#### PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir Henry Edward McCallum, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

NOW Ye that We, the Governor of Ceylon, in exercise of the power in Us vested by section 6 of "The Masters Attendant's Ordinance, 1865," and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, have framed and established for the port of Colombo the additional port rule regarding searchlights, to be numbered 13, in section IV. of the rules already framed and established, set forth in the schedule hereto, for the purposes of the said Ordinance.

And We do hereby promulgate that the said additional port rule shall take effect from and after December. 15, 1912.

Given at Colombo, in the said Island of Ceylon, this Fourth day of November, in the year of our Lord One thousand Nine hundred and Twelve.

Section IV.

13. Signals to be made by Vessels when inconvenienced by Searchlights.—Any vessel approaching or leaving Colombo Harbour when searchlights are being worked, and finding that they interfere with her safe navigation, may make use of the following signals either singly or combined:—

(a) By flash lamp, four short flashes followed by one long flash.

(b) By whistle, siren, or foghorn, four short blasts followed by one long blast.

Whenever possible both flash lamp signals and sound signals should be used. On these signals being made, the searchlights will be worked so as to cause the least inconvenience, being either doused, raised, or their direction altered. The signals should not be used without real necessity, as unless the vessel is actually in the rays of the searchlight, it is impossible to know which searchlight is affected.

#### \* THE STAMP ORDINANCE, 1909."

T is hereby notified for general information that His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, in pursuance of the power in him vested by sub-section 1 (a) of section 5 of the above-named Ordinance, has repealed the Notifications bearing dates January 25, 1910, May 31, 1910, and September 23, 1912, which require the use of certain special stamps for the particular instruments mentioned therein.

It is hereby further notified that His Excellency the Governor in Executive Council, with the like authority, has directed that from and after November 1, 1912, up to and including December 31, 1912, the special stamps set forth in the left hand column of the schedule hereto shall be used for the particular instruments described in the right hand column of the said schedule.

#### "THE STAMP ORDINANCE, 1909."

The exercise of the powers conferred by "The Stamp Ordinance 1909," His Excellency the Governor in Executive Council has been pleased to revoke the rule made under. The Stamp Ordinance, 1909," and published in the Ceylon Government Gazette No. 6,529 of November 1, 1912, and to make the following rule to be substituted therefor.

#### RULE REFERRED TO.

From and after November 1, 1912, up to and including December 31, 1912, the stamps bearing the words "Ceylon Stamp Duty," or the words "Ceylon Postage and Revenue, or the words "Ceylon Postage Revenue," and no others, shall be used for all the instruments chargeable with stamp dutly under "The Stamp Ordinance of 1909" or any other Ordinance.

#### "THE PILGRIMAGES ORDINANCE, 1896."

THE following rules and orders made by the Governor; with the advice of the Executive Council, under Ordinance No. 13 of 1896, entitled "An Ordinance relating to Pilgrimages," for the conduct of the Kataragama pilgrimage and festival, where special precautions have been and are necessary, are published for general information in lieu of the rules promulgated annually for several years.

#### Rulcs.

For sanitary reasons the duration of the Kataragama festival and of the stay of pilgrims at Kataragama shall be and it is hereby limited to 2 days, namely, November 24 and 25, 1912, inclusive. Pilgrims arriving before the day first named or staying beyond the period here prescribed shall be guilty of an offence.

2. It shall be lawful for the Police authorities or any Police Magistrate at any place on the line of march to prohibit from proceeding all persons who, by reason of disease, infirmity, weakness, advanced age, youth, want of supplies, or other sufficient cause, are considered unfit to undertake the journey, or who appear likely to fall ill and endanger the health of others; and to require such persons to find security to ensure their obedience to the orders so given. In default of such security being found, it shall be lawful for the said Police authorities or Police Magistrate to detain such persons in custody for a period not exceeding three days.

3. In the event of an epidemic breaking out at Kataragama during the festival, it shall be lawful for the officers appointed to enforce the observance of orders to declare the festival at an end, and to direct pilgrims at once to leave the village and

proceed to their homes, and to prescribe the roads they have to travel.

4. The officers appointed to enforce the observance of orders shall have power on the line of march to and from Kataragama and at Kataragama—

- (a) To appoint paticular places to be exclusively used by the pilgrims for washing and bathing, for drawing water and drinking, and for natural offices.
- (b) To appoint places for the occupation of each class of pilgrims.

(c) To prescribe routes for the journey of any body of pilgrims. (d) To regulate the distribution of all food given to pilgrims.

(e) To fix separate places of abode for pilgrims who fall ill, to prohibit communication with them, and to detain them if unfit to travel.

Any person disobeying an order given by the appointed officers shall be guilty of an offence.

5. The Police are empowered and required to seize and destroy all food condemned as unwholesome on the march or in camp by the Medical Officer, or, if there be none, by the Chief Officer of Police; and any person resisting or obstructing the Police in the discharge of this or of any other duty prescribed by these rules shall be deemed guilty of an offence.

6. Any person bringing any cattle or cart bulls within three miles of the camp

shall be deemed guilty of an offence.

7. Any person selling meat in camp in any other place than that assigned for the purpose by the officer in charge of the camp, and any other person selling food condemned as unwholesome by the Medical Officer, or in his absence by the Chief Officer of Police, shall be deemed guilty of an offence.

8. Any person who shall, during the occupation of the camp, use any other place for offices of nature than that provided for the purpose by Government, or failing to cover the deposit with earth or sand, and any person who shall during the same period bathe in or enter the river above the spot appointed by the officer in charge of the camp, shall be deemed guilty of an offence.

9. Any person suffering from an infectious or a contagious disease, and not reporting the same to the Medical Officer, or in his absence to the Chief Officer of Police, and any person abetting or assisting in the concealment of such disease,

shall be deemed guilty of an offence.

10. All persons shall take up the quarters assigned to them by the Chief Officer of Police at the halting places and in the camp, and any pilgrim declining or neglecting to do so shall be deemed guilty of an offence.

11. The number of pilgrims for the pilgrimage of the year 1912 is restricted

to 500.

No person shall proceed on the pilgrimage in the year 1912 without having first obtained ticket from the Government Agent of the Western Province for the Colombo band, or from the Government Agent of the North-Central Province for the Anuradhapura band, or from the Government Agent of the Southern Province for the Galle band, or from the Government Agent of the North-Western Province for the Kurunegala band, or from the Government Agent of the Eastern Province for . the Batticaloa band, or from the Government Agent of the Northern Province for the Jaffna band, or from the Government Agent of the Province of Uva for the Badulla band, or from the Government Agent of the Province of Sabaragamuwa for the Ratnapura band, or from the Government Agent of the Central Province for the Kandy band.
- 13. Every person proceeding on the pilgrimage shall show his ticket when required to do so by any officer of Police, or by any officer appointed to enforce the observance of orders under the Ordinance aforesaid.
- 14. The transfer of a ticket by the person named in it and the use of it by any other person are forbidden.

Kolonnawa Canal.—It shall not be lawful for any person to fish in the Kolonnawa canal, in the Colombo Mudaliyar's division, within the Colombo District, of the Western Province, with any nets, except with the small nets with weights attached, known as the "baru-dela." The use of the big net called "ma-dela" shall not be lawful in this canal.

OTICE is hereby given that an examination for candidates wishing to enter the Third Class of the Clerical Branch of the Public Service will take place on Wednesday, January 8, 1913, and following days.

2. If the name appearing in the birth register differs, either by alteration or addition, from the name by which the candidate is known, the parent or guardian should, before obtaining a certificate, apply to the Registrar-General or his Assistant for such alteration in the manner set forth in section 7 of Ordinance No. 23 of 1900.

3. Clerks in Government service, from whatever funds they may be paid, who have completed three years' satisfactory service, and are not members of the Customs, Postal, Survey, or Railway Departments, and those clerks employed by Provincial and District Road Committees whose appointments date prior to July 1, 1875, are eligible for examination irrespective of age and without fee. Their applications (in the same form, Schedule A) for admission to the examination should be forwarded to the Director of Public Instruction through the Heads of

their Departments.

4. Applications are to reach the Director of Public Instruction not later than 2 p.m. on Wednesday, November 27, 1912; any applications received after that hour, by whatever cause delayed, will be absolutely rejected.

5. The Director of Public Instruction will return to the candidate his application, approved or disapproved as the case may be, after taking, if necessary, the orders of Government thereon. The approved application shall constitute the candidate's ticket of admission to the examination. Candidates presenting themselves for examination must produce to the officer appointed to supervise the examination their forms of application approved by the Director of Public Instruction. A candidate not producing such form, whatever may be the reason for his not so doing, will be refused admittance to the examination.

6. The examination will be held at Colombo only, in the place and under the supervision of the officer specified in Schedule B. Heads of Departments are required to grant to officers of their Departments, whose applications to present themselves for examination have been returned to them approved by the Director of Public

Instruction, leave to present themselves at the examination.

7. The examination will be competitive. The number of places assigned for competition will be twenty.

8. The successful candidates will be required to pass a medical examination as to their physical fitness for service in any part of the Island.

9. The subjects for examination are those set out in Schedule C to this notice. The examination shall be held in two parts. The first part a qualifying examination in Handwriting, Spelling, Arithmetic, and Bookkeeping. Any candidate failing to obtain two-thirds of the marks allotted for Handwriting, half those allowed for Spelling and Arithmetic respectively, and one-third of those allowed for Bookkeeping shall be excluded from the remainder

of the examination. Special attention will be paid to Handwriting, and candidates whose writing is untidy or illegible or contains defects in the formation of letters will be rigorously excluded. The kind of writing preferred will be that generally shown as the "Civil Service" hand. The second part of the examination shall be in the remaining subjects in Schedule C. Should a candidate obtain less than one-third of the aggregate marks for the three subjects-Composition, General Paper, Précis Writing-or less than one-fourth marks in any other subject, or if he be a Sinhalese or Tamil, less than one-half of the marks in his native language, such marks shall not be counted in his favour. In all the written papers marks will be deducted for bad writing and mistakes in spelling.

10. Clerks of the description given in section 3 above, who have served Government continuously for over six years, will be allowed to compete amongst themselves, and will be eligible, if they obtain a minimum of 66 per cent. in Writing and 33 per cent. in the other compulsory subjects, for four of the appointments offered for competition! Two of the appointments will be reserved as prizes for deserving clerks of the same description, who have served Government continuously for ten years and upwards, to be selected irrespective of examination. No service

under the age of sixteen years will be reckoned for this purpose.

# By-LAWS REFERRED TO. Dangerous and Offensive Trades.

1. No person shall keep or deposit or cause to be kept or deposited for sale or storage any guano, bone dust, or any manure or substance whatsoever from which knoxious or offensive smells arise or can or may at any time arise, or erect or use any lime or brick kiln or tannery in any place or depôt within the limits of the Local Board, unless such place or depôt be licensed therefor by the Chairman, which license shall be in the form in Schedule A hereto, and shall be in force from the date of issue until December 31 then next ensuing.

- 2. The management and conduct of business carried on in any lime or brick kiln or tannery or in any store or depôt or other place of business in which is kept, deposited, or manufactured any dangerous or inflammable substance, or any substance whatever from which noxious or offensive smells arise or can or may at any time arise, shall always be open and subject to examination by the Chairman and all persons acting under his authority.
- 3. Every holder of a license issued under section 1 shall submit at all times during the continuance of the license to such conditions or directions as may from time to time be given by the Chairman with regard to the mode of making, carrying, storing, or keeping of any dangerous or offensive substances, or with regard to the examining, testing, or proving from time to time the nature or strength of the said dangerous substances and things, or any of them.

SIR,—I HAVE the honour to inform you that, in accordance with the powers vested in me under sections 3(c) and 3(d) of the Official Secrets Act, 1911, I declare the following places in Ceylon to be prohibited places for the purposes of that Act, namely:—

• (1) Tallaimannar.—A triangular plot, bounded on the south by the main road for a distance of three-fourths of a mile measured from the shore; thence by a line tending due north and forming the eastern boundary; and on the north by the sea to a distance of 500 yards from the shore.

(2) Trincomalee.—The whole of the Fort Frederick peninsula, extending north-east from a straight line connecting Dutch and Black Bays and passing to the south-west of, and just clearing, Amsterdam and Zeeburg Bastions, Fort Frederick.

(3) Trincomalee.—The peninisula of Ostenburg, Great and Little Sober Islands, and the intervening water area as included in the following boundaries, viz.:—

From Nicholson's Cove in a straight line through Brownrigg Tower and the Infantry Orderly Room to the shore of the Inner Harbour; thence in a south-west direction to Leeson Jetty on the north of Great Sober Island; the north, west, and south coasts of Great Sober Island; from thence a straight line passing to the south of little Sober Island to Ostenburg point; and the north-west shore of Nicholson's Cove to the point of departure.

2. I have to request that you will cause this declaration, together with the Act,\* to be published in the Official Gazette.

THE following Notification by the Department of Agriculture, Pretoria, regarding the export of plants to South Africa, is published for information.

#### Union of South Africa.

NURSERYMEN with South African customers are hereby respectfully informed that plants, excluding bulbs and seeds, are admitted into the Union from oversea only under special permit. Permits are not given at all for conifers, or for eucalyptus, or acacia trees. They are freely given without regard to quantity for house palms, ferns, carnations, geraniums, chrysanthemums, orchids, and many other tender plants, but are given only for ten plants of a variety in the case of ornamental shrubs. While for fruit-bearing plants and roses and for trees in general, they are given only for varieties that are not procurable in the Union and that cannot be grown from seed, and for not more than ten of a kind. It is desirable that nurserymen refrain from filling any order in the absence of knowledge that a permit has been issued, or is practically certain to be issued with respect to it. Applicants are supplied with permits in duplicate, so that one copy may be sent with the order. Labels and invoices should invariably give the varietal names of trees, shrubs, roses, climbers, &c., as otherwise the inspectors may not be able to connect the plants with the permits. In filling orders for the latest varieties of roses, and orders for other plants, for which customers may say they are unable to get permits in advance of ordering owing to their not being able to give the varietal names, it is advisable to send to the customer a list of what varieties will be supplied a week or two ahead of despatching the plants. This action would admit of the customer getting a permit before the plants arrive, and thus perhaps avoid serious delay in the delivery of the censignment.

#### CEYLON CHAMBER OF COMMERCE.

#### Examinations for Commercial Certificates.

WITH the object of fixing a standard for Commercial Education in Ceylon, the Chamber of Commèrce will, in conjunction with the Department of Public Instruction, hold annual examinations, on the results of which certificates will be awarded to the successful candidates. A register of successful candidates will be kept by the Chamber of Commerce, and the Chamber will interest itself in assisting them to obtain suitable employments.

- 2. Candidates for these examinations must conform to the following regulations:—(a) They must be not under fourteen and not over twenty-one years of age on the last day of the month immediately preceding that fixed for the examination; (b) they must for eight months preceding the date of examination have been attending the Commercial Class of a school which has previously satisfied the Director of Public Instruction as providing suitable instruction in commercial subjects.
  - 3. The next examination will be held in July, 1913, and the subjects will be as follows:—

#### Compulsory Subjects.

(1) Handwriting, Orthography, and Dictation.

(2) Reading.

(3) English Composition.

(4) Arithmetic.

(5) Ordinary Commercial Terms.

(6) Précis and Indexing.

Optional Subjects.

(7) Shorthand and Typewriting.

(8) Office Routine and Bookkeeping.

(9) Commercial Geography and Shipping.

(10) Advanced Arithmetic.

In order to obtain a certificate, candidates must satisfy the examiners in all the compulsory subjects and in one of the three groups (7), (8), and (9). All the subjects in which a candidate passes will be noted on his certificate.

4. The approximate range of the various subjects and the standards of knowledge required in each are as follows:—

Handwriting, Orthography, and Dictation.—In handwriting the chief requirements are legibility of writing, and uniformity of size and slope. The ideal business handwriting is such as that set out in Blackie's Commercial Course of Copy Books. Writing should not be angular or floresque.

• The handwriting of the candidates will be tested in general by their writing in the various papers, and in particular by special tests, such as addressing envelopes, copying a draft letter, or writing from dictation. The spelling of the candidates will be judged from their general work and from a special test involving words of ordinary difficulty. In dictation the chief requirements are accuracy and correct punctuation.

Reading.—The essentials in reading are clear and distinct enunciation of each word, observation of necessary pauses according to punctuation, and faculty of making clear the meaning of each sentence. Questions will be put on the meaning of the passage read.

English Composition.—Candidates will be tested in the following ways:—(a) Writing a letter on a given business subject, the headings of which will be supplied; (b) re-writing in proper form and in correct phraseology a badly drafted letter; (c) correcting faulty or incorrect sentences. In this paper special attention will be paid to English Grammar.

Arithmetic.—Tots, simple and compound, long and cross. Weights and Measures. Vulgar Fractions and Decimals. Proportion, simple and compound. Practice, simple and compound. Interest, simple and compound. Percentages. Exchange. Special attention should be paid to methods of working and setting out of work.

Commercial Terms and Abbreviations.—A good knowledge of the terms and abbreviations ordinarily used in business. Lists of such terms and abbreviations may be found in almost any Manual of Commercial Correspondence, such as Pitman's or Routledge's.

Précis and Indexing.—Candidates will be required to make both a précis and an index of a series of business letters, all relating to the same subject.

The object of a précis is to present in a consecutive narrative all the principal points of the correspondence, leaving out all unimportant details, and making the narrative as concise as possible, without sacrificing completeness and lucidity.

The object of an index is to present in separate sections, chronologically arranged, a brief resume of each letter, giving number, date, name of writer, and substance of each letter in separate columns, so as to enable the particulars of any of the letters to be obtained without turning up the original document.

Shorthand.—Pitman's system as set out in the Manual and Reporter. Writing in shorthand from dictation at the rate of eighty words per minute. Transcribing accurately from shorthand into longhand at the rate of ten words per minute. Marks will be awarded for good shorthand outlines.

Typewriting.—Typing from manuscript copy, and setting out in proper form draft letters, tabular statements, or other commercial documents. Special attention must be paid to accuracy, correct spelling, proper punctuation, and paragraphing. Any candidate desiring to use his own machine may do so.

Office Routine.—Good knowledge of the methods in which business transactions should be entered up and treated. Use of ordinary office forms, such as invoices, order forms, despatch notes, forward notes, debit notes, credit notes, statements of account, account sales, accounts current, and similar forms. Use of documents, such as receipt forms, vouchers, cheques, paying in slips, bankers' drafts, bills of exchange, foreign bills, money orders, postal orders, I. O. Us. Treatment of correspondence, inward and outward. Letter register. Indexing, docketing, filing (various systems). Range of knowledge similar to that set out in Hooper and Graham's Business Manual or Blackie's Office Routine.

Bookkeeping.—Sound knowledge of the practice of modern bookkeeping by double entry. The system to be employed is that commonly known as the English system, in which the following subdivisions of books are employed:—Cash book, invoice book, day book, bought ledger, sales ledger, private ledger, bills receivable and bills payable books. Treatment by above system of discounts, interest, loans, mortgages, rents, dividends, bad debts, depreciation, plant fixtures. machinery, property, wages, salaries, consignment and commission accounts, joint accounts, partnership accounts, fixed and floating assets, trading and profit and loss accounts, profit appropriation accounts, and balance sheets.

Commercial Geography.—General knowledge of Asia and Australia, paying special attention to their products, trade, and commerce. Special knowledge of India and Ceylon in regard to their products, commerce, lines of communication, and trade routes with other countries. Special attention must be paid to the produce areas and particular trade centres, 'also to the rivers and railways of Ceylon and India.

Shipping.—A good knowledge of the more important steamship lines trading with Ceylon. Knowledge of procedure "adopted in shipping various kinds of articles, such as live stock, goods, explosives, &c., import and export. Knowledge of Customs procedure and use of documents, such as advice note, mate's receipt, insurance slip, bill of lading, Customs specification, certificate of origin, delivery order, Customs entry forms, landing order, warehousing form, bill of sightr weight note, manifests, and similar forms. Range of knowledge such as that set out in Hooper and Graham's Manual of Import and Export Trade.

#### VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended November 2, 1912.

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 125 (1 European, 16 Burghers, 66 Sinhalese, 14 Tamils, 20 Moors, 6 Malays, and 2 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on July 1, 1912, viz., 226,969) was 28·8, the highest birth-rate recorded up to date of this year, as against 23·7 in the preceding week and in the corresponding week of last year, and 26·0 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 111 (0 Europeans, 4 Burghers, 43 Sinhalese, 36 Tamils, 19 Moors, 3 Malays, and 6 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 25.6, as against 26.5 in the previous week, 33.5 in the corresponding week of last year, and 35.2 the weekly average of last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 111 total deaths, 32 were of infants under one year of age, as against 29 in the preceding week, 32 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and the average of last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 7.

Selected Causes of Death.—Eleven deaths were registered from Pneumonia (against 7 in the previous week and 18 the weekly average for last year), of which 3 were in Maradana hospitals, 2 each in St. Paul's and New Bazaar, and 1 each in San Sebastian, Kotahena, Slave Island, and Wellawatta. Three deaths were registered from Bronchitis.

- 2. Ten deaths were registered from *Phthisis* (against 16 in the previous week and 14 the weekly average for last year), of which 3 each were in New Bazaar, Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), and Slave Island, and 1 in Kollupitiya.
- 3. Two deaths were registered from Enteric Fever in Kotahena (as in the previous week, against 8 the weekly average for last year). There were 5 cases reported during the week, against 3 in the previous week.
- 4. Eleven deaths were registered from Debility (5 infants), 10 from Infantile Convulsions, 8 from Dysentery, 7 each from Enteritis (1 infant) and Senility, 6 from Premature Birth, 4 from Marasmus (1 infant), 3 each from Diarrhæa (2 infants) and Nephritis, 2 from Tetanus (1 infant), 1 from Worms, and 23 from Other Causes.
- 5. Nine cases of *Measles* were reported, against 6 in the previous week; and 4 of *Chickenpox*, as in the previous week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 79.6°, against 80.1° in the preceding week and in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.858 in., against 29.838 in. in the preceding week and 29.879 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 1.90 in., against 2.65 in. in the preceding week and 5.93 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.
