Accession of Russia to the Convention of November 9, 1914, between the United Kingdom and France relating to Prizes captured during the present European War.

(1) The Russian Ambassador to Sir E. Grey.

Imperial Russian Embassy, London, March 5, 1915.

SIR,-IN acceding, in the name of my Government, to the Convention concluded between Great Britain and France on November 9, 1914, I desire to call Your Excellency's attention to the fact that, according to Russian legislation, the condemnation of enemy cargoes on board merchant vessels of the allied States destined to Russian ports does not appertain to Prize Court jurisdiction, but is pronounced by the Imperial administrative authorities. It is consequently in this sense that Article 2, paragraph 2, of the aforesaid Convention should be interpreted so far as regards Russia.

PROCLAMATION BY SPECIAL COMMISSIONER.

1. All persons are hereby required to give all assistance and information to the Military and Civil Authorities in the Municipality of Colombo with regard to the recent rioting and all matters connected therewith.

2. All persons refusing or neglecting to obey any order given to them by the said Military and Civil Authorities, or who may be found carrying firearms, will be liable to be shot.

3. Any person harbouring any rioter, or suppressing any evidence with regard to the offenders in the recent riots, or spreading any false report, will be treated as an aider and abettor in the said riots, and will be liable to be shot.

4. Any person in possession of any firearms or dangerous weapon is required to surrender the same forthwith at the nearest Police Station; any person neglecting to obey this order will be liable to a penalty. (This order does not extend to any member of the European community, or any person entitled to bear arms as a member of a duly enrolled Corps.)

5. Any person found in possession of any explosives, gunpowder, or ammunition without a license from the Proper Authority will be liable to punishment.

Should any person decline to enter into the contract and bond, or fail to furnish approved security, within ten days of receiving notice in writing from the Head of the Department, or his duly authorized representative, that his tender has been accepted, such deposit will be forfeited to the Crown, and the defaulter will render himself liable to be included in the list of defaulting contractors precluded from having any concern in a Government contract. All other deposits will be returned upon signature of a contract.

7. The tender must be accompanied by a letter signed by two responsible persons, whose addresses must be given, engaging to become security for the due fulfilment of the contract.

8. Sufficient sureties will be required to join in a bond for the due fulfilment of each contract. The amount of security required will be Rs. 500.

9. The security should be furnished within ten days of acceptance of tender being notified.

10. All alterations or erasures in tenders should bear the initials of the tenderers, otherwise the tenders will be treated as informal and rejected.

11. No tender will be considered unless in respect of it all the conditions above laid down have been strictly fulfilled. Any offers received containing conditions outside the specification will be rejected without question.

12. Fines will be inflicted for delays in complying with orders.

13. The Government reserves to itself the right, without question, of rejecting any or all tenders, and the right of accepting any portion of a tender.

14. Before tender forms are supplied to persons wishing to tender, they will have to satisfy the General Manager or person delegated by him that they are in a position to execute the contract in a satisfactory manner, and for this purpose they must be prepared to produce documentary or other evidence if called for.

15. Contracts may not be assigned or sublet without the authority of the Tender Board.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended June 5, 1915.

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 34 (1 European, 3 Burghers, 18 Sinhalese, 8 Tamils, 2 Moors, and 2 Malays). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on January 1, 1915, viz., 247,397) was 7.2, as against 16.0 in the preceding week, 16.8 in the corresponding week of last year, and 22.2 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 134 (3 Europeans, 8 Burghers, 72 Sinhalese, 21 Tamils, 25 Moors, 2 Malays, and 3 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was $28 \cdot 2$, as against $25 \cdot 5$ in the previous week, $20 \cdot 5$ in the corresponding week of last year, and $26 \cdot 7$ the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 134 total deaths, 26 were of infants under one year of age, as against 29 in the preceding week, 22 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 27 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 4.

Principal Causes of Death.—Seventeen deaths from Phthisis were registered, as against 12 in the previous week and 14 the weekly average for last year. Of these, 4 were in St. Paul's, 4 in New Bazaar, 4 in Maradana (including 1 death of a non-resident in hospital), 2 in San Sebastian, 2 in Slave Island, and 1 in Pettah.

2. Ten deaths from *Pneumonia* were registered, as against 9 in the previous week and 11 the weekly average for last year. Of these, 5 were in Maradana (including 1 death of a non-resident in hospital). 1 in Pettah, 1 in St. Paul's, 1 in Kotahena, 1 in Slave Island, and 1 in New Bazaar. Two deaths from *Bronchitis* were registered.

3. Three deaths from *Enteric Fever* were registered, as in the previous week, against 2 the weekly average for last year. Of these, 2 were in Kotahena and the other in Wellawatta.

4. One death was registered from *Smallpox* (in Kollupitiya), as in the previous week. No cases were reported. One case was reported in the previous week.

5. No deaths from *Plague* were registered. One was in the previous week. No cases of *Plague* were reported. There was 1 in the previous week.

6. Seventeen deaths from Infantile Convulsions were registered, 8 from Debility, 5 from Enteritis, 5 from Worms, 4 from Dysentery, 2 from Diarrhæa, 1 from Tetanus, and 59 from Other Causes.

7. Seven cases of *Chickenpox* were reported, as against 2 in the previous week. One case of *Measles* was reported. There were none in the previous week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was $85 \cdot 2^{\circ}$, against $83 \cdot 3^{\circ}$ in the preceding week and $82 \cdot 6^{\circ}$ in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was $29 \cdot 779$ in., against $29 \cdot 848$ in. in the preceding week and $29 \cdot 824$ in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was $0 \cdot 36$ in., against $2 \cdot 79$ in. in the preceding week and $1 \cdot 45$ in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.
