**VITAL STATISTICS OF TOWNS IN CEYLON IN THE  
MONTH OF JANUARY, 1912.**

**REPORT OF THE REGISTRAR-GENERAL.**

THIS report deals with the Vital Statistics of the 31 principal towns in the Island proclaimed under sections 31 to 36 of the Ordinance No. 1 of 1895.

**Births.**

2. The births registered in the 31 towns during the month numbered 1,412 (740 males and 672 females), and were equal to an annual rate of 31·61 per 1,000, against 27·38 during the preceding month, 38·85 in the corresponding month of last year, and 29·72 the monthly average for the fifty-four months, July, 1907, to December, 1911. Of the towns (excluding Vavuniya and Lunugala, which have a population under 1,000), the highest birth-rate was in Moratuwa (64·90, average 34·18), and the lowest in Nuwara Eliya (7·95, average 16·13).

3. In the city of Colombo\* the births numbered 471 (237 males and 234 females), and were equal to an annual rate of 24·55 per 1,000, against 23·51 in the preceding month, 36·05 in the corresponding month of last year, and 25·37 the monthly average. Of the wards (omitting Fort and Galle Face and the Pettah, which contain a mainly floating population), the highest birth-rate was in New Bazaar (25·61, average 23·94), and the lowest was in Kollupitiya and Wellawatta Wards (19·03, average 17·72).

**Deaths.**

4. The deaths registered in the 31 towns during the month numbered 2,197 (1,246 males and 951 females), and were equal to an annual rate of 40·76 per 1,000, against 42·03 during the preceding month, 29·27 in the corresponding month of last year, and 30·67 the monthly average. Of the towns (excluding Vavuniya and Lunugala), the highest death-rate was in Kurunegala (96·01, average 51·68), and the lowest was in Nuwara Eliya (7·29, average 13·79), followed by Kegalla (19·21, average 25·43).

5. In the city of Colombo\* the deaths registered numbered 700 (404 males and 296 females), and were equal to an annual rate of 34·28 per 1,000, against 40·92 during the preceding month, 29·84 in the corresponding month of last year, and 32·56 the monthly average. Omitting Fort and Galle Face Ward and the Pettah Ward, the lowest death-rate was in Kollupitiya and Wellawatta Wards (16·65, average 19·96), and the highest in New Bazaar (45·07, average 28·17).

**Infantile Mortality.**

6. The infantile mortality of the 31 towns was equal to a rate of 302 per 1,000 births registered, against 403 in the preceding month, 216 in the corresponding month of last year, and 257 the monthly average. In the towns having an estimated population of 5,000 or more, the infantile mortality ranged from as high as 632 in Kurunegala (average 362), 533 in Puttalam (average 288), 500 in Anuradhapura (average 428), 437 in Gampola (average 280), to 263 in Kalatura (average 162), 257 in Moratuwa (average 161), 238 in Matale (average 261), 217 in Kandy (average 240), 183 in Galle (average 204), 111 in Ratnapura (average 257), 108 in Matara (average 171), 77 in Panadure (average 183).

7. The infantile mortality in the city of Colombo was 329 per 1,000 births registered, against 479 in the previous month, 217 in the corresponding month of last year, and 318 the monthly average, and ranged from 700 in New Bazaar (average 393) to 139 in Wellawatta.

**Causes of Death.**

8. *Infants.*—Out of the 2,197 deaths from all causes at all ages in the 31 towns, 426 were among infants under one year. Of these, the chief causes were 89 *Convulsions* (including 39 in Colombo, 8 in Moratuwa, 6 in Batticaloa); 74 *Debility* (22 in Colombo, 12 in Jaffna, 8 in Kandy); 63 *Premature Birth* (13 in Jaffna, 11 in Colombo, 7 in Moratuwa); 36 *Pneumonia* (21 in Colombo, 6 in Moratuwa); 31 *Tetanus* (14 in Colombo, 10 in Galle); 27 *Bronchitis* (16 in Jaffna, 8 in Colombo); 18 *Enteritis* (13 in Colombo); 15 *Diarrhoea* (7 in Moratuwa, 4 in Colombo).

9. In the city of Colombo, out of the 700 deaths from all causes at all ages, 155 were among infants under one year. Of these, the chief causes were 39 *Convulsions* (17 in Maradana, exclusive of hospitals, 8 in New Bazaar, 4 in Slave Island); 22 *Debility* (10 in New Bazaar, 4 in Kotahena); 21 *Pneumonia* (11 in Kotahena); 14 *Tetanus* (7 in New Bazaar); 13 *Enteritis* (5 in Kotahena, 4 in Maradana, exclusive of hospitals); 11 *Premature Birth* (5 in Maradana, exclusive of hospitals, 3 in Kotahena); 8 *Bronchitis* (4 in New Bazaar).

\* Consequent on the extension of the Municipal limits of the Colombo town on November 9 last by the addition of Wellawatta, the limits of the registration division of Kollupitiya Ward was altered with effect from January 1, 1912, by Proclamation of December 18, 1911.

† The city-rate is worked out differently from the ward rates, and takes into account hospital events, &c., not assignable to wards.

10. **General Mortality (One Year and over).**—Out of the 1,771 deaths of persons one year and over in age in the 31 towns, there were 209 from *Pneumonia* (59 in Colombo, 22 in Moratuwa, 12 in Kalutara, 11 in Kandy); 170 from *Diarrhoea* (21 in Matale, 16 in Kurunegala, 15 in Ratnapura, 10 each in Negombo, Kandy, and Jaffna); 144 from *Dysentery* (29 in Colombo, 18 in Jaffna, 14 in Kurunegala); 128 from *Phthisis* (62 in Colombo, 15 in Moratuwa, 10 in Galle); 104 from *Malaria* (30 in Jaffna, 9 each in Colombo and Kurunegala); 90 from *Enteritis* (43 in Colombo, 20 in Badulla); 88 from *Malarial Cachexia* (25 in Kurunegala, 10 in Kegalla); 54 from *Enteric Fever* (35 in Colombo, 6 in Moratuwa); 41 from *Anchylostomiasis* or *Dochmias Duodenalis* (9 in Matale, 6 in Colombo); 39 from *Bright's Disease* and *Nephritis* (21 in Colombo); 40 from *Accidents* or *Negligence* (14 in Colombo, 6 in Kurunegala); 33 from *Bronchitis* (10 in Colombo, 8 in Puttalam); 32 from *Puerperal Septicemia* (7 in Jaffna, 5 in Colombo); 19 from *Convulsions* (4 in Colombo, 3 in Batticaloa); 16 from *Anæmia* (5 in Colombo, 4 in Matale); 15 from *Cancers* (9 in Colombo). No deaths were registered from *Cholera* or *Smallpox*.

11. The highest mortality in the city of Colombo was from *Phthisis* (11 per cent. of all deaths, one year and over) followed by *Pneumonia* (nearly 11 per cent.), *Enteritis* (8 per cent.), *Enteric Fever* (6 per cent.), *Dysentery* (5 per cent.), *Bright's Disease* and *Nephritis* (4 per cent.). Out of the 130 deaths from *Phthisis* in all towns at all ages, 63 occurred in Colombo. *Phthisis* and *Pneumonia* were together responsible for 143 deaths at all ages in the city, or 20 per cent. of the deaths from all causes.

12. Taking all towns together, *Diarrhoea* and *Dysentery* contributed the highest mortality (15 per cent.), followed by *Bronchitis* and *Pneumonia* (14 per cent.), *Debility* and *Phthisis* (each nearly 6 per cent.).

13. *Infectious Diseases.*—The most prevalent infectious disease during the month was *Enteric Fever*, of which 98 cases were reported (76 in Colombo, 8 in Moratuwa, 5 in Mannar) followed by *Chickenpox* 71 (of which 32 in Colombo, 11 in Matale, 8 in Weligama), *Phthisis* 66 (all in Colombo), *Measles* 45 (of which 39 in Colombo), and *Continued Fever* 15 (of which 12 in Colombo).

#### Meteorology.

14. *Rainfall.*—Badulla records the highest rainfall (3.29 inches), followed by Ratnapura (2.59 inches). The next highest (2.42 inches and 2.39 inches) were in Hambantota and Galle, while in the other towns the rainfall ranged from 2.35 inches in Hatton and Dikoya to 0.16 inches in Matale.

15. *Temperature.*—The mean temperature varied from 57.2° in Nuwara Eliya to 78.8° in Colombo, 78.7° in Mannar, 78.2° in Trincomalee, 78.1° in Ratnapura, and was 73.4° in Kandy.
