India-West Coast-Narakal.

Notice is hereby given that the Narakal flagstaff in lat. 10° 03′ 0″ N., long. 76° 12′ 0″ E., will be dismantled and removed on or before May 15, 1903, and will not be again erected.

The light exhibited from the Narakal flagstaff during the south-west monsoon will, in future, be exhibited from the Mallipuram flagstaff in lat. 10° 01′ N., long. 76° 13′ 10" E.

The Mallipuram light will be visible from seaward between the bearings from north through east round to south-east at a distance of ten miles in clear weather.

The Narakal boundary pillar in lat. 10° 2′ 0" N., long. 76° 12′ 50" E., will be removed west 850 ft., and will be replaced in position before May 15, in lat. 10° 2′ 0″ N., long. 76° 12′ 42″ E.

#### BENGAL.-No. 111.

Japan-Uniform System of Buoyage established.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 185 of 1903) that a uniform system of buoyage has been established in Japanese waters as follows:

The buoys are principally conical in shape, but are characterized by colour and by the form of topmark. The term "starboard hand" means the right hand side

approaching from seaward, the term "port hand means the left hand side approaching from seaward. With reference to the Naikai (Seto Uchi or Inland) sea and other straits, the term "approaching from seaward" refers to an approach to an arbitrary point in the strait, or sea, which is termed the "Head waters," and which point will be fully described in the forthcoming edition of the Sailing Directions for Japan and the adjacent seas, formerly published as China Sea Directory, vol. IV, now in progress. The term "outer end of middle ground" is given to the buoys moored at the seaward extremity of middle grounds; to those at the inshore extremity, the term "inner end of middle ground" is applied. The buoys or beacons marking shoals of small extent are named isolated danger buoys or beacons.

A starboard hand buoy is conical, painted red, and surmounted by a red cone base downwards.

A port hand buoy is conical, painted black, and surmounted by a cylindrical topmark.

The outer end of a middle ground is marked by a conical buoy, painted in black and white horizontal bands, surmounted by a diamond as a topmark.

The inner end of a middle ground is marked by a conical buoy, painted in red and white horizontal bands, surmounted by two cones, points together, in the form of an hour glass, as a topmark.

Isolated dangers which may be passed on either side are marked either by a conical buoy, a spar buoy, or a cylindrical beacon, but always painted in red and black horizontal bands, and surmounted by a red ball as a

#### BENGAL.—No. 112.

Japan-Kiusiu-East Coast-Saiki Bay-Depth over Sukanose, and Foul Ground between North and South Kando Shima.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 187 of 1903) that the least depth over Sukanose, situated about one cable to the westward of South Kando Shima, Saiki bay, is  $4\frac{1}{4}$  fathoms, and not 6 fathoms, as shown on the chart.

Also, that the ground between North Kando Shima and South Kando Shima is foul. Vessels are, therefore, advised not to pass between those islands.

Approximate position, South Kando Shima: lat 33° 14'

N., long. 131° 55' E.

#### Bengali.—No. 113.

New Zealand-South Island, West Coast-Greymouth-Dredging in Progress.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 188 of 1903) that, with the object of increasing the depths alongside the wharves in Grey river, dredging operations have been commenced. During the time that this work is in progress vessels are required to pass to the northward or outside the dredger, and to reduce speed when passing it. To enable this to be done at night, a white fixed light will be exhibited on the northern side of the dredger.

Japan-Yezo-Yesansaki Light-Arc of Visibility.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 195 of 1903) that the sector of visibility of Yesansaki light (white flashing) is shown on the Japanese charts between the bearings of S. 14° E., through south, and N. 18° W., and not from S. 14° E., through south, and N. 6° W., as shown on the Admiralty publications.
