### VITAL STATISTICS OF TOWNS IN CEYLON IN THE MONTH OF MAY, 1913.

#### REPORT OF THE REGISTRAR-GENERAL.

THIS report deals with the Vital Statistics of the 31 principal towns in the Island proclaimed under sections 31–36 of the Ordinance No. 1 of 1895.

##### Births.

2. The births registered in the 31 towns during the month numbered 1,334 (701 males and 633 females), and were equal to an annual rate of 28·82 per 1,000, against 30·99 during the preceding month, 27·91 in the corresponding month of last year, and 29·29 the monthly average for the sixty-six months, July, 1907, to December, 1912. Of the towns (excluding Vavuniya and Lunugala, which have a population under 1,000), the highest birth-rate was in Negombo (51·32, average 35·96), and the lowest in Nuwara Eliya (9·52, average 15·80).

3. In the city of Colombo\* the births numbered 493 (269 males and 224 females), and were equal to an annual rate† of 24·62 per 1,000, against 24·36 in the preceding month, 23·05 in the corresponding month of last year, and 24·95 the monthly average. Of the wards (omitting Fort and Galle Face and the Pettah, which contain a mainly floating population), the highest birth-rate was in Wellawatta (35·07, average 31·81), and the lowest in Kollupitiya (11·84, average 16·36).

##### Deaths.

4. The deaths registered in the 31 towns during the month numbered 1,417 (786 males and 631 females), and were equal to an annual rate of 27·86 per 1,000, against 29·86 in the preceding month, 28·39 in the corresponding month of last year, and 30·59 the monthly average. Of the towns (excluding Vavuniya and Lunugala), the highest death-rate was, as in the two previous months, in Mannar (53·32, average 42·44), and the lowest in Weligama (8·31, average 14·40).

5. In the city of Colombo\* the deaths registered numbered 513 (295 males and 218 females), and were equal to an annual rate† of 26·25 per 1,000, against 24·43 in the preceding month, 30·01 in the corresponding month of last year, and 31·88 the monthly average. Omitting Fort and Galle Face Ward and the Pettah Ward: the lowest death-rate was, as usual, in Kollupitiya (9·39, average 18·06), and the highest, as in the previous month, in New Bazaar (23·92, average 28·24).

6. The number of stillbirths registered in the 31 towns during the month numbered 76 (46 males and 30 females), against 77 in the preceding month.

##### Infantile Mortality.

7. The infantile mortality of the 31 towns was equal to a rate of 283 per 1,000 births registered, against 262 in the preceding month, 240 in the corresponding month of last year, and 258 the monthly average. In the towns having an estimated population of 5,000 or more, the infantile mortality ranged from 474 in Batticaloa (average 354), 400 in Trincomalee (average 278), 365 in Jaffna (average 271), to 143 in Chilaw (average 199), 130 in Weligama (average 104), and 83 in Anuradhapura (average 435).

8. The infantile mortality in the city of Colombo was 329 per 1,000 births registered, against 311 in the preceding month, 340 in the corresponding month of last year, and 315 the monthly average, and ranged from 535 in New Bazaar (average 402), to 292 in Kotahena (average 319).

##### Causes of Death.

9. *Infants.*—Out of the 1,417 deaths at all ages in the 31 towns, 301 were among infants under one year. Of these, the chief causes were 109 *Convulsions* (45 in Colombo, 12 in Galle, 5 each in Moratuwa, Kalutara, Nawalapitiya, and Batticaloa); 64 *Debility* (27 in Colombo, 11 in Jaffna, 6 each in Negombo and Kandy); 21 *Bronchitis* (12 in Colombo, 8 in Jaffna); 19 *Premature Birth* (5 in Jaffna, 4 in Colombo, 3 each in Kandy and Trincomalee); 18 *Pneumonia* (7 in Colombo, 5 in Moratuwa); 15 *Diarrhoea* (5 each in Colombo and Negombo); 15 *Enteritis* (12 in Colombo); 12 *Tetanus* (5 in Jaffna, 4 in Colombo).

10. In the city of Colombo, out of the 513 deaths from all causes at all ages, 129 were among infants under one year. Of these, the chief causes were 45 *Convulsions* (13 in Maradana, exclusive of hospitals, 8 in New Bazaar, 7 in Slave Island, 5 in St. Paul's); 27 *Debility* (9 in Kotahena, 4 in San Sebastian, 3 each in New Bazaar, Slave Island, and Wellawatta); 12 *Bronchitis* (3 each in St. Paul's, New Bazaar, and Maradana, exclusive of hospitals); 12 *Enteritis* (4 in Kollupitiya, 2 each in New Bazaar, Maradana hospitals, and Wellawatta); 7 *Pneumonia* (2 each in New Bazaar and Maradana, exclusive of hospitals); 5 *Diarrhoea* (2 in Maradana, exclusive of hospitals); 4 *Premature Birth* (1 each in Maradana hospitals, Maradana, exclusive of hospitals, Slave Island, and Wellawatta); 4 *Tetanus* (in Kotahena).

\* Consequent on the extension of the Municipal limits of the Colombo town on November 9, 1911, by the addition of Wellawatta, the limits of the registration division of Kollupitiya Ward were altered with effect from January 1, 1912, by Proclamation of December 18, 1911.

† The city-rate is worked out differently from the ward-rates, and takes into account hospital events, &c., not assignable to wards.

11. *General Mortality (One Year and over).*—Out of the 1,116 deaths of persons one year and over in age in the 31 towns, there were 115 from *Phthisis* (60 in Colombo, 16 in Galle, 10 in Kandy, 7 each in Kalutara and Jaffna); 112 from *Pneumonia* (46 in Colombo, 11 in Kandy, 10 in Jaffna, 5 each in Galle and Kurunegala); 83 from *Diarrhoea* 15 in Ratnapura, 8 in Jaffna, 7 in Hatton and Dikoya, 6 each in Kandy and Matale); 67 from *Dysentery* (8 each in Colombo and Jaffna, 7 in Badulla, 6 each in Trincomalee and Lunugala); 54 from *Anchylostomiasis* or *Dochmias Duodenalis* (9 each in Colombo and Galle, 7 Badulla, 6 in Kandy, 5 in Matale); 53 from *Enteritis* (33 in Colombo, 8 in Badulla, 4 in Lunugala); 50 from *Malarial Cachexia* (8 in Ratnapura, 6 in Batticaloa, 5 in Jaffna); 41 from *Enteric Fever* (21 in Colombo, 8 in Moratuwa, 4 in Kalutara); 40 from *Malaria* (13 in Jaffna, 5 each in Colombo and Trincomalee); 30 from *Bronchitis* (21 in Colombo, 4 in Puttalam); 27 from *Convulsions* (8 in Colombo, 6 in Trincomalee); 27 from *Accidents or Negligence* (7 in Colombo, 4 in Kalutara); 26 from *Puerperal Septicæmia* (7 in Colombo, 4 in Jaffna, 3 each in Moratuwa and Mannar); 16 from *Bright's Disease* and *Nephritis* (9 in Colombo).

12. The highest mortality in the city of Colombo was from *Phthisis* (nearly 16 per cent. of all deaths one year and over), followed by *Pneumonia* (nearly 12 per cent.), *Enteritis* (nearly 9 per cent.), *Enteric Fever* and *Bronchitis* (each nearly 6 per cent.). Out of the 115 deaths from *Phthisis* in all towns, 60 occurred in Colombo. *Phthisis* and *Pneumonia* were together responsible for 113 deaths at all ages in the city, or nearly 22 per cent. of the deaths from all causes.

13. Taking all the towns together, *Bronchitis* and *Pneumonia* contributed the highest mortality (nearly 13 per cent.), followed by *Diarrhoea* and *Dysentery* (nearly 12 per cent.), *Infantile Convulsions* (nearly 9 per cent.). *Phthisis* (nearly 8 per cent.), *Debility* (nearly 6 per cent.), and *Enteritis* (nearly 5 per cent.).

14. *Infectious Diseases reported.*—The most prevalent infectious disease during the month was *Chickenpox*, of which 118 cases of illness were reported (51 in Colombo, 14 each in Nuwara Eliya and Galle, 13 in Weligama, 6 in Trincomalee), followed by *Measles* 101 (85 in Colombo, 8 in Galle, 6 in Kandy, 2 in Matale), *Phthisis* 82 (79 in Colombo, 2 in Matale, 1 in Matara), *Enteric Fever* 54 (41 in Colombo, 6 in Moratuwa, 3 in Galle), *Continued Fever* 22 (10 in Panadure, 5 in Colombo, 3 each in Kalutara and Galle), *Mumps* 14 (in Colombo), *Dysentery* 5 (in Galle), *Acute Diarrhoea* 2 (in Panadure), and *Diphtheria* 2 (in Colombo).

#### Meteorology.

15. *Rainfall.*—Ratnapura records the highest rainfall (20·63 inches), followed by Galle (10·39 inches). The next highest (10·23 inches and 9·95 inches) were in Matara and Kalutara, while in the other towns the rainfall ranged from 7·70 inches in Gampola to 0·06 inches in Anuradhapura.

16. *Temperature.*—The mean temperature varied from 61·4° in Nuwara Eliya to 87·2° in Trincomalee, and was 82·0° in Colombo and 79·1° in Kandy.
