ABSTRACT OF SEASON REPORTS FOR JULY, 1893.

WESTERN PROVINCE.

COLOMBO DISTRICT.

Paddy.—The yala paddy plants continue to thrive, except where damaged by floods in June. The maha sowing progresses.

KALUTARA DISTRICT.

Paddy.—An abundant crop is expected from the fields in Rayigam korale which were not damaged by floods. The damaged fields form only a small proportion of the extent sown. In the Pasdun-Walallawiti korale the crop is generally fair, excepting in the villages Kudaligama, Iddagoda, and Pantiya, where the crops are damaged by flies. In the Totamuna a fair paddy crop is anticipated. No dry grain cultivation.

NEGOMBO DISTRICT.

Paddy.—Alutkuru Korale North : yala crops ; about one-third of the fields were damaged by the monsoon rains ; prospects middling ; some fields are being sown for maha. Hapitigam korale : yala prospects fair ; plants suffering from bambupiduma ; maha sowings promise well.

CENTRAL PROVINCE.

KANDY DISTRICT.

Paddy and Dry Grain.—Udunuwara and Yatinuwara : maha cultivation begun ; yala blossoming ; kurakkan blossoming, good prospects. Tumpane : maha cultivation begun ; yala being transplanted ; kurakkan blossoming, good prospects. Uda Dumbara and Pata Dumbara : maha cultivation begun ; yala paddy and kurakkan, good prospects. Pata Héwáheta : maha cultivation begun ; yala blossoming, good prospects. Udapalata : maha paddy being sown ; yala harvest commenced ; fair crop. Uda Bulatgama : maha ploughing over ; yala prospects good.

MÁTALÉ DISTRICT.

Paddy and Dry Grain.—Rain in Mátalé South has enabled cultivators to begin maha cultivation. Mátalé North : no paddy ; chenas being cleared.

NUWARA ELIYA DISTRICT.

Paddy and Dry Grain.—Kotmalé : paddy, ploughing and sowing for the maha ; kurakkan plants doing well. Uda Héwáheta and Walapané : paddy, yala cultivation commenced ; no work on chenas.

NORTHERN PROVINCE.

JAFFNA DISTRICT.

Paddy.—Ploughing and manuring general throughout district.
Dry Grain.—Panichamy, thinaichamy, and kurakkan nearly reaped ; crop reported good. Cutting and curing of tobacco almost completed—on the whole an indifferent crop.

MANNAR DISTRICT.

Paddy and Dry Grain.—No paddy crops in the district. Jungle is being cleared in Mannar island for dry grain cultivation.

MULLAITTIVU DISTRICT.

Paddy and Dry Grain.—Good rain in maritime pattus and Mulliavalai. Tunukkai healthy ; little rain ; no cultivation. Idaipokam crops progressing in maritime pattus. Clearing of gingelly chenas in Mulliavalai.

VAVUNIYA DISTRICT.

One hundred and fifty bushels under twenty-four tanks sown for sirupokam in Kilakkumalai North and South ; a few patches of sirupokam in Melpattu and Panankamam doing well ; uncertain in Cheddikulam. Crop under Mamadu thriving. Light rains throughout the month. General health good. Scarcity still continues. Eight hundred persons employed on relief work.

SOUTHERN PROVINCE.

GALLE DISTRICT.

Paddy.—Crop good, and reaping already commenced in Bentota-Walallawiti korale, Hinidum pattu, Wellaboda pattu, and Four Gravets and Akmimana ; in Talpe pattu, too, reaping commenced, but crop middling.

MĀTARA DISTRICT.

Paddy and Fine Grain.—Morawak koralé : paddy and fine grain good ; Gangaboda pattu, Wellaboda pattu, Weligam korale, Kandaboda pattu : good ; Four Gravets ; crop fair.

HAMBANTOTA DISTRICT.

Crop prospects excellent throughout the district.

EASTERN PROVINCE.

BATTICALOA DISTRICT.

Ripe paddy crops on 500 acres ; later pinmari damaged by unusual flood in Kalmunai division ; crop on 5,000 acres not affected ; munmari crops threshed and brought to market. Prices still high, as yield is much less than the average owing to damage by flood in March. Paddy, Re. 1.25 per bushel ; Indian corn, Re. 1.12½ ; fine grain, Re. 1.12½.

TRINCOMALEE DISTRICT.

Portion of pinmari crops is being reaped in all pattus ; rest ripe, in ears, and in blossom. Water supply sufficient. No damage by flies.

NORTH-WESTERN PROVINCE.

KURUNĠGALA DISTRICT.

Paddy and Dry Grain.—Dewamedi : prospects of maha harvest good ; sowing ma-wi and hatili paddy. Hiriyala : yala paddy partly withering from drought ; dry grain crops partly reaped ; sowing with ma-wi and hatili paddy. Weudawili : yala paddy partly reaped, but stunted ; kurakkan crop exceedingly good ; 200 acres paddy sown for maha. Katugampola : yala paddy crop being reaped ; dry grain reaped ; both partially damaged by flies and drought ; maha cultivation not satisfactory ; rain wanted very much ; chenas being cleared for maha. Wannu : rain on four days saved many crops withering from failure of tanks ; yala dry grain reaped except in the district where relief works have been opened where crop withered. Dambadeni : rain sufficient for maha cultivation ; yala paddy and dry grain mature, and being reaped.

PUTTALAM DISTRICT.

Paddy.—Crop ripening : poor in Puttalam pattu ; middling and fair in Demala hatpattu. *Fine Grain* being reaped in Demala hatpattu ; middling in that and Puttalam pattus.

CHILAW DISTRICT.

Paddy and Fine Grain.—Northern division : yala paddy being reaped ; condition fair. Central division : yala paddy is earing and maturing ; ploughing and sowing for maha still continues ; some fields have not been ploughed for want of rain ; if the dry weather continues yala paddy crops will suffer ; yala fine grain crop being gathered ; chenas are being cleared for maha. Southern division : fields sown for maha in lower tracts are thriving well, and those in higher tracts have failed ; many fields have not been cultivated for want of rain.

NORTH-CENTRAL PROVINCE.

Paddy and Dry Grain.—Moderate rains during first half of the month. Yala crop flourishing in various stages, and partly harvested. Cattle murrain exists in some villages, but is being kept in check. Gingelly crops being harvested with average produce.

PROVINCE OF UVA.

Paddy and Fine Grain.—Harvest operations in progress ; yield by reason of unseasonable rains not so good as was anticipated. Chenas being cleared in Wellassa and Wellawaya division.

PROVINCE OF SABARAGAMUWA.

RATNAPURA DISTRICT.

Paddy.—Midlands : paddy in yala fields are in blossom throughout the district, and in Kolonna and Ataka'an korales some of the yala fields are ripe and are already being reaped ; in Nawadun and Kuruwiti korales preparations for maha sowing are in hand ; prospects of crop very favourable.

Dry Grain.—El-wi crops doing well wherever rain has prevailed ; in Kolonna korale tana chenas have been reaped, and yielded good harvest ; maha chenas in Bintenna are being cleared. Rainfall abundant, except in Bintenna

KĠGALLA DISTRICT.

Paddy.—Yala prospects generally good, except in parts of Galboda and Kinigoda korales and in Beligal korale, where the fields have been affected with bambupiduma ; in Beligal korale there is damage by flies too. Ploughing and sowing for maha in progress throughout the district ; prospects good throughout.

Dry Grain.—Hill paddy being sown ; weather favourable. Kurakkan : prospects good in Beligal korale and Three Korales ; middling in Paranakuru korale and Galboda and Kinigoda korales. Mun being harvested ; outturn good in Paranakuru korale and middling in Galboda and Kinigoda korales and Beligal korale. Gingelly crop being gathered in Beligal korale ; outturn middling. Iringu : thriving well in Beligal korale, Galboda and Kinigoda korales ; prospects middling. Foot-and-mouth disease prevails in parts of Kandupita pattu ; in Three Korales and Paranakuru korale decreasing.

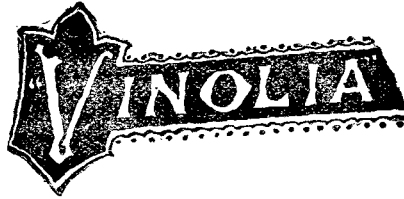

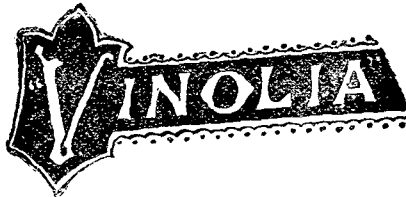

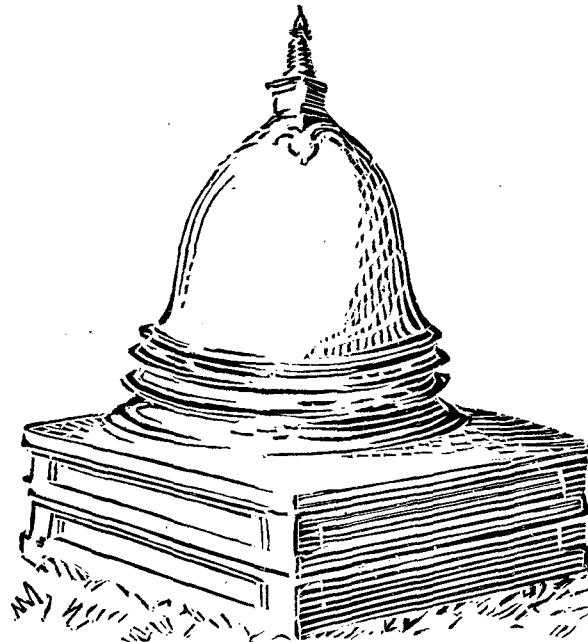

BENGAL.—No. 105.

Red Sea, Western Shore—Massawa Channel, Northern Approach—Breakers reported in Fairway.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 150 of 1893) that Mr. Kemp Saunders, commanding the ss. Shatel-Arab, when proceeding towards Suez from the Massawa channel, sighted breakers about 35½ miles N. ¼ E. from Difucin island.

A cast of the lead, obtained 3½ miles N. by W. ¼ W. from the breakers, gave no bottom at 115 fathoms.

Approximate position of breakers : lat. 17° 13' N., long. 39° 20½' E.

NOTE.—This break was passed at about 2 miles distance, at noon; the appearance of the break being seen for an hour, a northerly swell prevailing. The position appears unassailable. Unless therefore the eye was deceived by fish, light, or other delusive appearances, it would appear that a most dangerous shoal exists in the very fairway of approach to Massawa channel.

BENGAL.—No. 107.

Japan—Simonoseki Strait—Sunken Rocks South-west of Fairway of Western Entrance.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 157 of 1893) of the existence of the three under-mentioned sunken rocks lying about 2¼ cables south-west of the "Best track through" the western entrance to Simonoseki (Nagato) strait, as shown on Admiralty charts:—

1. A rock (Katānose rock), with 3¼ fathoms water on it, lies with Kita saki bearing N. 79° E., distant nearly 1⅞ mile, and Manaita rock beacon S. 44° E.

Approximate position : lat. 30° 57' 5" N., long. 130° 50' 50" E.

2. A rock (Toridashi rock), with 2¼ fathoms water on it, lies with Smooth hill (365' high), bearing N. 84° E., distant 2 miles, and Manaita rock beacon S. 43° E.

Approximate position : lat. 33° 56' 30" N., long. 130° 51' 30" E.

3. A rock (Kasaze rock), with one fathom water on it, lies with Smooth hill (Oinoyama) bearing N. 64° E., distant 1⅞ mile, and Manaita rock beacon S. 43° E.

Approximate position : lat. 33° 56' 5" N., long. 130° 52' 15" E.

The depths given are at low water.

BENGAL.—No. 109.

South Pacific Ocean—Samoa or Navigator Islands—Vailele Bay—Shoal in Fairway of Western Entrance.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 179 of 1893) that a shoal, on which the sea breaks with heavy swells, lies in the fairway of the western entrance of

Vailele bay, north coast of Upolu island. This shoal extends about one cable in a N.-W. by W. and S.-E. by E. direction, with probably about 2 fathoms water on it. Its east end (6 fathoms water) lies with Branker bearing S.-W. by W. ¼ W., distant about 7½ cables. Between the shoals and the western reef, the edge of which is always visible, there is a channel with depths of 10 to 16 fathoms; the best channel, however, is southwards of the shoal, keeping close to the north-west edge of the eastern reef, which is steep to and apparently clear of danger.

Approximate position of shoals : lat. 13° 50½' S., long. 171° 41' W.

BENGAL.—No. 110.

Eastern Archipelago—Ke Islands—Ke Dulan Harbour—Bank in Fairway of Approach.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 180 of 1890) that the Commander of the Netherlands steam-vessel Zee-meeuw reports the existence of a bank lying in the fairway of approach to Ke Dulan harbour from the north-eastward, with Tanjong Serbat bearing about S. ¾ W., distant 3⅞ miles. The bank was indicated by the discolouration of water; the least depth obtained was 9 fathoms, but there is probably shoaler water in the vicinity.

Position, to be considered doubtful : lat. 5° 28' 45" S., long. 132° 47' 45" E.

Japan—Strait of Tsugar—Cape Siwokubi—Fog Signal established.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 188 of 1893) that a fog signal has been established on Cape Siwokubi (Blunt), northern shore of strait of Tsugar.

The signal is a steam siren which, during thick or foggy weather, will give one blast of six seconds' duration every minute.

BENGAL.—No. 116.

New Zealand—North Island, North-East Coast—Rangaunu Bay—Sunken Rock in Fairway.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 196 of 1893) that the Commander of the ss. Staffa reports the existence of a sunken rock with 13 ft. water on it and 17 fathoms around lying in the fairway of Rangaunu bay, with the north extreme of the northern Moturoa island bearing N.N.E., distant about 2½ miles, and mount Puheki S.S.E.

Approximate position : lat. 34° 48½' S., long. 173° 21' E.

Further particulars concerning this rock will be given when examination of the locality has been made.

THE following Rules for the guidance of Registrars of Deaths, under the Ordinance No. 20 of 1891, made by the Lieutenant-Governor in Executive Council, are published for general information.

Rules for the guidance of Registrars of Deaths, under the Ordinance No. 20 of 1891, made by the Lieutenant-Governor in Executive Council, on the 5th August, 1893.

EVERY Registrar shall dwell in the division or locality in which he has been appointed to act.

2. He shall, on his appointment, at once cause his name, with the designation of "Registrar of Deaths" for his division, to be posted in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil in some conspicuous place on or near the door or entrance of his office.

3. He shall take care in all cases strictly to adhere to the Ordinances 18 of 1867 and 20 of 1891, and, whenever any doubts arise as to the construction or application of the Ordinances, or as to his duties, he shall apply for instructions to the Registrar-General. The principal sections of the Ordinances referring to the registration of deaths are given for his guidance in the schedule hereto annexed.

4. He shall inform himself carefully of every death that shall happen in his division, and learn and register accurately the particulars required by law to be registered. No death shall be registered except on information from some person required by sections 6 and 8 of Ordinance 20 of 1891 to give such information. It shall be furnished by the informant in the Registration Form B 36, headed "Information of Death," and be duly signed by him.

5. In case the Registrar has reasonable grounds of suspicion regarding any death which it would be within his province to register, he shall not register the same until after the investigation required by section 11 of the Ordinance.

6. Every death shall be registered in the order of time in which information satisfactory to the Registrar as to the cause of death is given to him.

7. The folios in which registration is made shall be consecutively numbered.

8. The name of every deceased person shall be given in full under the column set apart for it, with his or her nationality.

9. In the column "When Died" shall be inserted the name of the street or locality and the number of the house where the occurrence took place, and in the column "Cause of Death" the place of burial shall be stated.

10. In all cases of violent deaths, it shall be stated, under "Cause of Death," whether according to the inquiry, if any, held by the Police Magistrate or Inquirer into Deaths, or, as far as the Registrar can ascertain, the death is attributable to accident, homicide, suicide, or judicial execution.

11. Still-births and abortions shall not be registered or numbered as deaths. Still-births shall be entered in a separate paper, giving the following, among other, particulars:—

Date of occurrence; name and residence of patient, her age, rank or profession; signature, description, and residence of informant; and date of information.

12. The Registrar shall sign his name in the language in which the registration is made, in addition to his usual signature if such signature is in another language.

13. When a person applying to have a death registered adopts a name different from that by which he had previously been known, the Registrar shall accept such new name unless he has reason to suspect that fraud is intended.

14. Upon receipt of the information referred to in rule 4, and after verification thereof, or after the investigation referred to in rule 5, the Registrar shall issue to the informant a certificate substantially in the following form:—

I, _____, Registrar of Deaths for _____, do hereby certify that notice of the death of _____, aged _____, from [here state the cause of death] at _____, on the _____, has been received by me this day from _____

Colombo _____

A B,
Registrar.

15. The Registrar shall post every Sunday morning to the Registrar-General the duplicate of every entry of death registered by him in the previous week up to Saturday midnight.

16. In a covering letter he shall call the Registrar-General's attention to any death which, on sanitary, statistical, or other public grounds, demands special notice, or which by mistake may have been registered by more than one Registrar.

17. If no death has been registered by him in the week, he shall send a *nil* statement to the Registrar-General in form Registration B 22.

18. He shall report to the Registrar-General the burial or cremation of the body of any person of whose death information has not been given to the local Registrar.

19. The registers and forms required by the Registrar will be supplied by the Registrar-General on application, which should be made in due time, so that he may not be left without registers or forms for even a single day.

20. He shall be careful and economical in using the forms himself and in issuing them to the public, and prevent waste or damage.

21. He shall examine the blank registers issued to him before he begins to use them, with a view to ascertain if the folios are in order and consecutively numbered.

22. He shall keep his registers safe, and shall not permit them to leave his custody at any time, except when required by the Registrar-General or some person duly authorised by him, nor permit any person to have access to a register for the purpose of search except in his presence.

23. Every application for a certified copy of an entry of death in the register shall bear a stamp of 25 cents, and every copy of an entry of death issued by the Registrar shall bear a stamp of 50 cents, the stamps being supplied by the applicant.

24. The following fees are payable to Registrars :—

For a certified copy of entry of death from the register, 50 cents (payable by the applicant).

For registration of each death, Re. 1 (payable by Government), with carriage hire actually incurred in order to inspect a dead body or make inquiry under section 11 of Ordinance 20 of 1891.

25. Applications from Registrars for leave of absence shall, in accordance with the Minute of September 15, 1892, be despatched to the Registrar-General, so as to reach the office of the Colonial Secretary fourteen days at least before the day from which it is proposed that the leave shall commence.

SCHEDULE.

Ordinance 20 of 1891, Section 6.—It shall be the duty of the nearest adult male relative and every medical practitioner present at the death of any person dying in any town or place brought within the operation of this Ordinance, or (in case none such shall be present) any adult inmate of the house or tenement in which such death shall have happened, or (in case such death shall have happened on any plantation or estate) the resident manager thereof, to give information to the local registrar with all reasonable despatch, according to the best of his knowledge and belief, of the several particulars referred to in schedule A.

Section 7.—It shall be the duty of all police and peace officers and headmen to ascertain, so far as it lies in their power, and notify with all practicable speed to the local registrar the deaths of all persons occurring within their respective divisions, together with the particulars referred to in schedule B; and the local registrar shall, in the event of his not being furnished (within three hours of the receipt of such notification) by any inmate of the house, tenement, plantation, or estate in which such death took place, with the particulars referred to in schedule A, call upon such inmate for the necessary information.

Section 8.—Where an inquiry is held on any dead body under chapter XVI. of the Criminal Procedure Code, the Inquirer into Deaths shall ascertain the several particulars required by this Ordinance to be registered concerning the death; and the said Inquirer shall send to the local registrar, within three hours after the conclusion of such inquiry, the said particulars duly entered in schedule A, and the local registrar shall certify the same in his register. If the death has been previously registered, the said particulars shall be entered in the prescribed manner without any alteration of the original entry.

Section 9.—It shall not be lawful for any person to remove for burial or cremation any dead body unless a certificate under section 10 or 11 has been delivered to such person, or until after three hours shall have elapsed from the time in which the particulars referred to in schedule A have been furnished to the local registrar.

Section 10.—Upon receipt of the information under section 6 of the particulars referred to in schedule A, it shall be the duty of the local registrar forthwith to verify the same, and, if satisfied therewith, to issue a certificate under his hand that he has received notice of the death; or, if dissatisfied therewith, to proceed in manner hereinafter provided in section 11.

Section 11.—In case the local registrar has reasonable grounds for suspecting that the fact of the death of any person, or the true cause of such death, has been concealed, or that the party who is liable to give such information has neglected or refused to do so, or has given false or insufficient information, it shall be lawful for the local registrar to enter the house, tenement, plantation, or estate in which the death took place, to question all persons likely to be acquainted with the facts of the case, and, if the body has not been already buried or cremated, to inspect the same. Immediately after such investigation he shall record such particulars referred to in schedule A as he shall have obtained, and shall issue a certificate under his hand that he has received notice of the death.

Section 12.—Every person whose duty it is to give information under section 6 of this Ordinance, who shall wilfully neglect to furnish the particulars therein referred to, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding fifty rupees, or to simple or rigorous imprisonment not exceeding three months.

Section 13.—Whoever refuses to answer, or wilfully makes any false answer to any question put to him in pursuance of sections 10 and 11 of this Ordinance by a local registrar relating to any death or the cause of any death, shall be guilty of an offence, and shall be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding fifty rupees, or to simple or rigorous imprisonment not exceeding six months.

Section 14.—Every local registrar when satisfied with the information given under section 6, or after recording the particulars in manner provided by section 11, shall register the particulars required to be registered according substantially to the form B in the schedule to the Ordinance No. 18 of 1867; every such entry being made in order from beginning to the end of the book, and he shall also register the said particulars in the counterfoil certificate, and then separate the certificate from the register book, and transmit the same by the next convenient post or opportunity to the Registrar-General; and if no death shall have been registered during any calendar month, the said registrar shall at the end of the month certify such fact under his hand, and such certificate shall be transmitted as aforesaid; and the said registrar shall keep the register book safe.

Section 15.—Any police or peace officer, or headman, who shall have been informed of any death, and who shall neglect to report the same to the local registrar within three hours after he shall have obtained such information, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding fifty rupees.

Section 16.—Any local registrar neglecting to issue the requisition provided in section 7, or any person neglecting or refusing to give information after such requisition, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding fifty rupees, or to simple or rigorous imprisonment not exceeding three months.

Section 17.—Whoever shall remove for burial or cremation any dead body in breach of section 9, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding one hundred rupees, or to simple or rigorous imprisonment not exceeding six months.

Section 18.—Every local registrar shall be held to be a public servant within the meaning of that term as used in the Ceylon Penal Code.

Ordinance 18 of 1867, section 29.—Every registrar who shall refuse, or without reasonable cause omit to register any death of which he shall have had due notice as aforesaid, and every person having the custody of any register book or any part thereof, who shall carelessly lose or injure the same, or carelessly allow the same to be injured whilst in his keeping, shall forfeit a sum not exceeding twenty pounds for every such offence.
