SIR,—WITH reference to Lord Elgin's circular despatch of January 25, 1907, I have the honour to transmit to you, for publication or for such action as may be considered desirable, a copy of revised regulations for the Matriculation Examination of the University of London, and to call attention to the regulations with regard to the optional languages which may be taken by candidates for that examination.

The External Registrar states that the following languages have been accepted by the Matriculation Board :—

Starred under old Regulations.—Spanish, Portuguese, Italian, Modern Dutch, Arabic, Sanskrit, Hebrew, Chinese ;

By the Matriculation Board, January 25, 1909.—Burmese, Gaelic, (Irish, Scottish, or Welsh), Hindustani, Persian, Russian, Tamil,* Urdu—

and that the special fee referred to in the regulations is £1 in the case of either Spanish or Hebrew, and £2 in the case of any other of the languages named. This special fee must be paid by candidates taking such languages at the same time as the ordinary fee for the examination, and should be forwarded with the application for the examination.

The regulation comes into force so far as the Colonies are concerned in January next.

* The following concession by the University, with regard to Ceylon, has been recently notified :—

"If at the one centre in Ceylon any number of candidates not less than ten take Tamil at any one examination, and give due notice according to the regulations of their intention to do so, the University will reduce the special fee to 10s. for each candidate.

REGULATIONS FOR MATRICULATION.

IMPORTANT NOTICES.

The attention of all students who matriculate is directed to the following extract from Statute No. 120 :—

"No student shall be admitted to the Final Examination for a degree until the expiration of at least three years after Matriculation, unless the Senate in special cases otherwise determine."

MATRICULATION.

Candidates for any degree in this University, unless admitted under Statute 113,* or under the second clause of Statute 116,† must have passed the Matriculation Examination either in its ordinary form or in the form of the Senior School Examination at least three years‡ previously to the Final Examination for a First Degree.§

Students admitted under Statute 113, or under Statute 116, upon a qualification other than the Matriculation Examination, must pay a registration fee of £2 to the appropriate Registrar.

The Matriculation Examination and all other examinations of the University are open to men and women alike.

There shall be three examinations for Matriculation in each year, one commencing on September 15 if that day be a Monday, or if not, on the Monday next preceding the 15th ; one on the second Monday in January ; and the third on the second Monday in June (or July, as may be hereafter determined).||

‡ Nevertheless, candidates who matriculate at, or whose registration under Statute 116 as exempt from the Matriculation Examination dates from, the January examination in any year will be admissible to the First Degree Examination except in Medicine of the year next but one ensuing, provided that in each case the interval specified by the regulations between the Intermediate and Final Examination is observed.

§ The Medical and Surgical Degrees of this University are registrable qualifications, and it is not necessary for students to register as Medical Students in order to qualify for the examinations for these degrees. Compliance with the University Regulations is sufficient. For the diplomas of certain other licensing bodies, however, registration as a Medical Student by the General Medical Council is a necessary preliminary, and under the present regulations of the Council, those desiring to use the Matriculation Examination of this University as a qualification for registration must show that they have passed in Latin and in Greek or a modern foreign language.

|| The examinations in January and June (or July), but not that in September, may be held not only at the University, but also under special arrangements in other parts of the United Kingdom or in the Colonies. Neither Botany nor Drawing can be taken in the Colonies.

Every candidate entering for the Matriculation Examination must pay a fee of £2. If a candidate withdraws his name before the last day assigned for the return of the form of entry the fee shall be returned to him. If he fails to present himself at the examination, he shall be allowed, on payment of a fee of £1, to enter again within eight months for the Matriculation Examination. If he retires after the commencement of the examination, or fails to pass it, the full fee of £2 shall be payable upon every re-entry.*

Candidates who have matriculated in the University by examination, whether it be by the Matriculation Examination or by the Senior School Examination, will not be admitted to any subsequent Matriculation Examination as a whole; but they can enter at any subsequent Matriculation Examination with a view to passing in one or more additional subjects on payment of a fee of £1 for a single subject and of £2 for two or more subjects. Every such candidate must apply to the Principal at the appropriate date for a special form of entry for the "Matriculation Supplementary Certificate."†

Matriculated students of the University who have been registered under Statute 116 and members of the University who have proceeded to any Intermediate Examination in any Faculty or to the First Examination for Medical Degrees will not be admitted to any subsequent Matriculation Examination in whole or in part. Nevertheless, candidates who have so proceeded after passing the Matriculation Examination may, for the special purpose (which must be declared) of satisfying the requirements of a Public Authority, and on the conditions stated above, enter for one or more subjects of the Matriculation Examination. The names of such candidates will not appear on the pass list, nor will they receive certificates; but the University will on their behalf notify their success to the Public Authority concerned.

The examination shall be conducted by means of printed papers; but the Examiners shall not be precluded from putting, for the purpose of ascertaining the competence of the candidates to pass, *viva voce* questions to any candidate in the subjects in which they are appointed to examine.

Candidates shall not be approved by the Examiners unless they have shown at one and the same examination a competent knowledge in each of the following five subjects, according to the details specified under the several heads:—

- (1) English. Two papers of one and a half hour each.
- (2) Elementary Mathematics. Two papers of three hours each.
- (3) Latin or Greek, or Elementary Mechanics, or Elementary Physics—Heat, Light, and Sound—or Elementary Chemistry, or Elementary Botany. One paper of three hours in each subject.
- (4) and (5) Two of the following subjects, neither of which has already been taken under section (3). One paper of three hours in each subject. If neither Latin nor Greek has been taken under section 3 one of the other subjects selected must be a language other than English:—

A candidate who so desires may offer some one language other than those named above. Such proposal must be submitted for the consideration of the Matriculation Board. The normal notice of such proposal is six months before the beginning of the Matriculation Examination for which the application is made. Candidates giving less than six months' notice are advised that it may not be possible to make arrangements for papers to be set at the next Matriculation Examination, even though the language be approved.

Proposals to take a particular language, other than one of those mentioned above, must be accompanied by a special fee, additional to the regular Matriculation fee. This fee will be returned should the proposed language not be accepted by the Matriculation Board, but in no other case. The amount of this additional fee varies with the language selected, and can be ascertained on application to the External Registrar.

The following are the particulars of the foregoing subjects of examination:—

I.—ENGLISH.

The Examination in English will consist of two papers of one and a half hour each, and will include—

- (a) A subject for an essay to be chosen by each candidate from several subjects set. Those proposed may include some having reference to Geography and History, and some involving an acquaintance with English Authors, as well as more abstract subjects, the main object being to test power of expression, thought, and arrangement, general reading, and knowledge.

* Candidates who entered for the Matriculation Examination in or before January, 1902, will for the present be admitted to subsequent Matriculation Examinations upon payment at every such entry of a fee of £1, provided that they comply with the above Regulations. Colonial Candidates who withdraw their names after having entered for, or who fail to present themselves at, an examination will be required to pay the full fee of £2 upon every re-entry.

† Candidates who take the combined paper in History and Geography will not be allowed to take, whether in the general examination or for supplementary certificate, either the Modern History paper or the paper in Physical and General Geography; but candidates who have taken either of those subjects separately will be allowed to take the combined paper for a supplementary certificate.

- (b) Questions testing knowledge and command of English. These may include questions on précis writing, paraphrase, and analysis of sentences.
- (c) Questions testing general reading and knowledge of English books.

Candidates will be expected to devote to the essay at least one hour, after the expiry of which the second paper will be given out.

II.—ELEMENTARY MATHEMATICS.

Geometry.—The subjects of Euclid I.—IV., with simple deductions, including easy loci and the areas of triangles and parallelograms, of which the bases and altitudes are given commensurable lengths. (Euclid's proofs will not be insisted upon.)

III.—OPTIONAL LANGUAGES.

Latin.—The paper shall contain passages to be translated into English from Latin books not previously prescribed, together with questions on Grammar and simple and easy sentences of English to be translated into Latin.*

Candidates who take Latin may also take an additional paper on Latin prose, if they give notice on their Entry forms. This paper will not be a part of the Matriculation Examination, and marks gained on it will not be credited to the candidate. Two hours will be allowed for this paper, which will be of about the same difficulty as the corresponding paper in Responsions at Oxford.†

Greek.—The paper shall contain passages to be translated into English from Greek books not previously prescribed, together with questions on Grammar and simple and easy sentences of English to be translated into Greek.‡

French.—The paper shall contain (1) passages for translation from French, (2) a piece of easy translation into French, or, as an alternative, an essay of a simple character to be written in French, (3) questions on Grammar limited to Accidence and Elementary Syntax.

German.—The paper shall contain (1) passages for translation from German, (2) a piece of easy translation into German, or, as an alternative, an essay of a simple character to be written in German, (3) questions on Grammar limited to Accidence and Elementary Syntax.

Other Languages.§—The paper in any other language approved for the Matriculation Examination shall be drawn up as nearly as may be practicable in conformity with the following syllabus:—

The paper shall contain (1) an easy passage or easy passages for translation from the language in question, (2) an easy piece for translation into the language in question, or, as an alternative, an essay of a simple character to be written in the language in question, (3) questions on Grammar limited to Accidence and Elementary Syntax.

IV.—HISTORY.

Ancient.—The general course of Greek and Roman History, and an outline of the earlier monarchies.

The questions will be framed to test the general conceptions of history and historical development rather than technical detail.

Modern.—The general course of English history from 1485 to the death of Queen Victoria, with some reference to the contemporary history of Europe and Colonial developments.

The questions will be framed to test the general conception of history and historical development rather than technical detail.

V.—PHYSICAL AND GENERAL GEOGRAPHY.

The following regions in decreasing detail:—(a) England and Wales, (b) Scotland and Ireland, (c) Europe, the Mediterranean, the North Atlantic, North America, and Greenland, (d) the remaining Continents. Recapitulation from the point of view of the British Empire.

Attention should be directed to the following aspects of the several regions:—The broad contrasts and chief features of the land relief. The chief features of the coastal outline as related to those of the relief. The disposition of the water partings and of the chief river basins. The winds and sea currents, distribution of rainfall, the climatic contrasts, and the resulting agricultural contrasts. The districts of exceptionally dense or rare population considered in relation to their position, natural resources, and industrial activities. The arrangement of the political divisions upon the land relief and with reference to the drainage system. The analysis of the positions of the great towns.

Except in the case of Elementary Mathematics, candidates will only be allowed to take one paper in each subject. Two papers will be set in many other subjects in order to compress the examination into as short a period as possible, but no candidate will be allowed to take more than one of these papers. No option is allowed as to the order in which they are taken, and if the candidate does not present himself for examination in a given subject at the right time, he will on no account whatever be allowed to take a paper which may be set later on the same subject. It is, therefore, of the greatest importance that candidates should attend to the following rule:—

Candidates, having selected their subjects in accordance with the regulations, will be examined in these subjects in the numerical order in which they occur in the above list, and must take each subject on the first possible occasion accordingly.

Thus, a candidate who offers, in addition to English and Mathematics (Elementary), Botany, Mechanics, and French, must take Botany (No. 5) on the afternoon of the third day, Mechanics (No. 7) on the morning of the fourth day, and French (No. 10) on the afternoon of the fourth day. Again, a candidate who offers Latin, German (11), and Greek (12), must take German in the morning and Greek in the afternoon of the fourth day.

Candidates who take any of the subjects for which two months' notice or more is required will be informed when the examinations in these subjects will take place.

A pass certificate, signed by the principal and setting forth the subjects of examination taken by the candidate, shall be delivered to each successful candidate after the report of the Examiners shall have been approved by the Senate.‡

CAMBRIDGE LOCAL EXAMINATIONS, 1912.

AN Examination of Senior and Junior Candidates, in accordance with the Regulations of the Revised Code, will be held at Colombo, Moratuwa, Kandy, Galle, Jaffna, and Batticaloa, on December 9, 1912, and the following days.

2. Forms of entry duly filled up should be forwarded so as to reach the Director of Public Instruction not later than 2 P.M. on Thursday, August 1, 1912, together with the following fees, which should be paid as follows:—

(1) A Bank Draft on England payable to J. H. Flather, Esq., crossed "Barclay & Co.," at the rate of £1 for each candidate, as the Cambridge fee.

N.B.—The fees should not, under any circumstances, be remitted by Money Order. *No cash or Money Order, Bank Draft, or Cheque in favour of the Director of Public Instruction will be accepted.*

(2) A Post Office Order (not Postal Order), Bank Draft, or crossed cheque in my favour at the rate of Rs. 2.50 for each candidate, as the local expenses fee. *Cash will not be accepted.*

N.B.—Forms of entry will be accepted from August 2 to August 9 inclusive on payment of an extra fee of Rs. 5.

All entry forms received at the Public Instruction Office not accompanied by the Cambridge and local fees, as well as the proper birth certificate where one is required, will be immediately returned to the sender.

3. Forms of entry may be had from the Director in the second week in July. It is requested that Managers will only apply for such number of forms as they actually require, and that they will not encourage any student to enter as a candidate unless they are satisfied that he has a fair chance of passing the examination.

It is also requested that Principals of Schools will check the entry forms of their candidates and see that the instructions of the Syndicate with regard to the filling up of the forms are complied with. *The date of birth should be carefully verified, and the candidates' full names must be given without any initials.*

4. Applications for entry forms should be made from the first week in July, 1912, stating what kinds of entry forms (C, D, E, or F) and the number of forms of each kind are required.

5. Religious Knowledge, as a subject of examination, is not necessary for Colonial Students, and no grant or award under the Revised Code will be made directly or indirectly dependent on marks gained for Religious Knowledge.

6. All under-age candidates must forward with their entry forms certificates of the registration of their birth, unless such a certificate has been sent to this office for a previous examination. Those who have already forwarded certificates of birth for a previous examination *should mention the year, the examination for which they forwarded the certificates, and the centre at which they appeared for the examination.* Affidavits will not be accepted *under any circumstances.*

If the name appearing in the birth register differs, either by alteration or addition, from the name by which the candidate is known, the parent or guardian should, before obtaining a certificate, apply to the Registrar-General or his Assistant for such alteration in the manner set forth in section 7 of Ordinance No. 23 of 1900.

A certificate of baptism should be a proper extract of the Baptismal Register, *i.e.*, an exact copy of the entry of the register should be made, and at the foot of the copy the incumbent of the Church issuing it should certify to its correctness. Baptismal certificates will only be accepted if the candidate's baptism was within four months of his date of birth; otherwise he will not be allowed to compete for Prizes and Scholarships.

Principals of Schools should examine carefully all certificates of birth or baptism, and should not forward any certificate which is not a proper and reliable document.

7. Private students will only be admitted as under-age candidates if they forward, along with their entry forms a written statement from an Inspector of Schools that their certificate of birth or baptism is a reliable document.

8. Schools registered as elementary schools are not allowed to present candidates for the Cambridge Examinations.

Candidates will not be allowed to present themselves as private students if they are actually pupils of any school or college.

Private students will not be admitted to the examinations unless they have previously obtained permission from the Department and unless they produce a certificate from some responsible person to the effect that they have a reasonable chance of passing the examination.

9. Fees cannot be returned. If notice of withdrawal is received by the Local Secretary more than sixteen days before the commencement of the examination, a voucher will be sent, which will enable the student to enter in another year without further fee to the University, subject to the usual conditions of age. The Syndicate do not undertake to grant a similar voucher in any case in which the full sixteen days' notice has not been given. Applications made within sixteen days of the examination will, however, be considered if accompanied by a certificate from a qualified doctor stating that the candidate is physically unfit to take the examination. No applications received after the commencement of the examination can be considered. Students holding vouchers must apply for fresh forms of entry and return them to Local Secretaries on or before August 1 together with the local expenses fee of Rs. 2.50 (*vide* section 2 of clause 2).

N.B.—(1) The Mathematical Prize will be awarded on the results of the Cambridge Senior Local Examination of December, 1912, to the candidate under 19 years of age who passes the best examination in the subjects of section 10.

(2) A prize of the value of Rs. 100 in books, presented by Don Carolis Hewavitarana, Mudaliyar, entitled the "Hewavitarana Science Prize," will be awarded on the results of the Junior Local Examination to the candidate under 16 years of age who passes the best examination in the subjects of section 11 "Elementary Experimental Science."

NOTES.

The schedules in Geometry for the Junior and Senior Examinations have been re-drafted.

Changes have been made in the regulations for Religious Knowledge in the Senior Examination.

Domestic Science has been added to the subjects for the Senior Examination.

In December Chinese or Sanskrit or Arabic may under certain conditions be offered by Senior candidates as an alternative for Greek.

Spanish has been added to the subjects for the Preliminary Examination.

No examination for Army Leaving Certificates will be held after December, 1911.

Some changes have been made in the Time Tables. Special attention is called to the regulation that no student may take two papers included in the same bracket.

EXAMINATION OF JUNIOR STUDENTS.

No one born before December 15, 1896, can be admitted to the December examination for Junior Students under the ordinary conditions. Those born before December 15, 1896, may be admitted to the December examination, but they can obtain a Pass Certificate only, and are not eligible for marks of distinction.

PART I.—COMPULSORY.

Every student will be required to satisfy the Examiners in (1) Writing from Dictation, and (2) Arithmetic.*

PART II.

The examination will comprise the subjects mentioned in the following seventeen sections. Students will be required to satisfy the Examiners either (a) in three of the sections 1-14 (one at least of the three being section 2 or one of the sections 4-9); or (b) in two of the sections 1-14, together with two subjects† out of any other two of these sections (one at least of the two complete sections being section 2 or one of the sections 4-9). No student may enter for subjects in more than seven sections, together with one subject from an eighth section, subject to the condition that this additional subject does not suffice for a pass in the section. One at least of the four subjects of section 1 must be taken by all students, unless their parents or guardians object to their examination in that section.

N.B.—No student can take two papers set at the same time in the Time Table.

A certain number of marks will be assigned to Handwriting. Composition will be taken into account.

Section 1.—RELIGIOUS KNOWLEDGE : ‡

Questions will be set on (a) the Gospel of *St. Matthew*, credit being given for a satisfactory knowledge of the original Greek [or, for Jewish students only, *I. Kings*, credit being given for a satisfactory knowledge of the original Hebrew]; (b) *I. Samuel*; (c) the *Acts of the Apostles*, xiii.-xxviii.; (d) the Church Catechism and the Offices for Baptism and Confirmation in the Book of Common Prayer. In New Testament subjects special papers in which the Douay version is used will be prepared for candidates who have been accustomed to the use of that version.§

To pass in this section students must satisfy the Examiners in (a), and in one of the subjects (b), (c), (d), to each of which the same credit is given. No student will be examined in more than one of the subjects (b), (c), (d).

Section 2.—ENGLISH LANGUAGE AND LITERATURE :

(a) *English Composition*.—Exercises, including the composition of an Essay, will be set with the object of testing the power of the candidates to write clear and grammatical English.

(b) *Shakespeare, Henry V.*

(c) *Scott, The Lady of the Lake.*

(d) A paper of questions of a general, not a detailed, character, on *Scott, Woodstock*, and *Select Poems of Tennyson*, v.-xvii. (ed. George and Hadow, Messrs. Macmillan & Co.).

(e) *English Grammar*, including parsing and the analysis of sentences.

To pass in the section candidates must satisfy the Examiners in two subjects of which (b) or (c) or (d) must be one. They cannot gain the mark of distinction unless they satisfy the Examiners in three subjects. They may not be examined in both (b) and (c), or in more than three subjects altogether.

Throughout the section importance will be attached to clearness and correctness of style.

Section 3.—HISTORY AND GEOGRAPHY :

(a) Outlines of the *History of England*. The paper will consist of three divisions on the periods (i.) 1066-1485, (ii.) 1485-1688, (iii.) 1688-1832 respectively. Candidates may if they wish select questions from all three of the divisions, or may confine themselves to two or one of them.

(b) Outlines of the *History of the British Empire* from 1492 A.D. to 1784 A.D.||

(c) Outlines of *Roman History* from 37 A.D. to 117 A.D.

(d) Geography. Questions will be set on (i.) *Great Britain and Ireland*, (ii.) *Africa*, (iii.) *North America and the West Indies*. Candidates may select questions from all three of the divisions, or may confine themselves to any two. An outline map will be given to be filled up by inserting and naming the chief ranges of mountains, the chief rivers and lakes, the chief towns, and the political divisions, and by naming the chief features of the coast line, of some part of these portions of the world. Questions will be set requiring knowledge of the outlines of Physical Geography. Importance will be attached to a knowledge of the relation between the physical features of a country and its political and commercial geography.

To pass in this section students must satisfy the Examiners in either (a), (b), or (c), and also in (d). No student will be examined in more than one of the three subjects (a), (b), (c).

Section 4.—LATIN.

The papers will include (1) questions on grammar and parsing; (2a) passages for translation from selected books, with questions, and (2b) as an alternative, unprepared passages for translation into English, with questions; (3) one or more easy unprepared passages for translation into English, a vocabulary of the less familiar words being given; (4) one or more unprepared passages of ordinary difficulty for translation into English; (5) easy sentences for translation into Latin; (6) one or more continuous passages for translation into Latin. The unprepared passages set under (2b) will be for those candidates only who do not take any selected book.

The selected books for 1912 are *Cæsar, de Bello Gallico I.*, and *Virgil, Aeneid VII.* Candidates may take any two, but not more than two of the following portions of these books: (i.) *de Bello Gallico I.*, 1-29; (ii.) *de Bello Gallico I.*, 30-54; (iii.) *Aeneid VII.*, 1-405; (iv.) *Aeneid VII.*, 406-817.

In order to pass in Latin, candidates must reach a certain standard in the subject as a whole, and must also satisfy the Examiners separately in accidence and either in (3) or in (4). In order to gain the mark of distinction they must reach a higher standard in the subject as a whole, and must also reach a certain standard in (4) and in (6).

Section 5.—GREEK.

The papers will include (1) questions on grammar and parsing; (2a) passages for translation from selected books, with questions, and (2b) as an alternative, unprepared passages for translation into English, with questions; (3) one or more easy unprepared passages for translation into English, a vocabulary of the less familiar words being given; (4) one or more unprepared passages of ordinary difficulty for translation into English; (5) easy sentences for translation into Greek. The unprepared passages set under (2b) will be for those candidates only who do not take any selected book.

* The use of algebraical symbols and processes is permitted. A knowledge of recurring decimals and of the process of extracting cube root will not be required. Candidates will be expected to know the following tables of weights and measures, namely, avoirdupois, linear measure, square measure, capacity (pints, quarts, gallons); and in the metric system, the metre, the gramme, and the litre, with their multiples and submultiples. Questions may be set involving the franc and the centime, the dollar and the cent.

† Any one of the sections 15, 16, 17 may count in the place of one of these two subjects.

‡ For 1913 and 1914, subjects (a), (b), and (c) will be as follows:—1913: (a) *St. Mark* [or, for Jewish students only, *II. Kings*]; (b) *II. Samuel*; (c) *Acts of the Apostles*, i.-xv. 1914: (a) *St. Luke*; (b) *I. Kings*; (c) *Acts of the Apostles*, xiii.-xxviii.

§ Candidates wishing to avail themselves of this arrangement must make a statement to that effect in their forms of entry; if they omit to do so, they cannot be allowed to take the special papers.

The selected books for 1912 are *Xenophon, Anabasis V.*, and *Euripides, Alcestis*. Candidates may take any two, but not more than two, of the following portions of these books: (i.) *Anabasis V.*, 1-4; (ii.) *Anabasis V.*, 5-8; (iii.) *Alcestis*, 1-567 (omitting 86-136, 213-244, 435-475); (iv.) *Alcestis*, 603-1163 (omitting 962-1005).

In order to pass in Greek, candidates must reach a certain standard in the subject as a whole, and must also satisfy the Examiners separately in accident, and either in (3) or in (4). In order to gain the mark of distinction they must reach a higher standard in the subject as a whole, and must also reach a certain standard in (4).

Section 6.—FRENCH. Section 7.—GERMAN:*

In sections 6 and 7, the paper will include (1) questions on grammar; (2a) passages for translation into English from selected books, and (2b) as an alternative, unprepared passages for translation into English; (3) one or more easy unprepared passages for translation into English, a vocabulary of the less familiar words being given; (4) one or more unprepared passages of ordinary difficulty for translation into English; (5) easy English sentences for translation into the language; (6a) one or more continuous passages for translation into the language, and (6b) as an alternative, subjects on one of which candidates are to write a short composition in the language.

The unprepared passages set under (2b) will be for those candidates only who do not take a selected book. Higher marks will be assigned to (2b) than to (2a). For those who take selected books questions may be set on historical and geographical allusions and on the metre of verse subjects. The selected books for 1912 are as follows:—In French, Erckmann-Chatrian, *Madame Thérèse*, chapters 1-11; in German, Hauff, *Der Scheik von Alessandria und seine Sklaven*.

No candidate may take both (6a) and (6b).

In order to pass in French or German, candidates must reach a certain standard in the subject as a whole, and must also satisfy the Examiners separately in (1) and either in (3) or in (4). In order to gain the mark of distinction they must reach a higher standard in the subject as a whole, and must also reach a certain standard in (4) and in (6).

For particulars of the examination in Spoken French and Spoken German, see page 125.

Section 8.—SPANISH. Section 9.—DUTCH:

The paper will include (1) questions on grammar, (2) passages for translation into English, (3) passages for translation into the language.

Section 10.—MATHEMATICS:

(a) GEOMETRY (see page 125).

(b) ALGEBRA.—Candidates will be required to satisfy the Examiners in definitions and explanations of algebraical signs and terms; addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division of algebraical quantities; theory of indices; highest common factor and lowest common multiple; extraction of the square root; the solution of easy equations of the first degree (including simultaneous equations) and questions producing such equations, and the solution of easy quadratic equations involving one unknown quantity. Questions may be set on graphs; and when such questions are set, squared paper will be provided. Questions will also be set on quadratic equations, the solution of two simultaneous equations, one being linear, the elementary rules of ratio and proportion, arithmetical and geometrical progressions, permutations, combinations, the binomial theorem with positive integral exponents, the theory of indices including the nature of logarithms, and the use of logarithms to the base 10. Candidates will be provided in the examination room with four-figure tables of logarithms. They should provide themselves with graduated rulers.

(c) PLANE TRIGONOMETRY, including the solution of triangles and the use of logarithms. Questions will not be set involving angles greater than 360 degrees. Candidates will be provided in the examination room with mathematical tables.† They must bring with them a graduated ruler and a protractor.

(d) ELEMENTARY MECHANICS.—Questions will be set on the composition and resolution of forces acting in one plane at a point, including graphical representation of the same; parallel forces; moments of forces about a point; the properties of the centre of gravity; simple applications to the lever, the common balance, the inclined plane, and the pulley; the composition and resolution of velocities and accelerations in one plane; rectilinear motion with uniform acceleration, including gravity; motion, momentum, force, mass. Candidates must bring with them a graduated ruler and a protractor.

To pass in this section, students must satisfy the Examiners in Geometry and in Algebra.

Section 11.—ELEMENTARY EXPERIMENTAL SCIENCE.‡—Students will be expected to show that they have acquired a practical acquaintance with the elements of physical and chemical measurement, and with the properties of common substances as ascertained by simple experiments.§ Three papers will be set, one of which (Paper III.) will be a practical examination.

Section 12. CHEMISTRY:

(a) THEORETICAL CHEMISTRY.§

(b) PRACTICAL CHEMISTRY.‡§—Alternative papers are set in this subject, one on Thursday, the other on Saturday; candidates must state in their forms of entry which paper they will take.

To pass in this section, students must satisfy the Examiners in both the subjects (a) and (b).

Section 13.—PHYSICS:

(a) HEAT.§

(b) SOUND AND LIGHT.§

(c) ELECTRICITY AND MAGNETISM.§—Alternative papers are set in this subject, one on Tuesday; the other on Saturday; candidates must state in their forms of entry which paper they will take.

In this section the questions will be principally such as will test the candidates' knowledge of the subject as gained from a course of experimental instruction.

To pass in this section, students must satisfy the Examiners in two of the three subjects (a), (b), (c).

Section 14.—BIOLOGY AND PHYSICAL GEOGRAPHY:

(a) BOTANY.§

(b) NATURAL HISTORY OF ANIMALS.§

(c) PHYSIOLOGY AND HYGIENE.§

(d) PHYSICAL GEOGRAPHY.—Elementary questions will be set on the present physical condition of the earth, and on the physical agencies modifying its surface or affecting the conditions of life upon it.§

To pass in this section, students must satisfy the Examiners in one of the four subjects. They may not take more than one of the three (a), (b), (c).

* In writing German in the examination students are advised to use the English character, but the use of the German character is not forbidden.

† The tables which will be provided are the Cambridge Four-Figure Mathematical Tables containing logarithms of numbers, of sines and cosines, of tangents and cotangents, natural sines and cosines, natural tangents and cotangents. Copies can be obtained from Syndicate Buildings, Cambridge, price threepence, post free (or, bound in limp cloth, price sixpence, post free).

‡ This subject can be taken at those centres only at which a suitable laboratory and apparatus can be provided for the practical examination. A special local fee may be charged.

§ Detailed schedules can be obtained on application to the General Secretary. The schedules are the same for 1912 as they were for 1911.

Section 15.—(a) BOOKKEEPING.—Questions will be set on Bookkeeping by double entry. Ruled forms will be provided for the Candidates. *Alternative papers are set in this subject, one on Friday, the other on Saturday; candidates must state in their forms of entry which paper they will take.*

(b) MENSURATION AND SURVEYING.—Questions will be set on Mensuration and on the Elements of Land Surveying. Candidates will be provided in the examination room with tables of logarithms.* They should provide themselves with rulers, scales, &c.

(c) SHORTHAND.—The students will take down passages read aloud, and will afterwards transcribe them. Passages will be dictated at the rates of fifty words and eighty words per minute.

To pass in this section, students must satisfy the examiners in one of the subjects (a), (b), (c). They may not take both (b) and (c).

Section 16.—DRAWING :

(a) FREEHAND DRAWING, from a photograph or print. The examination will be designed to test the power of the candidates to draw accurately and intelligently in outline. The drawings are to be executed in pencil.

(b) MODEL DRAWING.—The group, to be drawn in outline only, will consist of one or two of the following solids, namely, the cube, cone, cylinder, square pyramid, hexagonal prism, and triangular prism, together with some common object and a drawing board.

(c) GEOMETRICAL DRAWING.—*Alternative papers are set in this subject, one on Monday, the other on Saturday; candidates must state in their forms of entry which paper they will take.*

(d) ELEMENTARY DESIGN.—Candidates will be supplied with a photograph or print of some characteristic portion of a plant, and will be required to fill a given space with a design based thereon. Either the background or the pattern, but not both, may be tinted in a wash of any one colour.

(e) MEMORY DRAWING.—Candidates will be required to draw simple objects from memory, the drawing to be executed in any medium.

To pass in this section, students must satisfy the Examiners in two of the five subjects. They may not take more than one of the three subjects (c), (d), (e).

Section 17.—MUSIC.—Questions will be set on Notation; on Scales, Clefs, Keys, Intervals, Time; on the Marks and Terms generally employed in Music; on Cadences. Exercises will be set, in not more than four parts, on Triads and their Inversions, and the Dominant Seventh without inversions; in these exercises the lowest part, with or without figuring, will be given.

EXAMINATION OF SENIOR STUDENTS.

No one born before December 15, 1893, can be admitted to the December examination for Senior Students under the ordinary conditions. Those born before December 15, 1893, may be admitted to the December examination, but they can obtain a Pass Certificate only, and are not eligible for marks of distinction.

PART I.—COMPULSORY.

Every student will be required to satisfy the Examiners in Arithmetic.†

PART II.

The examination will comprise the subjects mentioned in the following seventeen sections. Every student will be required to satisfy the Examiners in at least three of the sections 1-14‡ (one at least of the three being section 2 or one of the sections 4-9). No student may enter for more than seven sections, together with one subject from an eighth section. subject to the condition that this additional subject does not suffice for a pass in the section; those who enter for three subjects in section 1 may not enter for more than six sections in addition to section 1. One at least of the five subjects of section 1 must be taken by all students, unless their parents or guardians object to their examination in that section.

N.B.—No student can take two papers set at the same time in the Time Table.

Section 1.—RELIGIOUS KNOWLEDGE :§

The examination will consist of questions on (a) the Gospel of *St. Matthew*, credit being given for a satisfactory knowledge of the original Greek [or, for Jewish students only, *I. Kings*, credit being given for a satisfactory knowledge of the original Hebrew]; (b) the *Acts of the Apostles*, xiii.-xxviii.; (c) *I. Samuel*; (d) *I. Corinthians*; (e) The Litany and the Offices for Communion, Baptism, and Confirmation in the Book of Common Prayer; questions will be set on the history of these portions of the Prayer Book; special attention should be paid to the Nicene Creed. In New Testament subjects special papers in which the Douay version is used will be prepared for candidates who have been accustomed to the use of that version.||

To pass in this section, students must satisfy the Examiners in two of the five subjects. They may offer three subjects, but they will not be required to take more than two subjects in order to obtain the mark of distinction. Those who take three subjects in this section may not enter for more than six other sections. No student will be examined in both (a) and (b), or in both (d) and (e). Credit will be given for a knowledge of the Revised Version.

Section 2.—ENGLISH LANGUAGE AND LITERATURE :

(a) ENGLISH COMPOSITION.—Exercises, including the composition of an Essay, will be set with the object of testing the power of the candidates to write clear and grammatical English.

(b) *Shakespeare, Henry V.*

(c) *Milton, Samson Agonistes.*

(d) A paper of questions of a general, not a detailed, character, on *Shakespeare, King Lear, Gray's Poems, and Southey's Life of Nelson.*

Candidates may consult Stopford Brooke's *English Literature* or some similar work. They will not be expected to show acquaintance with minor authors or biographical details. To pass in this section, candidates must satisfy the Examiners in two of these five subjects. They cannot gain the mark of distinction unless they satisfy the Examiners in three. They may not take both (b) and (c), or both (d) and (e).

Throughout the section importance will be attached to clearness and correctness of style.

The papers will include (1) questions on grammar; (2a) passages for translation from selected books, with questions, and (2b) as an alternative, unprepared passages for translation into English, with questions; (3) one or more easy unprepared passages for translation into English, a vocabulary of unfamiliar words being given; (4) one or more unprepared passages of ordinary difficulty for translation into English; (5) easy sentences for translation into Greek. The unprepared passages set under (2b) will be for those candidates only who do not take any selected book.

The selected books for 1912 are either *Demosthenes, Olynthiacs*, or *Plato, Crito*, and *Euthyphro*; and either *Homer, Iliad XXIII.*, or *Euripides, Alcesteis*.

In order to pass in Greek, candidates must reach a certain standard in the subject as a whole, and must also satisfy the Examiners separately in (1) and either in (3) or in (4). In order to gain the mark of distinction, they must reach a higher standard in the subject as a whole, and must also reach a certain standard in (4).

Section 6.—FRENCH. Section 7.—GERMAN : ‡

The paper will consist of three parts: (1) questions on grammar; (2) passages for translation into English; (3) two continuous passages of English for translation into the language. As an alternative to the harder of these passages, subjects will be given, on one of which candidates may write a short composition in the language.

In order to pass in French or German, candidates must reach a certain standard in the subject as a whole. They may be rejected for weakness in any one of the three parts of the paper. In order to gain the mark of distinction they must reach a higher standard in the subject as a whole, and must also reach a certain standard in (2) and in (3).

For particulars of the examination in Spoken French and Spoken German, see page 125.

Section 8.—SPANISH. Section 9.—DUTCH :

The paper will include (1) questions on grammar, (2) passages for translation into English, (3) passages for translation into the language.

In order to pass in Spanish or Dutch, candidates must reach a certain standard in the subject as a whole. They may be rejected for weakness in any one of the three parts of the paper. In order to gain the mark of distinction they must reach a higher standard in the subject as a whole, and must also reach a certain standard in (2) and in (3).

Section 10.—MATHEMATICS.

(a) GEOMETRY (see page 125).

(b) ALGEBRA, including definitions and explanations of algebraical signs and terms, addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division, highest common factor and lowest common multiple, extraction of the square root, the solution of simple and quadratic equations and of problems producing such equations, graphs, § theory of indices, including the nature and use of logarithms, the elementary rules of ratio and proportion, arithmetical, geometrical, and harmonical progressions, scales of notation, permutations, combinations, and the binomial theorem with positive integral exponents. For candidates for Honours, easy questions will also be set on the more advanced parts of Algebra. Candidates will be provided in the examination room with mathematical tables. || They should bring with them graduated rulers.

(c) PLANE TRIGONOMETRY up to the solution of triangles. For candidates for Honours questions will also be set on the more advanced parts of Trigonometry, including De Moivre's Theorem with simple applications. Candidates will be provided in the examination room with mathematical tables. || They must bring with them a graduated ruler and a protractor.

(d) ELEMENTS OF ANALYTICAL GEOMETRY. ¶

(e) ELEMENTS OF THE DIFFERENTIAL CALCULUS, ¶ including the differentiation of simple functions, simple applications of Taylor's and Maclaurin's theorems, maxima and minima of functions of one variable, and tangents and normals.

(f) APPLIED MATHEMATICS, including the equilibrium of forces acting in one plane and simple graphical methods; the properties of the centre of gravity; friction; the lever, the common balance, the inclined plane, and the pulley; the screw; the composition and resolution of velocities and accelerations in one plane; rectilinear motion with uniform acceleration; motion, momentum, force, mass; work, energy, power; projectiles; direct impact of spherical bodies. Candidates must bring with them a graduated ruler and a protractor.

To pass in this section, students must satisfy the Examiners in (a) and in (b).

Section 11.—CHEMISTRY :

(a) THEORETICAL CHEMISTRY.**

(b) PRACTICAL CHEMISTRY.**

To pass in this section, students must satisfy the Examiners in both (a) and (b).

Section 12.—PHYSICS :

(a) The elementary principles of EXPERIMENTAL MECHANICS, including Statics, Dynamics, and Hydrostatics, as illustrated by simple experiments, common observation, or the action of well known machines.*

(b) HEAT.*—Alternative papers are set in this subject, one on Tuesday, the other on Saturday; candidates must state in their forms of entry which paper they will take.

(c) SOUND AND LIGHT.*

(d) ELECTRICITY AND MAGNETISM.*

In (b), (c), (d) questions will be set on fundamental laws and the experiments that illustrate them.

To pass in this section, students must satisfy the Examiners in two of the four subjects (a), (b), (c), (d). They may not take more than three of the four subjects.

Section 13.—BIOLOGICAL, DOMESTIC SCIENCE, AND PHYSICAL GEOGRAPHY :

(a) BOTANY.*

(b) NATURAL HISTORY OF ANIMALS.*

(c) PHYSIOLOGY AND HYGIENE.†—Alternative papers are set in this subject, one on Wednesday, the other on Saturday; candidates must state in their forms of entry which paper they will take.

(d) DOMESTIC SCIENCE.†.—Students cannot enter for this subject unless they either have passed in Elementary Experimental Science in the Junior Examination or produce evidence that they have taken a practical course in Elementary Physics and Chemistry.

(e) PHYSICAL GEOGRAPHY.—Questions will be set on the present physical condition of the earth, and the physical agencies modifying it or affecting the conditions of life upon it.†

To pass in this section, students must satisfy the Examiners in one of the five subjects. They may not take more than two of the five subjects, nor may they take both (c) and (d).

Section 14.—AGRICULTURAL SCIENCE.—Two papers will be set.† Students entering for the section must take both the papers.

Section 15.—(a) BOOKKEEPING.—Questions will be set on Bookkeeping by double entry. Ruled forms will be provided for the candidates. Alternative papers are set in this subject, one on Friday, the other on Saturday; candidates must state in their forms of entry which paper they will take.

(b) MENSURATION AND SURVEYING.—Questions will be set on Mensuration and on the Elements of Land Surveying and Levelling. Candidates will be provided in the examination room with tables of logarithms.‡ They should provide themselves with rulers, scales, &c.

(c) SHORTHAND.—Students will be required to take down passages read aloud, and afterwards to transcribe them. Passages will be dictated at the rates of seventy words and ninety words per minute.

To pass in this section, students must satisfy the Examiners in (a), and also in (b) or (c). No student may take both (b) and (c).

Section 16.—DRAWING :

(a) FREEHAND DRAWING, from a photograph or print. The examination will be designed to test the power of the candidates to draw accurately and intelligently in outline. The drawings are to be executed in pencil.

(b) MODEL DRAWING, from a group of common objects in which there may be included one or more of the following, namely, the cube, cone, cylinder, square pyramid, square prism, hexagonal prism, and skeleton cube; the group to be drawn in outline with pencil, and shaded with pencil, chalk, or wash of any one colour.

(c) PERSPECTIVE DRAWING.—Geometrical and common objects in parallel and angular perspective, above and below the horizon, with accidental vanishing points.

(d) DESIGN.—Candidates will be supplied with a photograph or print of some characteristic portion of a plant, and will be required to fill a given space with a coloured design based thereon.

(e) MEMORY DRAWING.—Candidates will be required to draw simple objects from memory, the drawing to be executed in any medium.

To pass in this section, candidates will be required to satisfy the Examiners in two subjects, of which one must be (a) or (b). They may not take more than one of the three subjects (c), (d), (e).

Section 17.—MUSIC.—Questions will be set on Notation; on Scales, Clefs, Keys, Intervals, Time; on the Marks and Terms generally employed in Music; on Cadences; on Triads and Chords of the Dominant Seventh and their Inversions; Single Suspensions. On the above Chords exercises (in not more than four parts) will be set, in which the highest or the lowest part will be given, the latter being either figured or unfigured. Questions will also be set on Parry's *Studies of the Great Composers* (Routledge), Chapters 1-4.

SUBSTITUTES FOR SET BOOKS AND SUBJECTS.

The pupils at any school may, on application from the authorities of the school, be allowed to substitute for the Set Book or Books in any subject in the Local Examinations another Book or Books, or for any Syllabus prescribed in the Regulations a different Syllabus, provided that the consent of the Syndicate is obtained. Such consent will not be given unless the alternative proposed in lieu of that prescribed is in the opinion of the Syndicate suitable and of equivalent length and difficulty. Any application made in accordance with this announcement must reach the General Secretary not later than April 1 for the ensuing December Examination. A fee, to cover the extra expense involved, will be payable by the school authorities for each special paper that has to be prepared.

In the December Examination of 1912, and the following years, Senior candidates may offer Chinese, or Sanskrit, or Arabic, as an alternative to Greek, at any centre from which an application accompanied by a special fee of £5 for each language has been received by the General Secretary not later than March 15 preceding.

Candidates taking any one of these languages must enter for the examination in the usual way and pay the ordinary University fee of £1 and the local fee.

SANSKRIT AND ARABIC.—The papers will include (1) questions on grammar; (2) passages for translation from selected books, with questions; (3) one or more unprepared passages for translation into English, a vocabulary of any unfamiliar words being given; (4) an easy passage of English for translation into the language.

In order to pass in Sanskrit or Arabic, candidates must reach a certain standard in the subject as a whole, and must also satisfy the Examiners separately in (1) and in (3). In order to gain the mark of distinction, they must reach a higher standard in the subject as a whole, and must also reach a certain standard in (4).

CHINESE.—The papers will include (1) passages for translation from selected books, with questions; (2) questions on the usages of words and tones; (3) one or more unprepared passages for translation into English; (4) an easy passage for translation from English into Chinese.

In order to pass in Chinese, candidates must reach a certain standard in the subject as a whole. In order to gain the mark of distinction, they must reach a higher standard in the subject as a whole, and particularly in (1) and (2).

The selected books for 1912 are—

SANSKRIT.—*Pancatantra* II., III.; *Ratnāvalī*.

ARABIC.—*Al-Fakhri*, from the beginning of the Dāulat al-Arba'a to the death of Yazid I. (pp. 88–143 in Ahlwardt's edition; pp. 101–163 in Derenbourg's edition); *The Mu'allakāt of 'Amr ibn Kulthūm and Zuhair*.

CHINESE.—*The San Tzu Ching*; *Lun Yü*, Books 1–10; *Meng Tzu*, Book 6, Parts I. and II.

There will be two papers in each of the languages, and they will be set at the same times as the Greek papers.

EXAMINATION IN SPOKEN FRENCH AND SPOKEN GERMAN.

The Syndicate will arrange for the examination of candidates in Spoken French and Spoken German at schools at which the authorities are prepared to pay a fee of half-a-crown for each candidate examined in each language (the minimum payable by any school being £1 for each language); together with the travelling expenses and the hotel expenses (if any) of the Examiner or Examiners.

Two or more schools may, if they wish, combine for the examination, the minimum fee payable by the combined schools for each language being £1. All the negotiations, however, between the schools must be conducted independently of the Syndicate; and, in communications with the Syndicate or the Examiners, the Principal of one of the schools must act as the representative of all of them. The Principal of the school conducting the correspondence must also be responsible for collecting the fees, including the share payable by each school for the out-of-pocket expenses of the Examiners, and must forward them in due course to the Syndicate. The names of all the candidates must be sent to the General Secretary on the same form, and all the candidates must be examined together.

Applications must reach the General Secretary not later than May 12 or October 3, and the examination will be held at some time, before the commencement of the Local Examinations, to be fixed by the Syndicate.

Candidates entering for the Spoken Examination in either language must also enter for the Written Examination in the same language, and if they pass therein and also in the Spoken Examination, the fact of their having satisfied the Examiners in the Spoken Examination will be endorsed on their Certificate.

The Spoken Examination will not be necessary for passing in the language or for the mark of distinction; it will, however, be taken into account in determining the position of candidates in the general Class List, and it will be counted towards the mark of distinction in cases where the mark of distinction would not be obtained without it.

In the Junior and Senior Examinations, candidates will be required (1) to read aloud a passage of French, or German; (2) to write a passage of French, or German, from dictation; (3) to hold a short conversation in French, or German, with the Examiner.

In the Junior and Senior Examinations the conversation will be partly on a portion of a French or German author to be selected by the school and approved by the Syndicate. A book or a portion of a book containing less than 10,000 words will not be approved. Application for the approval of the book must be received by the General Secretary not later than May 12 or October 3, and must be accompanied by a copy of the book.

SYLLABUS IN GEOMETRY.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS APPLICABLE TO THE JUNIOR AND SENIOR EXAMINATIONS.

The papers in Geometry will contain questions on Practical and on Theoretical Geometry. Every candidate will be expected to answer questions in both branches of the subject.

The questions on Practical Geometry will be set on the constructions contained in the annexed Schedule A, together with easy extensions of them. In cases where the validity of a construction is not obvious, the reasoning by which it is justified may be required. Every candidate must provide himself with a ruler graduated in inches and tenths of an inch, and in centimetres and millimetres, a set square, a protractor, compasses, and a fairly hard pencil. All figures must be drawn accurately and distinctly. Questions may be set in which the use of the set square or of the protractor is forbidden.

The questions on Theoretical Geometry will consist of theorems contained in the annexed Schedule B, together with questions upon these theorems, easy deductions from them, and arithmetical illustrations. Any proof of a proposition will be accepted which appears to the Examiners to form part of a systematic treatment of the subject; the order in which the theorems are stated in Schedule B is not imposed as a sequence of their treatment. In the proof of theorems and deductions from them, the use of hypothetical constructions will be permitted.

JUNIOR EXAMINATION.

Attention is called to the General Instructions above.

The paper will consist of two Parts, each containing questions on Practical and on Theoretical Geometry. Candidates can pass in Geometry by doing sufficiently well in Part I.

PART I.—Questions will be set on Schedules A (i.), A (ii.), and B (i.), B (ii.). (Page 126.)

Candidates will also be expected to be acquainted with the forms of the simpler solid bodies, namely, the cube, the rectangular block, the tetrahedron, the sphere, the cylinder, the wedge, the pyramid, and the cone.

PART II.—Questions will be set on Schedules A (iii.) and B (iii.). (Page 126.)

SENIOR EXAMINATION.

Attention is called to the General Instructions above.

Questions will be set on Schedule A (i.), A (ii.), A (iii.), and B (i.), B (ii.), B (iii.). (Pages 126.)

For candidates for Honours questions will also be set relating to other properties of triangles and circles, and to the Elementary Geometry of the plane and the sphere.

SCHEDULES.

SCHEDULE A. (PRACTICAL.)

A (i.).

Bisection of angles and of straight lines.
 Construction of perpendiculars to straight lines.
 Construction of an angle equal to a given angle.
 Construction of parallels to a given straight line.
 Simple cases of the construction from sufficient data of triangles and quadrilaterals.
 Division of straight lines into a given number of equal parts or into parts in any given proportions.

SCHEDULE B. (THEORETICAL.)

B (i.).

Angles at a Point.

If a straight line stands on another straight line, the sum of the two angles so formed is equal to two right angles and the converse.

If two straight lines intersect, the vertically opposite angles are equal.

Parallel Straight Lines.

When a straight line cuts two other straight lines, if (i.) a pair of alternate angles are equal, or (ii.) a pair of corresponding angles are equal, or (iii.) a pair of interior angles on the same side of the cutting line are together equal to two right angles, then the two straight lines are parallel; and the converse.

Straight lines which are parallel to the same straight line are parallel to one another.

Triangles and Rectilinear Figures.

The sum of the angles of a triangle is equal to two right angles.

If the sides of a convex polygon are produced in order, the sum of the angles so formed is equal to four right angles.

If two triangles have two sides of the one equal to two sides of the other, each to each, and also the angles contained by those sides equal, the triangles are congruent.

If two triangles have two angles of the one equal to two angles of the other, each to each, and also one side of the one equal to the corresponding side of the other, the triangles are congruent.

If two sides of a triangle are equal, the angles opposite to these sides are equal; and the converse.

If two triangles have the three sides of the one equal to the three sides of the other, each to each, the triangles are congruent.

If two right-angled triangles have their hypotenuses equal, and one side of the one equal to one side of the other, the triangles are congruent.

If two sides of a triangle are unequal, the greater side has the greater angle opposite to it; and the converse.

Of all the straight lines that can be drawn to a given straight line from a given point outside it, the perpendicular is the shortest.

The opposite sides and angles of a parallelogram are equal, each diagonal bisects the parallelogram, and the diagonals bisect one another.

If there are three or more parallel straight lines, and the intercepts made by them on any straight line that cuts them are equal, then the corresponding intercepts on any other straight line that cuts them are also equal.

Loci.

The locus of a point which is equidistant from two fixed points is the perpendicular bisector of the straight line joining the two fixed points.

The locus of a point which is equidistant from two intersecting straight lines consists of the pair of straight lines which bisect the angles between the two given lines.

B (ii.).

Areas.

Parallelograms on the same or equal bases and of the same altitude are equal in area.

Triangles on the same or equal bases and of the same altitude are equal in area.

Equal triangles on the same or equal bases are of the same altitude.

In a right-angled triangle, the square described on the hypotenuse is equal to the sum of the squares described on the sides containing the right angle; and the converse.

The Circle.

A straight line drawn from the centre of a circle to bisect a chord which is not a diameter, is at right angles to the chord; conversely, the perpendicular to a chord from the centre bisects the chord.

There is one circle, and one only, which passes through three given points not in a straight line.

Equal chords of a circle are equidistant from the centre; and the converse.

The tangent at any point of a circle and the radius through the point are perpendicular to one another.

If two circles touch, the point of contact lies on the straight line through the centres.

The angle which an arc of a circle subtends at the centre is double that which it subtends at any point on the remaining part of the circumference.

Angles in the same segment of a circle are equal; and, if the line joining two points subtends equal angles at two other points on the same side of it, the four points lie on a circle.

The angle in a semicircle is a right angle; the angle in a segment greater than a semicircle is less than a right angle; and the angle in a segment less than a semicircle is greater than a right angle.

The opposite angles of any quadrilateral inscribed in a circle are supplementary; and the converse.

B (iii.).

Areas.

Illustrations and explanations of the geometrical theorems corresponding to the following algebraical identities:—

$$\begin{aligned} k(a + b + c + \dots) &= ka + kb + kc + \dots, \\ (a + b)^2 &= a^2 + 2ab + b^2, \\ (a - b)^2 &= a^2 - 2ab + b^2, \\ a^2 - b^2 &= (a + b)(a - b). \end{aligned}$$

The square on a side of a triangle is greater or less than the sum of the squares on the other two sides, according as the angle contained by those sides is obtuse or acute. The difference is twice the rectangle contained by one of the two sides and the projection on it of the other.

The Circle.

In equal circles (or, in the same circle) (i.) if two arcs subtend equal angles at the centres, they are equal; (ii.) conversely, if two arcs are equal, they subtend equal angles at the centre.

In equal circles (or, in the same circle) (i.) if two chords are equal, they cut off equal arcs; (ii.) conversely, if two arcs are equal, the chords of the arcs are equal.

If a straight line touch a circle, and from the point of contact a chord be drawn, the angles which this chord makes with the tangent are equal to the angles in the alternate segments.

If two chords of a circle intersect either inside or outside the circle the rectangle contained by the parts of the one is equal to the rectangle contained by the parts of the other.

Proportion: Similar Triangles.

(Proofs which are only applicable to commensurable magnitudes will be accepted.)

If a straight line is drawn parallel to one side of a triangle, the other two sides are divided proportionally; and the converse.

If two triangles are equiangular their corresponding sides are proportional; and the converse.

If two triangles have one angle of the one equal to one angle of the other and the sides about these equal angles proportional, the triangles are similar.

The internal bisector of an angle of a triangle divides the opposite side internally in the ratio of the sides containing the angle, and likewise the external bisector externally.

The ratio of the areas of similar triangles is equal to the ratio of the squares on corresponding sides.

EXEMPTIONS FROM VARIOUS EXAMINATIONS, &c.

[The Syndicate do not hold themselves responsible for any error caused by changes in requirements with which they have not been made acquainted. Students are referred to the published regulations of the respective institutions.]

A. THE UNIVERSITY OF CAMBRIDGE: PREVIOUS EXAMINATION.—The following are the conditions under which a candidate in the Senior Local Examination is entitled to exemption from parts or the whole of the previous examination:

(1) From the Classical Papers in Part I., if the candidate has at one and the same examination satisfied the Examiners in Latin and in Greek;* and, in addition, from the paper on the Greek Gospel,* if the candidate has at the same or some subsequent examination satisfied the Examiners in the Gospel (including the Greek Text);

(2) From the papers on Mathematics in Part II., if the candidate has at one and the same examination satisfied the Examiners in Arithmetic, in Geometry, and in Algebra; and, in addition, (a) from the English Essay if the candidate has at the same or some subsequent examination satisfied the Examiners in English Composition, (b) from the paper on Paley's *Evidences* and its substitutes if the candidate has at the same or some subsequent examination satisfied the Examiners in Religious Knowledge or in Logic or in Chemistry or in Physics;

(3) From the additional subjects if the candidate has shown a sufficient degree of merit either in Applied Mathematics or in French or in German.

Students desirous of obtaining exemption from Part I., Part II., or the additional subjects of the previous examination may, whether they already hold the certificate of the Syndicate or not, enter for those subjects alone that are required for the purpose.

B. THE UNIVERSITY OF OXFORD.—The holder of a Senior Certificate is entitled to exemption from the examination in Stated Subjects in Responsions, provided (i.) that in the Senior Local Examination he has shown sufficient merit in Latin and in Greek to be qualified in these subjects for exemption from Part I. of the previous examination of the University of Cambridge, (ii.) that the certificate includes Arithmetic and either Geometry or Algebra, (iii.) that the candidate has shown sufficient merit in Latin Prose. If the holder of the certificate has satisfied conditions (i.) and (ii.), but not condition (iii.), he is entitled to exemption from the examination in Stated Subjects contingently on his passing a further examination in Latin Prose at Oxford.

The holder of a Senior Certificate is entitled to be exempted from the examination in an additional subject at Responsions, provided that in the Senior Local Examination he has shown sufficient merit in French or in German to be entitled to exemption from the additional subjects of the previous examination or has shown sufficient merit in Logic to be qualified in that subject for exemption from Part II. of the previous examination.

Students entitled to exemption from any part of Responsions should apply to the General Secretary, Syndicate Buildings, Cambridge, for a special form of certificate.

* Exemption from the Classical Papers in Part I. is granted to a candidate who, being a native of Asia and not of European parentage, has at one and the same examination satisfied the Examiners in Latin, and in English Language and Literature (including English Composition); and, in addition, from the paper on the Greek Gospel if the candidate has at the same or some subsequent examination satisfied the Examiners either in the Gospel or in English History; provided that it has been stated in the form of entry that the candidate claims exemption under this clause, and provided further that evidence satisfactory to the Syndicate is offered showing that the required conditions as to birth and parentage are fulfilled.

A native of Asia or Africa not of European parentage, who in one and the same examination has satisfied the examiners in English Language and Literature (including English Composition) and either in the Gospel or in English History, is entitled to exemption from all the papers of Part I. with the exception of the papers in Arabic, Chinese, or Sanskrit.

C. THE UNIVERSITY OF LONDON.—The holder of a Senior Certificate is entitled to exemption from the Matriculation Examination of the University of London, if the candidate has at one and the same examination passed (1) in English Language and Literature including English Composition, or History together with English Composition, or Geography together with English Composition, (2) in Arithmetic, Geometry, and Algebra, and (3) in three of the following subjects or combinations of subjects, not counted under (1) above:—Latin, Greek, French, German, Spanish, Greek, or Roman History, English History or History of the British Empire, Physical Geography, Logic, two subjects in Mathematics other than those mentioned above, Chemistry, Experimental Mechanics, Heat together with Sound and Light, Electricity and Magnetism, Botany, provided that either Latin, or Mechanics, or Heat together with Sound and Light, or Chemistry, or Botany is included, and provided further that one language is included.

Candidates who desire to be informed immediately on the publication of the Class Lists whether they have satisfied the conditions for exemption from the Matriculation Examination of the University of London should communicate with the General Secretary, Syndicate Buildings, Cambridge, to this effect in the course of the week of Examination. The Centre and index-number should be stated.

D. THE UNIVERSITIES OF MANCHESTER, LIVERPOOL, LEEDS, AND SHEFFIELD.—The holder of a Senior Certificate is entitled to exemption from the Matriculation Examination of the Universities of Manchester, Liverpool, Leeds, and Sheffield, conducted by their Joint Matriculation Board, provided that the candidate has passed at one and the same examination in (1) English Language and Literature, including Composition, (2) Arithmetic, Geometry, and Algebra, and (3) either History or Geography, and two of the following eight sections or parts of sections, one at least being a language, namely, (4) Latin, (5) Greek, (6) French, (7) German, (8) Spanish, (9) an additional subject in Mathematics, (10) Chemistry, (11) one subject in Physics.

E. THE UNIVERSITY OF BIRMINGHAM.—The holder of a Senior Certificate is under certain conditions entitled to exemption from the Matriculation Examination of the University of Birmingham.

F. THE UNIVERSITY OF WALES.—The holder of a Senior Certificate is exempted from the Matriculation Examination of the University of Wales, provided that the certificate includes English, English History, Latin, Mathematics, and two of the following subjects, chosen from different groups: (a) Greek; (b) French, German; (c) Applied Mathematics, Physics (Experimental Mechanics and Heat); (d) Chemistry, Botany. The subjects need not be all taken at the same examination. A student who has passed in four of the requisite subjects in the Senior Local Examination may matriculate on passing in the fifth subject in the Matriculation Examination of the University of Wales. Candidates for degrees in Science and Music may under certain conditions substitute French or German for Latin.

G. THE SCOTTISH UNIVERSITIES.—The holder of a Senior Certificate is under certain conditions entitled to exemption from portions of the Preliminary Examinations in Arts and Science and in Medicine of the Scottish Universities.

H. THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.—(i.) Holders of the Senior Certificate not less than 18 years of age may be recognized as Uncertificated Teachers, provided that the certificate includes English Language and Literature (section 2).

(ii.) The Senior Certificate qualifies for admission to a Training College for a course of two years, provided that it includes English Language and Literature, English History and Geography,* and either Mathematics or Chemistry or Physics or Botany or a language other than English. A certificate including these subjects will also be accepted as one of the qualifications of those who desire to become Student-Teachers.

(iii.) The Senior Certificate will be accepted as qualifying students admitted to a Training College to be prepared for an examination forming a recognized stage towards a University Degree, provided that it includes (a) English Language and Literature,† (b) English History, (c) Geography, (d) Mathematics, (e) one language, selected from Latin, Greek, French, and German, (f) either a second language or Chemistry or Physics or Botany. In the case of (a) and (b) a standard of attainment higher than that indicated by a mere pass will be required.

The subjects required under (ii.) and (iii.) need not all be taken at the same examination; but, whether they are so taken or not, candidates must as a rule have passed in all of them within two and a half years preceding August 1 in the year of entering the Training College. Subjects in which candidates may have passed in examinations prior to that in which they first gained a Senior Certificate will not be counted.

I. THE GENERAL MEDICAL COUNCIL.—The holder of a Senior Certificate is qualified for registration as a Medical or Dental Student, provided either (1) that the student has at one or at two examinations passed in (a) English Composition, (b) Latin, (c) Mathematics, and either (d) Greek or (e) French or (f) German or (g) Spanish, or (h) Dutch; or (2) that the student has at more than two examinations passed in the above-mentioned subjects, reaching the standard for distinction either in English Language and Literature or in one of the subjects (b) to (h).

The holder of a Junior Certificate‡ is qualified for registration as a Medical or Dental Student, provided that the student (1) has at one and the same examination passed in (a) English Language and Literature, (b) Latin, (c) Arithmetic, Geometry, and Algebra, and either (d) Greek or (e) French or (f) German or (g) Spanish; and (2) has either (i.) reached the standard for distinction in one of the subjects (a) to (g), or (ii.) reached an Honours standard on the whole examination or in two of the subjects (a) to (g).

J. THE INNS OF COURTS.—The Senior Certificate is accepted as a qualification for the admission of Students to an Inn of Court.

K. THE LAW SOCIETY.—Persons who have obtained a Senior or a Junior Certificate are excused the Preliminary Examination before entering into Articles of Clerkship with Solicitors.

L. THE INSTITUTION OF CIVIL ENGINEERS.—A Senior Certificate exempts the holder from the Studentship Examination, provided that it includes section 2; section 3 (a) or (b) and (d); one of the sections 4 to 8 inclusive; section 10 (including Trigonometry); and either section 11 or section 12.

M. THE ROYAL INSTITUTE OF BRITISH ARCHITECTS.—A Senior Certificate or a Junior Honours Certificate exempts the holder from such of the following subjects of the Preliminary Examination as are included in the Certificate:—English Composition, Arithmetic, Algebra, Geometry, Geography, English History, Latin, French, German, Applied Mathematics.

N. THE SURVEYORS' INSTITUTION.—A Senior Certificate or a Junior Honours Certificate exempts the holder from the Preliminary Examination of the Institution.

O. THE PHARMACEUTICAL SOCIETY OF GREAT BRITAIN.—A Senior or Junior Certificate qualifies the holder for registration as a Pharmaceutical Student, provided that it includes English Composition or English Grammar, Latin, French or German or Spanish, Geometry, and Algebra, passed at the same or at not more than two examinations.

P. THE ROYAL COLLEGE OF VETERINARY SURGEONS.—The Senior or the Junior‡ Certificate qualifies the holder to admission to the Professional Examination under the same conditions as those set forth in paragraph I (General Medical Council).

Q. THE INSTITUTE OF CHARTERED ACCOUNTANTS.—A Senior Certificate exempts the holder from the Preliminary Examination if it includes certain subjects, of which Dictation is one, prescribed in the regulations of the Institute. Senior

* English History without Geography, or Geography without English History, will be accepted, provided that the examination shall have been taken before August 1, 1911.

† In December, 1911, and subsequent examinations candidates must pass in Composition and paper (d) or (e) of section 2.

‡ Junior candidates, whether above the age of sixteen or not, who desire to qualify for registration as Medical or Dental Students or to be admitted to the First Professional Examination of the Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons, should make a statement to that effect in their Forms of Entry. They will then be informed in due course as to whether they have satisfied the prescribed conditions.

candidates may be examined in Dictation if they indicate in their forms of entry that they desire to be so examined. A syllabus and further information can be obtained from the Secretary of the Institute of Chartered Accountants, Moorgate place, London, E.C.

R. THE SOCIETY OF INCORPORATED ACCOUNTANTS AND AUDITORS.—The Senior Certificate exempts from the Preliminary Examination. Exemption from the same examination is conferred by a Junior Honours Certificate if it includes English, Mathematics, one language, and one other subject.

S. THE INSTITUTE OF CHEMISTRY.—The Senior Examination is accepted as an approved Preliminary Examination, provided that the candidate has obtained a certificate including English, Geometry, Algebra, and two of the languages, Latin, Greek, French, German, Spanish, or one of these languages and a further subject approved by the Institute.

T. THE AUCTIONEERS' INSTITUTE.—A Senior Certificate exempts the holder from the Preliminary Examination. Exemption from the same examination is conferred by a Junior Honours Certificate, provided that it includes English Composition, Geography, History, Geometry, Algebra, Bookkeeping, Mensuration, and two of the following: Latin, French, German, Shorthand.

U. THE LONDON COUNTY COUNCIL.—(a) The Senior Certificate or the Junior Certificate in first or second class honours, exempts from the Preliminary Examination for Intermediate County Scholarships. (b) Holders of the Senior Certificate, provided that the certificate includes English Language and Literature, History or Geography, and either Mathematics or Chemistry or Physics or Botany or a language other than English, are qualified for the award of Student Teacherships, subject to their otherwise satisfying the Council's requirements. (c) The Senior Certificate exempts from Preliminary Examination for Domestic Economy Training Scholarships.

** Students who already hold a Junior (or Senior) Certificate and desire to add some one or more subjects may enter at a subsequent Junior (or Senior) Examination for less than the minimum number of subjects necessary for a certificate. If such students are successful, their names will not appear in the Class Lists, but they will receive supplementary certificates.* The ordinary fee for entrance must be paid.

Students who do not already hold a Junior (or Senior) Certificate may enter for less than the minimum number of subjects necessary for a Junior (or Senior) Certificate with the object of satisfying the requirements of a recognized public body. If such students are successful, their names will not appear in the Class Lists, and they will not receive formal certificates, but information will be furnished for the use of the public body concerned. Students entering under this paragraph must state full particulars in their forms of entry, and the ordinary fee for entrance must be paid.

PRIZES AND MEDALS.

The Syndicate will give prizes to the four candidates who stand highest in the First Class of the Senior and Junior boys and the Senior and Junior girls, £12 to each of the two Seniors, and £8 to each of the two Juniors.

The Council of the Royal Geographical Society offer two silver medals, one for the best Senior in Geography (section 3) and Physical Geography (section 13) combined, and one for the best Junior in Geography (sections 3) and Physical Geography (section 14) combined, if of sufficient merit.

These prizes and medals are not open to Juniors above the age of 16 or to Seniors above the age of 19.

CLASS LISTS AND CERTIFICATES.

The names of the boys who pass with credit will be arranged in three Honour Classes. In each of these classes, and also in the list of those who pass to the satisfaction of the Examiners, yet not so as to deserve Honours, the candidates will be arranged in alphabetical order under the several centres. After the name of every boy will be added the school (if any) from which he comes to attend the examination, and the name of his Schoolmaster. *The names of those who pass the Examination for Juniors above the age of 16, and of those who pass the Examination for Seniors above the age of 19 will be placed in lists by themselves, in alphabetical order, not in any Class of Honours.* Similar classes and lists will be drawn up for girls. Copies of the class lists will be forwarded to the candidates by the Local Secretaries.

Separate lists will also be given of those Junior candidates under the age of 16, and of those Senior candidates under the age of 19, who may specially distinguish themselves in particular parts of the examination, and in these lists the candidates will be arranged in order of merit.

The Classes of Honours are determined solely by the total number of marks obtained by the student. In the examination for Juniors and Seniors no marks are counted for any subject unless the student passes in that subject. Regard is paid to handwriting and spelling.

The students who pass with credit or satisfy the Examiners will receive certificates to that effect, which will be sent to them through the Local Secretaries. Every Senior and Junior Certificate will specify the subjects in which the student has satisfied the Examiners or has gained the mark of distinction, and the class obtained, if any.

DETAILED REPORTS.

After the Class Lists of each examination have been issued, the Syndicate will be prepared to inform the Principals of Schools, on receipt of a payment of one shilling for each student, of the manner in which their pupils have acquitted themselves in the several subjects in which they have been examined, describing each as *good*, *moderately good*, &c.; and also to place their pupils in order of merit among themselves in each subject and on the whole examination. If an application is made by a school on behalf of more than fifty students, the fee payable for each student at that school after the first fifty will be sixpence.

* It should be observed that in certain cases it is made a condition for exemption from a Preliminary Examination that all the required subjects shall be taken at one and the same time.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended January 27, 1912.

Births.—The total births registered were 104 (4 Europeans, 8 Burghers, 62 Sinhalese, 9 Tamils, 16 Moors, 3 Malays, and 2 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on January 1, 1912, viz., 223,353) was 24.3, as against 28.8 in the preceding week, 37.2 in the corresponding week of last year, and 26.0 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 150 (2 Europeans, 8 Burghers, 79 Sinhalese, 37 Tamils, 19 Moors, 2 Malays, and 3 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 35.1, as against 32.8 in the previous week, 28.3 in the corresponding week of last year, and 35.2 the weekly average of last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 150 total deaths, 25 were of infants under one year of age, as against 38 in the preceding week, 30 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 32 the average of last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 5.

Selected Causes of Death.—Sixteen deaths were registered from *Phthisis* (against 14 in the previous week and the weekly average for last year), of which 5 were in Kotahena, 3 each in New Bazaar and Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), 2 each in St. Paul's and Maradana hospitals, and 1 in San Sebastian.

2. Twelve deaths were registered from *Pneumonia*, as in the previous week (against 18 the weekly average for last year), of which 5 were in Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), 3 in Kotahena, and 1 each in St. Paul's, New Bazaar, Maradana hospitals, and Kollupitiya. Four deaths were registered from *Bronchitis*.

3. Ten deaths were registered from *Enteric Fever* (against 3 in the previous week and 8 the weekly average for last year), of which 3 were in Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), 2 in Maradana hospitals, and 1 each in Fort and Galle Face Ward, St. Paul's, Kotahena, Slave Island, and Wellawatta. There were 8 cases reported during the week, against 21 in the previous week.

4. Eleven deaths were registered from *Enteritis* (including 1 infant), 8 from *Infantile Convulsions*, 6 *Diarrhoea* (2 infants), 6 *Debility* (all infants), 6 *Senility*, 3 each from *Worms*, *Paralysis*, *Nephritis*, *Bright's Disease*, *Premature Birth*, and *Marasmus*, and 53 from *Other Causes*.

5. Thirteen cases of *Measles* were reported, as in the previous week; and 10 of *Chickenpox*, against 19 in the previous week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 79·7°, against 80·0° in the preceding week and 77·9° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29·918 in., against 29·938 in. in the preceding week and 29·933 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 0·69 in., against 0·40 in. in the preceding week and 0·02 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.
