WHEREAS We deem it expedient that a Commission should issue to inquire into the organization of the Police, and to advise what measures are required for strengthening or otherwise reorganizing the Force, regard being had in particular to the experience which has accrued respecting the conduct of the Police in connection with the recent riots in the Island.

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, reposing great trust and confidence in your prudence, ability, and fidelity, have, with the advice of Our Executive Council, in pursuance of the powers in Us vested by the Ordinance No. 9 of 1872, nominated, constitute, and appoint you, the Hon. Sir Alexander Wood Renton, Kt., Chief Justice; the Hon. Mr. Arthur Sampson Pagden, Controller of Revenue; the Hon. Sir Christoffel Obeyesekere, Kt.; Charles Russell Cumberland, Esq., Government Agent of the North-Western Province; and William Moir, Esq., to be Our Commissioners for the purposes aforesaid, with authority to exercise all the powers which Commissioners appointed under the said Ordinance may lawfully use and exercise.

And we do hereby nominate, constitute, and appoint you, the Hon. Sir Alexander Wood Renton, Kt., . Chief Justice, to be the Chairman of the said Commission.

And we do further hereby authorize and empower you, Our said Commissioners, to make all necessary inquiries in the said matter, and to report to Us under your hands as early as may be possible, upon the matter referred to you as aforesaid.

## BY-LAW REFERRED TO.

2. No person shall keep, for the accommodation of cattle or carts other than his own, any cattle shed or halting place for cattle within the limits of the town without a permit from the Board. Such permit may impose such conditions as the Chairman shall consider necessary for the preservation of public health; and the person keeping such cattle shed or halting place for cattle shall be bound to observe such conditions. Any permit issued under this by-law shall be free of charge.

# "THE LOCAL BOARDS ORDINANCE, 1898."

THE following rules relating to the grant of retiring pensions and gratuities to officers of the Local Board, Jaffna, prescribed by His Excellency the Governor in Executive Council, under the provisions of section 87 of Ordinance No. 13 of 1898, are published for general information.

### Rules referred to.

- 1. Officers of the Local Board of Jafina have no absolute right to any pension or allowance under these rules, and the Board retains the right to dismiss an officer without compensation.
- 2. No pension will be granted to any officer of the Local Board of Jaffina without the authority of the Governor, in order to obtain which, certificate of service, age, good conduct, and of the ground of retirement must be submitted to the Colonial Secretary.

- 3. Subject to the provisions contained in rules I and 2, all officers of the Local Board of Jaffna on the fixed establishment drawing a salary of Rs. 250 per annum and upwards may be awarded a pension as under :-
  - (1) Any officer who shall have served for 10 and less than 11 years may receive an annuity equal to ten-sixtieths of the annual salary of his permanent
  - (2) Any officer who shall have served for 11 and less than 12 years may receive
  - an annuity equal to eleven-sixtieths of such salary.

    (3) In like manner, an addition may be granted of one-sixtieth for each additional year of service until the completion of 35 years' service, when the maximum pension equal to thirty-five-sixtieths of the salary may be granted.

Provided that officers in office at the date of the passing of these rules who do not receive promotion or new appointments may receive pensions at three-fourths of the rates prescribed in this rule.

Provided, further, that if the salary of such officer at the time of his retirement exceeds Rs. 500 per annum, the said salary shall, for the purpose of calculating the pension, be reduced as follows:—

Provided, further, that such officers may be awarded full pensions under these rules, provided that they pay, within a period to be fixed by the Board, all arrears of contribution that would have been payable by them if these rules had been in force at the time they joined the fixed establishment of the Board with compound interest at 3 per cent.

- The rates of pension above set forth will only be granted in cases of faithful and meritorious service, and where the testimony as to good conduct is in any way defective, a deduction will be made from the pension, and where the misconduct of the officer has been of a serious nature, he shall forfeit all claim to a pension.
- 5. The service of an officer of the Local Board to be reckoned for pension will be calculated from the date of his first permanent appointment to the fixed establishment of the Local Board.
- 6. If an officer be transferred from the provisional and temporary establishment to the fixed establishment, his provisional and temporary service, when continuous with his subsequent permanent service, will be allowed to reckon as service for pension.
- 7. A pension will not be granted to any officer of the Local Board who shall be under 55 years of age, unless upon a certificate from the Chairman of the Local Board and from two medical practitioners nominated by the Chairman that he is unfit to discharge the duties of his office owing to infirmity of mind or body, and unless he shall have theretofore discharged those duties with diligence and fidelity to the satisfaction of the Chairman.
- 8. The service in respect of which pensions or gratuities are granted must be unbroken, unless the service has been interrupted by abolition of office or other temporary suspension of employment not arising from misconduct or voluntary resignation.
- 9. The pension awarded to an officer of the Local Board shall be computed upon the salary drawn by him at the time of his retirement in respect of the permanent office then held by him, provided that he shall have held such appointment for at least three years; otherwise the pension shall be calculated upon the average of the salaries attached to the permanent offices held by such person during the three years next preceding the commencement of such pension.
- 10. In the case of abolition of any pensionable office held by any officer, the pension or gratuity grantable to such officer will be at the rates specified in rule 3, plus the following addition of years for abolition:—
  - (1) Where the actual service amounts to 20 years and upwards, a period of 10 years may be added to his actual service in computing his retiring
  - (2) Where the actual service amounts to less than 20 years and not less than 15 years, a period of 7 years may be added.
    (3) Where the actual service amounts to less than 15 years and not less than
  - 10 years, a period of 5 years may be added.

    (4) Where the period of service amounts to less than 10 years and not less than

  - (4) Where the period of service amounts to less than 10 years and not less than 5 years, a gratuity may be awarded calculated at the rate of 1 month's salary for each year's service with the addition of 3 months' salary.
    (5) Where the period of service amounts to less than 5 years, a gratuity may be awarded calculated at the rate of 1 month's salary for each year's service, plus half a month's salary for the fraction of a year over 6 months, with the addition of 1 month's salary.

Provided always that the officer who is thus retired shall be liable to be recalled to the service of the Local Board, and that in no case shall the number of years to be added to the actual service exceed that which, if added to the age of the retiring officer, would bring that age up to 60 years.

- 11. When a pension or gratuity has been awarded to any officer under rule 10 on the abolition of his office, and he has afterwards been re-employed, one-half of the period during which he has been in the receipt of such allowance will be allowed to count towards pension on his final retirement.
- 12. In the case of persons eligible for pensions under rule 10 who are over 55 years, and who are retired upon abolition of office, the provisions in rule 10 will not be binding on the Local Board, but each particular case may be decided upon its merits.
- 13. If any person in the receipt of a pension or superannuation allowance from the Local Board shall be convicted of any offence in any court of justice in this Island for which he shall be sentenced to death, or to any term of rigorous imprisonment exceeding 12 months, the payment of such pension or superannuation allowance shall be forthwith discontinued, unless such person shall, within three months after his conviction, receive free pardon, or unless the Local Board shall otherwise order.
- 14. Every person hereafter appointed to any pensionable office under the Local Board may be required to retire from the service of the Local Board on or after attaining the age of 55, upon being given 12 months' notice to that effect.
- 15. As a contribution to the pension fund a deduction of 4 per cent. shall be made from the salary of each officer entitled to pension, but if an officer whose office is pensionable, and who has become entitled to a pension under these rules, shall die in office leaving a widow and (or) children under the age of 21 years, one-half of the amount of his contributions, without interest, shall be refunded for the benefit of such widow and (or) children.
- 16. All sums so deducted shall be deposited monthly in the Government Savings Bank pending permanent investment or other disposal by the Board.
- 17. Should an officer be transferred to a post under Government or under another Board or other public authority with the approval of the Board, he shall retain his claim to ultimate pension for service rendered to the Board, provided that he retires from the latter service under circumstances which would entitle him to pension in terms of this Minute.
- pension in terms of this Minute.

  18. Local Board employes drawing a salary of less than Rs. 250 per annum and retiring on account of age or infirmity after serving continuously for a period of 25 years and upwards may, if the Board be satisfied that they are unfit, owing to age or infirmity of body or mind, to discharge efficiently the duties of their offices, be granted such long service allowances not exceeding Rs. 5 per mensem in each case as the Board may award. Persons in receipt of a daily pay, who have completed a period of 25 years of continuous service, retiring under similar circumstances may be awarded gratuities calculated at the rate of 1 month's pay for every 3 years of service.

### "THE MOTOR CAR ORDINANCE, No. 25 OF 1908."

IN terms of regulations Nos. 55, 56, and 57 of the regulations dated August 4, 1910, and October 11, 1913, framed under "The Motor Car Ordinance, No. 25 of 1908," it is hereby notified for general information that the roads mental and the schedule hereto annexed are suitable for use by motor lorries, subject to their compliance with the regulations governing the use of motor cars, motor lorries, and motor cycles, and with the modified conditions specified in the schedule referred to, and that the said roads are substituted for the corresponding roads mentioned in the schedule to the Notification of December 31, 1914, published in Government Gazette No. 6,693 of January 8, 1915.

"THE LOCAL BOARDS ORDINANCE, 1898."

THE following by-laws made by the Local Board of Kurunegala, under section 56 (7) of "The Local Boards Ordinance, 1898," and confirmed by His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, are published for general information.

## By-laws referred to.

- 1. No person shall commence the manufacture of aerated waters within the limits of the Local Board of Kurunegala for the purposes of sale without giving one month's previous notice in writing to the Chairman of the Board.
- 2. No aerated water factory shall be situated within less than 150 feet of any gala, stable, or other building used for keeping animals by day or night, or of any latrine or cesspit. No part of the factory shall be used us a dwelling house.
- 3. All premises used for the manufac ure of aerated waters must be well lighted and ventilated, must have cemented floors, must be provided with suitable built drains to carry waste material, and must be kept clean and free from dirt and d. st. The preparation of the syrups must be carried out in a fly-proof room. All chemicals and other materials used in the manufacture of the waters must be of good quality. All utensils and machinery employed in the manufacture must be kept scrupulously clean.
- 4. The water used in the manufacture shall be obtained from a source adequately protected from contamination and approved of by the Chairman of the Board. It shall be transported to the factory by means which shall ensure that no pollution occurs in transit. It shall be stored at the factory in properly constructed tanks or reservoirs connecting with the aerating apparatus.
- 5. All water used in the manufacture of aerated waters shall be passed through a Jewell or other filter approved by the Chairman and connected with the plant, provided that the Chairman shall have the power to exempt from the operation of this rule water derived from an approved public supply.
- 6. Whenever the Secretary or Inspector of the Board is satisfied that any aerated water, either manufactured within the limits of the Board or introduced into such limits from outside, is of such bad quality as to be unfit for human consumption, he may seize such waters and produce them before the Health Officer or Police Magistrate, and if it appears to such Health Officer or Police Magistrate that such waters are unfit for human consumption, he may order the same to be destroyed. Any person manufacturing any aerated water which shall be proved to the satisfaction of the court to be unfit for human consumption shall be guilty of an offence.
- 7. All bottles used in the manufacture of aerated waters shall be washed with filtered water, and shall be kept scrupulously clean.

- 8. Every bottle containing aerated water shall bear a label setting out the description of the water, the place of manufacture, the name of the person or firm owning the factory, and the number assigned to the factory by the Chairman of the Board.
- 9. No person under 12 years of age shall be employed in any aerated water factory, nor any person suffering from any cutaneous or contagious disease.
- 10. All persons engaged in bottling aerated waters shall wear whilst so engaged a wire gauze mask over the face and leather gloves on the hands.

#### VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended October 23, 1915.

Births.—The total births registered in the City of Colombo in the week were 101 (3 Europeans, 7 Burghers, 60 Sinhalese, 14 Tamils, 13 Moors, and 4 Malays). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on July 1, 1915, viz., 251,338) was 21.0, as against 17.4 in the preceding week, 22.7 in the corresponding week of last year, and 22.2 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 116 (1 European, 4 Burghers, 60 Sinhalese, 20 Tamils, 19 Moors, 4 Malays, and 8 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 24·1, as against 25·3 in the previous week, 24·2 in the corresponding week of last year, and 26·7 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 116 total deaths, 33 were of infants under one year of age, as against 26 in the preceding week, 25 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 27 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 8.

Principal Causes of Death.—Eighteen deaths from Pneumonia were registered, as against 12 in the previous week and 11 the weekly average for last year. Of these, 5 were in Maradana (including 2 deaths of non-residents in hospitals) 3 in Kotahena, 3 in Wellawatta, 2 in New Bazaar, 2 in Slave Island, 2 in Kollupitiya, and 1 in San Sebastian. Three deaths from Bronchitis were registered.

- 2. Fifteen deaths from *Phthisis* were registered, as in the previous week, and 14 the weekly average for last year. Of these, 8 were in Maradana (including 5 deaths of non-residents in hospitals), 2 in Kotahena, 1 in Pettah, 1 in St. Paul's, 1 in New Bazaas, 1 in Kollupitiya, and 1 in Wellawatta.
- 3. Three deaths from *Plague* were registered, as against 5 in the previous week. Of these, 2 were in Pettah and 1 in Kotahena. Eight cases were reported, as against 4 in the previous week.
- 4. Two deaths were registered from Smallpox, as in the previous week. Of these, 1 was in Maradana and 1 in the Infectious Diseases Hospital, Wellawatta. Six cases were reported, as against 5 in the previous week.
- 5. One death of a resident of Wellawatta was registered from Enteric Fever, as against 5 in the previous week and 2 the weekly average for last year.
- 6. Ten deaths from Infantile Convulsions were registered, 10 from Debility, 7 from Enteritis, 3 from Worms, 2 from Tetanus, 1 from Diarrhaa, 1 from Dysentery, and 40 from Other Causes.
  - 7. Nine cases of Chickenpox were reported, as in the previous week. No cases of Measles were reported.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 80.7°, against 80.0° in the preceding week and 80.7° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.814 in., against 29.829 in. in the preceding week and 29.876 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 0.11 in., against 0.40 in. in the preceding week and 5.01 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.
