### NOTICE TO MARINERS.

COMMANDERS of vessels approaching Colombo Harbour during south-west monsoon or any time with westerly or south-westerly wind are hereby requested to get their vessels to the northward sufficiently to open the northern entrance (say about  $\frac{1}{2}$  or  $\frac{3}{4}$  mile south of Onagalla Buoy) and head in, between east and south-east, bringing wind and sea on starboard quarter. The pilot will then board on *port side* and be enabled to tow his boat alongside, coming in.

In the north-east monsoon vessels should head in similarly "giving a lee" on *starboard side*.

The Cemeteries and Burials Ordinance, No. 9 of 1899.

THE following regulations made by the "proper authority," to wit, the Sanitary Board of the District of Mannar, in pursuance of the powers conferred by sections 18 and 23 of "The Cemeteries and Burials Ordinance, 1899," in respect of the general cemetery at Mannar, are published for public information.

Regulations referred to.

- All applications for graves shall be made to the keeper of the cemetery not less than six hours before the time fixed for burial of a person for whom the grave is wanted.
- No one shall be allowed to dig a grave except the persons employed or approved by the keeper.
- The keeper shall intimate the line to be followed by the funeral party on arriving at the cemetery, and if more than one party come at the same time, the order in which they are respectively to move to the graves.
- Should it be necessary for the purposes of preventing the disturbance of one funeral party by another and not otherwise, the keeper may require that one burial service should be concluded before another is commenced.
- The keeper shall be entitled to keep order within the cemetery, and his commands in that behalf shall be obeyed.
- No grave shall be less than five feet in depth, or at a less distance than four feet from another. No grave shall be reopened within three years, nor vault within six months, from the last interment therein, except upon orders from the proper authority.
- No dead body shall be buried without the permission of the cemetery-keeper, and such permission shall not be granted until all fees due have been paid.
- The following fees shall be paid by applicants for graves at the time of application in respect of the general cemetery only:—

10. The keeper of the cemetery shall send to the Chairman of the Sanitary Board monthly a statement of all moneys recovered by him, together with such recoveries.

"Distributing gear for valveless internal combustion engines."

*Abstract.*—This invention has for its object distributing gear for valveless internal combustion engines, but more particularly for engines in which two or more radially arranged cylinders effect a circular movement around a common shaft. The inventors state:—The present invention has for its object to provide a rotary internal combustion engine in which all the defects hitherto inherent in engines of this kind are avoided. In particular, however, the object of the present invention is to avoid failure of the distributing gear even with long continuous operation owing to the gear ceasing to form a good joint or owing to inadequate lubrication. This object has been attained by a special formation of the distributing gear itself and a special arrangement of this distributing gear on the cylinders of the engine. Both the formation of the distributing gear and the arrangement of the latter on the cylinder of the engine is such that the centrifugal force during the rotary movement of the cylinders tends to apply all the movable parts of the distributing mechanism to their seat, and thereby form a good joint without the employment of special auxiliary means being necessary for this purpose. By the special formation and arrangement of the distributing member, which renders it possible to utilize centrifugal force for the said purpose, all the devices that have hitherto been necessary for forming a good joint for the distributing members such as springs, packing ring stuffing boxes or the like, also their retaining members or devices are dispensed with.

By means of a special automatic supply of the lubricant required for lubricating the movable parts of the distributing member as combustion chamber the operation of the distributing members and the operation of the internal combustion engine itself is rendered certain in every respect.

The claims are:—

1. A valveless internal combustion engine with rotary cylinders, characterized by the fact that a member is arranged in the cylinder of the engine in such a manner that the movable part of this member is applied to its seat by the centrifugal force arising owing to the rotation of the cylinders without the employment of special auxiliary means for this purpose.

2. A valveless internal combustion engine in accordance with claim 1, characterized by the fact that a cylindrical sleeve slit in the longitudinal direction is employed as the distributing member, the sleeve being rotatably mounted in the longitudinal axis of a casing arranged on the open end of the cylinder, whereby the centrifugal force arising during the rotating movement of the cylinders presses the sleeve against the inner wall of the casing in such a manner that a reliable joint between the sleeve and the casing is ensured.

3. A valveless internal combustion engine in accordance with claims 1 and 2, characterized by the fact that the cross section of the cylindrical slide valve is of such a form that the centre of gravity of the two halves of the cylindrical slides valve cross section do not fall in the horizontal plane of the cylindrical slide valve, but as far as possible beyond this plane in order thereby to utilize the centrifugal force in as advantageous a manner as possible for forming a good joint owing to the fact that this force acting on the centre of gravity of the two cross sections each half of the cylindrical slide valve is caused to bear firmly on its entire surface.

4. A valveless internal combustion engine in accordance with claims 1 and 2, characterized by the fact that the two slotted parts on the slit sleeve are located approximately symmetrically to the central axis of the cylinder.

5. A valveless internal combustion engine in accordance with claims 1, 2, and 3, characterized by the fact that the sleeve acting as the distributing member is constructed in such a manner that the material becomes thinner towards the slotted parts.

6. A valveless internal combustion engine in accordance with claims 1 to 5, characterized by the fact that the cavity enclosed by the distributing member simultaneously serves as a combustion chamber, and with this object communicates with the interior of the cylinder.

7. A casing for internal combustion engines of all kinds serving for the reception of the distributing member, characterized by the fact that the bearing member is provided on the inlet for the explosive mixture with intersecting rib-like protuberances.

8. A valveless internal combustion engine in accordance with claims 1 to 7, characterized by an up-pipe which connects the collecting chamber for the lubricating oil arranged in proximity to the axis of rotation of the motor with the casing for the distributing member, and to which the lubricating oil is supplied through the centrifugal force caused by the rotation of the cylinders.

9. A valveless internal combustion engine in accordance with claims 1 to 8, characterized by the fact that the position in the distributing member casing of the discharge aperture of the up-pipe for the lubricating oil is selected in such a manner that the lubricating oil passing from the up-pipe into the casing is distributed by the centrifugal force over the entire surface of the distributing member.

10. A valveless internal combustion engine in accordance with claims 1 to 9, characterized by the fact that the lubricating oil collecting on the walls of the engine casing during running is conducted to the members to be lubricated through the up-pipe.

11. A valveless internal combustion engine in accordance with claims 1 to 10, characterized by the fact that the wall of the engine casing is formed as a guide channel for the lubricating oil to be introduced into the up-pipe.

12. A valveless internal combustion engine in accordance with claims 1 to 11, characterized by the fact that the distributing member is formed as a slide.

13. A valveless internal combustion in accordance with claims 1 to 12, characterized by the fact that the distributing member is made conical.

14. A valveless internal combustion engine in accordance with claims 1 to 13, characterized by the fact that the movable part of the distributing member is provided with one or more longitudinal slots which register with slots arranged on the fixed part of the distributing member.

15. A valveless internal combustion engine in accordance with claims 1 to 14, characterized by a slotted and resilient ring screw threaded on its outer side and adapted to be inserted between the cylinder wall and the engine casing in such a manner that a secure fixing of the cylinder to the engine casing is ensured.

16. A valveless internal combustion engine in accordance with claims 1 to 15, characterized by the fact that for operating the distributing member a cam groove provided on the flat side of the plate and corresponding to the admission, compression, explosion, and exhaust is used, this groove being repeated a number of times corresponding to the ratio between the speed of rotation of the motor and that of the cam plate.

17. An air inlet for internal combustion engines in accordance with claims 1 to 16, characterized by the fact that airsuction surfaces are arranged on the engine with the object of supplying cooling air to the engine.

**Minutes of Proceedings of a General Meeting of the Municipal Council of Colombo held in the Town Hall  
on Friday, June 27, 1913.**

The Council met this day at 3 P.M., pursuant to notice dated June 20, 1913.

*Present* :—Mr. E. B. Alexander, Chairman; Mr. C. P. Dias; Mr. H. A. Jayewardene; Major A. W. de Wilton; Mr. R. S. Templeton; Mr. L. B. Fernando; Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader; Mr. Arthur Alvis; Mr. H. L. de Mel; Mr. E. G. Jayewardene; Dr. David Rockwood; Mr. A. J. Martin; Dr. D. P. Banajee; Dr. E. V. Ratnam; Dr. W. P. Rodrigo; Mr. W. Sutherland Ross; Mr. T. Leese; Dr. G. J. Rutherford; and Mr. T. H. Chapman.

The Chairman, with the leave of the Council, brought forward item No. 5 on the agenda, and moved that the Council do place on record its deep sense of the loss sustained by the death of Mr. L. A. B. Peilo, the late Superintendent of the Fire Brigade, and that the Council's condolences be conveyed by the Chairman to his relatives in their bereavement. Mr. C. P. Dias seconded.—Carried unanimously.

The Chairman, with the leave of the Council, moved that the recommendation of the Standing Committee on Law, Finance, and Municipal Works held on June 18, 1913, with respect to the tenders for supplying uniforms, stationery, materials, tools, &c., coir dust, drugs, and miscellaneous items be adopted. Mr. H. L. de Mel seconded.—Carried.

1. Pursuant to notice the Chairman moved that item No. 1 of the minutes of the General Meeting held on Friday, May 23, 1913, be rescinded, and that the rest of the minutes be confirmed. Major A. W. de Wilton seconded.—Carried.

2. Pursuant to notice the Chairman moved that the minutes of the General Meeting held on Friday, April 25, 1913, be confirmed. Mr. H. A. Jayewardene seconded.—Carried.

3. Pursuant to notice the Chairman moved that the resolution of the Special Meeting held on May 14, 1913, be rescinded. Mr. C. P. Dias seconded.—Carried.

4. Pursuant to notice the Chairman moved that the salary of the Secretary of the Municipal Council be fixed at Rs. 4,000 rising by annual increments of Rs. 500 to Rs. 6,000 and that, when that sum is reached, it be considered whether any further increase is desirable. Dr. David Rockwood seconded.—Carried.

Mr. H. L. de Mel moved, as an amendment, that the following words be added to the Chairman's motion after the word "desirable":—That no person be eligible for appointment to the post of Secretary whose age is over 35 unless he shall already be in Municipal or Government service. Dr. W. P. Rodrigo seconded.

On a show of hands being taken the amendment was declared *lost*.

Mr. E. G. Jayewardene moved as an amendment that the matter be referred to the Finance Committee for report. Dr. W. P. Rodrigo seconded.

On a show of hands being taken the amendment was declared *lost*.

Dr. W. P. Rodrigo then moved as another amendment that the words after "Rs. 6,000" be deleted. Mr. E. G. Jayewardene seconded.

On a show of hands being taken the amendment was declared *lost*.

The Chairman's motion was then put to the meeting and *carried*.

6. Pursuant to notice the Chairman moved that a Special Committee consisting of the Chairman, Mr. C. P. Dias, Mr. E. G. Jayewardene, Dr. David Rockwood, Mr. Arthur Alvis, Mr. T. H. Chapman, and Dr. G. J. Rutherford be appointed to inquire and report to Council :—(1) What funds will be required over and above the loan of Rs. 12,500,000 to complete such further drainage works as are immediately necessary. (2) What expenditure will be incurred by Council :—(a) in making house connections; (b) in building latrines; (c) in constructing tipping depôts. (3) Whether the completion of the immediately necessary drainage works will necessitate a further increase to the water supply of the town, and if so, what such further supply will cost. (4) What other Municipal works are urgently required, and the estimated cost of the same. Mr. H. L. de Mel seconded.—Carried.



The Chairman moved that a Special Committee consisting of the Chairman, Mr. C. P. Dias, Mr. H. L. de Mel, and Dr. E. V. Ratnam be appointed to inquire and report to the Council:—(5) What expenditure will be involved in the introduction of the Town Schools Ordinance. Major A. W. de Wilton seconded.—Carried.

The Chairman moved that a Special Committee consisting of the Chairman, Mr. T. H. Chapman, Dr. G. J. Rutherford, Mr. H. L. de Mel, and Mr. Arthur Alvis be appointed to inquire and report to the Council:—(6) What staff will be required to carry out the full programme of work found to be necessary, what scale should be adopted to meet the salaries of the staff, and what increase of expenditure will thereby be incurred. Mr. H. A. Jayewardene seconded.—Carried.

The Chairman moved that a Special Committee consisting of the members of the four Standing Committees, Mr. T. H. Chapman, and Dr. G. J. Rutherford be appointed to inquire and report to the Council:—(7) What the total cost of the full programme will be, what contribution can be expected from Government, and how it is proposed that the Council can best raise money to meet all its liabilities. Mr. H. A. Jayewardene seconded.—Carried.

7. Pursuant to notice the Chairman moved that the draft amendments of the new Drainage Ordinance which have been printed and circulated be adopted. Mr. C. P. Dias seconded.—Carried.

8. Pursuant to notice, Mr. H. L. de Mel moved that a Special Committee consisting of the members of the four Standing Committees be appointed to inquire into the prospects of the various branches of the Municipal service, to revise the salaries and allowances, to submit a proper incremental scheme and rules and regulations relating to the appointments, salaries, and promotions of Municipal Officers.

By leave of the Council the words "organization and" were inserted in the motion before the word "prospects." Dr. David Rockwood seconded.—Carried.

9. It was resolved to refer the motion which stood in the name of Mr. E. G. Jayewardene regarding the work of the Printing Department to the Special Committee appointed to inquire into the prospects of the various branches of the Municipal Service.

10. Mr. E. G. Jayewardene withdrew the motion which stood in his name regarding the application made by the Secretary of the Borella Catholic Young Men's Society for exclusive use of a piece of ground at Campbell park, and it was agreed to defer the matter until the site has been visited by the Chairman and Mr. E. G. Jayewardene.

11. Mr. E. G. Jayewardene's motion regarding the application made by the Catholic authorities of the Pettah for the exclusive use of a piece of ground at the Racquet Court was also deferred until the site has been visited by the Chairman and Mr. E. G. Jayewardene.

12. Pursuant to notice, Dr. W. P. Rodrigo asked the Chairman whether any roads not vested in the Council and lying outside this city are being repaired and generally kept up by the Council, and if so, will the Chairman be good enough to say what length of Public Works Department and Provincial Road Committee roads, respectively, are so treated and at what respective cost and since what date.

(2) Whether permission to incur this expenditure has been granted by this Council, and if so, how and when.

(3) If such permission has not been granted, will the Chairman be good enough to say who is responsible for this innovation.

The Chairman replied that the Council are not maintaining any roads not vested in the Council, and that Dr. Rodrigo was probably referring to three short lengths of roads leading to the quarries which are outside Municipal limits but they are vested in the Council.

13. To sanction the payment of the following amount on account of the gratuity to Mrs. R. R. Dunuwille and three minor children:—Three months' full pay to widow, Rs. 2,100; three minor children at one month's pay for each child, Rs. 2,100; total, Rs. 4,200.

The Chairman moved that the payment be sanctioned. Mr. Arthur Alvis seconded.—Carried.

(2) Question of licensing the trade in poultry.—The recommendation of the Sanitation Committee is supported.

(4) Pig nuisance—Proposed by-law.—The Chairman is requested to draft a by-law requiring pigs within the Municipal limits to be penned.

(2) Estimate for the proposed tipping depôt at Pickering's road, Rs. 1,966.17.—Recommended after inspection of Price Park depôt.

It shall not be lawful for any one to use any premises as a live poultry mart without an annual license from the Chairman.

(4) Letter No. 755 of April 15, 1913, from the Municipal Bacteriologist applying for an Assistant on Rs. 80 to Rs. 100 per month.—The Committee inspected the laboratory and found it full to overflowing with glass tubes and apparatus of all kinds. The Committee recommend the immediate appointment of an Assistant on Rs. 80 to Rs. 100 per mensem, and that a store room and apparatus room should be added to the laboratory as soon as possible.

(5) Dean's road fish market: Sale of stall rents by tenders from July 1, 1913.—Recommended that sale should be by tender.

- (10) Question of paying half-salary to foreman Danby of the Considere Construction Co., London, during his voyage to Ceylon.—Recommended.

- (12) Alteration of names of owners in assessment registers.—Recommended that applicants wishing to have their names entered as owners on the assessment registers should apply by affidavit and attach to such affidavit a true copy of the transfer in their favour; recommended further that Council should give public notice of this requirement and should add a caution that no one will be registered as owner of a property unless all the rates and taxes on the property have been duly paid.
- (16) Retirement of Cooly Muttusamy. To Sanction the payment of a gratuity of Rs. 112-66.—Recommended.

16. With reference to item No. 4 of the recommendations of the Standing Committee on Finance of June 13, 1913, Mr. H. L. de Mel moved that permission to the Tamil Union Sports Club to erect a pavilion be deferred, and the application be considered with other similar applications. Mr. E. G. Jayewardene seconded.

On a show of hands being taken the amendment was declared carried, 11 voting for it and 8 against.

#### DISSENT.

At a meeting of the Council of June 27, under items No. 16 and 17 on the agenda, the following extracts from minutes of two Standing Committees came up for consideration, viz. :—" Application for a pavilion by the Tamil Union Sports Club."

" Recommended that permission be given on the same terms as granted to the Sinhalese Sports Club."

The above purports to recommend that the Council do permit a portion of land, being a part of Campbell park, to wit : a public park be let to the Tamil Union Sports Club for the purpose of erecting thereon a permanent building from which the public are to be excluded. (The aforesaid minute would seem to imply that Council should grant a pavilion, but this was not the intention or object of the application.)

The following are the conditions under which the Council by a majority decided to let the site and grounds : (a) that the site be approved by the Chairman ; (b) that the plans be similarly approved of ; (c) that the Council shall have power to resume the possession of the site on which the pavilion is erected on three months' notice and without paying any compensation whatever ; (d) that no enclosure be placed round the ground or pavilion.

We are unable to agree to the alienation, letting, or even permissive use of public parks to private parties, and beg to place on record our reasons for dissenting from the opinion of the majority.

1. The Campbell park is public property, dedicated to the use of the public, and Council as custodians or trustees cannot lease, let, or permit buildings to be erected from which the public are excluded for any period.

2. This park has been improved with public moneys, improved and maintained for the benefit of the public, who have, therefore, acquired a free right to the exclusive use of all or any portion thereof, and unless and until it is discontinued to be used as a public park the Council cannot deal with it. (*vide* section 154.)

3. It is a violation of the principle that there should be no interference with the rights of the public for a purpose not essentially for the benefit of the public.

4. The law does not even make any provision to lease any public property (*vide* sections 69 and 72 of Ordinance No. 6 of 1910). The restrictions laid down against alienation of even Municipal property support our contention. Alienation is permitted only when advantageous or convenient. To deal with public property in this manner is far from convenient, advantageous, proper, or legal.

5. It is an unusual policy and altogether opposed to the policy, of this Council heretofore, to permit buildings on property which has been used by the public. The Sinhalese Sports Club was refused permission to build some years ago, and the Malay Club was refused a similar request with respect to the Rifle Green.

6. It is an unwise policy and a wrong principle to narrow down or limit open spaces now available to the public as general recreation grounds by permitting buildings to be erected thereon and such buildings allowed to be applied for particular or specific purposes.

7. As regards public health, our open spaces should be as open as possible, and the area of such open spaces should be extended in keeping with the increase and density of population. For an area of about 1,800 acres with a heavy density of population there is only the Campbell park as a recreation ground, and this is only eighteen acres in extent.

The people of Maradana, Dematagoda, Borella, Welikada, and Cotta road have no other public park, and in view of the extension of limits and rapid increase of new buildings it is necessary to enlarge the park, or provide others where facilities for the enjoyment of open air may be had.

8. For years it had been the settled policy of this Council not to let or lease land for the exclusive use of private bodies. (*vide* resolutions of Council and the Municipal Engineer's report on the application of the Young Men's Catholic Association, Bloomfield, Malay Cricket Club, Sinhalese Sports Club, the Pettah Catholic Club, &c.)

9. If the policy of Council is now to be altered, and the law allows the alteration, and the public suffers it, before any one body should be preferred and given a specific site, it is necessary to call for applications from all sporting clubs who desire recreation grounds.

It would not be fair, and it is not right, to give permission to some and judge the others on merits. There can be no merits unless the claims of various clubs and community interests are compared.

10. We fail to see how Council can grant two sites for pavilions to the Sinhalese Sports Club and Tamil Union Sports Club, respectively, and refuse similar or other concessions involving the exclusive use of grounds in public parks to the Malay Sports Club, the Catholic Clubs (Pettah and Borella), the Buddhist Cricket or Tennis Clubs, the Young Men's Catholic Association Athletic Club, the Mercantile and Government Cricket Clubs, Wesley College Cricket Club, Bambalapatiya Recreation Club, the Ramblers, &c. Give to all or give to none should be the policy of the Council.

11. The grounds leased to the Colombo Garden Club and Lawn Club are land undeveloped and not public lands and so long as a proper rental is obtained and Council's rights are conserved, it does not seem to us that permissive use granted to them is wrong or is a violation of any rights of the public, especially since the lands have been improved and rendered rateable.

12. About eight acres of Crown land available in the vicinity of Campbell park have been applied for by the Tamil Union Sports Club and refused as the land was needed for public purposes. If undeveloped Crown land is so refused, the Council is not justified in permitting private buildings to be erected on public land.

13. Once the Council concedes the principle that public land can be claimed by public bodies or private societies, it must be fair to every one, and all applications for such purposes should be favourably entertained.

14. It may be that the policy of the Council at some future time, when constituted differently than what it is at present, will so change as to make it necessary to resume possession of these sites. Then all these parties to whom these concessions have been allowed will be put into considerable inconvenience and the expense they have incurred will be lost to them.

15. Both the Police Sports Club and the Nondescripts have, in common with the Ladies' Golf Club and Victoria Golf Club, received concessions from Government, and in view of the extension of limits Government should be asked to reclaim their undeveloped and low lands which are in an insanitary condition at present for the benefit of recreation clubs which may lease them on specified terms.

The Adjourned General Meeting, Monday, June 30, 1913.

The adjourned Meeting of the Municipal Council met this day at 3 p.m., at the Town Hall, pursuant to notice dated June 28, 1913.

The Chairman reported progress and informed the Council that three amendments proposing Messrs. H. P. Beling, J. R. Jayatilleke, and D. M. Moreira had been negatived on his original motion that Mr. E. H. Joseph should be appointed Secretary, and that his original motion seconded by Major A. W. de Wilton was now before the Council.

Mr. L. B. Fernando proposed as an amendment that Mr. E. H. Joseph be appointed Secretary, and that the applications of Messrs. H. E. Wijetunge, J. R. Toussaint, D. M. Moreira, Cyril Foenander, E. Nelson, R. A. Ekanayaka, H. P. Beling, J. R. Jayatilleke, William de Silva, Edwin R. Pieris, N. A. Dharmaratne, W. Chas. de Silva, W. Samarasinghe, B. V. Caspersz, W. R. M. Rupasinghe, M. S. Arudparagasam, Robert Martin, O. Nicholas, J. W. H. Bradshaw, Vivian Perera, R. J. Perera, T. Wilmot Perera, Dr. V. R. Schokman, L.M.S., Dr. J. C. Nicholas, L.M.S., Cyril L. Joseph, C. V. Hunter, Chas. Dias, John Guthrie, G. Weerasinghe, E. C. Kindersley, C. V. Perera, J. A. Guneratne, W. S. Tirimane, Chas. H. Vandenberg, Hilary D. Jansz, C. G. W. Jayasekera, and T. Kelaart be rejected. Dr. David Rockwood seconded.

Mr. H. L. de Mel rose to a point of order and submitted the following written objection :—

The Council having gone into Committee to consider No. 18 of the agenda, and having resumed without having arrived at a result (only having out-voted three amendments and not voting upon the substantive motion before the Council in Committee), I contend that under by-law 6 of chapter II. only the result of the deliberations can be now dealt with. I say the result is nil and, therefore, we must proceed to item No. 19.

The Chairman overruled the objection and made the following order :—

"I hold that what resulted in Committee was that the Chairman moved that Mr. E. H. Joseph should be appointed as Secretary, that Major A. W. de Wilton seconded the Chairman's motion, and that three amendments proposing Messrs. H. P. Beling, J. R. Jayatilleke, and D. M. Moreira were negatived. The final result is that the Chairman's motion is now before the Council. That motion could have been put formally and finally to the vote if no amendment had been proposed as it has been by Mr. L. B. Fernando."

The amendment was opposed by Messrs. H. L. de Mel, E. G. Jayewardene, Dr. W. P. Rodrigo, and Messrs. C. P. Dias, and H. A. Jayawardena.

Mr. L. B. Fernando withdrew his amendment by leave of the Council.

The Council adjourned for twenty minutes.

On resuming Mr. E. G. Jayewardene requested the Chairman to make a minute that his motion in Committee to appoint Mr. E. H. Joseph was not voted upon in Committee.

The Chairman acknowledged that his motion was not voted upon in Committee.

The Chairman's motion that Mr. E. H. Joseph be appointed Secretary was then put to the Council.

#### DISSENT.

At the Council Meeting of June 27, 1913, and the adjourned Meeting of June 30, two of the subjects for consideration were as follows :—

*Item No. 4 on the Agenda.*—That the salary of the Secretary of the Municipal Council be fixed at Rs. 4,000 rising by annual increments of Rs. 500 to Rs. 6,000, and when that sum is reached it be considered whether any further increase is desirable. An amendment to refer the matter to the Standing Committee on Finance for consideration and report was lost and the motion carried.

*Item No. 18 on the Agenda* was the consideration of applications for the post of Secretary, Municipal Council, Colombo, and selection of a Secretary. When this item on the agenda was reached the Council duly resolved themselves into a Committee of the whole Council to consider the item. This the Council had the power to do under section 2, Chapter 6, of the by-laws. After some discussion on the number of applications to be dealt with in Committee, the Chairman, after permitting a number of names to be included for discussion in Committee, proposed that Mr. E. H. Joseph be appointed, and this was duly seconded. (The Chairman had previously recommended this candidate to members of Council, purporting to act under a resolution of Council of May 14, 1913, irregularly passed and inoperative in effect.)

This Meeting began by the Chairman moving to rescind the resolution under which he had made the recommendation, and he brought up some 38 applications for consideration and selection. The resolution authorizing these applications to be dealt with by the Chairman having been rescinded there were no applications before Council legally, and their consideration could not be taken up without proper notice to the Members and the public and without the express permission of the Council (*vide* Chapter 8 of Ordinance No. 6 of 1910).

To the Chairman's substantive motion, however, three amendments were duly proposed, duly deliberated upon, voted upon, and a division in each case recorded; they were all lost by a majority, but without the substantive motion being debated, discussed, or voted upon, the Chairman, with the consent of the majority of Council, in spite of a dissenting minority, moved that the Council do resume, and the Council thereupon resumed. Thereupon, under section 90 of the Ordinance, the Council was duly adjourned by consent of the majority to Monday, 30th instant, at 3 p.m.

At the adjourned Meeting, the Chairman reported progress and proposed to put the identical motion proposed by him when the Council was in Committee and which the Council then abandoned; a point of order was raised indicating that under section 6, Chapter 2 of the by-laws, when the Council resumes from Committee "the result of their deliberations shall be dealt with in Council." In this case there was no result, the deliberations being the negating of three amendments and the result therefore being nil. It was, therefore, not competent, legal, or proper for the Council to discuss or vote only on the question, but to proceed to the next item on the agenda, *viz.*, the business left unfinished (*vide* section 90 of 6 of 1910). It must be here clearly pointed out that the adjournment was not under section 21 of the by-laws, for that adjournment, under that section, could only have been during the Committee stage. Any new matter at the adjourned

Meeting could under exceptional circumstances be introduced by the special permission of Council. But the Council did not resolve themselves into Committee again to re-open or discuss the question which they had discussed in Committee and abandoned. The Chairman overruled the objection and even permitted the introduction of another amendment, which, far from dealing with the result of the Council's deliberations in Committee, introduced very contentious, offensive, and unfair matter into the Council's business of the day. This was proposed by the Member for Kotahena and duly seconded by the Member for Kollupitiya. The Members for San Sebastian, New Bazaar, Slave Island, Maradana, and Wellawatta, and Mr. Arthur Alwis opposed the said amendment, thereupon it was withdrawn by leave of Council. The Chairman's motion, which he alleged and ruled was "the result of the deliberations in Committee," was then voted upon and carried by a majority. We beg to dissent from the opinion of the majority and record our reasons:—

1. When the Council resolved themselves into a Committee of the whole Council for a particular purpose, in this case, to consider No. 18 on the agenda, viz., "Consideration of applications for the post of Secretary, Municipal Council, Colombo, and selection of a Secretary," the result of their deliberations can only end either in the "selection of a Secretary" by considering all the applications or in the abandonment of the selection altogether.

The Committee's deliberations are presumed to end in a result and be the work of the whole Council in Committee, that work or the result of their work can and must either be confirmed, amended, or rejected when the Council resumes. We contend that, there being no result arrived at in Committee, the law presumes there was no result. The next procedure, therefore, should have been to proceed to No. 19 on the agenda. The Council could not deal afresh with the same matter and subject it to debate; if such a course is permitted the object of work in Committee will be defeated.

2. There is a further reason for presuming that the Council in Committee abandoned the Chairman's recommendation and did not act on it; namely, that the recommendation was inadmissible as improper, not being supported by authority. If, however, according to the Chairman's ruling the matter of the appointment of a Secretary was properly before the Council with his recommendation, we say that the failure or the refusal to appoint Mr. Beling, Head Clerk and Acting Secretary, is a gross violation of a pledge given by a past Chairman; it is a violation of a resolution of Council acquiesced in for years past and with a growth of various departments of the Municipal Council year after year.

With the assumption of office by a new Chairman, what is needed for efficient and effectual administration of Municipal affairs is a Secretary with special qualifications for the post; and these are the qualifications clearly and unmistakably held by Mr. Beling, a trusted and reliable officer of the Council, with a special previous Government training. He was besides recommended by the Financial Assistant to the Chairman, who possesses good experience and knowledge of matters Municipal and is able to express an opinion on the point, in the following words:—"He is very reliable. It would serve the best interests of Council if Mr. Beling is appointed to the post rather than an outsider."

3. Mr. Beling's clear and conclusive claims were not commented on by the Chairman, nor did he deny Mr. Beling's competency to assist him in current affairs of the Municipal Council so far as a Secretary should do.

4. By not recognizing merit and efficiency within its own service, the Council was closing the door to an already close department by drafting outsiders at the sacrifice of efficiency and justice. This tends to demoralize the loyalty of a staff who expect fair play and justice in granting promotions or rewarding merit.

5. The right to appoint a Secretary and fix his salary is a right specially reserved to the whole Council (*vide* section 59-1 and 3) and therefore a minute by the Chairman on one candidate, after calling for applications from the public and having besides an excellent officer in the service of the Council already, is clearly wrong. It was also against the tenor of the Council's established policy and contrary to principles of fair play and justice.

6. The officer to be appointed or selected was not an officer to be attached to the Chairman, but a Secretary of the whole Council who had to deal more with the general public and to be acquainted with Municipal duties to be able to deal at first hand with a number of them or their requests; besides this he has to record the Minutes of Council and submit all papers for consideration of the Council and the various Standing Committees with the past history and other details. The memorandum of the duties of the Secretary by the present Chairman were not approved by Council, and do not represent them correctly in view of the number of special officers in the Medical, Engineering, and Financial Departments to whom certain powers of the Chairman are now delegated. In this respect the claims of Messrs. Beling, Jayatilake, and Moreira and a number of other applicants were very superior and should have been fully considered on their respective merits.

7. It was equally unfair to call for a number of applications, reply that they would be considered by the Council, and then to act on the irregular recommendation of the Chairman, without considering or inquiring into the merits of others, but by implication rejecting all. It was only at the Council Meeting of May 23 that Mr. Beling was appointed as Acting Secretary, and unless any applicant had very superior qualifications and was more efficient to do the work of Secretary or even assist the Chairman, who was new to the Municipal work, there was no justification to bring up other applications to over-ride his claims.

8. Item No. 4 on the agenda determined the salary of the Secretary of the Municipal Council at 4 P.M., on June 27, but in the absence of words to the following effect, "that the matter of an appointment of a Secretary be now considered and dealt with by the Meeting," it was irregular to bring up No. 18 because item No. 18 *ipso facto* became a nullity immediately Council rescinded the resolutions of the Special Meeting [held on May 14 during the early part of this Meeting]. The Council had, therefore, not called for any applications, the "applications" then opposed to be before the Council being null and void, the result of a nullity. There being no applications before the Council, no recommendations, no previous consideration, all the subsequent proceedings were equally vitiated and are a nullity.

9. If, on the other hand, as the Chairman was determined with the aid of the majority that voted with him to carry out his own recommendation, it was clear that the whole Council went into Committee to deliberate on that subject and arrive at a result, but there was no result, and Council is debarred from dealing in the matter afresh unless with due notice. By permitting the Member for Kotahena to move his amendment "that several applications be rejected," the Chairman made clear that several applications had not been considered in Committee or any result arrived at.

10. This appointment, being contrary to law by being irregularly submitted to Council, illegally dealt with, and adopted in the face of illegal procedure, is tantamount to a misapplication of Municipal funds should any salary be paid to the person so appointed.

11. By the Chairman's ruling a new precedent has been established, viz., that after going into Committee for a definite purpose and not arriving at a definite result, Council can resume and raise issues, propose motions and amendments, and re-debate on them. The very object of Committee work is thus frustrated and defeated.

I beg leave to record the following further reasons for dissenting from the proceedings of the Meeting held on June 27 and 30, 1913 :—

(i.) The business of the Council at the above Meeting was not taken up in the order provided by by-law 6 of Chapter II., motions having been considered before questions.

However insignificant this point may seem, it constituted an irregularity which rendered the proceedings illegal.

(ii.) The resolutions of the Special Meeting held on May 14, 1913, having been rescinded at the Meeting held on June 27, 1913, every act done under its authority was *ipso facto* null and void. The Council, therefore, had not properly advertised for applications and there were no regular applications before the Council on June 27. It was therefore highly irregular and improper to select an applicant out of a lot of irregular applications without giving the public a chance of considering an advertisement brought before them in a more legal manner.

The Chairman's recommendation, which he said was made at the request of the Council, was not regularly before the Council, that request also having been rescinded.

The proper, constitutional, and fair course the Council should have pursued, after fixing the Secretary's salary, was to retrace the steps taken at the rescinded Special Meeting (May 14), and after due performance of those formalities bring up the question of the selection of a Secretary at a subsequent Meeting.

To the above dissent I should like to add the following reasons on the merits—

1. In the course of the discussion it came to light that the Chairman had not adopted the usual course of interviewing candidates and seeing them personally and finding out their respective merits. Even in making minor appointments, this is the course adopted. In this instance the Chairman having fixed upon one candidate at the very outset obviously gave no consideration to the others.

2. It is true that two or three of the candidates had seen the Chairman, but this was on their own initiative. The Chairman made no effort to get at the others or to personally ascertain their qualifications.

3. Not having seen any of the other candidates and not knowing their merits, it was obviously impossible for the Chairman to say that the candidate he proposed was comparatively the best out of the applicants.

4. A number of elected members interviewed the Chairman and openly and frankly stated their views to the Chairman. The Chairman in Council appreciated the action of these Members. It is regrettable that the Chairman did not bring to the discussion of the question an open mind. From the discussion it was obvious that the minority had no candidate of their own, whereas the Chairman had one whom he had selected without comparison with others.

5. Weighty reasons were given for the selection of any one of the three candidates in support of whose candidature three amendments were moved in Council-in-Committee.

No reasons were given by the Chairman or any of his supporters for the rejection of these candidates.

6. In the selection of the Chairman's candidate precedent has been set at nought in regard to the limitation of age. The dissent deals with the other question as regards the violation of special resolutions of Council in regard to the appointment of officers of Council when available in preference to outsiders. I therefore say nothing further upon that point.

7. Had it not been for the illegal action of the Chairman, the minority intended to bring forward the names of Messrs. J. A. Gooneratne, Mudaliyar, W. Samarasinghe, Muhandiram, and Bernardine Caspersz, men with great and varied experience in the Government service, and who were recommended as eminently fit for the Secretaryship. The Chairman's action precluded the possibility of discussing the merits of these candidates.
