### MUNICIPAL COUNCIL NOTICES.

#### MUNICIPALITY OF COLOMBO.

Minutes of Proceedings of a General Meeting of the Municipal Council of Colombo held in the Town Hall  
on Friday, March 22, 1912.

THE Council met this day at 3 p.m., pursuant to notice dated March 16, 1912.

*Present* :—Mr. K. W. B. Macleod, Chairman; Mr. C. P. Dias; the Hon. Mr. F. A. Cooper, C.M.G.; Mr. H. A. Jayewardene; Mr. R. S. Templeton; Mr. L. B. Fernando; Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader; Mr. H. L. de Mel; Mr. E. G. Jayewardene; Dr. David Rockwood; Mr. G. L. Cox; Mr. A. J. Martin; Dr. D. P. Banajee; Dr. E. V. Ratnam; and Dr. W. P. Rodrigo.

The Minutes of General Meeting of February 23, 1912, having been printed, and a copy thereof having been sent to each Member of Council, were taken as read:

Resolved that the Minutes of General Meeting of February 23, 1912, be confirmed.

1. Pursuant to notice, Mr. C. P. Dias moved that the request made to this Council by the Ceylon Educational Association *re* the compulsory attendance at school of all children of school-going age in the city of Colombo be complied with. Mr. H. A. Jayewardene seconded.

The Chairman moved as an amendment that the further consideration of the matter be deferred until the Director of Public Instruction and the Superintendent of Census have furnished the Council with the data specified in Mr. Dias's motion of last month. Mr. R. S. Templeton seconded.

On a show of hands being taken the amendment was carried.

2, 3, and 4. The following extracts from Minutes of Standing Committee on Sanitation and Markets of March 13, 1912, on Municipal Works of March 15, 1912, and on Finance of March 15, 1912, were brought before the Council, having been previously printed and circulated :—

*Extracts from Minutes of Standing Committee on Sanitation and Markets of March 13, 1912.*

- (2) Estimate for opening out and maintaining of drain in Floor's lane, Dematagoda, Rs. 78.—Recommended.
- (3) Estimate for the erection of a corrugated iron fence for Dean's road market, Rs. 90.—Recommended.
- (4) Estimate for laying of kerb and channel, &c., at the Kanatta cemetery, Rs. 1,389.50.—Recommended.

- (6) Drainage of the General Hospital: Construction of a footbridge across drain in Norris canal road at a cost of Rs. 50.—Recommended.
- (7) Expiration of agreement of Dr. M. de L. Robinson, Assistant Medical Officer of Health.—The Committee recommends that he should be offered, as pay of his permanent appointment, Rs. 6,500 to Rs. 9,000 by annual increments of Rs. 500. As regards his request for leave, he should be allowed what leave he is entitled to by the rules.
- (9) Revision of stall rents of Grandpass market: Recommendation of the Financial Assistant to charge 10 cents per stall for stalls Nos. 10 to 18, which are now reserved for basket women at 2 cents each.—The Financial Assistant's recommendation is approved.
- (10) Equipment for Municipal Bacteriological Laboratory: Authority required to order a suction pump at Rs. 525 instead of a gas compressor, estimated for at Rs. 600, for the Municipal Bacteriological Laboratory.—Recommended.
- (12) Medical Officer's leave: Letter from the Medical Officer of Health, No. 46 of March 6, 1912.—Recommended that a substitute should be provided to perform the duties of the Medical Officer of the Dispensary for one month at a cost of Rs. 150.
- (13) Letter from the Hon. the Colonial Secretary, No. 29 of March 9, 1912, forwarding an estimate for Rs. 12,000 for renovating the Infectious Diseases Hospital at Kanatta and inquiring whether, if Government provides half the sum, the Municipal Council is prepared to provide the balance.—Recommended that the Municipal Council should provide half the cost of the proposed improvements to the Infectious Diseases Hospital.

- (15) Correspondence on the subject of additional staff for the Veterinary Department, and increase of salary to Mr. A. M. Fernando, Superintendent, Cattle Mart and Quarantine Station.—The Committee considers that the question of raising Mr. Fernando's pay should await consideration with the general inquiry into pay of Municipal employés. As regards additional staff, the Committee recommends that the Veterinary Surgeon's proposals for additional staff, as printed, be adopted, as no further expense is involved.
- (16) To sanction the expenditure of Rs. 22,725 being unexpended balance on estimate of Rs. 32,725 for extension of water service in eastward extension already sanctioned.—The Committee recommends an expenditure of Rs. 10,000 this year on the programme already sanctioned.
- (17) To sanction the appointment of a night watcher and cooly for the Municipal Court at Rs. 15 per month each, with effect from February 1, 1912.—Recommended.

With reference to item No. 8 of the recommendations of the Standing Committee on Municipal Works of March 15, 1912, it was resolved that the words "without prejudice to the Municipal Council" be added after the word "crows" in the last line.

3 and 4. Resolved that the recommendations of the Standing Committees on Municipal Works of March 15, 1912 (as amended), and on Finance of March 15, 1912, be adopted.

The Chairman moved that Council do resume and that the resolutions passed in Committee be adopted. Mr. C. P. Dias seconded.—Carried.

5. Letter from the Hon. the Colonial Secretary, No. 28 of March 7, 1912, forwarding copy of letter from Mr. E. L. Mansergh regarding the progress of the Colombo Drainage Works was laid before the Council, having been previously printed and circulated.

6. To sanction excess leave over thirty days granted to Mr. G. E. R. Gunawardene, Clerk, Assessor's Department, from November 22 to December 31, 1911, and from January 31 to February 29, 1912.—Resolved that the leave granted by the Chairman be confirmed.

7. Correspondence on the subject of the Southern Outfall and extension of Municipal boundaries was laid before the Council, having been previously printed and circulated.

The Chairman moved that Council do accept Messrs. Mansergh and Sons' offer to prepare the scheme and report for Rs. 15,750.—The Hon. Mr. F. A. Cooper, C.M.G., seconded.—Carried.

8. To sanction excess leave of fourteen days over thirty days granted to Mr. E. W. Goonewardene, Supervisor of Conservancy.—Resolved that the leave granted by the Chairman be confirmed.

9. Progress Report No. 12 of the City Sanitation Engineer was laid on the table, having been previously printed and circulated.

10. Report of the Chief Resident Engineer of the Colombo Drainage Works, for the month of January, 1912 was laid on the table, having been previously printed and circulated.

11. City Analyst's reports on the town water for January, 1912, were laid on the table, having been previously printed and circulated.

12. Statements of receipts and disbursements from January 1 to 31, 1912, and from January 1 to February 29, 1912, and progress reports of work done for February, 1912, were laid on the table.

## REGULATIONS.

1. All applications for graves shall be made to the keeper of the cemetery, at least six hours before the time fixed for the burial of the body for which the grave is required.
2. The keeper shall intimate the line to be followed by a funeral party on arrival at the cemetery, and if more than one funeral party arrive at the same time, the order in which they are respectively to move to the graves; and funeral parties shall obey the directions of the keeper.
3. Should it be necessary for the purpose of preventing the disturbance of one funeral party by another, and not otherwise, the keeper of the cemetery may require that one burial service should be concluded before the other commences.
4. The keeper of the cemetery shall be entitled to keep order within the cemetery, and his orders shall be obeyed.
5. No grave shall be less than four feet in depth, or at a distance of less than four feet from any other.
6. No grave shall be re-opened within a year, or vault within eighteen months, from the date of the last interment therein, except upon orders made by a competent court or other legally competent authority.
7. No dead body shall be buried without the permission of the cemetery-keeper; such permission shall not be granted till all fees due have been paid.

9. Provided (a) that paupers dying in the Government Civil Hospital at Panadure shall be buried free of charge by the hospital contractor under the directions of the cemetery-keeper.

(b) And that on the production of a certificate signed by a Minister of any Christian denomination, or by a Mudaliyar or Muhandiram of the district, or by a Justice of the Peace, or by an Inquirer under the Criminal Procedure Code, that the relatives and friends of any deceased person are not able to pay the fees herein prescribed for the digging of a grave, the keeper of the cemetery shall cause a grave to be dug and the corpse to be buried therein, free of charge.

Parties may choose the person to perform the burial service, and the fee agreed upon shall be paid to him by the parties concerned.

## NOTIFICATIONS UNDER "THE PATENTS ORDINANCE, 1906."

THE following Specifications have been accepted:—

No. 1,245 of May 1, 1912.

*Eugene Erle Battelle.*—"Process for Recovery of Cane Sugar."

*Abstract.*—This invention relates to a process for the recovery of cane sugar, and particularly to a process for the manufacture of white sugar from juices, syrups, molasses and massecuites containing glucose, known as invert sugar; and has for its objects: the elimination of glucose, the increasing of the purity of the products, the production of a white table sugar or single grade marketable raw sugar, and the extraction of a maximum amount of the sugar.

The process is as follows:—The juice, syrup or other sugarhouse product is mixed with quick lime, milk of lime, saccharate of lime, or other equivalent alkaline earth in the proportion of 1 per cent. to 5 per cent. depending on the percentage of glucose. The mixture is boiled, or maintained near the boiling temperature, until the glucose is precipitated; sufficient excess of lime being added to maintain the alkalinity of the mixture during boiling. The precipitated glucose is removed and the remainder is treated with a suitable acid, preferably carbonic acid, to precipitate the excess of lime, and is then filtered. The subsequent processes for extraction of the sugar from the filtered solution are of the ordinary character.

*Gogu Constantinescu.*—"Improvements in Carburettors for Internal Combustion Engines."

*Abstract.*—This invention relates to carburettors of the class wherein the liquid to be vaporised is heated by contact with surfaces disposed in a chamber adjacent to a conduit traversed by exhaust gases from the motor, such surfaces being heated by those exhaust gases and the air to be carburetted being sucked through said chamber by the motor. The object of the invention is to provide an efficient apparatus of this type more particularly designed for use with heavy hydrocarbons, especially paraffin; but also designed for use with alcohol, benzine and the like, or mixtures thereof.

The inventor states that he is aware that the use of the exhaust gases for heating the vaporising chamber is not new. He claims however that the particular arrangement of the surfaces described in his Specification and shown in the drawings is novel and has several advantages. That arrangement is best understood by studying the drawings.

*Abstract.*—The invention consists in an improved mounting for carrying the stylus of a gramophone. The mounting carrying the stylus is fixed to the sound box, and a connection is made also between that mounting and the diaphragm. It is necessary that the mounting should be flexible to convey to the diaphragm the vibrations communicated to the stylus from the “record.” In order to provide that flexibility the material of the mounting is cut away at a certain portion of it leaving only two posts which are fined down to a thickness approximating to a knife edge. Or instead of cutting the material away the mounting is made in two parts which are joined together by two posts which are fined down to a knife edge towards the middle of their length. Means are provided for limiting the range of flexibility beyond the limit of elasticity of the material.

*Abstract.*—The invention consists of an improved manner of fixing the edge of the diaphragm in the sound box of a gramophone. A ring mounting is made having an annulus and with the internal edges chamfered. The diaphragm is slipped into that annulus and is held with its circular edge free within the annulus but gripped a little way from its circular edge by the internal chamfered edges. Ring and diaphragm are placed in a sound box having a removable back formed with a circular projection, and so formed that when the removable back is screwed up tightly the projection squeezes the ring and so grips tightly the diaphragm held within it.

Wilburn Norris Dennison.—“Improvements relating to Talking Machines.”

*Abstract.*—In gramophones with disc “records” the stylus that engages with the sound line of the disc moves generally, in known gramophones, across the disc not on a radial line but on an arc of a circle from the periphery towards the centre. The invention consists in devices for causing the stylus to move along a radial line of the disc. For that purpose the sound box carrying the stylus is carried by an arm which is arranged to swing in a plane substantially at right angles to the plane of the disc. There are in addition special devices provided to cause the stylus to move in the plane of the disc : such as parallel motion bars or cams to guide the stylus.
