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**VITAL STATISTICS OF CEYLON.**

REPORT OF THE REGISTRAR-GENERAL FOR THE THIRD QUARTER OF 1902.

**I.—Population.**

THE estimated population of the Island on the last day of the quarter was 3,660,958, being an increase of 19,978 on the previous quarter, due to an excess of 8,373 births over deaths and of 11,605 arrivals over departures of Indian coolies. Table I. in the Appendix gives the area of each Province and district of the Island, with its estimated population, exclusive of immigrants, and the number of marriages, births, and deaths registered during the quarter.

2. *Arrivals and Departures of Indian Coolies.*—The total number of Indian coolies who arrived in the Island during the quarter was 28,676, and of departures 17,071. Compared with the average for the corresponding quarter of the preceding five years, the arrivals show a decline of 25 per cent., and the departures a decline of 29 per cent.

**II.—Marriages.**

3. *Marriages.*—The number of general marriages (*i.e.*, marriages other than Kandyan or Mohammedan) registered during the quarter was 9,122 and of Kandyan marriages 1,833.

4. Table VI. in the Appendix shows the marriages solemnized in the general community in each Province and district in the Island, the civil condition, nationality, the highest, lowest, and mean ages of the parties, the mode of solemnization, the number of bridegrooms and brides who were unable to sign their names in the register, &c.

5. Table VII. gives similar information in respect of the Kandyan marriages.

6. *First Marriages; Re-marriages.*—Of the 9,122 general marriages, 7,866 (equal to 86 per cent.) were between bachelors and spinsters, 733 between widowers and spinsters, 400 between bachelors and widows, 116 between widowers and widows, 4 between divorced men and spinsters, 2 between bachelors and divorced women, and 1 between a divorced woman and a widower. Of the 1,833 Kandyan marriages, 1,366 (equal to 74 per cent.) were between bachelors and spinsters, 197 between widowers and spinsters, 87 between bachelors and widows, 69 between widowers and widows, 46 between divorced men and spinsters, 46 between divorced women and bachelors, 10 between divorced women and widowers, 8 between divorced men and divorced women, and 4 between divorced men and widows.

7. *Age at Marriage.*—The mean age at marriage for the general community was 34·7 for males and 26·8 for females, and for Kandyans 28·2 for males and 21·3 for females. The mean age for the general community has been greatly exaggerated by the registration in the Matara District, of an abnormally large number of unions which the parties had previously contracted, but failed to register until special efforts were made by the Assistant Provincial Registrar to secure their registration. The marriages in the Matara District alone, during the quarter under report, numbered 5,256 out of a total of 9,122 for the Island.

8. *Minors.*—In the general community about 3 per cent. of the bridegrooms and 27 per cent. of the brides, and, among the Kandyans, 12 per cent. of the bridegrooms and 65 per cent. of the brides, were under 21 years of age.

9. *Mixed Marriages.*—There were 45 mixed marriages during the quarter : 4 between Europeans and Burghers, 7 between Burghers and Sinhalese, 1 between a Burgher and a Tamil, 31 between Sinhalese and Tamils, and 2 other mixed marriages.

10. *Signatures in Marriage Register.*—Of the 18,244 persons married in the general community during the quarter, 3,838 men and 7,950 women signed the register with marks ; that is to say, 42 per cent. of the men and 87 per cent. of the women were unable to write their names. Of the 3,666 Kandyans married, 666 men and 1,744 women signed the register with marks ; *i.e.*, 36 per cent. of the men and 95 per cent. of the women were unable to write their names.

**III.—Births and Deaths.**

11. *Births.*—The births registered during the quarter numbered 31,241 (44 Europeans, 179 Burghers, 21,675 Sinhalese, 7,090 Tamils, 2,121 Moors, 85 Malays, and 47 Others), and were in the proportion of 34·0 per 1,000 persons living, as against 37·0 in the previous quarter and 29·8 and 33·7, the respective averages of the corresponding quarter

in the periods 1891–1896 and 1898–1901. The birth- and death-rates for the quarter under report and the preceding quarter being based on the Census population of 1901, the rates of previous quarters, which had been calculated on previous estimates of population, have been revised on the same basis.

12. *Deaths.*—The number of deaths registered during the quarter amounted to 22,868 (29 Europeans, 125 Burghers, 14,103 Sinhalese, 6,895 Tamils, 1,561 Moors, 82 Malays, and 73 Others), and presented an annual rate of 24·9 per 1,000 persons living, as against the averages of 26·0 and 26·4 for the third quarter in the periods 1891–1896 and 1898–1901, and 26·4, the rate in the preceding quarter.

13. The births and deaths and their rates are compared in the following table with the results obtained in the previous quarter and the average rates for the third quarter in 1891–1896 and 1898–1901:—

The birth-rate for the quarter (34·0) showed a decline compared with the rate in the previous quarter (37·0), but an improvement on the averages in 1891–1896 and 1898–1901 (29·8 and 33·7 respectively). The death-rate during the quarter declined to 24·9 from 26·4 which was the rate in the previous quarter and the average for the third quarter in 1898–1901, and from 26·0, the average for the third quarter in 1891–1896.

15. Table II. in the Appendix gives information similar to that given in Table A in respect of each Province and district of the Island; Table I. gives the births and deaths according to sex; Table VIII. the births according to nationality and sex; Table IX. the deaths for each month of the quarter, according to nationality, for each Province and district. The causes of death for each district are shown in Table X.; and for the estates in the Central, Uva, and Sabaragamuwa Provinces, and in the Kalutara and Colombo Districts of the Western Province in Table XI.; and for the town of Colombo (according to wards and nationalities) in Table XII. Table XIII. shows, for each district, by nationality, the period of life at which the deaths occurred.

16. *Sex.*—Of the 31,241 births, 16,132 were male and 15,109 were female; that is to say, there were 107 males born to every 100 females. Of the 22,868 deaths, 11,731 were male and 11,137 were female, i.e., out of equal proportions of each sex there died 928 males to 1,000 females.

17. *Infantile Mortality.*—The deaths of children under one year of age in the quarter numbered 5,262, and were in the proportion of 168 to 1,000 registered births. The rate of infantile mortality varied in different districts, from 390 (for Tamils) and 259 (for Moors) in Puttalam, 216 (for Tamils) in Trincomalee, 208 (for Sinhalese) in Puttalam, 207 (for Tamils) in Mannar, and 201 (for Sinhalese) and (for Tamils) in Kandy and Batticaloa, to 148 (for Sinhalese) in Batticaloa, 139 (for Tamils) in Jaffna, 138 (for Sinhalese) in Colombo, 136 (for Sinhalese) in Kalutara, 116 (for Sinhalese) in Negombo, 114 (for Sinhalese) in Matara, and 113 (for Sinhalese) in Chilaw.

18. *Centenarians.*—Forty-two deaths (20 male and 22 female) were reported to be of centenarians, but the ages stated can hardly be relied upon.

#### IV.—State of Public Health.

19. The general health of the population during the quarter was satisfactory, the death-rate having declined to 24·9 from 26·0, the average for the corresponding quarter of the period 1891–1896 and from 26·4, the average in 1898–1901 and the rate in the preceding quarter. The Southern Province, the North-Western Province, and the Provinces of Uva and Sabaragamuwa showed improved health, as compared with the preceding quarter as well as the averages in the periods 1891–1896 and 1898–1901.

20. Tables III., IV., and V. in the Appendix show the births and deaths, the birth rates and death-rates, for all ages, in the several Provinces and districts of the Island and in the revenue subdivisions of those districts, for the quarter under report, for the preceding quarter, the average of the six third quarters of 1891–1896, and the average of the four third quarters of 1898–1901, the latter period showing more reliable statistics owing to the improvements effected in the system of registration by the introduction of the Ordinances Nos. 1 and 2 of 1895. The year 1897 is omitted, as half the year was under the operation of the old Ordinances and half under that of the new. The rates shown are for the Sinhalese only for the districts which are mainly inhabited by the Sinhalese, and for the Tamils only where Tamils form the bulk of the population. In the Puttalam District, where the Sinhalese and the Mohammedans are found in almost equal numbers, and in the Batticaloa District, where the Tamils and Mohammedans are found in almost equal numbers, the rates are separately given for the different sections of the population.

21. The healthiest Province was, as usual, the Western (21·5), the healthiest district was Negombo (17·2), and the healthiest division was Siyane korale west (13·6), excluding Delft (6·9) in the Jaffna District and Koddiyar patti (12·1) of the Trincomalee District, which contain too small and shifting populations for comparison.

22. *Western Province.*—The Western Province presented a death-rate of 21·5 for all races and 18·9 for the Sinhalese who form the bulk of the population, and maintained its usual place as the healthiest Province in the Island. The death-rate in the Province (18·9) was slightly in excess of the average (18·7), the excess being due to the Colombo and Kalutara Districts.

23. The health of the inhabitants of the Colombo District during the quarter was nearly as good as usual, the death-rate being 19·3 as against 18·6, the average of the third quarters in 1898–1901, and 19·2, the rate in the previous quarter, and 17·5, the average in 1891–1896. Siyane korale west, with a population of over 90,000, showed the lowest death-rate (13·6), closely followed by Siyane korale east (14·6). The Colombo Municipality showed the highest death-rate for all ages (34·0) as well as for infants (32·0). The birth-rate during the quarter (28·6) was below the rate in the preceding quarter (31·5) and the average in 1898–1901 (29·4), but in excess of the average in 1891–1896 (27·4).

24. The death-rate in the Negombo District (15·6), though the same as in the previous quarter, was a considerable improvement on the average of the corresponding quarters in 1891–1896 (19·8) and the average in 1898–1901 (18·1). All three of its subdivisions showed lower death-rates than usual. Compared with the preceding quarter, the death-rate in the Negombo Local Board (25·5) was lower, in Alutkuru korale north (14·5) the same, and in Hapitigam korale (14·6) slightly higher. The rate of mortality among infants in the district was in the proportion of 116 per 1,000 births registered, and the birth-rate was 33·2.

25. The Kalutara District, which recorded a death-rate of 20·3 during the quarter, was the unhealthiest of the districts in the Western Province, and fared even worse than usual, the average in 1891–1896 being 17·9, in 1898–1901 19·5, and the rate in the preceding quarter 19·6. Pasdun korale east (17·5) was the healthiest division in the quarter, and was followed by Pasdun korale west (18·2). The Kalutara Local Board, with a death-rate of 31·2, was the unhealthiest division in the district. This rate was enhanced by the hospital and jail deaths, but even excluding these the rate is as high as 24·3, and is the highest death-rate in the district.

26. *Central Province.*—The death-rate in the Central Province rose to 27·8 from 26·9 in the previous quarter. Compared with the average rate in the period 1891–1896 (31·4) and in the period 1898–1901 (29·9), the rate for the quarter showed a diminution. The diminution was confined to the Kandy and Matale Districts.

27. In the Kandy District, which showed the lowest mortality in the Province, the deaths registered were in the proportion of 26·4 per 1,000 persons living. This rate, though slightly in excess of the preceding quarter (26·0), was a considerable improvement on the average rates in 1891–1896 (29·1) and in 1898–1901 (29·0). Compared with the average rates, seven of its ten subdivisions enjoyed better health during the quarter. The healthiest division in the district was the Kandy Municipality (23·6), and the unhealthiest Pata Hewaheta (33·3). The death-rate among infants was highest in Udu Nuwara division (24·8 per 1000 births registered), and lowest in Pata Hewaheta (105).

28. The rate of mortality in the Matale District (32·9) was almost the same as in the previous quarter (32·8), but much better than the average rates in 1891–1896 (41·5) and in 1898–1901 (35·7). Three of its four subdivisions fared better than usual, the exception being Matale north (41·2). This rate was in excess of the rate in the previous quarter (35·3), as well as the average rates in 1891–1896 (37·8), and in 1898–1901 (36·1). The birth-rate in the district (43·9) was a great deterioration from the previous quarter (53·2), but a slight improvement on the average rates in 1891–1896 (39·9) and in 1898–1901 (43·2). The highest birth-rate in the district was in Matale north (49·3).

29. In the Nuwara Eliya District the death-rate (26·9) was in excess of the previous quarter (22·8). The excess is hardly appreciable when compared with the average rates in 1891–1896 (26·7) and in 1898–1901 (26·1). The rise in the death-rate of the district is due to the subdivisions of Uda Hewaheta (29·3) and Walapane (33·5), where the increase more than counterbalanced the diminution in the other two divisions, Nuwara Eliya Local Board (17·9) and Kotmale (19·8). The birth-rate in the district was 42·5, as against 43·7 in the previous quarter, 37·7 the average rate in the period 1891–1896, and 40·3 the average in 1898–1901. The highest birth-rate was in Walapane (56·9).

30. *Northern Province.*—The Northern Province, with a Tamil population of about a third of a million, showed a Tamil death-rate of 22·4, an improvement on the rate in the previous quarter (24·1) and the average in 1898–1901 (24·7), but a slight deterioration from the average in 1891–1896 (19·6). The deterioration from the average in 1891–1896 was solely due to the Jaffna District, where the death-rate during the quarter rose to 21·9 from 18·2. The Jaffna District showed the lowest death-rate in the Province (21·9), and Mullaittivu the highest (32·2).

31. In the Jaffna District the death-rate in the quarter was below the rate in the previous quarter (22·6) and the average of the four third quarters in 1898–1901 (23·6), but in excess of the average in 1891–1896 (18·2). Compared with this period, all its subdivisions, except Karaichchi and Punakari, have deteriorated in health. Judging from the average rates in the period 1898–1901, however, all its subdivisions, except the two above-named and Valikamam west, have improved in health. Compared with the previous quarter, ten of its thirteen subdivisions show improved health, the exceptions being Valikamam east, The Islands, and Jaffna divisions. Birth and death-rates for this last division have not been calculated owing to the smallness of its population.

32. The death-rate in the Mannar District declined to 25·0 from 37·6 in the previous quarter, and 37·5 and 29·8 the respective averages in the corresponding quarters of the periods 1898–1901 and 1891–1896. Each of its three subdivisions fared much better than usual. The lowest death-rate was in Mantai division (21·8), and the highest in Nanaddan division (27·4). The birth-rate in the district also showed a considerable improvement, the rate for the quarter rising to 34·9 from 29·9 in the previous quarter, and 27·5 and 32·3 the respective averages in the periods 1891–1896 and 1898–1901.

33. The inhabitants of the Mullaittivu District fared much better than usual in point of health, their death-rate in the quarter having declined to 32·2 from 41·7 in the previous quarter, 33·8 the average in 1898–1901, and 36·7 the average in 1891–1896. Maritime pattus (23·4) fared better, and Vavuniya south (41·2) fared worse, than in the previous quarter, and in the periods 1891–1896 and 1898–1901. Vavuniya north showed an improvement on the rate in the previous quarter and the average in 1891–1896, but a deterioration from the average in 1898–1901. The infant mortality in this division was as high as 333.

34. *Southern Province.*—The Southern Province, with a population of about 548,000 Sinhalese, showed a death-rate of 23·0 during the quarter, being a decline from the previous quarter (23·6) as well as from the average rates in 1891–1896 (25·3) and in 1898–1901 (23·2). All three of its districts enjoyed better health than usual, the lowest death-rate in the Province being in the Matara District (20·7).

35. In the Galle District the rate of mortality declined to 23·7 from 25·4 in the previous quarter and 24·4 and 26·0 the respective averages in the periods 1898–1901 and 1891–1896. In three of its subdivisions, viz., Galle Municipality, Gangaboda pattuwa, and Wellaboda pattuwa, the death-rates were in excess of the previous quarter; in Wellaboda pattuwa, Walallawiti korale, and Hinidum pattuwa the rates were in excess of the average in 1898–1901; and in Four Gravets beyond Municipal limits and Akminama, Wellaboda pattuwa, and Walallawiti korale the mortality was in excess of the period 1891–1896. The lowest death-rate in the quarter was in Talpe pattuwa (20·2), followed by Gangaboda pattuwa (20·8), and the highest in Walallawiti korale (30·1). The Galle Municipality division recorded as high a death-rate as 221 for infants. The births registered in the district were in the proportion of 35·3 per 1,000 persons living, as against 37·3 in the previous quarter, 36·1 the average in the period 1898–1901, and 29·4 the average in 1891–1896. The highest birth-rate was in Walallawiti korale (40·9), and the lowest in Hinidum pattuwa (31·8), followed by Galle Municipality (31·9).

36. The Matara District showed a death-rate of 20·7 in the quarter, as against 21·2 in the previous quarter, 22·9 the average in 1898–1901, and 24·7 the average in 1891–1896. Of its subdivisions, Wellaboda pattuwa (15·5), Morawak korale (18·6), Kandaboda pattuwa (21·5), and Gangaboda pattuwa (21·5) showed improved health, as compared with the previous quarter as well as the average rates in the periods 1891–1896 and 1898–1901. Matara Local Board (35·7) showed an improvement on the average in the period 1898–1901 (39·7), but a deterioration from the previous quarter (26·6) and the average in 1891–1896 (27·4). In Weligama korale (21·3) there was an increase on the previous quarter (19·1), but a diminution from the average rates in 1891–1896 (22·1) and in 1898–1901 (22·2). The division of Four Gravets beyond Local Board limits (23·7) showed an increase on the previous quarter (18·8) as well as the averages in both periods (22·8 and 17·6) respectively. The lowest death-rate in the district was in Wellaboda pattuwa (15·5), and the highest in Matara Local Board (35·7).

37. In the Hambantota District the deaths registered during the quarter corresponded to an annual rate of 23·3 per 1,000 living, which showed a rise on the average of the corresponding quarters in the period 1898–1901 (20·8), but a decline from the average in 1891–1896 (24·5) and from the rate in the previous quarter (23·7). Hambantota Four Gravets recorded a death-rate of 60·4 during the quarter, and was the unhealthiest division, not only in the district, but in the whole Island. This rate is somewhat exaggerated by the deaths in hospital and jail, but even exclusive of these the division is one of the unhealthiest in the Island, the death-rate among all nationalities, exclusive of hospital and jail deaths, being 33·1. The healthiest division in the district was Giruwa pattu east (22·0), followed by Giruwa pattu west (22·7). The birth-rate in the district rose to 42·2 from 38·7 in the previous quarter, and 29·0 and 36·5 the respective averages in 1891–1896 and 1898–1901. The highest birth-rate was in Giruwa pattu west (43·3).

38. *Eastern Province.*—The Eastern Province, with a population comprising nearly 9,000 Sinhalese, about 98,000 Tamils, and 63,000 Moors, showed death-rates of 32·4, 26·7, and 24·9 for the Sinhalese, Tamils, and Moors respectively. The births registered were at the annual rate of 42·3 among the Sinhalese, 43·6 among the Tamils, and 51·0 among the Moors.

39. In the Batticaloa District the Tamils, who number over 81,000, showed a death-rate of 27·5 in the quarter, and fared slightly better than in the previous quarter (29·5), but worse than in the period 1898–1901 (26·9) and in 1891–1896 (25·9). The Moors showed a death-rate of 26·8, and enjoyed better health than in the previous quarter (28·3) and in the period 1898–1901 (28·1), but fared a little worse than in the period 1891–1896 (26·6). The rate of mortality among the Sinhalese in the district was 34·5 in the quarter, as against 43·7 in the previous quarter and 34·8 the average in 1891–1896. The lowest death-rate among the Sinhalese was in Bintenna division (27·8), among the Tamils in Akkarai pattu (19·8), and among the Moors in Eravur and Rukam pattus (16·5). The highest birth-rate for the Sinhalese was in Panawa pattu (58·8), for the Tamils in Eravur and Rukam pattus (53·8), and for the Moors in Maumunai pattu north (69·7).

40. The Tamil population of the Trincomalee District, which amounts to more than 17,000, showed a considerable improvement during the quarter, their death-rate falling to 22·9 from 37·0 in the previous quarter and 28·8 and 33·4 the respective averages in the periods 1891–1896 and 1898–1901. Each of its four subdivisions showed an appreciable decline in the death-rate from the previous quarter and the average rates in 1898–1901 and 1891–1896, especially Kaddukulam pattu, where the death-rate declined to 24·7 from 45·3 in the previous quarter and 45·8 and 49·0 the respective averages in 1891–1896 and 1898–1901. The lowest death-rate in the district was in Koddiyar pattu (12·1), and the highest in Trincomalee town (27·3). The birth-rate of the district was equal to 34·3, as against 38·2 in the previous quarter, 33·4 the average in 1898–1901, and 34·5 the average in 1891–1896.

41. *North-Western Province.*—The North-Western Province, with a Sinhalese population of nearly a third of a million, showed a death-rate of 25·5, a great improvement on the previous quarter (32·0) and the periods 1891–1896 (32·4) and 1898–1901 (28·9). All three of its districts shared in the improvement. The births registered in the Province were in the proportion of 40·0 per 1,000, 1 per 1,000 less than in the previous quarter, but 9·7 and 1·2 in excess of the average rates in 1891–1896 and 1898–1901.

42. In the Kurunegala District, which contains more than 75 per cent. of the total provincial population, the mortality was equal to an annual rate of 27·7 per 1,000, a rate which is considerably lower than in the previous quarter and in the periods 1891–1896 and 1898–1901. Compared with the previous quarter and the period 1891–1896, each of its seven subdivisions showed improved death-rates; compared with the period 1898–1901 five of the divisions showed improved health, while the other two, viz., Weudawili hatpattu and Dewamedi hatpattu, had deteriorated. The lowest death-rate in the district was in Katugampola hatpattu (19·6), followed by Dambadeni hatpattu (21·7); and the highest in Kurunegala Local Board (43·9), followed by Dewamedi hatpattu (35·0). Kurunegala Local Board showed an infant mortality of 389 per 1,000 births registered, and Katugampola hatpattu 87.

43. In the Puttalam District, which at the beginning of the quarter was estimated to contain nearly 12,000 Sinhalese, 7,560 Tamils, and about 10,000 Moors, the rates of mortality were equal to 26·7, 36·7, and 28·9 for the Sinhalese, Tamils, and Moors, respectively. The Sinhalese enjoyed better health than usual, their death-rate (26·7), though the same as in the period 1898–1901, was a considerable improvement on the previous quarter (43·0) and in the period 1891–1896 (33·9). The Tamils showed a death-rate of 36·7, and fared better than in the period 1891–1896 (48·0), but worse than in the previous quarter (35·5) and in the period 1898–1901 (36·1). The Moors, with a death-rate of 28·9, showed a decline in health as compared with the period 1891–1896 (24·1), but a great improvement as compared with the preceding quarter (41·4) and the period 1898–1901 (33·2). The healthiest division for the Sinhalese was Kalpitiya division (13·9), for the Tamils Puttalam division (23·3), and for the Moors Puttalam Local Board (17·5).

44. In the Chilaw District the inhabitants fared better in point of health, their death-rate having declined to 17·2 from 21·0 in the previous quarter and 17·9 and 20·0 the average rates in the periods 1898–1901 and 1891–1896. The death-rate in each of the subdivisions was less than in the previous quarter and in the periods 1891–1896 and 1898–1901. Pitigal korale south showed the lowest death-rate in the district (15·3), and Chilaw town the highest (24·1). The birth-rate in the district was 31·9, as against 34·3 in the previous quarter, 35·1 the average in the period 1898–1901, and 26·6 the average in the period 1891–1896. The highest birth-rate among the subdivisions was in Pitigal korale central (33·0), and the lowest in Chilaw town (19·3).

45. *North-Central Province.*—The North-Central Province, or the Anuradhapura District, with which it is coterminous, showed a death-rate of 32·8 in the quarter, an improvement on the previous quarter (40·1), but a slight deterioration from the average rates in the periods 1891–1896 (32·4) and 1898–1901 (32·7). Each of the five subdivisions showed lower death-rates than in the previous quarter. Compared with the average rates in the periods 1891–1896 and 1898–1901, Anuradhapura town (55·5), Hurulupalata (35·1), and Kelegam palata (30·6) showed increased mortality, while in the other two divisions, Nuwaragam palata (31·4) and Tamankaduwa palata (29·5), there was a diminution in the death-rates. The births registered in the Province corresponded to an annual rate of 40·4, as against 35·7 in the previous quarter, 44·9 the average in the period 1898–1901, and 41·3 the average in 1891–1896. The highest birth-rate in the Province was in Hurulu palata (47·5), and the lowest in Tamankaduwa palata (24·1).

46. *Province of Uva.*—The Province of Uva, or the Badulla District, with an estimated population of very nearly 124,000, showed an improvement in health during the quarter, the death-rate having declined to 35·1 from an average of 36·8 in the period 1891–1896, and 38·9 in the period 1898–1901, and 36·0 in the previous quarter. The rates of mortality in five of the eight subdivisions had declined from the previous quarter and the average in 1891–1896, the exceptions being Buttala, (43·9), Udukinda (53·9), and Wellassa (52·8). All the subdivisions, except Udukinda and Wellassa, showed death-rates below the average in 1898–1901. The healthiest subdivision during the quarter was Wiyaluwa (19·5), and the unhealthiest Udukinda (53·9). The highest birth-rate in the quarter was in Wiyaluwa (58·7), and the lowest in Badulla Local Board (27·9). The highest rate of mortality among infants in the Province was in Wellassa (280), followed by Badulla Local Board (269) and Buttala (251).

47. *Province of Sabaragamuwa.*—The Province of Sabaragamuwa, which contains a Sinhalese population of nearly 258,000, showed an improvement in point of health, its death-rate (23·0) being below the rate in the previous quarter (26·3), as well as the average rates in 1891–1896 (29·4) and 1898–1901 (28·8). Both Ratnapura and Kegalla Districts shared in the improvement. The birth-rate in the Province (35·4), though lower than in the preceding quarter (42·0) and in the period 1898–1901 (37·6), was a great improvement on the average in 1891–1896 (27·6).

48. In the Ratnapura District the rate of mortality (25·4) was below the rate in the previous quarter (29·7), as well as the average rates in the periods 1891–1896 (30·0) and 1898–1901 (29·9). All the subdivisions of the district, with the exception of Kolonna korale, presented lower death-rates than in the periods 1891–1896 and 1898–1901 and in the previous quarter. In Kolonna korale the death-rate rose to 27·0 from 24·3 in the previous quarter, and 26·2 and 24·6 the respective averages in 1891–1896 and 1898–1901. The healthiest division in the district was Ratnapura Local Board (20·5), and the unhealthiest Nawadun korale (29·6).

49. In the Kegalla District the death-rate declined to 21·1 from 23·5 in the previous quarter, and from 28·9 and 27·8 the respective averages in the periods 1891–1896 and 1898–1901. Judging from the rate in the previous quarter as well as the average rates in both periods, all the subdivisions, except Paranakuru korale and Dehigampal korale, showed improved health. In Paranakuru korale the death-rate (24·9), though less than in the period 1891–1896 (30·2), was in excess of the rate in the previous quarter (20·2). The death-rate of Dehigampal korale (20·7) exceeded its average in the period 1898–1901 (19·3). The improvement in health is most noticeable in Galboda korale, where the death-rate fell to 19·4 from 29·3 in the previous quarter and 39·0 and 32·7 the respective averages in 1891–1896 and 1898–1901.

## V.—Causes of Deaths.

50. The causes of deaths registered in the Island during the quarter are given in Table X., and are summarized below:—

51. *Fever and Diarrhoeal Diseases.*—Of the 22,868 deaths registered in the Island, 4,438 were reported as due to various forms of fever and 5,184 to diarrhoeal diseases, i.e., fever and diarrhoeal diseases contributed over 42 per cent. of the total number of deaths.

Under the head "Diarrhoeal Diseases" are included 15 deaths from cholera, 14 of which occurred in Colombo and 1 in Badulla.

52. There were 22 deaths from smallpox (all in Colombo), chickenpox caused 3 deaths (1 in Colombo and 2 in Nuwara Eliya), and measles 51 (35 in Jaffna, 4 each in Batticaloa and Colombo, and 2 each in Nuwara Eliya, Mullaittivu, Galle, and Kegalla). Whooping cough resulted in 7 deaths and mumps in 1. Influenza caused 29 deaths (6 in Kandy, 5 in Colombo, 4 in Matale, 3 each in Nuwara Eliya and Badulla, 2 each in Galle and Matara, and 1 each in Kalutara, Kurunegala, Ratnapura, and Kegalla). The other chief natural causes were infantile convulsions 2,258, debility 1,076, phthisis 790, pneumonia 729, general dropsy 642, anaemia 636, worms 579, old age 562, malarial cachexia 260, puerperal convulsions 245 (85 in Kurunegala, 23 in Badulla, 21 in Kegalla, 18 in Matale, 17 in Galle, 14 in Anuradhapura, 11 in Colombo, 9 in Kandy, 8 in Chilaw, 7 each in Nuwara Eliya and Ratnapura, 6 in Matara, 4 each in Kalutara and Negombo, 3 each in Mullaittivu and Hambantota, 2 in Batticaloa, and 1 each in Jaffna, Trincomalee, and Puttalam), thrush 199, bronchitis 162, premature birth 161 (87 or more than half the number being in Badulla), tetanus 158, rheumatism 129, and dochmias duodenalis 73 (17 in Colombo, 16 in Kegalla, 14 in Kandy, 9 in Ratnapura, 5 in Badulla, 4 each in Kalutara and Nuwara Eliya, and 2 each in Galle and Matara). Parangi was responsible this quarter for 23 deaths (8 in Kurunegala, 5 in Galle, 4 in Hambantota, 2 in Matara, and 1 each in Colombo, Kandy, Batticaloa, and Badulla).

53. *Violent Deaths ; Accidents.*—Of the 427 deaths attributed to violence, as many as 356 were assigned to accident or negligence. Of these, 88 were due to fall from trees, 15 to fall of heavy substance on, 4 to fall from heights other than trees, 3 to falls other than from heights, and 1 by falling into a plumbago pit. Eighty deaths resulted from drowning, 29 from burns and scalds, 12 from gunshot wounds, 53 from snake-bite, 9 from other poisons, 4 from suffocation, and 1 from cut-stab. Twelve persons were killed by railway trains, 2 by being run over by carts, 1 by jumping off a tram car when in motion, 1 by machinery, and 1 by a blow. Gunpowder and sunstroke were responsible each for a death. Three deaths were due to injuries caused by elephants, 2 by bulls, 2 by cheetahs, 1 by a horse, 1 by a bear, 1 by a wild boar, and 2 by rat-bites. Twelve deaths of infants were attributed to injury at birth.

54. *Suicide.*—Thirty deaths were attributed to suicide, of which 17 were by hanging, 4 by drowning, 4 by poison, 3 by gunshot wounds, 1 by cut-stab, and 1 by other means. Of these, 17 were Sinhalese and 13 Tamils.

55. *Homicide.*—Twenty-nine deaths were attributed to murder and other forms of homicide, of which 12 were in Colombo, 3 each in Negombo, Hambantota, and Chilaw, 2 each in Kandy and Galle, and 1 each in Kalutara, Mannar, Kurunegala, and Kegalla. Of these, 27 were Sinhalese and 2 Tamils.

56. *Executions.*—Judicial executions registered during the quarter amounted to as many as 12 (all Sinhalese), of which 7 were in Matara, 4 in Colombo, and 1 in Galle.

## VI.—Health of the Estate Population.

57. The total number of births reported from the estates in the Central, Uva, and Sabaragamuwa Provinces, and in the Colombo and Kalutara Districts of the Western Province was 2,372 (of which 13 were Europeans, 7 Burghers, 68 Sinhalese, 2,249 Tamils, 27 Moors, 5 Malays, and 3 Others), and the total number of deaths was 2,938 (2 Europeans, 5 Burghers, 45 Sinhalese, 2,860 Tamils, 22 Moors, 2 Malays, and 2 Others), corresponding respectively to an annual birth-rate of 22·4 and a death-rate of 27·7. The causes of death are given in Table XI., and may be summarized as follows:—

59. *Kandy District*.—The total number of births reported for registration from the estates in the Kandy District was 994 (of which 6 were Europeans, 3 Burghers, 24 Sinhalese, 951 Tamils, 9 Moors, and 1 Malay), and the deaths numbered 1,168 (1 European, 1 Burgher, 18 Sinhalese, 1,139 Tamils, 7 Moors, and 2 Others). The birth-rate in the quarter was equal to 25·4, as against a mean rate of 20·1 for the third quarters in 1893–1896 and of 21·9 for the third quarters in 1898–1901. As usual, the most fatal causes of death were the diarrhoeal diseases, which caused 412 deaths, that is, 41 per cent. of the total number of deaths in the district. The other chief natural causes of death were debility (mostly of infants from inability to suck) 269, general dropsy 66, infantile convulsions 62, pneumonia 53, old age 51, fevers 49, malarial cachexia 32, bronchitis 21, anaemia 14, dochmias duodenalis 11, starvation (want of breast-milk) 10, and worms 9.

60. *Matale District*.—The total number of births reported for registration from the estates in the Matale District amounted to 148 (142 Tamils, 2 Europeans, 2 Sinhalese, 1 Moor, and 1 Malay), and the deaths numbered 249 (244 Tamils, 2 Sinhalese, 2 Moors, and 1 Malay). The birth-rate in the quarter was equal to 22·5, and though slightly lower than in the previous quarter (23·0), was in excess of the average rates in the periods 1893–1896 and 1898–1901 by 4·0 and 1·7 per 1,000 respectively. The death-rate (37·8) was higher than the average in 1893–1896 (28·5), but less than the average in 1898–1901 (38·8). The chief natural causes of death were diarrhoeal diseases, which accounted for 81 deaths, or nearly 32 per cent. of the total number of deaths. The other principal causes of death were debility (mostly of infants from inability to suck) 38, fevers 28, malarial cachexia 26, general dropsy 15, pneumonia 14, infantile convulsions 11, and old age 9.

61. *Nuwara Eliya District*.—The total number of births reported for registration from the estates in the Nuwara Eliya District amounted to 578 (546 Tamils, 12 Sinhalese, 9 Moors, 5 Europeans, 2 Burghers, 2 Malays, and 2 Others), and the deaths numbered 602 (583 Tamils, 9 Sinhalese, 5 Moors, 4 Burghers, and 1 European). The birth-rate for the quarter (22·2) is an improvement on the previous quarter (19·0) and the average in 1898–1901 (18·5), but a deterioration from the average in 1893–1896 (25·1). The death-rate for the quarter (23·1) is in excess of the rate in the previous quarter (18·6) and the average in 1898–1901 (20·1), but below the average in 1893–1896 by 4·8 per 1,000. The principal natural causes of death were the diarrhoeal diseases, which caused 267 deaths, i.e., 44 per cent. of the total number of deaths, debility 87, pneumonia 34, general dropsy 25, old age 24, fevers 23, infantile convulsions 19, tabes mesenterica 16, malarial cachexia 9, and bronchitis 7.

62. *Badulla District*.—The total number of births reported for registration from the estates in the Badulla District amounted to 244 (232 Tamils, 6 Sinhalese, 5 Malays, and 1 Burgher), and the deaths numbered 260 (257 Tamils and 3 Sinhalese). The birth-rate for the quarter (18·7) is a deterioration from the rate in the previous quarter (24·9) and the average rates in 1893–1896 and 1898–1901 (20·9 and 22·1 respectively). The death-rate (19·9) was an improvement on the rate in the previous quarter (22·5) as well as the average rates in 1893–1896 and 1898–1901 (21·3 and 22·4 respectively). The chief natural causes of death were the diarrhoeal diseases, which caused 93 deaths, or 35 per cent. of the total number of deaths, debility 50, fevers 31, pneumonia 29, general dropsy 9, and old age 8.

63. *Ratnapura District*.—The total number of births reported for registration from the estates in the Ratnapura District was 73 (71 Tamils, 1 Burgher, and 1 Sinhalese), and the deaths numbered 116 (114 Tamils, 1 Sinhalese, and 1 Moor). The birth-rate for the quarter was in excess of the previous quarter by 4 per 1,000, but below the average rates in the periods 1893–1896 and 1898–1901 by 3 and 8 per 1,000 respectively. The death-rate was nearly 9 per 1,000 above the average in 1893–1896, but was lower than the average in 1898–1901 and the rate in the previous quarter by 21 per 1,000 and 3 per 1,000 respectively. Here, as elsewhere, the chief natural cause of death was diarrhoeal diseases, which caused 67 deaths, or 57 per cent. of the total number of deaths. The other chief causes of death were debility (mostly of infants from inability to suck) 15, dochmias duodenalis 7, fever 5, infantile convulsions 5, and pneumonia 4.

64. *Kegalla District*.—The total number of births reported for registration from the estates in the Kegalla District was 219 (203 Tamils, 14 Sinhalese, 1 Moor, and 1 Malay), and the deaths numbered 331 (314 Tamils, 10 Sinhalese, 6 Moors, and 1 Malay). The birth-rate in the quarter (20·9) exceeded the average in 1893–1896 by 5 per 1,000, but fell short of the average in 1898–1901 and the rate in the previous quarter by 4 and 3·8 respectively; and the death-rate (31·6) was an improvement on the previous quarter as well as the average rates in 1893–1896 and 1898–1901. The improvement is remarkable as compared with the average in 1898–1901, from which it declined by 12 per 1,000. Diarrhoeal diseases caused 141 deaths, or 42 per cent. of the total number of deaths, the other chief causes of death were debility 32, malarial cachexia 30, infantile convulsions 18, old age 15, dochmias duodenalis 14, fevers 14, pneumonia 12, general dropsy 8, and phthisis 6.

65. *Colombo District*.—The total number of births reported for registration from the estates in the Colombo District, by which is meant the Avisawella division of the district, was 32 (25 Tamils, 5 Sinhalese, 1 Moor, and 1 Other), and the deaths numbered 72 (70 Tamils and 2 Sinhalese). The birth-rate of the district was 15·3, as against 19·3 in the previous quarter and 14·0 and 16·4 the respective averages in the periods 1893–1896 and 1898–1901. The death-rate (34·4) was in excess of the average in 1893–1896 by 4 per 1,000, but below the average in 1898–1901 and the rate in the previous quarter by 15 per 1,000 and 18 per 1,000 respectively. The high death-rates and low birth-rates of this and the Kalutara District are striking. The chief natural causes of death were the diarrhoeal diseases, which caused 32 deaths, or 46 per cent. of the total number of deaths. The other chief causes of death were fevers 16, phthisis 4, malarial cachexia 3, debility 3, general dropsy 2, and worms 2.

66. *Kalutara District*.—The total number of births reported for registration from the estates in the Kalutara District was 84 (79 Tamils, 4 Sinhalese, and 1 Moor), and the deaths numbered 140 (139 Tamils and 1 Moor). The birth-rate (19·6) was an improvement on the rate in the previous quarter (17·2) as well as the average rates in

1893-1896 and 1898-1901 (5·0 and 12·6); and the death-rate (32·7), though 2 per 1,000 above the rate in the previous quarter, was an improvement on the average rates (34·5 and 34·4 respectively). It is, however, noticeable that the birth-rate falls short of the death-rate by more than 13 per 1,000. The chief natural causes of death were the diarrhoeal diseases, which accounted for 46 deaths, or 33 per cent. of the total number of deaths, debility 21, fevers 15, malarial cachexia 11, pneumonia 8, general dropsy 8, and infantile convulsions 5.

### VII.—Health of the Town of Colombo.

67. The births registered in the town of Colombo numbered 883, and corresponded to an annual rate of 21·9 per mille, an increase of nearly 2 per mille on the average (20·0).

68. The deaths registered numbered 1,362. To these have been added 21 deaths of town residents, which occurred in the Infectious Diseases Hospital, Kanatta (outside the town limits), and which were registered by an extra urban registrar, making a total of 1,383 deaths, and corresponding to a rate of 34·3 per mille per annum, also nearly 2 per mille higher than the average (32·5).

69. As usual in the town, the death-rate exceeded the birth-rate, due mainly to the preponderance of males over females (chiefly among Europeans, Indian Tamils, and Mohammedans), to the presence of hospitals which add to the normal mortality of the town, and to registration of births being still defective.

70. The subjoined Table E gives the births and deaths and their rates for each race in the third quarters of 1902 and 1901, and the average for the third quarters in 1895-1901:—

71. The birth- and death-rates given in the above table for Europeans, Malays, and the races classed together as "Others" are not reliable owing chiefly to their population being too small for purposes of rate calculation. The Burghers show the highest birth-rate (28·0) and the lowest death-rate (25·4) of any race living in the town, and are the only race showing a birth-rate higher than the death-rate. The Tamil mortality (41·0) is as usual the highest, owing to the large number of destitute poor of the Indian immigrant class dying in hospitals. Out of the total of 375 deaths of Tamils for the whole town, 133 died in the hospitals in Maradana Ward. The next highest death-rate is among the Sinhalese (34·0).

72. The number of births and deaths of different wards in the town, their rates per mille per annum, the principal zymotic causes of death, &c., during the quarter are shown in the following Table F:—

73. The unhealthiest division of the town in the quarter was Slave Island Ward, with a death-rate of (32·3), followed by St. Paul's Ward (28·9), New Bazaar Ward (27·5), and Kotahena Ward (27·2). Leaving out of consideration the Fort and Galle Face, and the Pettah Wards, which show low death-rates and lower birth-rates owing to their population being mainly a floating male adult one, the lowest death-rate was, as usual, in Kollupitiya Ward (21·0). Slave Island Ward shows, this quarter, the highest birth-rate, also 25·3, followed by Maradana (24·2) and New Bazaar (23·3).

74. Except for one death which occurred in the harbour on board the ss. Bhadra, the town may be said to have been free from cholera during the quarter.

There were 18 deaths from smallpox, 17 of which occurred in the Infectious Diseases Hospital, Kanatta, to which the patients were removed from the town. Two deaths from measles of town residents occurred in the same hospital. Phthisis, bronchitis, and pneumonia were fatal in 293 cases (against an average of 235 in the corresponding period of 1895–1901), diarrhoea and dysentery in 286 (against an average of 212), fever in 104, including 16 of enteric fever (average 34), and 38 of remittent fever (average 55), infantile convulsions in 102 (average 125), tetanus in 94 (average 28), debility in 92 (average 86), old age in 73 (average 63), diseases of the circulatory system in 25 (average 20), dochmias duodenalis in 17 (average 10), worms in 15 (average 35), anaemia in 14 (average 13). Other causes of death were diseases of brain 20, paralysis 15, apoplexy 13, liver diseases 12, enteritis 11, malarial cachexia 10, Bright's disease 10.

75. Seventeen deaths were attributed to accidents, of which 4 were due to drowning, 3 to burns, 3 to suffocation, 2 to being run over by carts, 1 to a railway accident, 1 to a tramway accident, 1 to fall of a heavy substance, 1 to being kicked by a horse, and 1 to a cut. Six deaths were due to homicide.

### VIII.—Health of other Towns.

76. The following Table G shows the births and deaths registered in the quarter and their rates for the towns where the special system of death registration is in operation. The rates in this table are for all races, and may differ from those given in Tables III.–V., which are for the indigenous races :—

77. The death-rates for the quarter are given inclusive as well as exclusive of deaths in hospitals and jails. In some of the towns which attract large numbers of estate coolies and destitute poor to the hospitals the difference between the two rates is striking, e.g., Gampola 94·2 and 38·5, Nawalapitiya 75·0 and 20·9, Matale 70·5 and 15·7, Kegalla 38·9 and 13·0. Exclusive of hospital and jail deaths, the lowest death-rate was in Mannar (11·1), followed by Nuwara Eliya (12·4), Tangalla (12·7), and Kegalla (13·0), and the highest in Vavuniya (116·1).
