MUNICIPALITY OF COLOMBO.

Minutes of Proceedings of a General Meeting of the Municipal Council of Colombo held in the Town Hall on Friday, March 27, 1914.

THE Council met this day at 3 P.M., pursuant to notice dated March 20, 1914.

Present:—Mr. R. W. Byrde, Chairman; Mr. C. P. Dias; the Hon. Sir Alkan Perry, Kt.; Mr. L. B. Fernando; Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader; Mr. Arthur Alvis; Mr. H. L. de Mel; Mr. E. G. Jayewardene; Dr. David Rockwood; Mr. A. J. Martin; Dr. D. P. Banajee; Dr. E. V. Ratnam; Dr. W. P. Rodrigo; the Hon. Mr. T. H. Chapman; Mr. G. Lionel Cox; Mr. J. A. Perera; Major W. N. Robinson; and Mr. W. C. S. Ingles.

The Minutes of the General Meeting of February 20, 1914, having been printed, and a copy thereof having been sent to each member of Council, were taken as read, the entry in regard to a motion which was not seconded, appearing under item No. 9 of the Minutes of the General Meeting of February 20, 1914, being deleted on its being brought to the notice of the Chairman by Mr. J. A. Perera.

Resolved-That the Minutes of the General Meeting of February 20, 1914, be confirmed as corrected. The Chairman, with the leave of Council, made the following statement in connection with plague :-

Statement re Plague.

When I last addressed you on February 20, the number of cases of plague was 30, all of which had proved fatal. The cases registered to the 25th instant, inclusive, number 100, resulting in 88 deaths and 12 recoveries. Of these, 71 cases were septicæmic, from which there was no recovery; 29 cases were of the bubonic type; of these there were 12 recoveries with 17 deaths, giving a 58 5 per cent. bubonic case mortality.

288 eases of fever have been inquired into by the Public Health Department.

120 of these were sent to the Infectious Diseases Hospital; 46 of these cases were notified as positive cases of plague.

17 of these cases resulted in death, but gave negative plague results—from this we cannot conclude positively that they were not plague.

37 cases were discharged as recovered from fever, not plague. 2 cases are still under observation.

The average since the outbreak stands at only 1.66 per day, which speaks volumes for the work of prevention which has been vigorously carried on by Dr. Marshall Philip and his staff. The areas attacked are :-

(1) The Sea Street Area (embracing the Pettah and St. Paul's Wards and reaching to San Sebastian).—It was here, as you no doubt remember, I told you that the plague first broke out, and where the conditions are such that it will no doubt stay.

(2) Slave Island.—Plague first appeared here on February 9 and 20; it was no doubt brought from Sea street; dead rats were found; energetic steps were taken; patients were removed to the Infectious Diseases Hospital; the contacts were segregated; and the houses were evacuated and thoroughly disinfected. There were 10 cases in all.

No case has occurred since March 12. This is a triumph for the Health Department. I am sorry, however, to inform you that the rats are infected, so we must not be surprised if there is an outbreak again at

at any time.

(3) Piachaud's lane, Maradana.—Here, there was a sharp outbreak, but it was met by vigorous measures on the lines indicated before. There have been no fresh cases since March 19. Another success for the medical staff.

The disease still continues to be sporadio. The type is septicamic as a rule, but the bacillus is becoming attenuated and somewhat less virulent. There are more cases with bubonic symptoms, and there have been, as I stated, as many as 12 recoveries.

It has been interesting to watch the way in which the disease has spread. Dr. Marshall Philip, with wonderful

prescience, told me the track along which he believed it would spread. His forecast has been verified in every detail.

The disease has picked out the insanitary areas, leaving the sanitary ones untouched. The more insanitary The more insanitary the the quarter, the more virulent the plague. It finds a home in houses where there is a want of light, of air, of ventilationquarters where the houses are closely packed together, where there are rooms without windows—cubicles partitioned off into narrow and confined spaces: riddled with rats holes; where dirt abounds and where the light of the sun never penetrates. -cubicles partitioned off

Ah! Gentlemen, the irony of it all is not so much that such places should exist, but that the state of the Municipal laws should be such that the officers of the Council, in spite of their efforts, have been powerless to prevent such spots being

ereated, and are powerless to cause them to cease to exist.

It is not pleasant to contemplate what will be the future of the city. The population is increasing at a rapid rate—something between 20 to 30 per cent. in a decade. The railway has been opened to India. There is every prospect of

an influx in population and a consequent further overcrowding.

At the outset the general attitude towards plague was decidedly sceptical. People did not believe plague was here.

Now, in great measures, they are convinced, but there are still some who think that it cannot be the same plague as they have in India. The reason they adduce for it is that the mortality here is so very far below what it is in India in such

places as Bombay.

Let me sound a note of warning. The disease is plague—it is a virulent type of plague. It strikes silently; it wiftly. We have so far checked it, simply and solely by strenuous efforts, by the devoted and never-tiring zeal of kills swiftly. Dr. Marshall Philip and his staff. How long they will continue to hold it in check, I cannot say. The prospect before us is not a bright one. But I would ask every man who values the public welfare of this city to support to his utmost the efforts which are being made to check the spread of the disease. We are face to face with a grave danger to the public health, and it behoves every single person to assist to his utmost to prevent such a mortality as exists in Bombay and other Indian cities occurring here. So far plague here is sporadic, let us prevent it becoming endemic.

There must be no relaxation of our precautions in-

The isolation of the sick by removal to the hospital.

(2) Segregation of contacts.

There is opposition to both of these, but I am satisfied that they must be carried out. In the interests of the public health, the individual must conform to rules which are enforced for the common good. Each case is in itself a source of danger. Each case forms a fresh focus from which the disease may spread. Complete evacuation of the infected house is necessary in order that it may be throughly disinfected and, if possible, the roof removed.

Even the best scientists will admit that they do not know all the ways in which plague is spread. One thing is known, that is, that rat fleas do convey it, but it cannot be said that they are the one and only source of infection. medical man would venture to risk his reputation in laying down the dictum that isolation and segregation are useless.

So far by adopting these methods we have held the plague in check, and they are going to be carried on in future. Several representations have been made to me from time to time by different sections of the Muhammadan community. They express the wish that they might have a hospital of their own. After consideration I informed them that I was prepared to accede to their wishes, and that they could have a site at Kolonnawa. On this they can erect their own temporary hospital and their own segregation camp. Since I made my communication I have heard no more from them on the subject. But last Saturday a petition from the Muhammadans of New Bazaar, which had or ginally been addressed to the Chairman of the Plague Committee, was brought to me as the proper person to whom it should have been addressed. I found that not a single word was said in it about the provision of a temporary hospital for the community.

It contained:

(a) Statements with regard to the religious ceremonies to be performed on the death and burial of a Muhammadan, all of which I am pleased to say have been and are being performed.

(b) Certain statements with regard to post-mortem examinations. These are not under my control, but

their wishes will no doubt be met as far as the interests of justice will permit.

(c) There were also objections to the removal of plague patients to the Infectious Diseases Hospital, and objections to segregation. I consider that both of these are absolutely necessary in the interests of public health, and I intend to see them carried out.

It is of course open for a discretion to be exercised in very exceptional cases, but I may state that any variation would only be made in very rare cases, and that only on the Medical Officer of Health being of opinion that there was no danger to the public health.

I may inform you that I am given to understand that there is special accommodation in the Infectious Diseases

When maden women.

Hospital for Muhammadans and a special ward for Muhammadan women.

With regard to the segregation of contacts, it is as well for me to say a word or two, as there appears to be some misconception as to what it actually means. This Council has provided a segration camp in which accommodation consisting of cadjan lines is supplied, and where the inmates are given 50 cents a day for provisions which they buy for themselves at a shop in the camp. The spot is a cool and airy one, and the site is well adapted to its use.

1,023 persons have been admitted and, as far as I know, everybody who has been in it speaks well of it, and no complaints have been received. On the 25th instant there were 22 contacts in the camp. The accommodation which this Council has supplied at the camp is limited in its nature. Therefore persons who can obtain a suitable non-infected house are and have been permitted to spend their time of secrecation there on condition that they pay for the police grand.

Council has supplied at the camp is limited in its nature. Therefore persons who can obtain a suitable non-injected induse are and have been permitted to spend their time of segregation there on condition that they pay for the police guard. It is only in cases where such a house is not provided that contacts are removed to the camp.

If the Muhammadan community as a whole really has an objection to removal to the Infectious Diseases Hospital and to the segregation camp, they have an easy solution out of the difficulty. It is open to them to erect their own temporary hospital and their own segregation camp, to staff them and maintain them, subject of course to supervision and control. Here is an opportunity, waiting for one or more philanthropic persons, and, gentlemen, I should be pleased to see some such persons rise to the occasion, come forward, and carry out the work.

Inoculation.—We established three Depôts where inoculation, free of charge, is carried out. I am sorry to say, the citizens of Colombo have failed to take advantage of this means of rendering themselves immune from attack. Only 322

persons have been inoculated.

A scare was spread among the Tamil population that inoculation was compulsory. It led to an exodus of the cooly class, and much hampered the work of the city. Our Works Engineer had an extremely anxious time, but happily succeeded in averting any calamity. He finds that a number of his men have returned, and that he is now carrying on his services satisfactorily.

No person can say that I hold a brief for inoculation; so my words, gentlemen, will have all the greater weight when I say that I recommend every person to be inoculated.

Rat Destruction and Rats. I am sorry to say that the disease among rats has spread to most parts of the city. The organization of the department for the destruction of rats has been very ably carried out by Dr. Milne. He reorganized the whole system. There was naturally the usual opposition, but he overcame it, and has been darrying on the work by-

(1) Trapping.—700 traps are in use. There are seven trapping gangs which operate in particular areas, specially allotted to them by Dr. Milne.

(2) Poisoning.—There are six overseers and twelve coolies employed on this work. They distribute 9,000 baits a day in areas selected by Dr. Milne. Baits which are not carried away by the rats are collected.

(3) Payment of 5 cents for each rat is made to the public. Arrangements have been made with the Police authorities whereby a depot is established at each police station. The fact has been notified in every possible way and proclaimed by beat of tom-tom.

Rats are selected, labelled, and sent by Dr. Milne to the Bacteriologist to see whether they are plague infected or not. I am afraid that rat destruction does wound the susceptibilities of some persons, notably the Buddhists, but we have to realize that the plague-infected rat is a source of danger to human life, and that in order to protect human life rat life must be destroyed.

We have discontinued the use of the Clayton disinfector, and it has been returned to the harbour. The Clayton

manuals which have been ordered cannot be expected to arrive for some time yet.

-Freshly imported rice is being stored at the Customs premises. Rice from local stores has for a time been sunned at the yard near the Harbour Engineer's Office, and is now being sunned at the Racquet Court.

The grain stores at the Pettah area are being made sanitary.

The new system has its advantages, and is appreciated by grain merchants, as there is a saving on cartage and of the long delay at the Railway yard.

Infectious Diseases Hospital.—It is the duty of this Council to erect a permanent Infectious Diseases Hospital

So far this Council has not performed that duty.

I find that as far back as 1914, on a representation of Sir Allan Perry, the Principal Civil Medical Officer, pointing out the unsatisfactory nature of the buildings of the then Infectious Diseases Hospital, the Government invited the Municipal

Council to take action and to provide a suitable hospital for infectious diseases.

This Council has not yet provided a permanent hospital, but has continued to avail itself of the temporary hospital which is maintained and controlled by Government. No contribution is made by this Council beyond its having in 1912 paid a sum of Rs. 6,000 as half the cost of renovating the hospital. As this Council does not contribute towards the ordinary expenses of maintenance it cannot naturally have any voice in the control. The failure of the Council to supply a permanent hospital is due to unavoidable circumstances, viz., to the want of funds. I am glad to say that Mr. de Mel is to-day proposing a sensible and practical motion. So far this Council and its members have concurred in the arrangement, and have taken full advantage of the Government assistance, but I am sorry to say that from the list of questions before me to-day I see that some of them are violating the principles contained in an old adage that "You should not look a gift horse in the mouth.'

I was pleased to hear that Mr. de Mel and Mr. J. A. Perera attempted to allay the scare against inoculation by reassuring the persons in their wards that inoculation is not compulsory, and that they tried to induce them to take all steps necessary for protecting themselves against plague.

I have, as far as possible, encouraged the holding of religious ceremonies, as such I am convinced go a long way to establishing confidence and reassurance. The Roman Catholics have been permitted to have their street processions; the Buddhists are having their pinkama in Price park; and the Muhammadans in Slave Island have been given permits by the police to have their prayers and processions.

In conclusion, I must say that I cannot praise too highly the devoted service of Dr. Marshall Philip and his staff. They have laboured untiringly and unceasingly in spite of obstruction and opposition. Their efforts have met with success. It is due to those efforts that the disease has so far been held in check. Compare the state of this city to that existing in Bombay. There the plague has got a hold. If it had not been for the efforts of Dr. Marshall Philip and his staff, I am convinced that a similar state of affairs would have arisen here, and that instead of having only a hundred deaths, we should have had a thousand. Some people would ask us to relax our efforts. In the interest of public health, I say no. I look to you for support. As for me I shall continue to see that such states are nected as are described as are content. I look to you for support. As for me I shall continue to see that such steps are enforced as are best calculated to protect the public health.

- Pursuant to notice, Dr. W. P. Rodrigo asked the Chairman the following questions. The Chairman replied to them seriatim as follows:-
- Q. 1.—Who is the present Medical Officer in charge of the Infectious Diseases Hospital? What are his qualifications and how long has he been in medical practice ?

A.—I do not know.

Q. 2.—Has the Chairman been to this hospital since the outbreak of 1.lague?

- A.—No, it is not a hospital which has been placed under my control by this Council.

 Q. 3.—Are these descriptions of this hospital by Sir Henry Blake and the late Mayor, Mr. Horsburgh, respectively, viz., "As a hospital I consider it a disgrace to any Colony. The cadian wards have earther floors which become damp and ME; "As a hospital I consider it a disgrace to any colony. The cacien wards have earmen more which become damp and middy in wet weather Everything is squalid to the last degree On the whole this is the worst possible hospital that I have ever seen in my long experience," &c. "As a hospital for infectious diseases it appears to be about the worst possible" still applicable to this institution? How many wards are there in this hospital for pauper patients—male and female; for paying patients—male and female? How many beds are there in each Ward? Are there any special wards set apart for female patients of the Muhammadan community? In case of an outbreak of another infectious disease has a provincious bear made for the transferrence of those patients in sense to words. has provision been made for the treatment of those patients in separate wards?
- A.—I do not know. I understand that there is a separate ward for female patients of the Muhammadan community. I find that in 1912, the Government forwarded an estimate for Rs. 12,000 for renovating the Infectious Diseases Hospital, and that this Council contributed half the cost, the other half being provided by Government. So, I should consider that the remarks mentioned do not apply to the hospital as at present constructed.

Q. 4.—What is the full strength of the qualified nursing staff? How many attendants are there of each sex? Of these nurses and attendants, how many are on duty during the day and how many during the night? nature of the supervision exercised over this staff, i.e., over the Medical Officer, nurses, and attendants?

A .- I do not know. This is not an institution under my control.

Q. 5.—Is it true that some patients have escaped from the Infectious Diseases Hospital? If so, how many, and how many of these have been rehabilitated?

A.—Not to my knowledge.

Q. 6.—Could the Chairman describe in brief the nature of the treatment adopted in the Infectious Diseases Hospital with regard to plague cases?

A.—The Chairman cannot do so. The hospital is not a Municipal hospital.

Q. 7.—How many patients have been sent to the Infectious Diseases Hospital from this city supposed to be suffering from plague? In how many of these cases was the diagnosis of plague confirmed, and how? What was the diagnosis in the rest?

-(a) 102 cases were sent to the Infectious Diseases Hospital.

(b) 46 were subsequently notified as plague.

(c) 37 were discharged as recovered from fever, not plague. (d) 17 died, but gave negative plague results; cause not given.

(e) 2 cases are under observation.

Q. 8.—How many deaths have there been in the hospital (Infectious Diseases Hospital) of cases sent for plague, and was the diagnosis confirmed by bacteriological tests in every case?

A.—35 died of plague, 11 recovered. I am unable to say whether the diagnosis was confirmed by bacteriological

Q. 9,—Are the services of the Municipal Bacteriologist requisitioned in the diagnosis of cases sent to the hospital, and if not, why not?

A.—No. He is a Municipal Officer, and not a Government Servant.

Q. 10.—If perchance cases other than plague were by mistake or carelessness sent to the Infectious Diseases Hospital, what precautions are taken there to establish a correct diagnosis, and if such were impossible at the beginning, what precautions are taken to prevent these cases getting the plague from the patients in the hospital and dying of plague subsequently?

A.—The hospital is not a hospital belonging to this Council, and the Chairman of this Council is therefore not in a

position to inform you.

Q. 11.—Can a patient, who has had the misfortune to be sent to the Infectious Diseases Hospital for plague, get himself treated by his private medical attendant? Have any patients, or their friends on their behalf, applied either to the Government or to the Chairman to be allowed to have themselves treated by their vedaralas? If so, how have such applications been treated? If not, how will such an application be treated?

A.—On one or two occasions I have written to Sir Allan Perry, on behalf of Dr. Ratnam, to ask that he might be permitted to see the Medical Officer in charge in consultation. As far as I can say he was granted a consultation. I referred him to the Principal Civil vedorala of Maradana did write and ask to be allowed to treat plague patients.

vederala of Maradana did write and ask to be allowed to treat plague patients. I referred him to the Principal Civil Medical Officer. I should certainly expect that such applications would be refused.

Q. 12.—Can the Chairman tell this Council at what stage the scheme for building the new Infectious Diseases Hospital has now arrived? Has the Secretary of State sanctioned a loan for this purpose? Have the plans been completed and approved by Covernment? And if so, what is the delay actually due to? To what extent is the Government going to help this Council in the matter of the building of a new Infectious Diseases Hospital?

A.—The scheme has not reached any stage. It is at present in nubibus. The Secretary of State has not sanctioned a loan. The plans have not been submitted to and approved of by Government. The delay is due to the Council not having the money. According to present conditions Government is going to help the Council to no extent at all. The Council has acquired 48 acres for a site. Government paid a half of the cost of acquisition.

Public Health Department.

Q. 1.—What are the measures adopted by this Department with regard to the suppression of plague in this city? -House to house inspection; detention in house under observation; removal to hospital in cases of actual or suspected plague; segregation of contacts; disinfection of houses; filling up of rat holes; cleansing of premises; destruction of rats; free inoculation; evacuation of infected houses; fumigation of rat runs.

Q. 2.—How are cases of suspected plague found out in ordinary routine?

By house to house inspection and by information received from the Police, the Registrar, and householders. Q. 3.—In their daily rounds of inspection, what do the Inspectors do when they come across a patient suffering from (a) fever unattended with the other symptoms, (b) fever attended with other symptoms, e.g., congestion of the lungs?

A.—They call in one of the Medical Officers of Health.

- Q. 4.—What do the Medical Officers of Health do when they come on the scene? A.—A Medical Officer of Health examines the case. If he is of opinion that the symptoms point to plague, he orders removal to the Infectious Diseases Hospital. If he is doubtful, the house is left under police guard, and he pays another
- -What precautions do they take to prevent other cases than plague from being sent to the Infectious Diseases Hospital?

A.—By examining the patient, and, if in doubt, keeping him under observation.

Q. 6.—When a case of fever is sent to the hospital on suspicion, what is done with the other inmates of the house? Are they invariably sent to the segregation camp, or, if there is an exception, what conditions are considered necessary preliminary to such exemption?

A.--The inmates are sent to the camp unless they can provide some non-infected house, where they can remain

under a police guard for which they pay.

Q. 7.—What was the practice adopted in regard to the inmates of 186, Sea street? If contacts from this house were not sent to the segregation camp, why? And what was done with them, and if segregated elsewhere, what measures are sent to the segregation camp, why? And what was done with them, and if segregated elsewhere, what measures are sent to the segregation camp, why? And what was done with them, and if segregated elsewhere, what measures are sent to the pay. were adopted to protect the city from infection spreading through them? Was there any medical supervision, and if so, how often were they seen by a Medical Officer?

A.—186, Sea street, was not a plague infected house. No person acquired infection there. Two persons were found in the train with fever: one came from 186, the other from 1st Cross street. They were taken by the Inspector to 186, Sea street, and were kept for a short time under observation. The man from 186, Sea street, had not plague symptoms, and was discharged. The man from 1st Cross street was removed to the Infectious Diseases Hospital and died of plague:

House 186, Sea street, was not an infected house, and no contacts were removed.

Q. 8.—How many cases of similar exemption were there before this, and under what circumstances? There were no cases with similar circumstances.

Q. 9.—How many contacts have been sent to the segregation camp since the first discovery of plague in Colombo? How many of these developed plague in the camp and how many after their discharge?

A.—1,201. There were three cases of plague which occurred immediately on admission. No person developed

the disease after discharge. They were sent back to clean and disinfected houses.

Q. 10.—Has the Chairman considered my suggestion of isolating contacts in other places than the segregation camp and placing them under strict police supervision and medical surveillance and, if so, and, if favourably, will the Chairman be good enough to notify to the public the conditions under which such outside segregation will be allowed, so that this exemption may not be construed by the contacts as a special act of grace on the part of the officers of the Public Health Department for which they may feel morally under obligation?

A.—I have no recollection of such a suggestion being made by you. This has always been done in past epidemics,

and is being done in this one.

Q. 11.—Will the Chairman be good enough to give a concise description of the segregation camp, especially with regard to the number, extent, and nature of the buildings. Whether members of each family are allowed to live together or separated in wards according to sex; whether all classes of people are given the same kind of accommodation; what provision is there for isolating contacts from the house of a well-to-do resident? What is the period of isolation of contacts, and after that period are they allowed to go back to the infectious house?

With leave of the Council, Dr. Rodrigo withdrew the above words appearing in italics.

A.—There are 153 rooms in rows of 10 or 20 to accommodate 459 contacts or possibly 600. They are cadjan buildings, and the contacts are allowed to select their own huts and disperse themselves as they please. All are given the same accommodation as a rule. A family can live together. Well-to-do residents are not sent there if they can get a non-infected house and pay for a police guard.

With leave of the Council, Dr. Rodrigo withdrew question No. 12.

Q. 13.—Is it a fact that officers of the Public Health Department do not even allow friends of the patient to help them into the ambulance?

A.—Friends are allowed, and generally volunteer their help.

Q 14.—Is there any destruction of goods in infected houses, and, if so, are the owners remunerated ? A.—Yes. With money.

With leave of the Council, Dr. Rodrigo withdrew question No. 15.

With leave of the Council, Dr. Ratnam withdrew all the questions standing in his name with the exception of the following question No. 9:

Q. 9.—Since death is due to heart failure, is it not likely that removal will be dangerous to the patient?

A.—I should say not, but in any case the danger to the individual by removal is not commensurate with the danger

to the public if he were not removed.

5. Pursuant to notice, Mr. H. L. de Mel moved that the building of the proposed Infectious Diseases Hospital at Kolonnawa be put in hand at an early date as a work of urgent necessity, that Government be requested to advance the necessary funds pending the recommendation of the Municipal Commission on financial adjustment between Government and this Council, and that the Standing Committees on Finance and Sanitation be fully empowered to take all further steps; and added with leave of Council that the Hon. Sir Allan Perry, Kt., and the Hon. Mr. T. H. Chapman be requested to assist the Committees. Dr. David Rockwood seconded.

The Hon. Sir Allan Perry supported the motion, which was carried unanimously.

Mr. Jayewardene requested, with leave of the Council, that the motions cognate to the subject previously under discussion, namely, plague, be taken up first before he proceeds with his motions.

The Chairman thereupon called on Dr. Rodrigo to put his motion.

7. Pursuant to notice, Dr. W. P. Rodrigo moved:—(1) That this Council has no confidence in the administration of the Infectious Diseases Hospital by the Civil Medical Department, and deeply regrets the necessity there is of sending the unfortunate citizens of this city, stricken with plague, to it.

Mr. Arthur Alvis rose to a point of order and stated that in view of the statement made by the Chairman that the Infectious Diseases Hospital is not a Municipal institution, he asked for a ruling from the Chair as to whether the Member for Wellawatta should be allowed to put his motion.

The Chairman ruled that, as it was merely expression of opinion which Dr. Rodrigo wished to elicit, the motion was in order. Dr. E. V. Ratnam seconded the motion.

Dr. David Rockwood said that he had visited the Infectious Diseases Hospital, and found there were 12 wards for pauper patients and 12 beds for paying patients in a building of brick and mortar, with lavatories, loungers, iron beds, &c. Besides, there was special accommodation I rovided for Muhammadan patients.

The Chairman pointed out that if the Council did pass the motion, it would amount to a vote of "no confidence"

in the Council itself and in the members composing it.

The motion was then put to the meeting, and on a show of hands being taken the motion was declared lost, 2 voting for it and 16 against.

(2) Pursuant to notice, Dr. W. P. Rodrigo moved that Government be respectfully asked (a) to appoint three honorary visitors to the Infectious Diseases Hospital, nominated by this Council; (b) to furnish this Council with a return, on a form similar to the one annexed, showing the number of patients so far admitted for plague, and continue to favour this Council with similar returns weekly as long as plague exists in this city.—Mr. C. P. Dias seconded. Carried unanimously.

The Council next reverted to Mr. E. G. Jayewardene's motions under item 6 of the Agenda.

The Chairman said that if a cleansing gang were sent to Maligawatta, the other parts of the city would claim the

same attention.

L. de Mel seconded.—Carried.

MUNICIPALITY OF KANDY.

Minutes of Proceedings of a Meeting of the Municipal Council of Kandy held in the Town Hall, Kandy, on March 21, 1914, at 8.30 a.m., in accordance with Notice dated March 17, 1914.

Present: The Hon. Mr. C. S. Vaughan, Chairman; Mr. E. Beven; Mr. L. H. S. Pieris; Mr. E. L. Wijegoonewardene;

Mr. D. E. Weerasuriya; Mr. C. A. LaBrooy; Dr. Allan de Saram; and Mr. H. F. Tomalin.

1. The Minutes of Proceedings of the Meeting held on February 21 having been previously submitted to the Chairman for his approval, and a copy thereof furnished to each Member, were taken as read and confirmed by the Chairman.

2. The following documents were submitted:-

(a) Statement of Receipts and Expenditure from close of 1913 to February 28, 1914, on account of the Municipal Fund, comprising the (No. 1) General Revenue and Consolidated Rate (Police and Lighting) and (No. 2) Water Rate accounts.

(b) Progress Report of Works brought up to the same date.

(c) Health Officer's report for February.

(d) Statement of Cases instituted by the several Inspectors and of Work done by the Municipal Magistrate during the month of February.

(e) The Reservoir Readings for February.

Resolved-That the several statements, together with the Minutes of Proceedings of this Meeting, as required by section 83 of the Municipal Councils Ordinance, No. 6 of 1910, and the Health Officer's report, be forwarded to the Colonial's Secretary for publication in the Government Gazette.

3. The following papers were laid on the table :—Reports by the several Inspectors on Laundries, Bakeries, Dairies.

Standpipes, and House Service Taps inspected during February.

4. Correspondence :-

Letter of February 20, 1914, from the Hon. the Government Agent, Central Province, to the Hon, the Colonial Secretary re the proposed bridge over the river at Lewella for the information of the Council.—Read.

5. Pursuant to notice Mr. LaBrooy moved—That six night watchers be appointed to detect and prevent the commission of nuisance in the town.—Mr. Weerasooriya seconded.

The Chairman suggested the appointment of a reduced number for certain defined sections.

It was agreed that four night watchers be appointed from April 1, 1914, for 3 months at Rs. 15 each per mensem, and that an estimate for lighting each public latrine be prepared and submitted to the Works Committee.

6. Application of January 19 from the Provincial Engineer, Central Province, for permission towork a quarry in Municipal land at Bogambara.

Resolved—That permission be allowed on the terms already agreed upon.

7. Papers re the granting of 6 months' leave to Mr. G. E. Mutukisna, the Chief Clerk of the Municipal Office.

Resolved—That 6 months' full-pay leave and 3 months' half-pay leave be granted, and a substitute be engaged on Rs. 75 a month. The full-pay leave expired on March 20, 1914.

8. Report of the Special Committee appointed to consider what steps should be taken to give effect to the

recommendations of the Sanitation Committee re the re-organization of the Health Department. On the Chairman's motion the Council went into Committee.

It was agreed to reduce the inclusive commuted allowance from Rs. 50 to Rs. 40 a month.

The Council resumed, Mr. LaBrooy moved—"That the report as amended be adopted, and that Mr. Grenier be appointed Sanitary Superintendent in 6 months' time on the arrival of the trained Inspectors."—Mr. Beven seconded.

Mr. Tomalin moved as an amendment—"That Mr. Grenier be appointed Sanitary Superintendent in 6 months'

time on the arrival of the trained Inspectors, on 6 months' probation, and that on his taking up the appointment on probation his appointment as Assistant to the Superintendent of Works should terminate."—Mr. Weerasooriya seconded.

The amendment was put to the Meeting and carried by 6 to 2. Ayes:—The Chairman; Mr. Tomalin; Mr. Weerasooria; Mr. Wijegoonewardene; Mr. Pieris; Dr. de Saram. Noes:—Mr. LaBrooy; Mr. Beven.

The Council also approved of the terms of the notice calling for candidates,

Health Officer's Report for the Month of March, 1914.

Scavenging.—Satisfactory.

Water Supply.—Good.

Drainage.—The drains were flushed and kept clean.

Alleys.—These were kept in as sanitary a state as possible.

Bakeries.—Fairly well kept. Eating-houses.—Fairly well kept.

Public Market.—Clean and well kept.

Slaughter-house.—Clean and well kept.

Staughter-house.—Clean and well kept.

Night Soil Depôt.—Well kept.

Public Latrines.—Fairly well kept.

Food Supply.—Good. During the month 538 cattle, 105 buffaloes, 105 sheep, and 363 goats were passed. Eight head of cattle, 2 buffaloes, and 5 goats were rejected. Two livers and 3 lungs of cattle, 10 livers and 1 lung of buffaloes, 3 livers and 2 lungs of sheep, and 6 livers and 29 lungs of goats were condemned and destroyed.

Public Health.—The health of the town during the month was good. Eight cases of chickenpox and 1 case of

continued fever were reported.

Rabies.—The brain of suspected dog was sent to the Government Bacteriologist for examination.

Plague.—A man is still placed at the Kandy Railway Station to report any suspicious case. The campaign against rats is still being carried out; rats are continually examined, but so far no case of plague amongst them has been detected. 

"Improvements in and relating to apparatus for coagulating, smoking, and manufacturing rubber."

Abstract.—The inventor states:—

This invention has for its object to provide apparatus whereby rubber latex may be coagulated, cured, smoked, dried, and formed into a marketable product preferably in one operation by one machine and in such a manner that the use of chemicals, acids, and the mixing of live steam with the latex to induce coagulation may be avoided, and to provide that the machine for this purpose may be readily added to and enlarged as the output of an estate increases without the necessity of making any material alterations or putting the machine out of work in order to add to its capacity.

Now according to the present invention the rubber latex is heated and conducted on to a collecting roller arranged to rotate in a smoke chamber in such a manner that the rubber coagulates and forms a mass on the roller. may be provided to rotate parallel to the collecting roller, this second roller being heated by steam or the like and pressed in contact with the collecting roller. The two rollers are rotated in contact one with the other and the hot latex is conducted thereto in such a manner that it collects in one or both of the rollers in the form of a cylinder.

The manner in which this machine works is as follows:

The latex, direct from the fields, is poured through suitable strainers into the reservoirs and feeders. Its température is then raised by means of the heating apparatus to from 95° to 113° Fahr, by which the latex is purified and the enzymes it contains killed. It is then allowed to slowly run through the conduit to the interior of the smoking chamber where it flows upon and over the distributor, receiving on its way any further heat it may require to ensure coagulation.

The distributor spreads the latex out into a wide thin stream which gently flows against the rubber collecting roller at the point where it comes into contact with the heating roller, which in its turn maintains the temperature at the

coagulating point.

The rubber collecting roller revolves upwards from the line of contact between the two rollers and a thin layer of latex on the point of coagulation adheres to its circumference as it revolves, each revolution adding another thin layer on to the one beneath until such time as the latex in the reservoir is exhausted and the block or roll of rubber has attained its pre-determined diameter and weight.

Immediately the latex enters the smoking chamber it comes into thorough contact with the smoke permeating the chamber, so that during its progress over the distributor and whilst adhering to the collecting rollers it is being thoroughly

impregnated with the smoke and well cured.

As the coagulated layers are added to the rubber collecting rollers at every revolution they are being pressed and rolled by the warm roller and the moisture is thus driven out, which moisture is absorbed and carried off by the constantly changing and circulating smoke so that a dry atmosphere is maintained inside the smoke change r.

The rate of flow of the latex may be increased in proportion as the diameter of the collecting roller increased, and in addition both the flow of the latex and the speed of the roller may be increased as the diameter of the collecting roller increases, that is, the rate of flow is proportional to the square of and the rate of speed proportional to the diameter.

It is evident the rubber latex may be delivered on to the internal and heated surface of a collecting roller, and in such

case the above mentioned increases of speed will be decreases.

When the blocks or rolls of rubber in a smoke chamber are completed the hermetically closed door is op ned and the rolls removed on the rubber collecting roller. The catch or other device securing the covering material to the roller is then released and the roller withdrawn for further use, the covering material can then be pulled out of the centre hole in the rubber and there remains a cylinder of solid hard smoked dry rubber of the weight and size desired.

Suitable traps, valves, and bye-passes are provided, so that any chamber or chambers may be cut out of the smoke

circuit without otherwise interfering with the constant working of the whole machine.

The claims are :--

1. In an apparatus for coagulating rubber latex, means for distributing the latex on to one or more collecting rollers and means for revolving the said collecting roller or rollers in a smoke chamber substantially as described and illustrated.

2. In an apparatus for coagulating rubber latex, one or more rotary collecting rollers mounted in a smoke chamber so that the collecting surface or surfaces are exposed to the contained smoke substantially as described and illustrated, and

means substantially as described and illustrated for distributing the latex on the said collecting roller or rollers.

3. In an apparatus for coagulating rubber latex, one or more rotary collecting rollers mounted in a smoke chamber so that the collecting surface or surfaces are exposed to the contained smoke, means for distributing the latex on the said roller or rollers, and means substantially as described and illustrated for heating the collecting surface or surfaces of the collecting roller or rollers.

4. In an apparatus for coagulating rubber latex, one or more collecting rollers slidably mounted in guides in a smoke chamber so that the collecting surface or surfaces are exposed to the contained smoke, one or more heating and driving rollers against which the collecting roller or rollers is or are pressed, and means for distributing the latex on to the distributing roller or rollers above the point of contact of the said rollers and upon an upwardly moving portion of the roller or rollers substantially as described and illustrated.

5. The improved apparatus and means for the treatment of rubber latex substantially as described with reference

to the drawings.

- (15) Eighteen kurunies of paddy sowing extent of the field called Patiranagedeniya, in extent 1 amunam of paddy at ditto.
- (16) Thirty kurunies of paddy sowing extent of the field called Nawagamakumbura, in extent 2 amunam of paddy, at ditto.
- (17) One-half share of the soil and fruit trees of the garden called Polgahakoratuwa alias Padinchiwasitiyagedarawatta; in extent 4 kurunies of kurakkan, at ditto.

- (18) One-half share of the 3 of the land called Patiranagedeniyeatmaga, in extent about 2 kurunies of kurakkan, at

- (22) One-fourth share of the soil and fruit trees of the garden called Kuttigalahenewatta, in extent 3 kurunies of kurakkan, at ditto.
- (23) One-half share of the field called Kammalakira, in extent 1 amunam of paddy, at Nihiluwa

(24) One-half share of the field called Narayagodayakumbura, in extent 3 pelas of paddy sowing, at Nihiluwa.

(25) The field called and known as Mullepaspela, in extent 1 amunam and 12 kurunies of paddy sowing, at ditto.

(26) Three-fourth share of the field called Kongahapaspela, at ditto.

(27) Sixteen kurunies of paddy sowing extent of Webada-

kumbura, in extent I amunam of paddy, at ditto.

(28) Two-third share of the garden called Sudugahakoratuwa alias Indiketiyewatta, in extent 1 kuruni of kurakkan, at ditto, inclusive of the planter's ½ share thereof.

(29) One-half share of the extensive land called and known as Buweliara, in extent 322 acres and 6 perches, situated at Gonadeniya.

(30) One-half of \(\frac{3}{2} \) share of the soil and fruit trees of the garden called Bogahawatta, in extent about 12 kurunies of kurakkan sowing, at Nihiluwa.

(37) One-fortieth share of the soiland of the fruit trees of the garden called Mahawatta, in extent about 6 kurunies of kurakkan, at Nihiluwa.

(38) One-fortieth share of the soil and of the fruit trees of the garden called Urapolagewatta, in extent 4 kurunies of kurakkan sowing, at ditto.

(39) One-fortieth share of the soil and fruit trees of the garden called Urumuttagewatta, in extent about 3 kurunies of kurakkan sowing, at ditto.

(40) One-fortieth share of the soil and of the fruit trees of the land called Tittalabbawehena, in extent 6 kurunies of kurakkan, at ditto.

(41) One-third share of the field called Pandeniya, in

extent 3 amunams of paddy, at ditto.
(42) The field called Mahadeniya and Handugodayadeniya, in extent 6 pelas of paddy and the 3 atmagas appearing thereto at Udugalmote.

(43) One-fourth share of Katukomehenewatta, in extent

I kuruni of kurakkan.

(44) One-sixth share of the soil and 7/48 share of the plantations of Gederawatta, in extent 5 kurunies of kurakkan.

(45) One-fourth share of the land Kekirihenewatta, in extent 5 kurunies of kurakkan.

(46) One-sixth share of the field called Ratambalagahadeniya, in extent 2 pelas of paddy.

(47) One-twentieth share of the soil and of the 1st plantation and 1/40 share of the 2nd plantation of the land Ganegodagewatta, in extent 5 kurunies of kurakkan.

(48) One-twentieth share of Weralugahamulana, in extent

3 pelas of paddy.
(49) The whole of the land called Pallegurugewatta alias Kurugamagewatta alias Jambugahakoratuwa, in extent 1 kuruni of kurakkan.

(50) The southern portion of the Pahalawattakoratuwa, formerly occupied by Gamacharige Babenaide.
