WHEREAS His Excellency the Governor, in pursuance of section 9 of the Poisons Ordinance, No. 11 of 1901, has amended regulation No. 12 of the regulations dated November 10, 1908, by substituting the words "regulation 11" for "regulation 10," and the said amendment was published in the English, Sinhalese, and Tamil languages in two successive issues of the Government Gazette, to wit, the issue of July 28 and August 4, 1911, and was duly laid before the Legislative Council:

And whereas the said amendment was not objected to by the said Legislative Council then in session within forty days of its being so laid before the said Council:

Now know Ye that We, the Officer Administering the Government, in exercise of the power vested in Us by sub-section (3) of section 10 of the said Ordinance, do hereby proclaim the said amended regulation No. 12 as set forth below...

Given at Jaffna, in the said Island of Ceylon, this Eighteenth day of October in the year of our Lord One thousand Nine hundred and Eleven.

THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL ORDINANCE, No. 13 of 1910.

IT is hereby notified for public information that His Excellency the Officer Administering the Government, in exercise of the powers vested in him by section 17 of the above-named Ordinance, has been pleased to appoint Thursday, November 16, 1911, as a convenient day, and the Council Chamber, Colombo, as a convenient place for the election of Members for the Electorates specified in section 3 of the said Ordinance, viz.:—

WHEREAS by a notice dated March 31, 1911, and published in Government Gazette No. 6,434 of April 7, 1911, under section 6 (1) of Ordinance No. 25 of 1909, the villages of Horagala, Panagala, Panakaduwa, Ampanagala, Mawarala, Ehelakanda, Beralapanatara, and Kiripitiya were established to be "protective zones":

And whereas it is expedient to rescind the said "protective zones":

It is hereby ordered by His Excellency the Officer Administering the Government in Executive Council, in virtue of the powers in him vested by section 6 (4) of the said Ordinance, that the aforesaid "protective zones" be rescinded.

OFICE is hereby given that an examination for candidates wishing to enter the Third Class of the Clerical Branch of the Public Service will take place on Wednesday, January 3, 1912, and following days.

- 2. Applications for admission to the examination by persons not now in the Public Service must be addressed to the Director of Public Instruction, must bear a duly cancelled stamp of Rs. 10, and must be in the form (Schedule A) attached to this notice. Forms are to be obtained at any Post Office on application, or within four days' notice. A certificate of the registration of the candidate's birth showing him to be on January 3, 1912, between the ages of 18 and 21, and a certificate of good character signed by a responsible person,* to the satisfaction of the Director of Public Instruction, must be attached to the form of application. If a certificate of birth for a previous examination was sent in, reference may be made to it by mentioning name and date of examination. Affidavits will in no circumstances be accepted. In the case of candidates who submit certificates of registration in the register of past birth, the certificates will only be accepted after consideration of the evidence by which the dates of birth were established. If the name appearing in the birth register differs, either by alteration or addition, from the name by which the candidate is known, the parent or guardian should, before obtaining a certificate, apply to the Registrar-General or his Assistant for such alteration in the manner set forth in section 7 of Ordinance No. 23 of 1900.
- 3. Clerks in Government service, from whatever funds they may be paid, who have completed three years' satisfactory service, and are not members of the Customs, Postal, Survey, or Railway Departments, and those clerks employed by Provincial and District Road Committees whose appointments date prior to July 1, 1875, are eligible for examination irrespective of age and without fee. Their applications (in the same form, Schedule A) for admission to the examination should be forwarded to the Director of Public Instruction through the Heads of their Departments.
- 4. Applications are to reach the Director of Public Instruction not later than 2 r.m. on Monday, November 27, 1911; any applications received after that hour, by whatever cause delayed, will be absolutely rejected.
- 5. The Director of Public Instruction will return to the candidate his application, approved or disapproved as the case may be, after taking, if necessary, the orders of Government thereon. The approved application shall constitute the candidate's ticket of admission to the examination. Candidates presenting themselves for examination must produce to the officer appointed to supervise the examination their forms of application approved by the Director of Public Instruction. A candidate not producing such form, whatever may be the reason for his not so doing, will be refused admittance to the examination.
- 6. The examination will be held at Colombo only, in the place and under the supervision of the officer specified in Schedule B. Heads of Departments are required to grant to officers of their Departments, whose applications to present themselves for examination have been returned to them approved by the Director of Public Instruction, leave to present themselves at the examination.
 - 7. The examination will be competitive. The number of places assigned for competition will be forty.
- 8. The successful candidates will be required to pass a medical examination as to their physical fitness for service in any part of the Island.
- 9. The subjects for examination are those set out in Schedule C to this notice. The examination shall be held in two parts. The first part a qualifying examination in Handwriting, Spelling, Arithmetic, and Bookkeeping. Any candidate failing to obtain two-thirds of the marks allotted for Handwriting, half those allowed for Spelling and Arithmetic respectively, and one-third of those allowed for Bookkeeping shall be excluded from the remainder of the examination. Special attention will be paid to Handwriting, and candidates whose writing is untidy or illegible or contains defects in the formation of letters will be rigorously excluded. The kind of writing preferred will be that generally shown as the "Civil Service" hand. The second part of the examination shall be in the remaining subjects in Schedule C. Should a candidate obtain less than one-third of the aggregate marks for the three subjects—Composition, General Paper, Précis Writing—or less than one-fourth marks in any other subject, or if he be a Sinhalese or Tamil, less than one-half of the marks in his native language, such marks shall not be counted in his favour. In all the written papers marks will be deducted for bad writing and mistakes in spelling.
- 10. Clerks of the description given in section 3 above, who have served Government continuously for over six years, will be allowed to compete amongst themselves, and will be eligible, if they obtain a minimum of 66 per cent. in Writing and 33 per cent. in the other compulsory subjects, for nine of the appointments offered for competition. Four of the appointments will be reserved as prizes for deserving clerks of the same description, who have served Government continuously for ten years and upwards, to be selected irrespective of examination. No service under the age of sixteen years will be reckoned for this purpose.

THE CEYLON RAILWAYS OBDINANCE, No. 9 of 1902.

I is hereby notified that His Excellency the Officer Administering the Government, in exercise of the power vested in him by section 5 of the above-mentioned Ordinance, and with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to make the following amended rule, in substitution for rule 7 (e) of the rules relating to the conveyance of traffic by passenger trains published by Notification dated October 11, 1907, and published in Government Gazette on October 11, 1907, with effect from November 1, 1911:—

(e) Passengers must claim their lüggage on arrival of train at destination station, and when numbered receipts have been granted, such receipts must be given up before delivery of luggage.

In the event of the loss of the receipt, the person claiming the luggage must prove

ownership and sign an Indemnity Note.

In the event of luggage not arriving at destination station by the same train as a passenger, the circumstances must be reported immediately to the Station Master, the luggage receipt being produced at the same time for the Station Master's inspection, and a full description of each missing package given. A full list of contents and value thereof must be submitted at the same time, or within twenty-four hours thereafter, otherwise no subsequent claim will be entertained.

SIR,—I HAVE the honour to transmit copies of His Majesty's Proclamatics of Neutrality on the occasion of thewar between Italy and Turkey, together with a copy of a letter from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs embodying rules which His Majesty has directed to be observed during the continuance of the present state of war, and I have to request that you will cause both documents to be immediately published throughout the Colony under your government, and that you will not fail to conform to His Majesty's commands.

By the King.—A Proclamation.

GEORGE, R. I.

Whereas we are happily at peace with all Sovereigns, Powers, and States:

And whereas a state of war unhappily exists between His Majesty the King of Italy and His Imperial Majesty the Sultan of Turkey, and between their respective subjects and others inhabiting within their countries, territories, or

And whereas We are on terms of friendship and amicable intercourse with each of these powers, and with their

several subjects and others inhabiting within their countries, territories, or dominions:

And whereas great numbers of Our loyal subjects reside and carry on commerce, and possess property and establishments, and enjoy various rights and privileges, within the dominions of each of the aforesaid powers, protected by the faith of treaties between Us and each of the aforesaid powers:

And whereas We, being desirous of preserving to Our subjects the blessings of peace which they now happily enjoy, are firmly purposed and determined to maintain a strict and impartial neutrality in the said state of wer unhappily existing between the aforesaid powers:

We, therefore, have thought fit, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, to issue this Our Royal Proclamation.

And We do hereby strictly charge and command all Our loving subjects to govern themselves accordingly, and to observe a strict neutrality in and during the aforesaid war, and to abstain from violating or contravening either the laws and statutes of the realm in this behalf, or the law of nations in relation thereto, as they will answer to the contrary at their peril:

And whereas in and by a certain Statute made and passed in a Session of Parliament holden in the 33rd and 34th year of the reign of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act to Regulate the conduct of Her Majesty's Subjects during the existence of Hostilities between Foreign States with which Her Majesty is at Peace," it is, among other things, declared and enacted as follows :-

"This Act shall extend to all the dominions of Her Majesty, including the adjacent territorial waters."

٠.

Illegal Enlistment.

"If any person, without the license of Her Majesty, being a British subject, within or without Her Majesty's dominions, accepts or agrees to accept any commission or engagement in the military or naval service of any foreign state at war with any foreign state at peace with Her Majesty, and in this Act referred to as a friendly state, or whether a British subject or not, within Her Majesty's dominions, induces any other person to accept or agree to accept any commission or engagement in the military or naval service of any such foreign state as aforesaid,—

"He shall be guilty of an offence against this Act, and shall be punishable by fine and imprisonment, or either of such punishments, at the discretion of the court before which the offender is convicted and imprisonment, if awarded, may be either with or without hard labour.

"If any person, without the license of Her Majesty, being a British subject, quits or goes on board any ship with a view of quitting Her Majesty's dominions, with intent to accept any commission or engagement in the military or naval service of any foreign state at war with a friendly state, or, whether a British subject or not, within Her Majesty's dominions, induces any other person to quit or to go on board any ship with a view of quitting Her Majesty's dominions with the like

"He shall be guilty of an offence gainst this Act, and shall be punishable by fine and imprisonment, or either of such punishments, at the discretion of the court before which the offender is convicted; and imprison-"ment, if awarded, may be either with or without hard labour.

"If any person induces any other person to quit Her Majesty's dominions or to embark on any ship within Her Majesty's dominions under a misrepresentation or false representation of the service in which such person is to be engaged, with the intent or in order that such person may accept or agree to accept any commission or engagement in the military or naval service of any foreign state at war with a friendly state,-

"He shall be guilty of an offence against this Act, and shall be punishable by fine and imprisonment, or either of such punishments, at the discretion of the court before which the offender is convicted; and imprisonment, if awarded, may be with or without hard labour.

"If the master or owner of any ship, without the license of Her Majesty, knowingly either takes on board, or engages to take on board, or has on board such ship within Her Majesty's dominions any of the following persons, in this Act referred to as illegally enlisted persons, that is to say,

"(1) Any person who, being a British subject within or without the dominions of Har Majesty, has, without the dicense of Her Majesty, accepted or agreed to accept any commission or engagement in the military or navel conviction of any foreign state of the state of or naval service of any foreign state at war with any friendly state

"(2) Any person, being a British subject, who, without the license of Har Majesty, is about to quit Her Majesty's dominions with intent to accept any commission or engagement in the military or naval service of any foreign state at war with a friendly state:

"(3) Any person who has been induced to embark under a misrepresentation or false representation of the service in which such person is to be engaged, with the intent or in order that such person may accept or agree to accept any commission or engagement in the military or naval service of any foreign state at war with a friendly state:

"Such master or owner shall be guilty of an offence against the Act, and the following consequences shall ensue, that is to say,

"(1) The offender shall be punishable by fine and imprisonment, or either of such punishments, at the discretion of the court before which the offender is convicted; and imprisonment, if awarded, may be either with or without hard labour pand

"(2) Such ship shall be described until the trial and conviction or acquittal of the master or owner, and until all penalties inflicted on the master or owner have been paid, or the master or owner has given security for the payment of such penalties to the satisfaction of two Justices of the Peace, or other Magistrate or

Magistrates having the authority of two Justices of the Peace; and

"(3) All illegally enlisted persons shall immediately on the discovery of the offence be taken on shore, and shall not be allowed to return to the ship.

Illegal Shipbuilding and Illegal Expeditions.

: "If any person within Her Majesty's dominions, without the license of Her Majesty, does any of the following acts, that is to saw.

"(1) Builds or agrees to build, or causes to be built, any ship with intent or knowledge, or having reasonable cause to believe that the same shall or will be employed in the military or naval service of any foreign state at war with any friendly state; or

"(2) Issues or delivers any commission for any ship with intent or konwledge, or having reasonable cause to believe that the same shall or will be employed in the military or naval service of any foreign state at war with any friendly state; or

"(3) Equips any ship with intent or knowledge, or having reasonable cause to believe that the same shall or will be employed in the military or naval service of any or eign state at war with any friendly state; or

"(4) Despatches, or causes or allows to be despatched, any ship with intent or knowledge, or having reasonable cause to believe that the same shall or will be employed in the military or naval service of any foreign state at war with any friendly state:

"Such person shall be deemed to have committed an offence against this Act, and the following consequences shall ensue:

"(1) The offender shall be punishable by fine and imprisonment, or either of such punishments, at the discretion of the court before which the offender is convicted; and imprisonment, if awarded, may be either with or without hard labour.

"(2) The ship in respect of which any such offence is committed, and her equipment, shall be forfeited to Her Majesty:

- "Provided that a person building, causing to be built, or equipping a ship in any of the cases aforesaid, in pursuance of a contract made before the commencement of such war as aforesaid, shall not be liable to any of the penalties imposed by this section in respect of such building or equipping if he satisfies the conditions following (that is to say):—
 - "(1) If forthwith upon a proclamation of neutrality being issued by Her Majesty he gives notice to the Secretary of State that he is so building, causing to be built, or equipping such ship, and furnishes such particulars of the contract and of any matters relating to, or done, or to be done under the contract as may be required by the Secretary of State:

"(2) If he gives such security, and takes and permits to be taken such other measures, if any, as the Secretary of State may prescribe for ensuring that such ship shall not be despatched, delivered, or removed without the license of Her Majesty until the termination of such war as aforesaid.

"Where any ship is built by order of or on behalf of any foreign state when at war with a friendly state, or is delivered to or to the order of such foreign state, or any person who to the knowledge of the person building is an agent of such foreign state, or is paid for by such foreign state or such agent, and is employed in the military or naval service of such foreign state, such ship shall, until the contrary is proved, be deemed to have been built with a view to being so employed, and the burden shall lie on the builder of such ship of proving that he did not know that the ship was intended to be so employed in the military or naval service of such foreign state.

"If any person within the dominions of Her Majesty, and without the license of Her Majesty,-

- "By adding to the number of the guns, or by changing those on board for other guns, or by the addition of any equipment for war, increases or augments, or procures to be increased or augmented, or is knowingly concerned in increasing or augmenting the warlike force of any ship which at the time of her being within the dominions of Her Majesty was a ship in the military or naval service of any foreign state at war with any friendly state,—
 - "Such person shall be guilty of an offence against this Act, and shall be punishable by fine and imprisonment, or either of such punishments, at the discretion of the court before which the offender is convicted; and imprisonment, if awarded, may be either with or without hard labour.

"If any person within the limits of Her Majesty's dominions, and without the license of Her Majesty,

"Prepares or fits out any naval or military expedition to proceed against the dominions of any friendly state, the following consequences shall ensue:—

"(1) Every person engaged in such preparation or fitting out, or assisting therein, or employed in any capacity in such expedition, shall be guilty of an offence against this Act, and shall be punishable by fine and imprisonment, or either of such punishments, at the discretion of the court before which the offender is convicted; and imprisonment, if awarded, may be either with or without hard labour.

"(2) All ships, and their equipments, and all arms and munitions of war, used in or forming part of such

expedition, shall be forfeited to Her Majesty.

"Any person who aids, abets, counsels, or procures the commission of any offence against this Act shall be liable to be tried and punished as a principal offender."

And whereas by the said Act it is further provided that ships built, commissioned, equipped, or despatched in contravention of the said Act may be condemned and forfeited by judgment of the Court of Admiralty; and that if the Secretary of State or Chief Executive Authority is satisfied that there is a reasonable and probable cause for believing that a ship within Our dominions has been or is being built, commissioned, or equipped contrary to the said Act, and is about to be taken beyond the limits of such dominions, or that a ship is about to be despatched contrary to the Act, such Secretary of State or Chief Executive Authority shall have power to issue a warrant authorizing the seizure and search of such ship, and her detention until she has been either condemned or released by process of law. And whereas certain powers of seizure and detention are conferred by the said Act on certain local authorities:

Now, in order that more of Our subjects may unwarily render themselves liable to the penalties imposed by the said Statute, We do hereby strictly command that no person or persons whatsoever do commit any act, matter, or thing whatsoever contrary to the provisions of the said Statute, upon pain of the several penalties by the said Statute imposed and

of Our high displeasure.

And We do hereby further warn and admonish all Our leving subjects, and all persons whatsoever entitled to Our protection, to observe towards each of the aforesaid Powers, their subjects, and territories, and towards all belligerents whatsoever with whom We are at Peace, the duties of neutrality; and to respect, in all and each of them, the exercise of belligerent rights.

And We hereby further warn all Our loving subjects, and all persons whatsoever entitled to Our protection, that if any of them shall presume, in contempt of this Our Royal Proclamation, to do any acts in derogation of their duty as subjects of a neutral power in a war between other powers, or in violation or contravention of the law of nations in that behalf, all persons so offending will rightfully incur and be justly liable to the penalties denounced by such law.

And We do hereby give notice that all Our subjects and persons entitled to Our protection who may misconduct themselves in the premises will do so at their peril, and of their own wrong; and that they will in nowise obtain any protec-

tion from Us against such penalties as aforesaid.

Given at Our Court at Balmoral, this Third day of October, in the year of our Lord One thousand Nine hundred and Eleven, and in the second year of Our reign.

GOD SAVE THE KING.

The Right Honourable Sir Edward Grey to the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty.*

Foreign Office, October 3, 1911.

My Lords,—His Majesty being fully determined to observe the duties of neutrality during the existing state of war between Italy and Turkey; being, moreover, resolved to prevent, as far as possible, the use of His Majesty's harbours, ports, and coasts, and the waters within His Majesty's territorial jurisdiction, in aid of the warlike purposes of either belligerent, has commanded me to communicate to Your Lagdships, for your guidance, the following rules, which are to be treated and enforced as His Majesty's orders and directions:—

Rule 1.—During the continuance of the present state of war, all ships of war of either belligerent are prohibited from making use of any port or roadstead in the United Kingdom, the Isle of Man, or the Channel Islands, or in any of His Majesty's Colonies or foreign possessions or dependencies, or of any waters subject to the territorial jurisdiction of the British Crown, as a station or place of resort for any warlike purpose, or for the purpose of obtaining any facilities for warlike equipment; and no ship of war of either belligerent shall hereafter be permitted to leave any such port, roadstead, or waters from which any vessel of the other belligerent (whether the same shall be a ship of war or a merchant ship) shall have previously departed until after the expiration of at least twenty-four hours from the departure of such last-mentioned vessel beyond the territorial jurisdiction of His Majesty.

Rule 2.3-If there is now in any such port, roadstead, or waters subject to the territorial jurisdiction of the British Crown any ship of war of either belligerent, such ship of war shall leave such port, roadstead, or waters within such time not less than twenty-four hours as shall be reasonable, having regard to all the circumstances and the condition of such ship as to repairs, provisions, or things necessary for the subsistence of her erew; and if after the date hereof any ship of war of either belligerent shall enter any such port, roadstead, or waters, subject to the territorial jurisdiction of the British Crown, such ship shall depart and put to sea within twenty-four hours after her entrance into any such port, roadstead, or waters, except in case of stress of weather, or of her requiring provisions or things necessray for the subsistence of her crew, or repairs; in either of which cases the authorities of the port, or of the nearest port (as the case may be), shall require her to put to sea as soon as possible after the expiration of such period of twenty-four hours, without permitting her to take in supplies beyond what may be necessary for her immediate use; and no such vessel which may have been allowed to remain within British waters for the purpose of repairs shall continue in any such port, roadstead, or waters for a longer period than twenty-four hours after her necessary repairs shall have been completed. Provided, nevertheless, that in all cases in which there shall be any vessels (whether ships of war or merchant ships) of both the said belligerent parties in the same port, readstead, or waters within the territorial jurisdiction of His Majesty, there shall be an interval of not less than twentyfour hours between the departure therefrom of any such vessel (whether a ship of war or merchant ship) of the one belligerenk and the subsequent departure therefrom of any ship of war of the other belligerent; and the time hereby limited for the departure of such ships of war respectively shall always, in case of necessity, be extended so far as may be requisite for giving effect to this proviso, but no further or otherwise.

Rule 3.—No ship of war of either beligerent shall hereafter be permitted, while in any such port, roadstead, or waters subject to the territorial jurisdiction of His Majesty, to take in any supplies, except provisions and such other things as may be requisite for the subsistence of her crew, and except so much coal only as may be sufficient to carry such vessel to the nearest port of her own country, or to some nearer named neutral destination, and no coal shall again be supplied to any such ship of war in the same or any other port, roadstead, or waters subject to the territorial jurisdiction of His Majesty, without special permission, until after the expiration of three months from the time when such coal may have been last supplied to her within British waters as aforesaid.

Rule 4.—Armed ships of either belligerent are interdicted from carrying prizes made by them into the ports, harbours, roadsteads, or waters of the United Kingdom, the Isle of Man, the Channel Islands, or any of His Majesty's Colonies or possessions abroad.

The Governor or other chief authority of each of His Majesty's territories or possessions beyond the seas shall forthwith notify and publish the above rules.

A Silver Challenge Cup, value £10 10s., presented by the Right Hon. the Earl of Meath, K.P., to be held by the school, and a prize of £3 3s., given by the League of the Empire, is offered for competition to pupils attending all Elementary Schools throughout the Empire. The Essay must not exceed 1,000 words. Age-limit: under 14 years of age on January 1, 1912.

CONDITIONS.

- 1. All essays must be certified by the teacher, parent, or guardian of a child in the following terms:—
- "I certify that this essay is the unaided composition of the boy or girl in whose name it is sent in."

(Signed): Teacher, Parent, or Guardian.

Note.—This declaration is not intended to preclude a teacher from answering any reasonable requests for information, or from indicating books where such information may be found; but an essay must not be a mere reproduction of a lesson given in class.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended October 21, 1911.

Births.—The total births registered were 87 (0 Europeans, 10 Burghers, 47 Sinhalese, 8 Tamils, 16 Moors, 5 Malays, and 1 Other). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on July 1, 1911, viz., 213,825) was 21.2, as against 23.4 in the preceding week, 25.8 in the corresponding week of last year, and 25.6 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 137 (3 Europeans, 7 Burghers, 58 Sinhalese, 35 Tamils, 25 Moors, 4 Malays, and 5 Others). The death-rate pers1,000 per annum was 33.4, as against 32.2 in the previous week, 26.5 in the corresponding week of last year, and 31.2 the weekly average for last year. Injuntile Deaths.—Of the 137 total deaths, 25 were of infants under one year of age, as against 27 in the preceding week, 26 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 27 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 5.

Selected Causes of Death.—16 deaths were registered from Pneumonia (against 19 in the previous week and 12 the weekly average for last year), of which 3 each were in Pettah, Kotahena, and Maradana hospitals, 2 each in New Bazaar, Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), and Kollupitiya South, and 1 in St. Paul's. Seven deaths were registered from Bronchitis.

2. Eleven deaths were registered from *Phthisis* (against 10 in the previous week and 13 the weekly average for last year), of which 3 were in Maradana hospitals, 2 in St. Sebastian, and 1 each in Pettah, St. Paul's, Kotahena, New Bazaar, Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), and Kollupitive South.

Bazaar, Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), and Kollupitiya South.

3. Six deaths were registered from Enteric Fever (against 18 in the previous week and 5 the weekly average for last year), of which 2 each were in Maradana hospitals and Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), and 1 each in Pettah and Kollupitiya North. There were 28 cases reported during the week, against 29 in the previous week.

4. Fourteen deaths were registered from Enteritis (including 2 infants), 9 Infantile Convulsions, 6 Senility, 5 Debility (2 infants), 5 Anchylostomiasis, 4 Tetanus (all infants), 4 Diarrhæa (2 infants), 4 Dysentery, 3 each from Worms, Cerebral Hæmorrhage, Puerperal Septicæmia, and Ulcer, and 34 from Other Causes.

5. Four cases of *Measles* were reported, against 6 in the previous week; and 7 of *Chickenpox*, against 10 in the previous week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 79.5°, against 80.9° in the preceding week and 79.2° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.846 in., against 29.870 in. in the preceding week and 29.966 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 1.63 in., against 4.78 in. in the preceding week and 5.16 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.
