HEREAS it is enacted by sub-section (4) of section 7 of the Natives Emigration and Foreign Employment Ordinance, No. 32 of 1908, that it shall be the duty of the person issuing to a native of Ceylon's third class passenger ticket for any of the ports to which the said sub-section applies, to report forthwith the issue of such ticket to the nearest Police Station: And whereas by sub-section (5) of the said section 7 it is enacted that the Governor in Executive Council may, by Proclamation in the Government Gazette, declare the ports to which the provisions of sub-section (4) shall apply:

Now know Ye that We, the Governor of Ceylon, in exercise of the powers in Us vested by sub-section (5) of section 7 of the said Ordinance, and with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby declare that all ports other than ports within the limits of Asia shall be ports to which the said sub-section (4) of section 7 of the said Ordinance

For the amended rule 285, dated April 5, 1910, appearing on page 313 of Part I. of the Government Gazette of April 8, 1910, substitute the following:

The penal stage shall last one month. Prisoners in the penal stage shall be employed within the prison walls at stone breaking or coconut husk beating. They shall be allowed to write one letter within one month of admission on making application to the Jailer for that purpose. They shall receive penal diet making application to the Jailer for that purpose. They shall receive penal diet for the period passed in the penal stage, and shall be entitled to promotion to Class IV. on completing one month in the penal stage.

(2) Substitute the word "eleven" for the word "ten" in the penultimate line of

rule 286.

· Ceylon Government Agricultural Scholarships.

WITH a view to securing trained teachers for Provincial Agricultural Schools which it is proposed to establish in Ceylon, it has been decided, with the approval of the Secretary of State for the Colonies, to grant Government Scholarships to promising young men desirous of embarking on an agricultural career in the Government service to enable them to receive a training in an Agricultural College in India.

2. As a first step it is proposed to grant four such scholarships tenable for a period of three years for a course of training at the Agricultural College at Poona. The scholarships will entitle the holders to the following allowances during the three years of their course of training:—A subsistence allowance of Rs. 50 per mensem, and an outfit and travelling allowance at the rate of Rs. 300 per annum paid half-yearly. The candidates will be provided with quarters, but they will have to provide their own boarding: Fees for tuition, cost of instruments, &c., and rent of quarters will be paid by Government.

The scholarships will be granted by nomination by the Governor in Executive Council to selected candidates who were over 19 and less than 24 years of age on January 1, 1912. Candidates for nomination must, however,

have passed one of the following examinations:-

(a) The Intermediate Examination in Arts or Science of the University of London.

(b) The F.A. or the B.A. Examination of the Calcutta University, provided this has been passed with a classical language and history.

(c) The F.A. or B.A. Examination of the Madras University, provided this has been passed with a classical language.

3. Candidates will also be required to pass a test in physical fitness before nomination.

- 4. The course of study is that laid down by the University of Bombay for the degree of Bachelor of Agriculture. The candidates will have to take the F. Ag., S. Ag., and B. Ag. Examinations in succession.
- 5. Applications for His Excellency the Governor's nomination must be submitted to the Hon. the Colonial Secretary not later than March 1, 1912. Each candidate must send in with his application two certificates of character, one of which must be from the Principal of the last school which he attended; also proof of age.
 - 6. Candidates nominated will be required to pay a medical fee of Rs. 10.50.
- 7. The next scholastic year of the Agricultural College at Poona will commence on June 1, 1912, and the students nominated for the scholarship will be admitted to the College on that date.

Ceylon Government Engineering Scholarships.

A N examination will be held by the Ceylon Government in May, 1912, for the award of scholarships to be held in the Upper Subordinate Class in Engineering at the Madras Engineering College.

If candidates of sufficient merit present themselves there will be awarded three scholarships, which will under certain conditions lead to appointments in the Ceylon Irrigation Department.

The scholarships will entitle the holders to the following allowances for the three years of their course in the Upper Subordinate Class:—A subsistence allowance of Rs. 30 per mensem, and an outfit and travelling allowance at the rate of Rs. 200 per annum, paid half-yearly. Fees and deposits required for the classes will be paid by the Government. Those who pass the College final examination at the end of the three years' course will receive the same subsistence allowance for an additional year, during which they will be employed on works in India. They will also during this additional year receive the same travelling allowances as are drawn by Indian students under the same circumstances. All allowances will be contingent on the good conduct and satisfactory progress of the student.

2. The three scholars will, if they receive a certificate of good conduct and satisfactory progress during the year spent on works, be offered appointments as Irrigation Inspectors, Class II., of the Irrigation Department, with prospects of promotion to the higher grades of Irrigation Inspectors, Class I., and Chief Irrigation Inspectors.

The following is the sanctioned scale of salaries and strength for these appointments:--

Twelve Inspectors, Class II., at Rs. 960 rising to Rs. 1,360 by annual increments of Rs. 40. Ten Inspectors, Class I., at Rs. 1,400 rising to Rs. 2,300 by annual increments of Rs. 60. Eight Chief Inspectors at Rs. 2,500 rising to Rs. 3,000 by annual increments of Rs. 100.

Promotion from class to class is by selection. Each of these scholars will be required to execute a bond of Rs. 1,000, pledging himself to enter Government service in the Irrigation Department, and remain in that service for at least ten years.

3. The examination will be confined to candidates whose age will be under 22 on June 30, 1912, and who are nominated by His Excellency the Governor. Before receiving such nomination, candidates must have passed one of the following examinations:—

(i.) The Matriculation Examination of the London University.

(ii.) The Cambridge University Senior Local Examination, including a pass in not less than five of the sections 2-16. Three of these sections must be—

(1) English.

(2) Mathematics.

- (3) Latin, or Chemistry, or Physics, or two subjects in Biology and Physical Geography.
- (iii.) The Intermediate Examination in Arts of the Madras University.
- 4. The subjects of examination will be as follows:-

Compulsory.

(1) Arithmetic.

(2) Drawing—Freehand and Geometrical.

(3) English Language and Composition.

(4) Pure Mathematics—Geometry, Algebra, and Trigonometry.

Optional.

Not more than two of the following:-

(5) Applied Mathematics—Elementary Mechanics and Hydrostatics.

(6) Chemistry—Theoretical and Practical.

(7) Physics—the elements of Sound, Light, Heat, Electricity, and Magnetism. Candidates will be examined practically in the use of the commoner physical apparatus.

Note.—The standard of the examination in subjects (4), (5), (6), and (7) is sufficiently indicated in the syllabus for the respective subjects prescribed for the Senior Cambridge Local and the London Matriculation Examinations.

- N.B.—In selecting the scholars a preference will be given to those who have passed in either Physics or Chemistry.
- 5. Applications for His Excellency the Governor's nomination must be submitted to the Director of Irrigation not later than April 15, 1912. Each candidate must send in with his application two certificates of character, one of which must be from the Principal of the last school which he attended.
- 6. Candidates nominated by His Excellency the Governor will be required to pay a medical fee of Rs. 10.50 and an examination fee of Rs. 25.
- 7. Any further particulars and forms of application for nomination may be obtained from the Director of Irrigation.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended January 13, 1912.

Births.—The total births registered were 106 (7 Europeans, 4 Burghers, 61 Sinhalese, 11 Tamils, 16 Moors, 4 Malays, and 3 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on January 1, 1912, viz., 223,353) was 24 8, as against 23 4 in the preceding week, 35 0 in the corresponding week of last year, and 26 0 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 167 (0 Europeans, 12 Burghers, 84 Sinhalese, 38 Tamils, 24 Moors, 6 Malays and 3 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 39.1, as against 44.5 in the previous week, 30.1 in the corresponding week of last year, and 35.2 the weekly average of last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 167 total deaths, 40 were of infants under one year of age, as against 41 in the preceding week, 30 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 32 the average of last year.

-The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 8.

Selected Causes of Death.—Twenty-three deaths were registered from Pneumonia (against 24 in the previous week and 18 the weekly average for last year), of which 10 were in Kotahena, 5 in Maradana Hospitals, 4 in Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), 2 in St. Sebastian, and 1 each in New Bazaar and Kollupitiya North. Four deaths were registered from Bronchitis.

- 2. Fifteen deaths were registered from Phthisis (against 16 in the previous week and 14 the weekly average for last year), of which 5 were in Slave Island, 2 each in St. Paul's, Kotahena, New Bazaar, and Maradana hospitals, and 1 each in San Sebastian and Maradana (exclusive of hospitals).
- 3. Seven deaths were registered from Enteric Fever (against 12 in the previous week and 8 the weekly average for last year), of which 3 were in Kotahena, and 1 each in St. Paul's, New Bazaar, Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), and There were 21 cases reported during the week, against 26 in the previous week. Kollupitiya North.
- Sixteen deaths were registered from Senility, 14 from Enteritis (including 2 infants), 10 Infantile Convulsions, 7 Debility (3 infants), 6 Premature Birth, 5 Dysentery, 4 Nephritis, 4 Worms (1 infant), 3 each from Bright's Disease, Puerperal Septicæmia, and Starvation, and 43 from Other Causes.
- Two deaths were registered from Measles, both of Sinhalese from New Bazaar. There were 9 cases of Measles reported during the week, against 4 in the previous week; and 1 of Chickenpox, against 2 in the previous week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 76.1°, against 77.1° in the preceding week and 79.0° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.870 in., against 29.893 in. in the preceding week and 29.953 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was nil, as in the preceding week, against 0.68 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.
