The examination in the Criminal Procedure Code prescribed under the Minute of March 26, 1900, for officers in the Fourth Class of the Civil Service, will also be held on July 29, 1913, as well as at the Kandy Kachcheri.

*It is also hereby notified that candidates will be given the option of using Codes in the examination in the Criminal Procedure Code and the Penal Code; they must, however, state when sending in their names what their decision is, as the character of the papers set for those who use Codes and those who do not will be different.*

The examination for officers in the Police Department and the Forest Department, and the *vivâ voce* examination in the native languages for officers in the Public Works Department, the Irrigation Department, and the Railway Department, will be held at the same time and place.

Candidates are required to send in their names not later than June 30, 1913.

Gentlemen in the Civil Service should state in their applications whether they are presenting themselves for the first or second examination, and whether they intend taking up Sinhalese or Tamil, and whether they wish to have the option of using Codes.

The hours of examination will be from 10.30 A.M. to 1.30 P.M. and from 2 P.M. to 5 P.M., exclusive of the *vivâ voce* examinations, which will be specially arranged for.

## GOVERNMENT TRAINING COLLEGE, COLOMBO.

## Entrance Examination for 1914 and 1915.

## ENGLISH CLASSES (MEN AND WOMEN).

AN Entrance Examination for admission to the English classes will be held at the Training College on November 3, 4, and 5, 1913, commencing at 10.30 A.M. In order to gain admission to this examination, intending candidates must apply to the Principal of the Training College during the month of September for an admission form. These forms must be returned on or before October 16. Candidates will then be informed whether they have been selected to appear at the examination.

The students of these classes will be trained for teacherships in Grant-in-aid and Government schools. The following studentships are offered for competition:—

Fifteen studentships of Rs. 300 per annum each, with free tuition and free railway passes for use during vacations.

Besides the fifteen students who receive the above allowances, twelve additional students will, if eligible candidates present themselves, be appointed, who will receive no allowance, but will be allowed to take up the first-year course free of charge, at the end of which they will receive a third class certificate, if their record during the year and their performance at the first-year examination be satisfactory. Such students will be allowed to complete the course, and if their work shows exceptional progress, will be eligible for appointment to a studentship of Rs. 300 in their second-year course. Four of these twelve will, if eligible candidates present themselves, be students who will take a special course with a view to qualify for the certificate under (c) below.

It must be understood that all students are appointed on probation for the first three months, and will not be allowed to continue their course unless their work shows a reasonable degree of promise.

Students in training must devote the whole of their time to College work. Board and residence will be provided on payment of the prescribed charge during the time the College is in session. Those for whom residence is not available must live within a convenient distance of the College, and must be able to satisfy the Principal that their places of residence afford proper facilities for study and conditions for the maintenance of general good health. Each selected candidate will be examined by the College Medical Officer, whose report must state that the candidate is physically fit to take up the work of a teacher.

The Second Class certificate issued to students at the conclusion of their course at the Government Training College will in future be of three grades:—

- (a) A certificate which qualifies a teacher to be in charge of a secondary school.
- (b) A certificate which qualifies a teacher to be in charge of an elementary school.
- (c) A certificate which qualifies a teacher to be in charge of an infant school; this certificate will be recognized for the purpose of awarding the higher grant under clause 36 of the Code for Aided Schools.

The Entrance Examination will consist of two parts:—

## I.—Compulsory subjects:—

- (1) English Language and Literature (a general paper will be set).
- (2) English Composition.
- (3) Reading aloud an unprepared passage from a work of a standard English author.
- (4) Arithmetic.
- (5) History and Geography, general knowledge of English History from 1815 to the present time, and Geography of Europe and Asia, Ceylon in detail.

## II.—Optional subjects:—

Mathematics: Algebra.

Geometry: the subject-matter of Euclid's Books I. to III. (experimentally and theoretically).

Languages: A.—Latin: Translation, Grammar, and Composition.

B.—Sinhalese: Ummagga Jataka and Guttilla. Grammar. Composition.

C.—Tamil: Panchatantra, Nayadatam (verse), and Ilakkanachchurukkam. Composition.

N.B.—Only one of A, B, or C can be taken.

No further information will be given concerning this syllabus.



## SINHALESE CLASS (MEN).

The students in this Department will be trained for masterships in Government Sinhalese schools.

Twenty studentships will be open for competition to selected monitors in Government schools who have passed their third-year examination in 1912 or before that year.

Selected students will receive free board and lodging at the College during the session, text books will be provided, and free passes on the railway will be issued for use during the vacations. The period of training will extend over two years, and at the end of this period those who pass the Final Examination will receive certificates of the second or third class in accordance with the record of their work in the College and their performance at the Final Examination.

Certificates of the first class will be issued only to trained teachers in the service of the Department who hold second class certificates after an uninterrupted service of ten years as head teacher in a school of the class corresponding to the certificate, provided that their conduct and efficiency be approved by the Director. For scale of payments see clause 8 of the Departmental Code.

The following will be the subjects for the Entrance Examination :—

Sinhalese Literature : Ummaga Jataka and Guttila. Grammar.  
Composition and Dictation.  
Arithmetic.  
Reading aloud from an unseen passage.  
History of Ceylon.  
Geography of Europe and Asia, Ceylon in detail.

N.B.—No further particulars will be given concerning the subjects of this examination.

The Entrance Examination will be held at the Training College on November 3, 4, and 5, 1913, commencing at 10.30 A.M. In order to gain admission to this examination, intending candidates must apply to the Principal of the Training College during the month of September for an admission form. These forms must be returned on or before October 16. Candidates will then be informed whether they have been selected to appear at the examination.

## VITAL STATISTICS.

### Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended May 24, 1913.

**Births.**—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 114 (1 European, 9 Burghers, 70 Sinhalese, 11 Tamils, 18 Moors, 5 Malays, and 0 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on January 1, 1913, viz., 229,776) was 25·9, as in the preceding week, against 26·0 in the corresponding week of last year, and 23·0 the weekly average for last year.

**Deaths.**—The total deaths registered were 118 (2 Europeans, 6 Burghers, 63 Sinhalese, 23 Tamils, 20 Moors, 2 Malays, and 2 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 26·8, as against 26·3 in the previous week, 35·6 in the corresponding week of last year, and 29·5 the weekly average of last year.

**Infantile Deaths.**—Of the 118 total deaths, 26 were of infants under one year of age, as against 27 in the preceding week, 40 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 30 the average of last year.

**Stillbirths.**—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 6.

**Selected Causes of Death.**—Sixteen deaths were registered from *Phthisis* (against 13 in the previous week and 14 the weekly average for last year), of which 6 were in Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), 2 each in New Bazaar and Maradana hospitals, and 1 each in Pettah, San Sebastian, St. Paul's, Kotahena, Slave Island, and Kollupitiya.

2. Thirteen deaths were registered from *Pneumonia* (against 12 in the previous week and 17 the weekly average for last year), of which 4 were in Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), 3 in Maradana hospitals, 2 each in New Bazaar and Slave Island, and 1 each in Pettah and Kotahena. Six deaths were registered from *Bronchitis*.

3. Three deaths were registered from *Enteric Fever* (against 6 in the previous week and 5 the weekly average for last year), of which 1 each was in Maradana hospitals, Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), and Wellawatta. There were 8 cases reported during the week, against 12 in the previous week.

4. Twelve deaths were registered from *Infantile Convulsions*, 10 from *Debility* (8 infants), 8 each from *Enteritis* (2 infants) and *Senility*, 3 each from *Dysentery*, *Worms*, *Paralysis*, and *Puerperal Fever*, 2 from *Diarrhoea* (1 infant), 1 from an *Injury to the Foot*, and 27 from *Other Causes*.

5. Seventeen cases of *Measles* were reported, against 22 in the previous week; and 10 of *Chickenpox*, against 14 in the previous week.

**State of the Weather.**—The mean temperature of air was 81·6°, against 82·9° in the preceding week and 83·5° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29·795 in., against 29·836 in. in the preceding week and 29·820 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 1·59 in., against 0·80 in. in the preceding week and 5·26 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.
