Excise Notification No. 34.

IT is hereby notified that HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR has, under the provisions of section 24 of the Excise Ordinance, No. 8 of 1912, been pleased to direct that on and after October 1, 1914, all persons carrying on any trade in foreign liquor shall do so under cover of one or more of the following licenses.

General Description of the Licenses.

(1) *Bottling License*.—These licenses will be granted only to those holders of wholesale licenses who import foreign liquor in bulk and bottle it in the Colony. The annual fee will be Rs. 50. The bottling license will be granted by the Government Agent after approval of the premises in which bottling is to take place, and all reducing and bottling operations will be done under the supervision of an Excise Officer. Colouring, blending, or flavouring, *i.e.*, essencing, after importation will be strictly prohibited, as well as the exchange of bottle labels, corks, and capsules so as to make the liquor of one manufacturer appear to be that of another.

(2) *Wholesale License* (for the sale to licensed dealers only of foreign liquor not to be consumed on the premises).—This class of license will have to be taken out by those commission agents and others who import liquor largely; and sales by them under this license will be permitted to licensed dealers only. The annual fee for this license will be Rs. 50.

(3) *Retail License* (for the sale of foreign liquor not to be consumed on the premises).—This license will be issued on payment of an annual fee of Rs. 100 to Rs. 500, determined by the Government Agent on a basis of gallonage or business done.

(4) *Tavern License* (that is, retail license for the sale of foreign liquor to be consumed on the premises).—The amount to be paid for this privilege will be determined ultimately by public auction or by tender, but shall, until further notice, be assessed by the Government Agent on a basis of gallonage or business done. Under these licenses the sale of liquor in one transaction for removal from the premises in a quantity exceeding one reputed quart will be prohibited.

(5) *Beer and Porter License* (for the sale of beer and porter only).—These licenses will be issued for the sale of beer and porter only, for consumption on or off the premises, at an annual fixed fee of Rs. 30.

(6) *Hotel License* (for the supply of liquor to residents in hotels and boarding houses).—These licenses will be of different classes, and fees will be fixed according to class. No liquor may be sold under these licenses otherwise than to residents in hotels and boarding houses for their own use or that of their guests, or to casual visitors requiring liquor with meals supplied to them. A fee of Rs. 100 to Rs. 500 may be charged, at the discretion of the Government Agent.

(7) *Bar License*.—This license will be issued to approved hotel keepers, or to managers of approved places of public entertainment, to cover the sale of foreign liquor at a bar in the hotel or place of entertainment under the same conditions and to the same extent as the tavern license. This license will be issued on payment of a fee for each bar, assessed by the Government Agent on a basis of gallonage or business done.

(8) *Railway Refreshment Room or Dining Car License* (issued to the contractor or contractors who have secured the privilege of opening refreshment rooms at railway stations or running the dining cars attached to trains).—These will cover the supply of foreign liquor to *bona fide* travellers by railway only, and will be issued by the Government Agent, after consultation with the General Manager, on payment of an assessed fee for each refreshment room or car. When one contractor has secured combined privileges, a consolidated fee may be charged, payable by instalments.

(9) *Refreshment Room or Restaurant License* (issued only to respectable applicants to cover the sale of foreign liquor when combined with the supply of meals).—This license will be issued on a fee of Rs. 200 to Rs. 400, assessed at the discretion of the Government Agent according to locality and business done.

(10) *Resthouse License* (to resthouses maintained under the supervision and control of the Chairmen of the Provincial Road Committees).—Under this license liquor may be sold only to persons staying at the resthouse, or to *bona fide* travellers, for consumption on the premises; and no liquor shall be sold for removal from the resthouse. The fee will be assessed by the Government Agent.

(11) *Proprietary Club License*.—This license will be issued on payment of a fee assessed by the Government Agent, and will cover the sale of foreign liquor for consumption on the premises to members only and to friends in their company.

(12) *Occasional License*.—This will be granted for the sale of foreign liquor at refreshment stalls or bars in connection with race meetings, public entertainments, or other gatherings approved by the Government Agent, for periods not exceeding ten days at one time, and at fees assessed by the Government Agent not exceeding Rs. 100 on each occasion. No sale of liquor for removal from the premises will be allowed under this license.

(13) *Auctioneer's License* (for the sale by recognized auctioneers of consignments of foreign liquor).—The annual fee will be Rs. 10. The licensee may give sample bottles, and may hold the auction at places other than those specified in the license. Liquor sold under this license must be the property of *bona fide* residents in the Island.

(14) *License for the Sale of Pure Rectified Spirit*.—This will be issued, on payment of an annual fee of Rs. 10, to such chemists and druggists and other firms or persons as are specially approved by the Government Agent. Under this license the possession of pure rectified spirit in excess of forty imperial gallons (or such larger quantity

as the Excise Commissioner may specially authorize) is prohibited. Pure rectified spirit must not be sold under these licenses for other than *bona fide* medical, industrial, and scientific purposes, and the maximum limit of sale at one time to the same person is restricted to one reputed pint in the case of sale to a private individual; one imperial gallon in the case of sale for industrial purposes, or to a chemist, medical practitioner, or scientific body; and ten imperial gallons to any Government, Local Board, or Municipal hospital.

(15) *License for the Sale of Medicated Wines and similar Preparations containing 20 per cent. and upwards, but not more than 42 per cent., of Proof Spirit.*—The annual fee for the license will be Rs. 10. The licensee may sell the medicated wines and similar preparations only as tonic or medicine.

(16) *Special License.*—This will be granted under the orders of the Excise Commissioner on such terms and conditions as may in each case be determined, when the circumstances are such as not to allow of the issue of licenses of any of the above descriptions.

LICENSE FOR BOTTLING FOREIGN LIQUOR.

(To Wholesale Dealers only.)

I, ———, Government Agent of the ———, under the provisions of the Excise Ordinance, No. 8 of 1912, in consideration of the payment of a fee of Rupees Fifty, the receipt of which is hereby acknowledged, hereby license you, ———, to bottle potable foreign liquor at the premises more fully described below, in the ———, during the official year ending September 30, 191—, subject to the following conditions to be observed by you, the said ———, viz., the general conditions issued herewith applicable to all Excise licenses, the bottling rules (foreign liquor) published in Excise Notification No. 9 III., and the following special conditions applicable to this license:—

1. The privilege extends to the bottling of all potable liquors imported in bulk.
2. Every receptacle containing liquor imported in bulk must bear a printed label showing clearly the name and the strength of the liquor, the country of manufacture, and the date of removal from the Custom-house.
3. No manipulation of the liquor beyond reducing, whether by blending, or by flavouring, or by colouring, is permitted, and all operations connected with bottling must be done in the presence of an Excise Officer. Timely intimation of all proposed bottling operations must be given to the Excise Office.
4. The liquor must be "proved" on each occasion of bottling or re-casking on the premises.
5. Every bottle or other receptacle filled on the premises and passed out for sale must bear a printed label showing clearly the country of manufacture, the name of the bottler as entered in the license, and the place of bottling. Every bottle or other receptacle must be sealed, wired, or secured by capsules, or the cork and the top of the neck covered by metallic foil.
6. No spirits shall be bottled at a lower strength than 20° under London proof.
7. An account showing the different kinds of liquor received, bottled, and issued daily must be maintained, and produced on demand of a duly empowered Excise Officer.

2. The licensee shall, when called on to do so by officers authorized to inspect shops, furnish proof that the preparations kept for sale do not contain more than 42 per cent. of proof spirit. The proof shall be either (1) a certificate of the Principal Collector of Customs, (2) a certificate of purchase from the importer, together with a copy of the certificate of the Principal Collector of Customs, or (3) a certificate of the Government Analyst.

3. Samples of medicated wines or similar preparations manufactured locally shall be submitted by the maker to the Government Analyst for determination of the percentage of proof spirit in them.

4. Special exemptions from maintaining accounts may be granted by the Excise Commissioner to licensees on the licensee showing good grounds for the exemption.

"THE LOCAL BOARDS ORDINANCE, 1898."

THE following by-laws made by the Local Board of Kalutara, under and in pursuance of section 56 (5) of the above-named Ordinance, and confirmed by His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, are published for general information.

BY-LAWS REFERRED TO.

1. No person shall keep a bakery without a license from the Chairman of the Local Board.
2. Every room in a bakery used (a) for kneading of dough or preparation of bread, and (b) for baking of bread, or for either of these purposes, shall be well ventilated and well lighted, and the walls thereof plastered with cement, and the floor cemented throughout, and proper drainage provided; a ceiling shall also be provided when so ordered by the Chairman.
3. No bakery or place used for the sale of bread shall be within 30 feet of any cesspit, latrine, or open sewer.
4. No room in a bakery used (a) for kneading of dough or preparation of bread, and (b) for baking of bread, or for either of these purposes, shall be used as a dwelling place or for any purposes other than the preparation and baking of bread.
5. All utensils, furniture, and other requisites used in or belonging to a bakery or place used for the sale of bread shall be kept scrupulously clean, and the tops of all tables are to be made of closely fitting planks free from holes and crevices.
6. All refuse and dirt in and about the premises of a bakery or place used for the sale of bread shall be removed without delay, and the drains kept well flushed.
7. All bread, cakes, or sweetmeats kept or exposed for sale shall be kept in properly constructed glass cases free from flies. The glass cases shall be kept scrupulously clean.
8. No person suffering from any cutaneous, contagious, or infectious disease, or who has recently been in attendance on any such person, or who is otherwise unclean, shall be employed in or about any place used as a bakery or for selling bread.
9. All persons employed in the preparation and baking of bread shall wear clean white aprons covering the chest and the body.
10. It shall be lawful for the Local Board Inspectors, supervisors, or other persons authorized in writing by the Chairman at any time to enter and inspect any bakery or place used for the sale of bread, provided that there is some one on the premises.
11. Copies of the above by-laws in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil must be hung up in a conspicuous place in every bakery.

NOTICE is hereby given that an examination for candidates wishing to enter Class II., Grade III., of the Clerical Branch of the Public Service will take place on Monday, October 19, 1914, and following days.

2. Applications for admission to the examination by persons not now in the Public Service must be addressed to the Director of Education, must bear a duly cancelled stamp of Rs. 10, and must be in the form (Schedule A) attached to this notice. Forms are to be obtained at any Post Office on application, or within four days' notice. A certificate of the registration of the candidate's birth showing him to be on October 19, 1914, between the ages of 18 and 21, and a certificate of good character signed by a responsible person,* to the satisfaction of the Director of Education, must be attached to the form of application. If a certificate of birth for a previous examination has been already sent in, it will be sufficient to refer to the name and date of that examination. Affidavits will in no circumstances be accepted. In the case of candidates who submit certificates of registration from the register of past births, the certificates will only be accepted after consideration of the evidence by which the dates of birth were established. If the name appearing in the birth register differs, either by alteration or addition, from the name by which the candidate is known, the parent or guardian should, before obtaining a certificate, apply to the Registrar-General or his Assistant for such alteration in the manner set forth in section 7 of Ordinance No. 23 of 1900. This examination is confined to British subjects born in Ceylon whose families are permanently resident in the Island.

3. Clerks in Government service, from whatever funds they may be paid, who have completed three years' satisfactory service, and are not members of the Customs, Postal, Survey, or Railway Departments, are eligible for examination irrespective of age and without fee. Their applications (in the same form, Schedule A) for admission to the examination should be forwarded to the Director of Education through the Heads of their Departments.

4. Applications should reach the Director of Education not later than 2 P.M. on Friday, September 11, 1914; any applications received after that hour, by whatever cause delayed, will be rejected.

* If the candidate has been educated at a Government or grant-in-aid school, the certificate must be from the Principal of the last Government or grant-in-aid school which he has attended.

5. The Director of Education will return to the candidate his application, approved or disapproved as the case may be, after taking, if necessary, the orders of Government thereon. The approved application shall constitute the candidate's ticket of admission to the examination. Candidates presenting themselves for examination must produce to the officer appointed to supervise the examination their forms of application approved by the Director of Education. A candidate not producing such form, whatever may be the reason for his not so doing, will be refused admittance to the examination.

6. The examination will be held at Colombo only, in the place and under the supervision of the officer specified in Schedule B. Heads of Departments are required to grant to officers of their Departments, whose applications to present themselves for examination have been returned to them approved by the Director of Education, leave to present themselves at the examination.

7. The examination will be competitive. The number of places assigned for competition will be twenty-seven.

8. The successful candidates will be required to pass a medical examination as to their physical fitness for service in any part of the Island.

9. The subjects for examination are those set out in Schedule C to this notice. The examination will be held in two parts. The first part a qualifying examination in Handwriting, Spelling, Arithmetic, and Bookkeeping. Any candidate failing to obtain two-thirds of the marks allotted for Handwriting, half those allowed for Spelling and Arithmetic respectively, and one-third of those allowed for Bookkeeping will be excluded from the remainder of the examination. Special attention will be paid to Handwriting, and candidates whose writing is untidy or illegible or contains defects in the formation of letters will be rigorously excluded. The kind of writing preferred is that generally known as the "Civil Service" hand. The second part of the examination will be in the remaining subjects in Schedule C. Should a candidate obtain less than one-third of the aggregate marks for the three subjects—Composition, General Paper, Précis Writing—or less than one-fourth marks in any other subject, or if he be a Sinhalese or Tamil, less than one-half of the marks in his native language, such marks will not be counted in his favour. In all the written papers marks will be deducted for bad writing and mistakes in spelling.

10. Clerks of the description given in section 3 above will be allowed to compete amongst themselves, and will be eligible, if they obtain a minimum of 66 per cent. in Writing and 33 per cent. in the other compulsory subjects, for seven of the appointments offered for competition.

11. Three more appointments will be reserved as prizes for deserving clerks of the same description, who have served Government continuously for ten years and upwards, to be selected irrespective of examination. No service under the age of sixteen years will be reckoned for this purpose.

Teachers' Courses for 1915-16.

ENGLISH CLASSES (MEN AND WOMEN).

THE Annual Entrance Examination for admission to the courses of training for teachers in English schools will be held at the Training College on November 2, 3, and 4, 1914, commencing at 10.30 A.M. Candidates for admission must apply to the Principal of the College for an admission form during the month of September. These forms must be returned on or before October 16. Candidates will then be informed whether they have been selected to appear at the examination.

2. Selected students will be trained for teacherships in Grant-in-aid and Government schools. The following classes will be established in January, 1915:—

- A course for secondary school teachers in (1) Arts, (2) Science, (3) Mathematics, (4) Manual Training and Drawing.
- A course for elementary school teachers.
- An infant school teachers' course. The certificate awarded to successful students at the end of this course is that referred to under clause 37 (c) of the Code for 1914.

3. The following studentships are offered for competition:—

- Twenty-five studentships of Rs. 300 per annum.
- Ten studentships of Rs. 480 per annum.

All students will also receive free passes for rail and motor service to and from their homes during vacations.

It must be understood that all students are appointed on probation for the first three months, and will not be allowed to continue their course unless their work shows a reasonable degree of promise.

Students in training must devote the whole of their time to College work. Board and residence will be provided on payment of the prescribed charge during the time the College is in session. Those for whom residence is not available must live within a convenient distance of the College, and must be able to satisfy the Principal that their place of residence affords proper facilities for study and conditions for the maintenance of general good health. Each selected candidate will be examined by the College Medical Officer, whose report must state that the candidate is physically fit to take up the work of a teacher.

The Entrance Examination will comprise—

I.—Compulsory Subjects:—

- English Language and Literature (general paper).
- English Composition.
- Reading aloud from the work of a standard author.
- Arithmetic.
- History and Geography of the British Empire.

II.—Optional Subjects:—

- Algebra: to progressions.
- Geometry: the subject-matter of Euclid's Books I. to IV. (experimentally and theoretically).
- Languages: (a) Latin: Translation, Grammar, and Composition.
- (b) Sinhalese: Ummaga Jataka and Guttilla. Grammar. Composition.
- (c) Tamil: Panchatantra, Krishnanthoothu (Villi Baratham), and Ilakkanachchurukkam. Composition.

N.B.—Only one of (a), (b), or (c) can be taken.

A separate examination will be set for candidates for the infant school course—

- English Composition.
- Reading aloud.
- Elementary Drawing.

SINHALESE CLASS (MEN).

The students in this Department will be trained for masterships in Government Sinhalese schools.

Twenty studentships will be open for competition to selected monitors in Government schools who have passed their Third-year Examination in 1913 or before that year.

Selected students will receive free board and lodging at the College during the session, and free passes on the railway will be issued for use during the vacations. The period of training will extend over two years, and at the end of this period those who pass the Final Examination will receive certificates of the second or third class in accordance with the record of their work in the College and their performance at the Final Examination.

Certificates of the first class will be issued only to trained teachers in the service of the Department who hold second class certificates after an uninterrupted service of ten years as head teacher in a school of the class corresponding to the certificate, provided that their conduct and efficiency be approved by the Director. For scale of payments see clause 8 of the Departmental Code.

The following will be the subjects for the Entrance Examination :—

- Sinhalese Literature: Ummaga Jataka and Guttala. Grammar.
- Composition and Dictation.
- Arithmetic.

SEALED offers, in duplicate, bearing on the cover "Tender for the purchase of Satinwood illicitly felled in Maha Iluppallama Crown Forest," will be accepted up to July 21, 1914, by the Chairman of the Tender Board, Office of the Controller of Revenue, Colombo, for the purchase of 87 satinwood trees lying felled and cut into 190 short lengths of between 5 and 7 ft. in the above-mentioned forest.

2. The timber will be stamped personally in the presence of the purchaser or a trustworthy representative by the Assistant Conservator of Forests, Anuradhapura Division, in the forest, and will be primarily removed to the junction of the Anddiagala pinpara with the Talawa-Maha Iluppallama road at the 14½ milepost, and will there await further check before removal permit to Talawa station is sued.

3. Intending purchasers should quote a rate per cubic foot, written both in words and figures, and satisfy themselves of the nature of the timber before making any offer.

4. Should any other short pieces of the same description be found in the forest in excess of the number enumerated above and hitherto undetected, the purchaser will be allowed to remove the same at the same rate and under the same conditions.

5. The timber measures approximately 1,391 cubic feet.

6. The timber must be removed within three months of the acceptance of tender, and any timber left unremoved within this period will revert to the Crown.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended July 4, 1914.

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 105 (1 European, 8 Burghers, 63 Sinhalese, 12 Tamils, 15 Moors, 3 Malays, and 3 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on July 1, 1914, viz., 243,089) was 22.5, as against 21.1 in the preceding week, 19.9 in the corresponding week of last year, and 24.4 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 123 (0 Europeans, 7 Burghers, 58 Sinhalese, 32 Tamils, 15 Moors, 8 Malays, and 3 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 26.3, as against 25.2 in the previous week, 23.2 in the corresponding week of last year, and 28.0 the weekly average of last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 123 total deaths, 27 were of infants under one year of age, as against 33 in the preceding week, 27 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 31 the average of last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 9.

Principal Causes of Death.—Ten deaths from *Pneumonia* were registered, as against 9 in the previous week and 15 the weekly average for last year. Of these, 4 were in Maradana (including 1 death of a non-resident in hospital), 3 in Kotahena, 1 in St. Paul's, 1 in Slave Island, and 1 in Wellawatta. Six deaths from *Bronchitis* were registered.

2. Seven deaths from *Phthisis* were registered, as against 10 in the previous week and 13 the weekly average for last year. Of these, 3 were in Maradana (including 2 deaths of non-residents in hospitals), 2 in St. Paul's, and 2 in Slave Island.

3. One death from *Enteric Fever* was registered in Kotahena, as against 3 in the previous week and the weekly average for last year.

4. Thirteen deaths from *Enteritis* were registered, 9 from *Infantile Convulsions*, 9 from *Debility*, 7 from *Congestion of Lungs* (probably *Plague*), 4 from *Worms*, 2 from *Dysentery*, 1 from *Diarrhoea*, 1 from an *Accident*, and 45 from *Other Causes*.

5. Nine deaths from *Plague* were registered, as against 5 in the previous week. Of these, 5 were in Maradana, 3 in St. Paul's, and 1 in the Infectious Diseases Hospital, Wellawatta, of a non-resident of the city. There were 23 cases reported, as against 13 in the previous week.

6. Two cases of *Chickenpox* were reported, as in the previous week. One case of measles was reported. There were none in the previous week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 81.9°, against 80.9° in the preceding week and 80.0° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.809 in., against 29.802 in. in the preceding week and 29.855 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 0.28 in., against 2.22 in. in the preceding week and 3.36 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.
