HEREAS by the fourth section of the Royal Naval Reserve (Volunteer) Act, 1859, it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the King on such occasions as His Majesty shall deem fit (the occasion being first communicated to Parliament or declared in Council and notified by Proclamation if Parliament be not sitting or in being) to order and direct that the Volunteers under that Act, or so many or such part of them as His Majesty may deem necessary shall be called into actual service:

And whereas by the first section of the Naval Reserve (Mobilization) Act, 1900, it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the King, in case of any such ofder and direction, to authorize the Admiralty to give, and when given to revoke or vary, such directions as may seem necessary or proper for calling out all or any of the said Volunteers as the occasion may require:

And whereas the King has communicated to Parliament (or has declared in Council) and notified by Proclamation that owing to the state of public affairs and the demands upon his Naval Forces for the protection of the Empire an occasion has arisen for ordering and directing as in the said first-mentioned Act is provided:

It is hereby notified that the King has ordered and directed that the Royal Naval Reserves, or such part of them as the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty may direct, be called into actual service.

GOVERNMENT NOTIFICATIONS.

Notification of Suspension of Telegraph and Radio-Telegraph Services throughout the Empire.

IS BRITANNIC MAJESTY'S GOVERNMENT find themselves under the necessity of availing themselves of the power reserved under Article 8 of the International Telegraph Convention and Article 17 of the International Radio-Telegraph Convention to suspend the transmission of telegrams and radio-telegrams to and from or in transit through the United Kingdom, and to and from or in transit through all British Possessions and all British Protectorates whatsoever, save and except such telegrams and radio-telegrams as are on the service of His Majesty's Government or of the Government of any British Possession or Protectorate.

With a view, however, to minimize inconvenience to the public, His Britannic Majesty's Government will, until further notice, and as an act of grace, permit the transmission of such telegrams and radio-telegrams in plain language as Foreign Governments or the public choose to send, provided that such telegrams and radio-telegrams are written in English or French, and on the understanding that they are accepted at the sender's risk and subject to censorship by the British Authorities; that is, that they may be stopped, delayed, or otherwise dealt with in all respects at the discretion of those Authorities and without notice to the senders, and that no claims in respect of them, whether for the reimbursement of the sums paid for transmission or otherwise, will be considered by His Majesty's Government in any circumstances whatever.

It is, moreover, essential that such telegrams and radio-telegrams should bear the scader's name at the early of the text, otherwise they are liable to be stopped until the name is notified by paid telegram.

Registered abbreviated addresses will not be accepted, either as addresses or as the names of senders.

Norg.—The term "telegram" is applied to radio-telegraph messages sent from shore to shore, as we all as those sent by cable or land line. The term "radio-telegram" is used to denote messages exchanged between ships and the shore.

Special Admiralty Order.

MOBILIZATION OF THE ROYAL NAVAL RESERVE

Men absent from the British Islands. [13]

His Majesty the King having issued His Proclamation ordering and directing that the Royal Naval Volunteers (commonly known as the Royal Naval Reserve) under the Royal Naval Reserve Act, 1859, or as many or such part of them as the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty may direct, be called into actual service;

Notice is hereby given that all men in the Royal Naval Reserve who are absent from the British Islands are liable to serve in the Royal Navy, if called upon by the Officer Commanding any of His Majesty's Ships.

Royal Naval Reserve men serving in the Merchant Ships abroad, on receiving notice of the issue of the Royal Proclamation at any Port they may call at, are to report themselves to the Senior British Naval Officer at that Port, or to the first British Naval Officer they may meet; or failing that, to the nearest Registrar of Naval Reserve on arrival in the British Islands.

Royal Naval Reserve men abroad, but not serving in Merchant Ships, are to report themselves to the nearest British Naval, Consular, or Colonial Officer forthwith.

Any man failing to report himself without delay in compliance with this Order will be liable to arrest as a Deserter.
