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VITAL STATISTICS OF CEYLON.

REPORT OF THE REGISTRAR-GENERAL FOR THE SECOND QUARTER OF 1913.

I.—Population.

THE estimated population of the Island on the last day of the quarter was 4,220,459, an increase of 35,047 * on the previous quarter. This result is due to an excess of 14,830 births over deaths and of 20,217 arrivals over departures of Indian coolies.

2. *Arrivals and Departures of Indian Coolies.*—47,425 Indian coolies arrived in the Island during the quarter, while their departures amounted to 27,208, as against 37,583 and 21,734 respectively, the averages for the corresponding quarters of the last fifteen years.

II.—Marriages.

3. *Marriages.*—3,982 general marriages (*i.e.*, marriages other than Kandyan or Muhammadan) were registered during the quarter and 1,511 Kandyan marriages, against 3,509 and 994 respectively in the second quarter of the previous year. Their distribution by Provinces and districts is given in Table I. in the Appendix.

4. Table VI. in the Appendix shows the marriages solemnized in the general community in each Province and district in the Island, the civil condition, nationality, the highest, lowest, and mean ages of the parties, mode of solemnization, the number of bridegrooms and brides who were unable to sign their names in the register, &c. Table VII. gives similar information in respect of Kandyan marriages.

III.—Births and Deaths.

5. *Births.*—The births registered during the quarter numbered 42,866 (48 Europeans, 230 Burghers, 30,556 Sinhalese, 9,226 Tamils, 2,512 Moors, 149 Malays, and 145 Others), and were in the proportion of 41·1 per 1,000 persons living, as against 39·4 in the previous quarter and 37·6, the average for the second quarter in the period 1898-1908. See Table VIII. for each Province and district.

6. *Deaths.*—The number of deaths registered during the quarter amounted to 28,036 (27 Europeans, 158 Burghers, 16,771 Sinhalese, 9,081 Tamils, 1,730 Moors, 95 Malays, and 174 Others), and was equal to an annual rate of 26·9 per 1,000 persons living, as against the average 27·6 for the second quarters of 1898-1908 and 32·2, the rate in the preceding quarter. See Table IX. for each Province and district.

7. The births and deaths for the whole Island are compared in the following Table A with the previous quarter, the corresponding quarter of the previous year, and the average for the second quarters of 1898-1912, while the rates are compared also with the averages for the periods 1898-1908 and 1909-1912 respectively. All

the rates in this, except the averages for the period 1898-1908, are calculated on the population as estimated on the basis of the Census of March 10, 1911. For the particulars as to each Province and district see Tables I. and II.:-

8. The Island's death-rate (26·9) was lower than in the previous quarter (32·2), the second quarter of 1912 (31·5), and the average (27·6) for the period 1898-1908. The rate ranged from 51·0 in Mannar to 17·5 in Negombo. The birth-rate was higher than that of the previous quarter (39·4), the second quarter of 1912 (39·4), and the average (37·6) for the period 1898-1908. The rate varied from 53·2 in Kegalla to 27·7 in Puttalam.

9. *Infantile Mortality.*—The deaths of infants under one year of age numbered 6,771, and were in the proportion of nearly 158 to 1,000 registered births. The highest rate among the Sinhalese was 278 in Puttalam, among the Tamils 328 in Mannar, and among the Moors 198 in Puttalam.

IV.—State of Public Health.

10. The rate for the quarter (26·9) has fallen below the average (27·6), and each Province showed a lower death-rate than in the previous quarter.

11. The Western Province maintains the reputation of being the healthiest, with a death-rate of 21·4; whereas the unhealthiest was the Province of Uva, with a death-rate of 35·5. Of the districts, as in the previous quarter, Negombo was the healthiest (17·5) and Mannar the unhealthiest (51·0).

12. The births and deaths registered and their averages can be gleaned from Tables III., IV., and V. in the Appendix (pages 11-15). The rates are shown for the Sinhalese only in the districts which are mainly inhabited by the Sinhalese, and for the Tamils only where they form the bulk of the population, but in the Puttalam and Batticaloa Districts, which contain a resident population of Sinhalese, Tamils, and Moors, the rates are given for each of the races.

13. *Western Province.*—This was the healthiest Province, with Negombo, Colombo, and Kalutara taking the first, second, and fourth places, respectively. The infantile mortality of Colombo (78) was the lowest for the past five years. The birth-rate was lower than that of the previous quarter, but exceeded the average.

14. *Central Province.*—Kandy and Matale showed lower death-rates than in the previous quarter and than the average; whereas the death-rate in Nuwara Eliya was the highest for the past five quarters. The birth-rate far exceeded the average.

15. *Northern Province.*—The death-rate was lower than in the previous quarter, but higher than the average. Mannar alone of the three districts showed a higher rate than in the previous quarter. Mullaitivu, which recorded the highest infantile mortality in the Island during the last quarter (532 per 1,000 births), showed a great improvement in the quarter under review (259 per 1,000 births), and its place was taken by Mannar (328 per 1,000 births). The birth rate was lower than the average, though better than that of the previous quarter.

16. *Southern Province.*—The death-rate fell to 27·5 from 33·6 in the previous quarter, though higher than the average (23·9). Hambantota, as in the previous quarter, showed the highest death-rate in the Province (38·0). The birth-rate was slightly higher than in the previous quarter and than the average.

17. *Eastern Province.*—The infantile mortality (70 per 1,000 births) of the Sinhalese of the Batticaloa District was the lowest; while the birth-rate (57·8) was the highest recorded in the quarter for any race in the Island.

18. *North-Western Province.*—The death-rate of the Sinhalese fell far below the average and that of the previous quarter. The infantile mortality recorded in the Chilaw District was 99 per 1,000 births, the third lowest in the Island. The birth-rate of the Province (45·7) far exceeded the average (34·0).

19. *North-Central Province.*—In the North-Central Province, which is co-extensive with the Anuradhapura District, the death-rate (32·3) was the lowest since the third quarter of 1911. It was very much less than the average, and fell to nearly half of the rate recorded in the corresponding quarter of the previous year. The birth-rate (28·4) was far below the average, though slightly higher than that of the previous quarter.

20. *Province of Uva.*—This Province, which is co-extensive with the Badulla District, recorded a death-rate of 33·5 lower than the average, but similar to that recorded in the corresponding quarter of the previous year. The birth-rate (49·3) exceeded the average.

21. *Province of Sabaragamuwa.*—The death-rate (25·0) fell far short of that shown in the previous quarter (33·7) and the average (28·5). The birth-rate (52·1) exceeded the average, but was slightly lower than in the previous quarter.

22. *General Observations.*—Among the general population of the Negombo District 3 births were recorded during the quarter under review for every death that was registered. In the districts of Matara, Kegalla, and Chilaw there were 2 births to each death; while Mannar, Mullaitivu, Puttalam, and Anuradhapura were the only districts which exhibited death-rate in excess of their birth-rate. The death-rate of the Sinhalese of the Colombo, Negombo, Kandy, and Kegalla Districts was less than half the birth-rate; while Puttalam and Anuradhapura were the only districts where the Sinhalese death-rate exceeded the Sinhalese birth-rate.

23. For the health of the estate population (mainly Tamils) in the Central, Uva, Sabaragamuwa, and Western Provinces, and in the Galle, Matara, and Kurunegala Districts, see *infra*, Chapter VI., "Estate Population."

V.—Causes of Deaths.

24. The causes of deaths registered in the Island during the quarter are shown in detail in Table X. in the Appendix, and select causes of deaths are shown in the following Table B:—

25. *Smallpox*.—One death, that of a Tamil in the Kegalla District, was attributed to smallpox, against nil in the previous quarter and 7 in the second quarter of the last year. The source of infection was traced to Southern India.

26. *Cholera*.—One death, that of a Tamil in the Cooly Camp Hospital at Ragama, was due to cholera, as against 3 in the previous quarter and nil in the second quarter of the last year. The deceased was reported to have come from an infected area in Southern India.

28. *Death by Violence: Accidents*.—Of the 494 deaths attributed to violence, 122 were due to drowning (of which 36 were caused by falling into wells and 9 by falling into pits) and 99 to falls from trees. There were 2 deaths by lightning and 47 by burns (of which 1 was due to a kerosine oil lamp). Vehicles caused 22 deaths, of which trains were responsible for 8, motor cars and carts for 6 each, and bicycles and tram cars for 1 each. Snakes claimed 66 victims, crocodiles 6, dogs 4, bulls 2, and horses, buffaloes, rats, and hornets 1 each. Two deaths were due to wire shoot accident, 2 to dynamite explosion. One child was asphyxiated by the cloth which served as its cradle.

29. *Homicide*.—Forty-eight deaths (40 Sinhalese, 4 Tamils, 3 Moors, and 1 Other) were due to homicide, against 46 in the previous quarter and 56 in the second quarter of the last year. Of these, 3 were caused by firearms and 32 by cutting or piercing instruments. The highest number of deaths (7) was noticeable in the Kalutara, Kurunegala, and Ratnapura Districts.

30. *Suicide*.—Fifty-nine deaths resulted from suicide (1 European, 1 Burgher, 30 Sinhalese, 23 Tamils, 2 Moors, and 2 Others), against 47 in the previous quarter and 53 in the second quarter of the last year. Of these, 33 were caused by hanging or strangulation, 11 by drowning, 7 by poison, 2 by firearms, 2 by cutting or piercing instruments, 1 by jumping from a height, and 3 by other means not sufficiently particularized.

31. *Executions*.—Four judicial executions (2 Sinhalese and 2 Tamils) took place during the quarter, against 6 in the previous quarter and 2 in the second quarter of the last year.

VI.—Health of the Estate Population.

32. This chapter deals with the births and deaths of the population of the estates scheduled under "The Medical Wants Ordinance, 1912," and situated in the Central, Uva, Sabaragamuwa, and Western Provinces, and in Galle and Matara Districts in the Southern Province, and Kurunegala District in the North-Western Province. The total number of births registered during the quarter amounted to 4,766 (19 Europeans, 12 Burghers, 222 Sinhalese, 4,427 Tamils, 40 Moors, 13 Malays, and 33 Others), and the deaths numbered 4,732 (5 Europeans, 4 Burghers, 158 Sinhalese, 4,455 Tamils, 46 Moors, and 64 Others), corresponding to an annual birth-rate of 37.7 and a death-rate of 37.4 per 1,000, as against the respective averages of 24.6 and 28.6 for the period of 1898-1908 and 30.3 and 32.3 for the period 1909-1912.

33. Deaths of children under one year numbered 1,055, corresponding to a rate of 221 per 1,000 births. The subjoined list shows separately the deaths of infants in the districts for the quarter :—

The highest birth-rate was in Nuwara Eliya (43·7), and the lowest in Kurunegala (18·8).

35. The causes of deaths are shown in detail in Table XI. in the Appendix, and select causes are shown in the following Table C. To ancylostomiasis are attributed 431 deaths, but many of the deaths assigned to diarrhoea, dropsy, malarial cachexia, and anaemia are probably due to this cause :—

VII.—Health of the City of Colombo.

37. The births registered in the city of Colombo numbered 1,424, and corresponded to an annual rate of 24·2, which was 1·8 higher than the average for the corresponding quarters in 1898–1908 and 1·9 than in the corresponding quarter of the previous year. (See Table E below.)

38. The deaths registered numbered 1,486, and corresponded to a rate of 25·3 (against 26·9 for the whole Island), which was 4·7 per 1,000 lower than the average for the corresponding quarters in 1898–1908 and 3·4 than in the corresponding quarter of the previous year. (See Table E below.) The death-rate of the Colombo town approaches that of Gampola (25·6).

39. As usual in the city, the death-rate exceeded the birth-rate, owing mainly to the preponderance of males over females (chiefly among the Europeans, Indian Tamils, and Moors), to the presence of hospitals and jails, which add to the normal mortality of the city, and in some cases possibly to evasion of registration of births.

40. The subjoined Table E gives the births and deaths and their rates for each race for the second quarters of 1913 and 1912, and the average for the second quarters in 1898-1908 and 1909-1912:—

41. The rates for Europeans and the races classed together as "Others," being calculated upon small floating populations, are not very reliable. Excluding the rates for these sections, the lowest death-rate was among the Burghers (20·7, against an average of 28·3 in 1898-1908), and the highest death-rate was among the Malays (33·3, against an average of 36·4), followed by the Sinhalese (28·2, average 30·7) and the Moors (22·2, average 31·9) and the Tamils (21·4, average 31·6).

42. The highest birth-rate in the quarter was among the Malays (42·8, against an average of 27·9) followed by the Sinhalese (31·3, against an average of 29·1). The low birth-rates for Tamils and "Others" are due to the unequal distribution of the sexes owing to a preponderance of males.

43. Table XII. gives in detail the deaths from various causes in each ward of the city of Colombo and according to each nationality. The number of births and deaths in each ward of the city, their rates per mille per annum, and certain selected causes of deaths during the quarter are shown in Table F:—

44. Excluding from consideration the two wards, Fort and Galle Face, and Pettah, whose population is for the most part a floating male adult one, the healthiest division in the city was Kollupitiya, with a death-rate of 7·8; while the unhealthiest was New Bazaar, with a death-rate of 27·8 per annum.

45. The following Table G. indicates the comparative healthiness of each ward and race in the city on the basis of the infantile mortality :—

46. The infantile mortality was 336 per 1,000 births for the whole city, but rose as high as 618 in New Bazaar, 500 in Pettah, falling to 252 in Slave Island and 296 in Wellawatta. Among the races, the races classed together as "Others" lead with the highest mortality (762), followed by the Tamils (444) and Moors (354). In New Bazaar 6 Tamil children were born and 6 died in early infancy.

47. Compared with the second quarter of 1912, the infantile mortality of the city showed on the whole a decline.

48. The highest mortality among persons of all ages was due to pneumonia, which was responsible for 174 deaths, followed by phthisis (157), infantile convulsions (126), enteritis (120), debility (102), bronchitis (81), senility (70), diarrhoea and dysentery (64), enteric fever (41), worms (28), and marasmus (26).

VIII.—Health of the Principal Towns.

49. This chapter deals with the vital statistics of the thirty-one towns of the Island proclaimed under sections 31 to 36 of the Ordinance No. 1 of 1895. The Registrars of these towns are qualified medical men. No death occurring there is registered unless the cause is ascertained by the Registrar's personal inspection of the deceased, or certified by a qualified medical man in attendance on the deceased, and, as a rule, no body is buried or cremated before registration of the death.

50. Table XIII. in the Appendix shows the population at the last decennial Census of March 10, 1911, and the present estimated population, and the births, deaths, and stillbirths registered during the quarter, their rates, and the average infantile mortality since July, 1907, and the mean temperature and rainfall of each town in the quarter.

51. Corrected death-rates as well as crude death-rates are shown in Table XIII. By a corrected rate is meant the rate calculated for the population of each town on the basis that its age- and sex-constitution is the same as for the Island, and also excluding from the total deaths (as in the crude rate) the deaths of estate coolies and other persons who are not town residents. The corrected rate is thus a more satisfactory test of the comparative health of the towns than the crude rate.

52. *Population.*—The estimated population of the thirty-one towns is 552,505, or a little more than one-eighth of the total population of the Island. The population of the city of Colombo, 235,829, was more than seven-tenths of the population of all the other towns taken together.

53. *Births.*—The births registered numbered 3,953 (2,064 males and 1,889 females), and corresponded to an annual rate of 29.09 per 1,000 of the population, as against 30.48 during the previous quarter and 26.88 during the second quarter of 1912. Of the towns (excluding Vavuniya and Lunugala, which have a population under 1,000, and Nuwara Eliya, in which the population is largely migratory), the highest birth-rate for the quarter was in Matale (48.78), and the lowest in Anuradhapura (15.06), followed by Panadure (18.58). In the other towns the birth-rate ranged from 45.64 in Moratuwa to 22.14 in Trincomalee.

54. *Deaths.*—The number of deaths registered totalled 4,377 (2,328 males and 2,049 females), and corresponded to a rate of 28.54 per mille, as against 33.91 during the preceding quarter and 28.51 during the second quarter of 1912.

55. *Stillbirths.*—The number of stillbirths registered during the quarter was 237 (124 males and 113 females), against 230 in the previous quarter. Their distribution is shown in Table XIII.

56. The death-rate for all towns this quarter (28.54) was lower than in the previous quarter (33.91), but higher than the Island rate (26.9), and nearly identical with that of the second quarter of 1912. It shows a decrease on the average (30.59)—a decrease which occurs in fifteen out of the thirty-one towns, and is specially noticeable in Vavuniya (24.82, average 98.38), Tangalla (18.10, average 36.32), and Kegalla (8.54, average 23.04).

57. Of the towns (excluding Vavuniya, Lunugala, and Nuwara Eliya for reasons stated above), the lowest mortality during the year was recorded in Kegalla (8·54), and the highest in Mannar (62·44). The subjoined list places the towns in order of demerit:—

59. *Infantile Mortality.*—The infantile mortality of the thirty-one towns was equal to a rate of 286 per 1,000 births registered, as against 320 in the previous quarter and 315 in the second quarter of 1912.

60. *Causes of Death.*—Table XIV. in the Appendix gives for each town and race the principal causes of deaths registered during the quarter, and shows the infantile mortality separately from the general mortality (one year and over).

61. *Percentage of Principal Causes of Deaths at all Ages.*—Of the total number of deaths at all ages in the towns, *bronchitis* and *pneumonia* accounted for nearly 14 per cent., *diarrhoea* and *dysentery* 12 per cent., *infantile convulsions* and *phthisis* each 7 per cent., and *debility* 6 per cent.
