GOVERNMENT NOTIFICATIONS.

IN accordance with the provisions of the 6th clause of the Ordinance No. 6 of 1865, HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR is pleased to declare and publish for general information the following Regulations and Table of Hire for Passenger and Cargo Boats plying at the Port of Trincomalee.

1. Owners and tindals of boats shall give notice at the Master Attendant's Office, whenever for repair or other causes their boats are withdrawn from work or from the Port, so that their numbers may be taken off the Register for the time they are so withdrawn.
2. The transfer of a boat by the owner should also be notified at the Master Attendant's Office.
3. No licensed boat shall land any passengers or goods at any other places than those appointed by the Collector of Customs. The tindal or person in charge of any boat offending against this rule shall be liable to the penalty imposed by the Ordinance in addition to the suspension of his license and that of the boat.
4. The number of persons the boat is licensed to carry shall be legibly painted in some conspicuous place abaft.
5. The Master Attendant will appoint an officer of his Department to control the order of these boats.
6. No boat whatever shall communicate with the vessels until after the visit of the Government port boat. The tindal or person in charge of any boat offending against this rule shall be liable to the penalty imposed by the Ordinance in addition to the suspension of his license and that of the boat.
7. Complaints against any of the Master Attendant's Department or any of the boatmen of this Port should be made to the Master Attendant as soon as possible, in order that the complaint may be at once inquired into.
8. The following are the rates of boat hire for the Port of Trincomalee:—

- ” 6.—No cargo will be discharged or put on board of vessels anchoring in Back Bay between the 25th October and the 1st April, without special leave from the Collector of Customs.

If the depositor does not receive the said acknowledgment of the deposit of sums of Rs. 50 and not exceeding Rs. 300 within ten days from the day on which he made the deposit, he must apply for the same to the Postmaster-General by letter, and, if necessary, he must renew his application to the Postmaster-General until he receives the said acknowledgment.

6 Interest calculated yearly at the rate of Rs. 2.40 per Rs. 100 per annum shall be allowed on every complete Rs. 10 deposited, and shall be computed from the first day of the calendar month next following the day on which a sum of Rs. 10 shall have been deposited, or on which deposits of a less amount shall have been made up to a sum of Rs. 10 up to the first day of the calendar month in which moneys are withdrawn.* The interest will be calculated up to December 31 in every year, and will then be added to, and become part of, the principal money.

7 Deposits may be made by a trustee on behalf of another person in the joint names of such trustee and the person on whose account such money shall be so deposited; but re-payment of the same, or any part thereof, shall not be made without the receipt or receipts of both or the said parties, or the survivor, or the executors or administrators of such survivor, whose receipt or receipts, either personally or by agent appointed by power of attorney, which power of attorney may be executed by an infant of or exceeding the age of fourteen years, shall alone be a valid discharge, except in case of insanity or imbecility of the party on whose behalf the deposits were made, when the Postmaster-General may, on proof of the fact to his satisfaction, allow re-payment to be made to the trustee alone.

* The interest thus calculated will be at the rate of 2 cents per calendar month for every sum of Rs. 10.

And in case any such declaration shall not be true, or if any person shall at any time have or hold or be possessed of any deposits or funds in more than one Post Office Savings Bank within the Colony, every such person shall forfeit and lose all right and title to any deposit in or to any funds of any and every such Savings Bank.

8 Deposits may be made by or for the benefit of any person under twenty-one years of age, and re-payments shall be made to such minor after the age of seven years in the same manner as if he were of full age.

9 In case of minors under the age of seven years, the declaration must be made by one of the parents or a friend on behalf of the minor.

10 Every depositor shall once in each year, on the anniversary of the day on which he made his first deposit, forward his book to the General Post Office, Colombo, in a cover to be obtained at any Post Office Savings Bank, in order that the entries in the said book may be compared with the entries in the books of the Postmaster-General, and that the interest due to the depositor may be inserted in his book.

11 No charge shall be made to a depositor for the book at first supplied to him, or for any subsequent book issued as a continuation of the first; but if a depositor shall lose his first book or any continuation thereof, he shall not obtain a duplicate thereof except he shall make application therefor, supported by an affidavit. The affidavit must be on a stamp of one rupee, duly affirmed or sworn before a Justice of the Peace, setting out the circumstances of the loss; the depositor shall further produce a certificate signed by a Justice of the Peace, or minister of the Christian religion, or by the Chief Headman of the District within which he resides, in proof of his identity with the person to whom the first book was issued. Upon such application, and upon the production of such certificate, the Postmaster-General shall, if he see fit, order the delivery of the duplicate book at the office at which the original was issued, and at no other.

12 No charge for postage shall be made upon the depositors for the transmission of their books to the Postmaster-General, or for the return thereof to them, or for any applications they may have to make for acknowledgments of deposits, or for any application or necessary letter of inquiry respecting the sums deposited by them, or for the replies thereto.

13 All moneys lodged by members of the Post and Telegraph Department as security shall be placed by the Postmaster-General to the credit of each individual member in the Post Office Savings Bank. Such depositors being members of the Post and Telegraph Department shall, on making the usual declaration at the time of first deposit, add thereto the following words: "and shall be held at the disposal of the Postmaster-General as security for the due performance of my official duties."

14 Any depositor wishing to withdraw the whole or part of the sum deposited by him must make application for the same to the Postmaster-General in the following form, a printed copy of which may be obtained at any Post Office Savings Bank:—

By the same post the Postmaster at whose office the warrant is made payable shall be advised of the issue of the warrant. This warrant must be presented by the depositor at the Post Office named therein, together with the depositor's book, in which the Postmaster shall enter the amount repaid and attest the entry with his signature and the date stamp of his office. The Postmaster shall take a receipt from the depositor on the warrant for the amount repaid to him.

15 The Postmaster-General will endeavour to prevent fraud and to identify every depositor transacting business with the Post Office Savings Bank, but if any person shall fraudulently represent himself to be a depositor, and by forwarding the proper notice of withdrawal and by presentation of the depositor's book and compliance with the rules of the Department shall obtain any sum of money belonging to that depositor, the Postmaster-General shall not be responsible for the loss thereof.

Repayment to a depositor unable to attend personally.

16 Re-payments shall be made only to the depositor in person or to the bearer of an order under his hand, signed in the presence of a Justice of the Peace. If the depositor be resident abroad, his signature must be verified by some constituted authority of the place in which he resides.

Withdrawals by Friendly or Charitable Societies, and receipts for the same.

17 Application to withdraw money deposited by any Friendly, Charitable, or Provident Society must be signed by two of the trustees of any such society, or when there are no trustees, then by the treasurer, and the name of the trustee or treasurer or other officer of the society authorized to receive the amount to be withdrawn shall be stated in the notice of withdrawal, and the warrant for payment of the amount shall be made out in the name of such trustee, treasurer, or officer, and the receipt of such person apparently authorized shall be a sufficient discharge for the same.

Funds of deceased depositors above Rs. 1,000.

18 In case any depositor shall die leaving any sum of money in the Post Office Savings Bank which (exclusive of interest) shall exceed the sum of Rs. 1,000, the same shall only be paid to the executor or administrator on the production of the will or letters of administration of the estate and effects of the deceased depositor to the Postmaster-General.

19 In all cases wherein a certificate shall be required of the amount of the balance standing in the books of the Post Office Savings Bank to the credit of a deceased depositor, for the purpose of obtaining a probate of will or letters of administration, such certificate shall be in the following form :—

Incapacitated depositors.

20 If any depositors shall become insane or otherwise incapacitated to act, and the same shall be proved to the satisfaction of the Postmaster-General, and if the Postmaster-General shall be satisfied of the urgency of the case, he may authorize payment from time to time out of the funds of such depositor to any person whom he shall judge proper, and the receipt of such person shall be a good discharge for the same.

Secrecy.

21 The officers of the Postmaster-General engaged in the receipt or payment of deposits shall not disclose the name of any depositor, nor the amount deposited or withdrawn by him, except to the Postmaster-General or to such of his officers as may be appointed to assist in carrying out the provisions of the Post Office Savings Bank Ordinance.

22 If any dispute shall arise between the Postmaster-General and any individual depositor, or any executor, administrator, next of kin, or creditor, or assignee of a depositor who may become bankrupt or insolvent, or any person claiming to be such executor, administrator, next of kin, creditor, or assignee, or to be entitled to any money deposited in the Post Office Savings Bank, then and in every such case the matter in dispute shall be referred in writing to the Attorney-General, and whatever award, order, or determination shall be made by the Attorney-General shall be binding and conclusive on all parties, and shall be final to all intents and purposes without any appeal.

23 In all communications with the Postal Department on Savings Bank business the above particulars should be quoted.

24 The entries of the amount of each deposit and withdrawal in the deposit books should be carefully examined by the depositors before they leave the Post Office, in order that they may be satisfied that such entries are correct.

25 The attention of depositors is particularly directed to the rules which have been framed for their protection.

26 The persons performing the duties of the Colonial Secretary, the Auditor-General, and the Postmaster-General for the time being are hereby constituted Trustees of all the Post Office Savings Banks. It shall be their duty from time to time to receive and examine the accounts hereafter mentioned, to

invest all surplus funds of the Post Office Savings Banks either in approved securities in their joint names, or to retain the same in deposit in a bank to be selected by them in their joint names, and from time to time to change investments at their discretion, and realize such of these funds as may be required for the purposes of the Bank.

27 The Postmaster-General is required to furnish the Trustees immediately after the end of every month with an account duly signed by him showing as on the last day of such month :—

(a) The general fund of all the Post Office Savings Banks and the securities in which it is invested in the names of the Trustees.

(b) The sum in the custody of the Postmaster-General and the bank in which it was deposited.

(c) The amount in the hands of each Postmaster.

28 Each Postmaster entrusted with the control of a Savings Bank shall enter in the daily cash accounts rendered by him to the Postmaster-General the balance of Savings Bank funds in his hands, as well as particulars of the sums withdrawn and deposits made at his office each day by depositors in the Post Office Savings Bank.

29 The maximum sum which each Postmaster shall retain in his hands shall be fixed by notification in the *Government Gazette* by the Postmaster-General, and be entered by the Postmaster in his daily cash account. No balance shall be retained by any Postmaster in excess of the sum so fixed without special permission by the Postmaster-General.

30. The maximum sum which the Postmaster-General shall be allowed to retain in his own custody or in his own name in deposit is Rs. 5,000.

31 As soon as may be possible after December 31 in each year, the Postmaster-General shall send to the Auditor-General an account duly attested by himself in the form prescribed by rule 27.

The Auditor-General shall cause this account to be checked with the books in the custody of the Postmaster-General, and shall thereupon certify to its correctness or otherwise, and shall also certify that the account of each depositor has been made up, and the interest duly allotted to each, and shall transmit this report to the Colonial Secretary to be laid before the Governor.

PRINCIPAL RULES OF THE POST OFFICE SAVINGS BANK.

1 At these banks deposits of not less than 25 cents will be received ; but no one may deposit more than Rs. 300 in one year, or make a further deposit when the amount standing to his credit attains Rs. 1,500 exclusive of interest. Interest at the rate of two rupees and forty cents per hundred rupees per annum is allowed until the sum due to a depositor amounts to Rs. 2,000, when interest ceases to be due. The interest due to a depositor is added to the principal due to him on December 31 in each year.

2. The following declaration must be made and signed by each depositor when he makes his first deposit ; and his signature must be witnessed by the Postmaster who receives the deposit, or by some person known to him or by a minister of the town or district in which the depositor resides, or by a Justice of the Peace ; and if such declaration or any part of it be untrue, the depositor making the same will forfeit and lose all right and title to his deposits.

3. Deposits may be made by a trustee on behalf of another person in the joint names of such trustee and the person on whose account such money shall be so deposited; but repayment of the same or any part thereof will not be made without the receipt or receipts of both the said parties.

4. Every deposit in a Post Office Savings Bank must be immediately entered by the Postmaster or other person receiving it in the depositor's book, and the Postmaster or other person receiving the deposit must in addition to the entry in the book affix a label of the value of the deposit opposite the entry, as well as write below such label the date and his signature. The Postmaster will further place in the same line with the entry and the label an impression of the date stamp of his office. Depositors should carefully examine their books before leaving the offices and ascertain that the labels represent the value of the deposit, and that the entries therein are correct, and they should keep their books in their own possession.

In addition to the labels which the depositors will thus have affixed to their books, they will receive, in the case of deposits amounting to Rs. 50 and not exceeding Rs. 300, a special acknowledgment by post from the Savings Bank Branch at Colombo. This acknowledgment should reach the depositor within five days if he resides in the Western, Central, Southern, North-Western, and North-Central Provinces, and within ten days if he is in the Northern or Eastern Provinces. The acknowledgment should be quite free from erasure, and should state the exact amount of the deposit, and the day on which the deposit was made. If the acknowledgment does not reach the depositor in proper time, or if, when it reaches him, it shows any signs of erasure, or does not agree with the entry in his book, the depositor should immediately apply to the Postmaster-General by letter, and should renew his application again and again by letter until he obtains a satisfactory reply.

5. No charge for postage will be made to the depositor for any letter passing between him and the Savings Bank Department with regard to his deposits, or with regard to the withdrawal of the same, or for the transmission of his deposit book between him and the Savings Bank Department, and letters addressed to the Controller on Savings Bank business need not be prepaid.

6. No charge shall be made to a depositor for the book at first supplied to him, or for any subsequent book issued as a continuation of the first; but if a depositor shall lose his first book or any continuation thereof, he shall not obtain a duplicate thereof, except he shall make application therefor, supported by an affidavit. The affidavit must be on a stamp of one rupee, duly affirmed or sworn before a Justice of the Peace, setting out the circumstances of the loss; the depositor shall further produce a certificate signed by a Justice of the Peace, or minister of the Christian religion, or by the Chief Headman of the district within which he resides, in proof of his identity with the person to whom the first book was issued. Upon such application, and upon the production of such certificate, the Postmaster-General shall, if he see fit, order the delivery of the duplicate book at the office at which the original was issued, and at no other.

Notice of the loss of the book should immediately be given to the Controller, as, should the deposits be fraudulently obtained, the Department will not in such case be liable for the amount.

7. A depositor in the Post Office Savings Bank may add to his deposits at, and may withdraw the whole or any part of them from, any Post Office Savings Bank without change of deposit book.

8. When a depositor wishes to withdraw the whole or any part of the sum due to him, he must make application for the same on a printed form called a notice of withdrawal, which he can obtain at any Post Office Savings Bank. When he has

properly filled up this form he must fold and secure it, and forward it by post as if it were an ordinary letter. In return for it he will receive a warrant for the amount required by him, payable at the Post Office Savings Bank named by him in the notice of withdrawal. The warrant should be presented for payment immediately, as the amount ceases to bear interest from the date of issue.

9. Money is received from, or for the benefit of, children, but will not be repaid until they attain the age of seven years; but in the event of death before the age of seven years, the money will be payable, on a month's notice, to their personal representative or relatives in the same manner as of a deceased depositor.

10. If any dispute shall arise between the Postmaster-General and any individual depositor, or any executor, next of kin, or creditor, or assignee of a depositor who may become bankrupt, or insolvent, or any person claiming to be such executor, administrator, next of kin, creditor or assignee, or to be entitled to any money deposited in the Post Office Savings Bank, then and in every such case the matter in dispute must be referred, in writing, to the Attorney-General appointed under the Savings Bank Acts, and whatever award, order, or determination shall be made by the Attorney-General will be binding and conclusive on all parties, and will be final to all intents and purposes without any appeal.

Southern Boundary.—From this point the forest boundary marches along the northern boundaries of lands claimed by Wewawattagedera Kalu, Pangwelakumbura claimed by Munasinghe Gravets Mohandiam, a strip of chena land claimed by Pinghami Wattrale, it then follows along the eastern and northern boundary of title plan 80,312 when it strikes Lady Macarthy's road, it then marches along this road until it touches the northern boundary of land claimed by Messrs. Soysa & Co., it follows this boundary until it strikes the path to the eastern redoubt.

Western Boundary.—From this point the forest boundary follows the path to the eastern redoubt for a short distance when it strikes Lady Horton's walk, it then follows Lady Horton's walk until Russell path is reached.

MUNICIPAL COUNCIL NOTICES.

MUNICIPALITY OF COLOMBO.

Minutes of Proceedings of a General Meeting of the Municipal Council of Colombo held in the Town Hall on Friday, November 3, 1893.

The Council met this day at 3 P.M., pursuant to notice dated October 28, 1893.

Present:—Mr. C. E. D. Pennycuik, Mayor and Chairman; Dr. W. R. Kynsey, C.M.G.; Mr. R. K. MacBride, C.M.G.; Major R. E. Ferminger; Hon. A. de A. Seneviratne; Mr. M. I. M. Haniffa; Mr. C. Perera; Hon. P. Coomaraswamy; Mr. C. P. Dias; Mr. Walter Pereira; Mr. R. H. Morgan; and Mr. C. M. Fernando.

The Minutes of October 13, 1893, having been printed, and a copy sent to each Member of the Council, were taken as read.

Resolved,—That the Minutes of October 13, 1893, be confirmed.

1. Pursuant to notice, Mr. C. Perera moved "that the Government be requested to furnish the Council with a copy of the Draft Ordinance referring to Municipal Councils now before the Legislative Council."

The Chairman stated that on receipt of the above motion he had applied to the Colonial Secretary for a copy of the Draft Ordinance, but had not yet received it.

2. Pursuant to notice, Mr. C. Perera moved "that a Committee be appointed to consider the said Draft Ordinance, and to report and make any suggestion thereon with any further amendments that may seem desirable." This motion was, by leave of Council, withdrawn.

3. A statement of receipts and disbursements from January to October, 1893, was laid on the table.

4. A further report dated October 20, 1893, of the Special Committee on the Draft Ordinance relating to Dairies was placed before the Council, having been previously printed and circulated.

Dr. Kynsey moved the adoption of the report.

The Chairman seconded.—Carried.

5. A letter No. 150, dated October 11, 1893, from the Hon. the Colonial Secretary, was read, with reference to the closing of public thoroughfares by the Police.

Resolved, unanimously, that the Chairman be requested to address the Government again on the subject.

6. Resolved,—That the question of the regulation of rents to be levied for stalls in the new markets at Slave Island and Gintupitiya street, and the fish market at St. John's road, be deferred until the markets have been declared to be public markets, in accordance with section 1 of Ordinance 26 of 1890.

7. Tenders for the rent of boutiques Nos. 57, 58, 59, and 60, St. John's road, were laid on the table.

Resolved,—That the highest tenders be accepted, in accordance with the Chairman's recommendation.

8. The City Analyst's report dated October 27, 1893, on the town water for October, 1893, was laid on the table, having been previously printed and circulated.

9. A notification dated October 26, 1893, from the Chairman, was read, that Hon. J. J. Grinlinton having been absent from three consecutive General Meetings, has vacated his seat as a Member of this Council.

Mr. C. Perera moved that the Hon. J. J. Grinlinton be restored to office under the provisions of section 32 of the Ordinance 7 of 1887.

Hon. P. Coomaraswamy seconded.—Carried.

10. Reports of the Inspectors on licensed carriages, and kerosine, poison, and gunpowder shops for November, 1893, were laid on the table.

11. The Sanitary Officer's report for the third quarter of 1893 was laid on the table, having been previously printed and circulated.

Mr. C. P. Dias moved "that the Council be furnished with a list of houses situated alongside the lake, which use it as a receptacle for discharging the sewerage, and that steps be taken to insist on the landlords introducing the dry-earth system; and also a list of houses having privies situated at a short distance from the lake."

Mr. C. Perera seconded.—Carried.

12. Remarks of the Auditor-General on the accounts for May and June, 1893, received with letters Nos. 87, 96, and 98 of October 5, 25, and 27, 1893, were laid on the table.

WHEREAS by Proclamation bearing date the Twenty-seventh day of March, One thousand Eight hundred and Eighty-eight, issued under the provisions of section 7 of "The Police Ordinance, 1865," a Police Force was duly established in the town of Rakwana in the Province of Sabaragamuwa, within the limits in the said Proclamation set out and described :

And whereas by section 34 of the said Ordinance it is enacted that, for the purposes of creating a fund from which the expenses of the police force payable by each town not created a municipality are to be defrayed, a tax shall be payable on the 31st day of March, on the 30th day of June, 30th day of September, and on the 31st day of December in every year for the quarter ending on the said days respectively on all houses and buildings of every description and on all lands and tenements whatsoever within every such town, to an amount equal to such percentage on the *bonâ fide* annual value of such houses, buildings, lands, and tenements as the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, shall by Proclamation from time to time appoint, except in cases where such amount shall fall below the sum of twenty-five cents per quarter, in all which excepted cases twenty-five cents per quarter shall be assessed and payable : Provided that such tax shall not in the aggregate exceed the sum necessary for the maintenance of the force in such town except as aforesaid, and which sum it shall be lawful for the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, from time to time to determine and appoint : Provided further that buildings appropriated to religious worship and such as are placed in charge of military sentries shall be exempted from the payment of such tax :

And whereas the town of Rakwana aforesaid has not been created a municipality, and whereas the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, has determined and appointed that the sum necessary for the maintenance of the force in the said town of Rakwana is Rs. 319-20 :

Now therefore know Ye that We, the said Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, do hereby appoint that for the purposes aforesaid, the tax payable on all houses and buildings of every description, and on all lands and tenements whatsoever in the town of Rakwana aforesaid, within the limits specified in the schedule to the Proclamation dated Twenty-seventh day of March, One thousand Eight hundred and Eighty-eight aforesaid shall, save in such excepted cases as aforesaid, and in the case of such buildings which are exempted from the payment of such tax as aforesaid, from and after the First day of January, One thousand Eight hundred and Ninety-four, be at the rate of four per cent on the *bonâ fide* annual value of such houses, buildings, lands, and tenements aforesaid.
