(1 & 2, Geo. 5. Ch. 28.)

A.D. 1911.

An Act to re-enact the Official Secrets Act, 1889, with Amendments.

August 22, 1911.

BE it enacted by the King's Most Excellenct Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

Penalties for spying.

Wrongful

&c., of information.

communication,

- (1) If any person for any purpose prejudicial to the safety or interests of the State-
 - (a) Approaches or is in the neighbourhood of, or enters any prohibited place within the meaning of this Act ; or
 - (b) Makes any sketch, plan, model, or note which is calculated to be or might be or is intended to be directly or indirectly useful to an enemy; or
 - (c) Obtains or communicates to any other person any sketch, plan, model, article, or note, or other document or information which is calculated to be or might be or is intended to be directly or indirectly useful to an enemy;

he shall be guilty of felony, and shall be liable to penal servitude for any term not less than three years

and not exceeding seven years.

- 2) On a prosecution under this section, it shall not be necessary to show that the accused person was guilty of any particular act tending to show a purpose prejudicial to the safety or interests of the State, and, notwithstanding that no such act is proved against him, he may be convicted if, from the circumstances of the case, or his conduct, or his known character as proved, it appears that his purpose was a purpose prejudicial to the safety or interests of the State; and if any sketch, plan, model, article, note, document, or information relating to or used in any prohibited place within the meaning of this Act, or anything in such a place, is made, obtained, or communicated by any person other than a person acting under lawful authority, it shall be deemed to have been made, obtained, or communicated for a purpose prejudicial to the safety or interests of the State unless the contrary is proved.
- (1) If any person having in his possession or control any sketch, plan, model, article, note, document, or information which relates to or is used in a prohibited place or anything in such a place, or which has been made or obtained in contravention of this Act, or which has been entrusted in confidence to him by any person holding office under His Majesty or which he has obtained owing to his position as a person who holds or has held office under His Majesty, or as a person who holds or has held a contract made on behalf of His Majesty, or as a person who is or has been employed under a person who holds or has held such an office or contract,-

(a) Communicates the sketch, plan, model, article, note, document, or information to any person, other than a person to whom he is authorized to communicate it, or a person to whom it is in the interest of the State his duty to communicate it, or

(b) Retains the sketch, plan, model, article, note, or document in his possession or control when he has no right to retain it or when it is contrary to his duty to retain it:

that person shall be guilty of a misdemeanour.

(2) If any person receives any sketch, plan, model, article, note, document, or information, knowing, or having reasonable ground to believe, at the time when he receives it, that the sketch, plan, model, article, note, document, or information is communicated to him in contravention of this Act, he shall be guilty of a misdemeanour, unless he proves that the communication to him of the sketch, plan, model, article, note, document, or information was contrary to his desire.

(3) A person guilty of a misdemeanour under this section shall be liable to imprisonment with or without hard labour for a term not exceeding two years, or to a fine, or to both imprisonment and a fine.

- For the purposes of this Act, the expression "prohibited place" means—
 (a) Any work of defence, arsenal, factory, dockyard, camp, ship, telegraph or signal station, or office belonging to His Majesty, and any other place belonging to His Majesty used for the purpose of building, repairing, making, or storing any ship, arms, or other materials or instruments of use in time of war, or any plans or documents relating thereto;
- (b) Any place not belonging to His Majesty where any ship, arms, or other materials or instruments of use in time of war, or any plans or documents relating thereto, are being made, repaired, or stored under contract with, or with any person on behalf of, His Majesty, or otherwise on behalf of His Majesty; and

(c) Any place belonging to His Majesty which is for the time being declared by a Secretary of State to be a prohibited place for the purposes of this section on the ground that information with respect thereto, or damage thereto, would be useful to an enemy; and

- (d) Any railway, road, way, or channel, or other means of communication by land or water (including any works or structures being part thereof or connected therewith), or any place used for gas, water, or electricity works or other works for purposes of a public character, or any place where any ship, arms, or other materials or instruments of use in time of war, or any plans or documents relating thereto, are being made, repaired, or stored otherwise than on behalf of His Majesty, which is for the time being declared by a Secretary of State to be a prohibited place for the purposes of this section, on the ground that information with respect thereto, or the destruction or obstruction thereof, or interference therewith, would be useful to an enemy.
- Any person who attempts to commit any offence under this Act, or incites, or counsels, or attempts to procure another person to commit an offence under this Act, shall be guilty of felony or of a misdemeanour according as the offence in question is felony or misdemeanour, and on conviction shall be liable to the same punishment, and to be proceeded against in the same manner, as if he had committed the offence.
- Any person charged with an offence which is a felony under this Act may, if the circumstances warrant such a finding, be found guilty of an offence which is a misdemeanour under this Act.

Definition of prohibited place.

Attempts to commit offence, or incitement to commit offence, under Act.

Person charged with felony under Act, may be convicted of misdemeanour under Act.

Any person who is found committing an offence under this Act, whether that offence is a felony or not, or who is reasonably suspected of having committed, or having attempted to commit, or being about to commit, such an offence, may be apprehended and detained in the same manner as a person who is found committing a felony.

Power to arrest

7. If any person knowingly harbours any person whom he knows, or has reasonable grounds for supposing, to be a person who is about to commit or who has committed an offence under this Act, or knowingly permits to meet or assemble in any premises in his occupation or under his control any such persons, or if any person having harboured any such person, or permitted to meet or assemble in any premises in his occupation or under his control any such persons, wilfully refuses to disclose to a superintendent of police any information which it is in his power to give in relation to any such person he shall be guilty of a misdemeanour and liable to imprisonment with or without hard labour for a term not exceeding one year, or to a fine, or to both imprisonment and a fine.

Penalty for harbouring spies.

8. A prosecution for an offence under this Act shall not be instituted except by or with the consent of the Attorney-General.

Restriction on prosecution.

Provided that a person charged with such an offence may be arrested, or a warrant for his arrest may be issued and executed, and any such person may be remanded in custody or on bail, notwithstanding that the consent of the Attorney-General to the institution of a prosecution for the offence has not been obtained, but no further or other proceedings shall be taken until that consent has been obtained.

Search warrants.

9. (1) If a justice of the peace is satisfied by information on oath that there is reasonable ground for suspecting that an offence under this Act has been or is about to be committed, he may grant a search warrant authorizing any constable named therein to enter at any time any premises or place named in the warrant, if necessary, by force, and to search the premises or place and every person found therein, and to seize any sketch, plan, model, article, note, or document, or anything of a like nature or anything which is evidence of an offence under this Act having been or being about to be committed, which he may find on the premises or place or on any such person, and with regard to or in connexion with which he has reasonable ground for suspecting that an offence under this Act has been or is about to be committed.

(2) Where it appears to a superintendent of police that the case is one of great emergency and that in the interest of the State immediate action is necessary, he may by a written order under his hand give to any constable the like authority as may be given by the warrant of a justice under this section.

(1) This Act shall apply to all acts which are offences under this Act when committed in any part of His Majesty's dominions, or when committed by British officers or subjects elsewhere:

(2) An offence under this Act, if alleged to have been committed out of the United Kingdom, may be inquired of, heard, and determined, in any competent British court in the place where the offence was committed, or in the High Court in England or the Central Criminal Court, and the Criminal Jurisdiction Act, 1802, shall apply in like manner as if the offence were mentioned in that Act, and the Central Criminal Court as well as the High Court possessed the jurisdiction given by that Act to the Court

trial of offence.

of King's Bench. (3) An offence under this Act shall not be tried by any court of general or quarter sessions, nor by the sheriff court in Scotland, nor by any court out of the United Kingdom which has not jurisdiction

to try crimes which involve the greatest punishment allowed by law.

(4) The provisions of the Criminal Law and Procedure (Ireland) Act, 1887, shall not apply to any trial under the provisions of this Act.

11. If by any law made before or after the passing of this Act by the legislature of any British possession provisions are made which appear to His Majesty to be of the like effect as those contained in this Act, His Majesty may, by Order in Council, suspend the operation within that British possession of this Act, or of any part thereof, so long as that law continues in force there, and no longer, and the Order shall have effect as if it were enacted in this Act:

Saving for laws of British possessions.

Provided that the suspension of this Act, or of any part thereof, in any British possession shall not extend to the holder of an office under His Majesty who is not appointed to that office by the Government of that possession.

In this Act, unless the context otherwise requires,-

Any reference to a place belonging to His Majesty includes a place belonging to any department of the Government of the United Kingdom or of any British possessions, whether the place is or is not actually vested in His Majesty;

The expression "Attorney-General" means the Attorney or Solicitor-General for England; and as respects Scotland, means the Lord Advocate; and as respects Ireland, means the Attorney or Solicitor-General for Ireland; and, if the prosecution is instituted in any court out of the United Kingdom, means the person who in that court is Attorney-General,

or exercises the like functions as the Attorney-General in England;

Expressions referring to communicating or receiving include any communicating or receiving, whether in whole or in part, and whether the sketch, plan, model, article, note, document, or information itself or the substance, effect, or description thereof only be communicated or received; expressions referring to obtaining or retaining any sketch, plan, model, article, note, or document, include the copying or causing to be copied the whole or any part of any sketch, plan, model, article, note, or document; and expressions referring to the communication of any sketch, plan, model, article, note, or document include the transfer or transmission of the sketch, plan, model, article, note, or document;

Interpretation,

The expression "document" includes part of a document;

The expression "model" includes design, pattern, and specimen;
The expression "sketch" includes any photograph or other mode of representing any place

or thing;
The expression "superintendent of police" includes any police officer of a like or superior rank;
The expression "office under His Majesty" includes any office or employment in or under any department of the Government of the United Kingdom, or of any British possession:

The expression "offence under this Act" includes any act, omission, or other thing which is punishable under this Act.

- 13. (1) This Act may be cited as the Official Secrets Act, 1911.
- (2) The Official Secrets Act, 1889, is hereby repealed.

THE following copy of an Act, which received the Royal Assent on August 18 last, entitled "The Geneva Convention Act, 1911," for regulating the use of the heraldic emblem of the "Red Cross" or "Geneva Cross," in accordance with the provisions of the Convention for the Amelioration of the Condition of the Wounded and Sick of Armies in the Field, which was drawn up in Geneva in 1906, is published for information.

Geneva Convention Act, 1911.

(1 & 2, Geo. 5, Ch. 20.)

An Act to make such Amendments in the Law as are necessary to enable certain Reserved Provisions of the Second Geneva Convention to be carried into effect.

August 18, 1911.

WHEREAS His Majesty has ratified, with certain reservations, the Convention for the Amelioration of the Condition of the Wounded and Sick of Armies in the Field, drawn up in Geneva in the year One thousand Nine hundred and Six, and it is desirable, in order that those reservations may be withdrawn, that such amendments should be made in the law as are in this Act contained:

Be it therefore enacted by the King's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1. (1) As from the commencement of this Act it shall not be lawful for any person to use for the purposes of his trade or business, or for any other purpose whatsoever, without the authority of the Army Council, the heraldic emblem of the red cross on a white ground formed by reversing the Federal colours of Switzerland, or the words "Red Cross" or "Geneva Cross," and, if any person acts in contravention of this provision, he shall be guilty of an offence against this Act, and shall be liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding ten pounds, and to forfeit any goods upon or in connection with which the emblem or words were used.

(2) Where a company or society is guilty of any such contravention, without prejudice to the liability of the company or society, every director, manager, secretary, and other officer of the company or society who is knowingly

a party to the contravention shall be guilty of an offence against this Act and liable to the like penalty.

(3) Nothing in this section shall affect the right (if any) of the proprietor of a trade mark registered before the passing of this Act, and containing any such emblem or words, to continue to use such trade mark for a period of four years from the passing of this Act, and, if the period of the registration or of the renewal of registration of any such trade mark expires during those four years, the registration thereof may be renewed until the expiration of those four years, but without payment of any fee.

(4) Proceedings under this Act shall not in England or Ireland be instituted without the consent of the

Attorney-General.

- (5) This Act shall extend to His Majesty's possessions outside the United Kingdom, subject to such necessary adaptations as may be made by Order in Council.
 - 2. This Act may be cited as the Geneva Convention Act, 1911. .

GOVERNMENT TRAINING COLLEGE, COLOMBO.

Entrance Examination for 1913 and 1914.

ENGLISH CLASSES (MEN AND WOMEN).

N Entrance Examination for admission to the English classes will be held at the Training College on November 4. 5, and 6, 1912, commencing at 10.30 a.m. In order to gain admission to this examination, intending candidates must apply to the Principal of the Training College during the month of September for an admission form. These forms must be returned on or before October 16. Candidates will then be informed whether they have been selected to appear at the examination.

The students of these classes will be trained for teacherships in Grant-in-aid and Government schools. The following studentships are offered for competition:---

Fifteen studentships of Rs. 300 per annum each, with free tuition and free railway passes for use during vacations.

Besides the fifteen students who receive the above allowances, twelve additional students will, if eligible candidates present themselves, be appointed, who will receive no allowance, but will be allowed to take up the first-year course free of charge, at the end of which they will receive a third class certificate, if their record during the year and their performance at the first-year examination be satisfactory. Such students will be allowed to complete the course, and if their work shows exceptional progress, will be eligible for appointment to a studentship of Rs. 300 in their second-year course. Four of these twelve will, if eligible candidates present themselves, be students who will take a special course with a view to qualify for the certificate under (c) below.

It must be understood that all students are appointed on probation for the first three months, and will not be allowed

to continue their course unless their work shows a reasonable degree of promise.

Students in training must devote the whole of their time to College work. Board and residence will be provided on payment of the prescribed charge during the time the College is in session. Those for whom residence is not available must live within a convenient distance of the College, and must be able to satisfy the Principal that their places of residence afford proper facilities for study and conditions for the maintenance of general good health. Each selected candidate will be examined by the College Medical Officer, whose report must state that the candidate is physically fit to take up the work of a teacher.

The Second Class certificate issued to students at the conclusion of their course at the Government Training College will in future be of three grades:—

(a) A certificate which qualifies a teacher to be in charge of a secondary school.

(b) A certificate which qualifies a teacher to be in charge of an elementary school.

(c) A certificate which qualifies a teacher to be in charge of an infant school; this certificate will be recognized for the purpose of awarding the higher grant under clause 36 of the Code for Aided Schools.

The Entrance Examination will consist of two parts:-

I.—Compulsory subjects:-

(1) English Language: Grammar and Idiom.

(2) English Composition.

(3) Reading aloud an unprepared passage from a work of a standard English author.

(4) Arithmetic.

(5) History and Geography, general knowledge of English History, and general Geography of the World.

II.—Optional subjects:—

Mathematics: Algebra to Quadratic Equations.

Geometry: the subject-matter of Euclid's Books I. to III. (experimentally and theoretically).

Languages: A.—Latin: Translation, Grammar, and Composition.

B.—Sinhalese: Ummagga Jataka and Guttila. Grammar. Composition.

C.—Tamil: Panchatantra, Nayadatam (verse), and Ilakkanachchurukkam. Composition.

N.B.—Only one of A, B, or C can be taken.

No further information will be given concerning this syllabus.

SINHALESE CLASS (MEN).

The students in this Department will be trained for masterships in Government Sinhalese schools.

Twenty-one studentships will be open for competition to selected monitors in Government schools who have passed their third-year examination in 1911 or before that year.

Selected students will receive free board and lodging at the College during the session, text books will be provided, and free passes on the railway will be issued for use during the vacations. The period of training will extend over two years, and at the end of this period those who pass the Final Examination will receive certificates of the second or third class in accordance with the record of their work in the College and their performance at the Final Examination.

Certificates of the first class will be issued only to trained teachers in the service of the Department who hold second class certificates after an uninterrupted service of ten years as head teacher in a school of the class corresponding to the certificate, provided that their conduct and efficiency be approved by the Director. For scale of payments see clause 8 of the Departmental Code.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended March 2, 1912.

Births.—The total births registered were 103 (0 Europeans, 6 Burghers, 67 Sinhalese, 9 Tamils, 15 Moors, 1 Malay, and 5 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on January 1, 1912, viz., 223,353) was 24·1, as against 24·8 in the preceding week, 19·0 in the corresponding week of last year, and 26·0 the weekly average for last year.

The total deaths registered were 141 (0 Europeans, 10 Burghers, 58 Sinhalese, 42 Tamils, 24 Moors, 6 Malays, and 1 Other). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 33.0, as against 29.5 in the previous week, 30.3 in the corresponding week of last year, and 35.2 the weekly average of last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 141 total deaths, 21 were of infants under one year of age, as against 35 in the preceding week, 30 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 32 the average of last year.

Stillbirths.-The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 8.

Selected Causes of Death.—Twenty-two deaths were registered from Phthisis (against 16 in the previous week and 14 the weekly average for last year), of which 8 were in Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), 4 in New Bazaar, 3 in Slave

Island, 2 each in St. Paul's, and Maradana hospitals, and 1 each in Pettah, Kotahena, and Wellawatta.

2. Twelve deaths were registered from Pneumonia (against 18 in the previous week and the weekly average for last year), of which 5 were in New Bazaar, 3 in St. Paul's, 1 each in Kotahena, Maradana hospitals, Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), and Slave Island. Three deaths were registered from Bronchitis.

3. Thirteen deaths were registered from Enteric Fever (against 4 in the previous week and 8 the weekly average for last year), of which 4 were in Maradana hospitals, 2 in New Bazaar, and 1 each in Pettah, San Sebastian, St. Paul's, Kotahena, Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), Kollupitiya, and Wellawatta. There were 18 cases reported during the week, against 22 in the previous week.

4. Fourteen deaths were registered from Senility, 9 from Infantile Convulsions, 9 Enteritis (1 infant), 8 Debility (3 infants), 4 Dysentery, 3 Marasmus (all infants), 3 each from Diarrhea, Worms, Malaria, and Anchylostomiasis,

and 32 from Other Causes. 5. Six cases of Measles were reported, against 15 in the previous week; and 21 of Chickenpox, as in the

previous week. State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 82.1°, against 80.4° in the preceding week and 81.6° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.821 in., against 29.838 in. in the preceding week, and 29.975 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was nil, as in the preceding week, against 0.02 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.
