By His Excellency REGINALD EDWARD STUBBS, Esquire, Officer Administering the Government of the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

## R. E. STUBBS.

HEREAS certain by-laws were made by the District School Committee of Kegalla, in pursuance of section 19 of "The Rural Schools Ordinance, 1907," and, having been duly confirmed under sub-section (2) of section 20 of the said Ordinance, were published in the Government Gazette dated May 28, 1909, by Proclamation dated May 22. 1909; and whereas the said District School Committee has revoked the said by-laws and made other by-laws in . lieu thereof:

Now know Ye that We, the Officer Administering the Government of Ceylon, in exercise of the powers vested in Us by sub-section (2) of section 20 of the said Ordinance, and with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby confirm the revocation of the by-laws published by the said Proclamation of May 22, 1909; and We do also, with the like advice, confirm the by-laws made by the said District School Committee as set forth in the schedule hereto.

Given at Tangalla, in the said Island of Ceylon, this Twelfth day of September, in the year of our Lord One thousand Nine hundred and Thirteen.

#### SCHEDULE.

By-laws made under Seations 19 and 20 of "The Rural Schools Ordinance, 1907," for the School District of Kegalla by the Kegalla District School Committee.

1. In these by-laws—

The terms "boy," "girl," and "child" mean a boy, or a girl, or a child residing in the school district of Kegalla.

The term "parent" includes a guardian and any person who has the actual custody of the child.

The term "Code" means the Code for Aided Schools for the time being sanctioned by His Excellency the Governor in Executive Council.

The term "attendance" means an attendance for the period defined by the Code as constituting a full attendance recorded in an Attendance Register in the manner prescribed by the Code.

The term "school" means a school specified in the schedule hereto.

The terms "adequate and suitable provision for the education of a child" and "reasonable excuse" bear the meaning defined in sub-section 20 (1) (b) of "The Rural Schools Ordinance, 1907."

The terms "Inspector of Schools" means an Inspector of Schools appointed by His Excellency the Governor.

- 2. The parent of every child of not less than 6 nor more than 12 years of age shall cause such child to attend one of the schools specified in the schedule hereto, unless he has made other adequate and suitable provision for the education of such child, or unless there is a reasonable excuse for non-attendance; provided that no boy shall be compelled to attend school from a distance exceeding three miles, and that no girl be required to attend from a distance exceeding one and a half miles or to attend a school in which a female teacher is not employed, and that girls may be exempted if special circumstances make their presence at home necessary.
- 3. The time during which every child shall attend school shall be the whole time for which the school shall be open for the instruction of children of similar age.

4. Nothing in these by-laws-

- (a) Shall prevent the presence of children being excused during the hours when religious instruction is given, as provided by section 21 (d) of "The Rural Schools Ordinance, 1907."
- (b) Shall require any child to attend school on any day exclusively set apart for religious observance by the religious body to which the child's parent belongs.
- 5. When a child between 10 and 12 years of age, being beneficially employed to the satisfaction of the Chairman of the Village Committee, has received a certificate from an Inspector of Schools that he or she has passed in reading, writing, and arithmetic, the fourth standard prescribed by the Code for the time being, such child shall not be required to attend school.
- 6. Every parent who shall not observe or shall neglect or violate these by-laws or any of them shall upon conviction be liable to a penalty not exceeding Rs. 20 for each offence, and an additional fine not exceeding Rs. 2 per day in the case of a continuing offence.

Note.—The following are the portions of the Rural Schools Ordinance referred to in sections 1 and 4 of these by-laws:—

Sub-section 20 (1) (b)—A parent shall be deemed to have made adequate and suitable provision for the education of his child, if he proves that his child is in regular attendance at a school registered by the Director of Public Instruction for the receipt of a grant in aid, or at a school with regard to which an application for a grant in aid is under consideration, or at a school certified by the Director of Public Instruction to provide adequate and suitable instruction; or if he proves that he has made such other provision for his child's education as the Director of Public Instruction shall certify to be adequate and suitable, or if he produces a certificate from the Director of Public Instruction recommending that the child shall be exempted from compulsory attendance. Provided that no parent shall be convicted for not causing his child to attend such school, if he proves to the satisfaction of the President that he has reasonable excuse for not causing such child to attend a parent shall be deemed to have a reasonable excuse for not causing his child to attend school, if he proves that the child is prevented from attending by sickness or other unavoidable cause.

Section 21.—No school in which religious instruction is given shall be considered a public vernacular school, unless the District Committee is satisfied—

- (a) That religious instruction is given only during the time specified in the school time table;
- (b) That religious instruction is not given to pupils of other denominations than that to which the school belongs if the parents object;

(c) That pupils who do not attend religious instruction are employed in other studies during the hours allotted to religious instruction;

- d) That 'uch pupils if their parents object to their being present in the room where religious instruction is given are either allowed to study in some other part of the school premises during the hours when such instruction is given, or their presence in the school during such hour is excused; and
- (e) That a copy of this section in the English, Sinhalese, and Tamil languages is conspicuously posted up in the school.

The above by-laws were made by the Kegalla District School Committee at a meeeting held on March 29, 1913.

## GOVERNMENT NOTIFICATIONS.

"THE BUDDHIST TEMPORALITIES ORDINANCE, 1905."

THE following rules made by the District Committee of Matara, in exercise of the power vested in them by section 12 of the Buddhist Temporalities Ordinance, No. 8 of 1905, having been approved by His Excellency the Officer Administering the Government and the Executive Council, are, in pursuance of section 13 of the said Ordinance hereby published for general information.

Rules framed by the Matara District Committee in terms of the 12th Section of the Buddhist Temporalities Ordinance, No. 8 of 1905.

- 1. Three members of the District Committee shall form a quorum, except at the election of trustees under section 17 of Ordinance, when the President and the District Committee member of the district in which the temple is situate shall form the quorum.
- 2. The District Committee meetings shall be held on the first Sunday of the months of January, April, July, and October, either at the residence of the President or at such place to be fixed by the President, of which place at least seven days' notice shall be given to the members.
- 3. In the absence of the President at any meetings one of the members present shall be elected as the President for the occasion.
- 4. The President shall have the power to convene a special meeting by giving not less than fourteen days' notice. Such notice shall specify the object of the proposed meeting. The President shall also call a special meeting on the written requisition of two members stating the special object thereof.
- 5. Minute of the meetings of the District Committee shall be duly recorded and confirmed or otherwise dealt with after they have been read at the subsequent sitting, and they shall be signed by the President.
- 6. The Committee shall have a clerk and a messenger, whose pay shall be determined hereafter.
- 7. The trustees shall furnish the District Committee by January 15 and July 15 of each year with copies of the half-yearly accounts they have to forward to the District Court in terms of section 22 of the Ordinance.
- 8. If any trustee of a temple to whom due notice in writing with a certified copy of the charge or charges preferred against him has been given fail without showing sufficient cause to answer such charge or charges, the inquiry shall be proceeded with in his absence. Any such trustee feeling aggrieved by such ex parte decision shall be entitled to ask for a re-hearing, provided he shall show sufficient cause for his default of appearance at the inquiry.
- 9. In the event of the property of a temple or vihare being given in charge of the trustee thereof, it shall be the duty of the member of the District Committee to give charge of the same in the presence of two witnesses and the incumbent of the temple. The member shall be bound to fill up the three forms (Form A hereto annexed), one of which shall be delivered to the incumbent of the temple, one to the trustee, and the other to the Committee, and it shall be the duty of the trustee to deliver to the incumbent such property as may be required by him for the use of the temple and obtain two receipts from him, one of which shall be retained by the trustee, and the other shall be forwarded by him to the Committee.
- 10. Every trustee shall, on or before February 28, pay to the District Committee member of the district in which such temple or vihare is situated on account of the temple of which he is trustee as a contribution towards the expenses of carrying out the provisions of the Ordinance a sum calculated at the rate of 5 per cent. from the annual income of the temple, and the District Committee member shall forward same to the President before March 31.
- 11. The President shall deposit the moneys thus received in a bank and spend the same as directed by the Committee, keeping an account thereof, which shall be laid before each Committee meeting.
- 12. The sanction of the District Committee shall be obtained prior to removal of buildings or trees or the construction and repair of buildings or temple property.

### EXAMINATIONS FOR THE CIVIL SERVICE OF INDIA.

An open competitive examination for admission to the Civil Service of India will be held in London, under the subjoined regulations, commencing on August 1, 1914.

The number of persons to be selected at this examination will be announced hereafter.

No person will be admitted to compete from whom the Secretary, Civil Service Commission, has not received on or before June 1, 1914, an application on the prescribed form, a copy of which is sent herewith. No allegation that an application form or a letter respecting such form has been lost or delayed in the post will be considered by the Commissioners, unless the person making such allegation produces a Post Office certificate of posting. Candidates who delay their applications until the last days will do so at their own risk.

Acknowledgments of such application forms are sent, and any candidate who has filled up and returned the printed application form but has not received an acknowledgment of it within four complete days should at once write to the Secretary, Civil Service Commission, Burlington Gardens, London, W. Failure to comply with this provision will deprive

the candidate of any claim to consideration.

The order for admission to the examination will be posted early in July, 1914, to the address given on the form of application. It will contain instructions as to the time and place at which candidates will be required to attend, and as to the manner in which the fee (£6) is to be paid.

#### REGULATIONS.

- $**_*$  The following regulations, made by the Secretary of State for India in Council, are liable to alteration from year to year:—
- 1. An examination for admission to the Civil Service of India, open to all qualified persons, will be held in London in August of each year for such number of appointments to that Service as the Secretary of State may on each occasion determine. The date of the examination and the number of appointments to be made for each Province will be announced beforehand by the Civil Service Commissioners.
  - 2. No person will be deemed qualified who shall not satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners—

(i.) That he is a natural-born subject of His Majesty.

- (ii.) That he had attained the age of twenty-two, and had not attained the age of twenty-four, on the first day of August of the year in which the examination is held.
- [N.B.—In the case of Natives of India it will be necessary for a candidate to obtain a certificate of age and nationality issued under Notification of the Government of India, No. 2,252, dated August 21, 1888, as amended by Notification No. 404, dated May 19, 1898, and signed, should he be a resident in British India, by the Secretary to Government of the Province, or the Commissioner of the Division within which his family resides, or should he reside in a Native State, by the highest Political Officer accredited to the State in which his family resides.]
- (iii.) That he has no disease, constitutional affection, or bodily infirmity, unfitting him or likely to unfit him for the Civil Service of India.\*

(iv.) That he is of good moral character.

- 3. No person who, in a previous year, accepted the offer of a nomination as a selected candidate for the Civil Service of India and subsequently resigned his position as a selected candidate will be admitted to the examination.
- 4. Should the evidence upon the above points be prima facie satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners, the candidate, on payment of the prescribed fee, will be admitted to the examination. The Commissioners may, however, in their discretion, at any time prior to the grant of the certificate of qualification hereinafter referred to, institute such further inquiries as they may deem necessary; and if the result of such inquiries in the case of any candidate should be unsatisfactory to them in any of the above respects, he will be ineligible for admission to the Civil Service of India, and, if already selected, will be removed from the position of a Probationer.

From the marks assigned to candidates in each subject such deduction will be made as the Civil Service Commissioners

may deem necessary, in order to secure that no credit be allowed for merely superficial knowledge.

Consistently with the limitations specified above, candidates are at liberty to name any of the foregoing subjects, provided that the maximum number of marks that can be obtained from the subjects chosen is limited to 6,000. If this maximum is exceeded by a candidate's selection, he will be required to indicate one of his subjects, the marks for which should, in his case, be reduced so as to bring his maximum marks within the prescribed limit. The marks so reduced will be subject to a correspondingly reduced deduction.

Moreover, if a candidate's handwriting is not easily legible a further deduction will, on that account, be made from

the total marks otherwise accruing to him.\*

6. A list of the competitors shall be made out in order of their proficiency as disclosed by the aggregate marks finally awarded to each competitor, and in that order so many competitors, up to the determined number of appointments, as are found by the Civil Service Commissioners to be qualified by examination, shall be designated to be selected candidates fo the Civil Service of India, provided that they appear to be duly qualified in other respects. Should any selected candidate become disqualified, the Secretary of State for India will determine whether the vacancy thus created shall be filled or not. In the former case the candidate next in order of merit, and in other respects duly qualified, shall be deemed to be a selected candidate.

7. Selected candidates, before proceeding to India, will be on probation for one year, at the end of which time they will undergo an examination, called the final examination, in the following compulsory subjects: —

In Hindustani the candidate will be required to be acquainted with both the Persian and the Nagari character.

No candidate who offered Sanskrit or Arabic at the open competition may offer the same language at the Final Examination; and only candidates assigned to the Province of Burma may offer Hindustani as an optional subject.

9. In the Final Examination, as in the open competition, the merit of the candidates examined will be estimated by marks (which will be subject to deductions in the same way as the marks assigned at the pen competition), and the The number set opposite to each subject denotes the greatest number of marks that can be obtained in respect of it. examination will be conducted on paper and viva voce, as may be deemed necessary.

If any candidate is prevented by sickness or any other adequate cause from attending such examination, the Commissioners may, with the concurrence of the Secretary of State for India in Council, allow him to appear at the Final

Examination to be held in the following year, or at a special examination.

10. The selected candidates will also be tested during their probation as to their proficiency in riding. The Examinations in Riding will be held as follows:

(1) Shortly after the result of the open competitive examination has been declared, or at such time or times

as the Commissioners may appoint during the course of the probationary year.

(2) Again, at the time of the final examination. Candidates who may then fully satisfy the Commissioners of their ability to ride well and to perform journeys on horseback will be awarded from 100 to 200 marks, according to the degree of proficiency displayed, to be added to their marks in the final examination. Candidates who fail to obtain 100 marks, but are reported by the Civil Service Commissioners to have reached a minimum standard of proficiency in riding, and are certified by the said Commissioners to be entitled to be appointed to the Civil Service of India, will, on their arrival in India, be subjected to such further tests in riding as may be prescribed by their Government, and shall receive no increase to their

initial salary until they have passed such tests to the satisfaction of that Government.

A candidate who fails at the end of the year of probation to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners that he has reached the minimum standard of proficiency in riding will be liable to have his name removed from

the list of selected candidates.

The selected candidates who, on examination, shall be found to have a competent knowledge of the subjects specified in Regulation 7, and who shall have satisfied the Civil Service Commissioners of their eligibility in respect of nationality, age, health, character, conduct during the period of probation, and ability to ride, shall be certified by the said Commissioners to be entitled to be appointed to the Civil Service of India, provided they shall comply with the

regulations in force at the time for that service.

12. Persons desrious to be admitted as candidates must apply on forms, which may be obtained from "The Secretary to the Civil Service Commissioners, London," at any time after December 1, in the year previous to that in which the examination is to be held. No person will be admitted to the examination from whom the Secretary to the Civil Service Commissioners has not received on or before June 1 (or, if that date should fall on a Sunday or public holiday, then, on or before the first day thereafter on which their office is open), in the year in which the examination is to be held, an application, in the handwriting of the candidate, on the prescribed form.

The Civil Service Commissioners are authorized by the Secretary of State for India in Council to make the following announcements:

(i.) Selected candidates will be allotted to the various Provinces upon a consideration of all the circumstances, including their own wishes; but the requirements of the Public Service will rank before every other consideration.

• (ii.) An allowance amounting to £150 will be given to any candidate who passes his probation at one of the Universities or Colleges which have been approved by the Secretary of State, viz., the Universities of Oxford, Cambridge, Dublin, Glasgow, Edinburgh, St. Andrews, Aberdeen, and London (University College); Victoria University, Manchester.

This allowance will be paid to the selected candidate in four instalments on the following dates respectively:—December 24, after his selection, March 25, June 24, and the date of his signing his covenant on being finally appointed to the Service.

With the final instalment an allowance on account of passage to India will be paid to each newly appointed Civilian to the amount of £37. 10s. 0d. for passage to Calcutta, Madras, or Bombay, and £43 for passage to Rangoon, the officer

then making his own arrangements for his passage.

The payment of each of the first three instalments will be conditional on the receipt, by the Secretary of State, through the Civil Service Commissioners, of a certificate that the candidate has fulfilled up to date the requirements of the authorities, and shown satisfactory conduct at the Authorized University or College; the fourth and final instalment will be paid as soon as the selected candidate has signed his covenant, and for its payment no certificate from College Authorities will be required.

The whole probation must ordinarily be passed at the same institution. Migration will not be permitted, except

for special reasons approved by the Secretary of State.

- (iii.) Each candidate will be required before receiving the first instalment of his allowance to execute an agreement binding himself and one surety, jointly and severally, to refund all moneys he may have received from the Secretary of State for India in the event of-
  - (1) His failure to pass the final examination within the time prescribed by the regulations, and to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners of his fitness for admission to the Civil Service of India; or
  - (2) His subsequent failure to execute the usual covenant, and to proceed to India, as and when he shall be directed by the Secretary of State for India.
- (iv.) All candidates obtaining certificates will be also required to enter into covenants, by which, amongst other things, they will bind themselves to make such payments as under the rules and regulations for the time being in force, they may be required to make towards their own pensions or for the pensions of their families. The stamps payable on these covenants amount to £1.
- (v.) The seniority in the Civil Service of India of the candidates obtaining certificates will be determined according to the order in which they stand on the list resulting from the combined marks of the open competitive and final examinations.
- (vi.) Candidates obtaining certificates will be required to report their arrival in India within such period after the grant of their certificates of qualification as the Secretary of State may in each case direct.
- (vii.) Candidates who fail to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners at the final examination held in any year will be definitely rejected, and will not be allowed to present themselves for re-examination, unless it shall appear to the Secretary of State in Council, after reference to the Civil Service Commissioners, that such failure is due to circumstances wholly exceptional and beyond the control of the candidate.

The Commissioners have been requested by the Secretary of State for India to draw the attention of selected candidates to the prefatory note attached to this manual, as it is considered important that it should be clearly understood that this compilation is not to be regarded in any other light than that of a collection, made for facility of reference, of certain information and rules, that it is by no means exhaustive, and that it is liable to such modifications as may from

time to time be sanctioned by competent authority.

#### NOTE.

If open competitive examinations for the following services, viz.:-

Eastern Cadetships in the Colonial Service; Clerkships (Class I.) in the Home Civil Service;

should be held in 1914 concurrently with the Open Competitive Examination for the Civil Service of India, candidates duly eligible in respect of age will be admitted to compete for any two or all three of these Services, subject to the following conditions:

(I) They must send to the Secretary, Civil Service Commission, within the time appointed, an application on the form prescribed for each of the respective services.\*

(2) Every successful candidate who may have been admitted to compete for either the India or the Colonial Service (or both), as well as for the Home Service, will be called upon to declare, immediately after the announcement of the result of the competitions, whether he prefers his name to remain on the list of candidates for the India or Colonial Service or on the list of candidates for clerkships in the Home Civil Service.

The name of any candidate who fails to declare his choice when called upon to do so will be removed from the list

of candidates for clerkships in the Home Civil Service.

(3) Every successful candidate who may have been admitted to compete for both the India and Colonial Services will be called upon to declare, immediately after the announcement of the result of the competitions, whether he prefers his name to remain on the list of candidates for the Civil Service of India or on the list of candidates for Eastern Cadetships in the Colonial Service.

The name of any candidate who fails to declare his choice when called upon to do so will be removed from the list of candidates for Eastern Cadetships.

(4) All declarations of choice are irrevocable.

(5) Candidates for all three or any two of the above-mentioned services will be required to pay a consolidated fee of £6.

Syllabus of any Open Competitive Examination for the Civil Service of India, Clerkships (Class I.) in the Home Civil Service, and Eastern Cadetships in the Colonial Service that may be held in the Year 1914, and of any other Competition that may be held in combination therewith.

In view of the importance of legible handwriting in the Public Service, candidates are warned that the provision as to deductions for bad handwriting in these competitions will be strictly enforced.

Candidates are warned that full marks cannot be obtained on any paper unless the whole of it is answered, or, in where the number of questions to be answered is specified, unless the full number specified is answered.

English Composition.—An Essay to be written on one of several specified subjects.

Sanskrit Language and Literature.—Translation from Sanskrit; Composition in Sanskrit; Sanskrit Literature, including the life, thought, and antiquities of Ancient India, together with such knowledge of history as bears upon the subject; questions on the Sanskrit Language (including questions on Philology).

Composition will be required in Classical Sanskrit alone; elsewhere Vedic Sanskrit is also included.

Candidates are expected to make a special study of the Seventh Mandala of the Rig-veda, but other Vedic hymns may also be set in the examination.

Arabic Language and Literature.—Translation from Arabic; Set Composition and Free Composition in Arabic; Arabic Literature, including the life and thought of the Arabs as shown in the literature, together with such knowledge of history as bears upon the subject; questions on the Arabic Language (including questions on Philology).

Greek Literature.—Questions on the Greek Language (including questions on Philology), Literature, and Antiquities. Latin Literature. Questions on the Latin Language (including questions on Philology) and on Roman Literature

English Language and Literature.—The examination will be in two parts. In the one candidates will be expected to show a general acquaintance with the course of English Literature, as represented in the chief writers in verse and prose, between the reign of Edward III. and the death of Queen Victoria.

A minute and detailed knowledge will not be looked for in this part of the examination. But its aim will be to test how far the candidates have studied at first hand the chief productions of the greatest English writers, and are acquainted with the leading characteristics of their thought and style, and with the place which each of them occupies in the history of English Literature.

The other part of the examination will relate to one of the following periods, which will follow each other year by year in rotation:

Period I.: 1360 to 1600, Chaucer to Spenser. Period II.: 1600 to 1660, the later Elizabethans.

Period III.: 1660 to 1744, the age of Dryden and Pope.

Period IV.: 1744 to 1800, from the death of Pope to Cowper.
Period V.: 1800 to 1832, Nineteenth Century writers to the death of Scott. Period VI.: 1832 to 1892, from the death of Scott to the death of Tennyson.

<sup>\*</sup> Candidates who may desire to enter the competitions for the Home and Colonial Services should apply about Easter next to the Secretary, Civil Service Commission, London, W., for the prescribed Forms of Application. The forms must reach the Secretary on or before June 1.

The examination in this part will require from the candidates a more minute acquaintance with the history of the English Language and Literature, as illustrated in the chief works produced in each period, and will be based to a considerable extent, but by no means exclusively, on certain books specified each year by the Commissioners. The names and other indications placed beside the dates are intended to suggest the general character of the literary development of the period, and, consequently, the natural limits of the examination. All the works of Shakespeare and Milton, for example, will be regarded as falling within the period 1600 to 1660; all the works of Wordsworth and Coleridge within the period 1800 to 1832; all the works of Carlyle, Landor, and Macaulay within the period 1832 to 1892.

## VITAL STATISTICS.

## Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended September 13, 1913.

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 99 (I European, 16 Burghers, 40 Sinhalese, 12 Tamils, 18 Moors, 6 Malays, and 6 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on July 1, 1913, viz., 235,829) was 21.9, as against 23.9 in the preceding week, 20.7 in the corresponding week of last year, and 23.0 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 127 (2 Europeans, 8 Burghers, 56 Sinhalese, 35 Tamils, 18 Moors, 3 Malays, and 5 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 28·1, as against 24·8 in the previous week, 29·0 in the corresponding week of last year, and 29·5 the weekly average of last year.

Infantile Deaths. -Of the 127 total deaths, 30 were of infants under one year of age, as against 22 in the preceding week, 20 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 30 the average of last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 6.

Selected Causes of Death.—Fifteen deaths were registered from Phthisis (against 10 in the previous week and 14 the weekly average for last year), of which 4 were in Maradana (exclusive of hospitals), 2 each in New Bazaar, Maradana hospitals, and Wellawatta, and 1 each was in Pettah, San Sebastian, St. Paul's, Kotahena, and Slave Island.

- 2. Eleven deaths we registered from Pneumonia (against 18 in the previous week and 17 the weekly average for last year), of which 4 Slave Island, 3 in Kotahena, 2 in Marandana (exclusive of hospitals), and 1 each was in St. Paul's and New Paul's and
- 3. No death was registered from Enteric Fever (against 2 in the previous week and 5 the weekly average for There were seems reported during the week, against 12 in the previous week, last year).
- 4. Nine deaths were registered from Enteritis (2 infants), 8 from Infantile Convulsions, 7 from Debility (3 infants), 6 each from Sentility and I remature Birth, 5 from Bright's Disease, 4 each from Diarrhea, Dysentery, and Puerperal Septicæmia, 3 from Accidental one due to injury by the Bright's Disease, 4 each from Diarrhea, Dysentery, and the third to fell from a tracker, another to burns, and the third to fall from a tree), 2 from Worms (1 infant), 1 from Tetanus, and 32 from Other Causes.
- 5. One case of Medicles was reported, against 2 in the previous week; and 2 of Chickenpox, against 5 in the previous week.
