CEYLON GOVERNMENT ENGINEERING SCHOLARSHIP.

N examination will be held by the Ceylon Government in April, 1913, for the award of a scholarship to be held in the Engineer Class at the Madras Engineering College.

If candidates of sufficient merit present themselves, a scholarship will be awarded, which will under certain conditions lead to an appointment in the Ceylon Public Works Department. The scholar will be trained as a

Civil Engineer.

The scholarship will entitle the holder to the following allowances for the three years of his course in the Engineer Class:—A subsistence allowance of Rs. 50 per mensem and an outfit and travelling allowance at the rate of Rs. 300 per annum, paid half-yearly. Fees and deposits required for the Engineer Class will be paid by Government. In the event of his passing the College final examination at the end of the three years' course, the scholar will receive the same subsistence allowance for an additional year, during which he will be employed on works in India. He will also during this additional year receive the same travelling allowances as are drawn by Indian students under the same circumstances. All allowances will be contingent on the good conduct and satisfactory progress of the student.

- 2. The scholar selected with a view to service in the Public Works Department will, if he obtains the B.E. degree and receives a certificate of good conduct and satisfactory progress during the year spent on works, be offered an appointment in the Third Grade of District Engineers, and will be eligible, provided his qualifications are sufficient, for appointment to-the higher grades upon vacancies occurring. The scholar will be required before appointment to execute a bond of Rs. 1,000 pledging himself to enter Government service in the Public Works Department.
- 23. The examination will be confined to candidates whose age will be under 22 on June 30, 1913, and who are nominated by His Excellency the Governor. Before receiving such nomination candidates must have passed one of the following examinations:—
 - (a) Intermediate B.Sc. Examination of the University of London.
 - (b) The Intermediate Examination in Arts of the University of London with a pass in one of the Mathematical or Science subjects.
 - (c) The B.A. Examination of the University of Madras with Mathematics or Physical Science (II.—A).
 - The physical fitness of all the candidates will be tested before they are admitted to the examination.

The subjects of examination will be as follows:—

Compulsory.

(1) Arithmetic.

- (2) Drawing, Freehand and Geometrical.
- English Language and Composition.

(4) Pure Mathematics.

Optional.

Not more than two of the following:—

(5) Applied Mathematics.

- (6) Chemistry, Theoretical and Practical.
- (7) Physics, Theoretical and Practical.

The range of the work in the Mathematical and Science subjects will be the same as that prescribed in the Intermediate Examination in Arts of the University of London.

Each candidate must send in with his application two certificates of character, one of which must be from the Principal of the last school which he attended.

Twenty-first Annual Report of the Public Service Mutual Guarantee Association, 1911-12.

June 30, 1912, there were on the books of the Association 1,063 members, as against 1,023 on June 30, 1911, showing an increase of 40 members.

2. The total amount of contributions received from members during the year was Rs. 7,213.20, as against

Rs. 7,838 70 in the preceding year, a decrease of Rs. 625 50.

3. A sum of Rs. 10,553·11 in the aggregate was refunded to members on withdrawal or on account of overremittance, as against Rs. 13,567.41 refunded during the previous year.

4. The Association was not called upon to make good any claims during the year in respect of defaulting

associates.

5. The Association having closed the seventh premium of its existence, a sum of Rs. 9,441.63 became available on July 1, 1912, for distribution amongst the members as profits under Rule XI. This enabled the Association to declare a dividend of 10 per cent. on the total contributions to credit of members on June 30, 1912; this dividend absorbed a sum of Rs. 9,232.76, leaving a balance of Rs. 208.87 to credit of Profit and Loss Account.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended January 25, 1913.

Eirths.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 123 (0 Europeans, 12 Burghers, 70 Sinhalese, 16 Tamils, 19 Moors, 4 Malays, and 2 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on January 1, 1913, viz., 229,776) was 27.9, as in the preceding week, against 24.3 in the corresponding week of last year and 23.0 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 141 (0 Europeans, 8 Burghers, 69 Sinhalese, 30 Tamils, 23 Moors, 3 Malays, and 8 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 32·0, as against 25·2 in the previous week, 35·1 in the corresponding week of last year, a en29·5 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 141 total deaths, 41 were of infants under one year of age, as against 28 in the preceding week, 25 in the corresponding week the previous year, and 30 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of still in iths registered during the week was 6.

Selected Causes of Death.—Sixteen deaths were registered from Pneumonia (against 15 in the previous week and 17 the weekly average for last year), of which 4 were in Wellawatta, 2 each in St. Paul's, New Bazaar, Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), and Slave Island, and 1 each in Fort and Galle Face, San Sebastian, Kotahena, and Kollupitiya. Two deaths were registered from Bronchitis.

2. Fourteen deaths were registered from Phinist (against 2 in the previous week and 14 the weekly average for last year), of which 5 were in Maradana hospitals, 2 each Pettah, St. Paul's, and Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), and 1 each in San Sebastian, Kotahena, and New Bazaar.

3. Four deaths were registered from Enteric Fever (as in the previous week, against 5 the weekly average for last year), of which 3 were in Kotahena and 1 in St. Paul's. There were 8 cases reported during the week, against 7 in the previous week.

4. Fifteen deaths were registered from Infantile Convulsions, 13 from Debility (10 infants), 11 from Enteritis (2 infants), 5 from Marasmus (2 infants), 4 each from Worms (1 infant), Heart Disease, Bright's Disease, and Premature Birth, 3 each from Diarrhea, Septicemia, Senility, and Starvation, 2 from Dysentery, 1 each from Accidental Burns and Tetanus, following injury to foot (accident), and 29 from Other Causes.

5. Eight cases of Measles were reported, against 39 in the previous week; and 10 of Chickenpox, against 14 in the previous week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 78.7°, against 77.8° in the preceding week and 79.7° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.902 in., against 29.866 in. in the preceding week and 29.918 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 3.62 in., against 2.03 in. in the preceding week and 0.69 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.
