# "The Explosives Ordinance, 1902."

T is hereby notified that His Excellency the Officer Administering the Government, with the advice of the Executive Council, in pursuance of the powers vested in him by section 7 of the above-named Ordinance, has been pleased to add the following proviso to clause (n) of Regulation 3 of the Regulations as to Conveyance of Explosives by Road, River, or Canal, dated June 13, 1902.

#### Proviso referred to.

Provided that if the explosive is conveyed in a securely locked cart which has been approved by the Superintendent of Police of the district, and if such cart is clearly marked with the word "Explosives" on all four sides and has affixed thereto in a conspicuous position a red flag, no escort shall be necessary.

# "THE AERIAL NAVIGATION ORDINANCE, No. 18 of 1912."

TT is hereby notified that His Excellency the Officer Administering the Government, in exercise of the power in him vested by section 2 of the above-named Ordinance, and with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to make order prohibiting the navigation of all aircraft absolutely and at all times—

- (1) Over the area consisting of the Colombo harbour and that portion of the town of Colombo within the Municipal limits situated north-west and west of a straight line drawn from Kollupitiya Railway Station to the Victoria bridge, including that portion of the town of Colombo, which is bounded by the Kelani river from Victoria bridge to its mouth, as shown in plan marked A, and signed by R. S. Templeton, Esq., Surveyor-General, dated March 13, 1913, and annexed to this Notification; and
- (2) Over the area consisting of the Trincomalee harbour and such portion of the Revenue District of Trincomalee as is comprised within a circle with a ten-mile radius drawn from the Post Office in the town of Trincomalee, as shown in plan marked B, and signed by R. S. Templeton, Esq., Surveyor-General, dated March 13, 1913, and annexed to this Notification.





#### "THE BUTCHERS ORDINANCE, 1893."

THE following rules and regulations made by the Assistant Government Agent of the District of Kegalla, in the Province of Sabaragamuwa, under section 23 of Ordinance No. 9 of 1893, in respect of the public slaughter-house at Dehiowita, which has been proclaimed as a public slaughter-house in Government Gazette No. 6,525 of October 4, 1912, have been confirmed by His Excellency the Governor in Executive Council, and are published for general information.

Rules and Regulations made by the Assistant Government Agent of the District of Kegalla, in the Province of Sabaragamuwa, under Section 23 of Ordinance No. 9 of 1893.

- 1. No person licensed to carry on the trade of a butcher shall slaughter cattle at any place within the town of Dehiowita other than the public slaughter-house proclaimed as such.
- 2. No cattle shall be slaughtered at the said slaughter-house except between the hours of 6 and 7 A.M.
- 3. The place appointed for the exposure of cattle before slaughter shall be the building known as "the cattle pound" and situated on the grounds adjoining the slaughter-house.
- 4. Every licensed butcher shall produce for inspection before the District Medical Officer at 8 A.M. any head of cattle he desires to slaughter. The District Medical Officer shall note on the voucher produced his opinion as to whether the said head of cattle is healthy and fit for human consumption, or unfit for slaughter for human consumption.
- 5. Cattle rejected by the District Medical Officer as unfit for slaughter shall not be received into the pound.
- 6. Cattle pronounced to be healthy and fit for slaughter shall on the same day or not later than the next day be put into the pound and given over to the person in charge of the slaughter-house, together with the vouchers endorsed by the Sanitary Inspector, and shall be exposed for not less than 24 hours before slaughter. The Sanitary Inspector will then verify the voucher by comparing the brandmarks appearing on the animal with those noted on the voucher.
- 7. After the animal is slaughtered, the Sanitary Inspector shall endorse on the voucher that the animal was duly slaughtered, with the date of such slaughter, and shall forward the vouchers monthly to the Assistant Government Agent of the District of Kegalla.
- 8. If on any animal being slaughtered the carcase shall appear diseased or unfit for human food, the Sanitary Inspector shall bring the same to the notice of the District Medical Officer, and if the District Medical Officer shall be of opinion that the meat is unfit for human food, he shall cause the same to be forthwith buried, and report the matter to the Assistant Government Agent of the District of Kegalla.
- 9. The carcase of animals slaughtered shall be hung up after being flayed and cleaned the same day in the room provided for the purpose, and no meat shall be removed for sale except on permission until 8 A.M.
- 10. The Sanitary Inspector shall not permit the slaughter of any cattle which have not been approved as aforesaid, or of any cattle for which special license to slaughter has not been obtained from the "proper authority."
- 11. Every butcher or person using the slaughter-house or cattle pound shall pay the following fees:—For each head of cattle, 50 cents.
  - 12. All fees shall be paid in advance to the Sanitary Inspector.
- 13. Before 6 P.M. on each day the persons who have used the slaughter-house on that day shall thoroughly cleanse the slaughter-house and premises, and shall bury all blood, refuse, and offal. These duties shall be performed according to the directions of the Sanitary Inspector.
- 14. The Sanitary Inspector shall keep a register in the form annexed of all cattle brought to the slaughter-house:—

#### NYASALAND PROTECTORATE.

#### Ordinance No. 16 of 1912.

#### The Plants Protection Ordinance, 1912.

INACTED by the Governor of the Nyasaland Protectorate, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof:—

Short title.

Interpretation of terms.

- 1. This Ordinance may be cited as "The Plants Protection Ordinance, 1912."
- 2. In this Ordinance the expressions following shall have the meanings hereby respectively assigned to them, that is to say:—
- (a) "Agricultural Authority" means the Director of Agriculture and includes any person acting on his behalf by his direction.
  - (b) "Disinfection" includes "fumigation."
  - (c) "Imported" means brought into the Protectorate by any channel whatsoever.
  - (d) "Importer" includes the owner and consignee and their agents and servants.
- (e) "Packages" include boxes, coverings, wrappers, earth, soil, or anything whatsoever in which plants are imported.
- (f) "Plants" include growing trees, plants, or portions thereof, such as cuttings, buds, grafts, bulbs, roots, seeds, fruits, and vegetables, but shall not include canned, or otherwise preserved fruits or vegtables in which there is no longer any plant life.
- (g) "Comptroller of Customs" includes every Officer of Customs and for the purpose of dealing with the importation of plants and packages through the Post Office, includes the Postmaster-General and any Official of the Post Office acting on his behalf by his directions or those of the Governor.

Importation of plants prohibited by . Proclamation.

- 3. (1) The Governor in Council may, by Proclamation to be published in the Gazette, absolutely or conditionally prohibit the importation directly or indirectly from any country or place named in such Proclamation of any plant or any earth or soil, or any article packed therewith or any package or other article or thing which in the opinion of the Governor in Council is likely to be a means of introducing any plant disease into the Protectorate.
- (2) Any Proclamation issued hereunder shall remain in force for such time as may be mentioned therein or in any subsequent Proclamation hereunder, and may be varied or revoked by the like authority.
- (3) Any such plants, packages, earth, soil, articles, or things imported into the Protectorate may be deemed to be a prohibited importation and may be treated accordingly, unless the Importer satisfies the Comptroller of Customs to the contrary.

Imported plants.

4. No plants whatsoever nor the packages thereof shall be imported into the Protectorate except under the following conditions:—

To be landed at port of entry.

(1) All such plants and packages shall be landed at Port Herald or at such other place as may from time to time be substituted therefor by the Governor in Council by Proclamation in the Gazette, except when permission has been obtained under section 5 hereof to land the same at any other place.

And delivered up for it disinfection.

(2) All such plants and packages shall be delivered by the Importer to the Comptroller of Customs, who shall cause them to be conveyed to the place of disinfection there to be dealt with by the Agricultural Authority, and the Comptroller of Customs may also for such purpose take charge of any such plants and packages immediately on their arrival in the Protectorate and prior to the delivery thereof to the Importer.

Receipt to be given.

- (3) Upon such delivery the Comptroller of Customs shall give to the Importer a receipt showing the time and date of such delivery.
  - 5. The Governor may by permission in writing—

Permission to land plants elsewhere than at Port Herald.

- ' (1) Allow any Importer to land any plants and packages at any place to be specified in such permission.
- (2) Allow the importation of plants for scientific purposes without their being subject to disinfection on the application of the Agricultural Authority.

Disinfecting apparatus.

6. Suitable apparatus for the disinfection of plants shall be provided by the Government at Port Herald or at the port of entry to be substituted therefor, and such apparatus shall be under the care of the Agricultural Authority.

Process of disinfection.

- 7. (1) The process of disinfection shall be carried out in such manner and under such conditions as the Agricultural Authority may consider adequate for destruction of any vegetable or insect pests which may possibly be on or amongst such plants or packages.
- (2) No liability shall attach to the Government or to the Agricultural Authority in respect of any damage occasioned by such disinfection.

Removal of plants after disinfection.

8. All plants and packages shall be removed from the place of disinfection by the Importer within seven days after he has been required by the Agricultural Authority to remove the same, and failing such removal the Agricultural Authority may order the destruction of such plants and packages or may deal otherwise with them at his discretion.

9. The expenses of removal to and from the place of disinfection shall be borne by the Importer, and the Government may recover from the Importer such expenses necessarily incurred in keeping the plants in good condition: Provided always that if the importation exceeds in bulk twenty cubic feet or in weight half a ton, then the importer shall also bear the expenses of disinfection: Provided also that if plants are landed at any place by special permission of the Governor, then the Importer shall in addition pay all the expenses of disinfection, including the transport apparatus and the attendance of the Agricultural Authority, and shall provide any labour necessary to carry out such disinfection.

Expenses of removal, &c.

10. The Agricultural Authority may require the Importer to keep him informed as to the disposal of any plants after disinfection, and may visit and examine them at any time, if necessary.

Inspection of plants after removal.

- 11. (1) Where in the opinion of the Agricultural Authority disinfection is not sufficient to destroy any insect pest or fungoid disease on any plant sent him for disinfection, he shall cause such plant to be destroyed.
- (2) Where in the opinion of the Agricultural Authority any imported plant or part thereof should be grown apart from other plants of a similar description, he shall, if he think fit, require such plant or part thereof to be so grown, and shall, from time to time during twelve months from the date of the importation of such plant, subject the same to inspection by himself or as he shall direct; and if any such plant is at any time found on inspection to be suffering from any pest or disease already known in the Protectorate, it shall be treated as directed by the Agricultural Authority; and if suffering from any pest or disease net already known in the Protectorate, it may be destroyed under the immediate supervision of the Agricultural Authority.
- 12. All plants, packages, or other articles imported into this Protectorate contrary to the provisions of this Ordinance may be seized and forfeited, and may be destroyed or otherwise dealt with as the Governor may direct.

Seizure of plants.

13. It shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, from time to time, by rules to be published in the Gazette, to provide for the control or eradication of insect pests or plant diseases within the Protectorate.

Power to provide for the control or eradication of insect pests or plant diseases within the Protectorate.

Penalties.

14. Every person who shall do or omit to do anything which is by this Ordinance forbidden or required to be done, or shall assault, resist, hinder, prevent, or obstruct any person acting under and by the authority of this Ordinance, shall be guilty of an offence against this Ordinance, and shall on conviction be liable to a penalty not exceeding £50.

### The Plants Protection Ordinance, 1912.

#### Proclamation No. 3 of 1913.

PY HIS EXCELLENCY MAJOR FRANCIS BARROW PEARCE, Companion of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Acting Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Nyasaland Protectorate.

WHEREAS by section 3 of "The Plants Protection Ordinance, 1912," it is provided that the Governor in Council may, by Proclamation to be published in the Gazette, absolutely or conditionally prohibit the importation directly or indirectly from any country or place named in such Proclamation of any plant or any earth or soil, or any article packed therewith or any package or other article or thing which in the opinion of the Governor in Council is likely to be a means of introducing any plant disease into the Protectorate:

And whereas it has been made to appear to me that the importation of cotton plants with the following exceptions should be absolutely prohibited:—

#### Exceptions—

- (1) Cotton plants growing in Egypt.
- (2) Cotton plants imported for experimental purposes by the Director of Agriculture and packed in double bags or tins:

And whereas it has been further made to appear to me that all plants permitted to be imported should be imported subject to certain conditions:

Now therefore, by virtue of the powers in me as Acting Governor in Council vested as aforesaid, I do hereby declare and proclaim that the importation of cotton plants, with the exceptions as aforesaid, shall be and is hereby absolutely prohibited.

And further, that the importation of all plants permitted to be imported shall be imported subject to the following conditions:—

1. Every package containing plants imported into the Protectorate through the medium of the post shall contain a statement containing the full names of the kind and variety, the country of origin, and the name and address of the person or firm supplying such plants, together with any certificate which may be prescribed by Schedules A or B. Such package shall be delivered by the Postal Department to the Agricultural Department, Zomba, for inspection, and disinfection, if necessary. Such package shall, if in order, be delivered to the Post Office to be forwarded to the addressee without further postal charge. Any package or plants which does not contain the requisite statement and certificate shall be liably to be confiscated or otherwise dealt with as the Agricultural Authority may determine.

A 2

- 2. When plants are intended to be imported otherwise than through the medium of the post, a statement containing the full names and the kind and variety, the country of origin, and the name and address of the person or firm supplying such plants, together with any certificate which may be prescribed by Schedules A or B, shall be posted to the Comptroller of Customs. Such statement and certificate shall be despatched by the consignor in sufficient time to enable it to reach the Comptroller of Customs one month in advance of the consignment. Plants which reach the Port of Entry for which the necessary statement and certificate have not been received shall be detained pending the receipt of the statement and certificate as aforesaid, and if such are not received within one month susbequent to the arrival of the plants, the whole consignment shall be liable to be confiscated or otherwise dealt with as the Agricultural Authority may determine. When plants are imported by persons entering the Protectorate, the importer shall declare the same to the Customs Officer, giving the information required above, and producing the certificate which may be prescribed by Schedules A or B. In the event of the statement and certificate being in order, all plants shall be disinfected, if considered necessary by the Agricultural Authority at the Port of Entry, and allowed to proceed. Should any statement or certificate prove to be incorrect, the whole consignment shall be liable to be confiscated.
- 3. All plants shall be securely packed, and should any package become so damaged in the course of transit as to render it possible that any plant may escape therefrom, such package and any plant therein or therefrom may at the discretion of the Agricultural Authority be confiscated.

### Order of the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, dated March 4, 1913.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1911, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. The date on which Chapter I. (Importation) of the Horses (Importation and Transit) Order of 1912 (hereinafter referred to as the principal Order) shall come into operation is hereby further altered to the First day of July, Nineteen hundred and Thirteen.

- 2. The provisions of paragraph (ix.) (Food and Water) of Article 13 of the principal Order shall not until the First day of July, Nineteen hundred and Thirteen, apply to a vessel on which horses, asses, or mules are carried to any port in Great Britain or from any such port to any port in the British Islands.
- 3. The First day of July, Nineteen hundred and Thirteen, shall be substituted for the First day of January, Nineteen hundred and Thirteen, in the schedule to the principal Order (Orders Revoked).

In witness whereof the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries have hereunto set their Official Seal this Fourth day of March, Nineteen hundred and Thirteen.

The Hight Hon. Lewis Harcourt, M.P., to the Officer Administering the Government of Ceylon.

Circular.

Downing street, March 15, 1913.

SIR,—My attention and that of my predecessors in office has from time to time been called to cases in which gentlemen who have been Colonial Governors or have held other high appointments in the Colonial Service have, immediately upon their retirement, been offered and accepted directorships of companies operating in territories in which they recently held office.

- 2. The acceptance of such directorships has afforded foccasion for adverse criticism, and, after much consideration, I have arrived at the conclusion that the practice is open to serious objection, as tending to impair that reputation for a disinterested sense of public duty which the Colonial Service rightly enjoys.
- 3. I have therefore decided to lay down for the future the following rule, viz., that no officer who has retired from the Colonial Service shall accept the directorship of any company operating in the Colony or Protectorate in which he has served without first obtaining the written consent of the Governor for the time being of the Colony or Protectorate in question, which consent during the first three years after an officer's retirement will only be given in very exceptional circumstances and after reference to the Secretary of State. And no retiring Colonial Governor shall accept such a directorship or similar position until he has obtained the necessary permission from the Secretary of State, who will in each case consult the Governor of the Colony or Protectorate affected before deciding upon the application.
- 4. It is doubtless desirable to support such a rule by some adequate sanction, and you should at once consider the enactment of a provision in the Pensions Law of your Government for enforcing the new rule by taking power to suspend the pension of an officer who disregards the rule or the Secretary of State's instructions. In the meantime I have to request that you will take the necessary steps to bring the ruling to the notice of all whom it may concern.

#### "The Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Ordinance, 1907."

W HEREAS by the proviso to section 10 of "The Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Ordinance, 1907," as amended by Ordinance No. 19 of 1912, it is enacted that where in any area the whole or any part of the fines recovered in respect of offences under the said Ordinance which shall have been prosecuted by any officer of any society established in Ceylon for the prevention of cruelty to animals is by law or practice already appropriated to any public authority established in the area, an order made by the Governor in Executive Council, under section 10 of the said Ordinance, shall only take effect in such area, subject to the consent of such public authority signified by resolution notified in the Government Gazette and to the extent authorized by such resolution:

And whereas the Municipal Council of Kandy has, under and in pursuance of the proviso to section 10 of the said Ordinance, passed the following resolution on March 15, 1913:—

"That from and after April 1, 1913, the whole of the fines imposed in cases instituted by any officer of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals be paid to the Society":

It is hereby notified that the Officer Administering the Government in Executive Council has, under the provisions of section 10 of the said Ordinance, directed that from and after April 1, 1913, the whole of the fines recovered in respect of offences punishable under the said Ordinance which shall have been prosecuted within the limits of the Municipal Council of Kandy by any officer of the Society established in Ceylon for the prevention of cruelty to animals shall be paid to such Society.

#### Buildings referred to.

#### STATISTICS. VITAL

Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended April 19, 1913.

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 109 (0 Europeans, 13 Burghers, 68 Sinhalese, 15 Tamils, 11 Moors, 1 Malay, and 1 Other). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on January 1, 1913, viz., 229,776) was 24.7 as against 23.8 in the preceding week, 26.0 in the corresponding week of last year, and 23.0 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 117 (1 European, 8 Burghers, 54 Sinhalese, 30 Tamils, 15 Moors, 4 Malays, and 5 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 26.5, as against 26.8 in the previous week, 27.6 in the corresponding week of last year, and 29.5 the weekly average of last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 117 total deaths, 33 were of infants under one year of age, as against 22 in the preceding week, 24 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 30 the average of last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 9.

Selected Causes of Death.—Seventeen deaths were registered from Pneumonia (against 16 in the previous week and 17 the weekly average for last year), of which 3 each were in San Sebastian, Kotahena, and Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), 2 each in New Bazaar and Maradana hospitals, and I each in Pattah, Slave Island, Kollupitiya, and Wellawatta. Four deaths were registered from Bronchitis.

- 2. Twelve deaths were registered from Phthisis (as in the previous week, against 14 the weekly average for last year), of which 3 each were in St. Paul's, Maradana hospitals, and Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), 2 in Wellawatta, and 1 in New Bazaar.
- 3. Three deaths were registered from Enteric Fever (against 1 in the previous week and 5 the weekly average for last year), of which I each was in New Bazaar, Maradana hospitals, and Kollupitiya. There were 9 cases reported during the week, against 8 in the previous week.
- 4. Fourteen deaths were registered from Debility (6 infants), 11 from Senility, 10 from Infantile Convulsions, 5 from Enteritis (2 infants). 2 each from Dysentery and Tetanus (1 infant), 1 each from Diarrhæa (infant), Worms, and Accidental Explosion of Gunpowder, and 34 from Other Causes.
- 5. Twenty-eight cases of Measles were reported, against 22 in the previous week; and 19 of Chickenpox, against 26 in the previous week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 81.2°, against 81.7° in the preceding week and 82.3° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.826 in., against 29.813 in. in the preceding week and 29.802 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 2.09 in., against 6.09 in. in the preceding week and 2.15 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.
