MUNICIPALITY OF COLOMBO.

Minutes of Proceedings of a General Meeting of the Municipal Council of Colombo held in the Town Hall on Friday, April 24, 1914.

THE Council met this day at 3 P.M., pursuant to notice dated April 17, 1914.

Present: Mr. R. W. Byrde, Chairman; Mr. C. P. Dias; Mr. L. B. Fernando; Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader; Mr. H. L. de Mel; Mr. E. G. Jayewardene; Dr. David Rockwood; Dr. D. P. Banajee; Dr. E. V. Ratnam; Dr. W. P. Rodrigo; the Hon. Mr. T. H. Chapman; Mr. J. A. Perera; Major W. H. Robinson; and Mr. W. C. S. Ingles.

1. The Minutes of the General Meeting of March 27, 1914, having been printed, and a copy thereof having been sent to each Member of Council, were taken as read.

Resolved-That the Minutes of the General Meeting of March 27, 1914, be confirmed.

2. Pursuant to notice, the Chairman made the following statement re Plague:-

We still have plague in the city, but its incidence during the hot weather has not been so severe; for instance, there were only three fresh cases last week and five this week, including two which were reported yesterday. At our last Meeting on March 27 I reported that there had been 100 cases. These figures have been slightly revised, it having been decided that 1 of these cases was not a plague case, and that 17 cases, which occurred in that period and which had given negative bacteriological results, were, in fact, cases of plague. There were, therefore, up to March 27 116 cases of plague. Since that date there have been 31 fresh cases, making in all a total of 147 cases. Of these, 98 were of the septicæmic type, 49 were of the bubonic type. In the septicæmic cases there have been no recoveries, in the bubonic cases there have been 11 recoveries. In all 277 cases have been investigated.

1,268 persons have passed through the segregation camp, and at the present moment there are 9 contacts segregated. The Sea street area has been the principal centre of the disease, the chief focus being the insanitary quarters round fish market square. I am sorry to say that the infection still lingers among the rats. Among the 794 examined since March 27 26 were found to be infected. that the percentage of infection is lower, but the fact remains that there is still infection. In one case it was found that the rat had had an attack of plague and had survived. The animal was still, however, a potential source of danger, as it had the plague bacilli in its blood, and was capable of infecting fleas. I am very much afraid that we may have to face a recrudescence of the disease when the cooler weather comes. It behoves us in the interval to unremittingly prosecute the campaign for the destruction of rats. The reorganization of the Rat Destruction Department, initiated by Dr. Milne, has achieved very good results. Some 9,000 rats have been caught since March 27. Further, out of 208,000 poison baits which were laid, 33,418 were removed or eaten by rats. On April 14 Dr. Milne brought a number of new rat traps into

They are of a special pattern recommended by him. He has since their introduction succeeded in increasing the daily catch, which for the last eight days has given an average of 440 rats a day. The new traps have been distributed among householders, who are beginning to realize how important and beneficial it is for them to take steps to protect themselves. Dr. Milne has also introduced an ingenious system, which is likely to prove a stimulus to the populace to assist in rat catching. It is based on a system of rewards. A rat specially marked by him and Dr. Hirst is released in a certain neighbourhood. The inhabitants are informed by means of leaflets and by beat of tom-tom. The lucky person who succeeds in catching it receives a reward of Rs. 10 when he produces it at Headquarters. I much regret to say that we are to lose the services of Dr. Milne at the end of this month, as the exigencies of service require him back in his own Department. The work of rat destruction will be carried on by Mr. Pate, the Veterinary Surgeon. I must take this opportunity of asking you to place on record our appreciation of the very valuable services rendered to this Council by Dr. Milne, who has given us the benefits of the experience gained by him in his service in other plague-infected towns.

With the permission of the Council the Chairman proposed a vote of thanks to Dr. Milne for the very valuable services rendered by him to this Council in the reorganization of the Rat Destruction Department.

Mr. C. P. Dias seconded.—Carried unanimously.

Pursuant to notice, Dr. W. P. Rodrigo moved that this Council considers the action of the Chairman in refusing to put item No. 8 on the agenda of the General Meeting held on March 27 last before the Council (motion brought up by the Member of St. Paul's Ward) was irregular and ultra vires. Dr. E. V. Ratnam seconded.

Messrs. H. L. de Mel, J. A. Perera, and E. G. Jayewardene opposed the motion.

After the Chairman had made some remarks on the motion, and Dr. W. P. Rodrigo had spoken in reply, the motion

was put to the Meeting, and on a show of hands being taken the motion was declared lost, two voting for it and twelve against.

(4) To consider a letter dated March 9, 1914, from the Resident Engineer, Colombo Drainage Works, to the Hon. the Colonial Secretary, endorsed to the Chairman for the concurrence of the Council, in regard to the reorganization of the drawing office and the establishment of a "record" drawing office of the Drainage Works, with proposals as to consequent increments and additional staff.

Dr. David Rockwood moved that it be recommended that the Council authorize the Chairman to reply that

the Council has no objection.—Mr. Arthur Alvis seconded.

On a show of hands the votes were found divided as follows:

The Chairman gave his easting vote in favour of the motion, which was carried.

(5) To sanction the payment of the following bonuses to the under-mentioned officers of the Drainage Works from the available half salary of Mr. R. G. Waterhouse, as recommended by the Chief Resident Engineer, Drainage Works:

Mr. Swayne, Second Assistant, Rs. 1,200; Mr. Walton, Third Assistant, Rs. 450; Mr. Pilkington, Fourth Assistant, Rs. 300; Mr. Marston, Accountant, Rs. 150; total, Rs. 2,100.

(Referred by the Council at their Meeting of March 27, 1914, to this Committee.)

Dr. David Rockwood moved that it be recommended to Council that the usual custom with regard to these recommendations of the Resident Engineer, through the Government, be followed, and that the recom-

mendations be approved of. Mr. Arthus Alvis seconded.

On a show of hands the votes were found to be divided as follows:

The Chairman gave his casting vote in favour of the motion, which was carried.

(6) To consider letter dated February 9, 1914, from Mr. E. L. Mansergh, Chief Consulting Engineer, on the eve of his departure from Ceylon, with regard to the Colombo Drainage Works.

Paragraph 9 (a).—Recommended that, before the Council decide on this work being put in hand, an estimate of the probable cost of the work should be submitted for the consideration of the Council. Paragraph 9 (b).—Recommended that the alterations of the storm water tank be not proceeded with at present.

Paragraph 9 (c).—Recommended that the Council do concur with the proposal.

Paragraph 15.—Recommended-

(a) That two Emscher tanks be constructed.

(b) That the Hon. the Colonial Secretary be informed that the Council has not sanctioned the construction of the main sewer W 1 to the Wellawatta Treatment Works.

(c) That only such sewers in H. and Mp. districts as are included in the proposals contained in the City Sanitation Engineer's Report No. 105 of June 13, 1913, be constructed.

(2) To consider an application from the Medical Officer of Health to increase his allowance from Rs. 100 to Rs. 200 per mensem.—Considered.

N.B.—Dr. Rodrigo is unable to support it; Dr. Ratnum suggests Rs. 150 per mensem.

(3) To consider the application for a beef, mutton, and pork stall at Etambagas junction, at the corner of Regent street, Maradana.—Recommended, provided that such a stall is provided as is approved of by the Medical Officer of Health.

- (4) To consider Mr. E. G. Jayewardene's motion re cleansing gang for Maligawatta.—The Committee is not prepared to recommend this.
- (5) To consider Dr. W. P. Rodrigo's question re mutton stall at 623, Wellawatta. —The mutton license for 623 has been cancelled by the Chairman, and will not be renewed for 621.
- (8) To sanction the appointment of a Laboratory Assistant to the Municipal Bacteriologist.—Recommended.
- (9) To sanction the appointment (duly approved of by the majority of the Drainage Committee Members) of a trained Assistant for the Treatment Works, Madampitiya.—Recommended.
- (10) To sanction the payment of Rs. 100 a month as commuted allowance to Dr. A. J. Milne from the date he took up duties.—Recommended.
- (11) To sanction an application from Mr. C. L. Cox, City Sanitation Engineer, for six months' leave. Recommended from July or later, provided Mr. Cox has finished his experiments.
- (12) To sanction an application from Mr. J. D. Mair, Chief Inspector, Sanitation Department, for four months leave.—Recommended.

E. de S. Wijeyeratne, Draughtsman, Works Department, be appointed on Rs. 85 a month and Rs. 20 allowance, and that he be permitted to revert to his present post on completion of the work.
- Mr. C. P. Dias moved that the Council do go into Committee to consider items 4, 5, and 6 of the Agenda. Mr. L. B. Fernando seconded.—Carried.

Special Committee on Drainage Works.

4. With reference to item No. 4 of the recommendations of the Special Committee on Drainage Works of March 31, 1914, Mr. J. A. Perera moved that in view of the fact that this Council are not allowed any control over the expenditure incurred in the execution of the Drainage Works the Chairman do reply that the Council regret that they are unable to express any opinion on the matter referred to in the letter dated March 6, 1914. Mr. H. L. de Mel seconded.

Dr. W. P. Rodrigo opposed the motion. Mr. C. P. Dias spoke in favour of it, while Dr. David Rockwood upheld the

recommendation of the Drainage Committee.

On a show of hands being taken the motion was declared carried, 7 voting for it and 6 against.

With reference to item No. 5 of the recommendations of the Special Committee on Drainage Works, Mr. J. A. Perera moved that for the same reasons as in the case of item No. 4 the Council regret they are unable to express any opinion on the matter referred to. Mr. C. P. Dias seconded.

On a show of hands being taken the motion was declared carried, 7 voting for it and 6 against.

With reference to item No. 6 of the recommendations of the Special Committee on Drainage Works, it was resolved that the recommendations regarding paragraphs 9 (a), 9 (b), and 9 (c) be approved.

With reference to paragraphs 15 and 16 it was resolved that the Chairman do reply to the Colonial Secretary in terms of the recommendations of the Special Committee on Drainage as amended as follows:—

(a) That two Emscher tanks be constructed.

- (b) That the Hon. the Colonial Secretary be informed that the Council has not sanctioned the construction of the main sewer W 1 to the Wellawatta Treatment Works.
- (c) That only the following sewers be constructed, provided that the cost of executing them can be included within the amount to which the Council is already committed, viz., Rs. 13,800,000:-

H area, H 1 and H 29; M. P. area, M 22, M 52, M 43, M 48, M 51, M 22 extension, M 62, or some other minor sewer for a public latrine.

Paragraph 16.—Recommended that the sites for the Vuystwyke, Maligawatta, and Western pumping stations and also for the Wellawatta Treatment Works, should be acquired as soon as funds are available, and that the Chairman be empowered to select the sites, and take proceedings for acquisition if funds are available.

Standing Committee on Sanitation and Markets.

With reference to item No. 2 of the recommendations of the Standing Committee on Sanitation and Markets of April 20, 1914, Dr. W. P. Rodrigo moved that the increase of the allowance be refused. Mr. H. L. de Mel seconded.

On a show of hands being taken the motion was declared carried, 8 voting for it and 5 against.

With reference to item No. 3 of the recommendations of the Standing Committee on Sanitation and Markets of April 20, 1914, Mr. E. G. Jayewardene moved that the application be allowed. Mr. H. L. de Mel seconded.

On a show of hands being taken the motion was declared carried, 11 voting for it and 1 against.

With reference to item No. 4 of the Standing Committee on Sanitation and Markets of April 20, 1914, it was resolved that the matter be deferred for consideration by the next meeting of the Finance Committee.

With reference to item No. 8 of the recommendations of the Standing Committee on Sanitation and Markets of April 20, 1914, it was resolved that the wording be amended by the addition of the following words:-

On a salary of Rs 480 per annum for the first two years and subsequently Rs. 960 rising to Rs. 1,200 per annum. (The selected candidate will be required to execute a bond of service with the Municipal Council for a term of five years, and to find good security to Rs. 300.)

Resolved that the remaining items of the recommendations of the Standing Committee on Sanitation and Markets be adopted.

Standing Committee on Municipal Works.

With reference to item No. 5 of the recommendations of the Standing Committee on Municipal Works of April 21, 1914, Mr. E. G. Jayewardene moved that the alterations should not be sanctioned. Dr. W. P. Rodrigo seconded. Carried.

With reference to item No. 7 of the recommendations of the Standing Committee on Municipal Works of April 21, 1914, it was resolved that the wording be amended by the addition of the following words:

Carters, present rate per diem 60 cents; proposed rate per diem 65 cents. Coolies, present rate per diem from 50 to 60 cents; proposed rate per diem from 53 to 63 cents.

With reference to item No. 8 of the recommendations of the Standing Committee on Municipal Works of April 21, 1914, Mr. J. A. Perera moved that the Council are of opinion that the sanction of the Council is not necessary, as the Resident Engineer is not an officer controlled by the Council. Mr. E. G. Jayewardene seconded.

On a show of hands being taken the motion was declared carried, 7 voting for it and 4 against.

Resolved that the remaining items of the recommendations of the Standing Committee on Municipal Works of

April 21, 1914, be adopted.

Mr. E. G. Jayewardene moved that the Council do resume, and that the resolutions of Council in Committee be adopted.

Mr. L. B. Fernando seconded.—Carried.

The Colombo Drainage Scheme.

From Mr. E. L. Mansergh to the Hon. the Colonial Secretary, Colombo.

Colombo, February 9, 1914.

- SIR,—I HAVE the honour to inform you that I am leaving Ceylon for England to-morrow per ss. " Herefordshire."
- 2. I have carefully inspected all the completed work and that in course of construction, and am satisfied that the high standard of excellence which has characterized it from the start has been fully maintained.
- 3. Quite satisfactory progress is shown since my partner, Mr. W. L. Mansergh, reported on the subject on February 22, 1913, the total length of drains laid to the end of January last is 102 miles, showing progress of 14 miles for the twelve months.
- 4. Polwatta and Slave Island pumping stations have been finished and set to work, and the latter station has been handed over to the charge of the Sanitation Department, Municipal Council.
- 5. There have been no changes in the engineering staff during the year under review, but I am of opinion that the pay and *personnel* of the drawing office staff should be increased in order that the records of work handed over to the Sanitation Department may be brought and kept up to date.
- 6. I have discussed this matter with the Chief Resident Engineer, and have come to the conclusion that there are two alternatives, viz., either to appoint a European draughtsman to take charge of the office, or that the Chief Resident Engineer be authorized to increase the expenditure on the drawing office staff by a total not exceeding Rs. 250 per mensem.
- 7. The latter method is the cheaper of the two, and the Chief Resident Engineer considers that it will be effective in coping with the arrears, and I therefore beg leave to suggest that the necessary authorization should be given to him.
- 8. During my visit I have met the members of the Municipal Council or a majority of them on two occasions: first, on January 28 at Madampitiya Treatment Works, when I explained the details and working of the plant installed there; and second, on the 6th instant, when I answered at length a great many questions and discussed a number of matters which have been raised since the receipt of my firm's report on the Southern Outfall of January, 1913, and that on the extension and alterations of the Madampitiya Treatment Works dated June 11, 1913.
- 9. At the meeting I put forward certain recommendations, pending the completion of the experiments now being conducted by the City Sanitation Engineer on the detailed treatment, viz.:—
 - (a) That one of the existing septic tanks should be altered forthwith on the lines of our report of June 11.
 - (b) That a portion of the works we have advised in that report for the treatment of storm water be proceeded with, leaving the present tanks available for further experiment for the time being.
 - (c) That no further aerobic beds be proceeded with at present, as the City Sanitation Engineer's experiments may show that so many of them may not be required.
- 10. On the question of these experiments I would like to point out that it has been suggested more than once that these should have been made at an earlier date, or even before the works themselves were constructed; this latter suggestion is, of course, quite futile, as it was impossible to experiment on sewage which did not exist, and it was only towards the end of 1912 that the sewage arriving at Madampitiya had obtained anything like what is likely to be its normal strength, owing to house connections being made to a small extent and the establishment of numerous water carriage latrines.
- 11. Experiments were being made when my partner, Mr. W. L. Mansergh, was in Colombo at the beginning of last year, the question of alterations received our full attention, and we made the above-mentioned report in June last, and the experiments have been carried on continuously ever since.
- 12. In view of the valuable information which, I am of opinion, will be gained from these experiments, and the use they will be in deciding on the best and cheapest method of treatment in connection with the Southern Outfall and other places, I venture to suggest that Government should reconsider their previous decision not to contribute a moiety of their cost.
- 13. With regard to the general scheme I have undertaken to prepare and forward, as soon as possible after my return to England, a revised programme of work embodying certain suggestions made by the City Sanitation Engineer, so as to enable as large a benefit as possible to be derived from the scheme in spite of the backwardness of the house connections.
- 14. The Municipal authorities are satisfied that they have not at present sufficient powers to enable them to deal efficiently with house connections and drainage generally, and I beg leave to suggest that the necessary legislation should be proceeded with as early as possible.
- 15. The construction of two Emscher tanks at Madampitiya, and of the Main Sewer W I to the Wellawatta Treatment Works, have been sanctioned and are being proceeded with, but in order to maintain his labour force at the proper and economical standard it will probably be necessary for the Chief Resident Engineer to be given authority to proceed with certain important sewers in H and Mp. districts before the revised programme mentioned in paragraph 13 above can be furnished and approved.
- 16. Meantime it is important that the sites of the Wellawatta Treatment Works, the Vuystwyke, Maligawatta, and Western pumping stations should be acquired.
- 17. I have given instructions for observations to be made at the proposed Southern Outfall on the direction and strength of the currents within the reef throughout the year in all states of the weather.
- 18. I request that an early decision may be arrived at with regard to the provision of the sea outlet for draining the Flower Road Swamp suggested by the Municipal Works Engineer, as that decision will largely affect the details of rain water drains in T district, which it is important should be proceeded with without delay.

Letter from Mr. E. L. Mansergh to the Hon. the Colonial Secretary re Colombo Drainage Scheme.

THE CHAIRMAN,—WITH reference to Mr. E. L. Mansergh's letter to the Hon. the Colonial Secretæry dated the 9th ultimo, I have the honour to report—

- 2. I consider it essential that complete plans and records of the Drainage Work should be provided for our future reference. There has been some delay in supplying us with records necessary for our present work, and the Chief Resident Engineer has been unable to provide certain detail plans that have, from time to time, been required. The additional staff required by the Chief Resident Engineer for this purpose should be sanctioned without delay and the work should be urged forward.
- 3. With reference to paragraph 9 (a) I have agreed to the Consulting Engineer's proposal to alter one of the septic tanks, and I would recommend that sanction should be given to this work at once. It should be stipulated that the portion of work that would be affected by my proposal to subdivide the tanks should be carried out in a temporary manner.
- 4. With reference to paragraph 9 (b) I do not agree with the Consulting Engineer's recommendation to proceed with portion of the works proposed in their report of June 11 for the treatment of storm water. We now know that this proposal contemplates the provision of percolating storm filters to be worked intermittently, a method which has been condemned by the Royal Commission on sewage disposal. I am, moreover, not satisfied that the plant proposed will, in certain details, prove the most suitable. My chief objection to this proposal is based, however, on the opinion that, in view of the dilution afforded by the river, the existing storm plant can, with comparatively inexpensive modifications, be made to deal in a sufficiently effective manner with considerable volumes of storm water, and that there is no immediate necessity for additional expenditure in this direction.
- 5. I agree with the Consulting Engineer's recommendation made in paragraph 9 (c) that no further aerobic beds need be provided at the moment.
- 6. No object would appear to be served by continuing discussion of the question raised by Mr. Mansergh in paragraph 10 of his letter, and I will refrain from expressing an opinion. I should, however, consider it gross neglect if we failed to take advantage of our opportunities for investigation and experiment before proceeding with further extension of the plant. The value of preliminary scientific investigation is now well recognized in most countries, and it is to be regretted that it has, until quite recent years, been the general practice in England to rely upon observation of the success or failure of actual plants, rather than upon preliminary experimental work, to determine the most suitable methods of treatment.
- 7. With reference to paragraph 14, I note an endorsement on the letter that the matter is awaiting the return of the Hon. the Attorney-General. I would suggest that the draft amended Ordinance may be forwarded for the Government's consideration without delay.
- 8. With reference to paragraph 15, I have already pointed out that the Council have not sanctioned the extensions which include the Emscher tanks at Madampitiya, and the sewer W 1, and I would further point out that no detailed estimates of the cost of those particular works or of the cost of the proposed new storm water plant have been submitted to the Council. It would be more in accord with the Council's general practice and would, in my opinion, be conducive of the Council's best interests if a stricter surveillance of the expenditures proposed were made possible.
- 9. The Consulting Engineers point out the importance of acquiring the sites of the Wellawatta Treatment Works and the Vuystwyke, Maligawatta, and Western pumping stations, and they suggest the probable necessity of obtaining early authority to proceed with certain of the works included in the revised programme that has been recommended.
- 10. I would urge that the Council should consider this programme and decide upon the course to be adopted without delay. Whether the Government make any further financial contributions or not the Council must, in my ropinion, remain primarily responsible for the drainage system of the city.

"Improvement in shipping cases or boxes."

Abstract :---

The inventors state:---

Shipping cases or boxes as now commonly constructed are made from sawn lumber, and in all the usual sizes when made strong enough to ensure safety in transit are relatively heavy and require a relatively large amount of lumber. The weight increases the transportation charges, and the large quantity of lumber used increases the expense and results in a very considerable waste of a material which is day by day becoming less abundant. This waste is very largely increased owing to the fact that generally shipping cases made from sawn lumber are used but once, and are then either destroyed or put to less important uses.

A shipping case embodying the invention is light, strong, and relatively inexpensive. It may be opened without destroying any portion of it, and may therefore be used repeatedly, and it is light enough as ordinarily constructed to carry without loss fine-grained merchandise, such, for example, as flour, small seeds, and the like. It may also be secured by a seal, so that it cannot be opened without breaking the box or destroying the seal, and this further ensures delivery

of the goods to the consignee safely and without loss.

The claims are :--

1. A box made throughout from laminated wood and having the corners and edges covered with moulded binding and re-enforcing strips, the inner faces of which overlap and are in contact with adjacent sides of the box, and securing means for securing said binding and re-enforcing strips in places.

2. A box made throughout from laminated wood having applied to the corners and edges thereof moulded binding and re-enforcing strips made from laminated wood permeated and secured together by cement, the inner faces and said strips overlapping and being in contact throughout their surfaces with adjacent sides of the box, and securing means for

securing said re-enforcing strips in place.

- 3. A box made throughout from laminated wood, the sides, ends, top, and bottom being in contact with and serving to support each other, and having the corners and edges entirely covered and re-enforced by the corner binding strips which overlap the adjacent parts of the bex, and the inner surfaces of which are in contact therewith throughout, said binding strips having a rounded exterior corner, and securing means for securing said strips to underlying adjacent portions of the box.
- 4. A box made throughout from laminated wood, the sides, ends, top, and bottom being in contact with and serving to support each other against a crushing strain, and having the corners and edges protected and re-enforced by corner binding strips which overlap the adjacent parts of the box, and having a slidable cover to the front end of which the binding strip for that edge of the box is permanently secured, said cover sliding between the top of the side portions and the overlying corner binding strips secured to the upper edges of the side portions, and means as the screws 21 for securing the slidable cover in place when the box is closed.
- 5. A box made throughout from laminated wood, the sides, ends, top, and bottom being in contact with and serving to support each other and having the corners and edges entirely covered and re-enforced by corner binding strips which overlap the adjacent parts of the box, and the inner surfaces of which are in contact therewith throughout, and having a slidable cover to the front end of which the binding strip for that edge of the box is permanently secured, said cover sliding between the top of the side portions and the overlying corner binding strips secured to the upper edges of the side portions, and sealing means passing through the end of the box and through the downwardly projecting overlapping portion of the corner binding strip at the front of the cover, for securely sealing the box when it is closed.

"Improvement in corner binding."

Abstract :-

The inventors state:-

Our invention relates to corner bindings which are used to protect and secure the meeting edges of sections of material which are joined together at an angle to each other, and is particularly intended to provide an improved corner binding for protecting, securing, and re-enforcing the corners of boxes and the like in which such qualities as lightness,

strength, and durability are especially desirable. Many boxes, such, for example, as tea boxes, are made preferably from shength, and tunability are especially desirable. Many boxes, such to example, as the boxes, and that protects thin, light material, generally wood. Others are made from laminated wood, that is, sheets or veneers which are laid and secured together and which, when properly constructed, form a light and strong material for boxes. Such boxes are made from thin, light wood, are, however, relatively weak, because of the difficulty of securing the relatively thin material together firmly and strongly at the corners. When the corners are secured with the aid of a strong corner binding which protects and re-enforces them, a strong, light box is produced which is admirably adapted for a large variety of uses. Especially is this the case when the sides of the box are formed from built-up veneers as hereinabove referred to. Our inventiod consists in a moulded corner binding made from laminated wood having the grain of the various veneers or sheets arrangen in crossed relation and secured together and permeated by cement.

1. A corner binding composed of a plurality of laminæ of wood cemented together and moulded to shape.

A corner binding composed of a plurality of laminæ of wood permeated and united by cement and moulded to shape.

3. A corner binding composed of a plurality of laminæ of wood cemented together and moulded to form a sharp interior angle to fit closely the angle of the box corner to which the binding is applied.

4. A corner binding composed of a plurality of laminæ of wood permeated and united by cement and moulded to fit interiorly the exterior of a box corner, and being rounded exteriorly at the angle to form a rounded corner.

"Cup-holder and spout for collecting the sap of trees."

Abstract :---

The inventors state :-

The object of this invention is to provide a cheap, simple, and easily made cup-holder and spout for use in connection

with the extraction of the sap of rubber trees and the like.

In carrying out this object, out of a flat piece of thin metal is cut or stamped a ring (of a convenient size to hold the cup in which the sap is to be collected) having a large ear projecting outwards from the ring and a small spike projecting inwards into the ring. The large ear is bent upwards at right angles, and out of it a tongue is cut having the root still attached to the ear, and the ear is again bent along to the root of the tongue so that the tongue forms the spout, the outer edge of the ear being serrated to more easily enter the bark of the tree. The spike is bent downwards and outwards so as to be stuck into the tree and form a leg holding the device in position. The spout is suitably dished and the ring spout, supports, and spike may be corrugated if desired to give added strength.

1. A cup-holder and spout made of one piece of metal, which is stamped, bent, dished, and corrugated substantially to the form described and illustrated.
