HEREAS by Boyal Proclamation issued the 14th day of October, 1915, cortain articles specified in Schedules I. and II. thereof were declared contraband of war:

And whereas by Our Proclamation issued the 14th day of October, 1915, and published in the Government Gazette No. 6,750 of the same date, the The American afford was brought into force in the Colony of Ceylon, and the articles of contraband were published under Schedules A and B thereof:

And whereas His Majesty has by Royal Proclamation issued the 2th day of January, 1916, and published in the Schedule hereto, made certain further additions to, and appendments in, the said lists of contraband:

Know Ve that We, the Officer administration the Gazenment, do hereby declare that the Boyal Declared to the contraband.

Know Ye that We, the Officer administering the Government, do hereby declare that the Royal Proclamation of the 27th day of January, 1916, aforesaid is in force in the said Colony, and do call upon His Majesty's subjects and all other persons being in the said Colony to govern themselves accordingly.

Given at Colombo, in the said Island of Ceylon, this Fifteenth day of March, in the year of our Lord One thousand Nine hundred and Sixteen.

#### SCHEDULE.

### BY THE KING.

A PROCLAMATION making certain additions to and amendments in the List of Articles to be treated as Contraband of War.

### GEORGE, R. I.

Whereas on the 14th day of October, 1915, We did issue Our Royal Proclamation specifying the articles which it was Our intention to treat as contraband during the continuance of hostilities or until We did give further public notice; and

Whereas it is expedient to make certain further additions to and amendments in the said list:

Now, therefore, We do hereby declare, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, that, during the continuance of the war or until We do give further public notice, the following articles will be treated as absolute contraband, inaddition to those set out in Schedule I. of Qur Royal Proclamation aforementioned:—

Cork, including cork dust.

Bones in any form, whole or crushed, and bone ash.

Soap.

Vegetable fibres and yarns made therefrom.

And We do hereby further declare that as from this date the following amendments shall be made in Schedule 1. of Our Royal Proclamation aforementioned:-

In item 8 for "acetone" shall be substituted "acetones, and raw or finished materials usable for their preparation."

In item 9 for "phosphorus" shall be substituted "phosphorus and its compounds."
In item 26 there shall be added after the word "parts" the words "and accessories."
In item 38 the more general term "lead" shall be substituted for the words "lèad, pig, sheet, or pipe."

And We do hereby further declare that the following articles shall as from this date be treated as conditional contraband in addition to those set out in Schedule II. of Our Royal Proclamation aforementioned 🛸

Bladders, guts, casings, and sausage skins.

Given at Our Court at Buckingham Palace, this Twenty-seventh day of January, in the year of our Lord One thousand Nine hundred and Sixteen, and in the Sixth Year of Our Reign.

## GOVERNMENT NOTIFICATIONS.

"THE REGISTRARS' PROCEEDINGS VALIDATION ORDINANCE, No. 3 of 1912."

An Order for the purpose of giving validity to the Registrations of certain General Marriages in the Galle District of the Southern Province and other acts incidental thereto.

WHEREAS by section 3 of the above-named Ordinance it is enacted that "where, whether before or after the passing of this Ordinance—

(a) Any registration of a birth, death, marriage, document, or any other matter which is by law

required or authorized to be registered; or

(b) Any proceeding taken or purporting to be taken by or before a Registrar by virtue of his office—
is invalidated by reason of any informality, mistake, or accidental omission, whether relating to the appointment of
the Registrar, or the limits of his jurisdiction, or the manner in which the registration or proceeding was made or
taken, or any other incidental circumstance, and no other means are by law provided by which the registration or
proceeding may be validated, it shall be lawful for the Governor in Executive Council, by Order in Council notified
in the Government Gazette, to give directions for the correction of the mistake, informality, or omission, and to make
any other order that may be necessary for the purpose of giving validity to the registration or proceeding":

And whereas the acts specified in the second column of the schedule hereto attached relating to certain general marriages registered by the Registrars of Hinidum pattu division (Low-country) and Hinidum pattu Kandyan division, in the Galle District of the Southern Province, are invalidated by reason of the mistakes set forth in the third column of the said schedule, and no other means are by law provided for the validation of the said acts:

Now know Ye that We, the Officer Administering the Government, in exercise of the powers vested in Us as aforesaid, and with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby order and direct as follows:—

That the said acts are as valid and effectual for all purposes as if the said mistakes had not been made.

Registration Divisions.

Hinidum pattu division (Low-country) and Hinidum pattu Kandyan division, in the Galle District of the Southern Province.

Acts validated.

Registrations of general marriages made by the Registrars of these two divisions between July 1, 1899, and January 1, 1916, and other acts incidental thereto.

## "THE SMALL TOWNS SANITARY ORDINANCES, 1892 TO 1909."

IT is hereby notified that the following regulations made by the Sanitary Board of Ratnapura District, in the Province of Sabaragamuwa, under and in pursuance of section 9 E (2) of "The Small Towns Sanitary Ordinances, 1892 to 1909," have been confirmed by His Excellency the Officer Administering the Government in Executive Council.

#### REGULATIONS REFERRED TO.

1. All cattle, sheep, and goats straying on the public roads or paths within the town shall when seized be placed in the pound established by the Board for that purpose, and the following charges shall be paid before removal of any animal so impounded:—

For seizure For occupation

For food if supplied

Re. 1 per head

25 cents per head for a day or part of a day 15 cents per head for a day or part of a day

2. Any animal seized and not claimed within ten days may be sold by public auction, and the charges and costs recovered from the proceeds.

"THE SMALL TOWNS SANITARY ORDINANCE, 1892."

THE following by-laws made by the Sanitary Board of the Hambantota District, under section 9 E 2 (t) of Ordinance No. 18 of 1892, and confirmed by His Excellency the Officer Administering the Government in Executive Council, are published for general information.

#### By-LAWS re Wells.

1. No person shall sink a well or cause a well to be sunk within the limits of any Sanitary Board town, unless he shall have given to the Chairman one month's notice of such his intention, or shall have obtained a permit from the Chairman to sink such well or cause it to be sunk.

2. No well shall be sunk less than 50 feet from any cesspit, cesspool, pigsty, gala, cattle shed, manure heap, leaking drain, neglected privy, heap of decaying

vegetable or animal matter, or any manured land.

-3. No cesspit, cesspool, privy, pigsty, gala, or cattle shed shall be constructed within a distance of 50 feet from any well used for drinking or domestic purposes, nor shall any manure or decaying animal or vegetable matter be deposited, nor any land be cultivated with manure, nor any drain suffered to remain in a leaking condition within such distance.

4. All wells shall be lined as far as water level either with bricks set in cement with a backing of puddled clay or with cylinders of iron, cement, or clay, or shall be otherwise so constructed as to prevent the entrance of water except from the bottom.

5. A platform upon which to stand and draw water may be constructed over the top of a portion of the mouth of the well. This platform shall be so constructed as to be absolutely water-tight, so that no water therefrom can trickle back into the well, but all flow on to the apron or pavement referred to in rule 6. The said platform shall have a slope downwards from the centre of the mouth of the well outwards so as to throw off water, and a water-tight ledge at least 6 inches high along its inner edge connected at both ends with the parapet wall. The remainder of the well mouth shall be surrounded by a parapet wall at least 2 feet 6 inches high.

6. The well shall be surrounded for a distance of 5 feet by a cement apron or pavement of stone or brick set in cement sloping away from the well.

7. The outer edge of such apron or pavement shall be surrounded by a cement gutter emptying into a leadaway drain not less than 10 feet long, so as to prevent the stagnation of water in the vicinity of the well:

8. No plank shall be placed across the mouth of the well to stand on when drawing

water or for any other purpose.

9. Water from wells shall be drawn in clean receptacles.

10. No one shall wash clothes within 20 feet of the mouth of a well used for drinking or domestic purposes.

11. Every owner or lessee of a well used as a public bathing place shall supply bathing tubs, and shall not allow persons who bathe to draw water, and no person

shall draw water from such well while bathing.

12. Whenever any tree or branch of any tree overhangs a well, and is deemed after inspection by the Chairman or any Sanitary Officer of the Board to be injurious to the water owing to the dropping of the leaves or fruit into the water or by otherwise rendering the water unfit for use, it shall be lawful for the Chairman of the Sanitary Board to cause notice in writing to be given to the owner, lessee, or occupier of the ground on which such tree stands to cut down or remove such tree or branch, and if such notice is not complied with within 14 days such person shall be guilty of an offence.

13. The Chairman may, whenever he deems such a course to be necessary, cause notice to be given in writing to the owner or lessee or occupant of any compound in which there is a well used for drinking or domestic purposes to bale out the water and clean the well and execute such repairs as the Chairman may consider to be necessary, and if such notice is not complied with within 14 days such person shall be registered on offence.

shall be guilty of an offence.

14. Whenever it shall be decided by a resolution of the Sanitary Board that such a course is expedient in the interests of health, it may give notice to the owner, lessee, or occupant of any land to fill up or disinfect any well on such land, and the owner, lessee, or occupier shall thereupon be bound to comply with such order within 8 days' time. Should such owner, lessee, or occupier fail within such time to comply with such order such person shall be guilty of an offence.

15. It shall be lawful for the supervisor or inspector of the Board or other person empowered in writing by the Chairman of the Board to inspect wells or enter upon any land or premises for the purpose of inspecting proposed sites for wells or existing

wells and their surroundings.

### "THE VOLUNTEER ORDINANCE, 1910."

### "THE BUTCHERS ORDINANCE, 1893."

IT is hereby notified that His Excellency the Officer Administering the Government in Executive Council, in exercise of the powers vested in him by section 23 of "The Butchers Ordinance, 1893," has been pleased to confirm the following rules made by the proper authority, to wit, the Government Agent of the Province of Sabaragamuwa, in reference to public slaughter-houses in the Ratnapura District, excluding, however, those that are situated within the limits of a Local Board, and the same are hereby published for general information.

The rules now in force, which are published in Government Gazette No. 5,421 of August 7, 1896, are hereby

cancelled.

#### Rules referred to.

- 1. No person licensed to carry on the trade of a butcher in Ratnapura District shall slaughter any animal at any place other than a slaughter-house appointed for the purpose.
- 2. All animals intended for slaughter shall be for a period of not less than 24 hours immediately preceding the time of slaughter exposed to public view at a spot appointed by the Government Agent.
- 3. No animal shall be slaughtered between the hours of 6 P.M. and 6 A.M. or on any days other than those appointed by the Government Agent.
- 4. No cattle or sheep shall be slaughtered until they have been inspected and approved by the Medical Officer or Apothecary in Charge, or some person appointed for the purpose by the Government Agent, as fit for human consumption.
  - 5. Animals rejected as unfit for slaughter shall be removed immediately.
- 6. The same Medical Officer or Apothecary, or person appointed by the Government Agent, may prohibit the slaughter of any animal, netwithstanding that it has been approved as aforesaid, if it be found before slaughter to be diseased or otherwise unfit for human food.
- 7. If on any animal which has been approved as aforesaid being slaughtered the carcase shall appear diseased or unfit for human food, the said Medical Officer or Apothecary in Charge, or some person appointed by the Government Agent, Province of Sabaragamuwa, shall cause the meat to be immediately destroyed, or so disposed of as to prevent its being exposed for sale or used for human food.
- 8. The persón in charge of the slaughter-house shall not permit the slaughter of any animal which has not been approved as aforesaid as fit to be slaughtered for human food, or the slaughter of which the said Medical Officer or the Apothecary in Charge, or the person appointed by the Government Agent, Province of Sabaragamuwa, has prohibited as provided in rule 6,
- 9. No person shall remove from the slaughter-house, except under the direction of the said Medical Officer or the Apothecary in Charge, or some one appointed by the Government Agent, Province of Sabaragamuwa, any meat which the latter has declared unfit for human food.
- 10. The floor of every slaughter-house shall be of some impermeable material, such as cement, concrete, stone slabs, bricks or tiles rendered in cement, and shall be surrounded by a drain, which shall empty into a sump or otherwise as the Government Agent may approve. This whole structure to be kept at all times in a good state of repair.
- 11. All offal and manure must be disposed of in such a manner as not to endanger the public health.
- 12. Every slaughter-house shall be thoroughly swept and washed by the person slaughtering immediately after use.
- 13. Every slaughter-house shall be whitewashed within and without at such intervals as the Government Agent shall direct.
- 14. The fee for slaughtering shall be 50 cents for each head of cattle and 25 cents for each head of animals other than cattle, and for housing 25 cents and  $12\frac{1}{2}$  cents respectively for each period of 24 hours or part thereof.
- 15. The person in charge of the slaughter-house shall keep a register in the annexed form of all cattle brought to the slaughter-house.
  - 16. No animal shall be slaughtered in the presence of other animals.

#### VITAL STATISTICS.

### Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended March 4, 1916.

Births. -The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 109 (1 European, 12 Burghers, 70 Sinbalese, 11 Tamils, 9 Moors, 3 Malays, and 3 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on January 1, 1916, viz., 255,354) was 22.3, as against 28.9 in the preceding week, 30.3 in the corresponding week of last year, and 22.7 the weekly average for last year,

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 136 (8 Burghers, 70 Sinhalese, 28 Tamils, 18 Moors, 4 Malays, and 8 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 27.8, as against 24.2 in the previous week, 27.6 in the corresponding week of last year, and 25.8 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 136 total deaths, 24 were of infants under one year of age, same as in the preceding-

week, against 38 in the corresponding week of the previous year and 29 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 6.

- Selected Causes of Death.—Twenty deaths from Phthisis were registered, as against 13 in the previous week and 15 the weekly average for last year; of these, 6 were in Maradana (including 2 deaths of non-residents in hospitals), 4 in St. Paul's, 3 in Kotahena, 2 in New Bazaar, 2 in Wellawatta, 1 in Pettah, 1 in San Sebastian, and 1 in Kollupitiya.

2. Eight deaths from *Pneumonia* were registered, as against 20 in the previous week and 11 the weekly average for last year; of these, 3 were in New Bazaar, 2 in San Sebastian, I in Maradana, I in Slave Island, and I in Wellawatta.

Six deaths from Bronchitis were registered. .

3. Five deaths from Enteric Fever were registered, as against 1 in the previous week and 3 the weekly average for last year; of these, 3 were in Maradana (including a death of a non-resident in hospital), 1 in New Bazaar, and 1 in Kollupitiya.

Four deaths from Plague were registered, as against 3 in the previous week; of these, 2 were in New Bazaar,

1 in St. Paul's, and 1 in Maradana. Three cases were reported, as against 4 in the previous week.

5. One death from Chickenpox was registered (in Maradana), as against 3 in the previous week. Two hundred and thirty-five cases were reported, as against 233 in the previous week. Seventeen cases of Measles were reported, as against 10 in the previous week.

Twelve deaths from Infantile Convulsions were registered, 7 from Debility, 5 from Enteritis, 3 from Diarrhæa,

3.from Worms, 2 from Dysentery, 1 from Tetanus, and 59 from Other Causes.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 78.6°, against 78.9° in the preceding week and 81.8° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29 848 in., against 29 840 in. in the preceding week and 29 894 iff. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was nil, against 0.06 in. in the preceding week and 8.14 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.

Births.—The total highs registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 101 (1 European, 8 Burghers, 58 Sinhalese, 10 Tamils, 20 Moors, 2 Malays, and 2 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on January I, 1916, viz., 255,354) was 20.7, as against 22.3 in the preceding week, 30.8 in the corresponding week of last year, and 22.7 the weekly 22.7 beyond 15 Parks 15 Parks

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 115(2 Europeans, 3 Burghers, 46 Sinhalese, 31 Tamils, 24 Moors, 4 Malays, and 5 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 23.5, as against 27.8 in the previous week, 28.0 in the

corresponding week of last year, and 25.8 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 115 total deaths, 20 were of infants under one year of age, as against 24 in the preceding week, 29 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 29 the average for last year.

-Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 7.

Selected Causes of Death. Fifteen deaths from Phthisis were registered, as against 20 in the previous week and 15 the weekly average for last year; of these, 3 were in New Bazaar, 3 in Maradana (including the death of a non-resident in Rose 12 in Pettah, 2 in St. Paul's, 2 in Slave Island, 2 in Kollupitiya, and 1 in Kotahena.

2. Nine deaths from *Pneumonia* were registered, as against 8 in the previous week and 11 the weekly average for last year; of these, 4 were in Maradana, 1 in Pettah, 1 in San Sebastian, 1 in Kotahena, 1 in New Bazaar, and 1 in

Kollupitiya. Six deaths from *Bronchitis* were registered.

3. Thive deaths from *Plague* were registered, as against 4 in the previous week; of these, 3 were in Maradana (including the death of a pauper in hospital whose residence was not known) and 2 in St. Paul's. Five cases were reported, as against 3 in the previous week.
