MUNICIPALITY OF COLOMBO.

Minutes of Proceedings of a General Meeting of the Municipal Council of Colombo held in the Town Hall on Friday, May 29, 1914.

THE Council met this day at 3 P.M., pursuant to notice dated May 22, 1914.

Present :—Mr. R. W. Byrde, Chairman; Mr. C. P. Dias; the Hon. Sir Allan Perry, Kt.; Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader; Mr. Arthur Alvis; Mr. E. G. Jayewardene; Dr. David Rockwood; Mr. A. J. Martin; Dr. D. P. Banajee; Dr. E. V. Ratnam; Dr. W. P. Rodrigo; Mr. W. Sutherland Ross; Mr. G. Lionel Cox; Mr. J. A. Perera; Major W. H. Robinson; and Mr. W. C. S. Ingles.

1. Pursuant to notice the Chairman moved, under section 29 of the Municipal Ordinance, No. 6 of 1910, that this Council do decide that Mr. W. Sutherland Ross continue to be a Councillor, although he has failed to attend three consecutive General Meetings. Mr. Arthur Alvis seconded.—Carried unanimously.

2. The Minutes of the General Meeting of April 24, 1914, having been printed, and a copy thereof having been sent to each Member of Council, were taken as read.

Resolved—That the Minutes of the General Meeting of April 24, 1914, be confirmed.

Mr. Jayewardene asked the leave of the Council to invite the attention of the Chairman to an editorial article appearing in "The Ceylonese" newspaper of that date, in which certain charges were made against the Waterworks Engineer, and stated that these charges are either true or false. If false, it was but fair to the Officers of the Council that the Chairman should make a statement that there is no foundation for the charges. If true, a statement from the Chairman would be equally welcome as to what he had done in the circumstances. Mr. Jayewardene asked that the Chairman would be pleased at the next Meeting of the Council to lay a statement before them as regards this matter.

The Chairman said that the matter will be duly inquired into.

3. The Chairman read the following—

Statement re Plague.

At the last Meeting of this Council held on Friday, April 24, the total number of cases was 147. Since then there have been 34 more cases, making a total of 181 cases. Of the 34 cases, 22 were of the septicemic type and 12 of the bubonic type. There were 5 recoveries, all of the bubonic type, but none of the septicemic. It must be noted with satisfaction that there were only 4 cases last week. A new focus of the disease has been established in Symonds road, Maradana. The cases there have occurred among the occupants of some ranges of insanitary tenements, the floors and walls of which were found to be riddled with rat holes. A curious fact in this particular instance is that no dead or infected rats have been found in the vicinity. It at once raises the question "Is infection from rats by means of the flea the one

and only source of infection?" I am pleased to say that the residents of some of the infected quarters are realizing the importance of keeping their dwellings free from rats, and are entering into the spirit of taking precautions against the entry of rats. The Medical Officer of Health informs me that some of them have even gone as far as to make voluntarily and spontaneous applications to have the rat holes in their dwellings stopped. Since the commencement of March when the rat destruction was put on a systematic and organized basis, 30,000 rats have been trapped. Some 2,500 of the trapped rats and 137 rats which were found dead have been examined by the Municipal Bacteriologist. The results give an infection rate of 3.5 among the rat population. It is most satisfactory to know that the hot weather which we have been experiencing has had a very salutary effect, and that last week the incidence of infection among the rat population sank as low as .6 per cent. Dr. Hirst, however, reports that the flea count is showing signs of increasing. He has received information from the Hon. N. C. Rothschild, the greatest authority on fleas, that a number of the last batch of fleas sent to him for examination belong to the *Pulex Cheopis*, the plague flea of India. "In the previous consignments of flea sent by him the *Pulex Cheopis* was entirely absent, and there were only specimens of the *Pulex Astia*. It is a question whether the *Pulex Cheopis* is indigenous to Ceylon or not. It has not been found here before. The fact that it is present now raises the very interesting question as to whether it has been recently introduced and whether its recent introduction may not have been the primary cause of the outbreak and spread of plague in Ceylon. 645,025 poisoned baits have been laid, of which 124,062 have been taken. What the actual effect of the poison on the rats is it is extremely difficult to say, as very few dead rats are found. We can only surmise that they no doubt retire to their runs and die there. Mr. Pate is now in charge of the rat catching, Dr. Milne having reverted to his own duties in the Government Sanitary Department. You will be pleased to hear that last week a record catch was recorded of 3,239 rats.

4. The notice of the question standing in the name of Dr. E. V. Ratnam having been received after the prescribed time, Dr. Ratnam, with the permission of Council, asked the Chairman why the Minute of the Standing Committee on Sanitation and Markets of December 10, 1913, viz., "that the time table for scavenging streets and flushing of drains be printed and circulated for approval" has not been given effect to, and when it is likely to be given effect to.

The Chairman replied as follows:—

A revised time table for all the wards prepared by the Works Department was set up at the end of last year, but it was considered necessary that it should be revised. Revised time tables for the Fort, Pettah, and Slave Island wards were then prepared and put in type in January and February. Unfortunately, the outbreak of plague led to the disorganization of the staff in February and March, owing to a very large number of the Tamil coolies leaving Colombo. The time table had, in consequence, to be altered again. A second revised time table for the Fort ward was received this month, and the proofs have been printed and submitted to the Works Department for correction. The Pettah table has been completed, and will shortly be printed. The Works Department is at present engaged on the preparation of the Maradana west ward time table. The above-mentioned tables will, I hope, be ready for the consideration of the Sanitation Committee at their next Meeting.

5. Pursuant to notice, Mr. E. G. Jayewardene moved:—(1) In view of the fact that Maligawatta is not provided with an extension of lighting and water service, the assessment rate on properties at Maligawatta be decreased. Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader seconded.

Mr. Arthur Alvis moved, as an amendment, that the motion moved by Mr. E. G. Jayewardene on the same subject, and carried at the General Meeting of November 28, 1913 (*vide* item 3 of the Minutes of that Meeting), be given effect to. Dr. David Rockwood seconded.

The Chairman explained that the matter had already been dealt with. It was duly considered by the Committees, and it was decided that the work be undertaken as soon as funds permit.

On the understanding that the work will be so undertaken, Mr. Alvis withdrew his amendment, and Mr. Jayewardene withdrew his motion.

6. Pursuant to notice, Mr. E. G. Jayewardene moved for a return showing the number of officers above the rank of cooly (daily-paid or otherwise) who have been dismissed or discontinued from the Council's service—(1) in the Works Department, (2) in the Waterworks Department, and (3) in the City Sanitation Engineer's Department, during the years 1912 and 1913, and 1914 up to date, giving the name of the officer, his rank and daily rate of wage, and length of service, giving, in each case, the date of dismissal, and the date of the Chairman's order for dismissal.

(With permission of Council Mr. Jayewardene amended his motion by substituting the words "servants of the Council" in place of "officers." He cited a case of the dismissal of an overseer in the Works Department.) Mr. C. P. Dias seconded.—Carried.

The Chairman stated that the returns called for had been prepared and would be circulated, and that the particular instance of a dismissal which Mr. Jayewardene has brought to his notice would be duly inquired into.

Mr. Arthur Alvis moved that items 7, 8, and 9 of the recommendations of the Standing Committee on Sanitation and Markets of May 18, 1914, be adopted. Mr. C. P. Dias seconded.—Carried.

Standing Committee on Municipal Works.

10. With reference to item No. 2 of the recommendations of the Standing Committee on Municipal works of May 19, 1914, Dr. David Rockwood moved that Mr. Warwick Major be charged an enhanced rent of Rs. 15 per diem on the same conditions as at present. Dr. D. P. Banajee seconded.

Messrs. A. J. Martin, W. Sutherland Ross, the Hon. Sir Allan Perry, Messrs. G. Lionel Cox and W. C. S. Ingles spoke in favour of the continuance of the present tenancy.

Mr. J. A. Perera moved, as an amendment, that the occupancy of the present tenant of the Empire Theatre be terminated upon six months from the date of notice, and that the site be made use of in the same way as the remaining portion of the Raquet Court. Dr. W. P. Rodrigo seconded.

Mr. C. P. Dias supported the amendment. The amendment was put to the Meeting, and on a show of hands being taken it was declared lost, 6 voting for it and 9 against.

Mr. Arthur Alvis moved, as a further amendment, that the recommendation of the Standing Committee be passed with the addition of the words "as a tenancy renewable from day to day as at present, and that the permission of Government be obtained." Mr. E. G. Jayewardene seconded.

The amendment was put to the Meeting, and, on a division being called by Dr. Rodrigo, the Council divided as follows:—

The amendment was declared lost, 7 voting for it and 8 against.

The Chairman suggested that the rent should be raised to Rs. 20 per diem.

Mr. J. A. Perera moved, as a further amendment, that Mr. Warwick Major be allowed to continue his present occupancy on an increased rent, and that the question of the increase in the rent be referred to the Works and Finance Committees. Mr. C. P. Dias seconded.—Carried unanimously.

Resolved that the remaining items of the recommendations of the Works Committee of May 18, 1914, be adopted.

Standing Committee on Finance.

With reference to item No. 35 of the recommendations of the Finance Committee of May 19, 1914, it was resolved that the Council's resolution in regard to item No. 5 of the Extracts from the Minutes of the Sanitation Committee of May 18, 1914, be adopted.

"An improved latex spout and coconut-shell holder."

Abstract:—

The inventors state:—

This invention relates to improvements in spouts for the collection of rubber latex in such a manner as to involve the minimum formation of scrap or residual rubber adhering to tree stems in the process of collection. Further, where such spouts are employed, injuries to the cambium of the tree are avoided.

The nature of the invention is described in the claims as follows:—

1. An improved latex spout and coconut-shell holder, which may be fixed at any point on a rubber tree, and constructed of sheet iron, zinc, or tin, shaped in the form of a semicircular spout, and provided with two small triangular lugs and a larger triangular lug, all three of which lugs are cut on two sides and pressed out of the material of which the spout is constructed till they lie at right angles to the body of the spout, substantially as set forth.

2. An improved latex spout and coconut-shell holder, wherein two triangular lugs are provided at such a distance from the extremity of the spout, which is inserted into the bark of the rubber tree, as to prevent the insertion of the said spout to such a depth or extent as would injure the cambium of the tree, substantially as set forth.

3. An improved latex spout and coconut-shell holder, which, being inserted at right angles to the bark surface of the tree, forms a hook or projection whereby a coconut shell when not in use collecting latex may be suspended on its concave surface, being placed over the said projection afforded by the spout, substantially as set forth.

4. An improved latex spout and coconut-shell holder having an extension piece beyond the shell-holding lug to receive the blows or pressure dealt in fixing the spout into the tree, substantially as set forth.

5. An improved latex spout and coconut-shell holder having means of suspending a coconut shell when in use for the collection of latex by means of the provision of a triangular lug cut and bent out of the material of which the spout is constructed, in the manner substantially as described and illustrated, so that after the spout is fixed to the tree the rim or edge of a coconut shell may be inserted between the said lug and the bark of the tree, whereby the said shell is firmly and securely held by the jamming action of the shell's rim between the lug and the tree caused by the leverage and weight of the shell, substantially as set forth.

"An improved apparatus for collecting latex, gums, and resins from rubber and other trees."

Abstract :—

The inventors state :—

Our invention relates to apparatus for conducting the latex, gums, and resins from the cut incisions or place of exudation in the bark of rubber or other trees into the collecting cup or vessel (hereinafter referred to as the latex cup) to which it is desired the latex should be collected, and to apparatus for the holding of the latex cup in the required position for receiving and collecting the latex, gums, and resins.

The object of our invention is to provide a simple apparatus in the nature of a latex channel or spout, with a cup-holder combined, capable of being easily and firmly attached to the tree.

According to our invention this apparatus is made in two parts, which we refer to hereinafter as "the spout" and "the holder."

The nature of the invention is described in the claims as follows :—

1. In apparatus for collecting latex, gums, and resins from rubber and other trees a metal spout forming a channel, characterized by being slotted along the base of the channel forming loops for the reception of a pin or staple to affix the spout to the tree, substantially as described and illustrated.
2. In apparatus for collecting latex, gums, and resins from rubber and other trees a pin or staple characterized by being provided with a fine point for the purpose of being inserted through the loops in the spout referred to in claim (1) and projecting beyond the spout for the purpose of fixing the spout to the tree.
3. In apparatus for collecting latex, gums, and resins from rubber and other trees the subject-matter of claim (2), provided with a fine point as and for the purposes described, and also provided with a shaped head at the end opposite the fine point bent or curved for the suspension therefrom of the collecting cup in position to receive the latex, gums, and resins conducted by the spout, substantially as described and illustrated.
4. In apparatus for collecting latex, gums, and resins from rubber and other trees the subject-matter of claim (1) provided with loops as and for the purposes described, with the subject-matter of claim (2) provided with the fine point at one end as and for the purposes described in combination, substantially as described and illustrated.
5. In apparatus for collecting latex, gums, and resins from rubber and other trees the subject-matter of claim (1) provided with loops as and for the purposes described with the subject-matter of claim (3) provided with the fine point at one end as and for the purposes described and having the other end bent or curved as and for the purposes described, substantially as described and illustrated.

"Improvements in combined spout fasteners and cup holders in apparatus for collecting latex, gums, and resins from rubber and other trees."

Abstract :—

The inventors state :—

Our invention relates to apparatus for conducting into the collecting cup or vessel the latex, gums, and resins from the cut incisions or place of exudation in the bark of rubber and other trees, and in particular to such spouts for conducting the latex, gums, and resins from the tree to the collecting cups, which are provided with a pin staple or holder having a fine point which, passing through loops provided in the base of the channel of the spout, is then pressed into the tree and so fastens the spout to the tree. In Application No. 1,422 dated July 7, 1914, made prior hereto, we have described an invention for spouts slotted along the base of the channel so as to form loops for the passing through of a fastening pin or staple, and for a pointed pin or staple which, passing through these loops, is pressed into the tree and so fastens the spout to the tree. The object of our present invention is to provide an effective pin or staple and fastener of improved design, which not only fulfils the purpose of fastening the looped spout to the tree, but also provides a means of holding the collecting cup in position for receiving the latex, gums, and resins conducted into it by the spout.

The nature of the invention is described in the claim as follows :—

1. In apparatus for collecting latex, gums, and resins from rubber and other trees, comprising spouts attached to trees by a pointed pin or staple passing through loops in the base of the channel of the spout, a pin or staple characterized by being bent so as to have two arms, of which one is longer and provided with a point for the purpose of passing through the loops in the spout and being then pressed into the tree, thus fastening the spout to the tree, and the other shorter and of length sufficient when the longer arm is pressed into the tree to press the edge of the collecting cup against the tree and hold it in position, substantially as described and illustrated.

ARTICLES OF ASSOCIATION OF THE TAPROBANE ENGINEERING COMPANY, LIMITED.

THE Articles of Association of the Taprobane Engineering Co., Limited, shall be for all practical purposes the set of Model Articles given in Schedule "C" of "The Joint Stock Companies Act, 1861," subject to the following special provisions :—

Directors.—The business of the Company shall be managed by five Directors, three of whom shall form a quorum, with power to add to their number. The registered office of the Company is to be established in Colombo.

3. The objects for which the Company is to be established are—

- (n) To draw, make, accept, and endorse bills of lading, warrants, bills of exchange, promissory notes, and other transferable or negotiable instruments for the purposes of the Company.

- (o) To unite, co-operate, amalgamate, or enter into partnership or any arrangement for sharing profits or union of interests or any other arrangement with any person or company already engaged in or hereafter to be established for the purpose of carrying on any business having objects wholly or in parts similar or analogous or subsidiary to those of the Company or to any of them, or capable of being conducted so as to benefit the Company, either directly or indirectly, and to subscribe for or otherwise acquire for the benefit and in the name of the Company or otherwise and pay for in any manner that may be agreed upon, either in money or in shares or bonds or otherwise, and to hold any shares, stock, or other interest in any such company, and to promote the formation of any such company.

- (q) To acquire by purchase in money, shares, bonds, or otherwise, and undertake all or any part of the business, property, assets, and liabilities of any person or company carrying on any business in Ceylon or elsewhere which this Company is authorized to carry on, or possessed of property suitable for the purposes of this Company.
- (r) To sell the property, business, or undertaking of the Company, or any part or parts thereof, for such consideration as the Company shall think fit, and in particular for shares, stocks, debentures, or securities of any other company.
- (s) To procure the Company to be registered or incorporated in Ceylon, and, if and when necessary or thought advisable, elsewhere.
- (t) To lend money on any terms and in any manner and on any security, or without any security at all, and generally to transact financial business of any kind.
- (u) To invest and deal with the moneys of the Company not immediately required upon such securities and in such manner as may from time to time be determined.
- (v) To promote and establish any other company whatsoever, and to subscribe to and hold the shares or stock of any other company or any part thereof.
- (w) To pay for any lands and real or personal, immovable, or movable, estate or property or assets of any kind acquired or to be acquired by the Company, or for any services rendered or to be rendered to the Company, and generally to pay or discharge any consideration to be paid or given by the Company in money or in shares or debentures or debenture stock or obligations of the Company or partly in one way and partly in another, or otherwise howsoever, with power to issue any shares either fully or partially paid up for such purpose.

ARTICLES OF ASSOCIATION OF THE CEYLON SAW-MILLS COMPANY, LIMITED.

SUBJECT as hereinafter provided, the regulations contained in Table C annexed to "The Joint Stock Companies' Ordinance, 1861," shall apply to this Company, but shall be subject to repeal, addition, or alteration by special resolution. The Company may, by special resolution, alter and make provisions instead of, or in addition to, any of the regulations of the Company, whether contained or comprised in these Articles or not.

1. Clauses 2, 3, 8, 9, 10, 32, 45, 46, 64, and 65 of Table C shall not apply.

COMMENCEMENT OF BUSINESS.

2. The Company may proceed to carry out the objects for which it is established, and to employ and apply its capital as soon after the registration of the Company as the Directors in their discretion shall think fit; and if the whole of the shares shall not have been subscribed, applied for, or allotted, as soon as, in the judgment of the Directors, a sufficient number of shares shall have been subscribed or applied for.

ALLOTMENT OF SHARES.

3. The shares shall be under the control of the Directors who may allot and otherwise dispose of the same to such persons, on such terms and conditions, and at such times, as the Directors shall think fit.

CALLS.

4. The Directors may from time to time make such calls as they think fit upon the members in respect of any moneys unpaid on their shares, and not by the terms of issue made payable at fixed times, and provided that no call shall exceed one-fourth of the nominal amount of the share, or be payable at less than one month from the time when the last preceding call was made payable; and each member shall (subject to receiving at least fourteen days' notice specifying the time and place of payment) pay to the Company at the time and place so specified the amount called on his shares. A call may be made payable by instalments.

5. A call shall be deemed to have been made at the time when the resolution of the Directors authorizing such call was passed.

CERTIFICATES OF SHARES.

6. Every Shareholder shall be entitled to a certificate or certificates under the common seal of the Company, specifying the share or shares held by him and the amount paid thereon.

7. If any certificate be worn out or defaced, then, upon production thereof to the Directors, they may order the same to be cancelled and may issue a new certificate in lieu thereof; and if any certificate be lost or destroyed, then, upon proof thereof to the satisfaction of the Directors, and on such indemnity as the Directors deem adequate being given, a new certificate in lieu thereof shall be given to the person entitled to such lost or destroyed certificate.

TRANSFER OF SHARES.

8. The Board may, at their own absolute and uncontrolled discretion, decline to register any transfer of shares by a Shareholder who is indebted to the Company, or upon whose shares the Company have alien or otherwise, or in case of shares not fully paid up, to any person not approved by them; and in no case shall a Shareholder or proposed transferee be entitled to require the Directors to state the reason of their refusal to register, but their declinature shall be absolute.

9. Every instrument of transfer must be left at the office of the Company to be registered, accompanied by such evidence as the Directors may reasonably require to prove the title of the transferor, and a fee of two rupees and fifty cents, or such other sum as the Directors shall from time to time determine, must be paid to the Company for the registration of every such transfer, upon payment whereof the Directors, subject to the powers vested in them by Article 8, shall register the transferee as a Shareholder and retain the instrument of transfer.

10. The Directors may, by such means, as they shall deem expedient authorize the registration of transferees as Shareholders without the necessity of any meeting of the Directors for that purpose.

11. In no case shall the Directors be bound to inquire into the validity, legal effect, or genuineness of any instrument of transfer produced by a person claiming a transfer of any share in accordance with these Articles; and whether they abstain from so inquiring, or do so inquire and are misled, the transferor shall have no claim whatsoever upon the Company in respect of the share, except for the dividends previously declared in respect thereof, but only, if at all, upon the transferee only.

12. The Register of Transfers may be closed during the ten days immediately preceding each Ordinary General Meeting; and when a dividend is declared, for the three next ensuing after the Meeting; also at such other times (if any) and for such periods as the Directors may from time to time determine, provided always that it shall not be closed for more than twenty-one days in any year.

BORROWING POWERS.

13. The Directors shall have power to procure from time to time, in the usual course of business, such temporary advances on the produce in hand, or in the future to be obtained from the Company's property, as they may find necessary or expedient for the purpose of defraying the expenses of working the Company's property, or of erecting, maintaining, improving, or extending buildings, machinery, or plantations, or otherwise. Also from time to time at their discretion to borrow or raise from the Directors or other person any sum or sums of money for the purposes of the Company, provided that the moneys so borrowed or raised and owing at any one time shall not, without the sanction of a General Meeting, exceed the nominal amount of the issued Capital.

14. With the sanction of a General Meeting the Board shall be entitled to borrow such further sum or sums and at such rate of interest as such meeting shall determine. A certificate under the hands of one Director and the Secretary, or of two Directors, to the effect that in taking any loan the Directors are not exceeding their borrowing powers, shall be sufficient and binding on the Company and all concerned, and shall be conclusive evidence thereof in all questions between the Company and its creditors.

15. For the purpose of securing the repayment of any such moneys so borrowed or raised, or for any other purposes, the Directors may grant, create, execute, and issue any mortgages, cash credits, debentures, debenture stock, bonds, or obligations of the Company, charged upon all or any part of the undertaking, revenue, lands, property, rights, and assets of the Company, both present and future, including uncalled capital or unpaid calls, or may make, accept, or endorse on behalf of the Company any promissory notes or bills of exchange.

16. Any such securities may be issued, either at par or at a premium or discount, and may from time to time be cancelled, discharged, varied, or exchanged as the Directors may think fit, and may contain special privileges as to redemption, surrender, drawings, allotment of shares, or otherwise.

17. Every debenture or other instrument issued by the Company for securing the payment of money may be so framed that the moneys thereby secured shall be assignable free from any equities between the Company and the person to whom the same may be issued.

GENERAL MEETINGS.

18. The First General Meeting shall be held at such time, not being more than twelve months after the incorporation of the Company, and at such place as the Directors may determine.

19. Subsequent General Meetings shall be held once in every year at such time and place as may be prescribed by the Company in General Meeting, and if no time or place is so prescribed, then at such place and at such time as soon after the first day in each year as may be determined by the Directors.

20. The General Meetings mentioned in the last preceding clause shall be called Ordinary General Meetings; all other Meetings of the Company shall be called Extraordinary General Meetings.

21. No business shall be transacted at any General Meeting, except the declaration of a dividend recommended by a report of the Directors or the election of a Chairman, unless there shall be present or represented at the commencement of the business three or more Shareholders entitled to vote.

DIRECTORS.

22. The number of Directors shall never be less than two nor more than five, but this clause shall be construed as directory only, and the continuing Directors may act notwithstanding any number of vacancies.

The qualification of a Director shall be the holding of one hundred shares in the Company.

The Directors shall be paid out of the funds of the Company by way of remuneration for their services the sum of Rs. 1,000 per annum and such further sums as the Company in General Meeting may from time to time determine, and such remuneration shall be divided among them in such proportion and manner as the Directors may determine, and in default of such determination among them in proportion to their respective attendances at Board Meetings.

23. One or more of the Directors may be appointed by the Directors to act as Secretary, Managing Director, or Managing Directors, and (or) Visiting Agent or Agents of the Company, or Superintendents of any of the estates, for such time and on such terms as the Directors may determine, or may fix by agreement with the person or persons appointed to the office, and they may from time to time revoke such appointment and appoint another or other Secretary, Managing Director or Managing Directors, and (or) Visiting Agent or Agents or Superintendents.

The Directors may confer on the Managing Director or Managing Directors all or any duties and powers that might be conferred on any Manager of the Company.

If any Director shall be called upon to perform any extra services, the Directors may arrange with such Director for such special remuneration for such services, either by way of salary, commission, or the payment of a lump sum of money, as they shall think fit.

24. A resolution in writing signed by a majority of the Directors for the time being in Ceylon shall be as valid and effectual as if it had been passed at a meeting of the Directors duly called and constituted.

25. The Directors may, with the sanction of the Company in General Meeting, from time to time declare a dividend to be paid, and (or) pay a bonus to the Shareholders in proportion to the amount paid on their shares; but no dividend shall be payable except out of nett profits.

26. The Directors may, if they think fit, determine on and declare an interim dividend to be paid, or pay a bonus to the Shareholders on account and in anticipation of the dividend for the then current year.

DISQUALIFICATION OF DIRECTORS.

27. The office of the Director shall *ipso facto* be vacated—

- (a) If he accepts or holds any office or place of profit other than Managing Director, Manager, Departmental Manager, Secretary, Visiting Agent, or Superintendent under the Company; but the position of trustee of a deed for securing debentures or debenture stock of the Company, or of Solicitor, or Banker is not to be considered an office or place of profit.
- (b) If he becomes bankrupt or insolvent, or suspends payment, or files a petition for the liquidation of his affairs, or compounds with his creditors.
- (c) If by any reason of mental or bodily infirmity he becomes incapable of acting.
- (d) If he ceases to hold the required number of shares to qualify him for the office.
- (e) If he is absent from the Meetings of the Directors during a period of three calendar months without special leave of absence from the Directors.
- (f) If he is concerned or participates in the profits of any contract with, or work done for, the Company. Provided that no Director shall vacate his office by reason of his being a member of any corporation, company, or firm which has entered into any contract with, or done any work for, the Company of which he is a Director or which is concerned in or participates in the profits of any contract with the Company or by his being Agent, or Secretary, or Solicitor, or by his being a member of a firm who are Agents, or Secretaries, or Solicitors of the Company; nevertheless, he shall not vote in respect of any contract work or business in which he may be personally interested.
- (g) If by notice in writing to the Company he resigns his office.
- (h) If he is requested in writing by all his co-directors to resign.
