WHEREAS by Our Proclamations dated January 6, March 26, and June 19, 1915, published in the Government Gazettes Nos. 6,693, 6,706, and 6,723 of January 8, March 26, and June 25, 1915, respectively, certain Proclamations of His Majesty the King declaring various articles Contraband of War, were brought into force in the Colony of Ceylon:

And whereas the said rules having been transmitted to Us by the said Government Agent for approval or disallowance thereof have been approved by Us with the advice of the Executive Council:

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, in pursuance of the powers in Us vested by section 20 of the said Ordinance, do by this Our Proclamation give notice of Our approval of the said rules set forth in the schedule hereto annexed.

SCHEDULE.

Rules framed under Section 11 of the Irrigation Ordinance, No. 16 of 1906, to be observed by the Proprietors of all Manavari Lands and of all Paddy Lands under Village Tanks or Minor Irrigation Works under the Control and Management of the Government Agent, in Bintenna Pattu of the Batticaloa District, Eastern Province.

Management of the Government Agent, in Bintenna Pattu of the Batticaloa District, Eastern Province.

"In these rules 'proprietor' means the owner of any paddy lands irrigable by any irrigation work, and includes the cultivator, the person in actual possession, and, in case of Crown lands, the lasse or permit holder."

1. The works are in charge of the Government Agent, Eastern Province, and the terms Chief Headman and Irrigation Superintendent refer to' the officers appointed by him to exercise control in accordance with these rules.

2. The Vel-Vidanes, who shall be elected in the manner provided in section 14 of "The Irrigation Ordinance, 1906," shall have the entire supervision of all works of irrigation and paddy cultivation within their respective divisions, subject to instructions from and the control of the Chief Headman or Irrigation Superintendent. The Vel-Vidanes shall enforce these rules and bring all bre-ches of the same before the Village Council for adjudication. The Vel-Vidanes shall be assisted, when necessary, by Yaya-Vidanes, who will be nominated by the Vel-Vidanes. Both Vel-Vidanes and Yaya-Vidanes shall be liable for any neglect of duty proved to the satisfaction of the Village Council as for a breach of rule.

3. The Vel-Vidane shall be entitled to receive from the proprietors one marakal of paddy for each ammunam of land sown as his share of the crop; and when a Yaya-Vidane has been appointed, he also shall be entitled to receive one marakal per ammunam of land sown as his share of the crop; if more than one Yaya-Vidane has been appointed, the Yaya-Vidanes and Yaya-Vidanes shall be delivered to them at the threshing-floor before any paddy is removed. The whole or any portion of these shares may be withheld if, in the opinion of the Government Agent, the work has been improperly performed, and he may, if he considers it necessary, cause the amount withheld to be paid to any person who has acted for a Vel-Vidane or a Yaya-Vidane or rinto the Irrigation Fine Fund. The Government Agent may ap

4. As the season for cultivation approaches, whether it be maha, yala, or other cultivation, a meeting of the proprietors of lands concerned shall be convened and presided over by the Government Agent or some person deputed in writing by him for the purpose, and the date and place of the meeting, of which at least seven days' notice shall be given, shall be fixed by the Government Agent or person so deputed.

5. The meeting convened as in the last paragraph shall determine—

(a) What lands are to be cultivated.

- (a) What lands are to be cultivated.
 (b) The dates for the commencement and completion of sowing and irrigation.
 (c) The date for furnishing list of cultivators on account of the cultivation.
 (d) The date for the completion of fencing.
 (e) The order in which the different yayas shall be sown.
 (f) The method of cultivation.
 (g) The kind of paddy to be sown in each yaya.
 (h) The place and manner in which black cattle and buffaloes are to be confined during cultivation. during cultivation
- (i) The manner in which the different yayas have to be fenced.

Any breach of any decision of the meeting will be considered as a breach of rule.

6. Should it not be possible to commence cultivation on the time fixed, a meeting convened as in rule 5 shall be called to decide, subject to the approval of the Govern-

ment Agent, what extensions of time are necessary.
7. Whenever it occurs that there is not sufficient occurs that there is not sufficient water in any tank for the irrigation of the whole of the tract dependent thereon, a meeting convened as in rule 5 shall decide how much of the tract shall be cultivated, the proprietors generally shall cultivate such portion or portions, without reference to ownership, in the same proportion to the extent cultivated as the extent owned by each bears

in the same proportion to the extent cultivated as the extent owned by each bears to the whole tract dependent on the tank.

8. Each proprietor or mulkaraya shall deliver to the Vel-Vidane not later than the day fixed under rule 5 (c) a list of the mulkaraya and cultivators to be employed in his field. This list shall be signed by the proprietor and the mulkaraya and cultivators, or they shall make their marks before two witnesses. Persons supplying false information or withholding information shall be guilty of an offence under these rules. From the date of the delivery of the list the mulkaraya and cultivators as well as the proprietor shall become liable for all works of cultivation, and in the event of neglect or default without sufficient reason shall be guilty of an offence under these rules. under these rules.

under these rules.

Any change of proprietors during the cultivation shall be notified forthwith to the Vel-Vidane in writing by the proprietor (or mulkaraya).

9. In the absence of a legal document showing that another person has been placed in actual possession of the land, list shall be accepted, in case of dispute, from those persons who furnished a list for the preceding harvest. The acceptance by the Vel-Vidane of a list involves the due observance of these rules on all persons, witnesses excepted, who have signed it.

10. Should it be found that any proprietor does not intend to cultivate his share, the Vel-Vidane shall submit the matter to the Chief Headman, who may, if possible, exclude such share from the tract, or may allow such share to be cultivated by any other proprietor in the tract, should the proprietor of such lands agree in writing thereto. Such other proprietor shall not be liable for any payment to the proprietor of the land, but shall be liable for everything required by these rules for the season's cultivation to the same extent as if he were the proprietor of the field thus apportioned to him.

Provided that, should the proprietor of the land in question not agree to its

- tioned to him.

 Provided that, should the proprietor of the land in question not agree to its being cultivated by such other proprietor, he himself shall be liable for all such duties as are required by these rules.

 11. No proprietor shall be exempt from contributing everything required by these rules for the season's cultivation unless exempted at the meeting under rule 5, or unless his share has been excluded from the tract under rule 10. In the event of any proprietor becoming liable for any work and failing to perform it, the Vel-Vidane shall inform the Government Agent through the Chief Heedman in writing of the estimated cost thereof, and shall prosecute the defaulting proprietor for a breach of the rule. The Government Agent may then, in special cases, advance the sum required from the Irrigation Fine Fund; but the Vel-Vidane shall do the work at once in any case, and the Chief Headman shall certify the sum expended, which will be recovered as provided for in Chapter IX. of the Irrigation Ordinance, No. 16 of 1906.

 12. Trees or jungle within the yaya or tract likely to occasion damage by giving cover to birds or wild animals shall be removed by the proprietors of such
- lands.

 13. The periods during which water shall be issued to the different yayas shall be fixed by the Vel-Vidane, and, subject to the control of the Chief Headman or Irrigation Superintendent, the distribution of water shall be regulated by him. During the period in which his yaya is entitled to receive water, the Vel-Vidane may cause any dam which impedes the flow of water thereto to be cut, and any channel which is depriving it of water to be closed. Excepting during that period, he may not interfere with any dam or channel outside his yaya.

 14. The distribution of water from the tank or other source of supply shall be made under the control of the Vel-Vidane, and no person shall issue, distribute, cut off. divert, or use in any manner the water except under the direction of

cut off, divert, or use in any manner the water except under the direction of, or with the consent of, the Vel-Vidane.

15. In distributing water from any source of supply to the fields in a tract, the water shall first be taken to the fields on the higher level, and thence to those on lower level, and no one shall in any way interfere to the prejudice of others with the distribution of water.

with the distribution of water.

16. If any person shall wilfully prevent water from flowing to the field below his own, or shall obstruct the flow of surplus water from the field on a higher level, or shall in any other way interfere with the general distribution of water, the Vel-Vidane shall proceed to the spot with witnesses and open the gaps or remove the obstruction himself; and no person shall issue, distribute, cut off, divert, or use the water in any manner except in accordance with the Vel-Vidane's instructions.

17. Proprietors and others concerned shall be held liable for waste of water occurring in their fields. No paddy shall be sown in any irrigation or other channel.

18. No person other than a proprietor of the lands under the tank shall be entitled to the use of water from the tank for agricultural purposes.

19. The fence round the whole yaya shall be measured by the Vel-Vidane within three days of sowing being completed, and shall be apportioned by him to the proprietors in proportion to the extent of the proprietor's field, without regard to whether the fence adjoins his field or not. If fresh sticks are required, the Vel-Vidane shall inform the Chief Headman, who will obtain a license for him to have them cut.

20. The proprietors shall finish the fence within the time fixed at the meeting under rule 5, and each proprietor shall construct a watch hut adjoining the centre

of the portion of the fence erected by him. The proprietor shall keep fences and watch huts in repair, and shall keep regular watch in accordance with the orders of the Vel-Vidane. No persons shall be employed as watcher who is incompetent or under the age of sixteen.

21. No fence shall be put up on any part of tank bund.
22. The mulkaraya shall accompany the Vel-Vidane or the Yaya-Vidane with a light on their rounds at night until such time as the Vel-Vidane considers this

23. Should any portion of any tract ripen before the rest from any cause, the proprietors thereof shall be allowed to reap and store their crops, but shall continue to watch the field and preserve the fence until the crops of the remainder of the yaya have been reaped and stored. Should any portion of a tract not ripen until after the reaping of the crop sown in accordance with the decision under rule 5, either on account of default in sowing in proper time or because of sowing of a different kind of paddy to that agreed upon by the meeting under rule 5, the proprietors of the other portion of the tract shall not be bound to continue preserving the fence and watching the field until that portion of the tract ripens.

24. After the reasing is over the Vel-Vidane shall order the removal of the

24. After the reaping is over the Vel-Vidane shall order the removal of the fence, and shall cause the fence sticks to be heaped by the proprietors in such places as he may direct. Proprietors may, with the consent of the Vel-Vidane, remove the fence sticks from the fields. They shall, however, furnish the Vel-Vidane with a receipt for the number taken and return them to the land for the following harvest, whether they cultivate or not, or shall be liable for their assessed value.

26. The threshing-floor shall be cleared and fenced with a strong fence of stakes by the joint labour of all the proprietors of each field. The paddy shall be stacked there, and the proprietors shall take their turn in watching the stacks until they have been threshed for a period not exceeding three months from the date of reaping. No paddy shall be threshed without giving notice to the Vel-Vidane.

No paddy shall be removed from the fields at the termination of the harvest; until the shares due to the headmen under rule 3 and the wages due to all persons engaged in the harvest and the hire of cattle and other cultivation charges have

27. Tanks, dams, minor channels, water-courses, or other minor works shall be repaired or improved by the proprietors whenever the Government Agent shall consider it necessary. The work to be performed by each proprietor shall be in proportion to the extent of his land likely to be benefited by the work in question.

28. Should any new channel, dam, or other work be required either outside or inside any field, it shall be constructed by the proprietors interested in proportion to their holdings as in rule 27. The channels will be set out and pegs put in under the orders of the Chief Headman, Irrigation Superintendent, or Irrigation Inspector. All proprietors must grant way leave for such channels, dams, or other works, even though their land may not be benefited thereby; but those proprietors whose lands are benefited by any such works shall pay to the owners of lands who suffer damage by the construction of the work compensation for any land taken, or damage done to land, in proportion to the area of their holdings benefited. The Government Agent or the Assistant Government Agent shall determine the amount of such commensation. of such compensation.

Water-courses and channels within the fields shall be kept in proper order

by the proprietors of the lands through which they flow.

30. All ordinary repairs incidental to cultivation, such as clearing of channels, repair of bunds, shall be done by the proprietors.

31. The bunds of all tanks shall be divided equally among the proprietors of

repair of bunds, shall be done by the proprietors.

31. The bunds of all tanks shall be divided equally among the proprietors of lands under them, and each proprietor shall keep the portion assigned to him always free from jungle, brushwood, and overgrowth of every description, and from white ants' nests, and also shall keep such portion properly turfed.

32. (a) The full amount of labour which each proprietor of paddy land shall be liable to contribute under rules 27 and 28 and under section 31 of Ordinance No. 16 of 1906, shall not, except in urgent cases provided for in rule 33, exceed two cubes of earthwork or five days' labour annually for each acre of his land likely to be benefited, or their equivalent in money paid in advance at the rate of Rs. 2 per acre. If in any year it shall not be found necessary to require from the proprietors the full amount of labour, the Government Agent shall decide what amount of labour shall be contributed by them.

(b) Provided that when it has been decided by the proprietors or by the Government Agent that an irrigation work is to be constructed or restored with Government Agent that an irrigation work is to be constructed or restored with Government and, the proprietors of lands benefited by such work, and the persons who have applied to purchase, lease, or cultivate on permit Crown land likely to be irrigated by such work, shall be liable to contribute not more than sixty days' labour on such work in any one year, and shall be paid therefor at rates not less than those commonly prevailing in the pattu.

33. In addition to the ordinary labour of the year as above provided for, whenever the Government Agent or person authorized by him to supervise the work shall find it necessary to call out labour to perform an urgent work of repair, or of prevention of impending damage, uncommuted labour, either in person or by substitute, shall at once be furnished by overy proprietor, and continued daily until the completion of the work. Provided that double the ordinary labour provid

him to supervise the work.

35. Should any proprietor fail to do any work required under these rules, the Government Agent may order the Vel-Vidane to do the work, advancing him the estimated cost of the same from the Irrigation Fine Fund, and the cost of the work, together with any fine imposed by the Village Council on the defaulter, shall be recovered as provided for in Chapter IX. of the Irrigation Ordinance, No. 16 of 1906.

36. No person shall, in any way alter or injure any ridge or boundary between two fields in the same tract. On information that such alteration or injury has been effected, the Vel-Vidane shall notify the owners and proceed to the spot with witnesses and call upon the owners to restore the boundary to its original state, and on their failing to do so within three days after notice the Vel-Vidane shall report the matter to the Chief Headman, who shall summon a Village Council to decide the dispute.

decide the dispute.

37. Any proprietor shall, when required, point out the correct boundaries of his land, and, if required, by the Chief Headman or Irrigation Superintendent, shall erect bunds or other suitable works to define such boundaries.

38. No person other than the Irrigation Inspector or some one duly authorized by him in that behalf shall in any way interfere with or alter the level of the spill mater or alrige of any village tark. water or sluice of any village tank.

39. During cultivation the Vel-Vidane is empowered to seize all cattle found

39. During cultivation the Vel-Vidane is empowered to seize all cattle found in his yaya or in a tank bund or bank of an irrigation channel or straying near by and likely to endanger the crops.

Cattle seized under this rule should be handed over to the local Police Headman without delay to be produced before the Village Council.

40. Vel-Vidanes and Yaya-Vidanes shall reside within three miles of their divisions or kandams, and shall not absent themselves during the cultivation season or at other times when their services are required without making arrangements to the satisfaction of the Chief Headman or Irrigation Superintendent for the discharge of their duties

to the satisfaction of the Chief Headman or Irrigation Superintendent for the discharge of their duties.

41. The tank bed may be cultivated when the majority of proprietors under it so decide with the permission of the Government Agent. Unless the majority decide to cultivate the tank bed, and the permission of the Government Agent is obtained, no proprietor shall cultivate the tank bed or any portion thereof.

42. Paths between cultivated places shall be kept open by the proprietors according to the limits prescribed by ancient custom and in proportion to their respective shares.

respective shares
43. The propi 43. The proprietors of all paddy lands which may hereafter be purchased from the Crown or from private persons shall become liable to obey these rules. Such proprietors shall in all respects enjoy the same previleges and rights as the proprietors

of lands already under cultivation.

44. A meeting of proprietors may be convened by the Chief Headman whenever 44. A meeting of proprietors may be convened by the Chief Headman whenever the Government Agent, the Assistant Government Agent, or a majority of the proprietors consider it desirable, to obtain their advice or assistance in any matter

proprietors consider it desirable, to obtain their advice or assistance in any matter concerning cultivation or irrigation.

45. Any custom now existing relating to paddy cultivation not expressly provided for in these rules and not opposed thereto shall have the force of these rules and be considered part of them.

46. These rules shall be enforced by the Government Agent, Presidents of Village Councils, Chief Headmen, Irrigation Superintendents, Inspectors, Velvidanes, and Yaya-Vidanes as may from time to time be appointed, and breaches of the rules are punishable as provided for in the Irrigation Ordinance, No. 16 of 1906.

"THE LOCAL BOARDS ORDINANCE, 1898."

THE following rules relating to the grant of retiring pensions and gratuities to officers of the Local Board, Badulla, prescribed by His Excellency the flowers in Excellence in Excelle prescribed by His Excellency the Governor in Executive Council, under the provisions of section 87 of Ordinance No. 13 of 1898, are published for general information.

RULES REFERRED TO.

- 1. No pension will be granted to any officer of the Local Board of Badulla without the authority of the Governor, in order to obtain which a certificate of service, age, good conduct, and of the ground of retirement must be submitted to the Colonial Secretary.
- 2. Subject to the provisions of rule 1, all officers of the Local Board of Badulla on the fixed establishment drawing a salary of Rs. 250 per annum and upwards shall be entitled to pension as follows:—

shall be entitled to pension as follows:—

An officer who shall have served ten years and upwards and under eleven years shall receive an annual allowance of ten-sixtieths of his annual salary, eleven years and under twelve years an annual allowance of eleven-sixtieths of such salary, and in like manner a further addition to the annual allowance of one-sixtieth in respect of each additional year of such service until the completion of a period of service of thirty-five years, when the annual allowance of thirty-five-sixtieths may be granted, and no addition shall be made in respect of any service beyond thirty-five years; provided that officers in office at the date of the passing of these rules who do not receive promotion or new appointments shall be entitled to pension at three-fourths of the rates prescribed in this section, but such officers will be entitled to full pensions under these rules, provided that they pay, within a period to be fixed by the Board, all arrears of contribution that would have been payable by them if these rules had been in force at the time they joined the fixed establishment of the Board.

- 3. No officer of the Local Board will be held to have an absolute right to compensation for past services, or to any pension under these rules; and the Local Board will retain power and authority to dismiss any such officer without compensation.
- 4. No pension shall be granted to any officer of the Local Board who shall be under fifty-five years of age, unless upon a certificate from the Chairman of the Local Board and from two medical practitioners that he is incapable from infirmity of mind or body to discharge the duties of his situation, nor unless he shall have discharged these duties with diligence and fidelity to the satisfaction of the Chairman
- 5. It shall be competent for the Local Board, with the authority of the Governor, in cases of peculiar and extraordinary merit in respect of duties outside of those for which the officer has received a salary, to grant special and higher rates of pension than those laid down in these rules.
- than those laid down in these rules.

 6. The above-mentioned rates are only to be granted in case of decidedly faithful and meritorious service, but when the testimony as to fidelity, diligence, and merit is in any respect defective, a deduction will be made from the apportioned rate. Where there has been obvious negligence, irregularity, or misconduct, the grant of an allowance will be altogether withheld.

 7. The claim of an officer of the Local Board to pension will be considered to have commenced from the date of his first permanent appointment to the fixed establishment of the Local Board.
- establishment of the Local Board.
- 8. Every officer on the provisional and temporary establishment drawing a salary of over Rs. 250 per annum will, in the event of transfer to the fixed establishment, be entitled to reckon his provisional and temporary services when it has been continuous with his subsequent permanent service.
- 9. The services in respect of which superannuated allowances are granted should in all cases be continuous, unless interrupted by abolition of office or other temporary suspension of employment not arising from misconduct or voluntary resignation of
- 10. The pension will be computed upon the salary of the permanent office held by an officer of the Local Board at the time of his retirement, provided he shall have held such appointment for at least three years, otherwise the pension shall be calculated upon the average of salaries attached to the permanent offices held by such person during the three years next preceding the commencement of such pension.
- 11. In case of suspension or reduction or abolition of office, temporary allowances may be assigned according to the specified rates, on condition, however, that the persons receiving the same shall be liable to be recalled into service, and with the understanding that they are to be re-employed, as opportunity may offer, in preference to new applicants for office.
- 12. In the case of officers to whom temporary allowances may be assigned in accordance with rule 11 on the abolition or reorganization of their offices, and who may be afterwards re-employed, one-half of the period during which they have been in receipt of such allowance will be allowed to count towards pension on their final
- 13. In the case of the abolition of an office, a period of ten years shall be added to the actual service in computing the allowance of persons who have served twenty years and upwards, of seven years where the service is over fifteen and under twenty

years, and of five years where the service is over ten and under fifteen years. To persons who shall have served under ten years and not less than five years a gratuity shall be granted calculated at the rate of one month's pay for each year's service, with an additional allowance of three months' pay. To persons who shall have served less than five years a gratuity shall be awarded calculated at the rate of one month's pay for each year's service, with one month's pay added. The number of years to be added to actual service on abolition of office should not be more than that which, if added to the age of the retiring officer, would make that age up to sixty, except that one year may be added in the case of an officer of the actual age of sixty or more, unless the officer was quite disqualified for further service.

- 14. In the case of persons retired through abolition of office, who, if they had served the extra time granted by rule 13 for compensation, would at the expiry of that time be over fifty-five, the provisions in rule 13 shall not be binding on the Local Board, but each particular case will be decided after a full consideration of all the circumstances attending it.
- 15. Should the term of office not warrant the assignment of an annual allowance, a gratuity may be granted at the rate of one month's salary for each year's service. For a fractional part of a year's service exceeding six months half a month's salary will be added to the gratuity.
- 16. If any person being in receipt of any pension or superannuation allowance from the Local Board shall be convicted of any offence in any court of justice in the Island for which he shall be sentenced to death, or to any term of imprisonment with hard labour exceeding six months, such pension or superannuation allowance shall forthwith determine and cease to be payable, unless such person shall, within three months after his conviction, receive free pardon, or unless the Local Board shall otherwise order.
- 17. Every person hereafter appointed to any office under the Local Board to which a pension is attached on retirement may be required to retire from the service of the Local Board on or after attaining the age of fifty-five upon the receipt of twelve months' notice to that effect, but they may continue in office till sixty years of age with the censent of the Board.
- 18. As a contribution to the pension fund a deduction of 4 per cent. shall be made from the salary of each officer entitled to pension.
- 19. All sums so deducted shall be deposited monthly in the Government Savings Bank pending permanent investment or other disposal by the Board.
- 20. Officers receiving promotion or taking up a new appointment shall receive a salary less by 20 per cent. than the maximum salary payable to their predecessors. The initial salary shall be raised annually by 2 per cent. of the maximum salary until the maximum salary shall be attained.
- 21. Should an officer be transferred to a post under Government or under another Local Board or other public authority with the approval of the Board; he shall retain his claim to ultimate pension for service rendered to the Board, provided that he retires from the latter service under circumstances which would entitle him to pension in terms of this Minute.
- 22. Should an officer who retires on pension find after such retirement an employment under Government, or under another semi-official body, on a salary equal to or higher than what he drew from the Board at the time of his retirement, his pension shall be suspended so long as such employment continues. If he draws a less salary, he shall be entitled to only so much of his pension as, when added to the salary of the new appointment, will make his total emolument equal to the salary last drawn by him previous to his retirement.
- 23. When an officer seeking pension under this Minute is found to be already in receipt of a pension from another public body or from Government, his maximum pension under this Minute shall be such us when added to such other pension shall not exceed thirty-five-sixtieths of the highest salary drawn by the officer at any time during the course of his service, be it under Government or under a semi-official body.
- 24. Local Board employés drawing a salary of less than Rs. 250 per annum and retiring on account of age or infirmity after serving continuously for a period of twenty-five years and upwards may, if the Board be satisfied that they are unfit, owing to age or infirmity of body or mind, to discharge efficiently the duties of their offices, be granted such long service allowances not exceeding Rs. 5 per mensem in each case as the Board may award. Persons in receipt of a daily pay, who have completed a period of twenty-five years of continuous service, retiring under similar circumstances may be awarded gratuities calculated at the rate of of one month's pay for every three years of service.
- 25. Subject to the approval of His Excellency the Governor, the Board may allow a gratuity to the widow or orphans of an officer in the event of his death, provided that he has not received from the Board any gratuity.

(4) Logs attacked by fungus or defective logs are not to be sawn into sleepers. The sleepers should be sawn from sound matured wood, free from shakes, cracks, sapwood, and large or loose knots.

(5) Broad gauge sleepers are to be 9 feet by 10 inches by 5 inches, and narrow gauge sleepers 5 feet by 9 inches by 4½ inches.

(6) Sleepers should be rectangular in form, perfectly parallel on all sides, and should have smooth surfaces on all sides, and should have no wane.

(7) Sleepers should be covered with saw dust or immersed

in water and kept invariably under shade immediately they are sawn until they can be transported to delivery depôts, where they should be stacked and kept under shade in the manner to be pointed out by the Forest Ranger.

(8) Only such sleepers as are practically certain to be accepted by the Railway authorities will be allowed to be stacked at delivery depôts. Payments may be made on the responsibility of the Assistant Conservator of Forests "on account," or for not more than 90 per cent. of stacked

(9) Rejected sleepers will not be paid for, and they will lapse to Government, as well as all refuse wood in the sleeper operations. The contractor shall have no claim

in respect of any material sold as rejections.

(10) The felling operations should commence in the middle of January, 1916. Not less than 70 per cent. of sleepers should be sawn by May 15, 50 per cent. must be transported to delivery depôts by the end of June, and the whole supply on the contract must be completed on August 15, 1916.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended October 9, 1915.

Births.—The total births registered in the City of Colombo in the week were 113 (1 European, 11 Burghers, 76 Sinhalese, 14 Tamils, 14 Moors, 4 Malays, and 2 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on July 1, 1915, viz., 251,338) was 23.4 as against 20.3 in the preceding week, 20.8 in the corresponding week of last year, and 22.2 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 123 (2 Europeans, 11 Burghers, 67 Sinhalese, 24 Tamils, 14 Moors, 1 Malay, and 4 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 25.5, as against 27.0 in the previous week, 24.9 in the corresponding week of last year, and 26.7 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 123 total deaths, 20 were of infants under one year of age, as against 19 in the preceding week, 21 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 27 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 4.

Principal Causes of Death.—Fourteen deaths from Phthisis were registered, as against 24 in the previous week and 14 the weekly average for last year. Of these, 6 were in Kotahena, 3 in Maradana (including 1 death of a non-resident in heapital), 2 in Wellawatta, 1 in Slave Island, 1 in San Sebastian, and 1 in St. Paul's.

- 2. Ten deaths from *Pneumonia* were registered as in the previous week, against 11 the weekly average for last year. Of these, 4 were in Maradana (including 1 death of a non-resident in hospital), 3 in St. Paul's, 1 in Kotahena, 1 in Slave Island, and 1 in Kollupitiya. Two deaths from *Bronchitis* were registered.
- 3. Four deaths from *Plague* were registered, as against 2 in the previous week. Of these, 3 were in St. Paul's and 1 in Pettah. Seven cases were reported, as against 9 in the previous week.
- 4. Two deaths from Enteric Fever were registered, as against 1 in the previous week and 2 the weekly average for last year. Of these, 1 was in New Bazaar and 1 in Maradana.
- 5. One death from Smallpox was registered (in Maradana), as against 3 in the previous week. One case was reported, as against 4 in the previous week.
- 6. Twelve deaths from Debility were registered, 8 from Infantile Convulsions, 6 from Enteritis, 5 from Worms, 2 from Diarrhæa, 2 from Dysentery, 1 from Tetanus, and 54 from Other Causes.
- 7. Thirteen cases of Chickenpox were reported, as against 9 in the previous week. No cases of Measles were reported.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 81.8°, against 80.2° in the preceding week and 79.7° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.831 in., against 29.855 in. in the preceding week and 29.863 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 0.02 in., against 2.12 in. in the preceding week and 3.22 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.
