NOW Ye that We, the Governor of Ceylon, with the advice of the Executive Council, in exercise of the powers vested in Us by section 4 of "The Village Communities Ordinance, 1889," do hereby declare that the village of Angulana, set out in the schedule hereto, being part of the Chief Headman's Division of Salpiti korale, in the District of Colombo, Western Province, shall be brought within the operation of the said Ordinance from June 1, 1914.

By His Excellency Sir Robert Chalmers, Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

ROBERT CHALMERS. THEREAS by three Proclamations dated respectively September 6, 1873, February 1, 1886, and January 1, 1889, this Island was divided for revenue and administrative purposes into nine Provinces, including among others the Northern and North-Central Provinces:

And whereas it is expedient to alter and re-define for the said purposes in manner hereinafter appearing the existing northern boundary of the North-Central Province between the said Northern and North-Central Provinces:

Now know Ye that We, the Governor of Ceylon, do hereby proclaim and appoint that from and after October 1, 1914, the northern boundary of the North-Central Province, that is to say, the boundary between the Wilachchiya korale in the said Province and the Northern Province, shall be as follows:-

Starting from the point on the Kal-aru where it crosses the present western boundary of Wilachchiya korale the boundary shall run along the Kal-aru till it meets Kokapunchimotte-aru, and thence be a straight line-drawn approximately north-east by east to the junction of the Malwattu-oya and Kal-aru.

A .- FOR APPOINTMENTS IN THE DEPARTMENT.

1. Admission.—Candidates should apply in writing to the Surveyor-General, submitting copies of their school certificates, a specimen of their draughtsmanship, and a certificate of good character. They must pass a preliminary examination in the following subjects:—

and serve first as Extra Clerks and Draughtsmen where necessary to gain proficiency in drawing, &c., and then pass an Entrance Examination to the Departmental Training School for Surveyors. They must also pass a medical examination to ascertain if they are physically fit to undertake the duties of a surveyor. No appointments to the field will be made except through the Training School.

- 2. Conditions for Admission.—Security for the sum of Rs. 100 must be furnished on admission, to cover the cost of lost stores or damage to instruments through wilful neglect or gross carelessness.
- 3. Candidates, on selection for the Training School, will be required to enter into an agreement and bond to serve, on the completion of their training, for a period of three years as third grade surveyors.
- 4. Payment of Students.—Candidates whose progress after one month at the Training School is such as to make them suitable for further training will receive Rs. 15 a month while in Colombo and Rs. 30 a month while completing their training, on condition that their progress is satisfactory; those who are rejected as surveyors while in the Training School may be allowed to revert to the Head Office or outstation offices, and will in such cases be paid as Extra Clerks and Draughtsmen.
- 5. Course in the Field.—After completing a course of instruction in Colombo, such students as are proficient will be sent to the field to complete their practical training.
- 6. Appointments to the Field.—They will receive appointments as soon as they are reported fit to take up duty in the field. Those for whom there may be no vacancies at the time will be employed as Extra Clerks and Draughtsmen in one of the offices until vacancies occur.
- 7. In accordance with the usual agreements, surveyors will be appointed on probation for three years. If at any time during this period their work is found to be unsatisfactory or they are guilty of misconduct, their services will be dispensed with by the Surveyor-General, in which case they will render themselves liable to forfeit the cost of their training.
- 8. Pay and Conditions of Promotion.—From the date of appointment they will receive pay at the rate of Rs. 600 to Rs. 1,680 by two annual increments of Rs. 60 and eight of Rs. 120 per annum (i.e., the salary of Grade III.).
- 9. Before promotion to Grade II. (the salary of which is Rs. 1,800 to Rs. 3,000 per annum by annual increments of Rs. 120) they must pass the Departmental Examination to test their efficiency.
- 10. Promotion to Grade I. (the salary of which is Rs. 3,180 to Rs. 3,900 per annum by annual increments of Rs. 180) will be purely by merit, and will not be made unless the officer has served for one year on the maximum of Grade II., and is fitted to take command of others, that is, to take charge of a section of a survey party.
- 11. The increments will be paid, provided the officer gives satisfaction to the Surveyor-General in the discharge of the duties entrusted to him.
- 12. From the date of appointment to Grade III. all officers must conform to the Standing Orders of the Department regarding further promotion.
- 13. On attaining a salary of Rs. 840 per annum, and provided they are recommended by the Superintendents as having done conspicuously good work, they will be eligible to enter for the Departmental Examination, which will be held annually, provided there are vacancies in Grade II.
- 14. Departmental Examination.—The syllabus and the percentage for a pass are as follows:—

All subjects are compulsory.

The first time candidates present themselves they must take up and pass in at least three subjects; after passing in three subjects simultaneously they may take up the rest of the subjects singly if they wish.

15. Conditions for the issue of a Surveyor's License.—A surveyor who has served for more than ten years will be entitled to a license under Ordinance No. 26 of 1909, provided that the Surveyor-General is satisfied with his conduct and efficiency.

"THE LAND SURVEYORS, AUCTIONEERS, AND BROKERS ORDINANCES, 1889 AND 1909."

T is hereby notified that His Excellency the Governor in Executive Council, in exercise of the powers vested in him by section 7 of "The Land Surveyors, Auctioneers, and Brokers Ordinances, 1889 and 1909," has been pleased to make the following regulations, and to revoke the regulations published in the Notifications dated June 13, 1910, and September 8, 1913, promulgated in the Government Gazettes of June 17, 1910, and September 12, 1913, respectively.

B .- For LICENSE TO PRACTISE AS A SURVEYOR.

(Course, One Year.)

- 1. The Entrance Examination will be held by such officers of the Survey Department and on such dates as shall be duly authorized by His Excellency the Governor, and will be as follows:-
- 2. Handwriting, Orthography, Composition, Arithmetic, Geometry (first book of Euclid), Algebra (up to and including Quadratic Equations), Plane Trigonometry (Elementary), Mensuration, and Plan Drawing.
- Before admission to the examination, candidates must fill up the form "A" referred to in paragraph 6 (printed at the end of these Regulations).
- 4. Candidates who hold certificates that they have passed the Senior Cambridge or other examination of similar standing, or that they have matriculated at the London University or other similar institution from time to time approved by His Excellency the Governor, will be exempted from this examination in all subjects, if their certificates show that they have passed in mathematics.
 - The syllabus of the course will be as follows:

Fieldwork.—Chain surveying, theodolite surveying, and levelling, including adjustments of the theodolite and level, laying out curves.

Drawing.—Setting out, plotting, drawing up, computing, and making a report on a survey.

6. The course will include also mathematics and mensuration, and the theory of surveying and levelling up to the limits required for the Surveyor-General's examination for the Government license for surveying and levelling.

Fees.

- The fees will be Rs. 100 paid in advance for the one-year course, but if a candidate then fails to obtain a license, he may continue his training for another six months on payment of a further fee of Rs. 50; in addition, a deposit of Rs. 100 must be made on admission, to be returned to the student on leaving the School, less estimated value of any damage done to instruments or other property of Government and cost of instruments, &c., supplied for his use after completion of the course
- Students who have obtained the Surveyor-General's license in surveying and levelling are eligible for appointments in the Survey Department on the recommendation of the Surveyor-General, on the same terms as those who have been trained under Regulations A.
- The number of students to be admitted to Class A will be limited to the probable requirements of the Survey Department, while those for Class B will be limited to ten.

Schedule of Instruments, Tools, and Books which each Student is required to possess.

Two 12-in. scales and offsets (2 chains = 1 in., 1 chain = 1 in., 4 chains = 1 in., 16 chains = 1 in., 18 chains = 1 in.).

One 12-in. cardboard protractor.

One 6-in. parallel ruler (ivory).
One 18-in. rolling ruler (brass bound).
One drawing pen.

One pencil case and set of leads.

One spring bow compass.

One set drawing pins.

One 6-in. flat smooth file.

Pencil and ink eraser.

One each: Indian ink, crimson lake, Prussian blue, burnt sienna, neutral tint, Hooker's green No. 2.

One nest of saucers, one best camel hair brush.

One book of logarithms and trigonometrical tables.

Note books, drawing paper, squared paper, writing pencils and pens, as may be required.

Text books :-

Todhunter's Algebra.

Todhunter's Trigonometry.

Todhunter's Mensuration.

Surveying, by J. Whitelaw, Jr. Book of Traverse Tables.

10. Annual licenses will be granted in "Surveying and Levelling," "Surveying" only, or "Levelling" only, to those who pass the final examination for those purposes by the Surveyor-General.

- 11. The above class will be held in connection with the Survey Department Training School, and students for the Surveyor-General's license will be required to do their field training at their own cost under such officers of the Department and at such stations as may be approved by the Surveyor-General.
- 12. All students of the class will be under the authority of the Surveyor-General. They will be expected to attend the class at the times and dates laid down for the Survey Department Training School, and the Surveyor-General is authorized to dismiss them from the class for irregular attendance, bad conduct, or insufficient progress in their studies.

Rules re Examination of License Surveyors.

- 1. Examiners, Date, and Place of Examination.—The examiners shall be one or more officers of the Survey Department appointed annually by the Surveyor-General.
- 2. The examination shall be held during the last quarter of each year. A notice of the time and place at which the examination will be held shall be published one month beforehand in the Government Gazette.
- 3. Subjects of Examination.—The examination shall comprise the following subjects:—

Mathematics.—Algebra up to quadratic equations, plane trigonometry, and the mensuration of surfaces and solids.

Drawing.—Setting out, plotting, tracing, and office work, including a report on a survey.

Field Work.—Chain surveying, theodolite surveying, and levelling, including the adjustments of the theodolite and level, and setting out curves.

- 4. (a) Candidates found to be in communication with a surveyor or referring to books, notes, printed papers, or diagrams, or having them in their possession or available for reference during the examination, shall be disqualified.
- (b) Candidates shall produce instruments in good order, and no excuse will be admitted on account of defective instruments during examination.
- (c) No candidate shall be allowed to compete who presents himself ten minutes late for any subject.
- (d) Adjustments.—Forty minutes shall be allowed for the correct adjustment of each instrument.
 - (e) The maximum collimation error allowed shall be 0.01 foot at two chains.
- (f) Candidates who fail in adjustments shall be debarred from taking further part in the examination.
- (g) Field Work.—During the progress of field work, the examiner shall inspect the candidates on the ground.
- (h) Candidates shall be expected to be at work in the field between the hours fixed by the examiner.
- (i) Field and level books should be kept clearly and in ink, or the work will not be accepted. Each page must be numbered, paged, and dated, and full reference properly made. No erasures shall be allowed. Mistakes should be corrected so that the original figures are plainly visible, and a short explanation written opposite the correction. Level books must be clearly referenced and properly reduced.
- (j) Field and level books must be new, and must bear the name of the candidate neatly printed on the outside of the cover.

The field book must contain-

- (a) The record of the survey.
- (b) Report on the same: (c) Co-ordinates.
- (d) Computation of areas.

The level book must contain-

- (a) Flying levels.
- (b) Longitudinal section.
- (c) Check levels.
- (d) Cross sections.
- (e) Computation of earthwork.

No loose sheets shall be accepted. All field and level books must be delivered to the person appointed to receive them after work is over for the day. They should be called for the next morning by the candidates at the time fixed by the examiner.

- (k) Surveying.—The largest angular misclosure in minutes shall be 4 per cent. of the number of lines. The largest misclosure allowed in chainage shall be five links per mile.
- (1) Levelling.—The largest misclosure allowed in levelling shall be 0.06 foot per mile.
- (m) The closing readings must in all cases be taken only in the examiner's presence or of some person deputed by him.

- (n) Office Work.—Plans and sections must be accurately plotted. They should be neat and well drawn. All lines must be drawn with the drawing or ruling pen, crow-quills being used for lettering only. Survey plans must be plotted to the scale of one chain to an inch. Plans must be drawn up within a reasonable time, which shall be determined by the Surveyor-General. All plans must be dated and signed by the candidates.
- (o) The areas computed on a plan must be distinctly shown by a narrow coloured border.
- (p) Candidates will be expected to plot their survey by co-ordinates. The stations should be numbered similarly in the field book and the co-ordinate sheet and carefully cross referenced.
 - 5. (a) Fees.—The fees, payable in advance, for the examination shall be—

- (b) No candidate shall be allowed to take part in the examination unless he has paid the fees prescribed.
- 6. Certificate of Character.—Before being admitted to the examination, candidates will be required to fill up the accompanying form "A" and to furnish copies of their school certificates in support, and in addition a certificate of good character from a Government Agent, Assistant Government Agent, District Judge, or Police Magistrate, and a receipt for the fees paid by them.
 - 7. List of License Holders.—A list showing separately the names of—
 - (a) Surveyors duly certified under Ordinance No. 15 of 1889;

(b) Persons holding permanent licenses in surveying;(c) Persons holding permanent licenses in levelling;

(d Persons holding permanent licenses in surveying and levelling;

(e) Persons holding annual licenses in surveying; (f) Persons holding annual licenses in levelling;

(g) Persons holding annual licenses in surveying and levelling; and

(h) Persons holding annual and special licenses to carry out Crown surveys, shall be published in the first week of February in each year in the Government Gazette for general information, and may be consulted at any time at the Surveyor-

Supplementary lists of the names of those persons who, being entitled to the annual license were not at the beginning of the year in possession of such license, shall be published in the issue of the *Government Gazette* following its grant or renewal.

8. List of Suspended and Cancelled Licenses.—The names of those persons whose registration or permanent license or both have been suspended or cancelled shall be published in the Government Gazette immediately after such suspension or cancellation has been communicated by the District Court to the Surveyor-General; and in the same manner the names of the holders of annual licenses which the Surveyor-General has refused to renew under section 8 shall be published in the Government Gazette within thirty days after his decision has been communicated to such holders.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended May 23, 1914.

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 122 (0 Europeans, 12 Burghers, 65 Sinhalese, 16 Tamils, 21 Moors, 5 Malays, and 3 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on January 1, 1914, viz., 239,528) was 26.6, as against 24.8 in the preceding week, 25.9 in the corresponding week of last year, and 24.4 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 114 (2 Europeans, 6 Burghers, 49 Sinhalese, 33 Tamils, 16 Moors, 6 Malays, and 2 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 24.8, as against 26.3 in the previous week, 26.8 in the corresponding week of last year, and 28.0 the weekly average of last year. Infantile Deaths.—Of the 114 total deaths, 37 were of infants under one year of age, as against 26 in the preceding week and in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 31 the average of last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 4.

Principal Causes of Death.—Ten deaths fom Phthisis were registered, as against 14 in the previous week and 13 the weekly average for last year. Of these, 3 were in Maradana, 3 in Slave Island, 2 in St. Paul's, 1 in Kotahena, and 1 in New Bazaar.

- 2. Nine deaths from *Pneumonia* were registered, as against 7 in the previous week and 15 the weekly average for last year. Of these, 5 were in Maradana (including 2 deaths of non-residents in hospitals), 1 in Pettah, 1 in San Sebastian, 1 in Kotahena, and 1 in New Bazaar. Four deaths from *Bronchitis* were registered.
- 3. Only one death from Enteric Fever was registered (in Maradana), as against 3 in the previous week and the average for the last year.
- 4. Seventeen deaths from Debility were registered, I2 from Enteritis, 9 from Infantile Convulsions, 6 from Senility, 4 from Diarrhæa, 2 from Dysentery, 2 from Congestion of Lungs (probably plague), 2 from Accidents, and 33 from Other Causes.
- 5. Three deaths from *Plague* were registered (in Maradana), as against 2 in the previous week. There were only 4 cases reported, as against 13 in the previous week.
- 6. There was 1 case of Smallpox reported during the week. There were none in the previous week. Four cases of Chickenpox were reported, as against 8 in the previous week. No cases of measles were reported; there were 3 in the previous week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 83.3°, against 85.0° in the preceding week and 81.6° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.890 in., against 29.778 in. in the preceding week and 29.795 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 1.03 in., against 0.26 in. in the preceding week and 1.59 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.

STATISTICS OF TOWNS IN CEYLON IN THE MONTH OF APRIL, 1914.

REPORT OF THE REGISTRAR-GENERAL.

This report deals with the Vital Statistics of the 32 principal towns in the Island proclaimed under sections 31-36 of the Ordinance No. 1 of 1895.

Births.

2. The birth's numbered 1,289 (647 males and 642 females), and were equal to an annual rate of 27.75 per 1,000, against 30 21 in the preceding month, 30 99 in the corresponding month of last year, and 29 29 the monthly average since July, 1907. The rate ranged from 78.81 in Kalmunai to 12.22 in Nuwara Eliya.

3. In the city of Colombo* the births numbered 365 (180 males and 185 females), and were equal to an annual rate of 18·27 per 1,000, against 22·91 in the preceding month, 24·36 in the corresponding month of last year, and 24·83 the monthly average. The rate ranged from 32·72 in Wellawatta to 7·82 in St. Paul's.

Deaths.

4. The total deaths registered during the month amounted to 1,604 (867 males and 737 females). There were 1,285 deaths of residents equivalent to an annual rate of 30·15 per 1,000, against 31·95 in the preceding month and 29 86 in the corresponding month of last year, and 30·56 the monthly average. The rate ranged from 85·40 in

Trincomalee to 9.30 in Tangalla and 9.29 in Nuwara Eliya.

5. In the city of Colombo* the deaths numbered 474 (277 males and 197 females). There were 419 deaths of residents equivalent to an annual rate† of 24.33 per 1,000, against 25.34 in the preceding month, 24.43 in the corresponding month of last year, and 31.28 the monthly average. Kollupitiya showed the lowest death-rate, viz., 10.79, and Wellawatta the highest, 25.17.

6. Stillbirths numbered 99 (50 males and 49 females), against 98 in the preceding month.

Infantile Mortality.

7. The infantile mortality was equal to a rate of 230 per 1,000 births registered, against 194 in the preceding month, 263 in the corresponding month of last year, and 266 the monthly average. The rate ranged from 607 in Trincomalee to 48 in Panadure.

8. The infantile mortality in the city of Colombo was 258 per 1,000 births registered, against 171 in the preceding month, 311 in the corresponding month of last year, and 322 the monthly average since July, 1907, and ranged from 882 in St. Paul's to 179 in Wellawatta.

Causes of Death.

9. The highest mortality was from *Pneumonia*, to which 10 per cent. of the total deaths was due, 9 per cent. were due to *Diarrhæa*, 7 per cent. each to *Phthisis* and *Infantile Convulsions*, 6 per cent. to *Debility*, 5 per cent. each to Dysentery and Anchylostomiasis, and 2 per cent. to Bronchitis.

10. In the city of Colombo the highest mortality was from Phthisis, which caused nearly 14 per cent. of the total number of deaths in the city. 10 per cent. of the deaths were due to Pneumonia, 7 per cent. to Infantile Convulsions, 6 per cent. to Plague, against 14 per cent. in March and 6 per cent. in February, 3 per cent. each to Enteritis and Bronchitis, and 2 per cent. each to Diarrhæs and Anchylostomiasis. Out of the 4 deaths from Cancer in all the towns, 3 were registered in the city during the month. The total number of deaths from Plague was 29, against 71 in March and 32 in February.

11. Injectious Diseases reported.—The most prevalent infectious disease during the month was Phthisis, of which 75 cases were reported (62 in Colombo), followed by Chickenpox 68 (36 in Colombo, 6 in Moratuwa, 5 in Gampola), Whooping Cough 67 (all except 1 in Trincomalee), Plague 45 (in Colombo), Enteric Fever 23 (12 in Colombo, 5 in Moratuwa), Continued Fever 9 (7 in Colombo), Measles 9 (4 in Colombo), Mumps 6 (in Colombo), Smallpox 3 (in Colombo), Dysentery 2 (in Galle), and Diarrhea 2 (1 in Moratuwa and 1 in Kandy).

Meteorology.

12. Rainfall.—Ratnapura recorded the highest rainfall (11.50 inches), followed by Gampola (8.91 inches). In the other towns the rainfall ranged from 8.89 inches in Kalutara to 0.30 inch in Jaffna.

13. Temperature.—The mean temperature varied from 59.8° in Nuwara Eliya to 87.4° in Mannar, and was 82.8°

in Colombo.
