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# PROCLAMATIONS BY THE GOVERNOR.

In the Name of His Majesty GEORGE THE FIFTH, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, King, Defender of the Faith.

#### PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir ROBERT CHALMERS, Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

# ROBERT CHALMERS.

HEREAS the following by-laws have been made by the Municipal Council of Colombo, under the provisions of sections 109 (1) and 110 (1) (a) of "The Municipal Councils Ordinance, 1910," and have been confirmed by the Governor in Executive Council as provided by section 109 (3), subject to the provisions of section 109 (4) of the said Ordinance:

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, in exercise of the power vested in Us by the said section of the above-mentioned Ordinance, do hereby proclaim the said by-laws.

Given at Colombo, in the said Island of Ceylon, this Twenty-sixth day of October, in the year of our Lord One thousand Nine hundred and Fourteen.

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#### By-LAWS RELATING TO LEAVE.

1. These by-laws shall apply to all officers and servants of this Council, save and except the Chairman, the Assistant Chairman, if any, appointed under the provisions of section 50, and the Municipal Magistrate.

Leave may be recalled .- All leave is granted or withheld subject to the necessities of the Municipal Service, and leave once granted may be recalled at any time, if such a step be deemed necessary for the Municipal Service, by the Chairman provided that no leave granted by the Chairman with the sanction of the Council shall be recalled by the Chairman, except with the like sanction.

Absence from Colombo.—An officer may not absent himself from his station without leave from the Chairman.

4. Leave to be obtained formally.—Formal application for such leave must be made in all instances to the Chairman, even though permission may have been obtained verbally or demi-officially, and although the days for which leave of absence is desired are Government holidays

Absence without Leave. - In the event of an officer absenting himself from his station or his duties without leave, or violating in any respect these by-laws, the Head of the Department in which the officer is employed will at once report the case to the Chairman, and the pay of such an officer will be stopped until the order of the Chairman upon the case is made known.

6. Periods of Leave to be granted by Chairman and Council.—It shall be lawful for the Chairman to grant leave to all officers and servants of the Council, provided that no leave for a period exceeding six weeks on full or half pay or both shall be granted by the Chairman without the sanction of the Council.

7. Sick Leave .--When an application for leave or an extension of leave is based on the ground of ill-health, or when an officer cannot attend office on account of sickness, a medical certificate must invariably be sent in on Form A in the schedule.

8. Forms for Leave Applications.—Heads of Departments must forward application for leave, either on their own account or on that of officers of their department, on the proper form, viz. :

(a) Leave in the Colony on Form B in the schedule. (b) Leave out of the Colony on Form C in the schedule.

Applications which are not made on the proper form will be returned.

A register of all leave granted must be kept.

Annual Full Pay Leave. - Vacation leave on full pay may be granted for periods not exceeding six weeks in respect of any year.

10. Accumulation.—(i.) Vacation leave may be accumulated for two years only, and, subject to the requirements of the Service, an officer will be allowed accumulated vacation leave for not more than three months in respect of the leave due to him for the year preceding and the year in which he takes the leave.

(ii.) An officer who has taken his accumulated vacation leave of three months in any year may nevertheless, subject to sub-section (i.), be granted six weeks vacation

leave in the following year.

11. "Continuous Duty" Rule.—As a general rule, officers will be required to perform nine and eighteen months continuous duty before vacation leave on full pay

for six weeks and three months respectively can be granted to them.

12. Arrangements for Duties of Officer on Leave.—Where an officer seeks to obtain vacation leave only, he must, with the concurrence or sanction of the Chairman, make such arrangements as may be necessary for the adequate discharge of his duties without expense or inconvenience to the Council, except in very special circumstances

Substitute's expenses payable by Council in certain cases.—It shall be lawful for the Chairman, with the approval of the Standing Committee on Finance, to engage a substitute to perform the duties of an officer or servant on leave, such substitute shall be paid such salary as the Chairman, with the approval of the Standing Committee on Finance, shall fix. In case the officer or servant in whose place the substitute is sought to be appointed is in receipt of a salary exceeding Rs. 1,200 a year, the appointment of the substitute shall be made, and the amount of his salary shall be fixed by the Council. In no case should the salary of the substitute exceed the initial salary of the officer.

14. Casual Leave.—Short periods of leave not exceeding fourteen days in any year may be granted to an officer by the Chairman, provided that such officer can be conveniently spared from his duties. Such leave is not accumulative, and in no case can it be granted to prolong the period for which ordinary leave is granted Such leave will not be counted in calculating the amount of vacation leave on full pay for which an officer is eligible when he is proceeding on long leave.

15. Periods of Leave to be continuous.—Every period of leave applied for (other

than casual leave under section 14) must be continuous, irrespective of any holidays

or Sundays that may intervene.

Example.—An officer desires leave of absence from December 23 to January 4.

Of these 13 days, December 24 to 28 and January 1 and 2 are public holidays, but the officer cannot apply for leave for December 23, December 29 to 31, and January 3. The whole period must count as leave.

16. Mode of Calculation of Three Months Full Pay Leave.—Three months vacation or sick leave on full pay will be regarded as equal to 13 weeks or 91 days, and any leave already taken (other than casual leave) should be substracted from 91 days.

17. Leave to Peons and other Minor Employes.—In the case of peons and other subordinate employes drawing less than Rs. 250 per annum, casual leave may be granted at the discretion of the Head of the Department; but when a peon is granted

leave, he should, as a rule, either provide an approved substitute, or forfeit his pay for the period during which he is on leave.

- Temporary Officers not entitled to Leave.—Temporary officers are not entitled to except as provided in their agreements. The Chairman may, however, to leave except as provided in their agreements. grant such officers full or half pay leave, provided that no leave for a period exceeding six weeks shall be granted by the Chairman without the sanction of the Council, and the Council may in case of sickness grant further leave if they think fit.
- Half Pay Leave out of the Colony.—Subject to the necessities of the Service leave of absence on half pay may be granted without any special grounds after six years resident service from first appointment in the Municipal Service, or in the case of seconded or transferred officers a period of six years total service with the Government and the Council. It may be given after a less duration of service in cases of serious indisposition or of urgent private affairs, if the Council is satisfied that the indulgence is indispensable. In cases of serious indisposition the state of the officer's health must be certified by his medical attendant, or if required by the Council by a Medical Board. In cases of urgent private affairs the nature of such private affairs must be stated confidentially to the Chairman.
- 20. Calculation of Leave due.—In the absence of special grounds half pay leave must not exceed one-sixth of the officer's resident service in the Colony. On special grounds it may exceed that period by six months.
- Half Pay Leave not to be spent in the Colony.—Half pay leave is primarily intended to enable an officer to recruit his health by change of climate, and it will not be granted to be spent in the Colony, except in special circumstances.
- 22. Commutation of Half Pay Leave.—At the request of any officer who may be entitled to half pay leave, the Council may commute the whole or any pertion of such leave, provided it is to be spent outside the Colony, into one-half the period of leave with full salary, provided that the total period of commuted and uncommuted leave, together with any period of vacation leave that may be granted, does not exceed ten months at a time. No officer can claim as a right to commute his leave in this manner, the decision whether commutation can or cannot be allowed being wholly within the discretion of the Council.

Note.—Salary during "commuted" leave will be payable only at the current "official" rate of exchange (i.e., 1s. 4d. to the rupee).

No private arrangements to benefit Officers allowed.—When an officer is entitled to half pay leave, no private arrangements made with the object of securing to him more than half pay will be allowed.

Combined Vacation and Half Pay Leave.—(i.) Vacation leave may be granted

to an officer to be followed immediately by leave on half pay.

(ii.) Where full pay (i.e., vacation) leave is to be followed by half pay leave (including commuted half pay leave), the arrangements for the discharge of the officer's duties will be made by the Council, and every officer is liable and required to act without any increase of pay in an office ranking as high as, or higher than, his fixed appointment during the period of vacation leave thus granted.

(iii.) No officer shall proceed on vacation leave until he has handed over to the officer who has been appointed to act for him during his absence, or to some other

officer authorized by the Chairman.

25. Remuneration to Acting Officers from available Half Pay.—(i.) If any office be vacated by the death, removal, or absence on half pay leave of the holder, the person appointed to perform his duties may receive the available half pay of the office in proportion to the extra work he is required to do. The Chairman will decide in what proportion the available half pay is to be paid, provided that no officer can draw more than one-third of his full pay as remuneration for the extra work he is called upon to perform.

(ii.) Should an officer be appointed to act temporarily in a class or grade higher than that to which he belongs, he may draw the available half pay of the class to

which he is appointed to act and half his own pay.

(iii.) Where an officer acts in a post to which a higher commuted or travelling allowance than that which he normally draws is attached, he may draw the higher allowance while available.

26. Rate of Exchange for Payment of Salary in "Silver Currency" Countries .-Rates of exchange for payment of salaries in England:-

- (i.) Officers of the Municipal Council on leave residing in any part of Asia (except Cyprus) in any rupee-using country, or in any country the currency of which is based on a silver standard, will draw their salaries in the local currency at the current rate of exchange between the country in question and Ceylon or England, according as the salary is paid direct by the Municipal Council, or through the Crown Agents by arrangement with Government. The privilege rates of exchange which certain officers on rupee salaries have been allowed to retain will be payable solely in countries other than those above enumerated.
- (ii.) Rate of Exchange for Payment of Salary in England .- The following are the rates of exchange for payment of salaries in England :
  - (1) For officers on sterling salary 4 to the rupee (2) For officers on rupee salary:-
    - (a) If appointed not later than February 19, 1897
    - (b) If appointed after February 19, 1897, but not later than December 31, 1904
      - (c) If appointed on or after January 1, 1905

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- 27. Date up to which Salary is payable in Sterling.—All officers will draw salary at the sterling rate of exchange fixed in their leave certificates up to and including the day preceding that of their departure from England, but any officer spending one full week or more on the Continent before embarking for the Colony from Marseilles, Brindisi, Genoa, Naples, or Trieste is permitted to draw pay at the sterling rate up to including the day before his ship leaves such port.
- 28. Date of Resumption of Full Salary.—An officer returning from leave will be entitled to draw full salary only from the day on which he assumes the duties of his fixed office, or of the office the duties of which he may be ordered temporarily to discharge.
- 29. Pay of Officers on Leave.—Arrangements will be made with Government for the payment by the Crown Agents for the Colonies of the full salary and half salary of officers on leave in England.
- 30. Cases not provided for in these By-laws.—Should any case arise which has not been provided for in these by-laws, such case shall be considered and decided by the Council, regard being had to the provisions, if any, in that behalf contained in the Government Leave Minute.

### ROBERT CHALMERS.

WHEREAS by section 28 of "The Courts Ordinance, 1889," it is amongst other things enacted that Criminal Sessions of the Supreme Court shall be holden by one of the Judges thereof, or by a Commissioner of Assize duly appointed under the provisions of the said Ordinance, for each of the Circuits into which the Island is divided, for the hearing, trying, and determining all prosecutions which shall be commenced against any person for or in respect of any crime or offence or alleged crime or offence—

For the Midland Circuit, three times at least at Kandy, and any other Sessions at such other places in such Circuit as the Governor, after previous consultation with the Judges, shall appoint; such Sessions commencing at Kandy on March 10, on August 1, and on December 1 in every year:

And whereas it appears to Us expedient to order that a Criminal Session of the Supreme Court should be holden on the day hereinafter mentioned at Kurunegala, a place included within the said Midland Circuit:

Now, therefore, know Ye that We, the said Governor, for sufficient reasons to Us appearing, and after previous consultation with the Judges of the Supreme Court, do order and appoint that a Criminal Session of the Supreme Court shall be holden at Kurunegala, in the said Midland Circuit, on or about Monday, January 4, 1915.

#### VITAL STATISTICS.

# Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended November 14, 1914.

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 93 (8 Burghers, 54 Sinhalese, 16 Tamils, 11 Moors, 2 Malays, and 2 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on July 1, 1914, viz., 243,089) was 19.9, as against 22.3 in the preceding week, 24.8 in the corresponding week of last year, and 24.4 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 133 (4 Burghers, 57 Sinhalese, 41 Tamils, 22 Moors, 5 Malays, and 4 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 28.5, as against 30.0 in the previous week, 34.5 in the corresponding week of last year, and 28.0 the weekly average of last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 133 total deaths, 23 were of infants under one year of age, as against 34 in the preceding week, 39 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 31 the average of last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 8.

Principal Causes of Death.—Sixteen deaths from Phthisis were registered, as against 24 in the previous week and 13 the weekly average for last year. Of these, 6 were in Maradana (including 2 deaths of non-residents in hospitals), 3 in St. Paul's, 2 in Slave Island, 2 in Kollupitiya, 1 in Pettah, 1 in Kotahena, and 1 in Wellawatta.

- 2. Eleven deaths from *Pneumonia* were registered, as against 6 in the previous week and 15 the weekly average for last year. Of these, 2 were in Maradana, 2 in San Sebastian, 2 in Wellawatta, 1 in St. Paul's, 1 in Kotahena, 1 in New Bazaar, 1 in Slave Island, and 1 in Kollupitiya. Nine deaths from *Bronchitis* were registered.
- 3. Five deaths from *Plague* were registered, as against 4 in the previous week. Of these, 2 were in San Sebastian, 1 in St. Paul's, 1 in Maradana, and 1 in Wellawatta. Nine cases were reported, as against 3 in the previous week.
- 4. Five deaths from Smallpox were registered, as against 2 in the previous week. Of these, 2 were in Slave Island, 2 in Wellawatta (including 1 death of a non-resident in hospital), and 1 in Maradana. Seven cases were reported, as against 15 in the previous week.
- 5. Three deaths from Enteric Fever were registered, as against 4 in the previous week and 3 the weekly average for last year. Of these, 1 was in Kotahena, 1 in Maradana, and 1 in Slave Island.
- 6. Ten deaths from Infantile Convulsions were registered. Eight from Debility, 8 from Enteritis, 5 from Dysentery, 2 from Worms, 2 from Tetanus, and 49 from Other Causes.
- 7. Nineteen cases of Chickenpox were reported, as against 8 in the previous week. No cases of Measles were reported. There was 1 in the previous week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 80.3°, against 81.0° in the preceding week and 79.6° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.829 in., against 29.823 in. in the preceding week and 29.876 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 3.00 in., against 1.53 in. in the preceding week and 0.89 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.
