjects in which a candidate passes will be noted on his certificate.

4. The approximate range of the various subjects and the standards of knowledge required in each are as follows:—

Handwriting, Orthography, and Dictation.—In handwriting the chief requirements are legibility of writing, and uniformity of size and slope. The ideal business handwriting is such as that set out in Blackie's Commercial Course of Copy Books. Writing should not be angular or floresque.

The handwriting of the candidates will be tested in general by their writing in the various papers, and in particular

by special tests, such as addressing envelopes, copying a draft letter, or writing from dictation. The spelling of the candidates will be judged from their general work and from a special test involving words of ordinary difficulty. In dictation the chief requirements are accuracy and correct punctuation.

Reading.—The essentials in reading are clear and distinct enunciation of each word, observation of necessary pauses according to punctuation, and faculty of making clear the meaning of each sentence. Questions will be put on the meaning

of the passage read.

English Composition.—Candidates will be tested in the following ways:—(a) Writing a letter on a given business subject, the headings of which will be supplied; (b) re-writing in proper form and in correct phraseology a badly drafted letter; (c) correcting faulty or incorrect sentences. In this paper special attention will be paid to English Grammar.

Arithmetic.—Tots, simple and compound, long and cross. Weights and Measures. Vulgar Fractions and Decimals.

Proportion, simple and compound. Practice, simple and compound. Interest, simple and compound.

Frachence. Special attention should be paid to methods of working and setting out of work.

Exchange. Special attention should be paid to methods of working and setting out of work.

Commercial Terms and Abbreviations.—A good knowledge of the terms and abbreviations ordinarily used in business. Lists of such terms and abbreviations may be found in almost any Manual of Commercial Correspondence, such as Pitman's or Routledge's.

Précis and Indexing.—Candidates will be required to make both a précis and an index of a series of business letters,

all relating to the same subject.

The object of a précis is to present in a consecutive narrative all the principal points of the correspondence, leaving out all unimportant details, and making the narrative as concise as possible, without sacrificing completeness and lucidity.

The object of an index is to present in separate sections, chronologically arranged, a brief resumé of each letter, giving number, date, name of writer, and substance of each letter in separate columns, so as to enable the particulars of

any of the letters to be obtained without turning up the original document.

Shorthand.—Pitman's system as set out in the Manual and Reporter. Writing in shorthand from dictation at the rate of eighty words per minute. Transcribing accurately from shorthand into longhand at the rate of ten words per minute. Marks will be awarded for good shorthand outlines.

Typewriting.—Typing from manuscript copy, and setting out in proper form draft letters, tabular statements, or commercial documents. Special attention must be paid to accuracy, correct spelling, proper punctuation, and other commercial documents.

paragraphing. Any candidate desiring to use his own machine may do so.

Office Routing.—Good knowledge of the methods in which business transactions should be entered up and treated. Use of ordinary office forms, such as invoices, order forms, bespatch notes, forward notes, debit notes, credit notes, statements of account, account sales, accounts current, and similar forms. Use of documents, such as receipt forms, vouchers, cheques, paying in slips, bankers' drafts, bills of exchange, foreign bills, money orders, postal orders, I. O. Us. Treatment of correspondence, inward and outward. Letter register. Indexing, docketing, filing (various systems). Range of knowledge similar to that set out in Hooper and Graham's Business Manual or Blackie's Office Routine.

Bookkeeping.—Sound knowledge of the practice of modern bookkeeping by double entry. The system to be employed is that commonly known as the English system, in which the following subdivisions of books are employed:—Cash The system to be book, invoice book, day book, bought ledger, sales ledger, private ledger, bills receivable and bills payable books. Treatment by above system of discounts, interest, loans, mortgages, rents, dividends, bad debts, depreciation, plant fixtures, machinery, property, wages, salaries, consignment and commission accounts, joint accounts, partnership accounts, fixed

and floating assets, trading and profit and loss accounts, profit appropriation accounts, and balance sheets.

Commercial Geography.—General knowledge of Asia and Australia, paying special attention to their products, trade, and commerce. Special knowledge of India and Ceylon in regard to their products, commerce, lines of communication, and trade routes with other countries. Special attention must be paid to the produce areas and particular trade centres,

also to the rivers and railways of Ceylon and India.

Shipping.—A good knowledge of the more important steamship lines trading with Ceylon. Knowledge of procedure adopted in shipping various kinds of articles, such as live stock, goods, explosives, &c., import and export. Knowledge of Customs procedure and use of documents, such as advice note, mate's receipt, insurance slip, bill of lading, Customs specification, certificate of origin, delivery order, Customs entry forms, landing order, warehousing form, bill of sight, weight note, manifests, and similar forms. Range of knowledge such as that set out in Hooper and Graham's Manual of Import and Export Trade.

#### VITAL STATISTICS.

#### Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended October 7, 1911

Births.—The total births registered were 84 (1 European, 6 Burghers, 48 Sinhalese, 10 Tamils, 12 Moors, 4 Malays, and 3 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on July 1,1911, viz., 213,825) was 20.5, as in the preceding week, against 21.8 in the corresponding week of last year, and 25.6 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 132 (2 Europeans, 8 Burghers, 65 Sinhalese, 33 Tamils, 17 Moors, 3 Malays, and 4 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 32.2, as against 32.9 in the previous week, 21.8 in the corresponding week of last year, and 31.2 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 132 total deaths, 30 were of infants under one year of age, as against 22 in the preceding week and in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 27 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 7.

Selected Causes of Death.—As many as 20 deaths were registered from Pneumonia (against 15 in the previous week, and 12 the weekly average for last year), of which 5 were in New Bazaār, 4 each in St. Paul's and Kotahena, 3 in Maradana hospitals, 2 in Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), and 1 each in Fort and Galle Face and Pettah. Six deaths were registered from Bronchitis.

- 2. Thirteen deaths were registered from Phthisis (minst 18 in the previous week and 13 the weekly average for last year), of which 3 each were in Maradana hospitals and Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), 2 in St. Paul's, and 1 each in San Sebastian, New Bazaar, Slave Island, Kollupitiya North, and Kollupitiya South.
- 3. Eleven deaths were registered from Enteric Fever (against 12 in the previous week and 5 the weekly average for last year), of which 3 were in St. Paul's, 2 each in Pettah and Slave Island, and 1 in each Kotahena, Maradana hospitals, Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), and Kollupitiya South. There were 27 cases reported during the week, against 37 in the previous week.
- 4. Fifteen deaths were registered from Enteritis (including 2 infants), 12 Infantile Convulsions, 8 Sentity, 5 Tetanus (3 infants), 5 Dysentery, 4 Worms (1 infant), 4 Debility (1 infant), 2 each from Anchylostomiasis, Paralysis, and Cirrhosis of the Liver, and 22 from Other Causes.
- 5. One death was registered from Cholera in the Infectious Diseases hospital, Kanatta, a Dutchman of ss. Koningen-der-Nederlander en route from Batavia, where the infection was contracted. Last week the death of an officer of that ship from the same disease was recorded.
- 6. Six cases of Measles were reported during the week, against 9 in the previous week; and 2 of Chickenpox, against 8 in the previous week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 80.8°, against 82.4° in the preceding week and 80.8° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.855 in., against 29.821 in. in the preceding week and 29.955 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 2.61 in., against 0.09 in. in the preceding week and 0.37 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.
