**VITAL STATISTICS OF TOWNS IN CEYLON IN THE  
MONTH OF JULY, 1914.**

**REPORT OF THE REGISTRAR-GENERAL.**

This report deals with the Vital Statistics of the 32 principal towns in the Island proclaimed under sections 31-36 of the Ordinance No. 1 of 1895.

**Births.**

2. The births numbered 1,229 (638 males and 591 females), and were equal to an annual rate of 25·61 per 1,000, against 26·67 in the preceding month, 26·80 in the corresponding month of last year, and 29·27 the monthly average since July, 1907. The rate ranged from 5·87 in Kalmunai to 51·82 in Hambantota.

3. In the city of Colombo the births numbered 452 (227 males and 225 females), and were equal to an annual rate\* of 21·89 per 1,000, against 21·92 in the preceding month, 19·77 in the corresponding month of last year, and 24·66 the monthly average. The rate ranged from 10·24 in St. Paul's to 27·23 in New Bazaar.

**Deaths.**

4. The total deaths registered during the month amounted to 1,673 (938 males and 735 females). There were 1,368 deaths of residents, equivalent to an annual rate of 31·07 per 1,000 against 26·99 in the preceding month, 26·75 in the corresponding month of last year, and 30·76 the monthly average. The rate declined from 66·36 in Anuradhapura to 12·44 in Kegalla and 8·09 in Nuwara Eliya.

5. In the city of Colombo the deaths numbered 589 (353 males and 236 females). There were 537 deaths of residents, equivalent to an annual rate\* of 30·17 per 1,000, against 24·50 in the preceding month, 24·62 in the corresponding month of last year, and 30·93 the monthly average. Kollupitiya showed the lowest death-rate, viz., 12·77, and Wellawatta the highest, 43·03.

6. Stillbirths numbered 77 (47 males and 30 females), against 75 in the preceding month.

**Infantile Mortality.**

7. The infantile mortality was equal to a rate of 263 per 1,000 births registered, against 261 in the preceding month, 300 in the corresponding month of last year, and 267 the monthly average. Infant mortality rates calculated on the number of births and deaths that occur in any one town of small population are misleading, and such rates are omitted from the table.

8. The infantile mortality in the city of Colombo was 233 per 1,000 births registered, against 231 in the preceding month, 396 in the corresponding month of last year, and 318 the monthly average, and ranged from 609 in St. Paul's to 114 in Kotahena.

**Causes of Death.**

9. The highest mortality was from *Pneumonia*, to which 10 per cent. of the total deaths were due, 9 per cent. were due to *Infantile Convulsions*, 8 per cent. to *Diarrhoea*, 7 per cent. each to *Debility* and *Phthisis*, 5 per cent. to *Dysentery*, and 3 per cent. each to *Anchylostomiasis* and *Bronchitis*.

10. In the city of Colombo the highest mortality was from *Infantile Convulsions*, which caused 12 per cent. of the total number of deaths in the city. 10 per cent. of deaths were due to *Phthisis*, 9 per cent. to *Plague*, 8 per cent. each to *Pneumonia* and *Debility*, 7 per cent. to *Enteritis*, 4 per cent. to *Bronchitis*, and 1 per cent. each to *Diarrhoea* and *Anchylostomiasis*. The total number of deaths from *Plague* was 52, against 36 in June, 30 in May, 29 in April, and 71 in March.

11. *Infectious Diseases reported.*—The most prevalent infectious disease during the month was *Phthisis*, of which 84 cases were reported (69 in Colombo, 9 in Galle), followed by *Plague* 46 (in Colombo), *Enteric Fever* 43 (24 in Colombo, 10 in Moratuwa, 4 in Galle), *Chickenpox* 24 (10 in Colombo, 9 in Kalutara), *Smallpox* 14 (10 in Lunugala, 2 in Colombo), *Measles* 14 (11 in Badulla, 2 in Colombo), *Continued Fever* 13 (8 in Colombo), *Diarrhoea* 4 (in Galle), *Enteritis* 4 (in Anuradhapura), *Mumps* 1 (in Colombo), *Diphtheria* 1 (in Colombo), *Dysentery* 1 (in Moratuwa).

**Meteorology.**

12. *Rainfall.*—Hatton and Dikoya recorded the highest rainfall (22·73 inches), followed by Nuwara Eliya (11·80 inches). In the other towns the rainfall ranged from 0·16 inch in Kurunegala to 9·47 inches in Ratnapura.

13. *Temperature.*—The mean temperature varied from 60·6° in Nuwara Eliya to 87·8° in Trincomalee, and was 81·5° in Colombo.
