HEREAS by a Proclamation dated January 6, 1911, and published in the Government Gazette No. 6,420 of January 13, 1911, a certain regulation was made for the town of Colombo, under "The Motor Car Ordinance,

And whereas by a Proclamation dated February 3, 1911, and published in the Government Gazette No. 6,424 of February 10, 1911, certain regulations were made affecting motor cabs within the limits of the town and suburbs of Colombo:

And whereas it is expedient to revoke the said regulations:

Now know Ye that We, the Officer Administering the Government of the Island of Ceylon, in exercise of the power vested in Us by section 5 (1) of "The Motor Car Ordinance, No. 25 of 1908," and with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby revoke the said regulations.

K NOW Ye that We, the Officer Administering the Government, in exercise of the powers in Us vested by section 19 (1) of "The Vehicles Ordinance, 1901," and with the advice of the Executive Council, have made the following by-laws set forth in the Schedule A hereto for the regulation of taxi cabs within the limits of the town and suburbs of Colombo set out and defined in the Schedule B hereto.

Given at Colombo, in the said Island of Ceylon, this Fourteenth day of April, in the year of our Lord One thousand Nine hundred and Sixteen.

#### SCHEDULE A.\*

1. For the purpose of these by-laws a taxi cab means a motor car not exceeding 25 cwt. unloaded used for the purpose of standing or plying for hire in any street or public place.

. No taxi cab shall ply for hire at any place within the limits of the Municipality unless the same shall have been registered as a taxi cab, and unless a license

shall have been granted in respect of the same by the Chairman.

3. On the registration of a motor car as a taxi cab a license shall be granted by the Chairman of the Colombo Municipal Council in the form given in Appendix I.

to these by-laws.

4. No person shall drive a taxi cab within the limits of the Municipality except under a license granted in that behalf by the Chairman. Such license shall be in force till the end of the year within which the same is issued, and shall be in the form given in Appendix II. of these by-laws, and the conditions therein contained shall be read as part of these by-laws.

An applicant for a driver's license under these by-laws shall not be entitled to receive such licens unless he satisfies the Chairman, Colombo Municipal Council, that he is acquainted with the principal places and streets in and around Colombo,

that he is acquainted with the principal places and streets in and about the choines, that he has a thorough knowledge of the prescribed rates of hire, and that he is in all respects a fit person to be the driver of a taxi cab.

6. The license of a driver may be cancelled or suspended or otherwise dealt with by the Chairman, Colombo Municipal Council, for any breach of these by-laws, or of the conditions contained in the license issued to him.

7. No motor car shall be used as a taxi cab unless fitted with a taximeter or approved mechanical device for automatically and visibly registering on each occasion the fare to be charged according to the rates for distance or time or a

combination of distance and time.

Every taximeter shall be fitted with an indicator or handle in the form of a flag, on which shall be printed the words "For hire." The taximeter shall be so constructed that when the indicator is vertical the taximeter shall be out of action. Such indicator shall be so placed as to be clearly visible to any person outside of or in front of the vehicle, and to the hirer when inside.

The vertical position indicates that the vehicle is available for hire, and no driver shall, without reasonable excuse, refuse to accept a fare when the indicator

is in a vertical position.

Any owner, driver, attendant, or other person who shall, with intent to deceive, tamper with the taximeter or the driving mechanism thereof shall be deemed to have committed a breach of this by-law.

8. In every taxi cab there shall be available for the inspection of customers a list of rates, and the fare charged for the hire of the motor shall not exceed the maximum fare calculated according to the scale of the rates set forth in the list as may be applicable (vide Appendix IV.).

- 9. The driver of every taxi cab shall, as soon as he is hired and no sooner, set the taximeter in motion, and upon the termination of the hiring shall immediately stop the same. If he neglect or fail to do so, he shall be deemed to have committed a breach of this by-law. But if a taxi cab is called from a garage or a stand to take up a passenger at any place less than 500 yards from the garage or stand, the taximeter shall not be set in motion until the taxi cab shall arrive at such place and be ready to take up the passenger. Provided that in the event of a taxi cab whilst hired being unable to proceed from any mechanical derangement or tyre failure, either temporarily or otherwise, the driver shall at once stop the mechanism of the taximeter as against the hirer, and shall not re-start the same until such time as the defect is remedied.
- . 10. A driver of a taxi cab shall, in the absence of reasonable cause to the contrary, proceed to the destination named by the hirer by the shortest and quickest route.
- The brakes shall, as far as possible, be so affixed as to be capable of easy adjustment. At least one brake shall be so made as to be applied by the foot of the driver, and at least one shall act directly upon the road wheels.

All brake and steering connections secured with bolts shall have such bolts

secured with nuts, the same to be locked or pinned.

13. Every precaution shall be taken by the owner to see that all parts of the mechanism of the taxi cabs are periodically inspected and kept in proper working order, and a register shall be kept of such inspections in a convenient form giving the particulars shown in Appendix III. to these by-laws. This register shall be open at any reasonable time to the inspection of the Chairman, Colombo Municipal Council, or any person duly authorized by him in that behalf. Any failure to maintain this register, or to produce it when called for by lawful authority, shall be deemed to be a breach of this by-law.

14. No oil shall be allowed to drop upon the roadway, and where a tray or undershield is fixed below the mechanism of the car for the purpose of preventing this, or for any other purpose, such tray or undershield shall be so placed or constructed that no petrol from the tank, supply pipe, or carburetter can collect

therein.

Tanks for petrol must be so placed that any overflow shall neither fall on 15. nor soak into cushions, upholstery, or floor mats in or about the body, but the filling nozzle shall be brought to some point outside the body. No petrol shall be poured into the tank whilst the engine is running, or whilst any lamp other than an electric lamp is burning or on any portion of the car.

16. Every taxi cab shall have at least one driving wheel fitted with an approved means of preventing or limiting side slip, and shall carry at least one spare inflated tyre and rim or other approved device which can, if necessary, be quickly fitted to Such tyre shall be carried in such a position that the number plate is any wheel.

not obscured.

Where acetylene or other gas is used to light the taxi cab, the cylinders or 17. vessels which contain the gas or in which it is generated must be fixed outside in

- such a position as to minimize the danger of accidental ignition.

  18. No printed or written matter other than the sanctioned rates for hire of these by-laws shall appear on the inside or outside of the taxi cab, or be carried by way of advertisement, except with the approval of the Chairman, Colombo Municipal Council.
- 19. The doors, windows, seats, roof, springs, wheels, cushions, linings, panels, &c., and all furniture and appointments of a taxi cab shall be in proper order and repair, the paint and varnish in good condition, and the inside perfectly clean. The floor shall be covered with a mat of rubber, coir, or other suitable material.

20. The Chairman, Colombo Municipal Council, may prohibit the use of a taxi cab which is, in his opinion, unfit to ply for hire, until such time as the defects are

remedied to his satisfaction.

- No horn or other instrument for producing sound which is operated mechanically or electrically shall be used on any taxi cab within the limits of the Colombo Municipality.
  - 22. Every taxi cab shall be provided with a suitable pneumatic horn to be

blown by hand.

- A taxi cab shall not carry more passengers in the aggregate than the number specified in the license, provided that two children over five and under ten years of age shall be counted as one person, and that children under five years of age held in arms or on the lap shall not be counted.
- 24. The driver of a taxi cab shall not permit the same to stand for hire in any street otherwise than on a stand licensed for taxi cabs.

25. No motor car or other mechanically propelled vehicle other than a taxi cab shall ply for hire in the streets or from any public stand within the Municipal limits of Colombo except on a special license from the Chairman.

Motor cars licensed to carry passengers for hire may be permitted to stand on any stand specially set apart by the Chairman for that purpose on obtaining a license from the Chairman, the fee for which shall be at the rate of Rs. 5 a car per month.

26. It shall be lawful for the Chairman at any time to require that any taxi cab or class of taxi cabs should be painted any particular colour or colours either

previous to or after registration.

27. Any person acting in contravention of these by-laws, and also any person causing, suffering, or permitting any other person employed under him or by him or in his interests to act in contravention of these by-laws, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding Rs. 20.

#### APRENDIX II.

License to drive a Taxi Cab within the Limits of the Town and Suburbs of Colombo.

By virtue of the powers vested in the Chairman, Municipal Council, Colombo, by the Taxi Cab By-laws, 1914. this license is granted to ——— to act as driver of any taxi cab, the property of ----. from the date hereof till December 31, 191-, subject to the conditions hereinafter following:-

1. The driver named in this license shall at all times when on duty with a taxi cab wear in a conspicuous position a metal badge bearing the number of this license to be supplied by the Chairman, Colombo Municipal Council, on payment of a fee of Re. 1, such badge to remain the property of the Chairman, Colombo Municipal Council, and to be surrendered if this license is suspended or cancelled for any reason or on the expiry of the same.

2. All changes in the licensee's address to be at once notified to the Chairman, Colombo Municipal Council, in writing signed by the holder of this license, and

quoting the number and date of this license.

3. Neither this license nor the badge referred to shall be transferred or lent to

any other person under any circumstances whatever.

4. A fee of Rs. 2 50 shall be paid to the Chairman, Colombo Municipal Council, on the issue of this license. If this license be suspended or cancelled for any breach of the by-laws or the conditions herein contained, a fee of Rs. 2:50 shall be payable when this license is re-issued or a new one granted.

The rate of hire shall be as follows:-

Tariff 1: 50 cents up to and including the first mile, and 10 cents for each subsequent 352 yards.

Tariff 2: Outside Municipal limits 50 cents for the first 1,405 yards, and 10 cents for each subsequent 281 yards.

Tariff 3: Between 9 P.M. and 6.30 A.M. 50 cents up to and including first 1,175 yards, and 10 cents for each subsequent 235 yards.

Detention: At the rate of Re. 1.80 per hour.

The above rates shall be automatically indicated on the meter.

Extras: (a) For a third passenger an additional 50 cents, and for a fourth passenger

an additional 25 cents for the journey shall be paid, irrespective of distance.

(b) If the taxi cab be discharged outside the Colombo Municipal limits, the passenger shall pay for the return journey up to the Municipal limits only, at the rate of 25 cents per mile between 6.30 A.M. and 9 P.M., and at the rate of 35 cents per mile between 9 P.M. and 6.30 A.M.

(c) A charge of 10 cents shall be paid by the passenger for each piece of luggage

carried other than hand luggage.

All extras shall be marked up on the meter by the drivers before commencing the journey.

## SCHEDULE.

No headlight shall be used within the limits of the Municipality of Colombo except on the following conditions:—

- 1. In the case of electric headlights, the lowest sector of the reflector below the level of the light shall be cut off to the extent of at least one-third of the surface of the whole reflector by means of a shield or other device or contrivance with a dead black surface.
- 2. In the case of gas headlights, the whole of the lower half of the reflector at the back of the light shall be completely cut off by the interposition between the light and the reflector of a shield or some other device or contrivance with a blackened surface.

## "THE LOCAL BOARDS ORDINANCE, 1898."

THE following by-laws made by the Local Board of Kalutara, under section 56 (7) of "The Local Boards Ordinance, 1898," and confirmed by His Excellency the Officer Administering the Government, with the advice of the Executive Council, are published for general information.

## By-laws referred to.

1. No person shall commence the manufacture of aerated waters within the limits of the Local Board of Kalutara for the purpose of sale without giving one month's previous notice in writing to the Chairman of the Board.

2. No aerated water factory shall be situated within less than 150 feet from any gala, stable, or other building used for keeping animals by day and night, or of any latring or cessnit. No pert of the factory shall be used as a dwelling house.

latrine or cesspit. No part of the factory shall be used as a dwelling house.

3. All premises used for the manufacture of aerated waters must be well lighted and ventilated, must have cement floors, must be provided with suitably built drains to carry off waste material, and must be kept clean and free from dirt and dust. The preparation of the syrups must be carried out in a separate fly-proof room. All chemicals and other materials used in the manufacture of the waters must be of good quality. All utensils and machinery employed in the manufacture must be kept scrupulously clean.

- 4. The water used in the manufacture shall be obtained from a source adequately protected from contamination and approved of by the Chairman of the Board. It shall be transported to the factory by means which shall ensure that no pollution occurs in transit. It shall be stored at the factory in properly constructed tanks or reservoirs connecting with the aerating apparatus.
- 5. All water used in the manufacture of aerated waters shall be passed through a Jewell or other filter approved by the Chairman and connected with the plant, provided that the Chairman shall have power to exempt from the operation of this rule water derived from any approved public supply.
- 6. Whenever the Secretary or Inspector of the Board is satisfied that any aerated water, either manufactured within the limits of the Board or introduced to such limits from outside, is of such bad quality as to be unfit for human consumption, he may seize such waters and produce them before a Government Medical Officer, and if it appears to such Government Medical Officer that such waters are unfit for human consumption, he may order the same to be destroyed. Any person manufacturing any aerated water which shall be proved to the satisfaction of the court to be unfit for human consumption shall be guilty of an offence.
- 7. All bottles used in the manufacture of aerated waters shall be washed with filtered water and shall be kept scrupulously clean.
- 8. Every bottle containing aerated water shall bear a label setting out the description of the water and the place of manufacture, the name of the person or the firm owning the factory, and the number assigned to the factory by the Chairman of the Board.
- 9. No person under 12 years of age shall be employed in any aerated water factory, nor any person suffering from any cutaneous or contagious disease.
- 10. All employés engaged in the filling of bottles with gas shall wear fine-meshed wire face- and neck-shields and leather gloves.

## "THE SMALL TOWNS SANITARY ORDINANCE, 1892."

THE following by-laws made by the Sanitary Board of the Hambantota District, under section 9 E (f) of Ordinance No. 18 of 1892, and confirmed by His Excellency the Officer Administering the Government, with the advice of the Executive Council, are published for general information.

#### BY-LAWS REFERRED TO.

- 1. No person shall commence the manufacture of aerated waters within the limits of the Sanitary Board for the purposes of sale without giving one month's previous notice in writing to the Chairman of the Board.
- 2. No aerated water factory shall be situated within less than 150 feet rom any gala, stable, or other building used for keeping animals by day and night, or of any latrine or cesspit. No part of the factory shall be used as a dwelling house.
- 3. All premises used for manufacture of aerated waters must be well lighted and ventilated, must have cemented floors, must be provided with suitably built drains to carry off waste material, and must be kept clean and free from dirt and dust. The preparation of the syrups must be carried out in a separate fly-proof room. All chemicals and other materials used in the manufacture of the waters must be of good quality. All utensils and machinery employed in the manufacture must be kept scrupulously clean.
- 4. The water used in the manufacture shall be obtained from a source adequately protected from contamination and approved of by the Chairman of the Board. It shall be transported to the factory by means which shall ensure that no pollution occurs in transit. It shall be stored at the factory in properly constructed tanks or reservoirs connecting with the aerating apparatus.
- 5. All water used in the manufacture of aerated waters shall be passed through a Jewell or other filter approved by the Chairman and connected with the plant, provided that the Chairman shall have power to exempt from the operation of this rule water derived from an approved public supply.
- 6. Whenever the Supervisor or Inspector of the Board is satisfied that any aerated water, either manufactured within the limits of the Board or introduced into such limits from outside, is of such bad quality as to be unfit for human consumption, he may seize such waters and produce them before the Government Medical Officer, and if it appears to such Government Medical Officer that such waters are unfit for human consumption, he may order the same to be destroyed. Any person manufacturing any aerated water which shall be proved to the satisfaction of the court to be unfit for human consumption shall be guilty of an offence.
- 7. All bottles used in the manufacture of aerated waters shall be washed with filtered water and shall be kept scrupulously clean.
- 8. Every bottle containing aerated water shall bear a label setting out the description of the water and the place of manufacture, the name of the person or firm owning the factory, and the number assigned to the factory by the Chairman of the Board.
- 9. No person under 12 years of age shall be employed in any aerated water factory, nor any person suffering from any cutaneous or contagious disease.
- 10. All employés engaged in the filling of bottles with gas shall wear fine-meshed wire face- and neck-shields and leather gloves.

## CONSIGNMENT OF GOODS TO H. M. CONSULS ABROAD.

The attention of the Board of Trade has been called to a practice on the part of shippers of consigning their goods to His Majesty's Consular Officers stationed in different parts of the world, and sending to them bills of lading and invoices, for delivery to third parties. As it is impossible for His Majesty's Consular Officers to undertake work of this character, goods should in no circumstances be consigned to them unless the senders are expressly so authorized or directed by His Majesty's Government.

The Woods and Stones Licensing Committee (Gwydyr House, Whitehall, London, S.W.) desire to give notice that all consignments of furniture woods, hardwoods, and veneers, and of stones and slates which can be proved to have been despatched to the consignees from the place of origin on or before February 15 will be allowed to be to be imported on arrival in this country.

All such consignments will be released on the production to the Customs Officers of bills of lading or railway receipts showing that the goods were despatched on or before the date mentioned.

## VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended April 15, 1916.

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 71 (1 European, 4 Burghers, 35 Sinhalese, 10 Tamils, 15 Moors, 4 Malays, and 2 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on January 1, 1916, viz., 255,354) was 14.5, as against 18.4 in the preceding week, 20.0 in the corresponding week of last year, and 22.7 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 112 (6 Burghers, 50 Sinhalese, 28 Tamils, 18 Moors, 6 Malays, and The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 22 9, as against 24 8 in the previous week, 21 3 in the corresponding week of last year, and 25.8 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 112 total deaths, 24 were of infants under one year of age, same as in the preceding week, against 26 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 29 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 2.

Principal Causes of Death.—Thirteen deaths from Phthisis were registered, as against 17 in the previous week and 15 the weekly average for last year. Of these, 6 were in Maradana (including 4 deaths of non-residents in hospitals), 3 in St. Paul's, 3 in Kotahena, and 1 in Slave Island.

- 2. Eleven deaths from *Pneumonia* were registered, as against 17 in the previous week and 11 the weekly average for last year. Of these, 3 were in St. Paul's, 3 in Maradana, 3 in Slave Island, and 2 in Kotahena. Three deaths from Bronchitis were registered.
- 3. Four deaths from Enteric Fever were registered, as against 2 in the previous week and 3 the weekly average for last year. Of these, I was in Pettah, I in Maradana (of a non-resident in hospital), I in Slave Island, and I in Wellawatta.
- 4. One death from Plague was registered (in St. Paul's), as against 3 in the previous week and 2 the weekly average for last year. Three cases were reported, as in the previous week.
- 5. Eleven death from Debility were registered, 10 from Infantile Convulsions, 5 from Enteritis, 4 from Diarrhæa, 3 from Tetanus, 2 from Worms, and 45 from Other Causes.
- 6. One hundred and seventy-one cases of Chickenpox were reported, as in the previous week. Forty-seven cases of Measles were reported, as against 49 in the previous week. No deaths were registered from either cause.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 82.7°, against 81.8° in the preceding week and 82.5° in the corresponding week week are the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.810 in., against 29.839 in. in the preceding week and 29.849 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 1.61 in., against 2.64 in. in the preceding week and 1.73 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.
