## PROCLAMATIONS BY THE GOVERNOR.

IN the Name of His Majesty GEORGE THE FIFTH, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, King, Defender of the Faith.

### PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir HENRY EDWARD McCALLUM, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

HENRY McCALLUM.

WHEREAS the Chief Headman's division of Salpiti korale, in the District of Colombo, Western Province, was by a Proclamation dated September 24, 1891, and published in *Government Gazette* No. 5,091 of October 2, 1891, brought under the operation of the Village Communities Ordinance, No. 24 of 1889:

And whereas by a Proclamation dated November 9 1911, and published in the *Government Gazette* No. 6,470 of November 10, 1911, certain portions of villages belonging to the said division were included within the Municipal limits of the town of Colombo, and it is expedient that the same should be excluded from the operation of the said Ordinance:

Now know Ye that We, the Governor of Ceylon, in exercise of the powers in Us vested by section 4 A of the said Ordinance, as amended by Ordinance No. 14 of 1893, and with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby, as from and after January 1, 1912, exclude from the operation of the said Village Communities Ordinance, No. 24 of 1889, such portions of the Chief Headman's division of Salpiti korale as are now included within the limits of the said town of Colombo, viz., that portion of the village Kirillapone West which lies to the west of the Colombo-Bolgoda canal at Kirillapone and the village of Wellawatta, except so much thereof as lies to the east of Bolgoda canal, both forming part of the Chief Headman's division of Salpiti korale, in the District of Colombo, Western Province.

Given at Nuwara Eliya in the said Island of Ceylon, this Twenty-eighth day of February, in the year of our Lord One thousand Nine hundred and Twelve.

WHEREAS it is expedient to establish for the town of Chilaw, in the Chilaw District, of the North-Western Province, a general cemetery for the burial of the dead of the various communities residing therein, save and except the Roman Catholics, who are provided with a separate burial ground, within the limits hereinafter specified and defined:

Now know Ye that We, the Governor of Ceylon, in exercise of the power in Us vested by section 6 (1) of the Cemeteries and Burials Ordinance, No. 9 of 1899, and with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby, as from and after March 10, 1912, establish a general cemetery on the land set forth in the Schedule A hereunto annexed for the burial of the dead within the limits specified and defined in Schedule B hereto.

Given at Nuwara Eliya, in the said Island of Ceylon, this Twenty-eighth day of February, in the year of our Lord One thousand Nine hundred and Twelve.

SCHEDULE A.

An allotment of land situated in Welihena village, in Anaivilundan Pattu South, in the Chilaw District, in the North-Western Province, appearing as lot No. 315 in preliminary plan 3,907, in extent 6 acres and 6 perches; bounded on the north by lot No. 314, south by lot No. 317, and east by lot No. 316 shown on preliminary plan 3,907, and on the west by lot No. 11,631 in preliminary plan 2,554.

The examination in the Criminal Procedure Code prescribed under the Minute of March 26, 1900, for officers in the Fourth Class of the Civil Service, will also be held on April 16, 1912, as well as at the Kandy Kachcheri.

It is also hereby notified that candidates will be given the option of using Codes in the examination in the Criminal Procedure Code and the Penal Code; they must, however, state when sending in their names what their decision is, as the character of the papers set for those who use Codes and those who do not will be different.

The examination for officers in the Police Department, and the *vidé voce* examination in the native languages for officers in the Public Works Department, the Irrigation Department, the Forest Department, and the Railway Department, will be held at the same time and place.

Candidates are required to send in their names not later than March 25, 1912.

Gentlemen in the Civil Service should state in their applications whether they are presenting themselves for the first or second examination, and whether they intend taking up Sinhalese or Tamil, and whether they wish to have the option of using Codes.

The hours of examination will be from 10.30 A.M. to 1.30 P.M. and from 2 P.M. to 5 P.M., exclusive of the *vidé voce* examinations, which will be specially arranged for.

REGULATIONS REFERRED TO.

*Fish Stalls.*

1. Every permanent fish stall shall be well ventilated and lighted, and the walls thereof shall be plastered and whitewashed at least four times a year; or if the building be of iron, they shall be painted externally at least once a year. The floor shall be cemented and sufficient drainage provided.
2. Every table used in a fish stall shall be covered with a flat sheet of zinc; such table and the chopping block and all implements shall be kept scrupulously clean. They shall be washed with water and scrubbed with a hard brush immediately after use. All hooks for hanging fish shall be polished and free from rust.
3. Every fish stall holder shall provide himself with a movable receptacle of metal for waste material.
4. No person suffering from any loathsome, contagious, or infectious disease, or who has recently been in attendance on any such person, or who is unwashed or otherwise unclean, shall be employed in a fish stall.
5. Every fish stall and the management and conduct of the business shall be at all times open and subject to inspection and examination by the Chairman or any person acting under his authority.
6. These by-laws shall be framed and hung up in a prominent place in every fish stall.

*Bakeries.*

The following shall be added to Rule 31 of Chapter IV. of the by-laws in Schedule D to Ordinances No. 13 of 1898 and 2 of 1901:—

"The person or persons engaged in kneading the dough or flour shall wear clean white aprons covering the chest and body."

*Butchers' Stalls.*

1. Every butcher's stall shall be well ventilated and well lighted, the walls thereof shall be plastered and whitewashed at least four times a year; or if the building be of iron, the walls and roof shall be painted externally at least once a year. The floor cemented and sufficient drainage provided.
2. Every room in which meat is kept shall be kept scrupulously clean.
3. Every table used in a butcher's stall be covered with a flat sheet of zinc; such tables and the chopping block and all implements shall be kept scrupulously clean. They shall be washed with water and scrubbed with a hard clean brush immediately after use. All hooks for hanging meat shall be polished and free from rust.
4. Refuse and unsaleable material, offal, &c., if not immediately removed, shall be kept in a zinc-lined box with perforated zinc cover, the perforation to be of such size as to prevent flies entering.
5. No person suffering from any loathsome, contagious, or infectious disease, or who has recently been in attendance on any such person, or who is unwashed or otherwise unclean, shall be employed in a butcher's stall.
6. Every butcher shall provide himself with a movable receptacle of metal for waste material.
7. Every butcher's stall and the management and conduct of the business shall be at all times open and subject to inspection and examination by the Chairman or by any person acting under his authority.
8. The Chairman shall have power to revoke any butcher's license for a breach of any of these by-laws.
9. These by-laws shall be framed and hung up in a prominent place in every butcher's stall.

## VITAL STATISTICS.

### Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended February 24, 1912.

*Births.*—The total births registered were 106 (4 Europeans, 9 Burghers, 53 Sinhalese, 16 Tamils, 18 Moors, 4 Malays, and 2 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on January 1, 1912, viz., 223,353) was 24·8, as against 23·9 in the preceding week, 33·0 in the corresponding week of last year, and 26·0 the weekly average for last year.

*Deaths.*—The total deaths registered were 126 (3 Europeans, 7 Burghers, 60 Sinhalese, 30 Tamils, 18 Moors, 1 Malay, and 7 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 29·5, as against 28·1 in the previous week, 32·8 in the corresponding week of last year, and 35·2 the weekly average of last year.

*Infantile Deaths.*—Of the 126 total deaths, 35 were of infants under one year of age, as against 23 in the preceding week, 26 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 32 the average of last year.

*Stillbirths.*—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 9.

*Selected Causes of Death.*—Eighteen deaths were registered from *Pneumonia* (against 15 in the previous week and 18 the weekly average for last year), of which 5 were in Kotahena, 2 each in Pettah, St. Paul's, New Bazaar, Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), Slave Island, and Kollupitiya, and 1 in Maradana hospitals. One death was registered from *Bronchitis*.

2. Sixteen deaths were registered from *Phthisis* (against 13 in the previous week and 14 the weekly average for last year), of which 4 were in St. Paul's, 3 each in San Sebastian and Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), 2 each in Kotahena and Slave Island, and 1 each in Pettah and New Bazaar.

3. Four deaths were registered from *Enteric Fever* (against 5 in the previous week and 8 the weekly average for last year), 2 each in Kotahena and Maradana (exclusive of hospitals). There were 22 cases reported during the week, against 21 in the previous week.

4. Twelve deaths were registered from *Enteritis* (including 5 infants), 8 from *Infantile Convulsions*, 7 *Tetanus* (6 infants), 7 *Senility*, 6 *Debility* (4 infants), 4 *Bright's Disease* (1 infant), 4 *Dysentery*, 3 each from *Nephritis* and *Rickets*, 2 each from *Septicæmia* (1 infant), *Simple Meningitis*, *Apoplexy*, *Valve Disease of the Heart*, *Anchylostomiasis*, *Premature Birth*, and *Want of Breast Milk*, and 19 from *Other Causes*.

5. Fifteen cases of *Measles* were reported, against 9 in the previous week; and 21 of *Chickenpox*, against 18 in the previous week.

*State of the Weather.*—The mean temperature of air was 80·4°, against 81·4° in the preceding week and 79·8° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29·838 in., against 29·855 in. in the preceding week and 30·049 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was nil, as in the preceding week and in the corresponding week of the previous year.
